the biggest tournament ever held in the history of the game. Although in his seventies, he will also put over many a fast bid and play during the tournament.

The major came to the summer session of the nationals at Asbury Park to invite the players to Richmond and stayed long enough to play in one session. I happened to kibitz the bidding and play of today's hand.

North opened the deuce of hearts, and the major (West) carefully avoided ruffing in dummy. Instead he discarded a diamond and South won with the ace of hearts.

A spade was returned in a vain attempt to cut down dummy's ruffing power, but the major won and proceeded to make his doubled contract.

He cashed the king of hearts, discarding another diamond from dummy. Then he was able to ruff both of his own small diamonds in the first heart trick. You will note that if the major had ruffed the opening lead, he would have lost a club and two diamonds.

Swiss Protest Air Space Was Violated

BERN, Switzerland (AP)—The Swiss minister to Britain has protested as "a grave violation of Switzerland's air space" the passage of some 60 British planes the night of Sept. 28-29, presumably squadrons which heavily raided Italian cities, the foreign office announced Tuesday.

The announcement said the British flights called forth "energetic action" by the Swiss anti-aircraft defense.

On the night in question Genoa, Turin and other cities of Northern Italy were attacked by the RAF.

Court Hears Suit On Oil-Gas Lease

MONAHANS (Special)—Judge J. A. Drane opened the fall term of 109th District Court here Monday, and the court began hearing the O'Brien vs. Gulf Oil Corporation suit, seeking to cancel an oil and gas lease.

One of the heaviest dockets in recent years faces the court. The grand jury is expected to remain in session this week investigating about 22 criminal violations.

U. S. Oil Production Shows Small Increase

TULSA, Okla. (AP)—Daily crude oil production in the United States increased 735 barrels to 4,062,000 for the week ended Sept. 27, the Oil and Gas Journal said Tuesday.

Production for the year thus far was 1,007,894,140 barrels compared to 1,003,937,439 for the same period of 1940.

Illinois production was 9,550 to 416,903; Louisiana, 1,355 to 335,395; Michigan, 970 to 52,980; Oklahoma, 2,300 to 424,550; Rocky Mountain area, 3,850 to 115,550, and East Texas, 100 to 369,700.

California production was down to 111,900; Kansas, 150 to 258,650, and Texas, 3,400 to 1,458,850.

Farmers Bring More Pickers For Harvest

More cotton pickers are being brought to Midland County to harvest the large crop and more are needed.

John Graham left Monday for Central and East Texas to get pickers.

Two loads of pickers arrived here Sunday, one from Athens, where two other loads had been obtained.

DALLAS (AP)—A two-day conference to be held here Wednesday and Thursday will be devoted to working out preliminaries of six annual Methodist conferences in Texas and New Mexico.

Bishops Ivan Lee Holt and A. Frank Smith, who will preside over the conferences, will meet with approximately 50 district superintendents of the various conferences and pastors of churches at Southern Methodist University Wednesday morning.

Pastoral changes and similar business will be discussed by the bishops with district superintendents.
