Roosevelt Tells Nation Ships Will Shoot First

WASHINGTON — Secretary of State Hull indicated Friday Germany's actions will determine what areas the United States will consider "defensive waters" in which American warships will shoot, first in their patrols to defend shipping against Axis attacks.

Asked to define the waters concerned, Hull told reporters it must be remembered that the United States confronted a world move-ment of force for the purpose of conquest of continents and seas.

The discussion was on President Roosevelt's speech Thursday night in which the president bluntly bar-red vast reaches of the seas to what he called "rattlesnake" raiders carrying the flags of Germany and Italy. Mr. Roosevelt backed up the no tresspass order with guns of the United States fleet.

The opposing forces, Hull said, will have something to say concerning areas of the sea which the United States may or may not find necessary to defend in order to pro tect this hemisphere.

Asked whether the United States would now send a formal note to the German government protesting Nazi attacks on American shipping, Hull simply referred questioners to President Roosevelt's speech. To Protect Any Ship.

Soviets Cross Dnieper And Take Villages

Nazi Leader Loses Chance Of Equaling Napoleon's Advance

By The Associated Press

MOSCOW — Counter-attacking Russians crossed the lower Dnieper at four points Friday and claimed capture of an island and two villages from the Germans even as new reverses for the Wehrmacht in the bloody Smolensk central sector dashed all Adolf Hitler's hopes of equaling Napoleon's 83-day march to Moscow.

In his 83rd day of the Nazi invasion, Marshal Semeon Timoshenko's central Red Army reported recapture of the village of Olka as its latest success in the continuing westward thrust against the invaders. Red Star, the Soviet army newspaper, said a platoon scouted the village in advance and then a tank charge threw the Germans out. More than 100 men, 17 field guns and 10 mortars were left behind.

Fighting extended all up and down the central zone, Red Star saying the Germans were being driven back upon Smolensk at the rate of 7 to 10 miles a day.





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
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
