

## Magnolia And Shamrock Make New Locations

New drilling locations were announced this week by the Magnolia Petroleum Company and the Shamrock Oil and Gas Corporation.

Magnolia will drill the No. 1 Basin-Jahns 2,310 feet from the north and east lines of section 414, Block 1-T.

The Shamrock No. 5 Flores, is rigging up rotary drilling equipment 1,320 feet from the north and west lines of section 60, Block 3-T.

Cities Service No. 1 Hitz on Texas Railroad Commission test produced 15.3 million cubic feet of gas. It is located in section 451, Block 1-T. Pay was found between 2,800 and 3,150 feet, the total depth. The well was treated with 15,000 gallons of acid. Rock pressure was 424 pounds.

Phillips No. 1 Virginia, section 234, Block 1-T, is drilling with cable tools for completion of the deep test.

Casing is being laid to place Cities Service No. 1-D Wohlford well, section 315, Block 1-T, on the pipe line.

Cities Service No. 1 Foreman, south and east of the center of section 333, Block 1-T, is drilling with cable tools.

Cities Service No. 1 Klekamp, 100 feet northeast of the center of section 384, Block 1-T, is drilling with rotary tools.

Rotary tools are being set up on the southeast quarter of section 386, Block 1-T.

The Shamrock No. 1 Borth, east of center of section 365, Block 1-T, remains abandoned.

Shamrock No. 1 Braddock et al, center of section 212, Block 1-C, is drilling with cable tools.

Shamrock No. 1 Dorth, in the northeast quarter of section 214, Block 1-T, has been declared a dry hole. The casing has been pulled and the well plugged with concrete. Total depth was 3,437 feet.

## Farm Labor Office For Wheat Harvest At Garrison Motor

Arthur Folsom has been employed by the Extension Service to assist farmers and custom combine operators with wheat harvest in Sherman County. His headquarters will be in the Garrison Motor Company at the intersection of highways 287 and 54. He will serve the farmers by helping distribute transient labor, custom combines and trucks in the county during wheat harvest. He will also assist the custom combine people by directing them to farmers who need combines in the later part of the season, and directing custom combine people to the wheat harvest front. Mr. Folsom will be in direct contact with the State Farm Labor Office at Plainview and will keep posted on the wheat harvest situation. Farmers needing combines, labor or trucks for wheat harvest or plowing may take advantage of these services offered by Mr. Folsom.

**45 Canadian Combines Ordered**  
J. B. Kidd, Farm Labor Field Assistant at Plainview advised the county agent that 45 custom combines have been requested to report to Sherman County by the 25th of June for harvesting wheat. Farmers needing these combines are requested to list their names and the number desired with Mr. Folsom immediately in order for the county office to place them as fast as they arrive in the county. Contact men are expected to begin arriving this week end. Other custom combines requested by the Plainview office are: 15 for Lipscomb County, 15 for Dallam County, 75 for Hansford County. At present we have a request for 500 combines for Sherman County placed with the Plainview office.

## July Harvest Season Is Expected

Wheat harvest completed last year 30 days before the customary start of the season, is not expected to be in full swing until the first of July. Normally wheat in most all fields is ready for harvest July 4.

Some producers look forward to starting combines in a few fields the latter part of this week, but a much larger percentage look forward to next week as the earliest possible time for saving the grain.

Maturing of the wheat generally is spotted similar to conditions farther south.

Most wheat fields between Chillicothe and Chillicothe were combined and the stubble plowed the first week in June, while other fields of green wheat remained for several days before it was ripe enough to cut.

The harvest has progressed as far north as Memphis with small self-propelled combines of all makes following the maturing crop. Trucks in large numbers are said to be stalled for lack of work due to the slow ripening of the crop.

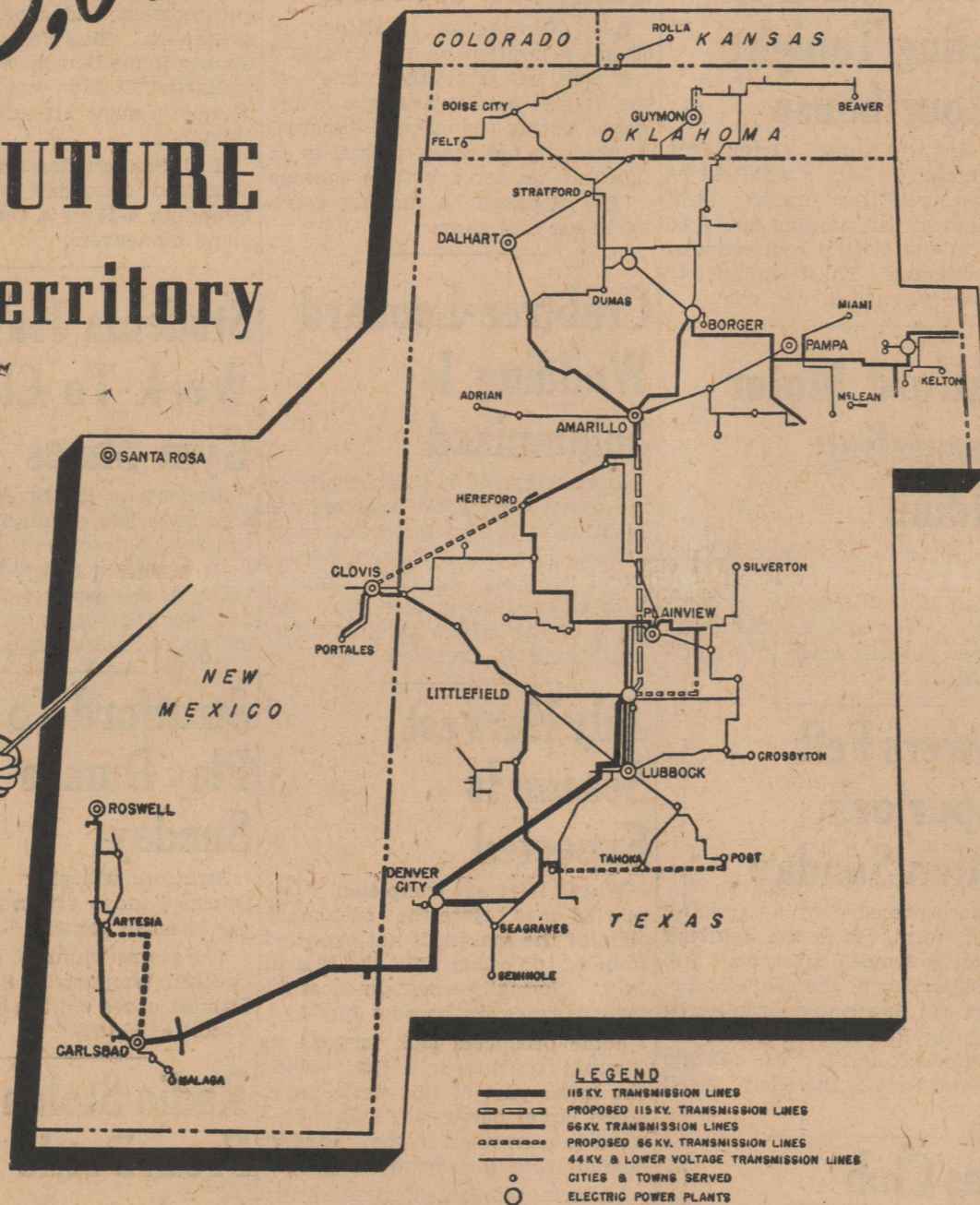
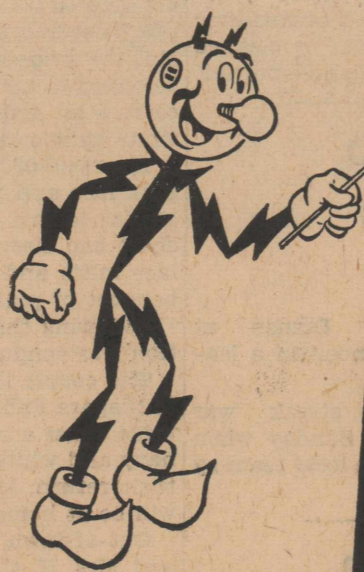

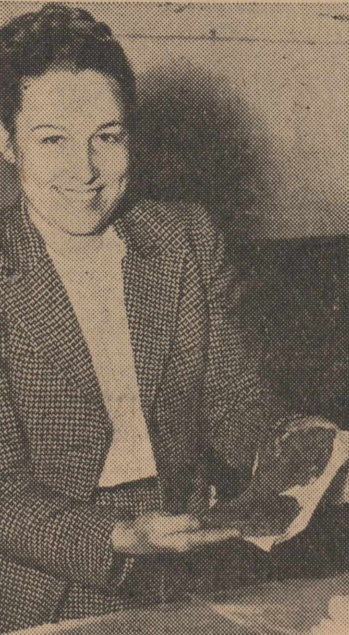

## Cooking Cabbage

Today, cabbage is cooked for minutes instead of hours. Short cooking saves the delicate cabbage flavor, the crisp texture, and, best of all, less food value is lost. Shredded cabbage cooked in milk is a good way to get a lot of nutrition into a single dish. Drop the freshly-shredded cabbage into simmering milk. Add some melted fat, mixed with a little flour, for thickening. It only takes five minutes to cook so stir the cabbage often. Season and serve. Panning is another quick way to cook cabbage. Put hot fat in a pan that you can cover—but don't add any water. Add the shredded cabbage and let it cook in its own steam until wilted. Stir the cabbage frequently. When done add salt, pepper and bits of butter.

## Armed Forces Institute Tests At PAMC

GOODWELL. — A series of U. S. Armed Forces Institute tests to determine the general educational development will be administered for veterans of this area at Panhandle A. & M. college Friday, June 27, according to information released by Miss Helen Muller, dean of the college and special agent in charge of testing. The current series of tests are the fourth that have been offered veterans of this area, through the college.

The tests are intended primarily to serve as "high school equivalence examinations" and are to determine whether or not veterans who have not attended or completed their high school work have nevertheless acquired a general education equivalent to a high school one and are therefore eligible to receive a diploma from their local high schools without returning to high school to complete additional work.

Five comprehensive examinations will be given, concerned respectively with english composition, social studies, natural sciences, literature, and mathematics. Each of the five tests will require about one and one-half hours, make a total of seven to eight hours required to complete the examination. The tests will be held in Room 205 Swell-Loofburrow Hall and will begin at 9:00 A. M. and continue until 12:00 A. M., and be resumed at 1:00 P. M. and continue until the veteran completes

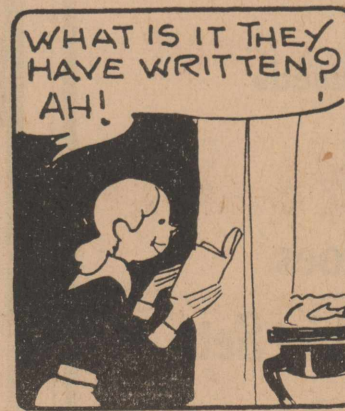
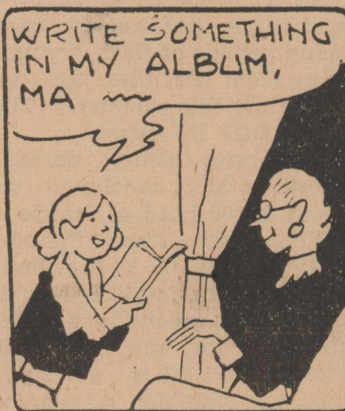

### DDT Removes Heel Fly Throat

A big percentage of West Texas beef cattle that usually run off many pounds of flesh, trying to get away from heel flies, are grazing peacefully this summer. The reason is DDT fly spray.

In Roberts County, during the month of May, ranchmen sprayed about 24,000 head of cattle with DDT to control flies. County Agricultural Agent L. E. Breeding reports now that, unlike the old days, the animals are not seen running across pastures and kicking at heel flies. The DDT is getting horn flies, too, says the county agent, which is still another big money-saving feature of DDT spraying.

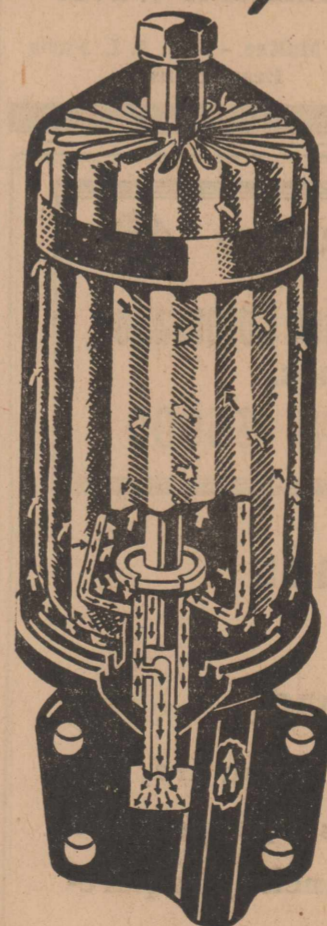

## Estimate 3,000 Combines Will Follow Harvest

Over 100 million bushels of Texas wheat, most of it about ready for harvest, is providing a tough test for the farm labor program of the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service.

Since the Extension farm labor program began in 1944, farm labor officials have handled the routing of a steadily increasing number of combines needed to harvest Texas wheat. This year, J. B. Kidd, Plainview, assistant state farm labor supervisor in charge of combine movement, estimates that at least 3,000 combines will be on the road, following the harvest from county to county. About 4,000 more will

operate only in their home counties.

Routing of these thousands of combines is handled primarily through Kidd's office in Plainview. County Agricultural agents in the wheat section of Texas and adjoining wheat counties of New Mexico wire him daily reports on combine needs, excess combines available, status of harvest, and other information. From that information, Kidd is able to see to it that combines are on the spot when they are needed and that those needing work get it. As the harvest is completed many of the combines, including those from 20 other states and Canada which had come into Texas, move northward and follow the harvest all the way into Canada.

Kidd believes the supply of combines will be sufficient to harvest most of the crop, estimated at 112,000,000 bushels by the Bureau of Agricultural Economics, but the squeeze will be tight when the Pan-

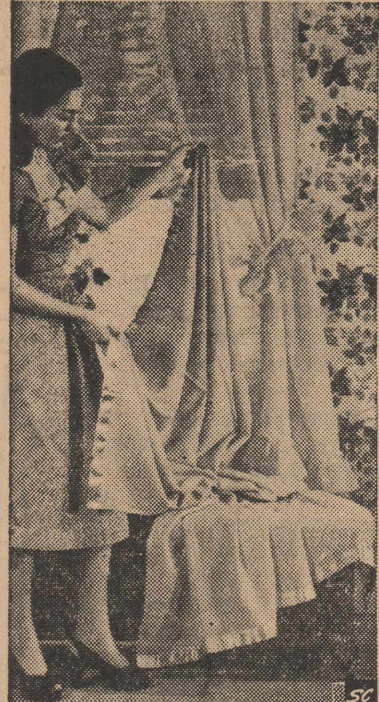

handle harvest gets underway the latter part of the month. Trucks attached to combines will find plenty of work, and some auxiliary trucks will be needed, but he emphasized that more trucks are expected than can be placed.

### Whaling Ancient Art

Actual capture of whales by the Eskimos, by harpooning them in narrow channels between ice floes, must go back to prehistoric times, and must long antedate the first records of European whaling by the Norsemen, as early as the ninth century, and by the Basques, in the Bay of Biscay, in the thirteenth century. The leadership in the whaling industry passed from one seafaring people to another—to the Dutch in the early seventeenth century, then to the English, then, by the early 1800s, to the New Englanders. In the redevelopment of whaling in modern times, the Norwegians have taken the lead, and have been most actively emulated by the Japanese.

### Popular House Plant

Although the geranium is the most common of all house plants, it is perhaps the hardest one to grow well because it requires a rather cool temperature and likes a moist humid atmosphere—something that can hardly be obtained in the average home. Horticulturally, the various geraniums can be divided into four general classes. First are the zonal or bedding types. These include practically all of the single or double geraniums grown in the house. The second group includes the Ivy-leaved geranium. This is a weak and straggling plant and is used mostly in vases and for hanging baskets. Third, comes the show, or fancy type, known as Lady Washington geranium. Housewives have had far more trouble in making the Lady Washington types grow. The fourth group includes the various scented geraniums, known mostly as Rose geraniums.

### Pigment Bleach

Take a peek at her beak, say poultry specialists, in discussing pigment-bleaching as a dependable method of determining the laying ability of hens. In all yellow-skinned breeds, the pullets will have an abundance of yellow pigment in the skin of the shanks, feet, beak, vent, and eye ring before they start laying eggs. This yellow pigment comes from the feed that the birds eat; yellow corn and green feed are chief sources of this pigment. Once a pullet starts laying, however, this yellow pigment goes to the yolk of the egg rather than being deposited in the skin. This means that as the pullet continues to lay, her skin is gradually bleached.

### Coal Reserves

The Bureau of Mines has estimated that our reserves of bituminous coal and lignite are sufficient for 4,300 years at the average annual rate of use for 1935-39. But high-grade coking coals are less plentiful. It is estimated that there is enough anthracite to last 195 years. Even though our coal reserves would appear to be practically unlimited, rate of exhaustion may be increased if the 30 to 40 per cent average loss sustained in mining is not reduced and if in the future we should turn to coal resources for liquid fuels. The use of high-grade coals for non-coke uses might well be eliminated, such as its use to generate steam for power plants which can use lower-grade coals.

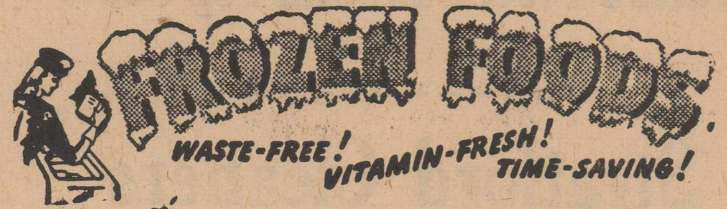

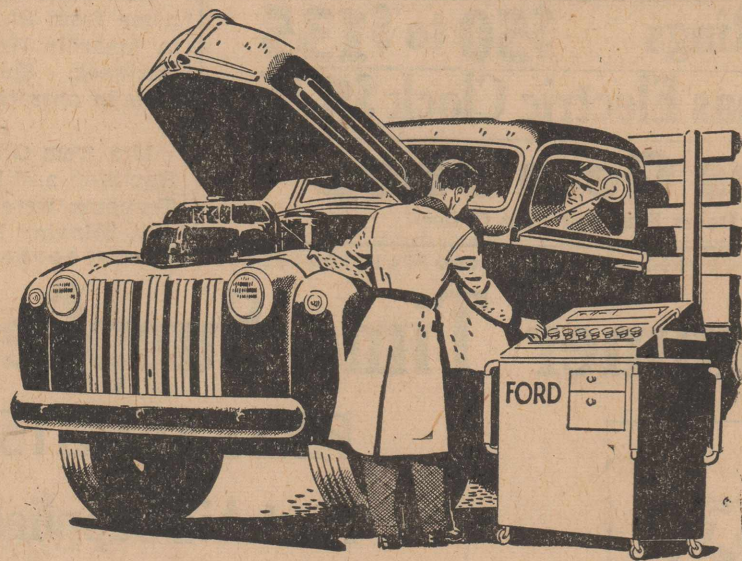

**X-raying Oil Fields**



A new advance in petroleum research is this X-ray machine, which takes pictures of how oil, gas, and water flow thru rocks thousands of feet underground. The X-ray focusses on samples of oil well rock, into which fluids found below ground are injected. The resulting X-ray pictures reveal in miniature how oil behaves in various earth formations. An engineer in Gulf Research Laboratories, which pioneered the development, is shown adjusting a cylindrical rock sample, while a secretary prepares to record X-ray findings. The machine is expected to lead to greater percentage of oil recovery.

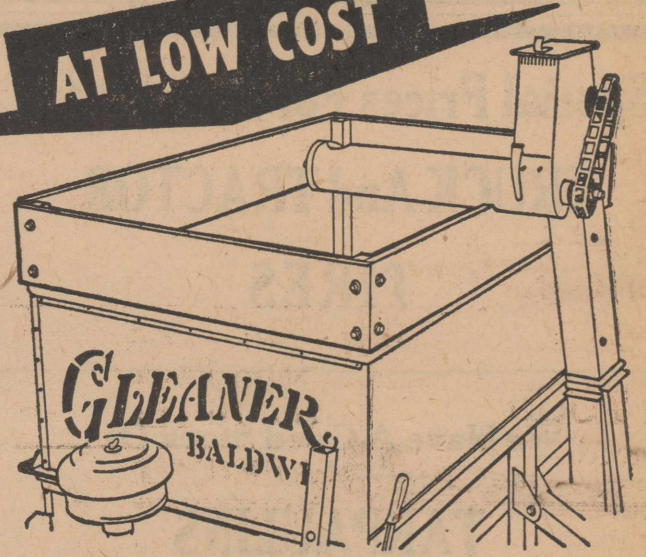

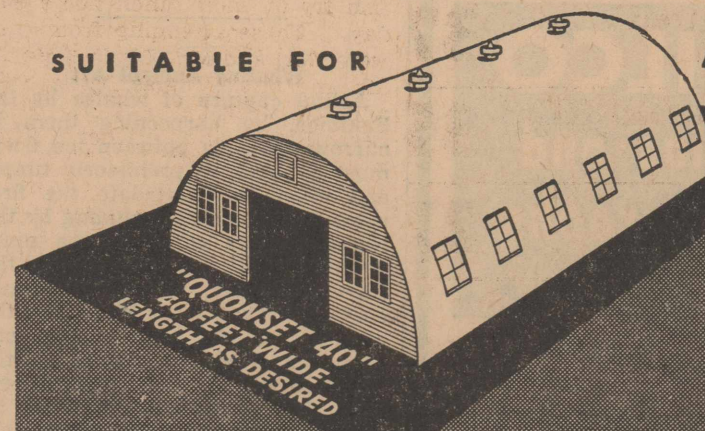

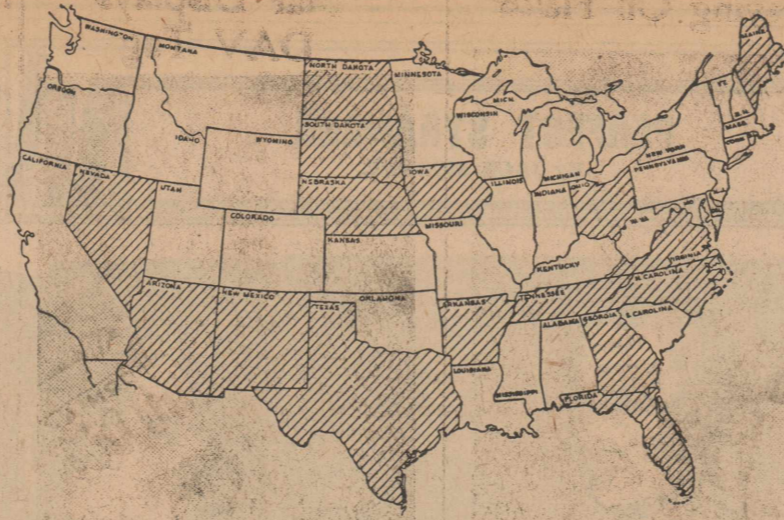

**CLOSED SHOP OUTLAWED IN 16 STATES**



Houston, Texas.—The shaded states in the above map have either adopted or submitted constitutional amendments or enacted statutes prohibiting the closed shop. Sixteen, or one-third of all the states, have taken such action. They are Arizona, Arkansas, Florida, Georgia, Iowa, Maine, Nebraska, Nevada, New Mexico, North Carolina, North Dakota, Ohio, South Dakota, Tennessee, Texas and Virginia. The Taft-Hartley Bill recently passed by Congress contained a provision outlawing the closed shop.

The Right to Work, regardless of union or non-union affiliation, as a principle of government, originated in this fast growing industrial city. Vance Muse, Secretary-Treasurer of the Christian American, Inc., with national headquarters here, directed the campaign that resulted in its adoption as an amendment to the Constitution of Arkansas and enlisted the support of the Attorney General of Florida in its enactment there. Five hundred labor papers of the nation recently voted Mr. Muse to be "Public Enemy No. 1" of the movement to organize the unorganized; he has been investigated by two State Legislatures and castigated by several others and a bill has been introduced in the Texas Legislature to revoke the charter of the Christian American which was granted in November 1936. The Chairman of the Communist Party in Texas recently filed suit against Mr. Muse for \$15,000.00, claiming that her reputation was damaged when Muse printed her picture along with 37 members of the Texas House of Representatives who voted against the Right to Work measure. The suit was withdrawn when Muse's attorney, Bernard A. Golding, announced he was ready to go to trial. Ultimate objective of the Christian American group is an amendment to the Constitution of the United States guaranteeing every person the right to work regardless of union status. A recent nation-wide survey shows that Texas has the most complete and effective set of labor regulatory measures of any state in the Union. . . . Directory of State Lawmakers.

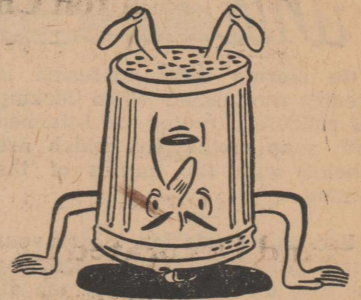

By cooking the green leaves in just enough boiling, salted water to prevent sticking, and just long enough for the leaves to be tender, the return of this vegetable's vitamins and minerals are high. Cooking does not destroy the carotene in kale but some of the other food value in this leafy vegetable can be protected. By quick cooking, kale retains a good amount of vitamin C—the vitamin which is most easily destroyed with cooking. All the valuable minerals, calcium and iron, in kale are kept from escaping into the water by cooking kale in a very small amount of water.

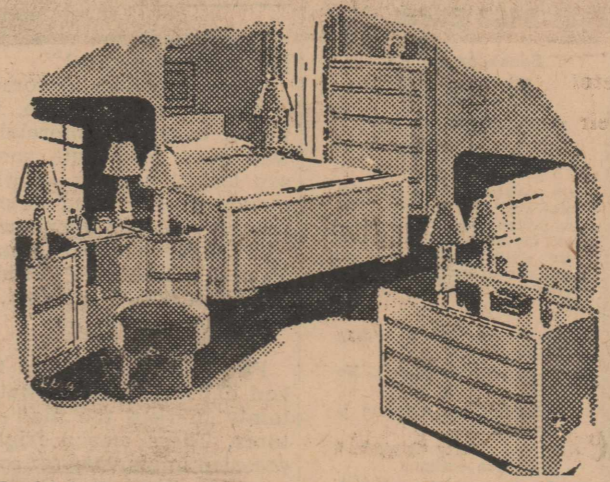

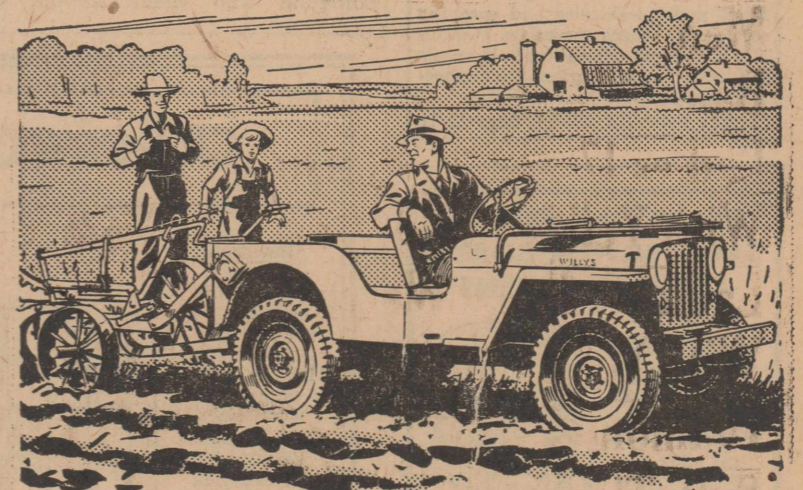

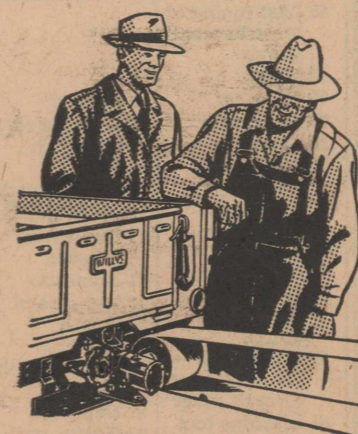

"Perhaps," she said, "he hasn't the price of a meal."

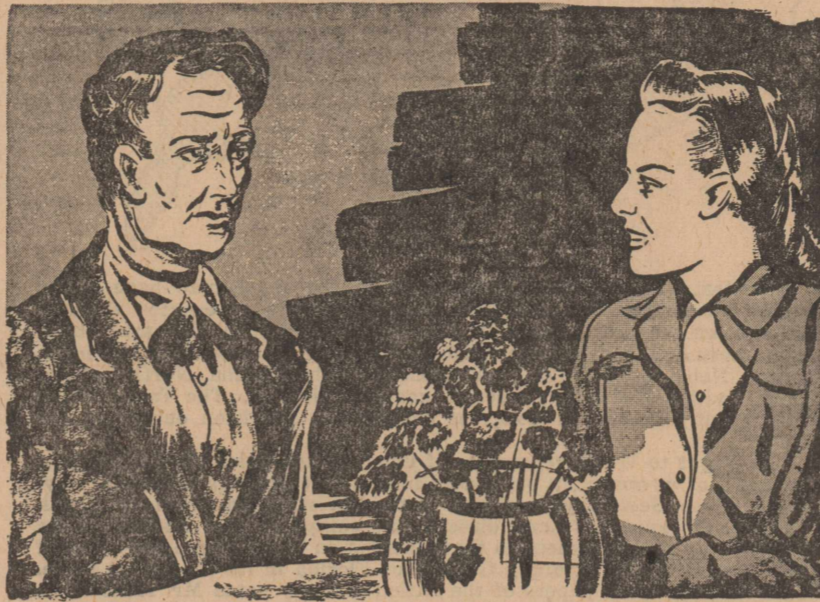

"What do you mean?"

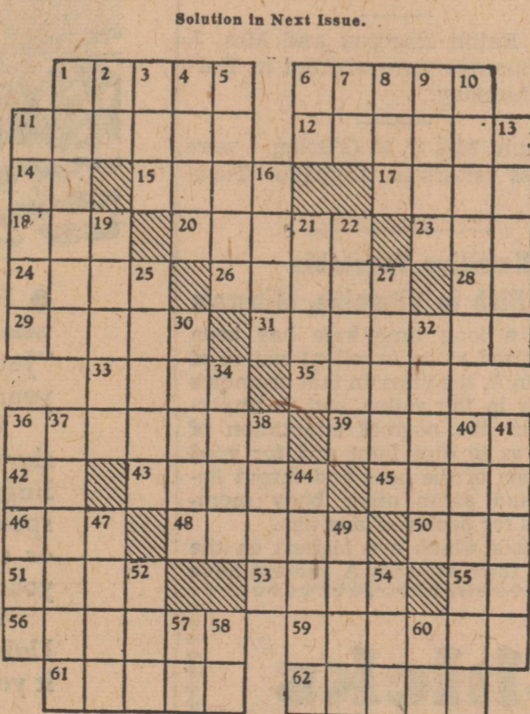

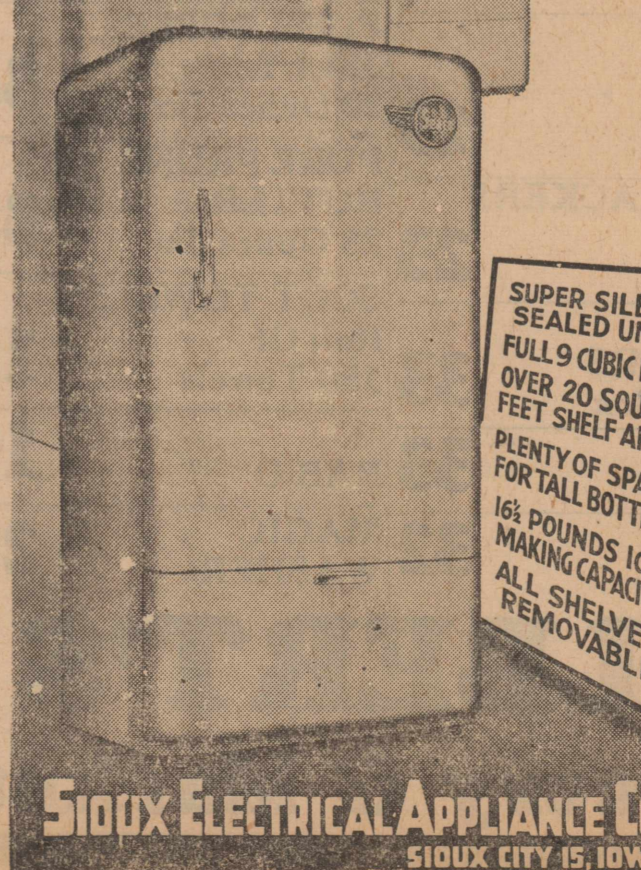

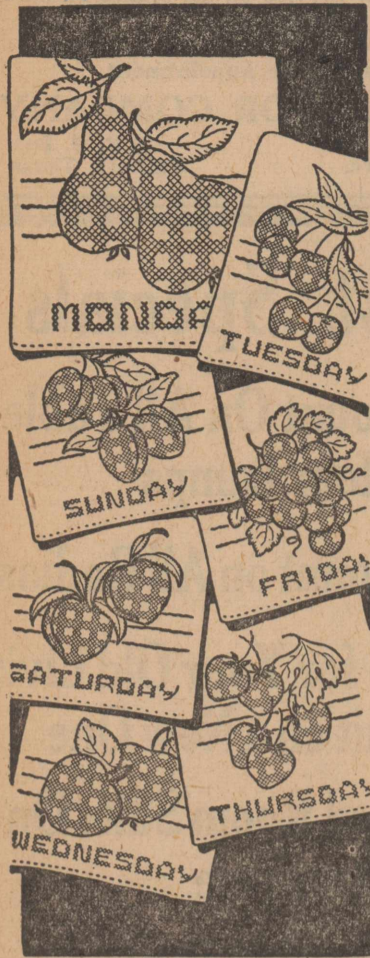

Lesson for June 22

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THE TRAGIC END OF A NATION

LESSON TEXT—II Kings 25:1-12. MEMORY SELECTION—Righteousness exalteth a nation; but sin is a reproach to any people.—Proverbs 14:34.

The end of the road! Down, down, down went Judah in its sinful refusal to keep God's Word, and ultimately came the final day of reckoning. It always does! The catastrophe which had long been approaching had arrived at last.

The fall of a capital city, which carries with it the empire, is a world-shaking event. The fall of Rome shattered the world for a thousand years. The fall of Berlin and Tokyo are within the memory of all of us, and the results are seen in a disordered world.

The destruction of Jerusalem, which our lesson presents, was even more serious; for it was not only a national tragedy, but also one with deep religious significance.

The wicked king Jehoiakim was succeeded by his son Jehoiachin, a mere boy who reigned only three months. He gave way to Nebuchadnezzar, who appointed as his successor his uncle Zedekiah.

It is in the verses just preceding our lesson that we learn that Zedekiah turned against Babylon in an act of

I. Rebellion (v. 1).

Zedekiah ignored his oath of allegiance (II Chron. 36:13), for which he was condemned by Ezekiel as a traitor (Ezek. 17:13-18). Zedekiah has well been called the vanishing point in a diminishing line of kings. It was an evil thing he did (II Kings 24:19), and one which showed his conceit, vanity and rashness.

True it was that he only followed what he had learned from his predecessors, but that is never a good excuse for a man foolishly to turn against God's will.

Observe that God was not just a disinterested spectator, and yet he had come to the place where he let Judah go down to its own awful doom. The worst thing that can happen to a man or a nation is to be let alone by God!

Zedekiah's act of folly quickly brought

II. Retribution (vv. 2-10).

Jeremiah urged Zedekiah to surrender (see Jer. 37, 38) in order to save Jerusalem and himself, but he refused, and the city was besieged.

The king's refusal to hear God's prophet and his turning to Egypt for help speak to us of the manner in which unrepentant sinners reject God's mercy and then seek help at the hopeless cisterns of this world (Jer. 2:13).

The king tried to flee, but was taken captive. Then came the siege of Jerusalem. For one and one-half years the enemy gradually closed in, while famine and distress grew apace in the city. Jeremiah went through this entire period sharing his people's trouble. The book of Lamentations is the record of this eyewitness.

Sin does its terrible work. Even as it can take a great city and turn it into a plague spot marked by cruelty, suffering and death, even so it can bring forth its inevitable and unspeakable results in the life of the individual who persists in resisting the voice of God.

Note also that the sin of Zedekiah brought quick judgment, not only on himself, but upon his innocent children (v. 7), and on many in the besieged city who were equally guilty of wrongdoing. It is again a picture of what sin does today in the homes and communities of our nation.

III. Removal (vv. 11, 12).

The fall of Jerusalem prepared the way for the closing scene of the immediate history of the nation as the people went into captivity. It also ended for the time being the history of the city that had once so proudly held a position of privilege and power, but was now brought down by its sin and rebellion against God.

We say rightly that history repeats itself. We see that any nation that lifts itself up in pride and forgets God will inevitably perish. We ask ourselves where our beloved country stands. As we consider its debauchery and drunkenness, its disregard of moral standards, its indifference to the things of God, we feel that instead of pointing a finger of scorn at Judah, we ought to be on our faces before God in penitence and shame.

Let us not assume that we hold a place of favor with God, which exempts us from the certainty of judgment. Israel was his chosen, and they still are, for his promises of ultimate blessing to them have never been withdrawn. But their sin brought certain punishment, and the same is true today not only of the nation but of the individual.

The Sunday school lessons will take up the history of Israel again at this point in April, 1948, when we consider the captivity and the partial return of the people to their land.

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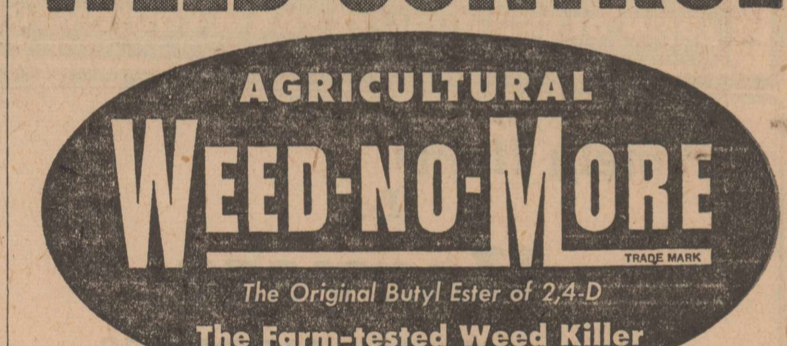
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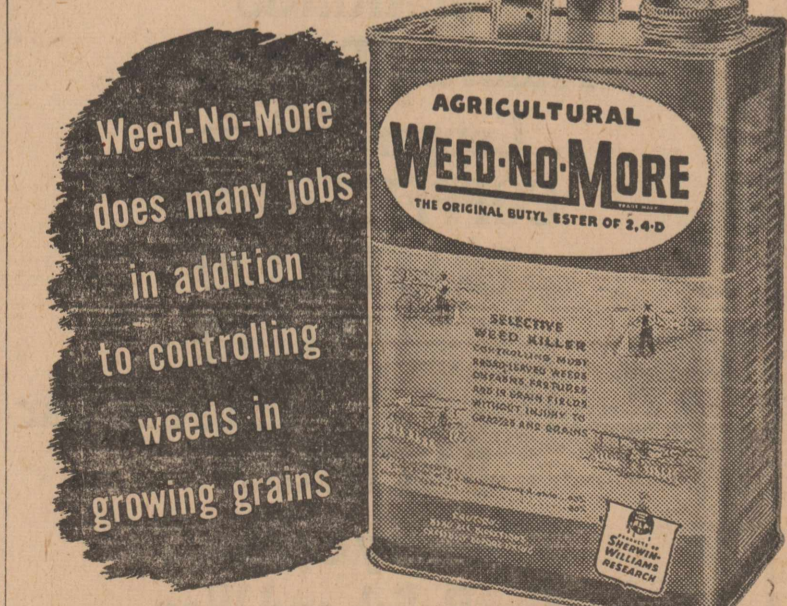
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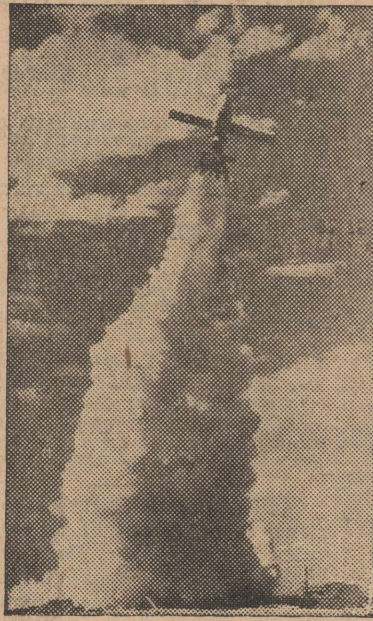
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### BUZZ BOMB

oil has been even greater than we demonstrated in war. Thus, the industry is undertaking a development program of unprecedented scope.

In pursuing this program, the industry is facing many an economic problem. A service station costs about three times what a comparable installation cost ten years ago. The cost of wildcat wells on the basis of oil discovered has multiplied sixfold. Costs are similarly swollen in every phase of the oil industry's activities. In the light of that, it is a remarkable tribute to the industry's efficiency that oil prices have risen as little as they have.

### Vanishing Birds

Many North American birds are in a precarious situation. The great white heron population of southern Florida shows no appreciable increase. The roseate spoonbill is possibly in more danger as a nester in the United States. None of the existing races of prairie chickens is in any too satisfactory a position, with one race reduced to approximately 8,000 birds. The masked bobwhite, formerly occurring in fair numbers within the United States, has become extirpated except for local colonies in Mexico. The largest and most magnificent woodpecker in the United States, the ivory-billed woodpecker, now is reduced to a few individuals in a heavily forested tract in Louisiana.

## Three Billion A Year For Oil

The oil industry must spend the enormous sum of \$3,000,000,000 a year for some years to come on new facilities and improvements, according to Dr. Robert E. Wilson, chairman of the board of the Standard Oil Company of Indiana.

That is nearly three times the average yearly expenditure during the past decade. It will be used, Dr. Wilson said, for six primary purposes: to find and develop additional sources of crude; to build new pipe lines, refinery units and other equipment; to employ new methods of conserving oil and gas; to make gasoline from natural gas and develop new products; to improve existing facilities; and, finally, to develop foreign sources of oil for the United States.

This need is, of course, the result of an unprecedented and to some extent unanticipated increase in the demand for oil. It was naturally expected that after the war there would be a certain drop in consumption of petroleum in its various forms. That did not occur, instead, our peacetime appetite for
