Arabia Comes to the Point

Amir Saud, crown prince of Saudi Arabia, presented Harry Truman with a bejeweled sword and dagger as gifts from his father the other day. This puzzles us. We had heard rumors about the quality of those 30-pound turkeys which the White House has received, but we never knew anybody suspected they were that tough.

The President gets a lot of curi-ous presents, but this sword and dagger one gives us pause. If we were a Republican congressman we would feel uneasy. If we were Mrs. Truman we would feel fidgety, too. (In fact even if we were Harry we wouldn't like it.)

This country has had Presidents with whose personalities a sword and dagger might not clash. But Harry is not the type. Even a cloak, sheet or turban wouldn't help matters.

It would be a step from all that to an Arabian horse. After that a President does not belong to the American people. He belongs to the films.

#### He even lays himself open to becoming a double feature.

Prince Saud in presenting the gifts also handed Harry a letter from his old man, the Imperial Poobah of Saudi Arabia, where the oil comes from. What did the letter say? That's important. Did it contain a set of directions for sword and dagger usage?

Did it open up "Dear Harry: The next paragraph will show you how to attach these implements to Senator Taft's chair"? Was there a postscript "Also mighty handy for use if you travel at all by motor bus or subway"?

Anywhere in the letter were there the words, "Look sharp, act sharp, be sharp!"?

In return Prince Saud got an auto-graphed photo of Mr. Truman. It does not seem to us that an autographed photo of the President is quite in the mood in such an exchange. If we were the President's secretary we would throw in a lariat and a branding iron, or some-

WHAT brand or breed of athletes make the most money out of professional sport? How do salaries paid out today compare with

those of the past? Those marvelling at the salaries paid to Bob Feller, Charlie Trippi and others fail to recall the total amounts col-lected by Babe Ruth annually from all of his financial deals. They also overlook the change picked up by Red Grange after he left Illinois

**Red Grange** to play with the Chicago Bears.

In addition to his contract with the Bears, the Redhead made a motion picture called "Two Minutes to Play." As I recall Grange's conversation at the time, something like two years after he had left Illinois, he was around \$250,000 in front, and those were the golden, happy years when they let you keep most of what you made, when there were no 70 and 80 and 90 per cent brackets.

The Galloping Ghost at the end of two years had made and kept more money than any four stars could do today. Unfortunately in other deals with C. C. Pyle, Grange blew a big part of his budding fortune.

Babe Ruth averaged far more than \$100,000 a year in his prime. There were years when he passed the \$200,000 count, including all the sidelines with which he dallied.

Feller and Trippi have ranged into rich pastures, but they won't be so rich when they have paid taxes on their various checks. Don't forget that when Gene Tunney received a a check for more than \$900,000 after his second fight with Dempsey, more than 20 years ago, Tunney re-tained around 90 per cent of his pay. Today the tax department would take 90 per cent and leave Tunney 10 per cent.

In actual cash returns, Feller's \$80,000 won't approach Babe Ruth's \$80,000, not by \$30,000 or more.

WASHINGTON. - All the angry shouting and politicking which surrounded UNRRA during the last two years have given taxpayers the general impression that this global agency was just tossing money down the drain. That, however, was not the case. Here are some little-known facts about UNRRA's remarkable accomplishments.

UNRRA supplied enough grain to make 11,500,000 loaves of bread for Europe, prevented Europe from becoming a disease-ravaged, epidemicplagued continent, rebuilt health departments all over Europe, supplied them with DDT, penicillin and sulpha drugs. It inoculated hundreds of thousands against typhus and yphoid, thus preventing the type of epidemic that ravaged Europe after World War I. Last year UNRRA fed at least one

neal a day to five million children, helped reclaim 10 million acres of flood land for planting this year. It took care of one million displaced persons, provided them food and shelter, saw hundreds of thousands of them safely home.

Despite its errors on the political side, UNRRA did two things. The agency made nations work together in harmony, made the postwar world better world for millions who otherwise might have perished. It is only fair to remember this side of the picture.

Since reaching these shores, Hussein has cast off his role of newsman and has registered with the justice department as a foreign agent repre-senting "Young Egypt." He has been selling his special brand of pro-Fascist, anti-British venom.

#### CAPITAL CHAFF

It hasn't leaked out, but Brig. Gen. Elliott Roosevelt was recommended for a permanent reserve commission by the army reserve officers commissioning board, headed by Lt. Gen. Jimmy Doolittle.
