Humphrey Services Planned

ST. PAUL, Minn. (AP) - The powerful with whom Hubert H. Humphrey served so long, and the humble whom he served with such boundless energy, are paying final tribute to the Minnesota senator.

Vice President Walter F. Mondale, a fellow Minnesotan and a Humphrey protege, accompanied the senator's body and the Humphrey family on the return trip to Minnesota for today's funeral.

President Carter, who led the tributes at a memorial service in the U.S. Capitol on Sunday, also planned to fly here for

Humphrey's body lay in state in a flagdraped coffin in the rotunda of the Minnesota Capitol while, through the night, the people who elected him five times to the Senate slowly walked by. Many wept

By midmorning more than 20,000 persons had filed past the coffin, including many state employees who were given time off from work. A line began forming outside the state

Capitol at noon Sunday - more than two hours before Air Force One, the presidential jet, carried Humphrey's body home from Washington, where it had lain in state since Saturday.

The temperature never rose above the mid-teens, and during the night it dropped below zero.

But despite the frigid temperatures, the people waited. They sang "America the Beautiful." "God Bless America" and "We Shall Overcome." They waited for their turn to pay silent farewell to the man who retained his optimism and enthusiasm despite bitter political setbacks, and even through the long agony of a losing fight against cancer

"He had a little more love for people. for all of us." said one mourner when asked what it was about Humphrey that brought so many people out in the cold to pay tribute to him.

At the memorial service in Washington, President Carter summed it up, calling Humphrey "the most beloved of all

Americans. Former Presidents Gerald R. Ford and Richard M. Nixon, and Lady Bird Johnson, widow of President Lyndon B. Johnson, were among the mourners who heard Carter say: "We and our families are here today to testify that Hubert Humphrey may well have blessed our

Over Raises

Court today upheld a lower court's ruling that the way members of Congress have given themselves pay raises is constitu-

The court's ruling removes the possibility that members of Congress could have seen their annual salaries shrink from a current \$57,500 level to \$42,500.

The justices affirmed without comment a decision by a three-judge panel here that the methods, as provided in two laws, are constitutional.

In other actions today, the court:

- Rejected the appeal of a Texas man sentenced to die in the electric chair for the 1975 shotgun murder of a Fort Worth grocery store clerk. The court let stand rulings by Texas courts that Billy Joe Battie received a fair trial.

- Set aside a lower-court ruling that the federal government had contended would obliterate its efforts to eliminate water pollution.

- By a 5-2 vote, left intact South Carolina's use of standardized tests to hire teachers and set their salaries, a procedure the federal government contended discriminates against blacks.

- Let stand a lower court's ruling that International Business Machines Corp. violated federal antitrust laws by refusing to sell equipment to a competitor in the computer-leasing field.

- Refused to consider arguments by an Alabama firm that black employees suing the company for alleged discrimination should not be permitted to offer as evidence statistics showing that most blacks were kept in lower-paying jobs.

The salary laws were challenged by Rep. Larry Pressler, R-S.D., who wanted to force Congress to vote for every pay hike its members receive.

Justice William H. Rehnquist, in a brief concurring opinion to the court's action, said the affirmance could reflect the court's belief that Pressler was not legally entitled to sue Congress, or could mean that the high court agreed with the three-judge panel on the merits of Pres-

Mennonites On Plains **Get Delay**

Avalanche-Journal Staff Most of the Seminole-area Mennonites have received a year's extension on the time they may stay in the United States, a U.S. Immigration and Naturalization Service official said today.

Jan. 31 had been the official date set for the beginning of deportation proceed-

ings against many of the Mennonites INS official Jerry Goodman said today, however, that the departure date has been extended to February, 1979.

"That encompasses the majority of the heads of households there and their families. There are a few who have come in since the legislation was introduced and

they would not fall under it," he said. He referred to Senate Bill 2180 intro-duced by Sens. Lloyd Bentsen of Texas and James Eastland of Mississippi. It would grant special immigration status to the Mennonites who came here from Mexico and Canada, if they could not satisfy immigration regulations under normal circumstances.

The bill is in the Senate Judiciary Com-

"The bill is just sitting here waiting to see how things work out. But no action probably will need to be taken, since the INS is not going to enforce their departure," a committee spokesman said.

About 150 German-speaking Mennonite families began pouring into the Seminole area a year ago. The Me sought religious freedom and also feared land confiscation and other economic problems in Mexico.

The Canadians were drawn because of the long growing season here, and because there were large tracts of land available for them to settle into the selfcontained communities they like to pro-

tect their church-oriented society. They wanted to obtain permanent visas, and work toward U.S. citizenship.

The group invested several million dollars in farm land and equipment, and planned to establish fruit and vegetable canning factories, dairies, cabinet-making and machine shops. Problems quickly developed, however,

Resignation Of Robison Disclosed

The City of Lubbock is seeking its third animal shelter director in two years. Citing personal reasons, Jim Robison has resigned the position, effective today. He is now manager of a company that markets industrial tools.

Hugh Akard, assistant chief animal warden, will be acting director until a permanent replacement is found. During his two-year tenure, Robison in-

curred the wrath of the Lubbock Humane Society and initiated new animal control measures at the pound. Only six months after he took office in

easly 1976, the humane society railed against shelter conditions and demanded Robison's resignation. Society members claimed that animals

were mistreated, that the gas chamber was ineffective in providing a humane death and that Robison was only using the shelter directorship as a stepping stone to another job.

Robison discounted most of the society's contentions of mistreatment and animal neglect. He did acknowledge, however, that lack of funds prevented him from improving the shelter as much as he

During his term, the decrepit gas chamber was repaired, a rigid training program for control wardens was continued and relations with the humane society were improved.

Lawmen today were pressing their search for the killer or killers of a 19year-old college student shot during a convenience store robbery late Sunday. Bruce Darrell Kelley, who lived on the

Lubbock Christian College campus, was pronounced dead about 11 p.m. by Justice of the Peace Wayne LeCroy at Vera's Grocerette on W. 4th Street. The store is about three miles west of Loop 289. The young clerk had begun the job only

four days earlier, and ironically, Sunday was his first time to work alone. According to Lubbock County Sheriff's

Department Chief Deputy Albert Smith,

ing a robbery at the store. Lawmen were notified of the incident after custo opened the front door and called for the clerk. A woman said she looked around and saw part of the body, ran outside to her companions and went to call police.

> Another woman said she entered the small market, noticed change scattered over the counter and turned to the back of the building to see if the clerk was there. WASHINGTON (AP) - As Jimmy Carter reaches the end of his first year in the Oval Office, the American people give his work the lowest marks of his term, an Associated Press-NBC News

Even Carter's seven-nation foreign tour failed to improve his showing, except for a slight increase in the rating of his for-

About 57 percent of those interviewed rated his overall job performance "only fair" or "poor," the poll taken last week

Only 41 percent rated Carter's performance as excellent or good. The remaining 2 percent were undecided.

The telephone survey of 1,604 Americans last Tuesday and Wednesday found the slide in Carter's popularity that started last summer continued into the first weeks of 1978. The rating of Carter's performance, as

measured by NBC News polls, began at a high level in his first weeks in office, only to slide by last April. Then Carter's trip to England and a summit conference of Western leaders in

early May helped boost his positive rating to 61 percent, while 37 percent of those questioned gave him negative marks. Even Carter's nine-day, seven-nation tour that opened 1978 did not boost his

overall rating, as foreign trips often do

for American presidents. His January marks were slightly below those registered in an AP-NBC News poll in late November. In that sampling, 43 percent rated his performance excellent or good while 54 percent said his work was only fair or poor. The seven-nation journey apparently

New Orleans Gives Tut Jazz Funeral

NEW ORLEANS (UPI) - Jazz is so much a part of this town, it was the logical way to bid goodbye to King Tut.

With the Olympia Brass Band in the lead, New Orleans marked the final hours of the Treasures of Tutankhamun Sunday by staging a traditional jazz funeral procession outside the museum.

"Everyone feels it was the perfect way to say goodbye to Tut in New Orleans, the only city in the country that could do it in the same fun manner," said John Bullard, the museum director who twirled a black umbrella as he marched alongside the band.

The procession was held at noon, 12

hours before the exhibit was to close. Attendance during the four-month stay approached 900,000, about double the adv-

sorrowful, with the band playing typical funeral dirges such as "A Closer Walk with Thee." The band marched to the steps of the museum, paused briefly, then turned and broke into several lively tunes on the return walk. A crowd of more than 5,000, including

Since the report's publication, comments have been received from a variety of groups concerned with architecture, planning, historic preservation, parking, the neighborhood and congressional space needs.


Carroll said the possibility of moving the court had attracted "keen interest and not too much opposition."

But a successful crusade by Taft prompted Congress to appropriate \$10 million to construct a new building. Its completion ended the court's nearly 150year search for a permanent, separate

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
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

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Many Americans Turning To Contact Lenses

Associated Press Writer Vanity, comfort and convenience are prompting a growing number of Americans to turn to contact lenses to correct vision problems.

There are two major types of contact lenses on the market — hard and soft. Although the soft lenses were not introduced in the United States until 1971, they have grown rapidly in popularity as manufacturers eliminated earlier problems. The American Optometric Association estimates that 42 percent of the contacts prescribed in 1976 were soft lenses.

Each type of lens has its advantages and disadvantages. Some people cannot wear contacts at all.

Hard contact lenses are made of a clear, acryllic plastic which maintains its shape. They are about a third of an inch in diameter and partially cover the cornea - the clear outer covering in front of the colored part of the eye. They are held in place by the surface tension of the eye's natural tear fluid.

Soft contact lenses are slightly larger than hard lenses and many people find them much more comfortable. They are made of liquid-absorbing plastic which, when wet, is flexible and conforms to the surface of the eye. For this reason, soft lenses may not be suitable for treatment of problems like astigmatism which involves an irregularity in the shape of the cornea.

Contact lenses have certain advantages over eyeglasses. They provide more natural and realistic vision, they move with the eye so the wearer is always looking through the center of the lens where vision is best. Contacts do not get spattered with rain or interfere with sports activities. And, except on close examina-

They do, however, require careful care. Wearers have to carry special solutions with them for emergencies. Contacts also require getting used to and there may be some initial discomfort. They are vulnerable to damage — and loss. And they generally cannot be worn for more than 16 or 18 hours at a time.

Research is under way on materials and designs that would be wearable for 24 hours a day, but these experimental lenses have not yet been approved for sale by the Food and Drug Administration.

The initial cost of hard contact lenses, according to the American Optometric Association, is usually between \$150 and \$225, which includes professional fees, a vision examination, the lenses themselves and a number of follow-up visits to the doctor. For soft lenses, the initial cost is between \$250 and \$350.

Hard lenses generally last longer. The optometrists' group says they can be worn for 10 years or more, although the average person usually loses at least one lens long before that. The average replacement rate for soft lenses is one

You should go to a specialist for contact lenses. They cannot be made from eyeglass prescriptions. Ask about fees in advance. Find out exactly what the price includes and what sort of refund policy there is if, after a period of time, you decide you cannot or do not want to wear the lenses.

Beware of anyone who "pushes" contact lenses instead of eyeglasses. You need a strong motivation in order to adjust to lenses; you can expect the doctor

to question you carefully about why you want lenses. It takes time for the eye to adapt to contact lenses. The eye must get used to some amount of friction, to a different way of getting oxygen to the cornea and to exchanging the tears held underneath the lens. Wearers may suffer from watery eyes, burning, redness, swelling and unclear vision at first. Report problems to your doctor.

Caring for lenses can be a nuisance, but it is essential. Both hard and soft lenses can be contaminated by bacteria if they are not properly cleaned and stored. When practical, contact lenses should be handled with clean hands and over a clean towel. If you have to handle the lens with unwashed hands, clean the lens

before putting it on the eye. Fingernails can damage contacts, scratching the hard variety and tearing the soft lenses. Learn to be careful.

Consumers should follow cleaning instructions provided by the doctor. Hard lens wearers will need three special solutions: a soaking solution in which lenses are stored, a cleaning solution to get rid of contaminants and a wetting solution to keep the lens clean while it is being applied and to help make it more

The optometric group says, "There are some all-in-one solutions on the market for hard lens wearers, but many optometrists find these less satisfactory."
The optometrists also recommend against mixing solutions from different man-

Soft lenses are usually disinfected by heating them in a salt solution. They also may be disinfected by being stored overnight in a chemical solution and rinsed in the solution in the morning. Find out what type of cleaning procedure is recommended for the lens you select and stick to it.

Executive Of TVA To Testify In Suit Against Westinghouse

of the Tennessee Valley Authority was scheduled to be called as an adverse witness today in the \$2.5 billion damage suit against Westinghouse Electric Corp. for its alleged reneging on uranium supply contracts.

Two utilities which do not have signed fuel agreements with the reactor manufacturer spent six hours Saturday trying to strengthen their claim against the de-

In cross examination of Westinghouse's Walter J. Dollard, counsel for Long Island Lighting Co. and Houston Lighting Power Co. focused specifically on how and when their clients were notified Westinghouse felt it had no obligation to supply uranium.

Ten utilities have sued Westinghouse for reneging on contracts to supply uranium to fuel reactors it had sold them. The case is being heard without a jury by U.S. District Judge Robert R. Merhige Jr.

Besides Long Island and Houston they are Texas Utilities, South Carolina Electric, Florida Power Light, Alabama Power, Northeast Utilities, Virginia Electric Power Co. and the TVA.

Alabama Power and Westinghouse agreed early in the trial to an out-of-court settlement that has been approved by U.S. District Judge Robert R. Merhige Jr. Texas Utilities and Westinghouse

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. In letters to the U.S. Olympic Committee made available to UPI Sunday, the FTC said the situation "could have the potential for undermining the respect for amateur athletics and the fairness of commercial competition.

The case was disclosed by a newsletter 'FTC Watch" which obtained the letters, sent by the commission to the Olympic Committee and to lawvers representing the swimming suit company, Speedo International Limited of Palo Alto, Calif.

The FTC, the letters revealed, told the company Jan. 3 it had conducted an antitrust investigation and was closing the case because it felt no action by the government was warranted. But the agency told the firm it was turning over to the Olympic Committee some of the information it uncovered.

In a letter to Col. F. Don Miller, executive director of the U.S. Olympic Committee in New York, the FTC said the situation "may give rise to the appearance of a conflict of interest."

The letter continued: 'Information provided to the FTC in the course of this investigation indicates that the U.S. Olympic Committee selects team uniforms for both the men's and women's swim teams representing the United States in Olympic competition.

Deep In Hurt Of Taxes

AMERICA HAS got its taxes in an uproar. The undercurrent against taxation has been nothing less than astonishing," economist Milton Friedman told The Wall Street Jour-

In fact, moves are underway in some areas to place mandatory limits on the amount of money that can be raised through taxation.

Forty-two of the nation's state legislatures, sans Texas', are scheduled to convene this year, and tax issues figure to be of concern to many of them.

LOCAL AND state tax collections rose to \$174.2 billion in the fiscal year that ended last June 30, an increase of \$18. billion (or 2 per cent) over the previous year's total.

Furthermore, additional increases are likely in the current fiscal year, but voter resistance to state and local taxes is mounting.

California Gov. Edmund G. Brown, for example, has set Jan. 27 as a "good target date" for the legislature to send him a bill to provide property-tax relief.

Such a measure was considered last year, but the lawmakers adjourned before com-

pleting action on it. Among other things, the legislation would provide for a state takeover of local welfare costs paid for by property taxes and an increase in the homeowner property tax exemption from the first \$1,750 to the first \$2,500 of assessed valuation.


While passage of a tax-relief bill might take some of the momentum out of the campaign for the initiative, if California voters approve the June ballot proposal, it would take precedence as state law.

ANTI-TAX sentiment also is strong in Massachusetts. A group there called Citizens for Limited Taxation already has gathered more than enough signatures to place a proposal on the state ballot in 1980.

The proposal would limit state spending -and thus taxes-to about 9 per cent of personal income in Massachusetts (the average percentage of personal income the state collected in taxes during the past three years).

If the California and Massachusetts tax proposals are approved, other states may be encouraged to institute similar plans.

Isn't that right, Texas?





The cost: 10 cents a letter, three cents less than the U.S. Postal Service.

MRS. BRENNAN got the idea for her service after she was angered when it took a letter from a friend 13 days to arrive from Pocatello, Idaho. But the Brennan's crime wave has been ended, for now anyway. The Republic is no longer men-

aced, at least for the time being. Federal District Judge Jarold Bruke has upheld the U.S. Postal Service's legal monopoly on firstclass mail and the Brennans have been ordered to cease and desist, as they say. In his brief, crime-buster Houlihan says:

'In terms of emotionalism, of children, I'd say this is about the worst I've ever seen," said Roy Kane of Elkin, a veteran of 40 years with rescue squads.

Kane was there in the darkness Saturday night when the bodies of Lisa Diane Hutson, 14, her sisters Sheila Anne, 12 and Patricia Lynn, 9; and brother and sister Linda Wood, 12, and Brad Wood, 8, were pulled from the icy water.

Funerals for the Wood children will be at 2 p.m. today at a funeral home chapel in nearby Dobson. Services for the Hutson children will be Tuesday afternoon at a Baptist church at the neighboring town of Jonesville.

Dentists Study Decay Vaccine

BOSTON (UPI) - Significant progress is being made in development of a vaccine to prevent tooth decay, says Dr. David Scott, director of the National Institute of Dental Research.

Scott told a group of dentists and technicians at the third annual Yankee Dental Congress: "It's a long way down the pike ... until all the safety testing is complete, but there's good evidence now for antibacterial approach.

He said dentists already have concluded the same bacterial organism which causes sore throats causes most tooth decay and gum disease.

Vaccines have been successful in rats and monkeys, but it will be at least two years before they can be tested on humans, Scott said.

MOSCOW (AP) - A new "hot line" satellite system designed for greater reliablility than existing cable and high-frequency radio links went into full operation today between Moscow and Washington, the U.S. Embassy announced.

Payroll Snag Hits Schools

CLEVELAND (AP) - Officials are again struggling to meet the school system payroll, and they hope to get funds from the state to tide them over.

If the money — to be provided from real estate taxes and state foundation payments - does not arrive in time, however, the 11,000 school employees may be asked to wait a few days to be paid, according to George Dobrea, school board finance chairman.

Dobrea said he expects the state money earmarked for Cleveland to arrive slightly ahead of schedule.

Financial problems have continued to plague the school system. Last Thursday the system's clerk-treasurer announced the school board would not be able to meet Friday's \$5 million payroll. It is the second time during this school year that the system's ability to meet its payroll has been in doubt.

Earlier last week, the school administration recommended \$6 million in cuts to help the system get through the year. However the schools face at least a \$30 million deficit and board members sent the staff back to develop recommendations that would further lessen the defi-



Shatalov said it now will be possible to make room for more important sophisticated equipment" in the station ship. And specialists could fly to the station to perform one experiment and then return


to earth, he said. In the future, Shatalov continued, ferry craft could also bring back materials that must be analyzed quickly on the ground before decisions affecting the future of the mission could be made.

Shatalov said another possibility was taking raw materials into space, using them in experiments and returning the final products to earth. Shatalov said this would allow ground controllers to analyze material while the program on the laboratory continued without interrup-

He said the cosmonauts and ground controllers also were able to study how a large, three-part system — about 30 yards long and weighing more than 32 tons behaved in space.

Margaret O'Brien Still Active With Television, Theater Roles

HOLLYWOOD (AP) - As a child star she was a moppet Sarah Bernhardt, with flashing eyes that could pour forth a torrent of tears on cue.

She played a bit part in "Babes on Broadway," then became a full-fledged MGM star at the age of 4 in the 1942 film "Journey For Margaret."

She hasn't made a movie in nearly 20 years, although she stays active in television and in the theater.

But those dark, flashing, Margaret O'Brien eyes haven't changed. They're still her dominant feature.

At the height of her fame, a time when her mother marched into Louis B. Mayer's office and wrangled \$6,000 a week, toymakers brought out a Margaret O'Brien doll.

'It's a collector's item now," said Miss O'Brien. "I looked all over for one for my daughter. I finally found one that still had the name tag on it, but the dealer had just sold it.

"She agreed to sell me her personal doll for \$500 and I asked for the name tag from the other doll. But the woman buying it said, 'I'm not giving up my Margaret O'Brien name tag for Margaret O'Brien or anyone else.

In the weeks before Christmas, Miss O'Brien traveled to five cities across the country to promote another doll, Holly

"It's an old-fashioned rag doll that requires children to use their imagination again," she said. "I tell children about my fantasies with dolls. I teach them to pretend, which goes back to the days before the bionic dolls that do everything for you.

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She recalled that during the making of "Three Wise Fools" Lionel Barrymore made her a rag doll.

In private life she is the wife of industrialist Roy T. Thorsen and the mother of a 17-month-old daughter, Mara Tolena Thorsen. They live in suburban Ventura County, far from the Hollywood crowd.

But she does return frequently for work. Last month she taped a television salute to Elizabeth Taylor - they were in "Little Women" together - and earlier this year she had a starring role in "Testimony of Two Men," a syndicated miniseries made by Universal. Two months ago she turned down a regular role in a soap opera.

She appears regularly on the stage and expects soon to revive her role in "The Tunnel of Love" at a regional theater. She starred in the role last October in North Carolina. She said she limits her stage appearances to three weeks so that she won't be away from her family too long. This eliminates her from many roles because most theaters require longer appearances, often up to six months.

Miss O'Brien says, "I don't dwell in the past. I'm more interested in what I'm doing now. Asked if she missed being a major star,

she replied, "I was little, so I didn't get all the glamor. It was easier for me to adapt. I think it was harder for the older stars for whom the studio was mother and father. In the days of contract stars

the studios did everything for you. "I think in a way it's too bad they don't have the glamor anymore. It's like a regular job now. You punch in and you punch out. The studios used to promote your name so that you remained in the limelight even when you weren't working. Now, on TV unless you're in a series nobody knows who you are."

Miss O'Brien said she liked combining her occasional work as an actress with her duties as a wife and mother.

"I wouldn't want to work every day," she said. "But I do lik to work. I think a woman has to be active and have other interests besides her home.

Another passion she pursues is archeology, and at every opportunity she heads for Mexico to hunt for artifacts and visit the ruins.

"I love to go to fascinating places," she said. "When I was working in El Paso I met Pancho Villa's wife. I think this profession gives you the opportunity to do so many things and meet so many people."



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Anne Francis Listens To Different Drummer

HOLLYWOOD (UPI) - Anne Francis, the ash blonde beauty of scores of movies and the defunct "Honey West" TV series, moves on a different plane than most of her contemporaries.

Anne is preoccupied with a philosophical combination of religion and metaphysics. Acting has been a means for supporting her avocational interests in spirit-

Currently she is starring in "Born Again," the film version of Charles Colson's book. She plays Patty Colson opposite Dean Jones, who portrays the former Nixon aide.

The movie is a labor of love for Jones, who describes himself as a born again Christian, as does the movie's producer, former ad executive Robert L. Munger.

Anne says she, too, has been born again, but in a different way than her costar and producer.

This spring Anne will sell the Brentwood home in which she has lived for many years to move to Montecito, Calif., a suburb of Santa Barbara, some 75 miles north of Hollywood.

Anne, a divorcee with two daughters, has purchased a French-style chalet on four acres of rolling countryside which she will transform into a think tank

"I've already established The Inner Space Foundation." Anne explained. "And my new quarters in Montecito will be dedicated to the facts and truths of illumined ones who walk this planet. The foundation will bring together

men of science and religion. There will be meetings of the mind among people of spiritual, scientific, educational and philosophical concepts for private dialogues and public dissemination.

"There will be films and lectures and in-depth interviews to send to similar centers around the country. Anne, who has played her share of neu-

rotics, hookers and other troubled women on screen, is a marvelously tranquil, assured woman offscreen. She speaks with authority on the subject of inner space.

She said she has been involved since her teen-age years with the International New Thought Alliance.

"The organization is 65 years old," Anne said. "It is really an umbrella organization for several metaphysical churches, including Science of Mind, Unity and the Church of Truth. 'I've been involved since I was 16. But

only in the last few years have I made my

own personal transition to the point where I feel born again. When a person realizes his own spiritial nature he is born 'But I don't proselytize among my friends. As president, I've provided most

of the funds for The Inner Space Foundation. Last fall I received a sizable donation without solicitation. I don't believe in soliciting. "I think my board of directors is impressive. There's Dr. Jack Holland, a pro-

fessor at San Jose State and an associate minister in the Unity and Science of Mind Churches.

'Also a member is the Rev. Sig Paul-

son of the Kansas City Unity Village which publishes The Daily Word. And Dr. Evarts Loomis, an M.D. and biochemist who has a clinic in Hemet, Calif.

"There are many other scientists who will participate in seminars at the foundation beginning this summer."

Anne devotes much of her time between movie and TV assignments studying metaphysics, religion and science. She belongs to no church herself but encourages belief in all religions. She feels a kindred spirit to Patty Col-

son, whom she met in Washington, D.C., during the early days of filming "Born Again. "This is the story of someone overcoming adversity," Anne said. "Charles Col-

son is controversial politically and reli-

giously. I play a woman who loves and stands by her husband. "I felt an instant rapport with Mrs. Colson when we met. I was pleased to find her honest, straightforward and a person with inner strength. Maybe most impor-

tant was her sense of humor. "I can understand her husband's attinecessarily share them

"In the past few years I've addressed many church congregations in various parts of the country. About one or two a month. My minister friends call me Reverend Anne. But I'd never think of being ordained in any of the organized reli-

Vance is expected to urge Kamel and Dayan to seek an interim or temporary arrangement, leaving determination of the permanent status of the West Bank and Gaza to the future and the door still open to self-determination for the Palestinians. Meanwhile, the two governments could go ahead with negotiations on issues that are less in dispute.

Another 5 inches of snow accumulated at Casper, Wyo., while 4 inches fell at Goodland, Kans. At Flagstaff, Ariz., weekend snowfall reached one foot.

The storm system, centered over Texas and Oklahoma, spawned freezing rains that iced highways in Oklahoma and Arkansas today

The first wave of heavy snows moved into Missouri and Illinois early today and was expected to reach Indiana, Kentucky and Ohio tonight.

Heavy snow or winter storm warnings were issued in parts of Wyoming, Colorado, Nebraska, Kansas and Missouri. Travel advisories were issued for parts of Texas, Oklahoma, Arksnsas, Missouri and Illinois.

Snows in the Plains were accompanied by an arctic air mass that dunked temperatures below the zero mark in northern sections. The low reached 27 below zero today at Williston, N.D., and 14 below at Bismarck, N.D.

Temperatures were higher on the East Coast, but it was a frosty day for hundreds of thousands of persons, who lost electrical power in weekend ice storms.

In New York, thousands of Long Island residents camped out in front of fireplaces, visited with relatives or spent the weekend in public shelters while repair crews tried to catch up with the damage described as the worst since Hurricane

Indictments Closed On Blackout Cases

NEW YORK (AP) - Six months ago, the city of New York announced a hardline policy for prosecuting thousands of suspects arrested during the July black-

However, the New York Daily News reported today that fewer than one-eighth of the defendants have received jail terms. Quoting unidentified sources, the News said that in the three hardest hit boroughs, Manhattan, Brooklyn and the Bronx, 90 percent of the misdemeanor cases and 35 percent of the felony indictments were closed. The paper also said 376 cases are still pending.

when they discovered they had entered the country under the wrong kind of legal papers for permanent residence.

When their temporary visas expired, the INS said it had no choice but to treat the Mennonites like other aliens and begin deportation proceedings.

A nationwide public outcry arose, and the Mennonites got extensions from Sept. 22 to Jan. 31.

Meanwhile, the group went to work establishing correct legal groundwork to stay, getting U.S. Labor Department job certification, a prerequisite to applying for permanent visas.

More than 50 heads of household have the certification now, and it is in the mill for others, Goodman said

The extension to next February should allow time for the others to clear themselves on the job front and get on visa lists, observers said.

A Federal Bureau of Investigation probe was ordered several months ago into circumstances under which the Mennonites came to the Seminole area.

The group said they had been told, erroneously, that merely buying land would satisfy INS visa requirements.

The FBI investigation was to see if any U.S. laws were broken by any persons who may have lured he Mennonites here with false information or promises, for monetary gain.



Government Resigns In Italy

By MICHAEL J. DUFFY

ROME (AP) — Premier Giulio Andreotti submitted his 17-month-old government's resignation today in preparation for an attempt to form another cabinet that would have the support of the Communists but no Communist members.

Andreotti presented his resignation to President Giovanni Leone at the presidential palace after a half-hour cabinet meeting. The president was expected to have the traditional consultations with the leaders of all parties and then name Andreotti, probably by Thursday, to try to form a new government.

The new political crisis, expected to be a long one, comes amid political violence that has caused four deaths in Italy this year, economic stagnation that has pushed unemployment to about 9 percent and demands from the Communists and Socialists for inclusion of the Communists in the cabinet.

However, Andreotti's Christian Democratic Party still rejects Communist participation in the government, and the U.S. government announced its opposition last week.

If a new government cannot be formed, elections for a new parliament would have to be held. But all parties oppose this. Opinion polls indicate elections would further polarize the country, increasing support for the Christian Demo-crats and Communists at the expense of the smaller parties.

The Communists got 34.4 percent of the vote in the 1976 election, four percentage points less than the Christian Democrats. Andreotti's all-Christian Democrat, minority cabinet was able to stay in office because the Communists and other parties agreed not to vote against it on major issues, and in turn the Communists were consulted about government policies.

The opposition parties abandoned this policy of tacit support last week and de-manded that the Christian Democrat form an emergency, all-party government including the Communists.

Andreotti's government was Italy's 35th since World War II and the third he has headed during 30 years in politics.

It does allow bonus payments for workers who step up productivity. In the coal mines, for instance, some workers are earning the equivalent of nearly \$50 extra a week, or 33 percent of their base pay, under a new productivity deal launched by the National Coal Board.

British fire brigades function under the authority of local municipalities, just like they do in the United States. Their first official strike in 59 years was called because the state vetoed the firemen's demand for a 30 percent hike. Every British government since 1961 has come out, usually in vain, for wage restraint in some form. Thus Mrs. Thatcher's calls for a general abolition of pay curbs looks risky even to some of her

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
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Public Interest Lags In Lake Board Elections

Avalanche-Journal Staff Buffalo Springs Lake is the most complete recreational facility in Lubbock, but many area residents, judging from last year's election of directors for the lake's governing body, apparently don't take much interest in it.

This year's candidates for Lubbock County Water Control and Improvement District No. 1 director say they hope that will change when polls open Saturday.

The five district directors serve staggered terms with three seats expiring this year. Candidates this year are Danny Edwards and Joanna Doss, and the two incumbents, Cubby B. Key and W. D. "Billy" Sims.

Long-time board member V. G. Browning is not seeking re-election, leaving open at least one spot on the board for a new director.

All the candidates say county reside

interest needs to be greater for the lake and its management. In last year's board election, where six persons pulled in votes (or a vote) for two expiring seats, only 162 out of the county's 79,000 registered voters went to the polls.

What do you bid now? A.—Three no trump. Partner's bid has allayed any fears you might have about a spade weakness at no trump. Spas began as luxurious retreats that only the very rich could afford. But, health fads today have put new demands on spas. In the 1960's spas became increasingly popular, and could be found in almost any town. Then the market peaked and the collapse followed. There are few spas that remain in operation today, but the survivors are as popular as

Although less prevelent, spas are affordable now, and that may be at least partially the reason for their popularity. Even if the work is hard, spas pamper people in a way most exercise programs

As more and more people become aware of phsyical fitness, spas offer a two-fold advantage, - practicality coupled with luxury

For some spa goers, luxury has become a necessity and the most convenient way to stay in shape. Increased emphasis on health and fitness has practically turned exercise into a criteria for happiness.

In the past that just wasn't true. "It used to be that if a man let himself go, his wife just looked the other way." explained Bob Heinsheimer, manager of a local health spa. Today if she's in shape she'll nudge him on his way to physical fitness. Likewise, if a man enjoys working out, he may encourage his wife to cash in on the benefits.

When used properly, spas offer a woman the chance to be sleek and trim. Some men claim they enjoy the sense of well being that comes with exercise, and toned muscles are only a side benefit.

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



Put in the bottom of the casserole, with the browned chicken pieces on top. Season to taste. Cover and bake at 350 for 25 to 30 minutes, until chicken is tender. Stir orange and green pepper into rice. Bake uncovered an additional 10 minutes. Serve from casserole. Serves six, 310 calories each.

Market Drop Found **Not To Be Unusual**

NEW YORK (AP) - The investigation was begun after hearing repeated references that trading activity in the first five business days dictated stock prices for the year to come.

John Wright, investment adviser to banks, other institutions and individuals. was curious on two scores, the first being he had doubts about the authenticity of the alleged omen.

More significantly, with the market in the first five trading days down by 7 per cent, the largest such decline of the century, he was concerned about the potential impact on future stock prices.

Asked the results of his research, Wright spoke with a directness that helps set him apart from many market analysts. "It's a bunch of baloney," he said. No translation needed.

In the 78 years of this century, said Wright from his Bridgeport, Conn. office. the market fell during the first five trading days. In 15 of those years the market

declined for the year; but it rose in 11. Factual data of that sort hardly documents the ominous portents of the popular allegation. In fact, it might be considered sufficient in itself to dispel the myth. But Wright searched further.

Averaging the highs and low for each of the 26 years in which declines occurred during the first five days, he found that the losses for the year came to 12.5 per cent but that advances amounted to 15

riod, he found that subsequent prices rose in three of those years. According to

the myth, prices should have fallen. Discoveries of this type are not rare; they happen all the time. Often the discovery is made too late to do much good,

Balanchine **Ballet Earns** High Marks

NEW YORK (AP) - George Balanchine added another pearl to the long necklace he has created for the New York City Ballet with the Thursday night premiere of "Ballo della Regina."

The new ballet is neoclassic - classic steps used in ways Balanchine has devised - and plotless, as most of his are. It bears his stamp, but is not a copy of anything he has done before. In a little more than 15 minutes there

are duets and solo variations for the leading couple, Merrill Ashley and Robert Weiss, plus solos for Debra Austin, Bonita Borne, Stephanie Saland and Sheryl Ware, and moments for the corps de ballet to shine.

Weiss' solo variations are brief, but dazzling. The fast sections of the music are mostly choreographed for Miss Ashand sure, and Balanchine stresses those qualities in this work

The costumes were white for the two stars, each only recently elevated to official principal-dancer status in the company, lavender for the four ingenues and pastel blue for the corps, a visually pleasing combination by Ben Benson.



Army To Strengthen S. Forces Abroad

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Army soon will start pulling artillery and other equipment from National Guard and Reserve units to strengthen regular U.S. forces in Europe, creating a conflict between two Carter administration programs.

The administration is committed to strengthening both U.S. forces defending Europe while enhancing the might of Guard and Reserve units at home.

The Pentagon, however, has obviously decided that shoring up European defenses is the more urgent problem.

The move is a blow to the understrength Army Guard and Reserve, already struggling to meet demanding mobilizaton assignments. They were handed a larger role in the nation's war plans when the draft ended five years

The Army acknowledged, reluctantly, that it would start "in the near future" to withdraw self-propelled artillery and some repair and supply-handling equipment from battalion-and company-sized Guard and Reserve outfits "for use in strengthening U.S. forces in Europe."

There were indications that the Army's reluctance to talk about the equipment withdrawals stemmed from concern about possible political repercussions in Congress and in the states where the Guard and Reserve have influence.

The Army refused to identify the units that will lose equipment between now and April 30. It said that information is classified.

But the official Army response to ques

tions did not mention semitrailer trucks, which sources said are also included in the equipment withdrawals planned over the next four months.

More importantly, the Army chose not to mention that, as reported by Pentagon sources, a long list of equipment will be drained from the Guard and Reserve over the next 18 months.

Pentagon sources said the artillery and other gear will be moved to West Germany to fill depleted standby stocks considered essential to sustaining regular U.S. Army divisions in battle during the early weeks of a war.

This is in addition to the planned transfer of several battalions of artillery from regular Army units in the United States to Europe.

Guard and Reserve offcials claim their units already lack some important equipment, in part because they were milked during the Vietnam War. Some of the

Balance Loss Symptom

By LAWRENCE E. LAMB, M.D. DEAR DR. LAMB - I am 76 years

old and had cataracts removed from both eyes three years ago. Since then I have lost my equilibrium. I do very well around the house most of the time as I can get hold of things to steady me, but when I am outside or in stores with bright lights I am off balance and cannot walk well unless I hold onto someone and feel about. If I close my eyes I will black out.

My doctor says it could be my eyes or poor circulation. My eye doctor does not seem to know what caused it. Anything you can tell me about my loss of equilibrium, and anything that could be done to help would be greatly appreciated.

DEAR READER - Loss of equilibrium is a symptom, and it can be caused by many different problems. Your sense of balance really depends upon the input from three different systems; the eyes, the balance system in the ears and the sensations you get from your joints, tendons and muscles throughout the body. Finally these three systems are all integrated inside

body position and sense of balance. As the brain received this information it sends out signals automatically that help you adjust to maintain your bal-

If two of your systems are working well you can usually maintain your balance. If only one is working you son who has had some degeneration in the spinal cord that affects the sense of body position may get along fine standing still until he closes the signals of orientation from his eyes, and already has lost the sensation from his body that passes through his spinal cord, he will sway and fall if not protected. This is a classical physical test for damage to parts of the spinal cord.

So if you have diminished eyesight it could in certain circumstances contribute to your loss of balance. Also you could have disease of the arteries to the brain that affects the integration of the signals from these three systems or affects the centers in the brain that control your blood pressure. In the latter case, the drop in blood pressure on standing may lead

to a sense of fainting.

Of course, you could have disease to the balance mechanism in the internal ear. This is a common cause of loss of

balance in younger people.

Cassini said he once lived in a hogan, or dirt hut, on the Navajo Indian Reservation near Gallup, N.M., for more than

three months. "I was interested in their culture " he said. "That was nearly 30 years ago, but I learned a lot about Indian lore, about their colors, patterns, many other things. I know more about Indians than most Indians do.

"Their belts, for example, contain designs that are of Moorish origin. You need a trained eye to see it, but it's there. I even studied the headdress of various tribes like the Sioux, Pawnee, Ojibwa, Apache. You learn from many sources if you have the eye for it and the imagina-

Sick Pay Exclusion ... Mixup Corrected

By RAY DE CRANE

One of the major fiascos of last year's tax filing season was the story on the Sick Pay Exclusion.

For years, employees who were absent from work because of a sickness or injury and whose pay was continued during this period of enforced absence, were permitted to exclude

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from taxable income as much as \$100

Although the 1976 Tax Act was not passed by Congress until September of that year, the lawmakers killed the Sick Pay exclusion retroactive to Jan. 1, 1976.

Literally hundreds of thousands of workers who were idled between January and September because of sickness or injury, and who had counted on this tax benefit, were denied its

Well after filing deadline, Congress reacted to the uproar that went up and passed a new law. The Sick Pay exclusion was continued for a full year, until Jan. 1, 1977.

The change will not affect anyone filing a 1977 return now. But the benefits can still be claimed by anyone who qualified in 1976 and were denied its use, or who neglected to claim it because it was then against the law.

made. If you had Sick Pay in 1976 and did not claim it on your last year's return, you should file an amended return, Form 1040X, and claim the ben-

But as of Jan. 1, 1977, the Sick Pay exclusion is gone for good. In its place is the Disability Pay exclusion.

Under its terms, the same \$100 weekly maximum exclusion applies, but it can now be claimed only by employees under 65 who were forced into early retirement because of a total and permanent disability.

The payments they may exclude are limited to the payments received, or \$100 a week, whichever is less.

If you are married, a joint return must be filed in order to claim the exclusion. Furthermore, the exclusion is reduced dollar-for-dollar by the amount the adjusted gross amount (including the disability income) exceeds \$15,000. Thus, if the combined incomes of husband and wife on the joint return are \$20,200 or more, there is no disability pay that may be claimed.

In addition, Form 2440 must be filed to claim the exclusion. A feature of Form 2440 is its requirements for a physician's certification to permanent and total disability.



Tunney Defends Out-Of-Bounds Call

NEW ORLEANS (AP) - Referee Jim Tunney defended his decision in calling Dallas quarterback Roger Staubach out of bounds on a play that preceded a Cowboy field goal in the second quarter of the Super Bowl Sunday

Staubach, scrambling to escape Denver's pass rush, was ruled to have stepped out of bounds just before unloading an interception to Bronco safety Bill Thompson in the end zone.

Television replays of the play were in-

"It was my call," Tunney told a pool reporter after the Cowboys' 27-10 victory. 'My responsiblity is the quarterback and I felt that he had touched the line and then threw. The ball was still in his hand when he touched the line. I saw no reason to doubt myself. I saw the line and saw the touch. All he has to do is touch

Because of the call, the interception

was nullified and Staubach absorbed a 6vard loss to the Denver 25. Efren Herrera booted a 43-vard field goal on the next play for a 13-0 Cowboy lead.

Tunney said field judge Bob Wortman gave the touchdown signal on a diving catch by Dallas' Butch Johnson in the end zone in the third quarter. The 45-yard pass from Staubach gave the Cowboys a 20-3 lead. Johnson fumbled the ball as he landed, but Wortman ruled he had possession when he crossed the goal line. Replays seemed to confirm that opinion. "It was Wortman's call," said Tunney.

We talked about that one. He caught the ball in the air, in flight and crossed the goal line in possession, and came to the ground in the end zone. Then he released the ball. He didn't fumble. He hit the ground, then released it."

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

Never has the coin toss that begins a game been more thoroughly covered from different angles, a move that yielded a marvelous shot of Craig Morton embracing Staubach. We also got a great sideline shot of Herrera explaining one of his missed field goals to an obviously skeptical Landry.

To the surprise of no one, we also got a good look at the cheerleaders for both teams. Perhaps too good a look. We got bouncing cheerleaders, smiling cheerleaders, posing cheerleaders, prancing cheerleaders, wiggling cheerleaders and even cheering cheerleaders. It was far too much of a

When the game got out of hand late in the third quarter and throughout the fourth, CBS tried to fill the void by showing cheerleaders. Summerall and Brookshier, with no pictures to talk about, were reduced to idle chatter. CBS also focused frequently on artist Leroy Neiman's electronic drawings which seemed, somehow, out of place and didn't add much to the coverage.

Brent Musburger, Phyllis George and Irv Cross wandered through New Orleans and managed to give viewers a feel for the city under the seige of Super Bowl while mixing in enough football talk to keep grid fans happy. There were brief interviews that, by and large, gave viewers an insight into the personalities of the two coaches and some of the players.

There was a nostalgic review of past Super Bowls, some commentary by Jack Whitaker - "Denver has swept into this town like snowflakes looking for a blizzard" - and a brief chat with Walter Cronkite, who had a refreshing view of the whole business. "This is the great American event," said Cronkite, "a chancé to see everyone come together once a year for an event that means absolutely nothing.

But it was too long. We could have done without Phyllis' interview with some children in Dallas and Denver, the inevitably tedious punt, pass and kick competition and Jimmy the Greek's uninspired observations. "This is gonna be one the greatest Super Bowl games ever, no doubt about it," said the Greek.

Halftime was uneventful - dancing girls, a little jazz, a filmed piece on past Super Bowls, etc. The post-game show was basic locker room interviews - Landry was "excited". Staubach had a "tremendous feeling", and so on.

The Super Bowl, and attendant hoopla, occupied about six hours of television time Sunday. That's a long time for a football game, even an outstanding one. And Super Bowl XII, like most of its predecessors, was far from outstanding.

Humphrey, a chronic enthusiast, put his imprint on 30 years of Democratic poli-

The former vice president and presidential nominee was serving his fifth term as senator from Minnesota when he died of cancer Friday night at his home in Waverly, Minn.

Senate colleagues had created a special leadership status for Humphrey, who lost seniority when he served as vice president from 1965-69.

Humphrey had been re-elected in a landslide in 1976, less than a month after undergoing surgery for cancer. Less than a year later surgeons found another cancer which they called inoperable and ter-

In October 1976, Humphrey had a cancerous bladder removed at New York's Sloan-Kettering Institute for Cancer Research. In August 1977, Humphrey underwent new surgery to relieve a blocked large intestine.

Surgeons discovered a malignant tumor in the senator's pelvis which could not be removed. They said they would try to check it with chemotherapy but would not speculate on Humphrey's life expect-

"It could be months, it could be years." Dr. John Najarian, chief of surgery at University of Minnesota, said at the time.

But Humphrey already was talking about an early return to work in the Senate. It was another campaign for the man who never stopped fighting.

A tireless, exuberant campaigner for causes as well as candidates, Humphrey

most made it in 1968, and almost tried again in 1976.

His last campaign was to become Democratic leader of the Senate, but he withdrew from that contest the day the 95th Congress convened, conceding he did not have the votes.

Aged and ailing with the effects of chemical treatments required as a followup to the cancer surgery, Humphrey declared at the time that he meant to play a major role in national affairs "as long as I have the breath of life, and I intend to be breathing for a long time, well and heartily.

His face, his voice and his marathon speechmaking style were Democratic keynotes to a generation of Americans. Illness changed his appearance but not the familiar voice or the torrest of words.

They only took out my bladder, not my guts or my heart or my mind," Humphrey said.

He was an emotional politician; as Democratic presidential nominee in 1968. he said his were the politics of joy. Lyndon B. Johnson once said Humphrey cried too much.

Humphrey burst upon the national scene as the brash, liberal mayor of Minneapolis, battling for a civil rights plank at the 1948 Democratic National Conven-

He was a man to reckon with at every convention that followed, although usually in defeat

Humphrey entered the Senate in 1949, and became a leading spokesman for the liberal cause. He played a major role in Senate efforts that led to civil rights laws, fought against nuclear weapons testing, pressed for medical care for the aged,

and took up countless quests on issues great and small

His long, unrequited quest for the presidency led him away from the Senate for six years, four as Johnson's vice president, two as a professor and free-lance politician. He was elected again in 1970 and re-elected in 1976

Humphrey was hospitalized early in 1974 and his physician, Dr. Edgar Berman, said the senator had been undergoing X-ray treatment for a small bladder tumor considered to be on the borderline of malignancy

Berman said Humphrey had suffered from bladder tumors, all benign, since the mid-1960s

On Oct. 7, 1976, Humphrey underwent surgery at Sloan-Kettering Memorial Hospital for removal of the cancefous bladder. He left the hospital on Oct. 30, and said he would rest for a couple of days, then go "campaigning, walking, swimming, and God only knows, I'll be

Although his physicians said they believed the cancer had been completely removed. Humphrey had to undergo intermittent and debilitating chemical treatments. "To put it bluntly, it's no fun." he said. To a visitor, he described the treatments as bottled death.

Still, Humphrey told his Senate colleagues that the doctors had assured him he was in shape to take on the tasks of the majority leader. The job went to Sen. Robert C. Byrd of West Virginia.

Senate Democrats then voted to create a new title for Humphrey as a former vice president, electing him deputy president pro tempore of the Senate. The president pro tempore does not have much to do, and the deputy has less. But the action made Humphrey a member of the leadership team that meets regularly with President Carter. It also gave him a pay raise, a chauffeured limousine, an ex tra office and three new aides.

Humphrey's big show as a presidential contender came in 1968, as the nominee of a Democratic Party divided by the war in Vietnam and the violence that wracked its convention in Chicago.

He started far behind, but steadily closed the gap and almost caught Richard M. Nixon. Nixon won by about 510,000 votes out of 73 million cast. "The longest day of my life," Hum-

phrey recalled in his autobiography. To lose to Nixon. Ye Gods. No warmth, no strength, no emotion, no spirit, no heart ... We could have won it. We should have won it."

If that was his most bitter disappointment in presidential politics, it was only one in a series. He tried in 1960 and lost to John F. Kennedy. He tried in 1972 and lost to George McGovern. He held himself available for a call that never came in 1976, when Carter took command in the presidential primaries and foreclosed the nomination while Humphrey shunned active candidacy but said he would love to run if drafted

Johnson chose him for the vice presidential nomination in 1964, and Humphrey left the Senate to become a faithful lieutenant in times that became ever more difficult. "Except for the president, I had been the administration's primary defender of the increasingly ugly and unpopular war," he reflected later.

Because of that, Humphrey lost the support of the party's liberal wing, which

once had idolized him. He was years repairing the damage, although he held the support of labor leaders and the party establishment during 1972 and much of the campaign for the 1976 nomination

While Humphrey never made it to the presidency, he saw more than a few of his ideas implemented by men who did. Among them: the Peace Corps, early efforts to limit nuclear testing, full-employment plans culminating with his co-authorship of a bill to make the federal government the employer of last resort, which kept up the pressure even though it did not become law.

Humphrey was the Senate Democratic whip, or deputy majority leader, between 1960 and 1964, and later said those were the happiest years of his life.

WASHINGTON (AP) - Not one to wallow in self-pity, Hubert H. Humphrey never gave up hope in his final days.

Almost to his death, aides told reporters that the senator from Minnesota hoped to return to Washington, although no travel plans were discussed.

The pain and reality of terminal cancer would not dissuade the man from saying last October: "I'm not about to have somebody cover me up. I'm not about to

Humphrey's last days at his Waverly home were filled with nostalgia but little business. He chatted by telephone with President Carter as well as former Presidents Richard M. Nixon and Gerald R. Ford and called old friends, including a teacher from his school days in Doland,

Every day, one or two staff assistants traveled the 40 miles from Minneapolis to Waverly to conduct routine office business. Otherwise, the danger of respiratory infection prevented Humphrey from receiving many wellwishers.

On Christmas Day, his four children

and 10 grandchildren sat down to a turkey dinner, watched home movies and

sang carols Though virtually none of his close friends expected him to return to the capital. Humphrey made his last trip to Washington on a cold Sunday last October. He was gaunt, frail, and in pain. But Congress was struggling, Jimmy Carter needed him, and Hubert Humphrey was back on the job.

He arrived in Washington aboard Air Force One, as Carter's guest, and declared his determination "to raise as much hell as I can." Besides, he quipped, how could he ref-

use the ride? "I've been trying to get on that airplane for at least 20 years. Humphrey admitted the worst day of his life was when he first learned he had

cancer. But as any Humphrey student

knows, there was nothing in which he could not find hope: You have to believe you can win this fight," he said. "You have to gear yourself to the continuity of the struggle. knowing that there will be days when you

There were many such days in the last

months. The chemical treatments he received, some of them experimental, were unusually strong and painful. But he consented to all the doctors could throw at him, partly in the belief that his experience could prove valuable to future can-

Meanwhile, the inexorable but lingering nature of the disease gave the nation opportunity to express its feelings while Humphrey could still return the salutes - and they came by the thousands.

The Senate and the House had special Hubert Humphrey days; a new Department of Health, Education and Welfare building was named after him; millions of dollars poured into a fund for a Hubert H. Humphrey Institute of Public Affairs at the University of Minnesota, a project that threw him repeatedly into tears of

He was hailed as "the most loved and most respected man in America" by Vice President Walter F. Mondale, who flew Humphrey home to Minnesota for the last time in December. President Carter told the world he had been comforted often by Humphrey's private advice and

said, "I'm proud to be the president of a nation that loves a man like Hubert Humphrey and is loved so deeply by him.

The House of Representatives shattered precedent in November by convening in special session to honor Humphrey, and Speaker Thomas P. O'Neill told the assembled that Humphrey was the "little man's greatest friend.

Governors in 32 states proclaimed Dec. 2 "Hubert Humphrey Day." Hundreds of communities, civic organizations and business and labor groups declared him their man of the year or bestowed similar

Goodwill messages poured in from throughout the world, including some Communist nations. In Poland, party chief Edward Gierek took the occasion of President Carter's visit to extend his "respect and sympathy" to Humphrey.

Television performers, like Redd Foxx. took time on their programs to salute Humphrey. Tributes were flashed on the scoreboards of football stadiums during nationally telecast games.

Gerald R. Ford came back to town on Dec. 19 to present an award for Humphrey's efforts to stem famine in the world, saying "I can't think of a nicer reason to be in Washington than to see

HHH Devoted To U.S. Senate

WASHINGTON (AP) - "I have a blind devotion to the Senate, which represents the Republic," Sen. Hubert Humphrey said in one of his last appearances in what he called "the greatest parliamentary body in the world.

Humphrey came to that body in 1949 as a bumptious newcomer to national political life who, he wrote in his autobiography, "was treated like an evil force that had seeped into sanctified halls."

When he left it for the last time, he left behind not only a record of fighting for liberal causes but a reputation as a skillful legislative craftsman respected by his conservative opponents as well as his al-

"Organization, morale and momentum are very important in a legislative battle," Humphrey said.

He mobilized those elements to push through the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and to play key roles in Senate approval of the Arms Control and Disarmament Agency and the limited nuclear test ban treaty of 1963.

Although he is perhaps best remembered for his civil rights record, Humphrey's legislative interests were broad so much so that he was criticized for spreading himself too thin.

In the 1971 session alone, Humphrey made 509 speeches on the Senate floor. In one week, he spoke on subjects ranging from French politics and the public debt to the wild flowers of the Northwest and the need for more office space.

The cool reception he received on his first arrival at the Capitol stemmed in part from the Democratic National Convention in 1948, at which Humphrey pushed through a civil rights plank which led 35 southern delegates to walk out.

One afternoon during his first week in the Senate, he recalled in his autobigraphy, he heard the veteran Democratic Sen. Richard Russell of Georgia turn to a group of colleagues and say, "Can you imagine the people of Minnesota sending that damn fool down here to represent

After the 1964 battle in which Hum-

phrey floor-managed the civil rights bill, however, Russell praised him for the fair way in which he had treated him and his conservative allies.

In an analysis of Humphrey's legislative career in 1972, the Ralph Nader Congress Project said the Minnesota senator "had to tone down his boisterous enthusiasm and gutsy idealism before being admitted to the Senate Establishment." The first bill he ever introduced in the

Homesitting Offered By **Texas Firm**

HOUSTON (UPI) - During long absences, keeping the house warm, pets fed, plants watered, car started, mail collected and burglars diverted can be a problem. Houston Homewatchers Inc. will solve it for a price.

They'll even throw in a supply of garbage to empty just to give the old homestead a real lived-in look.

"We set up the business with a couple of ads in the newspaper and immediately got tremendous response," said Ms. Janice Beale, founder and president. "People were intrigued that we would be com-

ing into their houses daily."
For \$4.50 a day, Ms. Beale, her neighbor and partner, Barbara Marcus, or one of their staff of four will enter the house daily to check security, adjust drapes, set timed lights and gather the mail and newspapers.

"There is garbage collection in Houston twice a week and on the days the people have their garbage collected, we put out a bag of garbage," Ms. Beale said. "If you don't have it, we supply it. From

somewhere comes a bag. "We take great pains to make the house looked lived in, to open and shut draper-

ies, that sort of thing."
They also will start the car and feed hamsters, goldfish and parakeets for no extra charge. But larger pets will cost you. Full service plus one dog raises the fee to \$8.50 daily.

Each additional big pet is \$2 more, but

that includes two visits a day, walking if requested and, of course, feeding, with the client buying the dog food. There are additional services.

"For \$30 a day we clean the house," Ms. Beale said. "We do supply a housesitter for \$30 a week. Mowing the lawn costs \$7.50 a mow. "For \$5 a day, clients supply us with

grocery list before they leave town, we have all those groceries purchased and cupboarded for them so there's no frantic shopping when they come back.

They even consider unusual special re-

"We've gone to the grocery store to buy a certain kind of barbecued chicken for a certain cat. We've also given medicine to animals. One hamster would eat only hard-boiled eggs."

Ms. Beale started housewatching in wealthy Hillsborough, Calif., three years ago, after a bad experience in boarding her own dog during a trip to Hawaii.

"We came to the conclusion that kennels and boarding places were just not right place for dogs," she said. "Cats fared even worse."

Her first partner later changed careers and Ms. Beale moved to Houston where "all the talk of burglaries" led her to start another housewatching business Sept. 30.

She and her new partner, who are bonded and insured, have an average of 20 clients at a time, all in southwest Houston. She expects rapid growth with planned expansion to serve the entire cit-

Students Assemble Simple Generator

MOSELEM SPRINGS, Pa. (AP) - A homemade generating plant which provides lighting via "foot power" was put together by 20 science students at the Richmond Township Elementary School

The plant, which was constructed from parts made available by parents and school faculty members, is actually a stationary bicycle hooked up to a small electric generator.

The students, who received technical assistance from the local subsidiary of General Public Utilities Corp. during the construction, used the apparatus to light the classroom Christmas tree last year and will continue to use it for other proects.

It is estimated that the students, taking turns on the bicycle 45 minutes a day for 45 days, exerted the energy needed to pedal a moving bike almost 200 miles.

Dipolomatic sources expect the Council will deal simultaneously but separately with Rhodesia and South Africa's policy of racial segregation or apartheid. It will be on the latter problem that Woods and

other witnesses will testify.

The Council also is expected to devote some time to the role of its special committee supervising the mandatory arms embago against Pretoria, adopted on

A Security Council debate on Namibia is not expected before February. In the upcoming talks, the five Western members - Britain, France, West Germany, Canada and the United States - are acting as intermediaries between South Africa and the black Axrican factions, mainly the South West Africa People's Organi-

zation, or SWAPO.

Diplomatic sources indicated South Africa's military presence during Namibia's transition to independence is one of the stumbling blocks in the negotiations."

They said the Western powers are proposing that 1,500 South African troops based in two camps should remain during transition in the territory, which has
