## Convicts Holding Hostages

NEW WESTMINSTER, British Columbia (UPI) - Prisoners who seized a dozen hostages after an aborted escape attempt agreed Sunday to release two of them in return for food, cigarettes and small amount of a pain-killing drug, a police spokesman said.

Five inmates originally grabbed 13 hostages - 10 of them visiting wives or girlfriends of prisoners - but released one late Saturday.

Authorities said it was believed the hostages had not been harmed. One of the five convicts was wounded by a shotgun blast during the escape attempt. **Trade For Provisions** 

They agreed to release two more hostages in return for food, cigarettes, instant coffee and a minimal amount of Demerol," said Royal Canadian Mounted Police Supt. Bruce Northrup.

Northrup played a tape of a conversation he had with the prisoners during which they agreed to release two hos-

We are prepared to go out on neutral ground then and accept two hostages.' Northrup was heard to say to a prisoner.

We guarantee your safety and we guarantee that you will be able to return to the building. And in return we're asking you to guarantee that the police officers exposing themselves to you ... will not be in any danger whatsoever.'

Safety Assured A prisoner replied that nobody would be in danger provided "both sides kept their word.

'As long as no one fires on us, no one is going to be fired on," the unidentified prisoner said.

A guard was stabbed in the neck and a prisoner wounded in the leg by gunfire during the escape attempt. The wounded guard was reported in good condition

Police with semi-automatic weapons cordoned off the area surrounding the old, fortresslike prison in suburban Van-

'Negotiations up to this time have been primarily for medical attention for the wounded inmate and now they're looking for additional comforts," Royal Canadian Mounted Police inspector Russ Holmes said.

It's a difficult situation to describe. but right now it's primarily a wait-andsee situation

Holmes identified the convicts as Stephen Albert Hall, David Bennett, Ralph ummers, Richard Wright, and Andrew Graydon Bruce. Bruce was wounded during the incident.

Sledgehammer Used

Hall said in a telephone interview with radio station CKNW that Saturday's escape bid began with breaking a glass partition in the visitors area with a sledgehammer.

We broke the glass and climbed through," Hall said. "One guard tried to jump me, so I had to run a knife through him - he was stabbed in the throat. Hall said the other guards "got away

but we have 11 hostages and two stool pigeons as prisoners - as hostages.

Hall said Bruce was hit by a ricocheting bullet and that medical treatment for his wound was the center of negotiations. He said one hostage would be released if authorities provided medical attention, and cigarettes, food, and pain killers. "That would be a start," he said. Bruce was involved in a 41-hour hostage taking at the same prison in June See CONVICTS Page 18

## **Arctic Temperatures** Chill U.S. Midsection On Blizzard's Heels

ARCTIC temperatures blew through the nation's battered midsection Sunday as its eary residents struggled to dig out from the season's most recent blizzard, which has claimed a death toll of at least

Army troops and equipment were flown into Ohio, the state most ravaged by the winter blitz.

The pre-dawn mercury plunged into the 20-below range over portions of North Dakota and Minnesota. Dubuque, Iowa, spared from the brunt of the Wednesday-to-Friday blizzard, reported a midmorning minus-5, while Rockford, Ill., residents shivered in a 2-below-zero temperature.

## Fog, Freezing **Drizzle Make Travel Touchy**

AIR TRAFFIC at Lubbock International Airport was at a standstill late Sunday and glass-like conditions on the city's Loop 289 plagued motorists as dense fog and freezing drizzle dealt a double blow to the city.

Wayne Hill, airport tower team supervisor, said that all air traffic had been stopped by the weather since 4 p.m. Spokesmen for the four major air car riers said most flights had been can-

celed, adding that the bad weather had forced planes to land at other destinations, sending some right back to where they started.

Airline Buses Passengers Van Jackson, customer service repre sentative for Texas International, reported that they were having to bus passengers from Amarillo to Lubbock since ex-

tremely low visibility prevented the Amarillo flight from landing at Lubbock. By 7:30 p.m., the freezing drizzle had put a dangerous icy coating on Loop 289, with Lubbock police reporting at one point three automobile accidents within 100 yards of one another, as motorist spun out of control on the slippery over-

However, amubulance and police officials reported no serious injuries as a re-sult of the multiple fender-benders.

The freezing temperatures, which nev-er reached above 31, also caused problems downtown. Electrical wires, apparently frozen, were reported down in the 800 block of Main Street.

Better Weather Due But forecasters have a bright note for South Plains residents today, as Sunday's miserable freezing drizzle is expected to leave the area as it continues

Sunday's drizzle, along with fog, plagued motorists across the Panhandle and South Plains by reducing visibility to less than one mile in some areas.

Sadat Appeal Printed Egyptian President Anwar Sadat, who will fly to Washington next weekend for talks with President Carter, Sunday called on American Jews to support his peace efforts. The appeal was in a letter published in the Miami Herald.

Hardline Arab opponents of Sadat's peace moves were dealt a blow Sunday when radical Iraq — expected to be a key in any wide anti-Sadat alliance — rejected an invitation to a planned Arab summit Feb. 2 in Algeria.

The official Iraqi News Agency, monitored in Beirut, said the decision was the logical follow-up to Iraq's walkout at a December anti-Sadat summit in Libya. Iraq charged the Syrian-dominated meeting had not gone far enough in opposing Sadat and Israel.

Arab Summit Proposed However, later Sunday the government-owned Algerian Press Service reported Iraq had proposed an Arab summit in Baghdad. It was not clear if it was

meant to rival the Algiers meeting. The Israeli decision to resume the military talks came after two weeks of indirect contacts with Egypt through U.S. ambassadors in Jerusalem and Cairo as well as the shuttle efforts of Undersecre tary of State Alfred Atherton, President Carter's special Middle East envoy.

Atherton returned to Jerusalem Sunday from a trip to Amman, where he met with King Hussein in an effort to bring Jordan into the peace talks. U.S. sources said Atherton would leave shortly for

Postponement Reason Given

Begin said last week - when Israel deided to postpone its participation in the military talks - that the Jewish state could not send a delegation to Cairo in light of what he called insulting references in the Egyptian press.

# Object Sighted In Search For Spy Satellite

EDMONTON, Alberta (UPI) - A group of meteorologists in the Northwest Territories have reported locating a "suspicious looking black object" that might be part of the Soviet spy satellite that fell from orbit over northern Canada five days ago, a Canadian Defense Department official said Sunday.

'Six meteorologists working for Environment Canada reported seeing a suspicious looking black object at Warden's Grove, about 240 miles southwest of Baker Lake," Major Vic Keating said. No Confirmation Yet

There is no confirmation that the object is part of the satellite, but as a precautionary measure we are arranging to fly out the six men," he said.

The object is apparently man-made and is lying on top of the snow, so it is fairly new.

Keating said airborne teams searching for evidence of radiation from the nuclear-powered Cosmos 954, which was believed to have disintegrated as it crashed through Earth's atmosphere Tuesday, are concentrating on two "hot spots" at Great Slave Lake.

The search corridor runs west to east for 450 miles between Great Slave and

Col. David Garland of the Canadian Armed Forces and Mahlon Gates, an American scientist, reported confirmation of signals from a possible man-made

Two Signals Reported

"They reported two very strong signals, one under the ice two miles off shore and another on the shoreline," Keating said. 'Helicopters will make further test flights over the area before a ground team is sent in."

Another Defense Department spokes-man, Capt. Craig Mills, said Saturday that it was impossible to say if "beeps recorded on monitoring equipment were caused by debris from the satellite.

He said they had five planes combing the area between Great Slave and Baker Lakes that scientists believe was the fiery re-entry path of the crippled Soviet satel-

"They are paying special attention to two spots where we found evidence of radioactivity two days ago - there have been no new finds," he said.

He said reports Friday that faulty monitoring equipment aboard Canadian aircraft had produced the bleeps were not correct. Instead, he said, scientists "with an incredibly heavy load of data, had released preliminary information without

"They said that on first reading, it ap-peared that here had been a malfunction of the detection equipment, but after continued analysis, data showed there were indeed contacts made," Mills said. Twenty-five men, including six U.S. ra-

diation specialists and the 11-member Nuclear Accident Support Team, re-mained on alert at a base camp at Baker Lake, the nearest settlement to the site.

# Disaster Declarations Provide Relief Aid

WASHINGTON (AP) - Droughts, floods, icing and fires resulted in 56 presi-lentially-declared disasters and emergencies in 1977, and it's all starting off again this year because of fierce blizzards in the Midwest.

A declaration of disaster has the effect of cutting governmental red tape and expediting federal financial aid to the affected areas. Last year the government spent an estimated \$885 million on recovery programs for areas victimized by

President Carter already has declared three emergencies this year. Two were for storm-battered Ohio and the other was for Indiana, which was also hamstrung by last week's blizzard. The declarations also covered three counties in the vicinity of Wynne, Ark., where a tornado destroyed homes.

Involved in the government's disbursement of disaster relief besides the White House is the Federal Disaster Assistance Administration and agencies such as the Small Business Administration, the Department of Agriculture, the Department of Health; Education and Welfare, the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers and the Federal Highway Administration.

Last year the White House declared 56 disasters and emergencies in 37 states hit by natural disasters. Drought aid went to 24 states in various regions of the country. Funds to help recovery from floods went to 17 states, some of which were also on the drought aid list.

The largest amount of federal aid for a single incident - \$258 million - went to the Johnstown, Pa., area, where flash flooding after nine inches of rain last July resulted in 75 deaths. It was the third time in 88 years that devastating floods had hit the area. An estimated 2,300 persons died there in an 1889 flood.


A summary of 1977 disasters and emergencies prepared by the disaster assistance administration includes only those proclaimed by the president. It lists 22 major disasters and 34 emergencies.

Flooding was a factor in 16 of the major disasters. William H. Wilcox, head of the disaster assistance agency, said flooding is the most common cause of serious natural disasters in this country. The 1977 floods were sometimes accompanied by severe storms, collapse of dams, tornadoes and, in the state of Washing-

An emergency is declared for a special problem, such as the drought in Virginia, where pastures dried out and farmers needed feed to save cattle. In a major disaster such as flooding, severe winter weather or ice conditions, as many as 15 or 20 federal agencies may need to be mobilized to cope with the problem, the disaster assistance agency said.

The lone fire emergency occurred in Bartlesville, Okla., where a section of the downtown was swept by fire. The federal government provided mobile homes for the people left homeless.

The 22 disasters in 1977 fell far short of the 48 major disasters declared in 1972 - the all-time high. Among the disasters that year were the East Coast floods from the rains spawned by Hurricane Agnes, the dam burst in the coal mining valley of West Virginia that caused 107 deaths and the flash flood in Rapid City, S.D., in which 226 persons perished

## Fierce Storms Wrack Europe; Snow And Waves Kill Dozens

LONDON (AP) - Severe storms swept through parts of Europe over the weekend, bringing blizzards to northern Scotland, snow to the Italian Riviera and flash flooding to Venice and other Italian

Officials said seven people were killed in Italy, two men drowned in British waters and 27 sailors from the Spanish fishing trawler Marbel were reported missing off the Spanish coast.

At an Italian Alps resort at Pescegalla, the cook and the owner of a hotel were killed when a wall of snow crashed into the building. Officials said a major disaster was averted because the hotel's usual weekend visitors were kept away by a heavy snowfall the previous day.

Three persons crossing a bridge over the River Marecchia at Pesaro were presumed drowned when the bridge collapsed in a storm, plunging their car into the river. On Saturday, officials reported that a motorist and a snowtractor driver died in separate snowslides.

The usually tranquil, palm-dotted Itali-

an Riviera and much of northwest Italy were lashed by gale-force winds, rain and snow. Rain and strong winds flooded the canal city of Venice, raising waters to their highest level since 1969, and flash floods were reported in the Italian towns of Imperia and Savona.

A tornado struck at the Italian seaside resort of Ospedaletti Saturday, tearing the roofs off scores of houses, uprooting trees and causing an estimated \$1.1 million in damage, officials said.

Three-foot snow piles blocked the main Vienna-Rome railroad. Rescuers Sunday morning reached about 100 passengers stranded overnight on a snow-blocked

A blizzard howled across parts of Scotland on Saturday and Sunday, stranding hundreds of motorists and train passengers in 20-foot drifts in what residents called the worst snowstorm in recent

Police used snowplows and eight Royal Air Force helicopters to search for marooned citizens. At least two passenger-

laden trains became stuck in the snow on Saturday and required rescue assistance.

In Northern Ireland, a 26-year-old customs officer was swept into the harbor and drowned at the County Down village of Annalong when winds gusting up to 80 miles-an-hour blasted the British province. In North Wales, also badly hit by snow, a climber drowned in a mountain lake Saturday night.

Along the English Channel coast, floodwaters swamped scores of roads, winds uprooted trees and damaged seafront

The 1,317-ton Marbel ran aground off Vigo, Spain, Saturday when it was reported caught up by 60 mile-an-hour winds. Maritime officials said 27 of the 36-man crew were feared lost in the stormy seas. A schooner in the area rescued nine

In France, snow and avalanche warnings were posted in mountainous regions. Other European points reported dreary drizzle and grey skies, but no unusually bad weather for the last days of January.





## 10-Year Delay Expected Before East Coast Oil Sites Produce

NEW YORK (AP) - The oil industry's next billion-dollar gamble for exploration rights off the East Coast is scheduled to begin Tuesday. But even without expected legal delays, officials don't hope to produce oil or gas from the sites off New England for at least 10 years.

"The chances of success are very remote," said Ed Capen, a petroleum engineer for Atlantic Richfield Co. "Don't believe that because we go out and spend money on leases, we're necessarily going to find oil and gas. We've had just too many fail-

Capen said the odds were about one-in-twelve of oil or gas ultimately being produced from any of the 155 tracts covering

882.443 acres in the Atlantic off Massachusetts. J. P. Yope, a Shell Oil Co. offshore drilling expert, said there is a one-in-five chance of finding oil or gas in offshore opera-

But the question remains academic until a confusing spate of court and legislative battles end and exploratory operations ac-

The Commonwealth of Massachusetts and a group of environmentalists have filed suits in Boston to block the lease sale, scheduled for 10 a.m. EST Tuesday in New York. The suits claim the federal government has not adequately protected fishing rights, fishery resources and the marine environment of the North Atlantic.

One of the tracts lies just 63 miles east of Nantucket Island, but most are more than 100 miles southeast of the island and some are almost 200 miles offshore. The area includes Georges Bank, one of North America's richeet fishing grounds.

In response to objections from fishermen and others, the U.S. Interior Department already has withdrawn from sale 51 tracts originally listed as part of the lease area.

Meanwhile, offshore legislation being considered by the U.S. House of Representatives could delay the sale or further complicate the court action in Boston.

Interior Department officials, considering the possibility that final clearance for the lease sale might not come before Tuesday, said they would - if necessary - seek last-minute appeals court permission to conduct the sale as scheduled.

The only previous lease sale of exploratory sites in the Atlantic occurred in August 1976, when the government accepted bids totaling \$1.13 billion for 93 tracts in the Baltimore Canyon off the coasts of New Jersey and Delaware. That sale encountered similar legal wrangles which forced several delays.

But experts such as Capen and Yope caution that geologists' estimates have been wrong before and that no significant quantities of oil or gas may be found.

We flunked in onshore explorations in Oregon and Washington, and offshore operations in Alaska, Canada and the Mississippi-Alabama-Florida areas." Capen said.

Officials said that from 1953 to 1976, the industry spent \$22.8 billion for leases to search for offshore oil and gas, and found \$27.6 billion worth of the fuels.

When production costs are included, the officials said, the return on invested capital for offshore exploration was about 5 percent - less than the industry's money would have earned in

So why does the industry continue to search for offshore oil and gas?

'We always assume we'll find something," said Yope. Each person believes in his heart that he has figured out ex-

actly where the oil is," said Capen. But even if the companies find sufficient oil or gas off New England - and that search could take more than two years officials say it would take at least eight years to obtain the nec-

essary environmental permits and to set up production wells. As for the lease sale itself, there are no official estimates of how many companies will participate. But most of the major

companies have indicated they will make bids, and many smaller firms are expected to participate as well. The companies often offer joint bids on some sites a process which industry critics say tends to hold down the bids and

cheats the government. To counter that criticism, the industry cites figures showing that the number of participating companies in offshore lease

sales has increased from 25 in 1959 to 62 by 1974. The industry also said there was a \$5.6 billion spread between the winning bid and the next-closest one in lease sales conducted between 1954 and 1974, showing "there is no collusion, no at-

tempt to reduce bids by joint bidding." The critics, however, point out that the spread likely would

have been wider without the joint bids.

## Califano Rejects Federally Sponsored Achievement Test

WASHINGTON (AP) — The federal government is reponding to the public clamor for new emphasis on reading, writing and arithmetic in schools, but Uncle Sam doesn't Every other state has some test plan on the docket or under sponding to the public clamor for new emphasis on reading, writing and arithmetic in schools, but Uncle Sam doesn't want to dictate the standards.

In the last two years, public concern has mounted over evidence that some young people graduate with basic learning deficiences that make it difficult for them to function as

Expressing alarm over indications that some young adults can't balance a checkbook, fill out forms or write coherent letters, parents have questioned whether educators are accurately measuring student achievement and ability.

The controversy hasn't escaped the attention of Joseph A. Califano Jr., secretary of Health; Education and Welfare. Califano has invited political and education leaders to a national conference here on achievement testing and basic

Califano says the conference, scheduled for early March, will deal with more effective testing, how to raise the level of student achievement and how the government can help. But he says the government is not interested in deciding what the test standards should be.

"Even a wholly voluntary national test or set of standards would be a step in precisely the wrong direction," Califano declared in a recent speech. " ... . There is no single test that is right for every school."

However, he promised to boost federal research on testing, and suggested that HEW could help states and school districts establish testing programs.

There is no agreement among educators and special interest groups on what kind of tests should be devised and

whether the federal government ought to be involved. The push for a return to the basics in schools and a re-emphasis on the three R's - reading, writing and arithmetic -

Two months ago, the state of Florida sent a shock wave through the educational establishment. State education offi-cials tested the basic skills and functional literacy of Florida students in grades 3, 5, 8 and 11. Thirty-six percent of the 110,000 high school juniors failed a simple math test and 8 percent flunked a 7th grade-level test in reading and writing.

The failure rate in math ran as high as 90 percent in some predominantly black, inner city high schools, according to Tom Fisher, test director for the Florida Department of Ed-

However, the group standardized tests have been assailed by the NAACP, which is considering suing the state to block

Meanwhile, teachers and school officials are expressing fears that parents will blame them, not their children, for ow test scores. Robert McClure, a National Education Association official, said the NEA's objection to the tests is not

We don't think it benefits anybody, particularly the kids and their teachers. It doesn't measure what it purports to measure and it isn't helpful to the learning process," he said. "The function of schools is not to compare kids ... but to help them move through their program as fast as possi-

McClure noted that school curricula are already shaped to some degree by the bevy of tests furnished by Educational Testing Services, Science Research Associates and other firms that devise scholastic achievement tests.

## Steel Official Sees Recovery For Industry

PITTSBURGH (UPI) - United States Steel Corp. Chairman Edgar B. Speer says the steel industry seems to be recovering, at least temporarily, from a disastrous 1977 with industry orders and employment now on the rise

'Orders for the first quarter of 1978 are up 8 percent to 10 percent (from those in recent months) and that can only mean that your employment has to go with it," Speer said in an interview.

When asked if he felt the rises in orders and employment marked a trend that would hold, the 62-year-old head of the nation's largest steel company said "I would hope so" but acknowledged he

The latest statistics released by the American Iron and Steel Institute, the industry trade association that Speer heads, showed that industry employment continued to drop through November

AISI said earlier this month that 6,000 fewer persons were employed by the industry in November than the month before, bringing to 33,000 the number of industry jobs lost since June 1977.

Speer also said the industry's utilization of its capacity "right now is about 73 percent or 74 percent."

While a slowdown in the automobile industry has slightly affected orders of other major steelmakers, Speer said, "We haven't noticed any significant difference. Flat-rolled products in general are

Speer described as "reasonable" an Inland Steel Corp. assessment that industry shipments probably would reach at least 25.5 million tons in the first three months of 1978, compared to a poor 21.9 million tons for the same period a year ago.

## Engineer Says Motorists Unaware Of Danger Found In Fuel Systems

few motorists are aware their 15 to 20 gallon gasoline tanks have an energy content equivalent to the explosive energy release of about 1,000 pounds of dyna-

Stanley E. Handman, chief engineer for Pullman Kellogg, also says 5,000 gallon tanks buried beneath many service station driveways have the energy equivalent of the explosive energy release of about 150 tons of dynamite.

Handman said the public perception of potential hazards is dependent on the way information is presented to the publ-He said motorists are generally aware

of the hazardous nature of gasoline but regularly drive their cars and drive into gasoline stations with inventories of 5,000 or more gallons of gasoline

"Personal experience has led to a low level of concern," Handman said. Pullman Kellogg made use of Hand-

man's studies while rejecting a final draft of a General Accounting Office report that the manner in which liquefied natural gas is stored poses danger on a scale comparable to a nuclear bomb explosion.

The GAO study, as reported by the New York Times, charges the federal government has not acted prudently or adequately to protect public health and

Pullman Kellogg, an international engineering and construction firm has participated in the design and construction of a number of cyrogenic and liquefied natural gas projects and facilities around the

On Jan. 5, Handman told a Department of Energy hearing there are approxi-mately 36 liquefied natural gas peak shaving plants with substantial storage capacity and another 32 smaller plants in operation today in the United States and Canada. Some have been in operation since the late 1960s. . He said there are also 11 import terminals in operation worldwide, with one starting operations in 1958, and that there are seven baseload liquefaction plants, all overseas except for one at Kenai, Alaska.

"None of these facilities have experi-

outside the plant boundary, and, in general, they have had an exemplary safety record," Handman said.

Handman said a 1974 liquefied natural gas tank failure in Cleveland, Ohio, is frequently cited as evidence of the hazards involved. The accident caused 130 deaths and injured 25 persons. "This tank did not have an impounding

dike, a deficiency that would not be permitted today for storage tanks handling any inflammable fluid," Handman said. "Also, the tank itself reflected the materials, design and inspection practices of

three decades ago. Handman said there are obviously potential hazards associated with the transportation, storage and handling of liquefied natural gas.

There are, however, equivalent hazards with many other materials, and these have not been given nearly as much consideration by the public or governmental authorities," he said.

"This is due, in part, to the public attention given to liquefied natural gas in recent years, with much of the concern ignoring the safety and satisfactory performance of modern plants handling liquefied natural gas."

Handman said public perception of the safety of gasoline tankage would certainly be different if there was a long history of referencing the stored gasoline to its dynamite equivalent.

Experience has shown, however, that the hazards associated with the gasoline transportation, storage, and handling syswhen compared to the benefits availa-

Handman said imported liquefied natural gas can make a significant contribution to the availability of natural gas, and, hence, can be of considerable bene-

"It would be unfortunate if the public perception of the hazards associated with iquefied natural gas importation were to be so influenced by unrealistic safety appraisals as to effectively preclude increasing the liquefied natural gas import capabilities of the United States," he

#### AN EDITORIAL:

## **Schools--A Viable Solution?**

IT WILL TAKE a while for school officials to evaluate the full impact of federal Judge Halbert O. Woodward's desegregation order here, but the initial reaction was favorable.

Although compliance will require some busing of students, his order leaves intact the basic concept of the neighborhood

Judge Woodward found that 22 schools in the district are racially identifiable but that only nine of these have their present racial status as a result of "past discriminatory acts with segregative intent."

He directed that a plan for desegregating those nine schools be submitted to him for approval by April 1. If approved, it would go into effect this fall.

EIGHT OF THESE nine schools are the same ones that Woodward found to be unlawfully segregated in 1970.

"Although the defendants (the school system) have fully complied with the court's order of August, 1970; it is obvious that the remedy then ordered did not remove the vestiges of segregation at these schools,' Judge Woodward said Friday.

Therefore, he said, a plan of attendance will be required to desegregate the nine: Dunbar High, Struggs Junior High and Wheatley, Iles, Posey, Martin, Sanders, Guadalupe and Mahon elementary schools.

He gave the school board latitude for ways in which to accomplish the desegregation but cautioned that "care should be taken...that any plan will not be a dispropor-tionate burden on any race."

## 'Weathering' Well

ALTHOUGH WE could use the moisture, as usual, the South Plains area can count its blessings that it again has missed the severe weather blasting other parts of the nation.

We have more than our share of dry weather in this area, but that brings with it more than our share of sunshine. Taken over the full 12 months. Lubbock's climate compares favorbly with that anywhere else-and we shouldn't forget to count our blessings and enjoy it to the fullest.

AMONG THE ALTERNATIVES that might be utilized, Judge Woodward ruled, are "pairing and clustering of schools, changes in attendance boundary lines, the utilization of space in schools now under capacity, the closing of schools, the full use and implementation of a majority-to-minority transfer policy or any other plan that is reasonable and necessary.

Thus, the extent of forced busing that might be necessary to meet the court's order will depend upon the extent to which other remedies might be desirable.

Enrollment that would reflect the racial make-up of the entire school population would be a starting point, but a starting point only, for determining if a given school has been desegregated, Woodward said in his ruling.

THE COURT LEFT open the question of building new schools to serve developing neighborhoods, indicating there would be no objection so long as the nine schools he named are desegregated.

'The decision of whether or not to build additional schools and classrooms is one that should be left to the discretion of the local authorities," he ruled.

.. The real question before the court is not whether these schools should be and could be built under constitutional guidelines but whether or not the building and location of said schools will further segregation in the district.

"...This court's order will permit the school district to build these additional buildings when and where they desire, subject only to the submission of a satisfactory plan for desegregation of each school in the district which the court finds is now racially identifiable as a minority school and whose racially identifiable status was caused by segregative intent...and will not hinder the integration of other schools."

THUS, WOODWARD rejected the Justice Department's contention that a systemwide desegregation plan here is necessary because HENRY J. TAYLOR: of alleged systemwide segregative intent.

With the exception of the nine schools named, he said, the evidence does not support the government's allegations.

'The government's expert based his opinion-that population patterns change as a result of the school board's actions in establishing schools-solely upon the results as he now views them and has no foundation in fact.... he said at one point in his ruling

Thus, barring appeal by either side, Woodward's decision appears on initial reading to be one that fully complies with the constitution and the law without causing the wholesale social disruptions that have marked far too many desegregation decisions elsewhere over the country.

Smith's negotiations are being conducted with the leaders of the Rhodesian blacks who, by all reports, command the broadest possible base of popular support: Bishop Abel Muzorewa, the Rev. Ndabaningi

Sithole and Sen. Chief Jeremiah Ghirau.

MOST OBSERVERS calculate that these three leaders among them have the backing of 80 percent or more of the Rhodesian people.

So the fact that they and Smith are getting together should be welcome news to self-proclaimed supporters of "majority rule" in Africa.

Such, however, is not the case. For one thing, the talks in Salisbury have been bitterly attacked by the terrorist leaders who have been savaging Rhodesia from across its borders-Joshua Nkomo and Robert Mugabe.

These terrorist commanders do not accept the

validity of the negotiations and vow to continue their armed onslaught regardless of what Smith, Muzerowa, Sithle and Ghirau agree to.

The United States and Great Britain, meanime, have tied their policy to the external terror-

UN AMBASSADOR Andrew Young, who seems o be our spokesman on such matters, has repeatedly shown his partiality for the Nkomo-Mugabe Patriotic Front."

The U.S. State Department has let it be known that any solution for Rhodesia "must be open to participation by nationalist elements living outside the country as well as those inside Rhode-sia." This position on our part appears at the mo-ment to be the major stumbling block to an au-thentic settlement in Rhodesia.

The mind-boggling implications of all this are suggested by noted American author Robin Moore ("The Green Berets," "The French Connection"), who now makes his home in Salisbury and calls himself the unofficial U.S. ambas-

MOORE HAS JUST brought out a blistering book entitled "Rhodesia" (Condor Books) which supplies a first hand account of political conditions in that country.

It outlines the brutal nature of the terrorist warfare and the political character of the Nkomo-Mugabe terrorists with whom our policy is

Moore provides a grisly account of the murder, bombings and mutilations committed by the Nkomo-Mugabe forces against women, children, missionaries and other helpless victims in sneak attacks across Rhodesia's borders.

For the most part, he notes, these attacks are aimed not at the Rhodesian security forces or the "white power structure" but at defenseless

The idea is to terrorize them into cooperation with the "Patriotic Front," exactly as the Viet Cong attempted to terrorize the peasants of Viet-

THE ANALOGY GOES further: Moore shows the "Patriotic Front" is heavily backed by the Soviet Union (and to a lesser extent by Red China), armed with Soviet weapons, coached by Cuban and East German advisers and bivouacked in sanctuaries provided by Marxist Mozambique.

In other words, the terrorist campaign is a communist-sponsored operation from start to finish. Its leaders oppose "one man, one vote" be-cause they doubt they could come to power that

They prefer the Maoist adage about political power growing from the barrel of a gun. That American policy prefers the Marxist terrorists to an internal settlement with moderate Rhodesian blacks speaks volumes about the out-

look of President Carter and Andrew Young. "One man, one vote," apparently, is not the object of our policy at all.


## A Shift In 'Signals'

WASHINGTON-President Carter's new warning against dangers of "Eurocommunism" in Italy reflects a confrontation with reality after one year in office-by the President in general and by Ambassador Richard Gardner in particular. When plucked from his chair as professor of in-

ternational law at Columbia University to be ambassador in Rome, Gardner joined other new Carter officials in viewing Henry Kissinger's hard line against Western European Communist parties as a cold-war throwback. Just before the first anniversary of the Carter

inauguration, Gardner helped guide policy back to the Kissinger line:

HIS INCOME IS being brutally reduced by today's rate of inflation, like all senior citizens living on a pension, annuity, retirement benefits, life-insurance payments, savings-bond redemptions, savings bank or savings and loan nest eggs,

As a railroad worker my friend and the railroad both contributed as much as \$57.85 per month, totaling monthly \$115.70 for the railroad man. This hard-to-spare deduction was a constant,

sometimes agonizing, sacrifice. In the 19 years, what has happened to all that hard-earned money put into retirement payments? Today each month it buys less and less.

Medicare? When Washington first announced the proposal my friend and his wife were enthusiastic. But now medicare costs nearly triple the estimated cost Washington originally stated.

MOREOVER, THEY find Medicare bound up

in enough red tape to wrap a mummy.

No wonder he calls Washington's bureaucrats, "Those monkeys with the say-so." He feels that throughout the remainder of his and his wife's life they will be pawns of faceless bureaucrats.

Adversity is indeed educational—but not among the elderly. After working conscientiously all his life, this fine and decent man feels mortified, debased, schemed against and double-crossed.

## Couple Moves, Rebuilds House

BOWEN, Ill. (AP) - A 191-year-old house built 50 years before the first white settlers came to western Illinois is being reconstructed in the middle of a cornfield here by a pig farmer and his wife.

John Dittmer, 32, and his wife Arlis bought and moved two-storey frame house 1,200 miles from Westfield, Mass., where Col. William Moseley built it in 1782, when the bleak prairies wiere still the domain of the Indians and the

By this spring, after more than a year of rebuilding, the Dittmers, who have two children and are expecting a third, say they will be able to move in to their new home Until last year the Dittmers were typical antique buffs, filling a rented home

with primitive furniture and hunting in vain for an old farmhouse to restore. "We considered building a new reproduction of a colonial home ... That was the era of history and architecture we'd become particularly interested in,"

said Mrs. Dittmer, who was born in Chicago. Then they spotted an add for the Moseley house in the National Trust's 'Preservation News." The home, originally a farmhouse, had more recently been used as a duplex apartment. But it was located near the center of West-

field and a contractor decided he wanted the site for commercial expansion

and sold the building to the Dittmers for \$12,000. "The hardest part was finding a truck for the move," said Mrs. Dittmer. "You'd tell a trucker what you wanted it for and he'd laugh." Finally an independent driver with a big meat truck brought the dismantled building to Hancock County in three loads.

Moseley built the house with three fireplaces on each floor, all using a huge central chimney with a built-in smokehouse. The home also has a slate roof, original wood paneling, yellow pine floors, a "coffin door" for in-home funerals and Indian shutters that close from the inside.

Dittmar said the building was not hard to take apart because the massive, axe-hewn beams were held together with wooden pins. "The contractor told us he wouldn't give us 30 cents for the chance of it all going back together again," Dittmer said. "But everything fit perfectly. It was sort of amazing."

Everything in the original building has been saved except the deteriorated weatherboards and windows. The Dittmers are adding double-pane windows, insulation in the attic and sidewalls, two forced-air furnaces and air condition

We're keeping it as original as possible, but we're not unrealistic," Mrs.

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Panama's "maximum leader" Omar Torrijos pledged to a group of visiting American senators he will step down from control of the Panamanian government if the Panama Canal treaties are ratified, the Washington Star reported Sunday.

The dispatch said Torrijos said he would end military control and not seek the presidency under civilian rule.

The newspaper, in a dispatch from Panama City, said it learned of Torrijos' pledge from Sen. John Melcher, D-Mont., a member of a Senate delegation visiting Panama. Melcher quoted Torrijos as saying if

the canal treaties are ratified, "then my job will be finished," the newspaper In Panama, a Torrijos spokesman dec-

lined comment on the Washington Star story. Panamanian negotiator Romulo Escobar Bethancourt said a statement on the matter would be issued Monday or Tuesday.

The canal treaties would cede U.S. control of the canal to Panama in 2000 and retain American rights to protect the canal's neutrality.

Torrijos said if the treaties are approved, he would not be a candidate for president, according to Melcher. A provision under which he has served as "maximum leader" for the past six years would be allowed to lapse, Torrijos proposed, Melcher said.

Torrijos said the turnover could come as soon as August following a regularly scheduled national election, Melcher said, adding that Torrijos pledged to legalize political parties in Panama if the treaties were approved.

According to the report, Torrijos also was concerned over having to conduct a second ratification referendum in Panama should the Senate amend the treaties to meet objections of opponents of the

"I asked the Senate respectfully that any additions that tend to clarify should be managed in a way so I would not be obligated to take it to a second plebiscite," Torrijos told Star reporter Walter Taylor in an interview at his oceanside retreat

"I don't want to convert 1978 into a year ... dedicated to the business of plebiscite fulltime," he said.

The newspaper also reported that Sen. Daniel Moynihan, D-N.Y., who supports ratification, became upset when Torrijos took the visiting senators on a long trip through several villages in an underde veloped area 40 miles south of the capital and posed with them for television and newspaper photographers.

The report said Moynihan refused to join in the photo sessions and complained of being used by Torrijos for political reasons

union's demand was out of sight." Along with wage increases "clearly higher than those granted in other industries," the association said, it offered to guarantee all health benefits, restore the UMW's health and pension funds and 'provide a contract right to deal fairly on both sides with wildcat strikes."

"Despite this offer, the UMW negotiators refused to move significantly from their incredibly high demands," the industry said.

With UMW President Arnold Miller and other top union officers scheduled to attend a union rally in Pittsburgh Sun-

day, the coal association said it decided to call off the negotiations. "Under all these circumstances, we can only con-clude that after 54 days of strike, the un-ion is not interested in settlement on any responsible basis," the management ne-

Union officials were not immediately

available for comment Although the strike has stopped only about half of the nation's coal production, it is beginning to have a growing impact, especially in the Appalachian states where electric utility companies are reporting diminished coal stockpiles.

The industry's statement was seen as an effort to bring increased public pressure on the union to reach a settlem

But the union rejected that proposal last Tuesday, and a new effort to reach in an agreement was made Thursday by the mediators, which led to the new industry to

## Lieutenant Governor's Race Worries New Mexico Democratic Leaders "It sounds like they're trying to invent an

A-J Correspondent SANTA FE — New Mexico's Democratic party leaders are worried about the crowded lieutenant governor's race, feeling the outcome may be determined virtually by the chance swing of a few

And the governor's race may hang in the outcome.

With so many relatively well-known office holders seeking the lieutenant governor's nomination, some party veterans feel, there'll be little chance for discerning Democrats among the rank-and-file to try to get a strong team to face likely Republican nominee Joe Skeen.

Among leading Democratic contenders are two women, one black, one Spanishsurnamed, one strongly avowed conservative, and others with strong ties to one economic or political faction or another.

Thre's one strong bloc of opinion that the number two nomination could go to the Spanish-surnamed candidate, Robert Mondragon, and that the electorate may be more receptive this year to an Anglo ticket.

Conversely, Mondragon supporters maintain he has proven strength - he was elected lieutenant governor in 1970 with running mate Bruce King and provided strength in Hispanic districts.

Another notion, expressed by an exceedingly well placed Democratic veteran, was that young state Senator Tom Rutherford of Albuquerque would add valuable strength among young, urban, liberal-to-moderate voters in Albuquerque's sprawling "Heights" area — but that Rutherford's potential bloc may be eroded by the late entry of former Sen.

Echols is not regarded as liberal as Rutherford, but he does have a certain amount of strength in that wing of the party and in outlying areas as well.



## **Psychiatric Treatment Planned For Inmate** Four Days Before Death, Deputy Says

ODESSA - An Ector County Sheriff's Department official said Sunday he was informed by his superiors four days after Larry Ortega Lozano's arrest that the inmate was to be committed to a state hospital for psychiatric treatment.

However, a Lozano family spokesman says they had been discouraged by the department from having the man committed, and no commitment papers were ever signed for transfer, according to Ector County Sheriff Elton Faught.

Lozano, whose death in the county jail on Jan. 22 is now the subject of an investigation by state and federal officials, was charged on Jan. 10 with three counts of aggravated assault against police officers, criminal mischief, driving at an unsafe speed, and resisting arrest.

The charges had been scheduled to be reviewed by an Ector County Grand Jury Jan. 23, the day after Lozano died.

Capt. Tommy McMeans of the Ector County Sheriff's Department told the Avalanche-Journal Sunday he believed Jan. 14 that the 27-year-old Mexican-American would soon be committed to Big Spring State Hospital for psychiatric

"I was told (by an official in the depart-

taken to a state hospital. I'm assuming that they meant Big Spring," McMeans

McMeans, who was on duty Jan. 14, said he recalled advising a local bondsman that there was no point in bonding Lozano since "commitment papers were in the works.

Lee Dallaire of A-1 Bonding Company in Odessa told the A-J that after conferring with the sheriff's department once on Jan. 13 and twice on Jan. 14, he was convinced that it was not worth bonding Lozano out of jail.

"It was useless at that point. We actually figured it would be Monday or Tuesday (Jan. 23 or 24) when he would be trans-

# Webb AFB Closing Not Disastrous

Avalanche-Journal Staff Until recent years, an abandoned military installation was gutted, then turned back to local authorities with no thought

It isn't that way today at Big Spring where Webb Air Force Base is in the final phasing down process after being closed as an Air Training Command facil-

Because recovery of the area and future compatible use of the buildings was a major consideration in closure, the expected economic disaster was not forth-

Instead, an economic upswing is gathering steam, spurred by townspeople awakened to the area's potential and aided by facilities ready for use

Only items designated "mission essential" or needed by another base are being removed from the base, Lt. Col. Ronald Miller, base closing officer, said.

Materials from non-appropriated funds establishments - clubs, exchanges, etc. - were allowed sold as not a part of the facility itself.

Everything else, including a salvage yard bulging at the seams with an estimated \$3 million in materials, is being left to expedite recovery. All sale of surplus cut off with the announcement of

"Not even a salt shaker has been removed from the dining facility," Miller

"The government certainly considered the economic recovery of the town. Everything is ready to move in."

And, industry has moved in, with more bidding to come aboard the base.

Lubbock Manufacturing Co., which moved in first, is overhauling fuel tankers, and is already expanding to manufacture parts for its parent company's use. Energy Efficient Corporation is making storm windows.

Cage Corporation is working on an electronics contract for the government. Able Construction is doing high pres-

sure sandblasting and painting of oil field Halliburton is readying a truck-driving training school and Cotton Machinery Co.

is setting up for compactors.

The Webb Bowling Lanes just reopened and the NCO Club has been leased to be turned into a disco.

Bids are coming in from many churches for the base chapel which will be occupied on the base instead of being moved. Howard County College has been grant-ed early access to the 30-bed hospital for

# Three-Fold Purpose Seen In Sadat Trip

CAIRO, Egypt (AP) — President Anwar Sadat's upcoming trip to the United States appears to have a three-fold purpose: ask U.S. leaders to put political pressure on Israel, lobby Congress for arms aid and sell his negotiating position to the American public.

Sadat is scheduled to huddle with President Carter in the secluded surroundings of Camp David, Md., Saturday and Sunday for discussions on the current status of Middle East peace negotiations. He also plans meetings with key members of Congress and the media.

Support Change Sought
Egyptian diplomats, legislators and newspapers are calling for a change in what they see as America's "blind support" of Israel militarily and its unwillingness to alienate a longtime political al-

The trip would be a real success should we succeed in changing the U.S. position," said a Sunday editorial in Al Gomhouria, one of Cairo's three leading daily newspapers.

We do not ask the Americans to take sides with us but we want a frank answer to this question: is the U.S. ready to defend Israel within its borders or is it ready to defend its expansions as well?" In a joint statement Saturday, the

## Hearings To Begin On FBI Nomination

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Senate Judiciary Committee opens hearings Monday on President Carter's nomination of William H. Webster to head the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

The nomination of Webster, now a judge of the 8th Circuit Court of Appeals, has prompted no open opposition in the Senate. He is expected to be cleared by the committee after a three-day hearing and then by the Senate.

Second Choice

Webster, 53, a Republican whose courtroom reputation has been one of evenhandedness, would succeed Clarence M. Kelley as FBI director.

Webster was Carter's second choice for the job. The first, U.S. District Judge Frank Johnson of Montgomery, Ala. turned down the nomination because of

The Senate could begin debate late this week on what may be the most emotional issue to face Congress this year.

The Senate Foreign Relations Committee plans to complete work Monday on the Panama Canal treaties, sending them to the floor for what is expected to be a lengthy fight. There actually are two treaties, but they are considered indivisi-

The committee approved the proposed treaties in the same form they were submitted by Carter. However, numerous efforts will be made on the Senate floor to amend them or to attach conditions aimed at ensuring perpetual U.S. defense of the canal, even after it is turned over to Panama at the end of the century.

In order to begin work on the treaties, the Senate may have to put aside a bill rewriting and restructuring federal crimi-

Senate leaders originally planned to finish that voluminous bill in two days. But the debate already has consumed seven days, and no end is in sight.

On the other side of the Capitol, the House Ways and Means Committee will hear Carter administration witnesses, led by Treasury Secy. Michael Blumenthal, outline the President's tax program.

The proposals already are under fire. Some Republicans say the tax cut that Carter wants - totaling \$25 billion in 1979 - is too small and would not offset the effects of inflation and increases in Social Security taxes.

Key Democrats, led by Rep. Al Ullman, chairman of Ways and Means, and Sen. Russell B. Long, who heads the Senate Finance Committee, say there is little chance Congress will approve some of the proposed tax revisions, which would mean higher taxes for various groups.

There have been so many queries about E bonds recently that I have decided to devote an entire column to answering them and, what's more, to get the Office of Public Affairs of the U.S. Savings Bonds Division, Department of the Treasury, to supply the answers. When one gets into complicated areas, there's nothing like presenting official answers. Many of the questions had to do with problems arising after the death of the E bond owner. Examples:

Q. If I buy a bond in my name (and pay for it myself) but list another person as co-owner or beneficiary merely as a convenience, does the bond become part of my estate if I die before the co-owner or

A. It depends upon whether the surviving owner originally paid for the bonds. If the survivor actually bought the bonds, then of course there is no inheritance tax. But if the surviving owner (or co-owner) did not originally pay for the bonds, then he is subject to his state's inheritance tax.

#### Q. May savings bonds be disposed of under the terms of an unprobated will?

A. Not directly. However, there's a procedure for distributing the bonds. It's spelled out in treasury Circular No. 530, Tenth Revision, dated Sept. 5, 1973, as amended, the consent of all heirs, as well as possible legatees, is ordinarily required. You can get a copy of this circular by writing to the Bureau of the Public, Debt, 200 Third Street, Parkerburg, West Virginia, 26101. (Warning: the language is detailed and legal.) This office will also send you information concerning the disposition of savings bonds. For basic savings bond information you may also write the Public Information Office, U.S. Savings Bonds Division, 1111 Twentieth St., N.W. Washington, D.C. 20226.

And finally, it won't hurt to remind E bond buyers that they have a chance on reporting - and paying taxes on - E bond interest.

You may offer to report interest annually (and include, it in your taxable income) or - as most investors do - defer any report of E bond interest earned until you cash in the bond (or they mature.)

If a youngster is the owner of the E bond, the first - the annual report procedure - could prove best since, by reporting the annual interest during the years the young owner has no taxable income anyway (or at least not enough income to require tax payments) the tax liability is worked off a little at a time and there is no taxable income when the youngster finally redeems the bonds. If, however, the owner is currently in a high tax bracket, it might prove best to delay the tax report until he cashes in the bonds, most likely in retirement, when his tax bracket will be lower.

HEARTLINE: Our car is in need of new tires. Can you give us any advice on purchasing new tires for it? My wife and I are on social security? S.T.

A. First, never choose a smaller size than those which came with the car. Tires should be replaced with the same size as recommended by the automobile or tire manufacturer. Different types and profiles of tires are not always interchangeable due to differences in load ratings, tire dimensions, fender clearances and rim sizes; particularly with older

Tires of different size construction and stages of wear may affect vehicle handling and stability. For best all-around car handling performance, tires of the same type or construction should be used on all four wheels with the exception of those for special service such as snow

While not recommended, it may be all right to mix your present tires with other size designations or constructions provided they are used in pairs on the same axle. Check the owner's manual or tire ons affixed to vehicle for automobile manufacturer's recommendations before you replace or mix tires.

When radial tires are used with blues or belted bias construction on the same vehicle, the radials must always be placed on the rear axle.

If selecting only a pair of replacement tires in the same size and construction as on the car, they should be put on the rear wheels for better traction, handling and extra protection against flats. A single new tire should be paired on the rear axle with the tire having the most tread depth of the other three.

A "Break-in" period is also recommend for all new tires - the tires on a new car, the spare put on after a flat, and all replacements. Limiting speed to 55 mph for the first 50 miles of driving enables the complex elements in a tire to adjust gradully and give top performance.

care at age 65. However, you should check very carefully with your company because many group policies will not cover employees over the age of 65.

You should sign up for the hospital portion of Medicare because this is free. The medical benefits are currently \$7.70 per month and for each year after the age of 65 that you do not take the medical benefits the premium will be increased by 10 per cent.

# Farmers Gain Americans' Sympathy

By 80-13 percent, an overwhelming majority of Americans is in sympathy with the farmers who have taken to their tractors to protest falling farm incomes. Moreover, by five to one the public supports the basic demand of the farmers. which is to raise the prices of the crops they sell so that they will be based on 100 percent of parity. This will guarantee them a profit and enable them to

Of course, the acid test of such public backing is whether consumers would be willing to pay higher food prices to relieve the plight of the farmer. Over the past few years, Harris Surveys have consistently shown that, along with energy and health, more than eight of every 10 Americans attribute their rising cost of living to the high cost of food. Indeed, in this latest survey of 1,259 adults nationwide, when asked how worried they would be about their own food costs' rising rapidly if farm prices were allowed to go up sharply, 35 percent said they were "greatly worried" and another 47 percent were "moderately worried."

Despite this, the public feels so strongly about the plight of the farmer that a 54-36 percent majority would be willing to have food prices rise by five percent in order to give farmers their parity goals. To be sure, when people were asked if they would be willing to see their food costs go up 10 percent, a 68-19 percent majority then said they would oppose the farmers' position.

However, accepting a five percent rise in food costs is not insignificant. There

are very few occasions these days when Americans express a willingness to pay more for any product or service.

Part of the reason for this deeply felt sympathy for the farmers can be traced to the fact that most people do not blame farmers for high food prices. By a lopsided 87-4 percent, a majority continues to agree with the charges of farm protest leaders that "food middlemen, rather than the farmers, are the ones who make most of the profits in food."

In many ways, these latest results are an unusual testimony to the fact that people do not behave strictly according to their own economic self-interest. Farmers are now fewer than four percent of the population. More than three out of every four Americans live in an essentially urban setting. Yet it is apparent that most people do not view the question as a simple matter of producer vs. consumer interests.

This becomes clear in a more detailed analysis of the pivotal question dealing

with people's willingness to see their food prices rise by five percent in order to give farmers 100 percent of parity in prices, a level that will insure them a profit

—Among people who live in big cities, a 48-37 percent majority favors parity, even if it means a five percent rise in their own food costs. To be sure, rural research

even if it means a five percent rise in their own tood costs. To be sure, rural residents support the move by a higher 60-33 percent. But the key fact is that in the big cities, the issue has not been cast as consumers against farm producers.

—Among union members, a high 59-33 percent majority would be willing to pay five percent more in food costs to give farmers their price goals. It is evident that union labor is capable of identifying with the plight of farmers, despite the long history of farm and labor union organizations' being at logger-

The most affluent and educated groups are also most supportive of the protesting farmers' movement. Among the college-educated, a 57-34 percent management of the college-educated and the college-educated and the college-educated are college-educated. jority is willing to pay five percent more for food costs, as is an even higher 62-29 percent majority of professionals. Among those with incomes of \$25,000 and over, willingness to pay more to see parity given to the farmers reaches a highwater mark of 63-33 percent.

It is evident that the plight of farmers has become a matter of conscience to millions of Americans. And their depth of conviction is such that they are willing to affect their own economic status to see what they feel is justice done for

## Private Dumpground **Approved By State Opens Near Airport**

After taking extra environmental precautions ordered by the state. J&G Waste Systems Inc. this weekend opened a private landfill near Lubbock International

John Giannattasio, owner of J&G, largest of the city's commercial trash-haulers, said he can assure neighboring landowners that his landfill operation will not be a threat to their water supply or

We are doing everything possible to make sure this will be a clean, model operation," said Giannattasio.

them," he added At a June 21 hearing conducted by the Texas Department of Health, some landowners protested J&G's application for the landfill, located about one mile west of the airport and one-half mile north of FM 2641. The City of Lubbock landfill al-

Billy Meyers, a cotton and grain farmer, and Roger Loter, who owns a restaurant and proposed residential development near the affected area, complained that if the private dumpground is anything like the city's, it will promote breeding of insects, spread of debris, erosion of property values and possible wa-

ter contamination. Loter claimed the new landfill could cost him as much as \$2 million.

However, state health authorities approved the application, saying there is a 'public need" for the trash-disposal site. But they attached "special provisions" to the permit to ensure that nearby water supplies will not be harmed.

Loter had hoped those provisions - including one that J&G be required to line its landfill pits with a denser material would prove so expensive that the project would be abandoned or relocated.

But I can understand the state wanting to be positive about the situation. We don't want to contaminate any underground water either. So we've gone ahead and are lining the pits," he said.

Giannattasio said he also complied with other state provisions, which include constructing a levee, monitoring water quality and taking care to control blown waste.

He said the state has given him the goshead to open the landfill.

The landfill, which will receive about 48 tons daily, is located on a 94-acre tract. J&G Waste Systems started making plans for a private waste-disposal site in 1976, when the City of Lubbock nearly tripled the fee commercial trash-haulers pay for using the municipal dumpground. J&G officials said they no longer want to

be at the mercy of the city. 'This landfill is really going to be a shot in the arm for us. It will allow us to control our costs," Giannattasio said.

Most of the protest over the J&G proposal was based on landowners' experiences with the existing municipal landfill. However, Giannattasio said that's an unfair comparison, because his operation will be "cleaner and more efficient than what the city has.

In fact, he said adjoining landowners actually may benefit from the new landfill. He said J&G will be removing some of the load on the municipal landfill, allowing city crews to concentrate more on controlling their own trash.

On hand for the recent AA meeting here were Childress Chamber of Commerce president Albert Helm and Mayor Pro Tem Walter Lockhoof.



You are not yet out of the auction— partner might be able to re-open the bidding. The only action you might consider is a double, but that is a risky venture with three low trumps

Dear Dr. Thosteson: My daughter is expecting her first child. She was told she has Rh-negative blood and might experience difficulty. How serious is this? What does the "Rh" mean? -R.R.M.

Veteran readers can skip this one.

Rh is a substance some people have in per cent of the Caucasion population has it. The figure is higher for non-Caucasians. They are Rh-positives. Those who don't have it are called "Rh-negatives." The initials "Rh" stand for the Rhesus monkey, used in experiments that led to an understanding of the problem in 1940.

Whenever the two kinds of blood (positive and negative) are mixed difficulties can arise, chiefly the destruction of red blood cells. This can occur when a negative mother carries a positive fetus. If the

father is positive, the fetus will have posi-

The problem usually emerges with the second or third pregnancy involving a negative mother and a positive father, but precautions are in order even during blood transfusion.) Dear Dr. Thosteson: If a woman wanted to have amniocentesis to detect a potential problem of the fetus, when should she have this done? -Mrs. G.D.

A recent issue (Nov. 30) of Patient Care touches on this in a panel discussion of the subject among several doctors.

Fifteen weeks is the suggested early date for meaningful results from amniocentesis (tapping the amniotic sac to obtain fluid for analysis). There is normally another two or three week wait for results. Before this time there may be insufficnet fluid surrounding the fetus and the uterus might not be large enough to allow the "tap." One of the doctor suggests 17 to 18 weeks as providing a margin for safety. Prior to 15 weeks there apparently are not sufficient numbers of cells in the fluid for adequate analysis of potential defects.

Dear Dr. Thosteson: If I smoked a pack of cigarets every day for ten years and then stopped, how long will it take for my

lungs to clean out? -P.A.

Like the man who beats himself over the head, stopping brings almost immediate relief. It may take a week for your cough to stop, but you will notice an almost immediate feeling of well-being. Within a week or two you might be able to climb a flight of stairs without huffing. Can't put any timetable on the lung matter. That, too, is a progressive proposition. Some may never "clear out" entirely, but the lungs you end up with will surely serve you better and longer.

Dear Dr. Thosteson: Can poor leg circulation cause brittle toenails? -M.W.

It can, and doctors can make a pretty fair analysis of circulatory problems by glancing at your feet. With ischemia (cir culation interruption) the toenails may appear brittle and opaque and there may

1/2 tsp. cinnamon Pastry for single crust pie 12 tbsp. milk Cheddar cheese

In a large bowl, mix together apples, cherries, sugars, flour, peel, juice and cinnamon. Spoon apple mixture into 10 x 6-inch oblong baking dish or shallow casserole. Set aside. Roll out pastry on lightly floured surface 1 and one-half inches larger than baking dish. Place pastry on filling. Trim and flute edge. Brush pastry with milk. Prick with fork or score several places. Bake in 400 degree oven for 45 minutes or until crust is golden brown and apples are fork-tender. Serve warm with Cheddar cheese. Makes 8 servings.

This latest Monterey team runs without reckless abandon, though. Nothing gets very reckless or careless around the Plainsmen coach if he can avoid it.


CHECK YOUR STANCE

Many skiers ski with their hips twisted into the hill. Years ago this was the accepted basic stance. Today, however skis turn much more easily (thanks partly to stiffer and higher boots), necessitating a less powerful, more natural stance.

Check out your own ski position. Would lines drawn across the tips of your skis, feet, knees, hips and shoulders be parallel to each other? Or into the hill on a separate plane? If your own stance resembles Figure

A, you are probably having difficulty holding an edge in your turns since the countered hip position encourages knees to face away from the hill. This, in turn, forces your skis to flatten and side-slip throughout your turns. In Figure B, skis, feet, knees and hips are aligned on the same plane. In this

neutral stance, edging is much easier. In modern skiing, the hip still provides a powerful turning force, but its movements should follow knee and ankle movements in the same plane for optimum edging and control.

# **Maris Comes Out Of Hiding**

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) - His waistline has thickened with the years but time's passage, most obviously, has peeled away the top layer of his bitter-

"I read the other day," Roger Maris said with a wry smile, "where some guy wrote, 'If he hadn't hit 61 home runs he'd be driving the truck now instead of owning it.'

"I got a big chuckle out of that one."

Chuckles rarely came to the man who committed the sacrilege of breaking Babe Ruth's single-season home run record. And he still feels the historic fist home run he slammed in the last regular season game in October, 1961, was cheapened by the asterisk then-commissioner Ford Frick attached to it.

But he now looks upon his rocky career as just a part of an era - the

wrong era for tampering with idols of Ruthian proportion.

"It was the times," the former Yankee slugger said Saturday prior to making his first appearance at a baseball awards dinner since 1962.

Baseball was rolling along on an even keel. Then Mickey (Mantle) and I started hitting some home runs and sort of shaking things up. People just weren't ready to accept it. The times were't right.

"It was like the Vietnam War. We've had wars in the past, but the times weren't right for that one. And the times weren't right for me to break "The press got on me after the 1962 season and swayed the fans away from me," he said. "I would go to a baseball dinner and stay three hours after it was over, signing autographs. I'd be the last one to leave. Then I'd read in the paper that I had refused to sign autographs. That's when I stopped going to these things."

the paper that I had refused to sign autographs. That's when I stopped going to these things."

Maris, who was given a special nostalgia award at the Kansas City dinner Saturday night, said he was coaxed to the affair by Royals Manager Whitey Herzog, an old friend, and his fond memories of playing days in Kansas City. "This was the only city I wasn't getting booed in," he recalled. "After the 1962 season I decided a lot of baseball fans worked in factories because I was always getting things like nuts and washers and bolts thrown at me."

Now the owner of a beer distributorship in Gainesville, Fla., Maris says he's not bitter about the asterisk. His only regret, he says, is that his accomplishment could have helped baseball if baseball had let it.

"Ford Frick threw a lot of tarnish on it with the asterisk. It could have done a lot for the game, helped build interest and all. But instead baseball chose to tarnish it. It could have helped baseball.

Maris has no doubt that someday somebody is going to come along and hit more than 61 home runs.

"Sure, it's going to happen. Records are meant to be broken and that one will be broken, too. If it happened today it would be accepted a lot better. I

#### Kennedy Woos AMA

CHICAGO (AP) - Sen, Edward Kennedy, D-Mass., leader of the drive for national health insurance, told leaders of the American Medical Association that they were "naysayers," then offered to create "a new and more effective relationship."

He said he was offering "an olive branch" because no national health care program can be adopted by Congress "if it is resisted by the overwhelming majority of practicing

Kennedy is sponsor of a bill that calls for payroll deductions to finance a health care system similar to Social Security for Americans of all ages. The AMA has strongly opposed Kennedy's proposal, saying it would involve too much government regulation of the medical profession.

We may well find, to our mutual surprise and benefit, that neither one of us is quite what the other thought he was," the Massachusetts Democrat told the AMA's National Leadership Conference Saturday.

## Bird Brings Suit In Hawaii

HONOLULU (AP) - A bird - a palila bird, to be specific - is suing Hawaii's department of land and natural re-

The palila, an endangered Hawaiian species, is listed as the plaintiff in a federal lawsuit requesting the removal of goats and sheep from the birds' environment on the slopes of the Mauna Kea volcano.

The lawsuit was filed on the birds' behalf by the Sierra Club, the Audubon Society and a museum expert on Hawaiian birds.

The defendant controls most of Mauna Kea's slopes on

the island of Hawaii.

The suit asks that sheep and goats be removed in the area between 7,000-and 10,000-feet above sea level on Mauna Kea. The animals are accused of eating the sprouts of oung trees on which the rare birds feed.

LANSING, Mich. (AP) - Actress Elizabeth Taylor will be the featured attraction at a dinner to raise money for the Michigan Republican Party.

Party leaders, looking for a new approach to party fundraising, persuaded the Academy Award-winning actress to attend the March 9 event.

Former President Gerald Ford, a native of Michigan, has been a fixture at GOP money-raising events in the state, but "You can only expect people to get excited about meeting Jerry so many times," one party leader said Saturday.

The fundraiser, scheduled for the Long Convention Center, should attract 1,200 people at \$150 a head, William Sederburg, chairman of the Ingham County Republican Party, estimated.

## Control Effort Cuts VD

ATLANTA (AP) - Sexual sleuths, tracking gonorrhea and syphilis from partner to partner, helped make 1977 the first year in two decades in which the number of cases for both venereal diseases declined.

But gains in the war on VD could be wiped out if fighters fall prey to the complacency that stifled past efforts, warns Dr. Paul Wiesner, director of venereal disease control at the national Center for Disease Control The 1977 figures are 996,883 gonorrhea

cases, down from 1,002,098 the year before, and 20,447 primary and secondary syphilis cases, down from 23,724. Wiesner said the drop had a lot to do with another figure - the \$32 million Congress spent on VD control last year, the most ever.

"The figures reflect the control effort." Wiesner said in an interview. Compare graphs of federal grants with those of incidence of sexually transmitted diseases 'and you'll see that as one goes up, the other goes down," he said. Wiesner noted that President Carter has proposed continuing the \$32 million appropriation.

He said much of the grant money has gone to hire and train sexual sleuths "to work with people who might have been infectious and exposed other people

"They have to be sure those people get

through new sexual contacts. They have to assist them to get their sex problems treated. Most important, he said, there's the tricky problem of getting them to identi-

fy sexual partners. You have to be able to relate to people," Wiesner said. "And you need train-

ing that takes a lot of time and a lot of The federal money goes to states and big cities based on factors that include

poverty levels and reports of VD in those areas. Wiesner said. State and local clinics often concentrate on diagnosis and treatment, and when they combine with federally supported prevention efforts "it does a lot to heighten the awareness by the general public," he said

## TV To Eye World Of Women

WASHINGTON (AP) - A new weekly series on public television starting Monday night explores the constantly changing world of today's women - at home and on the job - and of the men in

Called "Turnabout," it uses a magazine-type format combining live interviews, filmed reports, practical advice from experts, book reviews and other ef-

There are interviews with celebrities: singer Beverly Sills, actress-ambassador Shirley Temple Black, tennis star Billie Jean King, actress Shirley MacLaine, anthropologist Laura Nader, singer Nancy Wilson and others.

The program is conducted by Gerri Lange, a San Francisco television personality who was seen for two years on a similar program called "Womantime & Co." over KQED-TV there. It won two Emmy awards and other honors.

Lange, 53, divorced and the mother of three sons, was named the woman broadcaster of the year last year by American Women in Radio and Broad-

She said she found during the airing of the local program that many women listeners wanted their husbands to see it as well, so it has been scheduled by the Public Broadcasting Service for 10:30 p.m. EST on Monday nights. Local stations may choose to air it at different

Produced at KQED by a team of seven women, it is funded by the 148 PBS stations and a grant from Lane Bryant, Inc., the firm's first commitment to a television series.

This brought some conflicting advice to Lange, a trim black woman. She said in an interview that her head cameraman wants her to lose five pounds while Lane Bryant, which specializes in maternity clothes and larger sizes, thinks


she should gain five. "It's not just a woman's show, although it's done from a woman's viewpoint," she said of the series. "The themes are not just intuitive things - a lot of study has gone into it."

Thus one of the 26 programs will deal with dress on the job and off; another with juggling of personal and professional lives; others with adapting to motherhood or divorce, sex stereotyping, finance. losing weight and so on.

There is a visit to the Golden Door in Escondido, Calif., where for \$1,200 a week 30 clients enjoy facials, hand and foot care, saunas, massages and steam and whirlpool baths while exercising and eating low-calorie meals prepared by a French chef.

The third show focuses on a group of former Roman Catholic nuns who left to form an independent religious community, a female Episcopalian priest, and a woman rabbi.

Other programs deal with such things as personal safety and how to avoid rape, and personal finances for both single and married women.

# Public Service Important To Eva Bennett

SEMINOLE - After the dirty welcome Eva Bennett received when she moved here from Bono in East Texas, it was tough to stay on to become one of the county's outstanding citizens.

When Mrs. Bennett and her husband moved into a new home on their 160 acre farm here in 1928, they were met by a blinding sandstorm that lasted seven It finally cleared off and the dirt had piled up inside the house so I shoveled

it out," says Mrs. Bennett. But the next day the sand started blowing again and she started to cry. Her husband offered to move to New Mexico "where the sand doesn't blow."

but Mrs. Bennett said, "I've fixed this place up and I'm not going to fix up an-So then he told her they could move back to East Texas "where it rains and

gets muddy. "No," Mrs. Bennet answered quickly. "I've scraped enough mud out of the house.

"Well then," her husband said philosophically. "Let's stay here." Mrs. Bennett had to agree. "I guess we will," she told him.

And Gaines County is glad she did. Her tireless county and community service since moving here have earned her widespread regard and appreciation.

"Grandma Bennett Day" was declared here Feb. 1, 1976, and she recently was named "Outstanding Citizen" in Seminole by the Chamber of Commerce.

The last two years, the State of Texas has honored her "In appreciation for

continuous contributions and unselfish services rendered to the community.

At 84, (her birthday was Monday), she continues that commitment. She presently works as a Pink Lady at a local hospital where she operates a gift shop. She makes gifts for the patients and often visits with every one of them every-

She also works for a local nursing home, helping with therapy and teaching arts and crafts. She also helps teach arts and crafts at a senior citizen center here. She has been asked to do the same at a senior citizen home in Denver City

She makes many of her gift shop items at home from refuse brought in by neighbors. "I'm always looking for something different to make," she says. She used to give away the things she made before her husband died. Since then she's had to start charging "just enough to get my money back."

She also oversees her farm which has now grown to 668 acres, and she'll provide free taxi service for anyone that needs the lift. "I take anyone anyplace they

Mrs. Bennett belongs to the Live Long and Like It Club and is in her 61st year of Sunday school teaching. She is in a musical group called the Hot Shots that has played several gigs in the Lamesa and the Midland-Odessa area. In between, there are parties and games to attend and of course there is Home Demo

She helped bring Home Demonstration to the county. It was an important information link to what at that time was pretty much the lone prairie. "The population around here then 40 or 50," Mrs. Bennett says. The first paved roadway

was not to come through until 1933.

There was a county agent but no home agent for Home Demonstration in Gaines County when Mrs. Bennett first arrived. She had worked with Home Demonstration back in Bono since 1925, when it was first started. So she traveled around the county with the county agent, passing along various helpful hints to the county's widely scattered residents.

"The county agent would help neighbors kill beef and show them how to cut it up," explained Mrs. Bennett. However, the county agent didn't know how to can, so Mrs. Bennett and another lady went along to help. "We were the only persons in the county with a cooker.

Eventually, she helped establish nine home agents in the county. She also helped start up Home Demonstration fairs that she says eventually evolved into the fairs we have come to know.

Mrs. Bennett says it has been a blessing to spend her life in public service and that she has learned a lot from it.

However, she notes, "The only thing I haven't learned to do is say no."

However, he said he didn't know whether nuclear-equipped satellites could be banned effectively. Schlesinger was commenting on the Soviet spy satellite which fell from orbit Tuesday with a nuclear reactor aboard.

Meanwhile, U.S. and Canadian search officials said they believe radioactive debris from the Soviet satellite has been pinpointed in Northwest Canada

He was asked whether the United

the Soviet Union to prohibit nations from sending up nuclear reactors with their earth-orbiting vehicles.

"I would prefer to leave that particular question to the Department of State," he replied. "But there are serious hazards. and I regard it as inappropriate to have nuclear reactors orbiting the earth.

"I think that if all powers were to agree on that, that such events could be avoided in the future, but there's no possibility of that unless the Soviets were to agree to cease using this particular form of satelcould be worked out.

"That is not part of international law." he said

On Friday, President Carter criticized the Soviet Union for not supplying the United States with more information about the failing nuclear-powered spy satellite. However, he conceded that Soviet officials gave the United States "about what we would have given them under a similar circumstance.

Carter said it was likely that questions raised by the satellite failure would be brought up in diplomatic discussions with the Soviets. But he did not suggest that nuclear reactors be banned from earth-orbiting satellites.

Schlesinger said Sunday that 78 U.S. officials were working with the Canadians to determine whether a radiation hazard exits in the Northwest Territories.

Canadian officials had said earlier that planes detected high levels of radiation in several areas, but later reported the readings were caused by malfunctioning equipment. Scientists said Friday they believed the Soviet satellite - Cosmos 954 - burned up in the high atmosphere and they expected to find no debris on the ground.

Schlesinger, however, said U.S. officials have discovered ground-level radiation. "We have had two firm contacts with radiation," he said.

Bill Nelson, a University of California scientist, said Saturday that scientists still feel radioactivity detected at Dubawnt Lake, 186 miles southwest of Baker Lake, was of non-natural origin. He said another reading that still must be checked was found near Fort Reliance, about 200 miles west of Dubawnt Lake.

Schlesinger noted that the United States conducted "one experiment" in 1965 involving a space vehicle orbiting with nuclear equipment and that the program was halted.

'We do have some radioactive heat sources that we use for our longer-distance planetary probes," he said. "These stand re-entry and would not break up."

# Fountain of Youth Discovered By Little Known Civilization Over 2300 Years Ago

(Canton, Ohio) They still exist isolated from the world where they live to be 120 to 140 years old. They have no cancer, heart attacks or other major disorders to speak of. They are active and fit to the very end. Men father children at 100 years and older. Overweight people are unheard of for they have the perfect weight control system.

National Geographic Magazine sponsored a research trip by author Franc Shor and published a story on Hunza. Lowell Thomas, Jr. visited Hunza and featured the Hunza people in his motion picture documentary, "Search for Paradise". Thomas then invited the Mir (ruler) of Hunza, Mohammed Jamal Khan, to visit the United States.

For his work and experiments he chose albino rats. Rats are largely used in nutritional laboratories because they love all human food. Their span of life is short, so their whole life history can be observed.

For the first phase of his experiment, Dr. McCarrison chose healthy rats, then placed them in good conditions, with fresh air, sunlight, comfort and cleanliness. He chose their diet from foods eaten regularly by the

In this experiment almost 1,200 rats were watched from birth to the twenty-seventh month, an age in the rat which corresponds to that of about lifty years in a man. At this stage the Hunza - diet - fed rats were killed and carefully examined. Mc-Carrison's report was remarkable:

During the past two and a quarter years there has been no case of illness in this "universe" of albino rats, no death from natural causes in the adult stock, and, but for a few accidental deaths, no infantile mortality. Both clinically and at postmortem, examination of this stock has been shown to be remarkably free from disease. It may be that some of them have cryptic disease of one kind or another, but if so, I have failed to find either clinical or microscopical


