Ruling on 'Foreign' Farm Help Stirs Senators: Easing of Bans Seen

There may yet be hope for Bailey county farmers in the troublesome labor picture. A faint gleam was visible this past week after U. S. senators, in a floor debate, chastized the Secretary of Labor for his domestic farm help ruling, a ruling which virtually eliminated foreign "cheap" labor.

That was pointed out this week by Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., which said cautiously:

"There is still hope in some quarters that all is not yet lost to farmers in the controversy over whether the Secretary of Labor will permit the importaton of supplemental farm workers when citizen labor is not available and willing to do the job."

The National Council of Agricultural Employees (PCG is a co - founder and charter member) reports that recently a group of bi - partisan senators "severely criticized the Department of Labor's farm labor policies from the senate

Chairman of the Senate Agriculture committee, Sen. Allen J. Ellener, Louisiana, opened

the debate with a statement reviewing the recent hearings held by his committee. He said the Secretaries of Labor and Agriculture had heavy responsibilities to protect the interest of all concerned, and called on them to "make it plain and certain to growers that if, as, and when, crops that are to be planted become mature for harvest a sufficient number of stoop laborers will be able to come into the country should it be necessary to have those people do the work."

Florida, whose constituents this year reportedly have suffered losses for lack of labor to harvest citrus crops, held the Senate floor for over three hours. He said between \$4 and \$6 million dollars had been lost from insufficient harvest labor and that there is also grave danger of sugar cane losses attributable to the same cause. The Senator termed arguments that Congress intended to end foreign supplemental labor programs as "completely inaccurate, completely false and is shown to be such by the debate (on Public Law 78) in numerous places." Senator Holland expressed sharp disagreement with the Secretary of Labor's assumption of authority to set wages and hours of farm workers, and pointed out that the farm labor problem was one affecting major areas of the coun-

Other Senators - Democrats and Republicans alike - from Texas, California, Michigan, Wyoming, Colorado, Ohio, Tennessee, Arizona and Oregon expressed similar criticism of the Secretary of Labor's current

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farm labor policies. And, following this lashing from the Senate, a group of House members took the Labor Secretary to task on February 19.

Still Secretary Wirtz continues to refuse to certify foreign supplemental workers. His view remains that sufficient domestic labor is now and will be available to meet growers' require-

On this point, Senator George Smathers of Florida, said: "It appears to me that with the Secretary of Agriculture, who agrees with us on one side, and the Secretary of Labor, who

does not agree with us on the other side, the eventual solution of the problem will probably come through our making an appointment, en masse perhaps, with the President of the United States and presenting to him this very real problem insofar as we are concerned, and the very real problem insofar as the cost of living is concerned ... It is to be hoped that we shall obtain the relief that is so urgently needed."

At least the situation is not being allowed to rest, and so long as the fire burns, there is hope the pot will boil.
