

Mr. BUTANE - PROPANE Fischer, refreshingly, makes no pretense of being a great expert on Soviet affairs, he quotes with approval Paul Winterton's dictum that "there are no experts on Russia, only varying degrees of ignorance." Mr Fischer has, however, been a student of Russian history for many years, and in 1946 he made a brief visit to the U.S.S.R. as a member of an UNRRA mission. The purpose of his book is explained by its title, to tell why, in his opinion the Russians do what they do.

The Russians are obviously preparing for war, as Mr. Fischer shows, but he thinks that it will be 15 years or more before they will be able to recover from the terrible damage done by the last conflict, and build up an industial war potential any way comparable to ours. 





Butter - Making

Points to be observed in good butter-making include use of only good, clean, rich milk from properly fed and cared for cows. Cleanliness of the cow and the milker is essential. Correct temperature for ripening the milk and for churning is necessary. Cream should be ripened at 65 to 70 degrees F. The churning temperature should be about 60 to 68 degrees so that butter will form in granules about the size of wheat grains in 20 to 25 minutes. When that stage is reached, stop churning, wash the butter with water of the same temperature, in two or three waters, until all milk is removed. Add about a tablespoonful of salt to each pound of butter and work enough to distribute the salt. Mold and wrap in parchment paper.

Soybeans Will Hold **Own if Given Chance**

Industry Making Real Demands for Big Crop

Since America's pioneer soybean processing plant began operations in 1922, soybeans have become a byword in agriculture and industry, ranking as the nation's fourth largest cash farm crop.

Soybeans, when processed, enter largely into three fields of uses farm, home and industry.

Farmers know soybeans as a crop which can be planted late, if neces-

sary, and which brings comparatively high return per acre. They know soybeans, also, as a superlative source of protein concentrates for use in livestock and poultry rations.


Products made from soybeans go into hundreds of food items. Soybean oil is used in production of about 50 per cent of all shortenings. More than 40 per cent of all margarines are made from soybean oil. The soybean oil produced from nearly 1,500,000 acres is used in making margarines.

One of the subsidiary uses for soy-beans is the field of medicine, where soybean oil is used as a carrier in capsule-packaging of vitamins.

The health-giving value of soybeans long has been recognized by the farmers of health foods. These things are secondary to the farmer. Yield and profit per acre and use of soybean oilmeal as a feed have been the farmer's first consideration. If the production of soybean is to continue to increase, all uses of soybeans must be developed and expanded.

SHORTCHANGE THE SOIL

The benefits of clover depend on how much nitrogen and organic matter it produces, and how much of those materials is returned to the soil as clover or as manure. When er is out in the fall and removed from the field the resulting loss in nitrogen and organic matter reduces the yields of crops following in the rotation. When clover is not cut, those yields increase. The



above chart illustrates results of crop rotation tests at the Carthage soil experiment field by University of Illinois agronomists. In a threeyear rotation of corn, oats and wheat, sweet clover was seeded in the wheat and plowed under for corn the next spring. On one plot the stubble sweet clover was cut in the fall and removed. On another plot the sweet clover was left uncut. Both plots were plowed the following spring. The effect on yields of corn, oats and wheat following on each plot is summarized above.

New Type Spray Oil For Fruit Trees

A new superior type oil for use in dormant sprays for fruit trees has been developed by Geneva experiment station. The new type oils are said to be more effective and to be safer to use on fruit trees. It is estimated that 25 million gallons of oil are used annually throughout the world for horticultural sprays, sufficient to make about a billion gallons of dilute spray.

New Machine Aids Deep Fertilization

A machine capable of placing fertilizers at plow-sole depth and covering as high as 30 acres a day has been developed by an Illinois farmer. Fertilizer placed at root depth in the soil or in the bottom of the plow furrow has been gaining advocates at a rapid pace. The present slow method of application has delayed its general application. It allows late season application after weather has become settled.

FACING NATIONAL PERILS

LESSON TEXT-II Kings 19:5-7, 32-37; 20:12-17.

MEMORY SELECTION—For thus said the Lord God, the Holy One of Israel; in returning and rest shall ye be saved; in quietness and in confidence shall be your strength.—Isaiah 30:15.

Perilous times had come upon the southern part of the divided kingdom known as Judah. There had been a period of outward prosperity under King Uzziah, but the inward decay of the people made it an empty thing.

Judah, like Israel, was on the

downward path which was to lead to ultimate captivity and judgment. The occasional reign of good kings seemed to stem the tide a bit; in fact, the great king of whom we study today, Hezekiah, gave Judah a "fresh lease on life and enabled her to outlive her sister kingdom by nearly a century and a half."

Judah experienced a real revival of faith in God under Hezekiah (II Kings 18:4-6; II Chron. 29:31). The temple was cleansed, the priesthood renewed and reconsecrated, and the great feast of the Passover kept once more. This undoubtedly explains the new life which came to Judah in an hour when the nation seemed about to disintegrate.

I. The Enemy's Threat (19:5, 6) For the background here one must read the previous chapter. Hezekiah, having tried to throw off the yoke of Assyria, had seen Sennacherib and his armies sweep over the land. Thinking to stop him and to save Jerusalem, he sent a great gift amounting in value to millions of dollars. The gift was accepted, and then Sennacherib treacherously seiged Jerusalem.

Rabshakeh, Sennacherib's messenger to Hezekiah, not only threatened the nation, but blasphemously denied the power of God. Such was the awful situation Hezekiah faced as he went to the temple, and sent trusted servants to inquire of Isaiah what he ought to do.

The response was prompt and definite. We may learn from this incident that in an hour of confusion and danger it is well to take time to find out what the Lord has to say about things. He knows what to do! II. The Lord's Answer (19:7, 32-

God has only to blow on the mighty, blustering monarchs of this world and they come to their end, definitely and conclusively. The "blast" of the Lord (v. 7) is enough to care for that! And remember, he is still ready to act on behalf of his

On the plains of Philistia the mighty host of Assyria met the angel of the Lord, and they never awoke from their sleep. The loss of 185,000 men sent Sennacherib home to Nineveh broken and fearful, and there he met his own violent death. How much we need the encour-

agement of such an event as this in our own day when the mighty of this earth seem to speak so boldly and confidently against the name of the Lord. His children must often hear the blasphemous threats of unbelievers and bear the burden of their scorn. Let us remember that we do

serve a God who can with a glance of his eyes throw into confusion all the enemies of his mighty name. Let us be strong to fight the victorious battle in his name!

Hezekiah knew the sweetness of victory as he trusted in the Lord. If we could only rest the matter there. But the weakness of the flesh comes to the fore as we see III. The King's Folly (20:12-17).

Babylon, one of the great Gentile enemies of Assyria, wanted to cultivate the friendship of Hezekiah, so an embassy was sent to express joy at his recovery from a serious ill-

It was the Lord who had healed him (see 20:1-11) in a miraculous way, but now Hezekiah did the foolish thing of trying to cultivate the help of men. To impress these possible allies

from Babylon, he showed them all his wealth. He evidently wanted them to return to their ruler with a story of the might and glory of Judah.

Poor Hezekiah! He only made a fool of himself, prepared the way for the ultimate taking of his possessions and his people by the Babylonians. The lesson to be learned here is not only that boasting is folly (al-

though that is always true), but also that it is the height of folly to put one's trust in the arm of flesh. No matter how mighty the forces of this world may be, or how wonderful it might seem to have their favor toward the cause of the church, let us be clear that it is in God that we have our strength-and

in him alone. The church (and individual Christians too) has lost its testimony and its power in the community whenever and wherever it has turned to the world for help or support. Remember the folly of Hezekiah.



The most difficult problem is the terrific distrust the top men in the Kremlin have for the democratic world.
