LAMB - Would you please say something about mixing tranquilizers and alcohol? <br> My husband, age 57, is recovering from a coronary and the doctor has prescribed Librium, three a day. The doctor also told him a drink before meals is permissable. However, my husband sometimes has three drinks and the combination of drugs and alcohol has me worried. <br> He also has angina and has medication for this as well. |
| :---: |
| DEAR READER - It makes a difference what tranquilizer a person is taking with alcohol. Librium is sometimes used in treating the anxiety that alcoholics have when they stop drinking, particularly during withdrawal. I think your husband should not use alcohol at all - not even one drink before dinner. <br> Why? Because alcohol increases the work of the heart and increases the chances that he will have inadequate blood flow to his already damaged heart muscle. There was a good study reported last year by doctors at the University of California at Irvine, which showed that alcohol actually increases the work the heart must do. That will decrease the amount of |

## Treasure Chest Theory Confirmed By Discovery <br> WASHINGTON (AP) - A scientist's discovery of 21 meteorites within two hour of setting hiscovery of teting meteorites within two hoump in Antartuica seems to confirm his theory that old ice patches are treasure chests of the objects from outer space, the National Science Foundation says. They are of interest to scientists studying extraterrestrial material for clues to the origins of earth and the esoar system. Last year. Cassidy led ascientic team that found 11 meteorites in the general area of the new discovery, a reeion of the Transantarctic Mountains in Virtoria L.and about 120 miles north of McNurdo Station, the principal U.S. scientific out- post After the last expedition, Cassidy theo- rized that meteontes - which fall constantly over the earth - might be pres- erved in quantity and quality within Antarctica's deep ice.
