Nippon Gets Ready To Spring On Malaya And U. S. Subs Rip Fleet

By The Associated Press Two weeks of war in the Pacific Sunday found the Japanese strangling a sacrificial band of British Imperial troops on Hongkong Island, fighting fiercely to widen a new foothold in the Philippines, and gathering new strength for a new leap in Malaya, while Dutch airmen and United States submarines ripped more holes in the Japanese fleet.

The new Japanese landing in the Philippines at dawn Saturday was at Davao, on Mindanao Island, and defense forces immediately flung themselves on the invaders. The fighting con-tinued all day, and at 2:15 a. m. Sunday Manila time (11:15 a. m. Saturday CST) the U.S. Army headquarters was reported out of communication with the city, 600 miles south of Manila, since Saturday afternoon.

Japan was still carrying the ball for the Axis in the world struggle, because the Germans, Italians, and their hangers-on were taking a terrific beating on Russia's snow-swept plains and in the Libyan desert.

Hongkong's fall was regarded as inevitable. But the British Tommies, Canadians and Indian Sikhs who have no hope of reinforcements fought on from atop Victoria Peak

SAN FRANCISCO-The Navy received unconfirmed reports enemy submarines fired on two oil tankers near the California coast Saturday, apparently scoring a hit on one, and chasing the other tanker into port.

# Peru Discredits U.S. Neighborliness

By Fred S. Ferguson President of NEA Service LIMA.—It is necessary to be in Lima only a short time before one begins to realize that the United States is hardly regarded as a No. 1 pal and playmate, insofar as the controling elements in the Peruvian Government are concerned. It is a question whether the sentiment is as much pro-German as it is just plain suspicion of the United States, but those in the government and close to it naturally find plenty of sympathy for their position in the German Embassy.

There is a suspicion and distrust of North American aims. Influential Peruvian leaders will tell you they raise the question of North America's inmperialistic aims in South America, and express their resentment of the interference of the United States in the little affair with Ecuador, and the seizure by the United States of 18 light bombers which Peru had pur-chased from the Norwegian government.

The well-to-do, conservative fac-tions of old families are in control in Peru. Forty-six per cent of the population of the country is pure Indian, and illiterate.

A workman, or unskilled laborer receives about as much in pay per day as does an American workman per hour. There is a vast space between the thin upper crust, which controls and directs and the middle and the lower crust which toils, and which has lived for hundreds of years about as it is living now.

Hence, when there is talk of high wages, short hours. better housing and all that goes with this as a major part of the pattern for democracy, there are many, many attacks of chills followed by



### THE SPANISH ANGLE IS USED BY NAZIS

As the general sentiment to be found is not so much pro-German, as anti-American, so the German propaganda directed against the United States avoids the direct German angle, but emphasizes the Spanish. The desirability of ad-hering to European principles, as opposed to Pan-Americanism, is emphasized and the traditional ties with all that is Spanish are stress-

For instance, an elaborate fountain which squirts playfully in the square in front of the Presidential palace and the Cathedral was a gift from Spain some 250 years ago, as compared with the com-paratively recent interest of the United States in Peru.

Those in control in Peru do not want to mediate the differences with Ecuador but the United States has taken on the role of mediator. The Peruvians simply want to keep the territory they have occupied and regard the American Government as partial to Ecuador because of the proposal GIVES STAMPS PROGRAM of mediation. 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


