In keeping with the curtailment of Federal funds, the Veterans Administration regional office at Lubbock has been directed to suspend itinerant contact services throughout the region, Robert W. Sisson, West Texas VA regional manager announces.

Veterans in towns formerly visited on an itinerant basis will be served only in an extreme emergency by VA contact representatives. In such instances veterans should communicate with the nearest contact office. The regular schedule of VA itinerant service will be discontinued immediately, Sisson stated.

Contact offices will remain open Monday through Saturday in Abilene, Amarillo, Childress, Big Spring, Borger, El Paso, Lubbock, Odessa and San Angelo. Pecos contact office will be open Monday through Friday.

The VA regional office, located at Lubbock Army Air Field, has been directed to operate on a forty hour work week, and will not be open on Saturday it was pointed out.

"Every effort will be made to render efficient and expeditious service to West Texas veterans. Services to victims of war must not slacken," Sisson asserted.

A four day sea scouting camp will be held on the Naval Air Base lake at Denison, Texas in August.

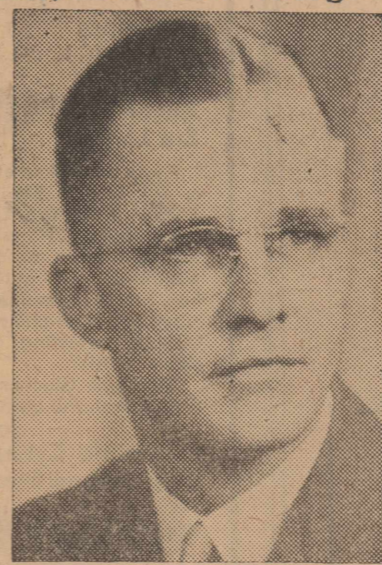
A Senioree will be held at Eagle Mountain Lake Marine base near Fort Worth where all forms of scouting will be enjoyed for five days during August.

Miss Skillin will represent Sherman County in the state contest to be held in College Station in August.

Dresses were placed in three groups for judging. Wash dresses, or suits for school or sports with accessories were judged in the first group. Winners of this group were: Georgana Skillin, first; Mildred Bennett, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Harold Bennett, second; and Mary Nan Davis, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Wright Davis, third.

Second Group

Classified in the second group were: "Best dresses," or ensemble including dress of rayon, silk, cotton or other suitable fabrics, and accessories. First place was taken by Miss Catherine Williams, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. C. G. Williams, second place by Louise Hollis, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Lee Hollis.

Third Group

The third group was composed of wool or part wool dresses, suit or ensemble for school, sport, or street wear, and accessories. Miss Marjorie Boney, daughter of Mrs. Lelah Boney placed first in her division.

Eleven girls completed dresses for the contest. Three dresses were from the Texhoma club and eight by Stratford girls. Other girls entering the contest were: Patricia Naugle, Patsy Coffman and Mary Lou Garoutte of Stratford. Colleen Walthall and Frances Davis of Texhoma made dresses but were not present for the revue.

All participants were judged by the following score card which was sent out by the clothing specialist, Mrs. Dora Barns, of College Station: individuality and style, 20 points; suitability of design and color of fabric to purpose, 15 points; construction, 15 points; posture and poise, 15 points; grooming 10 points; choice of accessories, 10 points; judgment shown in distribution of cost, 5 points; and clothing record, 10 points. The same score card will be used in the state revue.

The dresses ranged in cost from about \$2.40 to \$11.00. The girls were fourteen and fifteen years of age. Their clothing demonstrations for the year were begun by making these garments.

Amir Saud, crown prince of Saudi Arabia, presented Harry Truman with a bejeweled sword and dagger as gifts from his father the other day. This puzzles us. We had heard rumors about the quality of those 30-pound turkeys which the White House has received, but we never knew anybody suspected they were that tough.

The President gets a lot of curious presents, but this sword and dagger one gives us pause. If we were a Republican congressman we would feel uneasy. If we were Mrs. Truman we would feel fidgety, too. (In fact even if we were Harry we wouldn't like it.)

This country has had Presidents with whose personalities a sword and dagger might not clash. But Harry is not the type. Even a cloak, sheet or turban wouldn't help matters.

It would be a step from all that to an Arabian horse. After that a President does not belong to the American people. He belongs to the films.

He even lays himself open to becoming a double feature.

The blocked kick, the scramble for the ball, the breathless uncertainty for a few seconds and then, perhaps, a kid breaking from the pack to score a long run . . . oh, man! The game is being steadily modified to a point where it is more fun watching the cheer leaders.

Artur Rodzinski, former conductor of the New York Philharmonic, has gone to the Chicago Symphony. Rodzinski asked for and was given his outright release by the New York club, but we think if it had been smart it could have had a large cash sum, six outfield violinists and a couple of southpaw oboe players for him.



WHAT brand or breed of athletes make the most money out of professional sport? How do salaries paid out today compare with those of the past?

Those marvelling at the salaries paid to Bob Feller, Charlie Trippi and others fail to recall the total amounts collected by Babe Ruth annually from all of his financial deals. They also overlook the change picked up by Red Grange after he left Illinois to play with the Chicago Bears.

Red Grange

In addition to his contract with the Bears, the Redhead made a motion picture called "Two Minutes to Play." As I recall Grange's conversation at the time, something like two years after he had left Illinois, he was around \$250,000 in front, and those were the golden, happy years when they let you keep most of what you made, when there were no 70 and 80 and 90 per cent brackets.

The Galloping Ghost at the end of two years had made and kept more money than any four stars could do today. Unfortunately in other deals with C. C. Pyle, Grange blew a big part of his budding fortune.

Babe Ruth averaged far more than \$100,000 a year in his prime. There were years when he passed the \$200,000 count, including all the sidelines with which he dallied.

Feller and Trippi have ranged into rich pastures, but they won't be so rich when they have paid taxes on their various checks. Don't forget that when Gene Tunney received a check for more than \$900,000 after his second fight with Dempsey, more than 20 years ago, Tunney retained around 90 per cent of his pay. Today the tax department would take 90 per cent and leave Tunney 10 per cent.

In actual cash returns, Feller's \$80,000 won't approach Babe Ruth's \$80,000, not by \$30,000 or more.

Leading Collectors

What are the leading money making sports as far as the individual star is concerned? Byron Nelson passed the \$60,000 mark one season in golf prize money and this didn't include his receipts from sidelines. This was worth around \$40,000 more. Ben Hogan reached the \$44,500 mark in prize money in 1946. Hogan also had other pay checks that golf brought in. My guess would be a total of around \$65,000 or \$75,000.

So the pro golfer, or at least a few of them, can get along pretty well comparatively. A Nelson or a Hogan will do far better than a Coulter, a Trippi, a Buddy Young or any other pro football player. But the golf drop is rather steep after you take in the few crowd pleasers, the few big money makers.

Top baseball salaries have ranged lately from Hank Greenberg's \$55,000 to Bob Feller's estimated \$80,000. The difference in actual dollar returns won't be large after they have moved into certain brackets where the golden harvest suddenly reaches an abrupt finish. When you figure in the taxes and the present cost of living, the \$10,000 that Hans Wagner and Christy Mathewson once drew are not so far away from the \$50,000 and \$60,000 boys of today.

As far as pro football goes it is an established economic fact that the two rival leagues can't possibly break even, team for team, with the salaries they are paying today. Baseball has 154 games a year, excluding the 30 or 35 exhibition contests.

Against this, pro football can offer only 14 or 16 games a season. As every one knew it would, the new football league took a million dollar beating last fall. Certain National league teams were none too happy. The only happy people were the football players, who frequently were paid double their actual value.

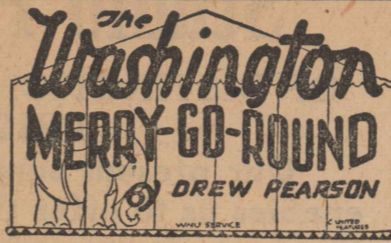
Durocher Tops Managers

Leo Durocher apparently set a new mark for high pay as a manager in 1946. Here guesses have ranged from \$60,000 to \$70,000. Certainly Leo's unfortunate winter publicity isn't going to help him this spring and summer. He has left himself too wide open for the barb throwers, including rival teams and the umpires. But The Lip is still one of the best managers baseball has known. I've seen him work at close range—and this is no guess. It is also no guess to say that he hasn't made Brother Branch Rickey any too happy this winter.

In the way of pay, such jockeys as Johnny Longden and Eddie Arcaro head the list. Longden's lifetime earnings are rated close to the million dollar mark. Arcaro has known \$90,000 and \$100,000 years. Longden and Arcaro probably are better fixed financially than other sporting stars.

When they finally quit riding, they have a prospect of long and profitable careers as trainers, track executives, or owners.

After all, it is what you finish with, not what you get for a year, that tells the story.



OTHER SIDE OF UNRRA

WASHINGTON. — All the angry shouting and politicking which surrounded UNRRA during the last two years have given taxpayers the general impression that this global agency was just tossing money down the drain. That, however, was not the case. Here are some little-known facts about UNRRA's remarkable accomplishments.

UNRRA supplied enough grain to make 11,500,000 loaves of bread for Europe, prevented Europe from becoming a disease-ravaged, epidemic-plagued continent, rebuilt health departments all over Europe, supplied them with DDT, penicillin and sulphur drugs. It inoculated hundreds of thousands against typhus and typhoid, thus preventing the type of epidemic that ravaged Europe after World War I.

Last year UNRRA fed at least one million a day to five million children, helped reclaim 10 million acres of flood land for planting this year. It took care of one million displaced persons, provided them food and shelter, saw hundreds of thousands of them safely home.

Despite its errors on the political side, UNRRA did two things. The agency made nations work together in harmony, made the postwar world a better world for millions who otherwise might have perished. It is only fair to remember this side of the picture.

GOVERNMENT JOBS

Memo to government workers: Don't get too excited about those statements by Representatives John Taber and Harold Knutson that the congressional budget committee, of which they are members, favors immediate reduction of government personnel by one million workers.

Inside fact is that most members of the committee, excluding Congressmen Taber and Knutson, are apprehensive that a too-sudden slash in the personnel question will be referred for further study to the senate and house appropriations committees.

When a decision finally is made, the reduction in government personnel will be much closer to 500,000 than one million.

BEATS TRUMAN AT FARMING

La Verne Hall of Westby, Wis., champion 4-H farmer of America, who has made \$53,000 at the age of 20, called to shake hands with President Truman, who never was able to make a go of farming in Missouri.

GOP Congressman William Stevenson, who escorted his young constituent, told the President how Hall was chosen "national achievement winner" among junior farmers at the International Livestock exposition in Chicago. One of the prizes was a silverware set from the White House.

"I'd like to meet more of your type," said Mr. Truman, perhaps remembering how his own farm was sold for its mortgage. "You young Americans are doing great things for the country. It must feel pretty good to be a successful farmer at the age of 20. When did you get started?"

His visitor replied that he started at the age of 11 with one pure-blooded calf and two Poland China hogs. He did not mention that his farm holdings are now worth \$53,000.

QUEER VISITORS

The late FDR once told a visitor he was considering sending an ambassador from the American people to the state department, since that department sometimes seemed so out of tune with the rest of the USA. Unfortunately, that condition hasn't changed.

While thousands of Hitler's victims still sweat it out in displaced persons camps unable to get visas, the state department has been throwing the doors open to various interesting visitors. These include Austria's former premier, Kurt Schuschnigg, Pastor Niemoeller—who reiterates his belief in a powerful Germany—and now, one of the key Fascist operatives of the Near East, Ahmed Hussein.

Hussein arrived ostensibly as a correspondent for Cairo newspapers but he is still head of the pro-Fascist "Young Egypt" party, and an intimate of the infamous "Mufti" of Palestine, whom Hitler chose as his fustler of the Middle East. Since reaching these shores, Hussein has cast off his role of newsmen and has registered with the justice department as a foreign agent representing "Young Egypt." He has been selling his special brand of pro-Fascist, anti-British venom.

CAPITAL CHAFF

It hasn't leaked out, but Brig. Gen. Elliott Roosevelt was recommended for a permanent reserve commission by the army reserve officers commissioning board, headed by Lt. Gen. Jimmy Doolittle. But when President Truman sent the nominations to the senate, Elliott's name was omitted. On the list, however, were several GOP opponents of the Roosevelts, particularly former Maj. Gen. Pat Hurley, who blasted both the President and the state department a year ago.

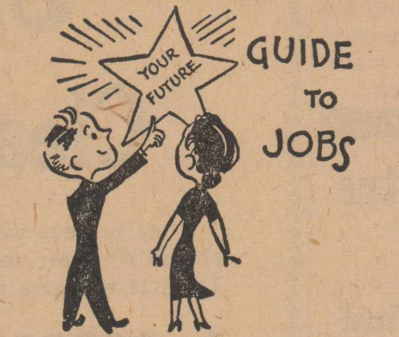

JESUS WASHES THE DISCIPLES' FEET

LESSON TEXT—John 13:3-15, 34, 35. MEMORY SELECTION—A new commandment I give unto you, that ye love me another; as I have loved you, that ye also love one another.—John 13:34.

On the eve of his crucifixion our Lord gave to his followers a striking example of how true humility shows itself in service to others.

Almost in the shadow of the cross the disciples had fallen into an argument about which of them should be greatest. Christ showed them the way of true greatness by an act of menial service, giving them an example for their own lives, a pattern of love.

I. Action (vv. 3-11). He who was about to wash his disciples feet was fully conscious who he was, whence he came, what his power was, and where he was going.

Verse 3 gives us a clear view of our Lord's knowledge of himself as divine, sent by the Father and to return to him. He was conscious that he was King of kings and Lord of lords—all things had been put into his hands.

What followed would seem to be a mistake—a misfit in the pattern of the life of a being so great as the one described in verse 3—except for the fact that it was Jesus of whom it was said.

He knew that real greatness proves itself in the ability to stoop if need be to minister to the humblest need. It was just like Jesus to take the place of the servant. It is just like him to do the loving, thoughtful, compassionate thing for us today.

Peter's impulsive refusal to be washed enabled the Lord to teach him, and us, a needed lesson. The one who had come clean and well-groomed to the feast needed only to have the dust of the road cleansed from his sandaled feet.

Just so the one who has been cleansed from his sins by the blood of Christ returns daily for the cleansing of the stains and soil of the journey through this wicked world. We must remember that this constant cleansing (1 John 1:7) is necessary. It is not enough to make a decision for Christ and receive salvation; we need his daily grace for daily living.

II. Example (vv. 12-15). When he resumed his place at the table, Jesus faced a humbled and ashamed group of men ready to have driven home to their hearts the powerful meaning of the example which had been set before them.

They called him Lord and Master, and he agreed that they were right. Now he had set them a pattern of lowly service. They had already sensed the rebuke involved, so he stressed only the positive side, the need for them to do what he had done.

It is one thing to understand what has been taught, it is another thing to put it into practice. Jesus conditioned his blessing on the doing, rather than the hearing (see vv. 16, 17).

We are told in James 1:22 that the one who is a hearer of the Word and not a doer of it is self-deceived. He is fooling himself about his supposed spiritual progress. God is not deceived by it, and usually his fellow men are not deceived by his profession of what he does not have. How sad then to go on deceiving himself and how foolish.

III. Command (vv. 34, 35). It is really not a matter of choice for the believer whether he will live in the light of this great example—it is a commandment of God. Oh, yes, it is a commandment of love, but that makes it not less but more binding on us who believe in Christ.

By act and example he set before his disciples the great and new commandment of love, expressing itself in loving service.

The measure of our love for our brethren is the love of Christ Jesus. That love, we all agree, was without limit, unbelievably great, inexpressibly tender, infinite in its purpose and power.

We cannot measure up to it. What then shall we do? Surely we must give to our very limit and beyond that limit by God's grace, of our love for one another. Nothing less will do, if we are to keep his commandment.

Such love between Christian brethren has always been the most effective kind of testimony for Christ. As men see true and sacrificial love shown between Christians, they are drawn to Christ and the church.

The opposite is also true. Divisions and strife among believers quickly become known to the world, and are always a ground for scornful rejection of the truth which the church professes to believe and is asking the world to accept. We cannot effectively apply the gospel remedy (and it is the only remedy!) to a strife-torn world while we are engaged in unlovely battles with one another. 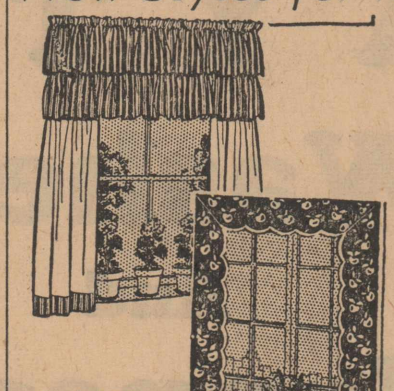
