Stalin Predicts Russian Victory Over Bleeding' Germany

Soviets Batter

Fatalistically, Joseph Stalin Friday gives Nazi Germany "one year, maybe" before it explodes. chooses for his prediction a sort of Black Friday for Germany, a day on which the Nazi armies before Moscow have suffered unexpected reverses and a day on which a bil-lion dollars have been entered to the credit of Soviet Russia on Washington's lease-lend book.

However, if one carefully considers Stalin's first speech, the one he made Thursday, it looks as if his "one year, maybe" forecast is based on the expectation that a second fighting front will be set up in Western Europe within that time. "What is the cause of the tem-

porary lack of success of the Red Army?" Stalin asked, in Thursday's broadcast speech. "One of the causes is definitely the lack of a second front in Europe against the German Fascists. The matter is that at the present time on the European continent there are no armies of Great Britain and the United States conducting war against Fascists.' Invasion Plan Exists

Coming from Stalin, this is bound to have the most profound effect in England on public opinion, already querulous about the extent of aid which is going to Russia. It will hasten, although not necessarily change, the plan of the imperial general staff for the opening of a

The British do not conceal the fact that such a plan exists and they say it will be put into effect when "the time is opportune." Well grounded informants here and in Washington believe that the first phase of this plan is a large-scale offensive to stamp out the Germans in Libya, and that the second front on the continent will be opened up from African bases, very possibly in Italy.

WASHINGTON (AP)—High administration officials said Friday President Roosevelt would veto the pending price-control bill, which critics say would permit sharp increases in the cost of agricultural commodities, if it reached his desk in the form recommended by the House banking committee.

At his press conference earlier in the day, the Chief Executive did not answer questions concerning ceilings for farm prices but it was bill's restrictions against establishing ceilings for those commodities below the 1919-29 average were ob-

jectionable to the President. They have been criticized by members of the committee as an "invitatino to inflation" on the ground that they would permit prices for some farm products, including cotton, lamb, sugar and corn, to rise 20 per cent or more.

The Case Of Russia

Not Nazi Germany, but Soviet Russia is the surprise of surprises in this European war. People are waking up to the fact that they were misinformed and misled about Russia. Hatred of Communism and repugnance to its methods had most to do with it.

Each vocal prewar visitor to Russia saw the great experiment through his own ideological glasses. The pros reported everything rosy in the garden. The anti-Bolsheviks reported quite the contrary. As the pros were often self-confessed Reds or Pinks or fellow-travelers, their testimony was largely discounted. The antis had the field, so far as popular belief was concerned.



Unlike any other system, the "V. V." system does not use an honor count table. It deals entirely with the eight high cards, the four aces and four kings.

In the preceding articles I have shown you how they determine the number of high cards held in the combined hands. I might add one thought in regard to a second hand bid. Charles E. Van Vleck explained that you have a right to shade your second hand bid, as he likes to add the value of the original bidder's pass to his hand.



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
