

Jahr, "there is hardly a practicing physician who has not encountered some grave illness which had been treated as a cold for days or even weeks... poliomyelitis, pneumonia, meningitis and many other important diseases start with symptoms of a cold.'

Dr. Jahr suggests three steps to be taken at the onset of what seems to be a cold-isolation of the patient from ohers, rest in bed if there is any suspicion of fever, and immediate notification of the family physician.

This is the season when colds are most prevalent. Don't take chances-minor ailments, wrongly treated and diagnosed, may lead to grave illness. The best advice is to call your doctor.



Racket City Turns Up New Gyp Method

SHANGHAI (UP)—Already known as one of the world's greatest "racket" cities, Shanghai is developing a new one, which hits virtually every foreigner or Chinese desiring to change living quarters inside the French Concession or the International Settlement. This the so-called key money racket.

The "business" is based on the extraordinary demand for housing due to extreme shortage of living quarters as a result of influx of refugees from the countryside, coupled with the fact there was little construction in the past four years. The racket functions simply but effectively. Whenever a vacancy occurs, the vacant flat is placed in the hands of a real estate agent, and he simply will refuse to show the flat, describe it or even disclose its location without a deposit -which is never returned even if the flat is not taken.

A recent investigation showed that key money was demanded for 28 out of 29 flats offered for rent through agency advertisements in newspapers. The key money ranged D. Mahaffey of Ada, Okla., as

National Council Reports Traffic Situation Better

Safety Council Friday reported progress in the nationwide effort to dam the rising tide of accidents in the

United States. The increase has not been stopped, the council said, but a peak rise of 23 per cent in traffic deaths in August has been cut to a 13 per cent increase in September and 12 per cent in October.

It was in August that President Roosevelt called upon the council to lead a defense emergency safety campaign to curb the growing menace. In an attempt to offset the usual rise in traffic deaths during the year-end holiday season, the council and 130 cooperating organizations are undertaking a special Christmas safety drive with the theme, "give courtesy for Christ-

The October traffic total was 4,050, approximately 400 greater than in October, 1940, but the 12 per cent rise was the smallest for any month this year. Traffic deaths for the first ten months of 1941 totaled 31,-

620, a 16 per cent rise over the 27,210 toll for the same 1940 period. Travel in September, the latest month for which mileage figures are available, was 13 per cent greater than in September, 1940. This was identical to the fatality increase. For the first nine months of this year travel was up 12 per cent and the mileage death rate 4 per cent.





McKENNEY ON BRIDGE

By William E. McKenney America's Card Authority

Bridge players from all parts of the country will be gathering at Richmond, Va., the first week in December for the winter national tournament. All will be top-flight players, but there will be mistakes made at the bridge tables in Rich-mond, just as there are slip-ups every time four contract fans get together for a session.



The winners of the tournament will be those who commit the fewest errors, who look ahead on every hand. A little study might have saved this contract.

Two rounds of hearts were led, West ruffing the second. After taking the king and ace of trumps, declarer tried running the diamonds, but found South with a fourth-round stopper.

So he ruffed out his losing diamond, ruffed Dummy's last heart and led a trump, hoping for a miracle. But the two top clubs and a long heart won the last three tricks.

It is discouraging to have to try to win a trick with the weak East-West clubs. Nevertheless declarer was bound to attempt it when the diamonds failed to break. He should have anticipated this possible necessity by winning the third dia-

mond in dummy.

He knew that South was dealt three spades and at least four hearts. It was a practical certainty that South was shorter in clubs than North. After South showed up with four diamonds, he was marked for not more than two

Then dummy should have led a club through him, West playing the queen if South ducked. This play will work if South holds not more than two clubs, regardless of how the honors are split.

Actually, North takes his king and leads a third heart, West ruffs. leads a club and ducks in dummy dropping the ace.






