NEW DELHI, India (AP) - Tens of elections last March and has indicated he hopes to improve relations with the United States, which cooled during Mrs. Gandhi's tenure

Air Force One landed at Palam Airport at 2:10 p.m. (2:40 a.m. CST) for the third leg of Carter's nine-day world tour.

The tour now includes a Wednesday stop in Egypt, scheduled at the last minute, to meet with President Anwar Sadat to discuss the stalled Egyptian-Israeli peace talks.

Earlier Sunday, Carter discussed the Middle East with Jordan's King Hussein in the Iranian capital of Tehran and told reporters afterward: "I think President Sadat is strongly representing the Arab position and for the moment I see no reason - I think the king agrees - for Jor-

dan to join the talks directly. Carter is scheduled to deliver a speech to the Indian Parliament today focusing on the role of human rights in the world. New Delhi Mayor Rajendra Kumar Gupta estimated that 250,000 to 300,000 people gathered at Ramlila, a cricket field on the edge of Old Delhi, for Carter's arrival speech. But reporters put the

figure at 50,000. Nevertheless, it was the largest crowd year in office, surpassing even his inauguration audience.

The 13-minute speech was interrupted five times by applause. Carter paused at the end of each sentence to allow a translator to deliver the speech in Hindi.

The most important bond between India and the United States is our emphasis on the questions and the commitments of the spirit," Carter told his cheering audi-

We believe that every human being is he said. He listed these as the right to choose a government, worship in freedom, receive education, work, raise a family and "eat so as to be strong in mind and body Carter, describing his warm reception

in India as "beautiful," saw but did not comment on a small demonstration staged by students protesting alleged human rights violations in Chinese-controlled Tibet.

At his airport reception, the American president received a garland of marigolds while Indian brass bands played the U.S. national anthem and a traditional 21-gun salute was fired.

In welcoming remarks, Desai said he hoped Carter's visit would "become a catalyst for clear rapport and understanding between the two countries." Reddy said it was "a happy coincidence" that governments in Washington and New Delhi changed at almost the same time.

"I know that I will feel at home here because of the things that the United States and India have in common - the importance we attach to basic moral values," Carter replied.

"Our common belief in and daily practice of democracy, our mutual commitment to world peace and to its essential foundations, a more just political and economic order among the nations large and small, rich and poor, our concern for helping those in need, both our immediate neighbors and those who live far

# Jumbo Jet Crashes Into Arabian Sea; 213 Believed Dead

BOMBAY, India - An Air India 747 jumbo jet carrying 213 persons on a flight to Dubai in the United Arab Emirates "disintegrated in midair" and crashed into the Arabian Sea minutes after takeof! Sunday, apparently killing all aboard.

India's national news agency Samachar said. "There is no likelihood of any survivors. All are feared to have been killed when the plane disintegrated. That would make the crash history's

third worst air disaster. The plane went down about two miles from shore shortly before 8:30 p.m. (9:30 a.m. CST). Witnesses said they saw a flash of light and then heard an explosion before the plane nosedived into the sea at

a 45-degree angle. Rescue workers said they found some debris and lifejackets - but no survivors - near the site of the crash.

Air India spokesmen said they were unable immediately to say how many foreigners were among the 190 passengers and 23 crew, or to give any nationalities. However, Samachar said an initial passenger list showed four infants and five

children among those aboard. The plane, flight 855, was en route from Bombay's Santa Cruz airport to Dubai, 1,200 miles across the Arabian Sea on the

southeast tip of the Arabian peninsula Samachar said the control tower lost contact with the plane just before the crash. There was no message from the pilot to the tower about any trouble.

The Boeing jumbo was a six-year-old iet, called "Emperor Ashoka" by the airine after an Indian historical figure.

The government sent six Indian Navy ships and three helicopters to the crash site. The water in the area is 30 to 40 feet

An Indian navy warship sighted the jetliner breaking up in the sky, aviation officials said. A navy officer "saw the explosion and the aircraft disintegrating"

India's minister for tourism and civil aviation ordered an inquiry into the crash and expressed his condolences to families of victims.

The worst air disaster in aviation history came on March 27, 1977, when a KLM Boeing 747 taking off at Santa Cruz de Tenerife in Spain's Canary Islands crashed into a taxiing chartered Pan-Am 747, killing 582 persons

The second was on March 3, 1974, when a Turkish DC-10 jet crashed at Ermenonville near Paris, killing 345 persons.

## Snow Blankets Hub City, Area

LIGHT snowfall, which arrived in Lubbock Sunday and made Lubbock area streets and highways hazardous for holiday travelers, is not expected to return today, according to the National Weather

Freezing temperatures, inviting snowy conditions, should persist today with an afternoon high in the upper 30s and an expected low tonight in the upper teens, allowing only a 30 percent chance for more snow flurries today.

Sleet and snow freezing on streets and highways over much of the region forced the National Weater Service to post traveler's warnings Sunday night and are expected to remain in effect through late morning hours today.

A DPS spokesman reported that hazardous road conditions, especially on overpasses and bridges, existed across Texas as far south as the Midland-Odessa area and north to the Panhandle boundary with Oklahoma. The band of snow patches extended from the Texas-New Mexico boundary as far east as Denton.

Despite hazardous roadways in the western portion of the state, officials at pated no flight cancellations to occur through the night since wintry weather conditions had not imposed poor visibility or runway conditions on the terminal.

A cold front, which invaded the South Plains early Sunday, forced temperatures into the teens and 20s and created patches of snow across the area.

Northern regions of the Panhandle saw the first snow flurries early Sunday morning. The snow continued through out the day, coating Amarillo with as much as two inches of snow. Tulia also

reported two inches. Snow flurries began farther south early Sunday afternoon, but did not pile any measurable amounts of the substance on most South Plains cities.

The flurries which produced enough substance to cover the ground were reported in various cities, including Lubbock, but the snowfall continued to remain immeasurable by late afternoon

Ground cover was officially reported at Abernathy, Cotton Center, Dimmitt, Idalou, Lockney and Petersburg. Snow also was reported at Plainview and Tulia. South and west of the Hub City, reports of snow were made in Levelland, Little-

field, Meadow, Plains, Shallowater, Slaton and Sundown. A warming trend is expected to raise temperature highs into the 50s in the west Texas area Wednesday through Fri-

day, accompanied by overnight lows in the 20s and 30s. Forecasters report that the rest of the

state should expect rain, light snow or freezing rain today with temperatures in the 30s and 40s.

The frontal system's eastern sweep

It was a frosty Jan. 1 for the rest of the

The village of Canyon, Wyo., had 46 inches of snow on the ground at sunrise after the latest storm. Yellowstone National Park had 5 feet.

## Fire Strikes Downtown

A THREE-ALARM fire Sunday night destroyed a vacant rooming house and damaged downstair businesses at the intersection of Broadway and Avenue G.

About 30 firemen, using an aerial ladder and snorkel, continued to battle the

blaze late Sunday. Firemen said they did not believe anyone was in the structure when it was re-

ported on fire about 7:45 p.m. However, the old rooming house was

known to be an overnight stay for transients. District Chief Art Holley said, though, that he did not think there were any persons trapped in the blaze because the structure was locked up when firemen arrived. Chief Tom Foster said the fire appar-

ently began at a stairwell located in the back of the building which faces Broadway and encompasses about half a block. The chief said firemen thought they had contained the blaze until it broke through to the second floor.

## Confusion Surrounds Briscoe Order On Funding

AUSTIN (AP) - Gov. Dolph Briscoe's office says the governor has ordered two job training grants to a South Texas manpower program frozen pending completion of a court investigation.

But officials in government offices that issued the grants said they were unaware of any instructions to half the flow of funds to South Texas Building Trades Education Services Inc.

"On Dec. 20, the governor instructed that those grants be frozen pending completion of the court of inquiry's action,' said press secretary Bob Bain. He added that he was did not know whether there was a written order or if it was relayed

Tom Laramey, general counsel of the Texas Department of Community Affairs, which administers federal Comprehensive Employment Training Act money received by the state, said he "wasn't aware" of any such instructions.

He said it was possible the order went to the agency's executive director "and I wasn't told." Other officials in a position to know were out of town and could not

"I am not aware of any direction" from Briscoe, said Joaquin Rodriguez, program director for the Governor's Office of Migrant Affairs, which issued a grant to the manpower program

A source close to the Brownsville investigation said Briscoe's office was warned of the probe before it began and was advised to suspend the grants.

Hester has subpoenaed 10 state employes and officials, most of them employes of the department of community affairs or the Governor's Office of Migrant Affairs, to testify in the court of inquiry on Wednesday

No one has discussed this matter or any part of this matter with me," Briscoe told The Associated Press last week through Bain.

One of those subpoenaed is Bruce Watson, an evaluator for the Texas Department of Community Affairs, who inspected the program run by South Texas Building Trades Education Services Inc. this spring

Watson found several fiscal irregularities in the program.

Watson said the bank signature card for the operation had only two names on it -Don and Clarence Gray, Clarence being the program's chief executive.

'Information on bank accounts was not readily available. No account existed until 51177, and after this date it was noted that one of the persons assigned as authorized signee was one who had nothing to do with the program." Watson said.

He recommended designation of another cosigner "in order to insure that the best management system is being utilized.

Watson also said a \$14,000 check from the community affairs agency had been held "at least a week" before it was de-





MASERU, Lesotho (AP) — Banned newspaper editor Donald Woods said Sunday after fleeing South Africa that his racially divided homeland is headed for civil war unless the white minority government "comes to its senses very

Woods, long one of South Africa's most outspoken liberal editors, said he expects to devote his exile to ending racial repression in that country and to defending before the outside world other detained or banned dissidents within

The 43-year-old editor spoke in an interview with The Associated Press at the home of the acting British ambassador in this small landlocked black African state, where he fled Saturday after hitchhiking in disguise 300 miles from his home in the South African port city of East London.

Woods, who was under banning orders in South Africa that restricted his movement and freedom of speech, said he hopes to leave here with his family within one or two days for Britain. He expects to settle in Britain or the United

His wife and five children traveled to Lesotho Saturday separately from him. A Lesotho government official said Woods probably will leave by a special charter flight Tuesday morning. Scheduled flights from this capital city land in South Africa, and all flights must overfly South Africa or the Transkei, an independent black homeland tied to South Africa.

But the Lesotho official predicted no problems with Woods's overflying South Africa. He pointed out that black nationalist leaders wanted by the South Afri-

can government have flown in and out of Maseru without dificulty Woods, his children milling around him as he spoke, appeared relaxed Sunday. But he described his flight from South Africa as the most "scaring seven or Asked why he risked a long jail term if caught fleeing in defiance of a five-year banning order, Woods said: "The (South African) Nationalist government made it impossible for me to continue to function as a journalist and critic of its policies, and I was no longer prepared to remain silent while they continued doing

the things they were doing and saying the things they were saying."
Woods, editor of the Daily Dispatch in East London, was a close friend of black activist leader Steve Biko, 30, whose death last September in security police detention sparked an international outcry.

On Oct. 19, the South African government banned or detained more than 50 black leaders and seven white dissidents, including Woods, and shut down the country's two main black newspapers.

Woods's banning order prevented him from continuing his work as an editor, being quoted in the press, leaving East London or having most visitors without

Woods said the closing of the black newspaper The World and the arrest of its editor, Percy Qoboza, and his own banning closed "the one area of limited freedom left in South Africa - the press."

"Unless the Nationalist government comes to its senses very soon, there is no doubt in my mind South Africa is headed for civil war along racial lines," he

Woods, who made it clear he rejects violence, did not say when or how he expects the war to start.

The editor said his first task will be to write about Biko, particularly the inquest at which a magistrate cleared security police of blame for the black leader's death from brain damage. Dissidents say the injuries were caused by police Describing his escape, Woods said only his wife, Wendy, and eldest son, Dillon, 13, knew of the plan.

He said he dyed his greying hair black and put on a false moustache before going to the outskirts of East London and hitchhiking rides toward Lesotho. He said he rode past an unmanned Transkei border post to a point close to the Le-

"I got three lifts and assumed three different identities," he said. "First I was an Afrikaner who couldn't speak much English, then I was an Australian and

finally I was a German." Discarding his jacket at the border, he swam a flooded river and got a final lift

Woods made these other points in his interview:

-The massive government victory at the Nov. 30 elections "exceeded my worst expectations because it implied that the white electorate was simply not prepared to opt for peace and negotiations with blacks."

-Recent events dashed his hopes of interracial negotiations and political power-sharing. "The government has banned or detained those blacks and whites who were best placed to bring about a reconciliation. What is left in the field is two polarized racial groups who will carry on a collision course to racial

-As a fifth-generation South African, he is "very sad" to leave. But he said he intends returning to South Africa "as soon as there is a change of government.or a change of heart in the government.

"And if I can do anything, wherever I am, to bring about that state of affairs, I will do it by any means other than violence," Woods declared.

## Chilean's Future Hinges On Balloting

Pinochet announced less than two weeks ago he was summoning all Chileans over age 18 to the polls to react to

can country The plebiscite, requiring a "yes" or 'no" answer, does not directly refer to the United Nations but would back Pinochet in "his defense of the dignity of Chile" and reaffirm the legitimacy of his

Between 5 and 6 million people, in a population of 12 million, are expected to cast the sealed paper ballots. Citizens who do not vote will have their identify cards declared invalid

The pro-government press has been filled with advertisements and news stories urging people to vote "Si Chile" or "Si Presidente." Large segments of the nightly news broadcasts on national television are taken up with people explaining why they are going to vote "yes."

The U.N. resolution, passed last month with the support of the United States and other Western nations, was one of many international condemnations of the deaths, torture and detentions that followed the right-wing military's 1973 coup against the government of socialist Salvador Allende.

There are no figures on the number killed, but estimates go as high as 7,000. The government acknowledges more than 40,000 leftists were jailed, but all but a few hundred since have been freed or

According to reliable sources, Chile's navy and air force have been ordered by their commanders to stay in their barracks Wednesday and take no part in policing the vote. That order came last week after junta members Gen. Gustavo Leigh of the air force and Admiral Jose Merino of the navy unsucressfully opposed the

> The council said a gain in Soviet-Warsaw pact conventional strength in fire power, mobility and striking range "has overbalanced improvements in NATO defense measures" in recent years.

Warsaw Pact countries already have the ability to mount a major offensive without reinforcement and the disparity continues to widen." the council said.

Without an adequate conventional defense, the North Atlantic Treaty Organization would be faced with the choice of using nuclear weapons at the outset of

hostilities or withdrawing in the face of superior forces, it said. The report criticized NATO countries

for delaying essential modernization, cutting terms of military service, and stationing troop units and supplies too far away from potential war fronts.

The group urged strong efforts to forge NATO armies, air forces and navies into a soundly united coalition force, rather than merely national components, not truly meshed together. Meanwhile, a separate document pub-

lished by the American Enterprise Institute for Public Policy Research presented conflicting arguments on the issue of standardizing NATO military equipment. Sen. Dewey F. Bartlett, R-Okla., called such standardization the key to survivial But retired Army Gen. James H. Polk,

who commanded U.S. army forces in Europe until 1971, called standardization window-dressing except for such practices in use of fuel and ammunition." Bartlett contended NATO loses up to 30

to 40 percent of its combat effectiveness because of inadequate standardization of weapons as well as other equipment among the national forces that make up

But Polk argued that the difference in national production methods, differing tactical concepts and the cost of international research and development stand in the way of standardization.







#### 1978--Year Of The Person?

WHAT DIFFERENCE does a day make? rather an explanation. If the day marks the are brought into our homes within an infirst, or second, day of a New Year, it can mean just about anything anyone wants it

But, if taken in the context as just one of 365 days of the year, it can be quite routine. It is only when we take the days and separate them into special days or days where something important has happened.

The importance usually is gauged as to its effect on each of us individually.

WITH THAT in mind, somewhere between ball games today, or at least tomorrow, a few moments taken to reflect on what lies ahead isn't out of order despite the fact it is

There are those who argue that "it makes little or no difference what I think" as an individual, "they" are going to do what they want to anyway

For whatever it is worth-and it is worth your stake in America-that is precisely why 'they" do what they want to anyway.

WE LONG have urged that qualified and responsible citizens get involved in how their communities, states and the nation are

All too often, instead of the more experienced person being chosen for office, the man or woman with the most "charisma," the most money or the largest number of special voting blocs has been chosen.

When only 18 to 38 per cent of the qualified electorate go to the polls to help choose the person who will help run the state or the nation, then we, not "they," have abdicated our claim to a share in how the state or the nation is run already.

TODAY, WE live in a most sophisticated The question hardly needs an answer, but society. News happenings half a world away stant, and in greater depth and detail in the

newspapers of the nation. Often, we seemed bombarded with so many events that there is a tendency to throw up one's hands and say "it makes no difference what I think..." But this is not so.

Many of our political problems in the U.S. have been brought about because far too many have thrown up their hands, leaving the process and "the system" to those wellorganized and special interest groups who do go to the polls and in effect choose the leaders for everyone

In brief, we often have majority rule by the minority, in the sense of numbers.

TODAY, WE have the problem over much of the world of too much and too little. While many enjoy the fruits of a modern society and technology, many others do not share in it.

Galloping inflation-which takes big chunks from paychecks and worker initiative continues to be a major problem.

While criticizing heavy federal spending, on everything from welfare to defense matters, many of us still demand more and more in the area of federal aid. Actually, what has happened, is happening and will happen in the New Year, 1978, to a great degree does depend on each of us as an individual, what we do each day.

How we vote, or not vote, how we spend save, use government funds, go for broke, rip off one another, or think, talk, act will determine what sort of nation-and year -the New Year will be.

WASHINGTON--As I understand from what an AP dispatch described as a "spokesperson" for General Motors, a fuel hose leak in a GM car is no more dangerous than getting out of bed in the

GM is recalling 133,000 Cadillacs built since. 1975 to correct fuel hose leaks which have caused 'at least" 100 engine fires. But GM's flack claimed "the danger is minimal."

The "spokesperson" went on to explain that 'There's plenty of time to stop the car and get out. The driver might smell smoke or gasoline. If he does, he should just pull over to the side of the road and get out. And then, if there is a fire under the hood, he should not try to open the hood.

Well now. How much is "plenty of time?" Suppose by the time the driver smells smoke or gasoline his horseless carriage is about to burst into flames?

AS FOR OPENING the hood, that is not an easy chore to accomplish while running for your life. I need no warning from GM not to meddle with any vehicle with four wheels and a gasoline

Indeed, it would seem that the modern automohile has become a dangerous possession that must be approached as one would extend a patting hand to a tiger.

A few-years back, for example, a federal consumer bulletin warned owners of 8 million Chevrolets produced from 1965 through 1969 that there was a "potential risk" involved in the high incidence of broken engine mounts.

When a mount breaks, there is a twisting effect that causes the car to go out of control. An official communique from GM was hustled

into print stating in effect that owners of those 8 million Chevies need not worry about dying a sudden death if their driving skills qualified them for competing in the Indianapolis "500."

"A PERSON driving a car should be a skilled driver," said the communique. "And if he can't manage a car at under 25 miles an hour he shouldn't be driving.

I have encountered people whose cars I would decline to enter with the engine idling. In fact, serious accidents usually happen at

speeds far in excess of 25 mph, and at such speeds a broken engine mount or smelly engine beckons instant tragedy. At any rate, the buyer gets little protection when he acquires anything these days.

Just the other day, GM agreed to pay out \$200 each to about 128,000 people who bought 1977 Oldsmobile, Buick or Pontiac cars equipped, without notice to the buyer, with Chevrolet V-8

THE UNPRECEDENTED six-month delay in bringing Anatoli Shcharansky to trial on espionage charges may signal Communist retreat from a semi-blackmail policy of using the leading Soviet dissident to force President Carter to cool his human rights campaign.

That is the conclusion of some Kremlinologists in this country, in and out of the Carter administration. Last October, these analysts leaned strongly the other way:

That Shcharansky, a major figure among dissidents demanding Kremlin adherence to human rights commitments made at the 1975 Helsinki conference, would be the victim of the first Soviet "show" trial since 1970.

BUT APPARENTLY the refusal of the Carter administration to knuckle under-notably Ambassador Arthur Goldberg, chief U.S. delegate at the Belgrade conference-persuaded Moscow to change its tune.

Instead of toning down his grim recitation of Soviet human rights violations, Golderg stepped it up-and then returned here last month to engender greater support from President Carter.

Shcharansky was arrested on unpublished charges of espionage for the U.S .- a charge categorically denied by Jimmy Carter. Soviet law requires bringing a suspect to trial within nine months of the charge.

PROOF DOES NOT exist as to the Kremlin's motives. It can be argued, for example, that the six-month postponement (announced Dec. 16) would bridge impending U.S.-Soviet develop-

A new strategic arms agreement, a Carter-Leonid Brezhnev summit, and the end of the Belgrade conference. The Soviet game might be to delay a bloody trial of Shcharansky until after that summit

But most Kremlinologists take a different view: that in the face of repeated, ominous and unpublicized warnings from the President on down, the Kremlin may have concluded that the trial could have a devastating U.S.-Soviet impact before or after a Carter-Brezhnev summit.

If true, this means that the politicians, led by Brezhnev, hold more power in the Kremlin than the KGB (the Soviet police apparatus), a matter of great significance.

bama Gov. George C. Wallace and his long before the divorce stories surfaced. wife of seven years, Cornelia, face each other in divorce court Wednesday on their wedding anniversary

The crippled 58-year-old Wallace sued his wife, 20 years younger than he, last September on grounds of incompatibility. She countered with a suit charging cruelty and fled the governor's mansion, saying she feared for her life.

The raven-haired Mrs. Wallace, who has a penchant for expensive clothes. says her husband refused to provide her with the necessities of life and that she had to spend her savings for living expenses. She has not specified how much ali-

mony she wants Wallace apparently was disillusioned with the marriage long before he filed for divorce. His friends said he contemplated divorce when he learned Cornelia had bugged his private telephone in 1976, but

waited a year He reportedly was fearful of the effect a divorce would have on his political future as he campaigns for the U.S. Senate this year, but finally decided he had to

Wallace was jealous of his active wife, their friends said, and thought she neglected him, traveling frequently while he stayed home in his wheelchair. He was left paralyzed from the waist down when he was shot by a would-be assassin while campaigning for the presidency in 1972, about 17 months after he and Cornelia were married.

## Hussein Raps Israel's Stance On West Bank TEHRAN (UPI) - King Hussein said

Sunday Israel has shown a "shocking and very distressing" refusal to be flexible. and its stance on the West Bank complicates Jordan's entry into Middle East peace talks.

He said there could be "disaster" in the area if Israeli Prime Minister Menahem Begin fails to adequately reciprocate peace initiatives of Egyptian President Anwar Sadat.

Hussein traveled to Iran to meet with President Carter. Carter, meanwhile said that while Hussein would be willing to join Middle East peace talks under certain conditions, the time is not ripe.

"Under certain principles, King Hussein would be ready to join the talks either directly with the Israelis or jointly with Egypt and Israel," Carter said, "but at the moment I think President Sadat is strongly representing the Arab position and for the moment I see no reason and I think the king agrees — for Jordan to join the talks directly."

A senior administration official who attended the meeting said, "the obstacle to Jordan going to Cairo now is that there has been no definition of the principles to govern how the Palestinian question is to be handled.

Until there is an adequate definition of that and the question of (territorial) withdrawals. I think it is unlikely the Jordanians will be able to join the talks.

In his interview. Hussein said Jordan would be willing to attend peace talks if it saw a possible solution to Middle East problems. But he said Begin's recent statements have not been encouraging.

He said that contrary to Begin's plan, Israeli troops on the West Bank should be withdrawn "in the shortest practical

Asked if he saw any sign of flexibility from Begin, he said:

"I haven't seen from his public statements anything to indicate that, and this is really shocking and very distressing as far as I'm concerned.

The Israelis "have taken no step in my opinion to match in any form or weight the very courageous initiative of President Sadat" and if Egypt's initiative is not reciprocated. "I don't see what the future will hold for all of us except possible disaster.

Although Jordan was initially somewhat critical of Sadat's decision to visit Jerusalem in November, Hussein said he now has accepted the move as "a very







## Pope Links Violence, Arms Race

ROME (AP) - Pope Paul VI, marking the 11th World Day of Peace, said Sunday that violence in the world can be traced to the arms race and "the conflict provoked in society by dehumanizing conditions of life."

The 80-year-old pontiff celebrated New Year's Mass in the Basilica of St Mary Major in downtown Rome before several thousand Romans and pilgrins and later wished a Happy New Year to about 20,000 faithful gathered in St. Peter's

In his emotional 25-minute sermon, titled "No to Violence, Yes to Peace," the pope made only passing reference to the Middle East, expressing the hope that Moslem and Christian populations living in Lebanon can set an example of peace for the rest of the region.

Frequently stumbling over his words, Pope Paul appealed to young people to reject violence even though war threatens them and the rest of mankind with its supreme irrationality, with its absurdity

He added: "Such conditions of life provoke, especially among the young, frustrations which set off reactions of violence and aggressivness against certain structures and economic situations of contemporary society."

He said those who react violently often are trying to destroy a specific aspect of modern life, which he called "a desacralized society, a society without soul, a society without love."

Pope Paul, who instituted the peace day, told the basilica gathering, 'You have the capacity of an extraordinary openness and a joyous availability, which unfortunately adults' sometimes have forgotten or lost.

"You too, young people, have your word, fresh, new, original, to say and make heard to your elders. Speak this word of peace, this 'no to violence,' with energy, with force, with the force of your pure hearts, your clear eyes, your joy of living, but living in a world in which justice and peace are joined."

#### **Troops Search** For Gunmen In Guatemala

GUATEMALA CITY, Guatemala-(UPI) - Police and Army troops searched this capital and the surrounding countryside Sunday for the kidnappers of former cabinet minister Roberto Herrera Ibarguen, one of Guatemala's wealthiest

Herrera, 55, was kidnapped Saturday by gunmen who cut off his car on a\_road outside the city and shot his chauffeur and bodyguard to death.

Herrera. Foreigh Minister and later Interior Minister under Presdient Carlos Manuel Arana Osorio (1970-1974), was the sixth prominent Guatemalan kidnapped

British colony claimed by Guatemala. There have been hundreds of political killings in Guatemala in the past year. Among the victims have been peasants, workers, students, landowners businessmen, politicians, bodyguards and police.



PASADENA, Calif. (UPI) - About one and a half million persons were expected to line the streets this morning for the start of the 89th annual Tournament of Roses Parade.

Thousands of persons had staked claims to curbside vantage points by the weekend, and an estimated 5,000 recreational vehicles and passenge cars were parked in Brookside Park near the starting point.

## Carter's Efforts Called 'Useless'

BEIRUT, Lebanon (UPI) - Palestinian guerilla leader Yasser Arafat Sunday bade a fiery "goodbye to American interests" in the Middle East and charged President Carter's policy was hurling the region toward war.

He also dismissed as "useless" Carter's efforts to bring Jordan's moderate King Hussein into the peace process.

Arafat, wearing his usual sunglasses, battle fatigues and an Arab headdress, addressed several thousand guerrillas from rival Palestinian groups at a rally marking the 13th anniversary of the first commando raid against Israel by his Fatah guerrillas.

With former rival Dr. George Habash of the radical Popular Front for the Liberation of Palestine at his side, Arafat said Carter and U.S. National Security Adviser Zbigniew Brzezinski had written off the Palestine Liberation Organization's role in the search for a Middle East

## Dayan Asks Settlers To Return

JERUSALEM (UPI) - Foreign Minister Moshe Dayan Sunday urged Jewish settlers in the occupied Sinai peninsula to go along with the government's proposed return of the territory to Egypt, calling the move critical to a Middle East peace.

"The people of Israel support the government plan as shown in the vote in the Knesset (parliament)," Dayan told a crowd of 3,000 persons at the Sadot settlement near the Gaza strip in northern

"If the settlers oppose the program, and because of this peace is not achieved, the people will not go with them," Dayan

Frequently interrupted by settlers demanding a clear statement of what they view as Israel's claim to the area, Dayansaid, "We never suggested in all the years the imposition of Israeli sovereignty.

With the exception of East Jerusalem. Israeli law has not been imposed and there have been no annexations" of any territory captured in 1967, he said.

Davan was accompanied at the meeting by Agriculture Minister Ariel Sharon, a reserve general who led the Israeli counterattack across the Suez Canal in 1973. Sharon said the government sees the

settlements as an inseparable part of the peace plan and urged the settlers to continue developing the region.

Sources in Jersusalem said the Israeli plan for the occupied territories calls for settlers to pay taxes to the Egyptian government and be subject to the Egyptian criminal code, although civil cases would come before Israeli courts.

In his speech to the Knesset last week, Prime Minister Menahem Begin said the settlements "shall remain in place linked with Israel's administration and courts. They will be protected by an Israeli force.

ISLAMABAD, Pakistan (AP) - Gen. Zia ul-Haq, Pakistan's military ruler, said Sunday he will decide this month whether former Prime Minister Zulfikar Ali Bhutto, under criminal indictment for murder, will be barred from campaigning in the next national election.

Zia told a news conference his military government will make a decision on Bhutto's political fate within two or three weeks. Several of Bhutto's political associates in the Pakistan People's Party may be included in the ban, Zia

The general reiterated his pledge to schedule national elections and return Pakistan to civilian rule by the end of

"I prefer soldiering and I am sure that do not want to be a politician," Zia

"We are not warmongers," he said. We are demanding our rights. And we know, as (former Egyptian leader Gamal Abdel) Nasser said, that that (land) which is taken (by Israel) through force can be retaken only through force.'

In a pointed reference to a recent resurgence in Soviet influence in the Middle East, Arafat said, "We (the PLO) are not alone," and mentioned Moscow as high among its allies. Arafat, smiling and eliciting laughter

and applause, said Carter had spent "40 useless minutes with (Jordan's) King Hussein" in Tehran on the U.S. president's current foreign tour. "He (Hussein) could not give you (Cart-

## Strike Factor Seen In Coal Stockpiles

BECKLEY, W.Va. (AP) - The president of the United Mine Workers union said Sunday that coal operators seem to feel they can survive a long strike - and meanwhile wear down the union's contract demands - because key customers

have stockpiled so much coal. Arnold Miller said contract talks in Washington have stalled because the Bituminous Coal Operators Association believes a long strike would force the miners - who are without any form of strike benefits - into accepting a less than favorable contract.

Some industries and utilities had stockpiled three-month supplies before the UMW went on strike Dec. 6.

But I can assure our members that if our negotiators reach a contract that doesn't suit me, it won't come down (to the various union locals)." Miller said in

an interview with Beckley radio station WWNR. "And the (union's) bargaining committee won't automatically rubber stamp any agreement. It has to suit them and suit me ... if I don't like it, it ain't going to come down

Miller also said the only way he would agree to a contract provision calling for fines against miners who conduct illegal wildcat strikes or have excessive absences would be if there is a similar provision calling for fines against coal opera-

If a miner is to face penalities for staving off work, Miller said, then there should be similar fines against coal companies which delay or refuse to negotiate local issues

## Sadat May Support Carter's Position

CAIRO, Egypt (UPI) - President Anwar Sadat indicated Sunday he was ready to throw his weight behind President Carter's call for a Palestinian homeland tied to Jordan.

Diplomatic sources said this could break the Arab-Israeli deadlock over the future of the West Bank of the Jordan and the Gaza Strip.

Reacting to Carter's latest statements on the Palestinian issue, Sadat said in an interview in the newspaper Al Akhbar: "I have been calling for the past four years for a link between Jordan and the envisaged Palestinian state. Carter, who will meet with Sadat in As-

wan, Egypt, Wednesday, said in Warsaw at the outset of his current world tour he favored a non-independent Palestinian homeland linked to Jordan. What Sadat advocates, however, is an

independent state with a federal or confederal link to Jordan. By contrast, Israeli Prime Minister Menahem Begin rejects the idea altogether, and is prepared only to grant self-rule to the Arabs of the West Bank and Gaza.

However, Sadat hinted there is room for compromise between the Egyptian and Israeli positions.

"We should renounce the policy of either getting everything or rejecting everything," Sadat said. "We should get what we can get until we can get all that we

The Egyptian-Israeli differences had surfaced at the Christmas Day summit between Sadat and Begin, forcing postponement of a "declaration of intent," outlining the basic principles of an overall settlement, which the two leaders were planning to issue.

Sadat then turned to America, "which holds 99 percent of the cards" in the Middle East conflict, and appealed to Carter, through U.S. ambassador Hermann Eilts, to declare backing for the Palestinians right to self-determination Carter's statement last week that he

opposed the idea of an independent Palestinian state drew a sharp reaction from Sadat, who said he was "surprised, disappointed and embarrassed" by it. But the Egyptian President apparently was reassured by Carter's later com-

Carter will arrive in Aswan at 12 noon (5 a.m. EST) Wednesday on his way from

Riyadh, the Saudi Arabian capital, to Paris, and will spend about four hours talking to Sadat. Aswan, about 500 miles south of Cairo,

is the site of the giant Soviet-built High Dam and is renowned for its warm weather and Egyptian antiquities.

Sadat, accompanied by West German Chancellor Helmut Schmidt, arrived there Sunday aboard a Nile boat from Luxor. The two have been on a working vacation in southern Egypt for the past

In an interview in the weekly magazine October, Sadat said he spurned an offer by some Palestinian groups, which he did not name, to meet with him secretly.

Charging the Palestinians were "wasting all available opportunities," by refusing to join his peace drive, Sadat said: Their confusion has reached such a point that they asked, through an Arab country, to meet secretly with me. Can anybody imagine this? This is the apex of confusion and impudence. I naturally ref-

Sadat said the Palestinians also asked to meet secretly with Moshe Dayan during a recent visit to West Germany, but the Israeli Foreign Minister turned them

## Dead Mao's Birthday **Observed**

TOKYO (AP) - In his lifetime, China's Mao Tse-tung forbade public celebrations of his birthday. Now that he is dead it appears the day is to take on all the trappings of a national holiday.

On Monday, Dec.26, according to reports reaching here, the top leadership of the Communist Party and state gathered in the Great Hall of the People for what was described as a "grand soiree," attended by more than 6,000 residents of Peking, to mark the 84th anniversary of Chairman Mao's birth.

Mao's successor, Hua Kuo-feng, and the four party vice chairmen were present, as was practically every member of the 24-member Politburo.

The importance of the event was underscored by the attendance of the party's No. 2 man. Vice Chairman Yeh Chien-ying, 78, whose shaky health has kept him away from some recent formal meetings.

To have missed so prestigious an occasion would have invited speculation as to the credentials of some leaders said to be under fire for one reason or another. As if to forestall this, Manchuria's politico-military boss, Li Teh-sheng, came down from Mukden, and the southwest chieftain, Hsu Shih-yu, came up from

And despite unconfirmed reports that they may be in trouble because of their lukewarm enthusiasm for twice-rehabilitated senior Vice Premier Teng Hsiaoping, both Peking's mayor, Wu Teh, and the city's military commander, Chen Hsi-lien, were there in the thick of

Meetings and theatrical performances were staged in provincial capitals as well as in Mao's birthplace, Shaoshan in Hunan province, and Yenan in Shensi, where he spent many of his revolutionary

Mao died Sept. 9, 1976, at the age of 82. A month later his widow, Chiang Ching, and three other powerful members of the Politburo were arrested on charges of plotting to overthrow Hua and seize power for themselves.

The radical ideas they espoused, and which Mao encouraged in his declining years, have been put on the shelf. Those which more fully suit the more realistic leadership now in charge have been dusted off and put into practice.

#### Economist Says grandchildren, six great-grandchildren. Action Needed

WASHINGTON (AP) - A prominent economist said Sunday that the Carter administration has worried too much about currying favor with the business community while failing to stem infla-

Dr. Arthur Okun, a senior fellow at the Brookings Institution, a liberal-oriented think tank, said there's a danger the inflation rate may go well above 6 percent in 1978 or 1979 if decisive action isn't taken.

'It is interesting that after two years of fairly stable 6 percent inflation, people haven't learned to live with it," he said. 'They haven't adapted to it.'

Okun made his comments in an interyiew on NBC's "Meet the Press."

Asked if he thought Carter pays too much attention to the notion of business confidence, Okun replied, "Yes. I see no evidence that love for the president can be bought, or that it can make a real difference in the way that business be-

Okun, a former chairman of the Council of Economic Advisers in the administration of Lyndon B. Johnson, said he didn't expect any dramatic economic changes stemming from Carter's decision to replace Arthur Burns as chairman of the Federal Reserve Board.

WASHINGTON (AP) - Tougher credit rules and higher minimum wages highlighted congressional consumer action this year, while the Supreme Court handed down decisions on package labels and lawyer advertising.

President Carter signed the Fair Debt Collection Act on Sept. 20, making it a federal offense for debt collectors to threaten violence, use obscene language or contact consumers by telephone at inconvenient times or places.

Other provisions prohibit collectors from publishing lists of debtors, impersonating government officials or lawyers. obtaining information under false pretenses and collecting more than is owed.

Under the Fair Labor Standards Amendments of 1977 the minimum wage rises from \$2.30 to \$2.65 an hour on Jan. 1. It will rise to at least \$2.90 in 1979, \$3.10 in 1980 and \$3.35 in 1981.

Consumers also will get a greater choice in shopping for loans and mortgages, thanks to the 1977 amendments to

the Federal Credit Union Act. They let credit unions make loans with more flexible terms, allowing them to compete with banks on mortgages and other types

Still pending before Congress are measures to create an office of consumer representation, allow consumer class action suits, establish consumer cooperative banks and give citizens broader standing to sue the government.

The Supreme Court rulings during 1977 included a finding that it is unconstitutional to prohibit newspaper advertising by lawyers. States still may regulate such advertising. Consumer groups hailed the decision as a means of getting price and specialty information to consumers.

Another decision held that states may not supersede federal food labeling provisions allowing some items to weigh less than the weight stated on their labels.

Looking at Social Security, the court decided it is illegal to require a male surviving spouse to prove he depended on his wife for at least half his income in order to collect survivors' benefits.

Other rulings rejected local laws prohibiting "for sale" and "sold" signs on houses and limiting the definition of 'family" in areas where only single fami-

ly dwellings are allowed. The Office of Consumer Affairs of the Department of Health, Education and Welfare has compiled a list of major actions by government agencies affecting consumers. Among them:

- Most aerosols containing chlorofluorocarbon propellants had to carry warning labels starting Oct. 31 under a Food and Drug Administration rule. The Consumer Product Safety Commission adopted a simlar label for aerosols under its jurisdiction, effective Feb. 20.

The Civil Aeronautics Board dropped requirements that tickets for one-stop-inclusive tour charters be purchased in advance.

The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration adopted a rule requiring front seat automobile crash protection of either air bags or passive seat belts beginning in 1981.

Plastic bottles containing acrylonitrile were banned effective Dec. 22 by the FDA. The agency says the chemical migrates into fruit juices and other liquids

in the bottles. - Mandatory FDA rules for cosmetic labeling took effect April 15. All new products are required to list their ingredients in descending order of predomi-

- The Federal Reserve System issued rules prohibiting surcharges to customers who use credit cards instead of cash. Cash customers may receive discounts,

- An FDA rule requiring women taking estrogen to be given information on the risks and benefits took effect Oct. 18.

- The Housing and Urban Develop-

ment Department increased the maximum mortgage amount for a one-family home from \$45,000 to \$60,000 for buyers with loans insured by the Federal Housing Authority.

Health, Education and Welfare rules: took effect June 3 prohibiting discriminaton against handicapped persons in employment and in programs and activities

receiving federal assistance. On Aug. 15, FDA rules went into effect prohibiting sale of hearing aids to persons unless they have had their hearing examined to determine the need for such a device. Persons over 18 can waive the exam, however.

FDA rules on labeling intrauterine contraceptive devices took effect Nov. 1, including a requirement that patients receive an easily understood brochure before the device is put in place.

- The Consumer Product Safety Commission banned on Feb. 27 the manufacture and use of paint containing more than 0.06 percent lead.

— The FDA banned the use of zircon-

ium in aerosol drug and cosmetic prod-ucts following studies showing some forms of zirconium cause lung disease in

- The Interstate Commerce Commission prohibited household movers from charging full freight rates on goods total-ly or substantially lost or destroyed in

- And finally, the FDA launched an effort to ban saccharin, the artificial swee-tener which has been associated with cancer in animals. However, congressional action has postponed the ban and the FDA is working on a warning label re-

#### Lockheed Workers To End Walkout

ONTARIO, Calif. (AP) - About 500 striking Lockheed Co. aircraft services workers voted overwhelmingly Sunday to accept a company contract offer and end their seven-week walkout, union officials said.

Members of International Association of Machinists Local 821 approved by 90 percent what union spokesman Pat Ziska said is the same contract proposal to be voted on today by an additional 8,500 striking Lockheed workers, also IAM

The aircraft services workers walked off the job Nov. 12; they were scheduled to return to work Tuesday.

The Lockheed machinists scheduled to vote today, who belong to a separate union local, went on strike Oct. 10 against plants in Burbank and Palmdale.

The offer approved Sunday provides for wage increases of 6.14 percent, or an average 40 cents an hour, in the first year and 3 percent in the second and third year of a three-year pact. Cost of living allowances are also maintained for the machinists, whose average wage is \$7.32 cents an hour.


The workers retain all of their previous seniority privileges. A key issue in the dispute was Lockheed's wish to change the seniority system, which allows workers with six years' or more employment to "bump" junior workers during layoffs.

The contract also provides for improved pension benefits.







#### Opens Attack On Broadcasters Literary Group

SAULT STE. MARIE, Mich. (UPI) - Television newscasters have replaced government bureaucrats as the target of a literary group dedicated to the banishment of despicable aberrations that have crept into the English language.

The Unicorn Society of Lake Superior State College, which took nomina from members and like-minded purists from around the country, singled out this group of lingual trend-setters for its "1977 Very Unique Redundancy Repet-

It cited the experience of a Nashville, Tenn., contributor who waged a yearlong battle against a local station to eliminate the use of such phrases as "completely destroyed," "most unique" and "more unique." The contributor reported "limited success" in his campaign.

Based on responses, the society compiled its annual "Dishonor List" of words and phrases banished from the Queen's English. Among the selections were:

"Nuk-u-lar.' What some people are reading on the air for the word 'nucle-"Medication.' We can no longer afford this. It's too expensive. We've got to get back to the cheaper 'medicine

## French Leader Gives Middle East Views

WASHINGTON (AP) - French President Valery Giscard d'Estaing said Sunday that a lasting peace in the Middle East may hinge on the willingness of industrial nations to curtail arms shipments to the troubled region.

Giscard d'Estaing, who will host President Carter for a round of talks beginning Thursday, said any peace settlement between Israel and its Arab neighbors must be accompanied by guarantees against new flareups.

Well. I think there will be a lasting peace in the Middle East if it is not possi ble for any country to endanger the life of another one." the president said.

Giscard d'Estaing was interviewed in Paris on ABC's "Issues and Answers." The program was broadcast to the United States by satellite.

#### Space Capsule To Become **School Display**

Cost to the district: \$165 - the price insuring the 5-ton conical craft for \$10,000 during the move from Rockwell International at Downey, Calif., to Bat-

Teacher Mike Murray is credited with starting efforts to acquire the capsule, a backup unit that never ventured from

When Murray learned the Apollo space program was being phased out, he asked the National Aeronautics and Space Administration if he could obtain a capsule.

"NASA told us that all the Apollo hardware actually belongs to the Smithsonian Institution," said Steve Root, assistant school superintendent. The reply from the Smithsonian, he

## **Theologians** Differ On Marriage

WASHINGTON (UPI) - A five-year study on interfaith marriage by churchappointed theologians has concluded some differences, especially the issue of divorce, are "perhaps, unreconcilable.

Despite the "common conviction" that marriage partners commit themselves for life, "the fact remains that we also have divisions, clear divisions" over the question of divorce, the report said. The Lutheran World Federation, the

World Alliance of Reformed Churches, both headquartered in Geneva, Switzerland, and the Vatican's Secretariat for Promoting Christian Unity were involved the study The scholars said the churches all be-

lieved "that God wishes marriage to be a bond for the whole of life, in both depth and duration; and this is for the good of And they noted the changing cultural

## **Alcohol And Impotence**

By LAWRENCE LAMB, M.D.

DEAR DR. LAMB - My husband. aged 38, is impotent. We have been having problems with this off and on for approximately seven months. He has had a duodenal ulcer for years. Our new doctor put him on Probanthine twice daily and Donnatal four times a day. He took both medications for four months

After about three months on the medications, he started having problems. Our previous doctor where we used to live warned him about the side effects of Probanthine, so he is now taking just the Donnatal four times a day. Things have not improved, and he's been off Probanthine over three months.

He has a high tension job, is very competitive, has a history of family diabetes (he has no symptoms, but has never been checked). He is about 30 pounds overweight.

He has one martini before dinner, one or two glasses of wine with dinner, and one to four brandies after

He has promised to go see his doctor, but keeps putting it off. He hasn't been since he originally got the prescriptions.

I've read that impotency before age 50 is usually psychological. This is very discouraging and disheartening for both of us. What can I do to help?

DEAR READER - His impotence is not caused by Probanthine. He has been off the medicine long enough that if it were the cause, he would long since have made a complete re-covery. It is true that Probanthine rarely has this side effect - usually it doesn't in the amounts commo used, but clearly your husband's problem is more complicated than

His cause is a good example of impotence being a symptom, not aodisease. The doctor's job is to find out what is causing the symptom, but he has to know about it and have an opportunity to do something about it

If your husband is a diabetic, he could have impotence from its effects on the nerves that control normal erection. It could be psychological as you mention and, once the problem starts, fear of failure takes over and is the real cause.

The other most likely cause is all that alcohol. It is quite true that alco-hol may release inhibitions, causing a

person to want sex, but it also takes away the ability and is a frequent cause of impotence. Your husband drinks entirely too much.

Anyone who has an ulcer should not drink any alcohol at all. Alcohol stimulates the stomach to produce increased amounts of acid digestive uice, the underlying cause of ulcers. He should not have even one drink, let alone a consumption worthy of an alcoholic. Your sex life, marriage, and his ulcer will all do better if he stops drinking entirely. He is getting a lot of calories from alcohol, and topping drinking may also help him lose some weight.

## South Africa Sanctions Urged

WASHINGTON (UPI) - The United States must impose economic and political sanctions on South Africa to reinforce America's civil rights stand, the coordinator of a House ad hoc monitoring group said Sunday.

Rep. Thomas Downey Jr., D-N.Y., called on Congress to approve a series of economic sanctions and to downgrade the U.S. mission to South Africa, including the elimination of the defense, com-

mercial and agricultural attaches. Downey is coordinator of the House Ad Hoc Monitoring Group on South Africa which was created after the death of civil rights leader Steve Biko. It has about 30

Downey authored the 3,000 word report issued Sunday but said he felt many members of the ad hoc group shared his

Realizing the tremendous political and economic gap between the white Nationalist Party in South Africa and the black majority is not enough for the U.S. government," Downey said. "Strong economic and political sanctions must be applied toward South Africa to reinforce our civil rights stand.

Among the sanctions proposed by Downey are denying credit or deductions for U.S. businesses for taxes paid or accrued in South Africa: prohibit any extension of credit to South Africa by the Export-Import Bank; prohibit the importation of South African goods in which discriminatory wage scales or job classifications are

Downey also proposed ending all military licensing agreements between the United States and foreign countries which would allow weapons to be imported into South Africa; an end to cooperative agreements on nuclear technolo gy and research; and a prohibition against licensing for export non-military goods, such as the Cessna model 185 planes which have been assigned to the South Africa army






## Recombinant DNA Research: Boon And Threat

Among the creations of Greek mythology was the chimera, an animal with the head of a lion, the body of a goat and the tail of a dragon. The monster vomited forth horrible flames and, the myth had it, personified a terrible storm - "pouncing suddenly on the darkened waves, it unleashed the raging

Twenty-five hundred years after the flowering of Greek civilization, two teams of scientists led by Drs. Stanley Cohen and Herbert Boyer reported that they had constructed a novel life form.

Taking two unrelated organisms that would not mate in nature, Cohen and Boyer isolated a piece of DNA from each, and then hooked the two pieces of genetic material together. The result was literally a new form of life, one that had never before existed on the face of the earth. They dubbed their creation "DNA chimeras," because, Cohen says, "they were conceptually similar to the mythological chimera."

Cohen, of course, was referring to their hybrid nature. He did not know at the time that his chimera - or as it is technically known, recombinant DNA was destined to unleash "raging tempests" of its own, provoking one of the bitterest, and perhaps most important, battles in the history of modern sci-

The discovery of the recombinant DNA process in 1973 was immediately hailed by biologists with a zeal equaled only by their earlier praise of Watson's and Crick's discovery of the structure of DNA. Using the new techniques, the genetic material from virtually any two unrelated organisms can be spliced together, opening up a whole new arena of experimentation and study.

'Now and in the next few years we shall be doing things that would have been thought completely improbable a few years ago," says Dr. Paul Berg of Stanford. Another researcher predicts that "problems people were interested in 100 years ago are starting to be tractable now with these methods.

A product of nearly 30 years investigation, climaxed by a series of rapid discoveries in the late 1960s and early 1970s, recombinant DNA is a kind of biological sewing machine that can be used to stitch together the genetic fabric of unrelated organisms. Dr. Cohen sees it as genetic surgery in four stages. To begin with, a chemical scalpel, called a "restriction enzyme," is used to split apart the DNA molecules from one source - a human, for example. Once the DNA has been cut into pieces, a small segment of genetic material-a gene perhaps, or a few genes in length - is separated out.

Next, the restriction enzyme is used to slice out a segment from the body of a plasmid, a short length of DNA found in a bacteria. Both the piece of human DNA and the body of the plasmid develop "sticky ends" as a result of the slicing process. The ends of both segments of DNA are then hooked together, forming a genetic whole composed of material from the two original sources.

Finally the modified plasmid is used as a vehicle to move the DNA into a 'host" cell, usually a bacteria. Absorbing the plasmid, the bacteria proceeds to duplicate it endlessly, producing identical copies of the new chimera. These

On the surface, the combining of different organisms in this way - a mouse DNA with a human, or a rhododendron with a horse - may seem bizarre. Researchers, however, are quick to point out that they are not creating giant

The purpose of recombinant DNA is considerably more significant. What the new technique makes feasible is the isolation and purification of a gene in massive quantities.

In May of 1977, for instance, a research team in California announced that, using the technique, they had isolated and analyzed a gene that orders the production of the hormone determining human growth. Now that this gene has been scrutinized, the next stop will be to implant it in a human cell and stimulate it into functioning. Researchers say this technique ultimatley will provide a cure for dwarfism. Just as easily it could be used to develop a basketball team of 10-footers.

Though recombinant DNA is still in its tooling-up phase, its proponents already envision a wide range of applications that will solve various medical and social problems.

Cohen, for one, imagines the synthesis of a variety of "biologically produced substances such as antibotics and hormones, or enzymes that can convert sunlight directly into food substances or usable energy.

Dr. Joshua Lederberg anticipates "the production of high-quality food prote-Others have volunteered scenarios where recombinant DNA solves the na-

tion's fuel crisis by converting waste into energy, retrieves precious minerals from the ocean, cleans up oil and chemical spills and eliminates world-wide "How much do we need recombinant DNA?," says Dr. David Baltimore, a

Harvard Nobel Laureate. "Fine, we can do without it. We have lived with famine, virus and cancer, and we can continue to." So great are the expectations surrounding recombinant DNA that a major

scientific-corporate-government complex has sprung up around it; a technical boom town set to mine the new genetic motherlode. The federal government has become an enthusiastic supporter of the research, handing out at least 180 recombinant DNA research grants to over 80 laboratories around the country

Seven major pharmaceutical companies also are engaged in the recombinant race, and a dozen more drug, chemical and agricultural companies are poised to enter a field that Fortune magazine predicts will soon become a "multi-billion dollar industry." Researchers at General Electric already have developed a recombinant oil-eating microorganism that they hope to use one day to clean

DNA clearly has come of age. Summing up progress in recombinants, a Swiss scientist observed during an international genetics conference, "this sort of research is gaining uncontrollable momentum.

But now the catch. Like another Greek mythical figure, the Trojan Horse, recombinant DNA chimeras hide within their outward beauty a deep and dark danger one that may be as destructive to humanity as the horrors of nuclear holocaust. In splicing together genes from two different species, scientists are creating a novel form of life whose properties they cannot know until-it is al-

Once the two kinds of DNA are joined together, the chimera is placed within a host, usually the bacteria E. coli, where it quickly proceeds to copy itself. E. coli has been selected by most researchers to house the recombinant DNA simply because more is known about it than any other bacteria on the planet.

There is a good reason for our encyclopedic knowledge of E. coli; it is a common inhabitant of the human gut. And that is where the problem comes in.

What might happen, researchers have begun to wonder, if the recombinant DNA chimera results in a cancer-causing alignment of genes?

Placed in the protective environment of the E. coli, the new cancerous life form would churn out cancer like a Detroit factory stamping out autos

If this E. coli finds its way out of the laboratory, carried on a lab technician's skin, it would then roam free among trillions of its friends, and likely would pass some of its cancer around. Once these virulent E. Coli begin invading human systems...well, no one knows exactly what might happen. A new plague? A cancer epidemic? A real-life Andromeda Strain?

To add to the problem, restriction enzymes necessary for cutting apart DNA molecules are commercially available, and will be sent through the mail to anyone who requests them. Most biologists agree: any high school student can

Many concerned scientists believe that recombinant DNA may well be the single most dangerous technology in human history.

A-bombs, nerve gas, biological warfare and the destruction of the stratospheric ozone layer by fluorocarbons are all'less a threat to human existence that recombinant DNA, argues Dr. Liebe Cavalieri of the Sloan-Kettering In-

"All of these dangers can, in theory if not in practice, be limited or controlled." notes Cavalieri. "The threat of a new life form is more compelling, for once released, it cannot be controlled and its effects cannot be reversed. A new disease may simply have to run its course, attacking millions in its path."

Dr. Robert Sinsheimer of Cal Tech believes, "what we are doing is almost certainly irreversible. Knowing human frailty, these structures will escape, and there is no way to recapture them.'

Dr. Erwin Chargaff, the iconoclastic professor emeritus from Columbia University, is typically blunt: "I should say that the spreading of experimental cancer may be confidently expected."

The possibility of these scenarios of mass death and genetic destruction becoming reality was frightening enough that it caused even the technology's top experts to stop and think.

On July 26, 1974, 11 of them took the unprecedented step of publishing an open letter to the biological community, calling upon their fellow researchers to observe a temporary moratorium on performing certain of the most dangerous experiments

The signers of the document read like a "Who's WHo" of molecular biology. Among them were DNA discoverer James D. Watson and Drs. Berg, Cohen With the weight of this all-star cast of scientists behind it, the moratorium

was almost universally observed, although recently a few have returned to

Predictably, the recombinant DNA moratorium - the first self-imposed ban on basic research in the history of science - provoked a storm of press interest. National newspapers headlined such warnings as "Danger in Man-Made Bacteria," "Hybrid Molecules Test Threat Seen," and "Bid to Ban Test of



## Service Agency Seeks To Help Vietnam Veteran

More than 4 1/2 years have passed since the last American serviceman left Vietnam, a battle which left its veterans bitter because there were no winners in what many of them say was a political war.

Many of the veterans, drafted at 19 or 20 and now in their late 20s and early 30s, are surviving as well as they can in a society where it has become almost necessary to have a college degree to obtain a good job

When the Vietnam veteran came back to the United States, that good job or college education seemed elusive.

However some have been successful in making the transition from soldier back into the mainstream of American society.

But others have not been that lucky and found it hard to fit into a society that seemed to hold no understanding of the Vietnam experience. An experience which, Vietnam veterans say, may only be shared with other Vietnam vets. In Lubbock, the American GI Forum's Veteran's Outreach Program is at-

tempting to bridge the gap between the Vietnam-era veteran and society. It is trying to help veterans like Fred Ramirez. But for 31-year-old Ramirez, it has been doubly hard to hold onto a good job

since he came home from Vietnam with a 100 percent disability. Ramirez's disability is not apparent, and he worked for three years after his discharge from the service.

'But, it's really hard; I haven't worked steadily since 1972," the young man said. "As soon as they find out you're classified 100 percent disabled, they find some way to get rid of you.

"It's gotten to the point where I don't want to hassle with it. But, I'll keep on trying ... some day I'd like to own my own business.

Frank Gutierrez, veterans outreach specialist, said it is extremely difficult for his office to help people like Ramirez. "The problem is once an employer hears that a veteran is 100 percent disabled, he becomes very hesitant to hire him. "However, the employers must make the jobs available. Without their assist-

ance, we can't do our job," he added. "I'm of the opinion that if you give a man a chance to achieve, he will perform," Gutierrez said.

Another Vietnam veteran, Esequiel "Curley" Quintana, who returned from Vietnam with a 70 percent physical disability, is grateful for assistance provided by the program. "It's been hard for me; I've been to the Texas Employment Commission

more than 50 times. But, as soon as they find out that you're disabled, forget it," Quintana said. "However, I got my last job through very good recommendations from the counselors at the VOP. Quintana, 30, has since resigned from his last job and decided to enroll at Tex-

as Tech this month. "I guess anybody can survive, but I don't just want to do that. I want to work to be somebody, and school is just the stepping stone it takes to do that," he said.

Gutierrez and Leopoldo Quirino, VOP counselors and Vietnam veterans themselves, say they've worked with other vets like themselves and understand their problems

"We want to support all veterans, qualified and unqualified for our services." Gutierrez said. "If we can't help them with their particular problem, we try to refer them to someone who can help them."

He advised veterans that the only way to receive assistance was to apply for

"But, the problem is that some think that we're providing charity for them, and others expect more from us," the counselor said.

The program, headquartered at 2020 4th St., is primarily concerned with helping the unemployed, underemployed or economically disadvantaged veteran.

Unemployment in Lubbock looks good, Gutierrez said. However, he added

that unemployment among Vietnam veterans here has reached 20 percent "Most of our clients are just seeking a good job," he said. "Many of them have not had the opportunity to go after that college degree or skill necessary to crack the good job market.'

Employers may list job openings with the program at no cost. All services are also free to the veteran seeking assistance.

Gutierrez added that Vietnam veterans also have an organizacion here that offers them a chance to share ideas and problems with other Vietnam vets. The Veterans of Foreign Wars, Post 8537, was begun last spring to bring Vietnam

"We expect to be addressing lots of issues that are being neglected by the other service organizations," Gutierrez said. "We're expecting a lot from this or-

ganization, but we still have a long way to go."

The meetings are held on the first and third Thursday of each month at 8 p.m. at the VOP office.

## **State Law Test Case** Seen In Odessa Trial

ODESSA - For possibly the first time in the history of the state a district attorney has called for a special grand jury session to investigate complaints of abuse and employees all can be held liable for

The Ector County grand jury meeting Thursday may be a test case of a new state law giving the power to prosecute for abuse of the elderly to the district attorney's office. Previously the power rested with the state.

Ector District Attorney John Green said last week he called for the special session as a result of a four-page memorandum from State Health Commissioner Dr. Fratis L. Duff and a series of articles by the San Angelo Standard Times

The report and the series chronicled alleged abuse at Western Hills Manor Nursing Home, an Odessa nursing home owned by Heritage Care Center in Dallas.

The report to Green alleged: - Neglect due to the faliure of staff to monitor patient activities and location;

- Licensed nurses did not make rounds after reporting for duty: - The nursing director was having to assist with the administrative management of the facility and was unable to devote adequate time to train and supervise

- Improper training of staff and unqualified help.

The report also told of a patient at the home who was missing for several hours. An orderly found her behind closed doors in her wheelchair and she was admitted to an Odessa hospital for serious head injuries. A state official said it was "physically impossible" for her to get through the closed doors.

Green said his office had other complaints not filed in the report, but that the report basically alleged the home 'did not have proper equipment, and did not have the proper aides," he said.

"We've found witnesses who will come forward and testify," Green said, adding that the people testifying include some patients, their children and former ad-

mistrator Floyd Cox. Cox has said he was fired as Western Hill's first administrator because he refused to cut costs at the expense of patient

Cox, who has been admistrator of nursing homes since 1968 and also served as director of the nursing care program for the Arkansas Welfare Department from 1959-1968, is now administrator of a Den-

ton nursing home. Also under subpoena to testify is Floyd Joyner, the administrator of Western

What do you bid now?

I can only tell you one thing with any certainty - that it is some neurological disturbance. Interference with normal sweating (as on the right side of your body) indicates some interference with the part of the nervous system that controls these functions automatically. Sweating involves dilation of capillaries (tiny blood vessels) near the skin surface, so a vascular problem would be involved. probably as a result of a nerve disturb-

The cause can be any of a number of diseases that damage nerves. It's an intricate problem requiring a thorough physical examination. including X-rays, to try to pinpoint the nerve involved. As far as immediate causes are concerned, one thinks of diabetes, thyroid-gland deficiency, or any of the vascular diseases.

You will get more answers at a neurological department of a major medical center. If there is one near you, go there. It's a rare condition.

Dear Dr. Thosteson: The topic of trichomonas was being discussed the other day among several women at coffee break. Someone said the male was the carrier, sometimes without knowing it, and also that he can be containinated with pork. I cannot buy this remark, but we do not know otherwise: Please set the record staright. - A.L.

Trichomonas vaginitis is a genital infec-tion. Pork-eating has nothing to do with it. Perhaps your informant was ocnfusing this with trichinosis, worm infestation from raw or poorly cooked pork.

The rest of your information appears correct. The male can have the trichomonas infection and practically no symptoms. In women, the parasite produces a heavy odorous vaginal discharge and considerable itching.

Treatment is quite effective. But if there is recurrence the male should be examined. If he had it also, both partners must be treated at the same time

Dear Dr. Thosteson: How come they say all women have some male hormones in their body? - Mrs. T.T.

Because the adrenal glands (possessed by both sexes) produce both types of sex hormones in different amounts. In the male, androgen, which produces male characteristics. predominates. In the female: estrogen does, producing the female traits.

This is why, after menopause, when the ovaries cease producing estrogen, some women may develop mild male characterisitics such as unwanted facial hair. The male adrenal hormones have begun predominating slightly


Dear Dr. Thosteson: When I awake in the morning I have a gagging and choking. It subsides after I have a glass of cold milk or juice, but sometimes it recurs during the day. I have not had my tonsils out, and I wonder if they could be the problem. I am a 32-year-old male. -

Huge tonsils can allow phlegm to accumulate during the night and cause the gagging when you're in an upright position. It might also result from heavy secretions higher up, as from sinuses or the nasopharynx. Have your throat checked.

Q.1-Both vulnerable, as South you hold: ♦QJ ♥K85 ♦952 ♦AK1073 The bidding has proceeded: North East South West 1 ♥ Pass 2 + Pass Pass

What do you bid now? A.—Considering partner's reverse and your fitting cards in both his suits, slam is a very real possibility. While we would not blame you if you decided to jump to six hearts, there is a possibility that you have two quick diamond losers. A jump to five hearts will alert partner to your ambitions and, because you did not cue bid diamonds. warn him that you do not have a control in that suit.

Q.2-East-West vulnerable as South you hold: ♦A1084 ♥J98 ♦AQJ954 The bidding has proceeded: South West North East Pass 1 Pass

What do you bid now? A .- What started out as a promising hand has become even better by partner's heart response. Nevertheless, there is no need for you to get hyper-

active in the bidding. A quiet-one spade rebid now will make it easier for partner to describe his hand properly and will leave you well placed for the subse-quent auction.

Q.3-Both vulnerable, as South you hold: ♦K762 ♥K84 ♦AK82 ♦J6 Partner opens the bidding with one club. What do you respond?

A.-With 14 points and a bal-anced hand, we wouldn't criti-cize you severely if you chose to jump to two no trump. How-ever, that may result in missing a 4-4 spade fit. Our choice would be a simple one diamond re-sponse, to give partner the epportunity to show a four card spade suit.

Q.4-East-West vulnérable as South you hold:

♦KQJ109 ♥AKQ6 ◊754 ♦Q The bidding has proceeded: North East South West Pass 1 + Pass Pass Pass 20 Pass 2 NT Pass What do you bid now?

A.—Three no trump. This may not be the right contract if partner has only one stopper in clubs, but all the other alternatives are fraught with danger. You certainly don't want to support diamonds with three low cards in partner's suit, and a three spade rebid would show a hand with six spades and four hearts. Since the club queen will probably carry its full weight in no trump, a raise to three no trump st you can do under the circumstances.

◆AKQJ ♥952 ♦ A83 ◆762 What is your opening bid?

A .- There are those who would advocate opening one club, or even one diamond, with this hand. However, we don't like opening a convenient club with three low cards in the suit.



#### Cold Water Washing Helps Thaw Turkey

LINCOLN, Neb. (UPI) - Food specialists at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln recommend a cold water method to thaw frozen turkeys.

Immerse the bird in its original wrapper in cold water, changing the water as often as necessary to help speed up the process, they say. They warn that thawing in warm water encourages bacterial

The specialists allow about 30 minutes for each six pounds of turkey when using this method.

## 'Old Pelican' Howard Hunt Ready To Forget Watergate

other life that is not Watergate-related," says E. Howard Hunt who, almost a year ofter completing his Watergate prison sentence, has remarried and resumed his career as a writer of thrillers.

Watergate is over with. It's finished. Let's get on to new things," Hunt said in an interview at his Miami home where he is working on his 54th adventure novel.

Three days before Christmas, Hunt married Laura Martin, 31, of Albany, Ga., a Spanish teacher whom his daughter befriended in Spain several years ago. Hunt's first wife, Dorothy, died in a 1972 plane crash, and he met Miss Martin while he was in prison in northern Flori-

Hunt smiled at his bride and said, "Just like an old Faulkner story. Georgia girl, Florida boy

Since the end of his 32-month prison term last February, Hunt told the Miami Herald, he has visited his parole officer once a month to report "whether I've been arrested during the month, that sort of thing." He had been given a 21/2-to 8year prison sentence and a \$10,000 fine then he's an ex-lawyer. I haven't exactly

He had to give up skeet shooting because he can't own guns. His right to vote can be restored only by a presidential

Although his life has become more normal in some ways, Watergate still stamps him. Two or three times a week, he said, someone will come up and make themselves known to me, give me their cards, tell me they want to be helpful if I need anything and so forth, and it's just

Then there are the pickets at the universities whose "Crime Does Pay" signs refer to his \$2,000 lecture fee.

Referring to the label of "Watergate burglar" that is often used to describe him, Hunt said, "I don't like being called a criminal. It seems to me that I am an ex-criminal. A criminal to me is a practicing criminal, like a lawyer is a practicing

"When a lawyer has been disbarred,

been disbarred from the practice of criminality, but I've abandoned it.

"I shouldn't be required to carry that burden, like, who was it, Sisyphus? Who had to push the millstone up the mountain every day, and then he was released and the next day he had to start all over

"I really shouldn't be required. I did that for almost three years in prison, and enough is enough In addition to his writing and lecturing,

he has taken up scuba diving and paint-

## Marijuana Raiders Hit **Oregon Coast Target**

BANDON, Ore. (AP) — The unpatrolled expanses of Oregon's 400-mile Pacific shoreline may no longer prove a haven for dope smugglers, federal officials said Sunday following the biggest marijuana bust in the Northwest.

Frank Grimes, director of the patrol division for U.S. Customs in Oregon, said officials have suspected for three years that dope smuggling was popular on the Oregon coast.

Fifteen men were arrested and about eight tons of marijuana valued at more than \$16 million were seized in a predawn land and sea raid Saturday in rural Coos County.

The men arrested were from California, New Jersey, Colorado, Masachu-setts, Illinois, Texas and Washington. They were held without bail in Coos County jails on smuggling-related charges pending arraignment Tuesday before a federal judge in Portland.

Federal and local officers continued to search the wooded shoreline for more suspects, including the owner of the beach farmhouse where the raid occurred south of Bandon in Southern Ore-

"We just opened our Coos Bay patrol office Dec. 6," said Grimes. "This is the only office on the coast between San Francisco and Seattle. We've been wide open, the soft underbelly of the coast.

'It's been extremely tough to operate with no one on the coast," Grimes said. "We finally got someone there, and,

He said the marijuana seized was in the form of expensive "Thai sticks" and probably came from Singapore or Bang-

"It's potent stuff and we figure we have around eight tons of it," Grimes said.

The street value of the marijuana is \$16 million to \$20 million, according to Michael Wright, special agent in charge of the Federal Drug Enforcement Administration office in Eugene.

There is no question that it was the largest seizure of marijuana ever made in Oregon and Washington," said Wright.

Wright estimated that the successful raid involved the cooperation of about 150 persons from the U.S. Coast Guard. U.S. Customs, Coos County and Curry County sheriffs' office and Coos Bay and

A small freighter, two Word War II-era amphibious vehicles and several trucks also were seized in the raid. Coos County officials said the marijuana was under armed guard at the North Bend Air Station and most of it would be destroyed to-

Coast Guard Cmdr. George Passmore said officers had observed suspected drug smuggling on the beach for several hours before a flare was fired at 4:48 a.m. Sat-

#### Producer Sues Art Dealer

LOS ANGELES (UPI) - Game show producer Ralph Andrews traded his platinum wristwatch, Edison phonograph and elephant tusks for letters reported to be from Robert E. Lee and George Wash-

But Andrews now says the letters are not genuine and he wants his goodies back.

Andrews, in a \$2 million Superior Court suit filed Thursday, said art dealer George Pollack assured him the documents - a letter from Lee to his troops dated April 10, 1865, and an April 14, 1789, letter from Washington accepting the nomination as the United States' first president - were real.

But after the trade, Andrews said, he had the letters appraised and learned they were facsimilies and only worth about \$20.

Other documents he received in the deal were genuine, Andrews said, but he still wants the whole trade invalidated.

Among the items Andrews traded were two platinum and diamond wristwatches, an armoire, a Degas pastel drawing, an exercise bicycle, an Edison phonograph

and some rare coins.

Otherwise, 1978 will be a year of consolidation for the Carter administration.

None of the new items of business will be as important to the president as finishing up the top items he has left over from 1977. And energy will be first on

"The early and obvious things that are important to us are resolution of the energy bill; the president's budget and the budget message, which will outline his plans for the economy; the Panama Canal treaty; and we'll hopefully consummate SALT II," said top Carter aide Hamilton Jordan in a year-end inter-

"Of course, there will be continuing U.S. involvement in the Middle East. And Congress has made some progress on our welfare reform package. And, of course, although it probably will not be introduced until late in the session, we'll be developing during the year a national health insurance program.'

Some new twists are likely in solutions the administration will propose to old

Stuart Eizenstat, the president's chief domestic assistant, has told reporters Carter is considering tax incentives as a weapon against inflation. The plan would give companies and unions tax advantages if they agree to restrain price

Eizenstat and Frank Moore, the president's chief congressional lobbyist, say Carter also is considering ways to make the bureaucracy more manageable, including changes in the Civil Service system to include incentives for federal em-

Another White House official, who declined to be identified, indicated Carter's budget, which goes to Congress in January, will include an assault on unemployment among young blacks, whose jobless rate skyrocketed this year to well above the national average.

Like his administration colleagues, this official declined to be specific, for fear of stealing some of the thunder from Carter's official announcement. But he called black unemployment "one of the tougher problems" the administration faces in the coming year.

"I will be disappointed," he said, "if by this time next year we haven't made progress on it.

Administration officials have no illusions about the difficulty of winning ratification of the Panama Canal treaty. They report progress, citing a private poll which they say gives approving the treaty a seven-point edge among the general

Other polls have shown public rejection of the pact - or at best a standoff between those who want the treaty and those who don't. "If we ratify the treaty, even if it's by one or two votes, I think it's going to be a tremendous political success," said one senior member of the White House staff.

White House officials also are aware that Carter's fight for the Panama treaty is a warmup for their battle for approval of a new strategic arms limitation treaty (SALT), which the president predicts will be negotiated in 1978.

Energy, Economy Top Carter's Goals For 1978 They are known to be thinking about applying many of the political tactics they are using on behalf of the canal treaty in their effort to convince the Senate to approve SALT II as well. In one way, they think, the battle for SALT won't be

"The difference between the canal and SALT is there are people out there in the country that believe in the notion of arms control," one aide said. "In the case of the Panama Canal, there was no constituency out there, because the

Panama Canal doesn't touch daily the lives of the American people. Nor does the administration have any illusions about progress toward peace in the Middle East.

As the euphoria of visits between Israeli Prime Minister Menahem Begin and Egptian President Anwar Sadat wears off, one administration official said, "Sadat is going to be trying to get us to nudge the Israelis, and the Israelis are going to be trying to get us to nudge Sadat.

"And we're going to be trying to bring (Jordan's King) Hussein and maybe (Syrian leader Hafez) Assad into the thing, so we're going to be juggling a lot of

One bright spot, said Jordan - and other senior officials agree - is that the administration is better prepared for the coming year than they were for 1977.

"Going into 1977," Jordan said, "we were preoccupied with the selection of the Cabinet and agency heads and the organization of the White House staff, learning our jobs here, and working out systems for circulating paper, and devising the president's schedule, and the decision-making processes.

We certainly didn't have the time in 1976 to prepare for 1977 that we've had in the last few months to get ready for 1978. Although 1978 will be just as busy a year, I think we're better prepared for it.'

## **Record Auto Recalls** Reported Last Year

DETROIT (UPI) - Domestic and foreign automakers recalled a record 12.6 million motor vehicles during 1977 for possible safety problems and some industry analysts believe recalls will continue

at a good pace for some time. "Consumers are more ready to complain today, and complaints from owners are frequently the basis for recalls," said Clarence Ditlow, director of the Center for Auto Safety in Washington.

'I expect to see recalls at a high pace for the next several years," he said.

No one cause has been cited as the primary reason for the record number of recalls last year.

Among the possible reasons given by consumer, government and industry spokesmen are higher expectations by consumers about their cars and the fact that buyers are becoming more aware that there is a government agency to which they can complain.

Other likely reasons cited are the introducton of several new models which means more than the usual number of flaws - and the possibility hat higher production in 1977 resulted in low-

Since September 1966, when the feder-

al Motor Vehicle Safety Act became law, 64.9 million vehicles have been recalled by manufacturers for the repair of safety-

Irving Cohr, consumer affairs specialist with the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, said he doesn't attach any particular significance to the 1977 to-

"The fact that there's a new record is not that significant," he said. "Really, it's little more than coincidence.

Of more significance, Cohr said, is the widening of the definition of safety de-

"The scope of safety-related problems has been broadened," he said. "For example, the recent recall of 1.3 million cars by Chrysler because of stalling problems came about as a result of a NHSTA investigation, and it's the first time that stalling has been considered a safety

GM recalled 3.1 million vehicles in 1977 while Chrysler called back 4.6 million, Ford 2.5 million and American Motors

Fifteen percent of the recalls last year were by foreign manufacturers.



Premier Trudeau is somewhere in Colorado today, enjoying his vacation, his Secret Service protection, his mountain privacy and is no doubt smiling because he wore down the pursuit.

The story could be for anyone who ever paid in advance for a motel room and arrived to find it canceled, or reached the rent-a-car company 10 minutes after it closed or failed to make dinner reservations in a resort community during the skilling season

But it's a story about journalists and it

The dateline could have been Colorado Springs or Denver or Aspen or Snowmass, but it is Dallas because that is where the story ended, where the hunt was called off.

#### London Blast Fatal To Syrian Pair

LONDON (AP) - Two employes of the Syrian Embassy were killed when a bomb went off in their car near crowded Piccadilly Circus New Year's Eve.

Police said they have not determined the motive for the bombing that killed a medical attache, 40-year-old Jawdat Awad, and embassy driver Sayez Shibly,

They were in a parked car a few blocks from Piccadilly Circus, the heart of London's nightlife district that was jammed with revelers bringing in the

A Syrian Embassy spokesmen said the two men had been visiting sick Syrians. The blast hurled the blue Volvo across Stafford Street and shattered the fronts of two shops. Witnesses said they saw of two shops. Witnesses said they saw flames shoot 15 feet into the air as the More Refugees explosion blew the car's roof and doors

"I was just walking along and the blast Flee Vietnam threw me off my feet," said 17-year-old Gary Bishop. No bystanders were in-

Commander Jim Nevill, head of Scotland Yard's anti-terrorist squad, said, "It's far too early to say what the motive was. I am keeping an open mind. In view of the target being a Syrian Embassy vehicle, it now seems unlikely that this was the work of Irish Republican Army terrorists."

The Provisional wing of the outlawed IRA, which is fighting British troops in Northern Ireland, has in the past claimed responsibility for a number of bombings in Britain.

Riad el-Rayyes, a Syrian and the editor of an Arab-language weekly published in London, dismissed speculation that the bombing could have been related to Syria's opposition to Egyptian-Isra-

The Syrian Embassy said both of victims were married and Awad had two children and Shibly three.

whooping crane may not lose its resting. Andrus, the federation's executive vice place near the confluence of the North president Thomas Kimball said both projects would damage downstream waterflows, significantly alter the habitat and

Because whooping cranes aiready are on the endangered species list, the federation asked Andrus to designate the habitat, known as the Big Bend area, as critical, which would prohibit federal projects from altering the area.

The Bureau of Reclamation proposed the Narrows unit to dam the South Platte River near Fort Morgan. The project would cut streamflows by about 11 percent, Kimball said.

The Missouri Basin Power Project includes the Greyrocks Dam, which would dam the Laramie River and cut about two percent of the annual average streamflow, he said.

According to the Wildlife Federation. the two projects would lower water in the Big Bend marsh and allow vegetation to encroach on sandbars, which are the favored feeding areas of whoopers.

"We want to place federal decision makers on notice that further water davelopments in the Platte River system must not be allowed to destroy or adversely modify the crane's critical habitat," said Kimball.

The number of whooping cranes had been reduced to 25 by hunters, but since the endangered designation, the population has risen to almost 126. Kimball

SYDNEY, Australia (UPI) - A Vietnamese fishing boat with 38 persons aboard arrived in Darwin late Sunday, bringing to more than 1,000 the total number of refugees who have sailed from Vietnam to Australia since the fall of Sai-

A government spokesman said the 108foot wooden Thanh Hai was escorted into Darwin by a naval patrol boat after being sighted by fishermen 30 miles southwest of Australia's northernmost city shortly after noon.

Officials said that with the arrival of the Thanh Hai, a total of 1,011 refugees have sailed from Vietnam to Australia in 28 boats since the fall of Saigon in April

The spokesman said that although all 38 refugees, including 12 children, are believed to be in good health, the boat will be kept at a quara, tine mooring until they have been examined by customs, health and immigration officials.

### Hill Trails Hughes' Tax Loot

HOUSTON (AP) - In an effort to reap the largest inheritance tax collection in Texas history, Attorney General John Hill is trying to penetrate the secret world of the late Howard Hughes.

At stake are taxes that could go high as \$150 million. By comparison, Texas gets \$100 million a year from the sales tax on all utili-

The issue is whether Texas was Hughes's legal residence. Hill finished with the state's case Dec. 16, and the trial was recessed until Jan.

Courtroom comments apparently have offered little hint of the maze of trails Hill's staff followed for 18 months in accumulating evidence. "Hughes spent the last 30 years of his

life dedicated to obscuring the footprints a person in his position would normally leave in his business and private activities," Hill said. "When he died, we faced a blank wall."

Hill's investigation began after Hughes died April 5, 1976.

So many phony leads were checked that Hill's staff almost missed a significant discovery because of their reluctance to pursue what they considered another absurd tip.

"One of our lawyers was assigned to cleck out a rumor that a Hughes representative had inquired about buying the top two floors of a luxurious Houston high-rise shortly before he died." Hill said. "We had been urged to pursue so many rabbit trails by that point, he (the lawyer) was embarrassed to ask the condominium owner if the rumor was true. After apologizing profusely and assuring the owner's assistant the rumor probably was untrue, the lawyer was stunned when the assistant cut him short and said, 'It's all true."

After Hill confirmed that Hughes had paid his personal income taxes to an Internal Revenue Service office in Texas and had paid poll taxes in Texas while living in other states, Hill notified Probate Judge Pat Gregory he would try to prove Hughes's legal residence was Tex-

## Man Awaiting Trial Sought In Colorado

GLENWOOD SPRINGS, Colo. (AP) -Theodore Bundy, a week away from trial in the death of a 24-year-old nurse, escaped from jail for the second time in less than seven months. This time he squeezed through a foot-square hole in the ceiling of his jail cell, crawled 40 feet through an attic, entered a jailer's apartment and walked away.

Authorities searched the countryside near here Sunday for the 30-year-old former law student, charged with first-degree murder in the January 1975 death of Caryn Campbell of Dearborn, Mich.

Law enforcement agencies throughout the West were alerted to watch for Bundy, and roadblocks were set up on all roads leading out of this mountain town of 6,000 people

Bundy's first escape came during a pretrial hearing last June in Aspen. He had been left unguarded in a law library and leaped two stories from an open window to the ground. He was recaptured after an intensive, six-day search.

Garfield County undersheriff Robert A. Hart said Bundy was found missing from his cell in the county jail just after noon Saturday. He last was seen about 7 p.m.

Hart said Bundy rolled up blankets and placed them in his bed to make it appear as if he were there. When jailers came with Bundy's breakfast Saturday morning, they thought he was asleep, he said. Hart said the jailer on duty all night

Friday apparently didn't hear anything

unusual. "We don't have the vaguest idea how long he has been gone," he said. Exactly how Bundy got out of the onestory building wasn't known either, he said, but "all he had to do was walk out the door." The door to the jailer's apart-

Bundy, a former Republican Party worker in Washington state, was extradited to Colorado from Utah, where he was serving a 1-to 15-year sentence for kid-

napping a Salt Lake City girl in 1974.

While in the Utah penitentiary, Bundy was put into isolation after guards found a forged Social Security card, a sketch of a driver's license, road maps and airline

schedules during a search of his cell. Bundy was scheduled to go on trial Jan. 9 in Colorado Springs, where the trial was

moved on a change of venue.

Miss Campbell disappeared while on a ski vacation in Aspen, and her nude, frozen body was found a month later beside a rural road.

#### **TEXAS DEPARTMENT OF HUMAN RESOURCES AMENDMENT**

Title XX of the Social Security Act provides funds for social services such as day care, family planning, protective care for children and adults. Each year the Texas Department of Human Resources (formerly Department of Public Welfare) publishes services plan which describes how Title XX funds will be used.

TO TITLE XX PLAN

A proposed amendment to the 1978 Title XX plan was published November 8. Public comments were accepted through December 8. Comments related to the administration of social security benefits in general and not to the proposed amendment.

The following is a summary of the amendment to the Title XX Comprehensive Annual Services Program Plan for the program year which began October 1, 1977, and ends September 30, 1978.

#### SPECIAL SERVICES TO AFDC CHILDREN

The Title XX plan is being amended to add a special service for children who are certified recipients of AFDC or AFDC foster care. The service will enhance the personal, social, and educational functioning of eligible children by providing assistance in obtaining school supplies, winter clothing, or other necessities the responsible adult feels necessary. The service will be provided only for those children who are AFDC and AFDC foster care certified for the month of December, 1977.



Clark was shot once in the head with a handgun, police said.







It began ringing off the wall shortly after Oklahoma quarterback Thomas Lott strained a hamstring Saturday during the second-ranked Sooners' final full-scale workout for Monday night's Orange Bowl clash with No. 6-rated Arkansas.

"The bookies got all worked up," reported Keith, who is Oklahoma's sports information director. "I got calls from guys who said they were with the Houston Press and the College Station Gazette. There ain't no such papers.

The injury to Lott was considered minor by trainer Ken Rawlinson but it excited the nation's betting fraternity almost as much as the crippling knee injury suffered by Leotis Harris, Arkansas' All-American guard, and the suspensions of running backs Ben Cowins and Micheal Forrest and wide receiver Donny Bobo for a dormitory incident involving a

Oklahoma started out as a 13-point favorite. When Arkansas Coach Lou Holtz suspended the three players the line shot up to 18 points and the game was taken off the boards in many places.

In fact, the Arkansas people report bookmakers in Little Rock were deluged by bets on Oklahoma.

As for the game itself, it will be Arkansas' quick defense (8.6 points a game) trying to slow down the nation's top rushing team (328.9-yard average).

Meanwhile, Oklahoma's underrated defense, featuring All-Americans in linebacker George Cumby and free safety Zac Henderson plus second-team linebacker Daryl Hunt and third-team nose guard Reggie Kinlaw, must contend with All-Southwest Conference quarterback Ron Calcagni Co.

The Arkansas field general, only a 30 percent passer in 1976, completed 53 percent this season for 1,147 yards and 10 touchdowns. Only three other Arkansas quarterbacks have ever thrown 10 TD passes in a season and the school record

In addition, Calcagni's 1,693 yards in total offense is the fourth highest in school history and his career total of 2,413 is

eighth best. Oklahoma doesn't have anyone with huge totals-Lott rushed for 760 yards, halfback Elvis Peacock 695, fullback Kenny King 640 and halfback Bily Sims 406-but that's because the Sooners are knee-deep in ground-gainers. On a percarry basis, Lott averaged 5.5 yards, Peacock 5.7, King 5.6 and Sims 6.2.

Although both coaches are playing it down, a key aspect in this game between 10-1 teams could be the outcome of the Texas-Notre Dame Cotton Bowl. If No. 1ranked Texas wins, college football's national championship will be a foregone conclusion. If Notre Dame prevails, Holtz and Oklahoma Coach Barry Switzer think anything can happen in the final Associated Press poll.







## ND Remains Prisoner Of Freedom Hall, 'Cats

It's called Freedom Hall, but the Notre Dame basketball team rarely breaks out

The Fighting Irish have been virtual prisoners to Kentucky down through the years in the Louisville arena - and Saturday was no exception.

They played the Wildcats for the 19th straight time on the supposed "neutral" court and Kentucky prevailed for the 16th time in the lopsided rivalry, this time by a 73-68 score.

"We just weren't moving enough," said Digger Phelps, coach of the fourth-ranked Irish. "We had a couple of key turnovers and we were missing foul shots, and Kentucky was making foul shots.

Two of the most important foul shots Kentucky made all game were a pair of pressure free throws by Kyle Macy that gave the Wildcats a 71-66 lead in the final minute. Macy also contributed three crucial field goals in the last four minutes as the nation's top-ranked team wiped out a 66-63 Notre Dame lead at the end.

"To come back when you're a little down like we were was a great effort. said Kentucky Coach Joe Hall. "After some of our other guys cooled off, Macy brought us back. He put that jumper in He's some shooter, isn't he? And we couldn't have had any better person on the line. He's a 92 percent foul shooter."

The latest loss, Phelps' fifth in six games with Kentucky, didn't especially endear Freedom Hall any more to the Notre Dame coach. On the eve of Saturday's game, he had expressed displeasure with playing in Kentucky's home territory and said he was "tired of going down there and getting my brains beat out every year

Phelps stayed away from controversy Saturday, however,

## Bo Hoping To Halt Jinx

PASADENA, Calif. (AP) - Michigan's Wolverines, their coach Bo Schembechler and the entire Big Ten conference find themselves pressure packed in Monday's Rose Bowl.

Facing the surprising Washington Huskies of the Pac-8, the Wolverines are favored by 14 points.

Schembechler-coached teams have appeared in Pasadena three previous times and lost all three, and the Big Ten representatives have lost eight times in their last 10 appearances in this granddaddy of the bowl games - the last victory a 42-21 count by Ohio State over Southern California on Jan. 1, 1974.

"We'd like to break that jinx, or whatever people think it is," commented Michigan defensive co-captain Dwight Hicks. Then, referring to the 14-6 loss to USC a year ago, he added:

"As the media put it, we couldn't deal with the Pac-8 and their style of play. But that wasn't true. We just lost, that's all." Ranked No. 4 and with a 10-1 record, Michigan would appear to be in prime position to revitalize the fortunes of both itself and the conference.

Yet Washington, 7-4 and ranked 13th in The Associated Press poll, could pull yet another surprise.

The Huskies were expected to finish behind USC and UCLA in the conference. When they lost to Mississippi State Syracuse and Minnesota in three of their first four non-conference games, they temporarily became a forgotten item.

Then came the resurgence with a 54-0 triumph over Oregon in their opening

Huskies Coach Don James credits the turnaround to the return of a number of injured starters, the superb play of quarterback Warren Moon, and the team's re-

fusal to quit. "We didn't lose faith in ourselves," said James, in his third year of coaching Washington. "An we owe a great deal of gratitude to War en Moon for our being here."

Surprisingly, James said his team finally began to click in the second half of the Oct. 1 loss to Minnesota — the team that nanded Michigan its only defeat.

"Although we lost the game," James said, "We had a good half and I think finally realized that we could be a good football team.'

Schembechler has appeared more relaxed than in his three previous Rose Bowl appearances and players such as Hicks, center Walt Downing and quarterback Rick Leach say this trip has been much more enjoyable than the one a year

'We're more relaxed," Downing said. "We've been here before and we're used to the surroundings

Then he said, "Don't forget that our losses to Oklahoma in the Orange Bowl two years ago and to USC were games against two of the best teams in the na-

The Wolverines take nothing away

"It's obvious from the films that they were the best team on the West Coast at

the end of the season.' A full house throng of 104,000 is expected for the nationally televised game if the weatherman cooperates. Rain fell through much of this week including a downpour for last Monday's Minnesota Vikings-Los Angeles Rams game.

The kickoff comes at 2 p.m. PST and fans remember that rains a year ago cleared by game time.

Michigan's main question rests with the tailback position in the option attack. Both Harlan Huckleby and Roosevelt Smith have been injured and freshman Stanley Edwards could get the call. During the regular season he carried 33 times for 152 yards.

Bryant and Hayes have both expressed regrets that so much is being made of their meeting- the two men who've won more major college football games than any others still in the business.



The court's 1973 obscenity definition generally is considered a stronger tool for prosecutors. A study soon to be published in the New York University Law Review, however, concludes that it "had little effect on the day-to-day regulation of obscene materials."

Perhaps more vividly than any other legal issue, obscenity illustrates that the Constitution, the nation's supreme law, is no more or no less than what the nine justices say it is.



HEARTLINE: I have been drawing my social security benefits for almost three years. I will soon be 65 years old and going on Medicare. I have seen in various governmental publications that Medicare does not cover routine foot care. I have to have a lot of medical care for my feet. Can you tell me what Medicare means by routine foot care? C.R.

A. Medicare's definition of routine foot care which is not covered is the treatment for flat feet or other structural misalignments of the feet; and removeal of corns, warts (including planters warts), and calluses. However, you can receive coverage for routine foot care if you have a medical condition affecting the lower limbs (such as diabetes) which requires that such care be preformed by a podiatrist or a doctor of medicine or osteopathy.

HEARTLINE: I am now working in the railroad industry and I plan to retire within the next year. I have heard that to qualify for the supplemental annuity, a person must have "a current connection" with the railroad industry. How does a person establish this current connection? J.K.

A. In general terms, an employee has a current connection if he has at least 12 months of railroad employment during the last 21/2 working years before retirement. If an employee does not qualify on this basis, an earlier 2 1/2-year period with 12 months of railroad service may be used, but only if the employee did not have a regular nonrailroad job following the earlier period, as such nonrailroad earnings would break the earlier current connection.

However, self-employment (working in an individual's own unincorporated business) or working for certain U.S. Government agericies (Department of Transportation, Interstate Commerce Com-National Mediation Board, Railroad Retirement Board) does not break a current connection.

HEARTLINE: I am 61 years old and I an still working. I will be 62 in July and I plan to retine and start drawing my so-cial security benefits at that time. I have read some of the social security literature and I find it very confusing. Can't government make this literature easy to understand? C.R.

A. Your wish may be coming true very soon. Health, Education, and Welfare Secretary Joseph Califano has announced plans for a program to rewrite HEW regulations to make them more understandable to the general public, and has asked the public to submit stiggestions. called "Operation Common Sense," the project will include a "sunset review" to eliminate rules that are ineffective or outdated, and what Califano termed a "top-to-bottom overhaul of the way HEW develops new reg-

Califano pointed out that in the past 25 years HEW regulations have grown to fill 6,000 pages in 13 volumes of the Code of Federal Regulations, and that in the past eight years alone HEW has written more than 3,000 pages of regula-

Califano said that many of these rules 'impose archaic and even incomprehensible requirements - often in elaborate and excruciating detail." THe result has become a body of regulations that "makes little sense to anyone," Califano said, icluding "the people who administer them, or the people who must comply with them."

HEW programs affect virtually all Americans in such areas as health care, social security, education and social services, and Califano has asked everyone who has "encountered a rule that has perverse effects, a confusing form, or an unfair requirement, to submit comments to him with suggestions on how these regulations shoud be changed. Comments on revising HEW regulations and on new procedures for writing new regulations should be sent to Operation Common Sense, P.O. Box 536. Washington, DC 20044.





was unexpected and involved a person using liquid protein diets exclusively for a long period of time. The deaths were due to ventricular fibrillation, in which the heart beats wildly and does not pump blood. The cause of the irregular heartbeat is unknown.

Foege said the 15 women had dieted for an average of five months and had lost an average of 83 pounds. Twelve of the 15 were under medical supervision. Myocarditis - an inflammation of the

heart muscle - turned up in seven of the 14 autopsies performed. An eighth case showed degeneration of the heart muscle without inflammation.

Foege said most of the women "were feeling better than they had felt in years and were overjoyed with their marked weight loss" prior to their deaths.

He said the 15 deaths remain unexplained "and we have not yet determined whether a cause-and-effect relationship exists between them and the prolonged

use of the liquid protein diet." Foege said in some of the 15 deaths, the women were getting only 300 calories a

day, less nutrition than victims of World

War II concentration camps received.

"Therefore, some of the deaths may be due to starvation," he said." If starvation is the cause, then it is not the product, but the way it is used. He said electrocardiograms of many of

the women were consistent with patterns shown in starvation, and he said sudden deaths have occurred in several previous starvation cases.

Although he said it is possible that toxic materials are present in the liquid protein products, none has been identified.

It has been estimated that two million to four million people have used liquid protein diets, but Foege said it is believed only about 100,000 used the diets in the same intensive, long-term manner as the 40 cases studied by the center.

He said researchers have found that patients on the diet died from irregular rhythms of the heart at a rate significantly higher than the general population.

And until further research can be done. he said, he would not recommend the di-


