The wedding is to be attended by friends and relatives of the couple.

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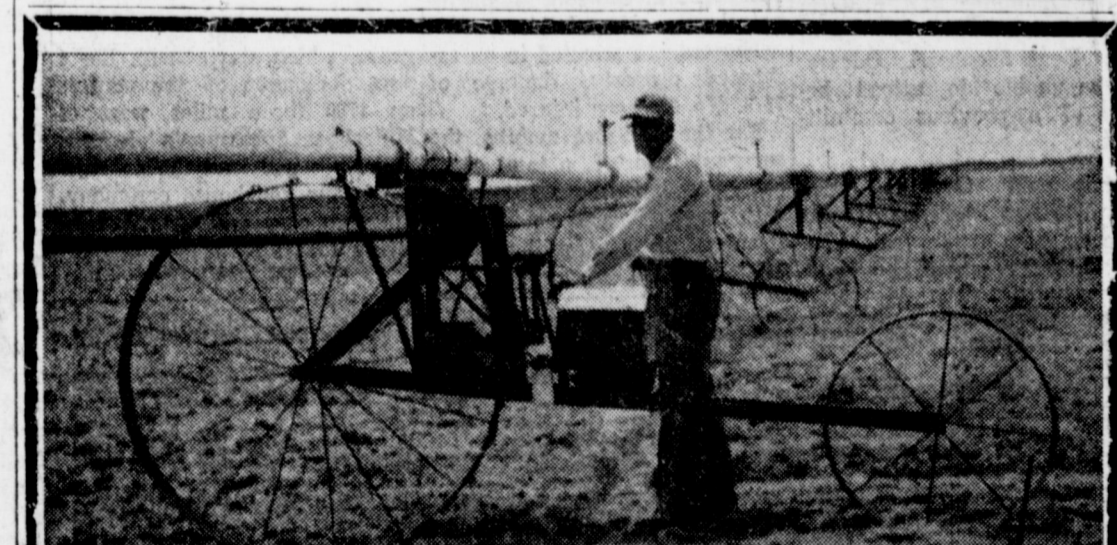

The open-air spectacular will have seating for 2,500 people in the newly built grandstands on the north and south sides of the arena.

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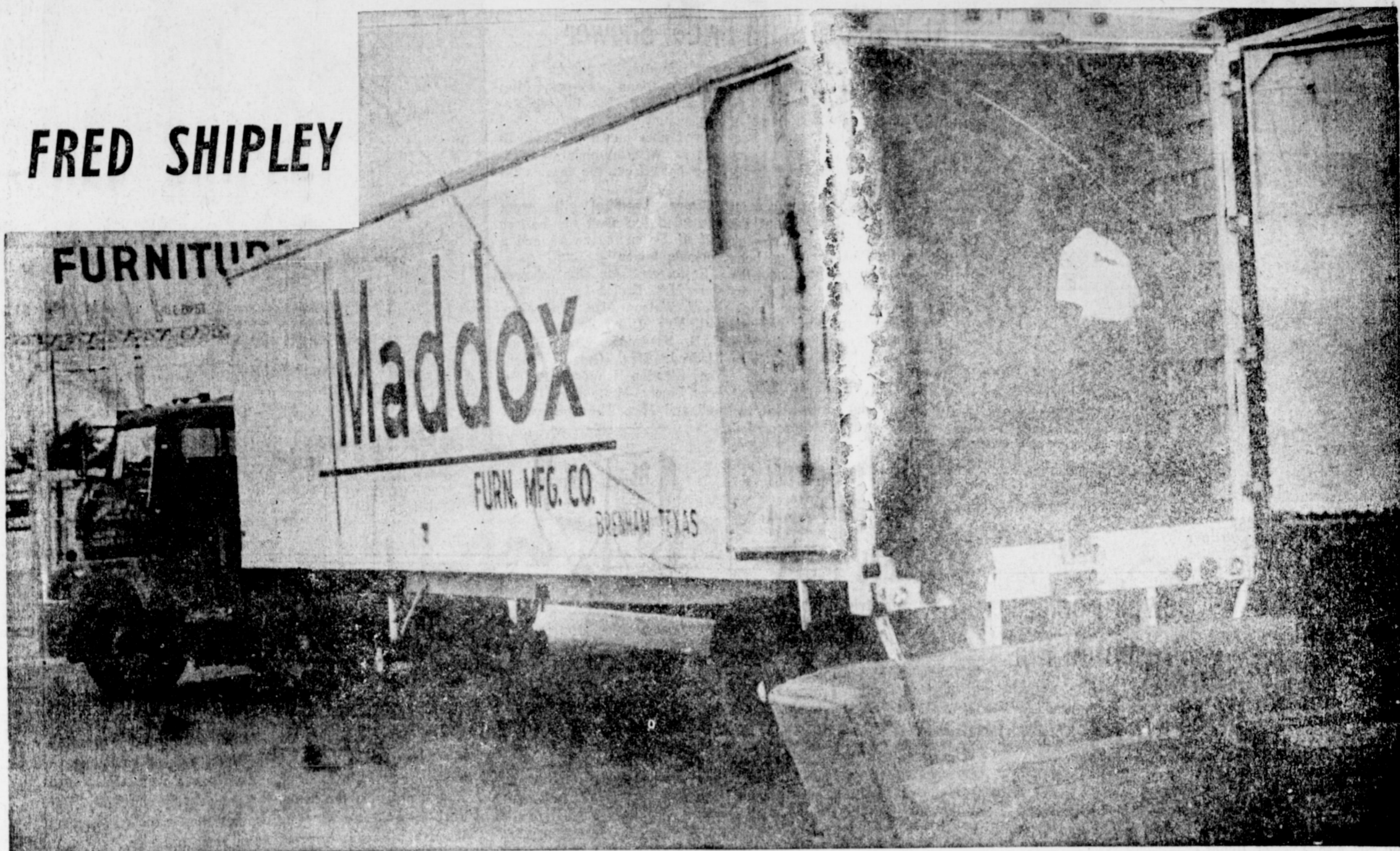
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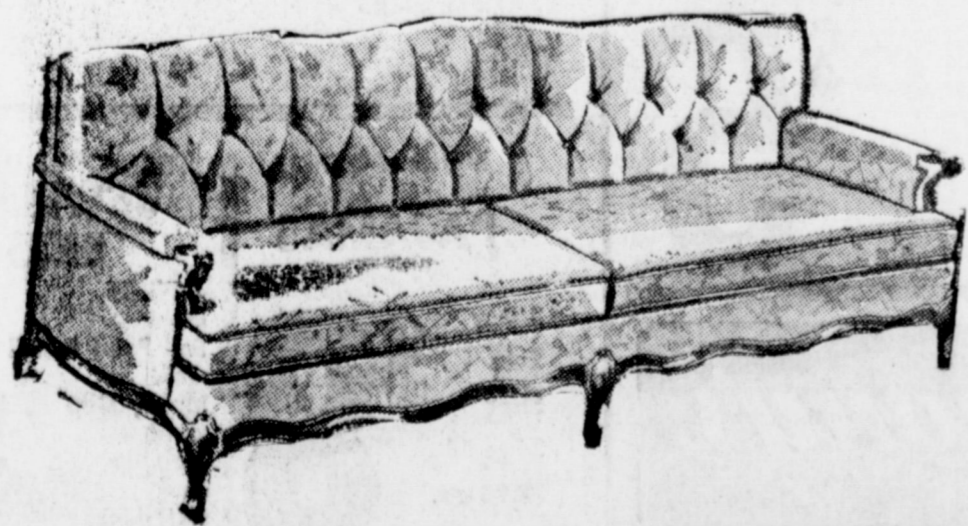

Canyon Theater Opens Thursday At Palo Duro

A new kind of outdoor theatre, lying in a canyon at the base of a 600-foot bluff, will open in the Texas Panhandle June 17. In opening it will draw visitors to the magnificently colored canyon at the most spectacular time of day and will lead them through the experiences of residents and visitors to this same spot during the past 40,000,000 years.

This theatre is the Pioneer Amphitheatre located in the Palo Duro Canyon State Park at the head of the 126-mile Palo Duro Canyon.

The bluff of the canyon and the bowl of the theatre make an echo chamber, so patrons seem to be inside of the sounds they hear. The acoustics are so perfect that a penny dropped anywhere on the stage may be heard in any seat, and a production in this place is a new kind of sound experience for listeners.

Taking advantage of the unique character of sound in this canyon, the first summer-long production will be a show in life and light and sound, "Thundering Sounds of the West." Starting with the surt in the days when the vast panhandle prairie was a sea, continuing through the ages of swamp and yeldt and land to its present form. Next, the show will recreate the drums and flutes and calls and arrows of the indian occupation, the chants and horses neighing, and guitars and guns of the spanish exploration, and the songs and homely sounds of the cattle drivers and the ranchers and the settlers who finally found a way to settle in this land through storm and sun and thick and thin. The show ends with a blaze of light and sound and horses and men in a great finale.

The effects with light and sound are adapted from the french "Son Et Lumiere" technics, which were developed in the chateaux of the Loire Valley to bring historical sites to life. They create high drama with synchronized audio - visual systems of sound effects, lighting, music, dialogue and narration. They were inspired by a thunder - storm. One evening in the 1930's the curator of the Chateau De Chambord in France stood in a field near the ornate castle and watched a thunderstorm around the building. He realized that it had never looked so magnificent and began to work on ways to recreate the effect.

The first use of this technic in the United States was in Independence Hall in Phila-

delphia. This opened on July 4th 1962. Since then there have been several other installations in this country.

Rains Improve Texas Ranges, Extension Says

COLLEGE STATION (AP) The condition of livestock ranges and pastures continues to improve in most sections of the state, said John E. Hutchison, director of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"Most of the farmers are ready for a break in unsettled weather that continued to keep field activities on a (catch - as - catch - can) basis," Hutchison added.

He said a stretch of dry weather was needed generally across the state for advancement of harvest of small grain and baling of hay, and for planting and replanting seed. Weeds and grass also have become a problem where wet land has prevented cultivation.

In a weekly report W. W. Grisham Jr. of Amarillo said most counties in the Panhandle had adequate to surplus moisture and that hail and tornadoes caused damage to wheat.

Most of the South Plains' irrigated cotton and grain sorghum is planted and looking good except where hail and blowing sand has caused damage, said Billy Gunter of Lubbock.

In far West Texas livestock are being moved from the dry areas and feeding is continuing, reported Ray Siegmund of Ft. Stockton. Livestock are in good condition in the counties with adequate moisture. Irrigated crops are making good process and dryland crops in the eastern counties of the district are up.

Moisture continues adequate throughout West Central Texas and ranges, except in San Angelo area, are above average, said Roy Huckabee of San Angelo. Small grain is being harvested as fields dry, and yields are ranging from poor to good. Cotton and grain sorghum are making good growth. Considerable acreages are yet to be planted.

Wet fields hampered field work in Central Texas where only 50 per cent of the oats have been harvested in some counties and peanut reached the tassel stage in planting is under way. Boll weevils and thrips have been reported from several counties with some damage from thrips. A heavy pecan crop is set.
