

REA Is Ready To Map Homes For Building Rural Power Lines

The Rita Blanca Rural Electric Cooperative has reached the stage of development where it is now necessary for all those of the agricultural section it serves to meet with the construction engineer to establish the location of their homes on the REA blue prints in order that material in sufficient quantities may be ordered for construction of the entire system.

In an advertisement on page 10, Consulting Engineer Hollis W. Harris, maps the proposed power lines as they will be built in Sherman, Dallam, Moore, and Hartley Counties.

Sherman County has been chosen for the first meeting place when all residents of the agricultural section will be requested to meet with Mr. Harris in the county agent's office to verify the location of their home to which they wish power lines built in order that plans may be completed and sufficient material secured for completion of the project.

Interested residents of Sherman County will meet in the County Agent's office in Stratford Tuesday, October 21. Moore County residents will gather at the County Agent's office in Dumas October 22, and the engineer and manager will be in the Co-op office in Dalhart October 23 and 24, for residents of Dallam and Hartley counties to establish the locations of their homes for connections with the rural electrification unit.

Cooperation of the people of the agricultural section to be served by the Rita Blanca Cooperative is necessary that adequate plans may be made as to the sizes of poles, the sizes of conductor wire and necessary substation capacity.

The Board of Directors have set as their goal, the electrification of every home in the four county area and are so planning the system as to achieve this goal without the expensive process of revamping some of the lines a few years from now.

Short Skirts Attractively Lengthened

It looks like skirt lengths are coming down, in spite of all the hemming and hawing that's going on about it.

So, for the girls who have decided to stop the fight and let their hems down, here's what might be some helpful information.

Miss Mary Routh, clothing specialist of the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service, has an answer to the girls' question: "How am I going to lengthen a skirt without giving it that telltale, let-down look?"

If it is a wool skirt that's being let down, and if the fabric is shiny on the underside of the hem, rip the hem and steam-press it on the wrong side of the fabric, that is, if the wool is light weight or has a raised pattern in the weave. If it is a thick wool, Miss Routh advises steam pressing on the right side.

In steam pressing, cover the fabric with a dry wool press cloth, then with a cotton cloth dampened in warm water. You may use a warm iron, but set it down, then lift it. Don't slide it back and forth, warns the clothing specialist.

If the shine is still showing after that operation, there's another trick you can try. Take a clean brush or a rubber sponge, the kind used for suede shoes, and try raising the nap of the wool with it.

Conspicuous and stubborn hemline creases can often be erased by wetting the crease on the wrong side, says Miss Routh. Then turn the goods over on the right side and roll the crease back and forth in your finger to work it out. Then press on the wrong side afterward.

Price Control Will Not Settle Present Condition

A return to nation-wide government price control is not the solution to the nation's current economic pains, in the opinion of Tyrus R. Timm, economist of the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service. There is no quick solution, says Timm, that may be counted on in terms of days, weeks or maybe even months. It may be a matter of years.

The economist believes that the country, as an alternative can go through the current transitional period and secure a more sound economic footing only by shrewd and frugal family use of household business resources and the close cooperation of the public with the government on programs which present laws permit.

Timm, during a part of the war period, was on leave from the college to serve as agricultural relations advisor to Chester Bowles, then national administrator of the Office of Price Administration.

"You can't close down price control regulation as you would a theater and then re-open with the same show" says Timm, explaining that price-cost relationships change swiftly and that the widely-talked price control return would call for long months of writing thousands of new regulations and making numerous new cost studies. That phase of a new price control bill would, alone, be a time consuming and costly headache says Timm, that looms as a big pit against price control revival.

There is also the question of getting a new control law-through the Congress, the economist continues. How long, he asks would it take to push a generally fair and equitable law through both the House and the Senate? "Surely there is even less agreement today upon the provisions which should be included in a price control act than there was in war years, when, on one occasion, haggling was so long and drawn out that it took an airplane to get the President's signature in time to keep the law from lapsing."

Another draw back, says Timm, is the fact that it would be practically impossible to gather enough businessmen and others who have the "know-how" and who held key positions in the old price control program. Those men who served the government faithfully during the war period are now busy meeting the troublesome transition period problems of their own firms. Others who held responsible price control positions are now in key jobs in other fields. "Price control may not be a science," says Timm, "but there is much for new-comers to learn before they can put a fair and square price control program be-

He brings up the usually underestimated enforcement problem. To what degree would the program get compliance?

"A skeleton organization held over from the old price control system to handle important price emergencies on basic items might have been the answer, that the economist says, "is spilled milk and tears won't cure the ills."

What can folks do to lighten the shock of high prices and high costs during these months ahead?

Tim says a lot of folks are in somewhat the same position as the average farmer from the depression right on up until the war broke out. They had to get along the best they could with what they had. It was tough, but they got by and kept their farms growing.

There is still room in many individual households and businesses for better planning and fuller and more efficient use of all goods and services at hand. This goes beyond efficient use to household supplies; transportation and financial resources. As a partner in the inflation fight, the government, Timm believes, needs to be even more aggressive in getting larger farm and industrial production, in securing better distribution of present supplies of food and other goods, in correlating domestic emergencies and foreign shipments, in keeping wages from getting out of line, and in using its fiscal and monetary powers.

Timm sounds a word of caution to American farm families. "Although there is no reason to expect abrupt farm price drop, it is probably that within the next few years prices of the things farmers buy will go up higher, stay up longer and likely not drop as far as prices on things that the farmer sells."

Work Starts On Three New Wells





Railway Postal Clerk Examination Open To Veterans

An examination has been announced by the Civil Service Commission to fill Substitute Railway Postal Clerk positions in all States except New York and in Alaska and Puerto Rico. Competition in this examination is restricted to persons entitled to veteran preference.

However, under Executive Order 9889, non-veterans serving continuously since August 23, 1947, in the position of Substitute Railway Postal Clerk under appointments not limited to one year or less may apply for the examination in order to be considered for a competitive civil service status.

The salary for the first year is \$1.14 per hour which amounts to approximately \$2,300 a year for a 40-hour work week. An additional 10 percent is paid for any night work between the hours of 6:00 P. M. and 6:00 A. M. Salary is increased each year by 5 cents an hour, up to a maximum of \$1.54 an hour.

The Heraldry of the Range

How early-day cattlemen let their imaginations run wild to create brands which became symbols of proud possession.



The beginning of brands is almost lost in antiquity, though in the Southwest the practice came up the trail with Longhorn herds from Mexico. But the Anglo-Saxons, with their genius for simplicity, discarded the intricate and ornate symbols that marred the hides of scrawny herds and adopted characters of their own.

They gave their imaginations free reign, however, and their symbols came to show their personality and character. Fancy and even whim, as well as practicality, influenced them in their choices, until at last the story of brands is a legendary lore within itself.

The simplest symbols of all were the Arabic numerals, like the extensive and salty Figure 2 of the Trans-Pecos. Other cowmen drew their characters from nature, like the Turkey Tracks, Terrapin, and Straddle-bug. "Fish" Anderson, on the Staked Plains, was never known by anything else because his brand was the tracing of a fish, and pretty game at that. Others took their theme from natural growth, like the Pine Tree and the Laurel Leaf. Some set their hearts and heads on objects of the range; the Muleshoes, the Pot Hooks, the Mill Irons, the Bridle Bits, and the ancient and honorable Spurs. Still others showed a touch of sophistication by taking the Wine Glass, the Doll Baby and the Dumb Bells, or a bit of national pride with the Flag, the Lone Star, and the Fleur-de-lis of France—though they called it "Flour de Loose."

But mostly they chose their brands from the capital letters of the language, often in combination to make them different—for each man's brand was distinctly his own. Some branded their names, like the Caseys of New Mexico with their KCs, and the distinguished English gentlemen, the Rowe brothers, with their RO range in the Panhandle. Some are remembered more for the brands they represented or owned than for their Christian names, like the Double Circle Kid of eastern New Mexico, and EQ (Barbecue) Campbell of Oklahoma and Kansas.

And in their fertile imaginations, cowboys and cowmen figured up variations never dreamed of by the makers of the alphabet, so that there were the Lazy S, Tumbling T, Flying V, Walking A, Running W, Szepple O, Rocking D, Cross L, and many others—al perfectly legible to a cowboy, but testing the imaginative and interpretative genius of an Egyptian antiquarian.

Great range enterprises and institutions, conceived and carried to immense proportions by bold and able men, were known by their brands. In many cases the men who made them are forgotten, but their brands live on—the JJ, the Bell, the XIT, the Rocking Chair and many another.

Nothing has intrigued the imagination of the cow country like the

story of brands. Names are sometimes commonplace but brands never are. Men worked for years for great outfits known only by their brands—"the Box T boss," "the T Anchor stray-man," "the JA haymaker," "the XIT windmill," "the Circle Dot horse rustler." Good cowboys delighted to be known by their brands. They worked without regard for hours and weather in looking after the cattle that bore them. A "thirty dollar a month" cowpuncher would look over a stray herd, pick out the stock of his millionaire employer, and proudly and possessively say: "That's our brand," and he would fight and die for it. In fierce pride in their outfits, and personal loyalty to the men who hired them, there has been nothing in modern history quite like it.

The old world had its armorial patterns—its coats of arms embroidered in its banners and embossed upon its shields—the marks of chivalry at home and daring in the field. The silversmiths had their hallmarks, which are still standing guarantees of supreme artistry and skill. The grandees of once great and gracious Spain had their rubrics—the distinctive flourishes with which they signed their names. But the Western World has its brands—the heraldry of the range.

Usually short and always symbolic, they catch the eye of the man who rides or runs, and trace their patterns on the scripts of memory with an impact that is fast and hard. They hold a fascination for those who have never owned a cow or ridden a horse.

But for those who have, brands are first of all a mark of proud possession. And proper pride always goes with honest ownership. A cowboy on a good horse sits up in his saddle like a line-bred member of royalty, and gently plays with his reins like a well-bred lady plays with her gloves. Pride induces care and enhances quality. A good brand comes to carry compulsion for future excellence. It is impossible to conceive a cold-blooded horse from the Running W strain that produced Assault, or a common steer flaunting the belegen 6666 brand. So men are proud of their brands—brands upon racing horses tearing out their noble hearts to gain the rail, brands upon fortunes in beef marching to distant markets, and even the brands of "cowboys without any cows"—brands stamped in the leather of their saddles and inlaid with silver on their spurs.

And now at last as the courage and character that built the West in the name of great brands has become more generally known, these have been seized up as legitimate matter in the artistic world of design.

They have been used to decorate public buildings, boldly to embellish stationery and fine print, and to grace with suggestive and significant pattern everything from linen to crystal in hospitable Western homes. Brands: have thus become cherished parts of the western tradition, legends of effort and adventure, and symbols of quality and success. Surely they are the shining heraldry of the range.







THE BIBLE TODAY

International Uniform Sunday School Lesson
By LOUIE D. NEWTON, D.D.

SCRIPTURE: Hebrews 3:1-8:5; 9-10, Matthew 4:1-11.
DEVOTIONAL READING: Philippians 2:1-11.

Apostle of Better Things

Lesson for October 12, 1947

THIS lesson opens, Hebrews 3:1-8, with the explanation that Jesus Christ is the minister of better things in that he is the apostle and high priest of our profession, perfectly faithful to him that appointed him. The comparison is made with Moses, who was also faithful, but within a very small circle as contrasted with the Son of God.
Called to God an high priest after the order of Melchisedec, Christ, the author of eternal salvation, dealt no longer with symbols, but offered himself as the perfect lamb to take away our sins.
"And for this cause he is the mediator of the new covenant (testament), that by means of death, for the redemptions of the transgressions that were under the first testament, they which are called might receive the promise of eternal inheritance," Hebrews 9:15.

Jesus and the Bible
JESUS is introduced in Matthew 4:1-4, as he quotes the Old Testament to Satan in the wilderness temptation. Having been reared by a God-fearing mother, Jesus was familiar with the Bible as a child.

What is the best thing any parent can do for his or her child? I would answer without hesitation: Teach them to hide God's words in their hearts in the impressive years of youth. A Bible verse learned in youth will serve through all life's testing situations.

"I will not forget Thy Word," Psalms 119:16.

He Helps Us Use the Bible
THE better ministry of Jesus is reflected in the fact that, "We have a great high priest, that is passed into the heavens, Jesus the Son of God. . . . For we have not an high priest which cannot be touched with the feeling of our infirmities; but was in all points tempted like as we are, yet without sin. Let us therefore come boldly unto the throne of grace, that we may obtain mercy, and find grace to help in time of need," Hebrews 4:14-16.

Study the example of Jesus in his answers to Satan in the wilderness temptation, and He will teach us when and what to say to Satan. We are not dependent upon our wisdom and words. Our great high priest will supply wisdom and words to match any situation that Satan ever presents.

I think of a story of a junior boy, recently accused of stealing. The boy was the victim of a wicked man who sought to turn circumstantial evidence upon him to cover his own sin. The boy told me that he was innocent. I went with him to the juvenile court. The judge asked him if he was guilty. He looked straight into the eyes of the judge and said:
"Sir, I have not sinned. Who convicted me of this charge?"
The man dropped his head, and said:
"Your honor, I ask for the privilege of withdrawing the charge."

His Laws in Our Hearts
"I WILL put my laws on their hearts, and upon their minds also will I write them," Hebrews 10:16. Jesus declares, "I do always the things that please him," and he enables us, by his grace, to do the father's will by his indwelling in our hearts. Thus, his will becomes the law of our lives, through the grace of Jesus Christ.

It is impossible for us to keep the law perfectly, but Christ, the better Christ, becomes our righteousness, and then his law is kept by his grace. In the olden times, men claimed to keep the letter of the law, without the spirit, as in the case of Moses. Now, through the offering of Christ, we are enabled to satisfy the spirit of the law.

The Sufficient Christ
THIS lesson should enhearten every trusting child of God, since it makes clear that, "He is able to save unto the uttermost them that draw near unto God through him," Hebrews 7:25.

He is not only able, but yearns to save unto the uttermost. He will save everyone. God has done everything he can do to save every sentient soul on this earth. Those who go to hell do so because they decide to go to hell. It is not the pleasure of God that any should perish, but that all should repent and be saved.

Variety of Ingredients Adds to Salad Popularity

To tempt the family appetites, keep salads bright and attractive to the eye, as well as cold, crisp and well flavored. Variety in the ingredients also helps to keep the raw salad one of the favorite dishes at family meals. The best sources of food values are the foods we eat, not the ones we put on the table and merely look at.

Chopped salads are favorites with most families because a variety of odds and ends can be used as ingredients, and the leafy vegetables are chopped in with the rest and not merely used as a base for the salad to be thrown away uneaten. While head lettuce is standard in salads, watercress, spinach and endive are all good greens richer in vitamin A, that also add excellent flavor to a tossed salad.

To make salads the best possible, prepare them as close to serving time as possible, and have them well chilled. Wash all the ingredients carefully, but do not leave them soaking in water. Drain all vegetables well before using them in salad. Use a sharp knife or scissors for cutting or chopping the foods, mix the salads lightly and add the dressing just before serving the salad, to avoid wilting.

Cheap Glasses
Many poorly fitting and cheap glasses cause ocular distress and headaches, according to the Journal of the American Medical Association. In discussing the harmful or beneficial effects of the average sun glasses on the eyes, the Journal states: "The average sun glasses, obtained in drug and ten cent stores, if sufficiently dark, are as a rule comforting to the eyes of the average wearer on an average bright day, on the water or on the beach, where they are usually used. They reduce the total amount of light entering the eyes. The idea that certain makes of glass do not transmit the "harmful" ultraviolet light is mostly sales talk, as the ordinary white glass allows but little ultraviolet light to pass through. In fact, in order to obtain passage for ultraviolet through a window pane it has to be specially made for that purpose. A certain amount of ultraviolet light is beneficial to the eyes; it is for this reason that vacations are taken at the seashore and in the mountains, and in the winter patients are sent to sunny climates."



**Truman Plans Food Conservation;
U. N. Takes on Difficult Agenda;
Taft Hits Labor Trouble in West**

FOOD PLANS:
Conservation

It wasn't hard for President Truman to figure out: Europe is in desperate need of food from the U. S., but the U. S. will leave itself wide open for even greater price spiraling if it boosts its exports much higher.

The answer, he told a special press conference, is food conservation by all Americans. It is not a matter of eating any less, he said, but of wasting less.

In line with that, he announced the setting up of a citizens food committee to develop a food conservation program in the nation. Charles Luckman of Cambridge, Mass., president of Lever Brothers, was named president.

Regarding Europe, Mr. Truman said the food and fuel situation there is too critical to allow time for detailed study. Thus, apparently in an emergency frame of mind, the President called together congressional leaders to discuss possible steps that could be taken immediately to aid the starving continent.

If possible, he said, he would not call a special session of congress if stop-gap aid for Europe could be pushed through without resorting to that step.

Americans could start preparing for a heavy barrage of food conservation propaganda.

ELEANOR:
An Old Note

"Dear Sumner — This Eisler case seems a hard nut to crack. What do you suggest? Sincerely, E. R."

That, Sumner Welles, former undersecretary of state, told the house committee on un-American activities, was a note he received from Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt in 1939 when the then first lady was interested in obtaining an open hearing on the passport application of one Hanns Eisler, Austrian refugee from Hitler.

The note, an almost forgotten memento of the prewar era, was hailed resoundingly in newspapers across the land because Hanns Eisler was

accused of being a Communist. He is the brother of Gerhart Eisler, No. 1 agent of the Kremlin in the U. S.

Eisler and his wife finally were issued visas in Mexico City to cover their entrance into this country. He has taken out naturalization papers and is a song writer in Hollywood.

In 1926, Eisler told the committee, he had applied for membership in the German Communist party, but had dropped out. A department of labor report made in 1938 said of him: "The evidence establishes preponderantly that Hanns Eisler is a Communist."

Mrs. Roosevelt's attitude toward the affair was lackadaisical. The note to Welles on behalf of Eisler was strictly routine, she said, adding that she neither knew Eisler nor remembered the note.

TOUGH AGENDA:
No Dodging

United Nations general assembly proved at least one thing in the first week of its current session—it isn't going to dodge any issues.

After riotous preliminary sessions in which they heard the U. S. and Russia flay each other verbally and U. N. Secretary General Trygve Lie call for an end to feuding, the delegates voted doggedly to take on the entire list of tough, almost insoluble problems standing as a barrier to world accord.

Among the items admitted to the agenda were the partition of Palestine, peace in the Balkans, independence of Korea and Marshall's proposal to reorganize U. N. machinery to hold a tighter rein on the turbulent peace.

Soviet delegate Andrei Vishinsky's resolution calling on member nations to take criminal action against war-mongering propagandists was wholeheartedly admitted to debate, probably because it will provide a chance to mull over the concept of freedom of the press.

ATOMIC CROP:
Above Normal

In Japan, much to the wonderment of practically everyone, the radioactive soil around atom-bombed Nagasaki has been reported to be giving out with huge crop yields 50 to 300 per cent above normal.

A Japanese agricultural expert estimated the wheat crop to be about twice normal and the cotton crop three times average. Pumpkins, sugar beets, tomatoes and similar produce had a 50 per cent increase.

HARD TIME:
Taft's Tour

Way out west, where pickets are pickets and carry insinuating signs to prove it, Sen. Robert Taft of labor law fame was finding the going a little rugged on his political junket.

But in Seattle, labor stronghold of the Pacific Northwest, he was treated to new heights of heckling. Physical pain was the senator's lot, too, when a jittery chauffeur, unnerved by milling demonstrators, slammed a car door on his hand.

The labor element was, in short, downright inhospitable. Mashed pickets booed Taft enthusiastically as he entered Seattle's Eagle auditorium to deliver his address. Inside the auditorium there were more boos, mingled with Republican cheers.

"Eat less," cried some of his vociferous critics in the audience.

Undaunted, Taft made his speech: "We are proud of our Republican record in congress," he said, to a motley accompaniment of more boos and cheers. He characterized the Taft-Hartley law as a "bill of rights" for union members, and called upon voters to render "gratitude" to congressional backers of the act.

Wilbur Zundell, president of the Young Men's Republican club of Seattle, had a word for the senator's tormentors: "Communists," he said, adding that a Communist demonstration was expected when Taft took the rostrum.

WARNING:
Consequences?

That the aggravated situation in Trieste rapidly is becoming intolerable to the United States was emphasized in a state department note to Yugoslavia that her "exceedingly dangerous" activities at Trieste may produce "most serious consequences."

The U. S. protest deplored the "irresponsible Yugoslav actions" in demanding changes in the Trieste-Yugoslav boundary, and asked the government "to issue immediate instructions to end this practice."

Yugoslav troops had been forcing a number of "incidents" all along the border in attempts to bluff American troops into letting them encroach on Trieste and Italian territory.

Not easing the situation at all was the fact that Yugoslav authorities were holding to their refusal to release an American officer and two enlisted men they had seized.

It was a tense, bitter situation, and it was straining to the danger point the all too tenuous threads of physical peace in the Balkans.

2 teaspoons sugar
1/2 cup warm water
2 packages Red Star Dry Yeast
1/2 cup milk, scalded
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup sugar
2 eggs
4 1/2 cups sifted flour (approx. 10 cups) (sifted)
1/2 teaspoon mace
3 tablespoons shortening
Fat for frying
Dissolve 2 teaspoons sugar in warm water. Add 2 packages yeast and 1/2 cup sugar in a large bowl. Cool to lukewarm. Stir the flour which has been sifted with the mace and beat well. Add eggs and melted and cooled shortening, stirring vigorously. Add remainder of four stirring well. Place on lightly floured board and knead for 3 minutes. Shape into smooth balls and place in greased bowl. Brush top lightly with smooth punching down turn dough onto lightly floured board and roll to 1/2 inch thickness. Cut dough with 3 inch floured doughnut cutter. Place doughnuts on floured baking sheet. Let rise in deep hot fat (350° F.) on both sides. Drain; cool and roll in sugar. Makes 2 dozen.
