## Congress' Negative Ratings Continue

Congress as a whole receives a poor $63-28$ percent negative rating from Americans
according to the latest Harris Survey of 1.259 adults nationwide. But when people are asked to rate their own oongressmen, they are lesss severe, giving them m a $43-39$ percent

The overall 63.28 perectin negative rating for Congress as a whole is somewhat better than last year's record low of $70-22$ percent negative. There was a time bact in 1964
and 1965 when Congress as a whole received highly positive ratings. That period saw a honeymoon between President Lyndon Johnson and a Democratic Congress, which standoffi, Congress has always been rated negatively by the public.
On a regional basis, where individual reperesentatives receive a 4935 percent negative rating. In the South, congressmen are given a 43.38 percent negative rating, and in the West, they receive a
$44-40$ percent negative score. The exception is the Midwest, where individual congressmen receive a positive rating of 4 -36 percent.
