

### Navy Announces No Loss Of Lives In Latest Attack

Department Says Ship Hit Without Warning Southwest Of Iceland

By The Associated Press WASHINGTON. - The Navy announced Tuesday another torpedoing in North Atlantic waters-that of the United States Naval tanker Salinas-but said that happily there was no further loss of life to add to the 97 men presumed lost on the sunken destroyer Reuben

James. The Salinas was "torpedoed without warning," a terse Navy statement said. Seriously damaged, she made her way to port.

"No details of the damage will be released as it will be of no value except to the Nazis," the Navy said in disclosing that the tanker was hit last Wednesday night southwest of Iceland. This was one day before, and in



"The two-bids in suits, as used in the 'V. V.' system, are bid merely for their defensive value. of a pre-emptive nature their size is hardly forbidding enough to make the opponents hesitate. In fact, rather than cause hesitation, they create a compelling influence upon the opponents to over-extend themselves for fear of being "psyched" out of what is coming to them by this wanton display of weakness.

"There is another efficacious angle, however. It is the ability to mention one's suit for a lead against an anticipated adverse no trump without the risk of one's partner mistaking this defensive bid for one of aggression. This method frustrates 'trap-passing' by the opposition and brings them out into the poen

"Furthermore, it seldom indicates the 'killing lead' when the opponents become the defenders. Great liberties may be taken against vul-nerable opponents though extreme discretion in counting playingtricks must be exercised when the vulnerability is the same or unfav-

Camilli led the National League League in home runs with 34, in runs batted in with 120, and pushed the Dodgers over many humps along the Pennant trail.

But his batting average was only 285 and it is rare—almost unheard of—for the most valuable player award to go to a hitter below the .300 bracket. Therefore the universial recognition given Camilli was a tremendous tribute to his leadership and all-around play.

The 33-year-old Californian, who owns a small ranch near Aytonville, Calif., and is the proud father of ive children, is a veteran of nine rears service in the National League and always has been considered one of its leading first basemen. He batted .315 and .339 in 1935 and 1936 for the Phillies.
