

Canal Pact DebateSet By Senate

WASHINGTON (AP) - Senate leaders said today they will bring the Panama Canal treaty - one of the most politically charged issues of the year - to the Senate floor on Wednesday for the start of an expected two to five weeks of debate.

But consideration of the controversial pact will not begin in earnest until after Congress returns Feb. 20 from its 10-day recess for Lincoln's Birthday.


Minority Leader Howard Baker, R-

Tenn., said his head count shows "more than enough" votes to add two key amendments to the proposal. However, that requires only a simple majority and the two-thirds majority needed for ratification is lacking, according to Baker and Majority Leader Robert C. Byrd,

Neither would estimate how many votes now exist for the treaty, but an Associated Press survey of the Senate, published over the weekend, showed the Carter administration 18 votes shy of the 67 needed if all members were present. The poll showed 31 firm or possible antitreaty votes.

The Senate Foreign Relations commitee's report on the canal treaty was issued today and Byrd obtained suspension of a Senate rule requiring a three-day delay, clearing the way for the proposal to be brought up Wednesday.

In the House, meanwhile, a special welfare subcommittee was to take up President Carter's welfare revision program, which remains a major issue, although some members question whether the White House and Speaker Thomas P. O'Neill Jr. are as committed to it this

Labor Laws Criticized By Farmers

HOUSTON (AP)-The president of the National Cotton Council said today overseas markets offer domestic cotton its

greatest growth potential. Jack G. Stone, Stratford, Calif., said, however, the industry's ability to com-pete in the world market could be adversely affected by new labor legislation.

Stone said the higher minimum wage which went into effect in January has made it even more difficult to hold down the cost of doing business. Additionally, he said, the labor reform bill now before the Senate has serious implications for

agricultural exports. 'Our nation's agriculture makes a major contribution to the balance of payments, and any erosion of our ability to make that contribution is not in our interest nor is it in the national interest," he

Stone spoke at the opening general session of the 40th annual meet of the council that represents all segments of the domestic cotton industry.

Stone expressed concern over the cost-price squeeze affecting farmers, but said the new farm law can help producers and other segments of the industry over the

next four year. He said higher costs combined with a severe price break under the old law have

"This is what usually happens when we go through the gyrations of prices too low or too high," he said.

Stone said the 1977 law offers solid leg-

SadatRipsIsrael For Tough Talk

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Egyptian President Anwar Sadat said today the Israeli position on Mideast peace is hardening rather than softening and it is up to the Jewish state to make the next move to reopen stalled peace talks.

He accused Israel of "a vicious cycle"

of nitpicking in the negotiations.

In remarks for a luncheon speech at the the National Press Club, Sadat said "efforts will have to be doubled if we are to re-affirm the faith of many people in the area that peace is attainable."

Sadat, who discussed the troubled talks with President Carter over the weekend, today accused Israel of going back to "the vicious circle of arguing over every single word or comma" in peace propos-

He said Israel's proposed solution for the West Bank and Gaza "is simply inadequate" and that the Israeli position "is hardening, rather than softening, as we

"The Israeli governmennt," he said in his strongest comment on the opening of still more Jewish communities in occupied lands, "cannot hide behind fanatic groups which are beating the drums of war in their feverish campaign to build these settlments.

After outlining what Egypt was willing to accept to bring about permament

"I trust that you agree with me, dear friends, that it remains for the other party to reciprocate" by withdrawal from all Arab territories, allowing the Palestinian people to exercise "self-determination" and providing for the necessary guaran-

tees for the security of Arab states.
The United States, Sadat said, has more than a go-between role in helping resolve the deadlock and must continue working with both parties to accelerate the proc-

Sadat today took his case to the American public. First, he met with Jewish leaders and then appeared before the press club audience to state Cairo's posi-

"It is true that I am rather disappoint ed, but I am determined to persevere," he told the press club of the stalled Israeli-Egyptian talks on the foreign minis-

"I am neither a pessimist nor an alarmist. I am not given to despair or impati-ence. I never lost hope in the face of difficulties. To the contrary, I take this as a

Jet Hijacker Seeks Help In Germany

FRANKFURT, West Germany (AP) -A man carrying a suitcase in which he said he had a bomb surrendered to the police after emerging from a hijacked Czechoslovak airliner that landed at Frankfurt early this afternoon.

Frankfurt airport spokesman Karlhans Mueller said no bomb was found in the

The hijacker requested political asylum in West Germany, the police said. His na-tionality was not immediately known.

The Tupolev 134 plane was commandeered after taking off from East Berlin on a scheduled flight to Prague, authorities said. Police said there were 42 passengers

aboard the plane and airport sources said they were believed to include 38 East Germans and three Czechoslovak citizens. The aircraft carried a crew of three.

It was the seventh hijacking of a Czechoslovak airliner to West Germany since

The Bonn Government has refused to return air pirates to the Soviet bloc nation in the past, but some of the Czecho-slovak hijackers have been convicted and served terms in German prisons.

Less than four months ago, on October 11, a 29-year-old Czechoslovak man and a 22-year-old woman companion hijacked a twin jet Yak-40 carrying 24 other passengers and five crew to Frankfurt.

Brandishing pistols smuggled past security guards, they took over the plane shortly after it took off from the Czechoslovak resort of Karlovy Vary.

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Pentagon says the number of Soviet citizens involved in civil defense projects outnumbers similar U.S. workers by about 16 to one, and the disparity makes some offi-cials wonder if the Soviet program might make that nation believe nuclear war is a

"reasonable option."
Russia is expanding construction of nuclear blast shelters for key industrial workers, as well as for political, military and managerial leaders, the Defense Department has told Congress.

The Pentagon report estimated that more than 100,000 civilian and military personnel are involved full time in the Russian civil defense program. In contrast, according to U.S. officials, there are about 600 federal employees and 5,500 others on the state and local level

working on civil defense in this country. Gen. George S. Brown, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, said in his formal report to Congress that U.S. civil defense "has been accorded a low priorty and does not maintain an effective capabi-

Brown called for " a reassessment of this view.'

The nation's top military officer said the strategic nuclear balance and the United States' ability to deter a nuclear

attack could be upset "should the Soviets believe their civil defense program makes nuclear war a reasonable option."

Defense Secretary Harold Brown, while acknowledging in the defense report that the Soviet program is growing, is known to remain unconvinced that any civil defense program, no matter how extensive, could prevent nuclear devastation in a pure report missile growing.

Current U.S. civil defense planning fo cuses on emptying the cities during a period of intense crisis and dispersing millions to lightly populated, "lower risl areas" where preparations would have been made to feed, shelter and care for

the people medically.

But any definitive evacuation plan is at least two years away and implementing it could take even longer.

Out of next year's \$126 billion Pentagon budget, civil defense was allotted only \$37 million.

Explorer Arrives In Pakistan

KARACHI, Pakistan (AP) — Norwegian explorer Thor Heyerdahl sailed into Karachi Harbor over the weekend after a 10-week "voyage to nowhere" aboard a replica of an ancient Sumerian reed boat.

Heyerdahl and his 11-man crew, including two Americans, planned to remain on the Indian subcontinent for about a week before sailing across the Indian and Pacific oceans toward South America.

The 63-year-old explorer, whose 1947 Kon Tiki expedition gained him worldwide recognition, arrived here Saturday night aboard the Tigris, a 60-foot raft made of woven berdi reeds. In his fifth and what he says is his last expedition, Heyerdahl is attempting to determine how far the Sumerians could have traveled on reed boats. He says his trip will end when his craft no longer is seaworthy.

The expedition set sail from the Iraqi port of Qurna last

November and has stopped at the Persian Gulf shiekdoms of Bahrain and Oman.

The 30-year-old recording artist pleaded innocent Saturday to a charge of criminal possession of stolen property and was freed on \$1,000 bond pending a hearing Feb. 23. The Rolls-Royce, valued at \$30,000, was impounded.

Police said it was stolen in Los Angeles. Womack, of Los ingeles, said he bought it in Phoenix last September

Police said Womack was traveling from Montreal when was arrested as he crossed the border from Canada into the United States.

Wendy Yoshimura 'Handicapped' SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Wendy Yoshimura, propelled to notoriety by her arrest while in the company of Patricia Hearst, says she is handicapped by an uncertain future. "It's hard to make long-range plans for a job and lasting relationships with this cloud hanging over my head," she said in a weekend interview with the San Francisco Exam-

The 35-year-old artist is free on \$50,000 bail pending an appeal of her January 1977 conviction on explosive and weapon possession charges. She was sentenced to a state prison term of up to 15 years.

"I'm not in jail doing time and I'm not involved in a trial, but mentally I don't feel normal or free," she said. "A normal life means all the regular things to me - a fulltime job, maybe marriage and children, time to relax and re-

"But more, it means having a sense of freedom in my head, which is something I haven't got right now."

Miss Yoshimura was fleeing from the explosive and weapons charges when she and Miss Hearst were arrested in September 1975.

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Animal Trainer Cleans Cages

VENICE, Fla. - Remember the story of the two guys who joined the circus

and got a job sweeping out the elephant cages?

The work was onerous and odiferous and they griped all the time.

"Hey," said the boss roustabout, "if you guys hate doing this so much, why

don't you quit?"
"What!" they exclaimed, "and give up show business?
Well, the old gag doesn't work anymore because the work isn't available anymore.

Gunther Gebel-Williams, the world's greatest animal trainer with the Greatest Show on Earth, cleans out all the animal cages himself for his menagerie of lions, tigers, leopards, panthers, horses and elephants, so they'll get used to having him around. Not only that, but he also gives the elephants a pedicure once a

These are some of the things a columnist learns walking around the winter headquarters here of the Ringling Bros. and Barnum and Bailey Circus with owner Irvin Feld and his son Kenneth.

"You know how you can tell the difference between a circus elephant and a zoo elephant?" Irv asked with considerable pride. "Look at their feet. Zoo elephants never have those white shiny toe nails." Almost on cue, Sally and Congo, two of the show's more ponderous pachyderms, did a little, or rather a big twinkle-toe two step to show of their recent pedicures.

Gunther, bare to the waist, was in the big cat cage alternately poking with a pole garnished with a sirloin steak and petting a young lion named Oscar, while an assortment of tigers, leopards and cougars watched from high stools like guests on a TV talk show.

"Circus people never stop rehearsing," said Kenneth Feld, who roams the world looking for new talent. "Gunther is working out a new act that will combine tigers and elephants and camels for the first time." The one he's got now is pretty sensational, like the first act finale where he rides in on the back of an elephant while holding a tiger on a leash.

Outside the cage, a midget was helpfing trim the fat from steaks piled high on a long table. Irvin revealed that it costs \$4,000 a year to keep a lion or a tiger in butcher bills alone. Each eats 25 pounds of meat a day, with the fat trimmed clean, alternating between two weeks of horse meat and two weeks of beef,

with a dozen eggs every Sunday to keep their pelts looking gorgeous.
"Tigers and leopards may be an endangered species in Asia, but they aren't

around here," said Irvin. "They breed like mad in captivity and you can't give one away. Zoos don't want any more. That's why Russian and Bulgarian circuses go in for trained bears. They're a lot cheaper to feed than the hig cata."

With aerialists swinging overhead and jugglers tossing Indian clubs about, Irvin led the way through a profusion of animal cages, property trunks marked "Lou Jacobs" and "Duane Thorpe" and racks of costumes gittering with rhinestones and real ostrich feathers out to the hoofed animal compound where over the weekend two baby camels had been born.

"Both females, very rare," Kenneth said. "Strange thing. We haven't had a female camel born in the show for years and years and now we get two in three days. I'm going to name them Egypt and Tel Aviv after the peace initiative."

The Red Unit, one of the two shows touring 80 cities under the Ringling Bros., Barnum and Bailey name, was getting ready for the big "move out," going through its final rehearsals before loading its 300 performers, 200 animals and thousands of tons of props, scenery and costumes onto 38 railroad cars for a 48-week tour. Since the big top folded its tent forever in 1956 in Pittsburgh, the circus has played indoors in auditoriums and armories. New York's Madison. Square Garden, with an 11-week run at Eastertide, remains the big time for the big show, as it has going back 108 years to when the old original Garden was built to house the original Ringling Brothers extravaganza.

The brothers, Otto, John, Charles, Alfred and Al, look down from vintage and invaluable circus posters adorning Irvin Feld's office at winter quarters, which has a big picture window looking out on the rehearsal ring. Irvin doesn't have to look at John Ringling's old grandfather clock in the corner, the one with the clown face, to tell what time it is. He looks out the window, and if the high wire acts are up there, he knows it's time for lunch, and if the acrobats are on it's dinnertime. The dog acts come on at breakfast.

Irvin Feld, a circus

Irvin Feld, a circus buff who broke into show business booking rock 'n' roll artists into auditoriums and field houses in the 1950s, gets dozen of letters every day from kids, like himself, wanting to run away and join the circus. His son Kenneth started out selling program

"God forbid, if we took any of these kids, 6 and 7 years old, we'd get arrest for encouraging runaways," Irv said. "I write to them and tell them they can join our Clown College when they turn 17 if they're still interested. I began the college 10 years ago, because when I took over the circus, we were down to 11 clowns, and six of them were in their 70s and 80s. It was a dying art. Now these kids who wrote to me then when they were 7 years old are being heard from again so I'll have to make good on my promise. That's show biz."

House To Vote On Establishing Consumer Representation Office

WASHINGTON (UPI) - The House votes Tuesday on an issue organized consumer groups have been pushing for eight years, and the chief pusher, Ralph Nader, says the outcome is too close to

The vote on whether to establish an office of consumer representation is crucial because, if the measure fails to pass the overwhelmingly Democratic House with President Carter's stamp of approval in advance, it will almost certainly die.

Nader told UPI he thinks the bill would have no trouble getting through the Senate because "we have between 60 and 65 votes in the Senate alone. But the House, he said, "is very close,

jority in both Houses of Congress and a new president backing the agency, Nader and other supporters flatly predicted victory - and quickly. But they had not taken into account the

tee by only one vote and Speaker Thomas O'Neill refused to call it up because he knew the votes were not there to pass it. changes over the years, but its basic aim - to provide a consumer advocate and spokesman to intervene in government decision-making - remains the same.

Proponents hoped to make it more saleable to the opponents of government spending by tying it to a reorganization of existing government consumer offices. The measure as now written calls for such offices to be combined or abolished, with part of the money - \$15 million the first year -being diverted to the agency at a net savings of \$6 million under cur-

rent spending on consumer programs. But the same change did not help the measure late last year when it died in the House and opponents have consistently argued the \$15 million would be only the beginning of another growing, long-term commitment.

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Year Of The Pessimist? ALTHOUGH SHOWING signs of an at-tempted recovery, the message from Wall

Street is still one of utmost caution. Or, put another way, whatever the Chinese astrologers may say, 1978 looks like the year

of the pessimist. A pessimistic economist, it is said, is one who feels bad when times are good for fear of feeling worse when business

That, in brief, pretty well sums things up.

ACTUALLY, THE economy is a case of some bad news and some good news.

The secretariat of the Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development, whose headquarters are in Paris forecasts that the industrialized West will slip back into a recession in the second half of 1978. Although the U.S. is expected to do somewhat better than its major trading partners, the OECD says the nation's growth rate in the July-December period will be only half of what it was in 1976.

In a similar vein, the research bureau of Euromoney magazine concluded that the Western economic powers face a new age of protectionism, that the dollar will continue to lose value in relation to other currencies, and that the world is on the verge of a recession. The theory that the "locomotive" sound fiscal policies in general

economies of Japan, West Germany and the U.S. could pull the rest of the world "back to sustainable non-inflationary growth was always suspect," the research bureau assert-

THE AMERICAN view of the economic future is decidely more upbeat.

Business Week observes that "virtually all the nation's top business forecasters agree that the economic recovery will continue at least through 1978 at about the current pace of advance: in the neighborhood of 4 per cent to 5 per cent real growth. Most economists, probing for trouble spots, can find some that theaten to curb growth at any time during 1978."

One of the major variables, ironically, rests with the man in the White House, who not only pledged a balanced budget by the end of his term, but pledged to keep the

economy going.

Hopefully, President Carter and his advisors are well aware of "what ails us" in the area of too high federal outlays on every-thing from welfare to the financial rescue of cities who can't or won't run their affairs in a businesslike manner. No one would be happier to see Mr. Carter come riding to the rescue of the economy in particular and

It's What's Inside That Counts

WASHINGTON-Probably more sincerely than any of the Presidents except Lincoln, Jimmy Carter has tried to bring the office down to the level of the common man

"I'm no better than anyone else," he said the other day, meaning that the Chief Magistry did not in itself exalt him, and that the office was not beyond the capacity of any average man to perform.

That Carter believes the Presidency has no special sheen, and required steady mental application rather than special talents, I don't doubt. But what I do doubt-and so does he-is that the American people look upon it that way.

This office has a majesty. It is greater than the hereditary power which is acquired by royal birth to kings, and greater than the powers carved out by the Napoleonic sword of conquerors.

THE PRESIDENCY HAS an inner greatness because it is the gift of the people. It is a finer gift for being sifted through the primary elections and the electoral college.

Otherwise it would be no more substantial an accolade than the roar of the crowd when the season's favorite athlete hits a homer or catches a touchdown pass. The Presidency is not just the acclaim of popularity.

The subject of presidential regality was in American minds at the beginning. Jefferson returned from traveling in Europe to join Washing-ton's cabinet, and said he'd never met a European monarch who had any more mentality than an average Virginia vestryman.

PRESIDENT WASHINGTON liked to show his leg in a silk stocking, and gave trouble to his tailors who didn't suit him in finery

In contrast, Jefferson when President, as afterwards and before, affected plainness of dress and manner. But he was not a thoroughly earnest man in many respects. The plainness was as much of a costume as Washington's finery.

A man such as Andrew Jackson was a frontier soldier who naturally graced the military garb. John Quincy Adams tried to prevent Jackson from being awarded a Harvard PhD on the grounds that the hero of New Orleans didn't know grammar or spelling.

But it was Jackson's protege and successor, Martin Van Buren, who achieved what Carter was thinking about-"I, as President, am no bet-

ter than anybody else." Van Buren was born in a tavern, had no military training, and he was a dandy in dress. But this vanity was only cloth deep. Little Van Buren understood national economics, such as banking and trade, better than the seven Presidents who came before.

On Medical Expenses

LET'S SAY YOUR physician tells you that it is medically imperative for you to install an improvement in your house-such as a pool, air conditioning or an elevator. If so, Treasury regulations allow you to treat as

a medical expense the cost of the improvement,

less any amount by which the value of your house may have been increased because of the improve-In a '77 Tax Court case, the IRS tried to limit this kind of medical expense to the cheapest

amount needed to achieve what the physician had recommended. In this instance, the physician had recommended that the taxpayer install a swimming pool in her house and that for the rest of her life she use

BECAUSE HER HOME was in Wisconsin, she had to have an indoor pool installed as an addition to her \$275,000 house

it twice a day to prevent permanent paralysis.

She paid \$172,000 for the pool-with part of the cost due to her wish that the pool be compatible

with her house. She figured that the pool added \$86,000 to the value of her house, so she deducted the other \$86,000 of the pool's cost as a medical expense.

The IRS agreed that the pool was medically essential but it argued she could have had it built for \$70,000, increasing her house's value by \$31,-000, and leaving her with a medical expense of only \$39,000 instead of \$86,000.

The Tax Court rejected the IRS argument. There are no cases that limit a medical expense to the cheapest form of treatment.

If, for instance, you pay for a private room in an expensive medical institution, instead of staying in a ward, you can deduct your cost and not be limited to the cost of a ward

SO. IF YOU MUST take on such medical expenses as these and IRS tries to reduce your deduction on the basis that you could have fulfilled your medical needs for less money, take some comfort from the high probability that the Tax Court will uphold you, the taxpayer, against the IRS on this point.

If you are among the many adoptive parents who undertake to pay the birth expenses of the unwed mother whose baby you plan to adopt, the Tax Court hit you with an unfavorable medical

BUT THE HOSPITAL and medical expenses you, the adoptive parents, pay in connection with the unwed mother's giving birth are as a general rule not deductible by you as medical expenses.

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




A twin-engine Cessna that stalled made Friday. Others touched down with no serious consequences in Grand Rapids, Chicago and Atlanta.

Eight other planes on the ground were also found with the fuel tainted with kerosene, a jet fuel that fouls propeller engines. Officials said the error was discovered in tests of the fuel from the Cessna

A spokesman for the airport's fuel concessionaire, Butler Aviation, said the tainted gasoline was delivered Thursday night from a Shell Oil Co. depot.

The bill of loading indicated that the fuel was high-octane gas, which was what we use to service the propeller craft," said Gary Watson, Butler's office manag-



Energy-Saving Steps

While homeowners wrestle with high heating bills and stuff insulation into attics and walls, apartment dwellers too often shrug off energy problems. "That's the landlord's job. What can I do?" they

The answer? A lot. Some of the same energy-saving techniques that apply to houses serve equally well in apartments and involve no major expenditures.

Experts at the cooperative extension service at Cornell University say wind infiltration is a key factor for many apartment residents, as well as for people who live in houses. Proper sealing around doors and windows can cut fuel consumption by 30 percent to 40 percent, according to the Cornell experts.

Caulking, weatherstripping and installing storm windows - temporary or permanent - are the basic ways to save, but it pays to know something about products and processes involved before you

Caulking is designed to seal cracks where two different materials or parts of the building meet. In an apartment, you might need caulking at joints where door and window frames meet the side of the building. You may also need it in spaces between air conditioners and window

The most popular form of caulking is the cartridge which is inserted into a caulking gun. Caulk also comes in squeezable tubes, in cans and in strands packaged in a roll. Most caulk has a limited shelf life; if you try to buy in bulk to save money, you may end up throwing out the extra. As a rule of thumb, you should fig-

ure on about half a cartridge per window. There are several materials available for caulking. Oil or resin base caulk is readily available, will bond to most surfaces and is generally the least expensive. It is not very durable, however.

Latex, butyl or polyvinyl based caulk also is readily available and will bond to most surfaces. It is more expensive and lasts longer than the oil or resin based va-

Elastomeric caulks are the most expensive and most durable. They include silicones, polysulfides and polyurethanes. Among the questions to ask before buy-

ing are: -How much will it shrink? Some caulking must be replaced every year because of shrinkage; other varieties are

—How does weather affect the application? Unfortunately for people who forget about the cold until winter actually arrives, most caulks go on best in warm weather. If caulking in warm weather is not rossible, warm the caulking tube itnot possible, warm the caulking tube it-self before you start. Be careful not to get

it too hot or the material will get runny.
Weatherstripping is designed to close
gaps around the moving parts of doors
and windows. Materials include foam, felt and metal. The easiest to apply is pressure-sensitive, adhesive-backed foam which comes in rolls. When compressed by a door or window, the foam seals out air. It can last from one to three years.

Metal strips are available in bronze, copper, stainless steel and aluminum finishes. They are packaged in rolls and come with either brads for installation or an adhesive-type backing. Metal weather-stripping usually is most durable.

Storm windows are the most expensive method of cutting heat loss. They create a dead air space between the two panes of glass; the air itself acts as an insulator. You may have to check with your landlord before installing them.

However, an inexpensive alternative is to tape plastic sheeting over windows to create an air pocket. Mount the plastic on the inside of the window with masking tape and leave at least three-fourths of an inch between the plastic and the window. Reminder: If you are trying to save energy by lowering the thermostat, be careful if an elderly person lives in the house or apartment. The National Institute on Aging recommends keeping the thermostant. Aging recommends keeping the thermo-stat above 65 degrees at all times for people over 65 because these people are par-ticularly vulnerable to hypothermia, a potentially fatal drop in body tempera-

Ford Ad Ruled Warranty

HIBBING, Minn. (AP) - A television commercial showing pickup trucks dashing over rough terrain and sailing through the air is as much a warranty as the paper an owner gets when he puts down his money, says a district county ju-

Steve Lastovitch, 24, sued Ford Motor Co. after his four-wheel-drive truck was dented during a rough trip through mud and sand. He contended that Ford should be required to pay \$500 in repairs.

The jury's ruling in Lastovitch's favor last month said that commercials showing vehicles withstanding rough trips are, in effect, part of the vehicle's warranty. William Thee, a Ford staff lawyer in Dearborn, Mich., had argued that the only warranty on vehicles is the "express warranty" given in writing to buyers at the time of purchase. He said Ford was "extremely disappointed" with the jury's verdict and is considering an appeal.

Thee said Ford has no plans to change its television commercial Lastovich, who bought the truck for

hunting trips in northern Minnesota, said his driving was mild compared to the workouts he had seen on television. "In no way did I ever jump it through the air or race it over sand or across rocky terrain like they do in those televi-sion ads," said Lastovitch.



Ohio City Faces Jobless Crisis

YOUNGSTOWN, Ohio (AP) - J. Phillip Richley became mayor of this valley steel town Jan. 1, just as Youngstown Sheet & Tube finished wiping some 5,000

jobs from its payrolls. Three days into his term, Richley was greeted with an announcement from U.S. Steel that it, too, was tired of spending

money on its Youngstown facility. U.S. Steel board Chairman Edgar Speer called it "an old factory which is based in

a bad geographical location." "The feeling here is that this is going to mean another 5,000 jobs lost," said Rich-

"We are not being singled out for any special punishment," he added. "The steel industry has a problem nationally. There is no basic steel policy that is mak-

ing any sense yet." Industry leaders agree that cheap imported steel, mostly from Japan and England, is the major problem.

"But the problem that we face is that we are going to be the focal point of that major national problem because proportionately, when you consider our size and when you consider the relative strength of steel in this area vs. other jobs, we will be hit harder than any other city in the nation," said Richley.

Youngstown and the surrounding county have a work force of 131,000. Before the cutbacks started, six area steel mills employed about 34,000 workers.

The full impact of the 5,000 steel layoffs already announced has not been calculated because it occurred too recently to be reflected in the latest unemployment sta-

However, it is estimated that an additional 5,000 to 7,000 jobs could be lost to the ripple effect on associated businessthe loss of up to 12,000 jobs — with more likely to follow — is an economic cata-

Richley is trying to fight back, but the prospects are not good, especially for continued reliance on the steel industry.

Steel production started in the Mahoning Valley 175 years ago, mainly because of an abundance of iron, coal and limestone, its principal ingredients. The area is equidistant from Cleveland, Pittsburgh, New York and Chicago.

However, the raw materials were used up long ago, leaving mills dependent on iron from Minnesota and on coal and limestone from Pennsylvania and south-

While Richley and other officials scramble to create new jobs, laid off workers have little to do but pick up weekly unemployment checks and hang out at union halls.

In the mills, they made an average of \$8.51 an hour, \$340 for a 40-hour week. Maximum unemployment ranges from \$102 a week for a single person to \$175 for a person with three or more dependents. And they can only draw that for 26

After that?

"Sure, there's some retraining programs around," said Earl Reagan, 41, who had worked for Sheet & Tube 22 years before his job was eliminated. "But what good would that do? I started to work here when I was 19 years old. What would I train for? Would there be a job for me when I learned something else?"

The Mahoning Valley Economic Development Committee was created recently to try to keep existing jobs, recruit new industry and ease the hardship of those

orial Institute of Columbus to develop a plan for diversifying the economic base of the area. Battelle told the committee it will take \$1 million over the next five years to lure 20,000 new jobs to the area.

"We are not going to abandon steel by any means," Richley said. "(But) we are realistic enough to know that we've got to begin to diversify and we have to start moving in that direction or we are going to be in serious trouble in the long haul.

Last November, a few days after Richley's election, a Japanese firm reportedly expressed interest in taking over Youngstown Sheet & Tube's operation. A local delegation headed by retiring Mayor Jack Hunter was ready to fly to Japan to nurture the interest when the State Department sent word they might violate proto-

The matter was dropped and local offi-cials have heard nothing since from either the State Department or Japanese interests.

A study is under way on the feasibility of a worker-community coalition buying or leasing the Sheet & Tube facilities here to update and re-open the mill.

Union and business leaders of the area estimate such a coalition would need from \$250 million to \$500 million for modernization and startup capital. Richley said that with enough local support. such a move could qualify for a 90 percent federal loan guarantee to raise the

Tokyo Airport Nears Opening

By TELJI SHIMIZU TOKYO (UPI) — After 12 years of construction and delays, a cost of \$2.6 billion and the deaths of five persons, the con-troversial new Tokyo International Air-port at Narita is scheduled to open March

Located 41 miles east of the Japanese capital, it is the second most distant airport in the world from the city it is to serve. Only Giracopos airport, 60 miles from Sao Paulo, Brazil, is more remote.

Some 30 international airlines that presently operate an average of 148 flights a day out of Haneda Airport in To-kyo are scheduled to move into Narita in time for the March 30 inauguration.

The only international carrier slated to keep its operation in Haneda will be Tai-wan's China Air Lines. Peking's planes will go to Narita.

The Narita airport has had trouble ever since the Japanese government decided 12 years ago to construct it on what was once a sprawling peanut farm and forest.

Much of the trouble will remain unresolved even after the \$2.6 billion facility opens its main terminal, one 13,120-foot runway and other buildings.

Railway company officials say a special express train can take passengers from

Tokyo to Narita in one hour. Highway officials believe the new airport is about an hour and a half from Tokyo by car - if the expressways are not congested. But other estimates say the travel time to Narita could run up to three hours at the peak of the highway rush hours that are bound to occur.

The airport originally was scheduled to to open with three runways. But because the government had trouble purchasing land from farmers, it will go into opera-

The Narita airport was constructed to replace Haneda as Tokyo's international airport. Originally it was believed that once Narita was completed, more international flights would come to Japan.

Now, however, any major increase in the number of international flights is considered almost improveible.

sidered almost impossible.

The airport was designed to have three runways, but construction of the second and third landing strips has been stalled by stiff opposition from farmers and en-

During the height of anti-airport move-ments, about 850 farmers refused to give up their land and clashed with riot police. Thousands of leftist unionists and students joined their cause.

Four policemen and one demonstrator died in clashes at Narita during the past several years.

More than 100 farmers and their relatives live on the sites designated for the second and third runways, but they have refused to leave their land. They vow they will force the government to shut down the new airport.

Opponents of the airport contend it could be used for military purposes in the future. Environmentalists also are against it because it may create pollution.

The government originally planned to construct an underground pipeline for jet fuel from the nearby port of Chiba to

Tobacco Companies **Unhurt By Campaign**

NEW YORK (AP) — The recent clam-or in Washington against cigarette smok-ing has produced no sign of alarm to date among investors and Wall Street analysts

True, Standard & Poor's index of four representative tobacco issues stood at a 1976-77 low as January drew to a close. But so did 25 other industry group indexes calculated by S&P, as well as most of the leading market indicators.

"If anything, the tobacco stocks have been doing a little better than the market," said Arthur Baer, an analyst who tracks the group for the brokerage firm of Shearson Hayden Stone, Inc.

"I've been analyzing the tobacco companies for about seven years, and each time one of these major criticisms comes out, it seems to have less effect than the

out, it seems to have less effect than the

Joseph Califano, secretary of health,

education and welfare, put the subject of cigarettes back on the front page recently when he called for a federal advertising campaign against it.

A commission set up by the American Cancer Society joined the debate last week when it urged that the tobacco industry be held accountable by the government for the safety of its products.

"The domestic industry has had to live with reams of unfavorable publicity ever since the U.S. surgeon general's 1964 report linking cigarette smoking with lung cancer," the Value Line Investment survey observed in its latest report on tobacco companies.

"In the last few years, anti-smoking forces have succeeded in eliminating or limiting smoking in many public places. Smoking sections on planes are the latest to fall under attack ... While all of these negative factors have had an impact on the tobacco industry, it is significant that total industry profits are at an all-time

Democratic Rep. Daniel Flood wrote several letters to the State Department in 1973 and 1974 urging more Haitian aid, department officials said last weekend.

Flood's letters asking U.S. aid had no effect because a decision was made more than a year earlier to resume the assistance, the State Department offi-

Flood was not available for comment. He has consistently refused to talk about Elko, who has accused Flood of accepting more than \$100,000 in questionable payments in matters not related to the Haitian deals

Elko's allegations about Flood led former U.S. Attorney David Marston to investigate Flood's relationship with Rep. Joshua Eilberg, D-Pa., and the congressmen's dealings with a Philadelphia hospi-

Eilberg later sought Marston's ouster in a phone call to Presient Carter, during which the president agreed to have Attorney General Griffin Bell expedite the dis-

Elko was convicted of accepting bribes for using Flood's office to benefit a West Coast trade school and faces a prison term. He has been granted immunity and, according to an affidavit filed in court by federal prosecutors, has accused Flood of accepting more than \$100,000 in payoffs.

It is not known what Elko has told prosecutors about the Haitian affair, if anything, and there is no indication that Flood profited personally from the deals. Most of what is known comes from official records, and what has been told to Americans by a Haitian businessman, Lucien Rigaud.

Rigaud has told Americans that Flood was able to pick the companies that would receive contracts with Haiti to perform work financed by U.S. government

Rigaud is offering to provide federal investigators with additional details of the Flood-Haiti connection in return for help in getting out of Haiti, where he is a virtual prisoner in the Mexican consulate. Rigaud was imprisoned on murder

charges for 17 months before he escaped. He is living under diplomatic asylum at the home of the Mexican charge d'affaires in Port-au-Prince. Haitian officials will not guarantee him safe conduct if he tries to leave the building. According to what Rigaud has told American visitors, Elko visited Haiti in

October 1973, seeking an audience with Haitian President-for-life Jean-Claude Duvalier. Rigaud arranged the meeting through a Maj. Roger Cazeau. Rigaud says he and Cazeau then flew to Washington, authorized by Duvalier to

negotiate on behalf of the government. According to one account, they stayed at Flood's apartment in Washington. Records of the Overseas Private Investment Corp., a government agency that

provides financing and insurance for American businesses in underdeveloped nations, show that Elko called on behalf of two different commercial deals. On Oct. 18, 1973, OPIC officials met

with a representative of the Hyatt hotel chain. The hotel wanted backing for a hotel-casino, but OPIC refused to finance a gambling establishment.

Because the man was bleeding from the ear, nose and mouth, the jailer told the policemen the suspect would not be accepted until he was examined. Following a discussion among themselves, the officers "dragged (him) into the public booking hall and slung him into the bars," according to the county report. The report indicated the prisoner lost a tooth at that time and then was dragged out of public view.

Another jailer who was called to the area said that as the prisoner tried to stand he was kicked in the ribs by police. According to another jailer's report, after the officers dragged the prisoner through the electronically operated doors outside the booking area, they refused to leave their weapons outside, as is the jail's policy. The report notes the weapons were not brought out until after the officers had taken the prisoner inside the booking room.

The jailers said they repeatedly explained to the policemen why they 'could not and would not" accept the prisoner without a medical examination.

The county employees maintain there was considerable "yelling and name call-ing" on the part of the officers as they awaited the ambulance.

Sheriff C.H. "Choc" Blanchard today said he originally was summoned to the jail because the officers "were not complying with the jail's policies." He said he was told they refused to leave their guns outside the booking area before entering, and that there was an argument over securing medical treatment for the prisoner.

According to Jail Supervisor Gary McGrew, no action has been taken against any of the jail personnel and the county's part of the investigation is com-

Police Chief J.T. Alley today said the police department "welcomes" the FBI's entering the probe. He said no decision yet has come from the investigation and no further action has been taken against

County Board Hikes Utility Rates At Lake

By JACK DOUGLAS Avalanche-Journal Staff Buffalo Springs Lake residents had their utility rates raised today at a meet-

ing of the lake's governing board.

Residents' monthly sewer service costs, presently \$1.50, were hiked to \$4.50. Garbage disposal rates, now costing \$2.50 per month, were raised to \$3.50. The rate boost is effective as of Feb. 1.

Some of the reasons directors gave for raising rates were the federal government's increase in the minimum hourly wage, rising costs of materials and sup-plies, the doubling of the cost for treatment of sewage effluent by Lake Ransom Canyon, increasing costs for electricity to operate pumps and the increase in the minimum hourly wage. Other factors cited were inflation of the

the district.



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Paper Cites America's Respect For Humphrey

Pawtucket (R.I) Times: Wherever you stand on the political

spectrum, you had to look favorably in some way on Hubert Horatio Humphrey. You may have loved him for his liberal political philosophy, or you may have hated him for it. You may have liked him as an individual - gregarious, sincere in his love of and concern for people; or you may have looked upon him as bombastic, garrulous and somewhat lacking realism as he preached his "politics of joy" phi-

But for his pure and undistilled love of America, the boundless energy he brought to public service, his limitless faith in the ability of this country to soar to even greater heights of achievements and his unswerving conviction in the workability of the democratic system for these qualities, the mass of Americans cast aside partisanship and ideological preferences and voiced praise and panegyrics for this man from the flatlands of South Dakota and the lake-pocked soil of Minnesota

A staunch and loyal Democrat, he was an even stauncher and more loyal American. He could transcend party lines if the country's good called for it. The respect in which his colleagues held him was demonstrated by the honors accorded him in Washington at his passing.

His legacy is varied. Those who may in the future enter the political arena can only take encouragement from his life. for he lost a contest for mayor, for two presidential nominations, for the presidency itself, but he still fashioned an eminent and influential career.

He changed this nation's course. Historians will not write of how he may have changed it even more had a mere 500,000 votes out of the 73,000,000 cast been distributed differently in 1968. The (Nashville) Tennessean:

Mrs. Hubert Humphrey has agreed to fill the U.S. Senate seat of her late husband and said she expects to complete 'some important business Hubert hoped to finish." She may just do that.

Her acceptance smoothed over some possible rough spots in Minnesota politics. Gov. Rudy Perpich, who first indicated there would be no "caretaker" appointment for the seat, would have had a dilemma about any choice except the sentimental one. So he has avoided party conflicts and pleased most, if not all.

Mrs. Humphrey isn't expected to be just a seat warmer in the Senate. She is a veteran campaigner of many political wars, state and national. She has extensive knowledge about the body politic and about the programs in which her husband was interested.

Her husband overshadowed Mrs. Humphrey, but if there are those in the Senate who tend to think of her only as the "charming Muriel," they may be in for a surprise or two. Tulsa World:

President Carter apparently has decided he must get involved with the leadership of the National Democratic Party, promising "much closer" cooperation aders than in the past

He admitted to the National Democratic Committee that it didn't get much cooperation from the White House last year but promised that would be remedied this year as Democrats go before the vot-

His appearance before the Committee and the appointment of Texan John C. White as chairman of the party appears to mark a change in attitude by the President, who has taken a standoffish position in regard to pedestrian Democratic party politics

Carter has assured Democrats that he will indeed step into the political arena this year to try to help get Democrats elected. That in itself is a departure from the previous attitude of the Administration which has generally worried strictly about its own problems.

The shift in posture by Carter is a clear admission that he now understands that as president he has a responsiblity to his own party, and that although he successfully ran an "outsider" campaign to capture the White House he can no longer be an outsider

As with so many "outs" who become ins," the president is being forced to take up the duties that mark him as the "establishment." Besides that, the president no doubt is beginning to realize that come 1980 he's going to need the national organization.

That's because there might be another "outsider" waiting to run a Carter-like campaign against the president.

Scripps-Howard Newspapers:
Brace yourself for what likely will be the most extravagantly expensive congressional election campaign in American history this fall.

Candidates for the House and Senate are expected to spend well over \$100 million this year. And much of the money perhaps one dollar in four - will come from corporations, labor unions and trade and professional associations seeking political favors in return .

The main reason so much private money is being spent on congressional campaigns is that presidential campaigns now are financed primarily with public funds. That means more money can be diverted to key congressmen who can "do us some good," as the lobbyists like to put it, in legislative matters ...

Such vying for favor might be less common if congressional races were financed at least partly with federal matching funds. Candidates then could run for office without catering to doctors or dairymen or maritime unions or some other

group with a poliitical war chest.

The House, which twice has turned down public financing of congressional campaigns, will consider a new bill this spring that would match private donations of \$100 or less up to a total of \$50,-000 per nominee. The money would come out of the \$1 income tax checkoff fund

and apply only to general election campaigns. Overall spending for House races would be limited to \$150,000.

This bill, or something like it, is needed in both houses. Otherwise, we'll have an even wilder scramble for money and in-fluence in 1980 than we're already witnessing this year.

New York Times: Soon after his inauguration, President Curter took pains to locate, display and identify with Harry Truman's sign, "The buck stops here." To Mr. Carter's credit, he has now taken pains to demonstrate that, when it comes to controlling American intelligence activities, the famous credo is wrong. In a new executive order, the Administration recognizes firmly that prevention of abuse by intelligence agencies requires Congressional as well as executive overseers. And it recognizes that even stronger overseers will not suffice; legal charters for the intelligence agencies are necessary ...

... the new Carter order remains too re-liant on discretion and too vague in its de-tailed protections of the rights of individuals ... even a good executive order remains just that - a transient document subject to harried, exigent interpretation or change by some future administration besieged by unpredictable urgencies, The rights of Americans not to be spied on or harassed deserve to be carefully carved

into the surer stone of the law.

Bangor (Maine) Daily News: It was during the Watergate days that the Washington press corps portrayed President Nixon's chief of staff, H.R. Haldeman, as the supreme autocrat — the next thing to a lieutenant in the Third

The press at the same time vigorously condemned the concept of a chief of staff in the Oval Office. They said it was typi-cally Nixonian, and that no U.S. presi-dent should have his office regimen "dicated" by a chief of staff.

President Carter may have been "playing" to this Washington press disposition against a presidential chief of staff when he spoke unfavorably of the idea in his campaign. Once in office, though, Carter was true to his word: he appointed no chief of staff and reportedly has encouraged an inner circle in the White House that is unstructured and loose as a goose.

Now, a little more than three years later, the same Washington press corps is reportedly in a furor about the urgent need for a White House chief of staff. The press is taking this contradictory tack because of the evident lack of staff coordination on the part of the Administration. The lack of planning and purposeful

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

Prisoners Release

Hostages NEW WESTMINSTER, British Colum-

bia (UPI) — Three prisoners freed the last of their hostages to end an eight-day drama, and police accused two of the women captives with complicity in the

breakout attempt.
Gay Hoon and Betsy Wood, well-known prisoners' rights activists, were ordered to court today on charges of attempted murder and assisting an escape attempt from British Columbia Penitentiary.

They were among five persons released Saturday by the last three of five inmates who seized 13 persons in a bungled escape attempt Jan. 28 to start what became the longest hostage incident in the history of the century-old prison.

The five inmates — Andy Bruce, Ste-phen Hall, Richard Wright, Ralph Saumer and David Bennett - were held at separate Royal Canadian Mounted Police jails. A Mountie spokesman said they would be charged with various offenses in the week-long incident,

"The inmates received no ultimate benefits from their actions," said Canadian Penitentiary Service spokesman Jack

"We were not prepared to give them anything. Hostage-takers, as far as we are concerned, should get absolutely nothing," Mountie Supt. Bruce Northorp

The siege began when five rebel convicts smashed through a glass partition in the visitor's area and seized 13 persons most of them wives or girlfriends of oth-

Guard Roy Yasuda was slashed across the neck with a knife and Bruce was wounded in the leg, apparently by a shot fired by a fellow inmate. The convicts were armed with a revolver, a knife and a 30-inch steel pipe.

He and his family believe Lubbock can learn from the experiences of Louisville and surrou ing Jefferson County public schools in implementing court-or-dered desegregation here:

Parents who want integration to work must not give in to anti-busing forces - however strong or violent that pressure may be.

The educational community, notably public school and university officials, must take the lead in preparing students, parents and teachers for peaceful integration. And, perhaps the most important

lesson of all, school desegregation by busing can have many advantages for children, Dietz and his wife Kathy said. To that, their son Joe, now a seventh-grader at Lubbock's Evans Junior High School,

can testify.
"It was fun. The kids didn't mind it, only the parents did," said Joe,

who as a fifth-grader during the Jefferson County students bused from Louisville suburbs to previously all-black inner-city schools.

Joe said the experience allowed him to meet new friends, try different from the statement of the statement of

ferent programs (he was trans-ferred from a traditional school in the suburbs to an open concep school) and take more field trips.

"We think this experience was one of the best things that could happen to Joey," Mrs. Dietz said of her son's assignment to Cooler-idge Taylor Elementary in Louisville's downtown area in 1975. "It really opened his eyes to the city.'

Most parents in Jefferson County did not feel that way. Many boy-cotted public schools. Some put their children in private schools or vowed to leave the city. And parents who did cooperate with the school system's desegregation plan sometimes received threats — a few houses were bombed — by the Ku Klux Klan and other anti-bus-

ing groups.

But as violent and disruptive as those protests were, they would have been much worse had not school authorities, the University

of Louisville and other community forces pulled together, Dietz said. "Unfortunately I don't see the same things at work in Lubbock. The elements that worked in favor of school integration in Louisville are totally lacking here. All we're left with in Lubbock is the fuel for real violence," he said.

"I sincerely hope violence doesn't happen, that somehow we can avoid it. But unless somebody gets the ball rolling, and soon, this community is likely to come

apart," Dietz said. The Lubbock The Lubbock Independent School District is drafting plans to increase the racial balance and en-rollment of nine minority schools, as required by U.S. District Judge Halbert O. Woodward. School offi-

cials say such a remedy may in-volve the entire school system. What bothers Dietz has been the

The rig was owned by Mims Meat Company, Inc., Houston. It was westbound on the two-lane highway four miles west of Soldier Summit when the mishap oc-



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Butter Cruise' Tourists Opt For Big Savings, Not Suntans

TRAVEMUENDE, West Germany (AP) — Thousands of German shoppers are flocking to this Baltic port to cruise on sailing supermarkets where they can buy everything from booze to butter at most bottom prices.

rock-bottom prices.

Six days a week, about 300 ships carry passengers on shopping sprees for food, liquor, perfume and other luxury items without customs duties or German sales taxes. Once the vessels leave port for five-hour jaunts to the Baltic or North seas, the stores open for business.

"That's where I do my weekly shop ping," said a 75-year-old woman as she struggled down the gangplank of the pop-ular Baltic Star with a load of groceries. "I bought a pound of butter, cigarettes for my son and some good schnapps. It's

Most of the "butter cruise" ships, as they are popularly known, make perfunc-tory calls at Scandinavian harbors to sat-Common Market requirements, but the passengers aren't interested in

They want their goods and then back to Travemuende as soon as possible, said Holger Funck, a former sea captain and now inspector for a butter cruise firm that operates three ships.

"Common Market rules say we have to go to a port. We can't just sail out to sea and come back. If we did, we would have to be out eight hours, and the passengers don't want that."

The Common Market, fearing the cruises will undermine its food price policy, recently announced sharp cutbacks effective Wednesday in the amount of food that can be purchased. But shoppers car. still save plenty without paying Germany's 12 percent sales tax and 6 percent levy on food

"The new rules will probably hurt our business somewhat, but they won't stop it." said Funck. "For one thing, the changes do not affect liquor sales and passengers can still buy butter and other

Each adult shopper can bring back about \$45 worth of food and limited quantities of other goods - 200 cigarettes, one bottle of liquor, two bottles of wine, a half-pound of coffee, a quarterpound of tea, one bottle of perfame and one bottle of cologne. Children often pur-chase toys and food but are prohibited

chase toys and food but are prohibited from buying liquor or eigarettes.

Usually consumers can save about one-third on grocery and other items by buying on the butter cruises. A carton of eigarettes, for example, sells for \$7.20 on board compared with \$12.60 in German stores; a pound of butter goes for \$1.30 compared with \$2.07 at a local shop; a pound of prime beef filet sells for \$3.90 compared with \$7.25 on shore; and a pared with \$7.25 on shore; and a quart of bourbon goes for \$7.60, a savings of almost \$4.

Once passengers have bought their limit, they can spend more money in the cruise ships' restaurants and bars or by playing the slot machines. The individual ip companies operate all the shops on

Ticket prices are nominal, usually less than \$1. One elderly couple from Hanover, 120 miles to the south, said they paid 45 cents for a combination ticket that included bus fare and the price of the

The ticket price was less than bus fare to their neighborhood grocery store, the couple noted.

In the summer and on weekends, Germans of all ages crowd the vessels. But in the winter, most of the passengers are re-tired persons who can afford to spend hours at sea but not pay high prices at the

Erwin Reuss, spokesman for the German food ministry, said the cruise operators cut costs in part by purchasing farm products wholesale in Scandinavia or Britain where food prices are lower. For instance, there is a 100 percent tariff on U.S. beef imported into West Germany.

Although the prices of goods on board the butter cruises are cheap, there is still plenty of room for markup because of the lack of taxes or tariffs. Sources said the sellers are able to get about 100 percent

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Americans Suffer From 'Secret Disease

By RICHARD SALTUS LOS ANGELES (AP) - Thousands of Americans suffer from a peculiar "secret sease," an inexplicable terror of public places that keeps them virtual prisoners

The syndrome is called agoraphobia, and Dr. Arthur Hardy estimates that as many as 1 in 100 people may be "materi-ally" affected by it at some time.

The victims' stories are strikingly alike: the sudden onset of panic in a supermarket or city street, the fear that they are going insane, the shrinking of the boundaries of their "safe" world until, in some cases, their home or even a closet becomes a prison.

'One day I was going Christmas shopping and it hit," said a North Hollywood oman who has been almost totally

"housebound" for seven years. "I can visit my neighbor three doors away, but I won't go to the end of the block - I'd have a panic attack," she said. "In the last six months I've been

two places - my lawyer's (she is getting divorced - a frequent consequence) and my mother's." Like many agoraphobes, she finds supermarkets - with their lines, turnstiles and crowds - occasions for a fear of being trapped. And driving, once a great

pleasure, now is simply impossible. "It is like a secret disease that has gone for a long time without being discovered," said Hardy, a psychiatrist who founded Terrap, Inc., a corporation with a dozen centers for treating the problem. Agoraphobia is one of many recognized phobias, or irrational fears that are usual-

The more the terrified victim tries to control or conceal this strange fear, the worse it becomes. The urge is to run for the safety of home. Commonly, over a period of time, the person sees the boundaries of his world shrink as fear overtakes him on the freeway, in stores, public buildings. There is a scary feeling of being trapped in crowds.

"Eventually I took to my house and found I couldn't be comfortable anywhere else," said an Orange County woman. "I figured I had to be totally nuts. Even getting out of bed became an ordeal - the morning was horrifying."

A 23-year-old student was housebound for two years, able to force himself outside only for a brief walk once a week.

"People literally tried to drag me out of the house, but I wouldn't go," said Alan Reed. "I read. I did yoga two hours a day. I worried a lot."

Another man, Hardy said, could emerge only to get the daily newspaper. He waited until dusk, to conceal his exit, then crept out the door backwards - so that he could bolt back inside should the panic strike.


Several victims said that Terrap helped them after conventional psychotherapy was of no use. They said that being in groups with other agoraphobes made them realize they weren't loony after all. Hardy claims that about 80 percent of the clients improve, to a greater or lesser degree. However, he has published no data in any scientific form and follow-up of cases has been limited to a questionnaire sent out six months after the treatment,

he said. Mental health experts say it takes much longer than this to determine the value of a behavior-modifying therapy, as relapses are common.

Phobias are "an incredibly complex problem and it's unlikely that there is any simple cure," said a UCLA research psychiatrist who asked not to be identified. "But one should never close one's mind. A lot of good therapies have come

out of non-academic situations." The Terrap treatment, a course of sessions up to six months long, costs from \$550 to \$650. Terrap centers are located in Los Angeles, San Francisco, Danville,

Attorney **Prepares** For Climb

By DEBORAH FRAZIER BOULDER, Colo. (UPI) - As Glenn Porzak jogs with 60 pounds of rocks thumping in his backpack, he dreams about his ultimate adventure which lies beyond the scream of fans and in a region not reached by commercial endorse-

The 29-year-old attorney and a party of eight other climbers leave this month for Manaslu, at 26,760-feet the seventh highest mountain in the world and located in the central Nepalese Himalayas near the Tibetian border.

"Every athlete has an ultimate goal. For the skier it is a gold medal. For a football player, it is the Super Bowl. But for a mountain climber, it is to climb one of the world's 14 26,000-foot peaks," he

Years of training are required for a climb into a lethally high altitude and into temperatures 40 degrees below zero.



Treatments Conflict

By LAWRENCE E. LAMB, M.D. DEAR DR. LAMB - Our 13-yearold son has Osgood-Schlatter disease Our family doctor told us over six months ago that he could be as good as new in six months to a year's time if he used his legs as little as possible. His condition has become worse and now his knees are swollen and he limps when he walks.

A friend's son was showing the same symptoms of the disease, so she took him to a bone specialist. This doctor said her son would never be cured of the disease. He said that exercising the knees would make no difference one way or the other, so he should particiapate in any sport he was capable of and refrain from anything that aggravated his condition. Could you tell us about this disease and what you think we should do for

DEAR READER - The disease is caused by a problem with the cartilage and bony parts that form the area just below the knee cap. This spot is called the tibial tubercle. The tibia is the large bone in the leg and the tubercle is where the large tendon that encloses the knee cap is at-

It is not surprising that this would be a site for trouble. After all, the thigh and leg bones are the two longest bones in the body and represent the longest levers for action. That means the leverage can cause a great deal of force. And the force is applied by the strongest muscle in the body, the quadriceps over the front of the thigh.

In Osgood-Schlater disease there is a failure of union of all the bony centers that are still maturing in young children or an actual injury at the sit of the tendon's attachment. It affects boys three times as often as girls; it occurs in girls between the ages of 8 and 13 and in boys between 10 and 15. It may last until the bony development in the legs is complete.

The condition usually can be helped by conservative treatment. Almost all authorities agree that the knee should be rested and some put a short cast or splint around the knee with the knee straight to prevent any pulling of the tendon on the tubercle

Others tend to neglect the disease and do little active treatment, but I am surprised that anyone would recommend athletic activity and other things which are apt to increase the strain on the area.

In some cases, orthopedic specialists do use injections of cortisone with an anesthetic agent. If one shot helps, a second may be warranted

This is usually not required for most cases, but it is one more trick the doctor has up his sleeve.

Finally, in a very few cases when there is a piece of fractured bone in an abnormal position or some other complication, an operation is indicated. This also can be done to reduce the size of an exceptionally large knobby knee that may result from Osgood-Schlater's disease.

You want to be sure your doctor is making his diagnosis on the basis of X-ray studies. If not, more serious disorders of the knee, including a bone tumor may be missed. Since your son's condition has gotten worse instead of better, you might have a consultation with an orthopedic specialist. See if your family doctor can arrange to have him seen at the University Medical Center in your state for a consultation.

Chicago Bank Uses Diamonds **To Pay Interest Obligations**

CHICAGO (UPI) - A Southwest Side bank is dangling diamonds on the hook in hopes it will snare high rollers in the world of bank depositors.

The Ford City Bank pays off its interest obligations in unset diamonds at wholesale prices instead of cash if customers prefer. The deposits are mostly four-year

Mrs. Maureen McQuinn, manager of personal banking, said the idea has caught on so well the program has been extended beyond its original Jan. 31

"About 75 depositors so far have gone for the diamond premium plan," Mrs. McQuinn said, "and we expect it to go well over 100 by Feb. 15 on the basis of inquiries. That's much better than we ex-

The bank felt duty bound to extend the shutoff date because many of its diamond-minded depositors were forced to wait through Jan. 31 for other certificates to mature.

"We extended the deadline to accommodate a lot of good customers until their interest was available to them," Mrs. McQuinn said.

The diamond payoff ranges in size from one-half to two-and-a-half carats. There also is one super special - a 15-carat stone not intended for the average wage

The 15-carat diamond comes with a \$430,000 four-year certificate of deposit. A half-carat requires a \$2,225 four-year deposit. A two-carat stone is payable as interest for a \$23,950 deposit for four

years, a 30-month deposit of \$40,150 or a 12-month deposit of \$103,600.

The value is expressed in terms of wholesale prices and the stones are avail-

able at the time the deposit is made. The bank has arranged with neighbor-hood merchants to set the stones at a discount of 20 percent. Most settings begin at about \$70.

"Most deposits have been for stones of a carat-and-a half," Mrs. McQuinn said, which seems to establish the plan as popular with more affluent investors.

The program is the brainchild of Gregg Hodgson, president of Hall, Hodgson Co., the bank's advertising agency. Hodgson said diamonds are "a far better" payoff than dollars or other promo-

"A lot of places offer television sets or microwave ovens," Hodgson said. "But in four years, what do you have? A wornout TV set? A 4-yearold microwave oven?

"Money? Inflation knocks its value down. Historically it has depreciated at a tremendous rate. But diamonds they've appreciated dramatically in the last several years."

The diamond program, Hodgson said, "is my own idea. It must be a good one, though, because we've had inquiries from all over the country asking for details."

The wholesale price is quoted, Hodgson said, because government regulations forbid quoting at retail. The bank, however, guarantees that the diamonds will appraise for considerably more than the price paid by its customers.

percent state sales tax, which comes to about \$29 for a half-carat and \$360 for the two-carat gem. But, the bank said, the appreciation trend in diamonds more than offsets effects of the tax.



of court-ordered busing here.
"Some block it out of their minds entirely. They say it just can't happen here. They don't want to accept reality. And if it ends up that their child is bused, they're going to panic," Dietz said.
"The other reaction is fear, with

parents saying, 'It's not going to happen to us because we won't let it. We'll move or put our child in a private school.'

"They've never stopped to analyze exactly what they're afraid of. It's the parents - not the children who create this fear about busing and integration. Then the parents pass these attitudes onto their kids," Dietz said.

"We heard all this before in Louisville. It's history repeating itself. The type of reaction we've had already in Lubbock is what leads me to believe the fuel for violence is the same," he said.

Mrs, Dietz said Lubbock parents uld re-examine their objections to busing — the fear, for example, that their child may be far from home in the event of an emergen-

"That's a rationalization," she said. "First of all, the City of Lubbock is not so big that a sick child can't be driven from one part of town to another within 15 or 20 tes - half an hour at most.

"Besides that, many parents work during the day. Even if their child is attending the school clos-est to home, they'd have the same problem picking him up in case of

In fact, Mrs. Dietz said, many working parents probably would find it easier to drive from their ess, if it's located downtown, to a school in the central part of Lubbock should there be such a

ing, she said, is that distance to

"We didn't find that to be true at all. When your school system is going through something such as integration, your help as a parent it's this need, not the proximity to school, that determines how much parents participate in school activities." Mrs. Dietz said.

Regarding students, she sees busing as "a positive force. It shakes up the school system, injects new ideas into the way of doing things and spreads around the resources.

Her husband explained that when children from affluent homes in Jefferson County were assigned to inner-city schools, there was more pressure on the school system administration to upgrade those schools.

And, Dietz said, students assigned from the inner-city to the suburbs brought with them new programs that had been available only in central Louisville. "Jefferson County has a better school system now," he said.

Joe said that half-hour bus ride he used to take from the suburbs to the city was of little importance. "It was like a study hall," he said. But his parents believe it was more than that.

"There's no greater liberal education than taking a bus ride from the affluent part of the city into the downtown area - past the office buildings, the housing projects," Mrs. Dietz said. "The bus ride in itself gave Joey a feeling for the whole idea of integration how other people live."

The Dietzes reside at 3024 60th St., near Parsons Elementary, where three of their children -Tim, Sharon and Beth - attend Besides Joe, they have one other child - Mike, in pre-school.

They moved here in 1976 when Don Dietz accepted his position at Texas Tech.

"When we decided to leave Louisville and come to Lubbock, it was Joey who voiced the most opposition," Mrs. Dietz said.

Pipeline Pump Nears Operation

PUMP STATION 8, Alaska (AP) - In the aftermath, the five men in the pump house at Pump Station 8 on the trans-Alaska oil pipeline that muggy summer day were incredulous that such a thing could happen.

Everything had been tried and tried and tested and tested," Herbert Robson recalled. "We had done nothing else for the past 10 weeks but check the system

But the trying and the testing and the checking were found wanting last July 8 when a valve that was supposed to be kept closed was opened by mistake.

Crude oil under high pressure sprayed into the pump room. Within moments the pump house was destroyed by an explosion and flames.

One man was killed. Robson and four others were injured. The flow of oil through the 800-mile line did not start again for 10 days, with Pump 8 bypassed. It has taken more than seven months, but now the reconstruction work on Pump 8 is almost complete. It should be back in operation pushing oil through the

\$7.7 billion line next month. Alyeska Pipeline Service Co. says the cost of replacing the pump house and othe damaged facilities is not yet known. Unofficial estimates put the cost at about \$50 million.

The destruction of the pump house delayed the delivery of millions of barrels of crude oil from Alaska's North Slope to

markets in the lower 48 states.

Alyeska had planned to be running 1.2 million barrels of crude a day through the line by last fall, but with Pump 8 down the flow has been held to about 700,000 to -750,000 barrels a day.

Investigators found that through "human error" a valve that had been closed while Robson and his four co-workers were cleaning a strainer in one of the three huge pumps at the station was

Oil spurted into the pump room, vapor-ized and ignited. Robson and the others got out before the pump house ripped

Shock waves were felt more than 10 miles away, and a huge plume of black smoke was visible for twice that distance.

"We have a fire. We've had a hell of an explosion," a supervisor at Pump 8 shouted over the telephone to the pipeline Operations Control Center at Valdez. It took only four minutes to halt the

flow of oil along the entire length of the line, but by that time flaming oil had flooded what was left of the pump house and rivers of fire flowed from it. Fire engulfed construction equipment

and burned through a birch and spruce forest. The air smelled like burning rub-

Reconstruction started almost immediately and continued through the winter months when the temperature here, 33 miles southeast of Fairbanks, often dips to 40 or more degrees below zero.

A mantle of snow now masks the damage caused by the streams of burning crude. The twisted hulk of the pump house has been replaced by a new struc-

After another period of trying and testing and checking, crude oil from Prudhoe Bay will soon again be flowing through Pump Station 8.

Government To Tighten **Procedures**

WASHINGTON (UPI) - The government plans to tighten procedures for issuing Social Security cards in an effort to prevent illegal aliens from obtaining U.S. identification documents.

Applicants for Social Security numbers, regardless of age, will be required to submit "documentary" evidence of age, identity and citizenship or alien status. Currently only applicants 18 and older

legal alien status is required only if the applicant is not a citizen. All adults will be interviewed in depth to assure they never had a Social Security number and were not getting one for

must submit evidence of age; evidence of

someone else. The Department of Health, Education and Welfare said the new procedures will begin this year and are aimed at "possible misuse of the Social Security card as an indicator of lawful status in the United States" and other misuses, such as attempted change of identities.

The new procedures are described in a "budget justification" accompanying the fiscal 1979 budget that was sent to Congress but not otherwise distributed. A copy was given to UPI.

Other planned changes in Social Security are expected to affect millions of Americans.

For the first time since 1938, most employers will report worker earnings information to Social Security annually rather than quarterly. No reports will be required from employers this year except for those that were due in January.

The change, approved by Congress last year, will cover reports on this year's wages, with the first ones due next January. Employers of household workers and state and local government employees must keep reporting quarterly.

A Federal Paperwork Commission estimated in 1971 that annual reporting will save businesses more than \$235 million a year. However, HEW said taxpayers will have to come up with \$26.5 million to pay for the government workers and equipment needed for the conversion.

HEW says each of the 265 million applications for Social Security numbers since the program began in 1937 will be coded, grouped, assigned control numbers, microfilmed and keyed for transfer to computers.

When the project is complete, computers can spew out by number a Social Security card holder's name, date and place of birth, father, mother's maiden name, race, sex, present age before last birthday and date applied for card.

Americans See War Games

MOSCOW (AP) - American observers are attending Soviet military maneuvers for the first time since World War II.

Winter war games for 25,000 Soviet soldiers and airmen began today in Byelorussia, in the western Soviet Union, with military representatives of the United States, West Germany, France, Belgium, the Netherlands and Switzerland attend-

The American observers are Brig.Gen. Richard X. Larkin, the military attache in Moscow, and Col. William Odom of the National Security Council.

Pravda said the war games, named Berezina after a river in Byelorussia, were taking place on marshy and wooded land crisscrossed by rivers and lakes near Minsk, the Byelorussian capital, and the towns of Orsha and Polotsk. But it said blowing snow was reducing visibility seri-

Tech Production Of 'Kaspar,' Steven Peters Earn Plaudits

A-J Entertainment Editor The program notes for the Texas Tech University Lab Theater's production of "Kaspar" indicate that the Peter Handke play is "taken from the true story of a 16-year-old boy named Kaspar Hauser who turned up mysteriously in Nuremberg in 1828. He had with him a letter explaining that a poor laborer had found him as a baby on his doorstep and had fed him and kept him confined in a cellar.

"Although he had the physical and mental capacity of a 'normal' person, Hauser had not developed beyond childhood - he could barely walk or talk. Handke uses this intriguing character not to show how it really is or was with Kaspar Hauser, but to explain what is theatrically possible with Theatrically possible with some-

one? Director Cindy Melby's final note is one of the more vague and nondescript statements ever tacked on to a program. Her rendition of the German play, translated into English by Michael Roloff, is also vague at times, but nevertheless full of exciting and tortuous vitality. A think piece of sorts, it possesses both the joy of innocence and the sinister control of Extremely theatrical - perhaps

too theatrical for some, with its

whiteface makeup and all - it is at once daring and meaningful, comic and terrifying, and without a doubt deserves to be seen.

The play opens with Steven Peters' entrance in the title role: stumbling in the clumsiness which accompanies childlike curiosity, exploring, testing, communicating (even with inanimate objects) through only one sentence. Indeed, that sentence - "I want to be a person like somebody else was once" - is the only verbal offering during the production's initial ten minutes, spouted in a multitude of expressionistic inflections.

And it is doubtful whether anyone, be they professional or virtually untested, could bring more emotion to the part of Kaspar than does Peters; his is a performance rarely equalled on even the most distinguished university stage.

The only other participants, so to speak, are five prompters who use logic and also the inconsistent truths of language to confuse, to brainwash the innocent Kaspar into losing first his individuality and later his self-confidence and, ultimately, all semblance of self-control. We see him bombarded by words: a teaching process by which the "child" learns the bitter emotions in place of the sweet. Learning to walk, after all, can bring about its share of hurts and scrapes due to lost duels with shoelaces and gravity - but the sting is meant to be temporary. Peters transcends his own experience to evoke universal discomfort when he states, "Falling only hurts since I learned how to speak. The pain never stops anymore, ever since I can feel ashamed at falling.

The prompters — Judy Blue, Jerry Cotton, Vanessa Hill, Karl Gore and Debbie Lemen - involve Kaspar in a battle of contradictions, both through the spoken word and physical action. Moving: is it running or limping on crutches? Don't stand when you can sit - sitting all your life is not good. Kaspar is blinded to the inbetween; the teachers, torturers if you will, shape and form flesh with words and phrases until, at last, their subject is familiar only with fear and conformity.

One of Peters' most brilliant moments comes at the close of Act One, when he struggles to keep his hand in a 3-finger Boy Scout salute while relating, as though reciting for inspection, how he has changed. Fearful of reproach from his teachers, desiring assistance from his classmates (the audience), his struggle is hard. His arm grows too heavy, his fingers uncon-

Almost predictably, rebellious concepts creep in and his fingers tighten into a fist he can lift. But it is the final glance Peters offers which is the most frightening, a sort of half smile as though to say he knows he has some sort of power, but is not really sure just what he's going to do with it. Or whether he could even if he wanted to.

All we know for certain is that his dreams are lost. He no longer wants to be like somebody else was once. He has learned violence. He has learned greed. Envy and fear. The child is no more. In Act Two, Kaspar fights his op-

pressors with the same weapon. Words. As he puts it, "I learned to pacify everything that screams with sentences." Peters is magnificent with his emotional shifts here, involved mainly in a long monologue in which he expresses first his ego, then realization of false power while telling us his schooling history. Walking up aisles, Peters, with an incredibly emoting pair of eyes, relates, "With my first sentence, I was trapped. ...] have been converted to reality. There can be no worse fate.

Brainwashers turn vindictive. Chaos reigns. Destruction is immi-

Naturally, in any piece of thought-provoking theatrics, a onetime experience is nowhere near enough to capture all nuances or messages. But the unmistakable talents of Peters - who is equally adept at expressing innocence and shame, boldness and terror - and director Cindy Melby make "Kaspar" an enthralling produc-tion of a "what if" story. Miss Melby's stage decisions - the prompters set off by screens (Kaspar tormented by disconnected voices), the choreographed clumsiness with chairs and table drawers, Kaspar himself leaving the stage to speak directly to the audience work extremely well.

And I might add, a play such as this is the perfect vehicle for small, intimate theaters the likes of the

Overlapping dialogue can be a problem, though, in that not everything is understood. (This can be taken a different way, in that the overlapping helps us empathize with Kaspar's confusion.) The prompters' different deliveries helped out. Reasoning behind lighting effects was sometimes unclear, though the blackouts were always effectively used. And one has to question the furious antics of the others on stage while Peters is speaking.

As incredibly funny as their roughhouse cruelties are, nothing they do seems as important as the fantastic and revealing words being delivered by Peters. Too often, the volume of the extras interfered. There were also some technical

problems with microphones Saturday night but, throughout, the play stood up as one of the more daring and entertaining productions this city has seen. It is total theater, horrifying us too often by stripping reality of its many disguises. Steven Peters, by fils performance in this play alone, proves he and the stage should remain close friends. And Cindy Melby's imaginative way of granting us comedy, and scaring us in the process, shows that she, too, should remain no stranger to the craft.

"Kaspar" is theater in its truest and most difficult form. It demands thought, deserves appreciation. It may earn a variety of responses and, personally, I hope that's the case. That this play, which denotes the act of brainwashing someone into conformity, could draw such individualistic responses would, after all, be the biggest paradox of all.

Here And There

THIS IS A BLEAK time of the year for pro football fans, despite the shuffle of coaches and hot-stove rumors about the NFL draft coming up early in May. Followers of the college game are luckier, with the signing of schoolboys just hours away and spring training just around the corner. But for pro partisans, it's a case of scrambling for crumbs.

The Dallas Cowboys haven't locked up their offices on North Central Expressway, following the Super Bowl victory over Denver, but few of the moguls are on duty right now. Vice President Gil Brandt and his scouts, who never seem to take a vacation, are around most of the time, but the coaches have split.

Sports Monday, Feb. 6, 1978

Within hours of the team's return from New Orleans, assistant head coach Jim Myers and his family headed for the snowy peaks of Jackson Hole, Wyo. A couple of days later, Coach Tom Landry and his wife flew to Vail, Colo., for a skiing vacation despite the mentor's chronic knee problem.

Offensive coordinator Danny Reeves made a couple of quick trips to Los Angeles in his bid for the head coaching job of the Rams, but it all came to naught when good of George Allen got the post. So Danny headed for the hills of New Mexico to work off his frustration on the ski slopes. Danny reportedly was unhappy that Landry refused to give him an all-out recommendation to the Ram

Some NFL insiders say that Allen had the Ram job in his hip pocket all the time, though, and that the interviews with other prospects were just a smokescreen. If so, it was a cruel trick to play on a nice guy like Reeves.

WORK NEVER ENDS for that tireless Dallas scouting department, however. The talent sleuths are wrapping up their reports on the players available for the draft in May, while mapping their spring visits to college campuses to get a look at the next crop.

It is not at all unusual for a Cowboy scout to fly more than 100,000 miles a year in making his appointed rounds, and the club pays for first-class fare.

"After a guy has spent all day looking at films, talking to coaches and writing up reports, I don't think he ought to have to ride in a narrow seat squeezed in between a couple of other people," Gil explains.

With eight full-time staff scouts, some regional scouts and a number of special assignment men, the Cowboys' travel expense obviously is staggering. Club owner Clint Murchison could save money by buying his own airline. THE COWBOYS, like many other NFL clubs, send out questionnaires to pros-

pects in the colleges every fall. These include the usual information about names, birthdays, the year the players first enrolled in college, and phone numbers where they can be reached on draft day. Most of the questionnaires also have a section at the end for player comments, and some of these are good for a The "name" players at the major universities play it cool, of course. They

have been everywhere and have seen everything - almost. So they are not going to flip over a letter from the Rams or the Cowboys or the Dolphins. But it is a different story in the small colleges. Many of those players are

dazed and delighted to discover that a pro football club actually is interested in Yeah, man! Would I like to play for the Cowboys? (Expletive deleted) right!

Tell me when and where to report and I'll be there. If you don't want to pay for a plane ticket, I'll ride the bus. Or hitchhike. Just give me a chance, man! Seriously, some of the replies from the young athletes at Elmhurst or North Carolina Central or Henderson State are surprising. The players' reactions are entirely unpredictable.

THERE WAS THE LINEBACKER at a very small college a few years ago who scrawled a bold warning on his questionnaire. "You better draft me quick," he declared, "because I am going to play for somebody in the NFL."

Now he's a budding superstar with a championship club. Some prospects are even more aggressive and determined than that. A defensive lineman from a little college in the South wrote on his questionnaire that, "I'd sell my mother for a chance to play pro football!" But he was only kidding,

Many of the small college players are apologetic about their bush league background. Some are quick to note that they were recruited by larger schools, or point to their achievements in high school. But their universal comment is "I know I can do the job if you'll give me a chance."

Some can, too. The Cowboys found Cliff Harris at Ouachita Baptist and Doug Dennison at Kutztown State. That's about as far back in the boondocks as even

"I sort of had a feeling if anyone would turn it around, it would be Randy Smith," said Havlicek, the retiring star of the Boston Celtics.

"What you saw him (Smith) do today, I've seen him do many times," said Ramsay, who watched helplessly as the catquick guard of the Buffalo Braves scored 14 points in the fourth quarter, sparking the East to a 133-125 comeback victory over Ramsay's West squad in the 28th National Basketball Association All-Star

game Sunday.

The West had dominated play until Smith took charge, aided by the aggressive rebounding of Boston's Dave Cowens and Philadelphia's Julius Erving, to erase a 12-point West lead in the final 10

Smith scored six straight baskets, two on layups and four on jump shots from the 14-foot to 22-foot range, chopping the lead to 113-112 with 5:42 remaining, and Erving put the East ahead for only the second time in the game, this time for good, on a three-point play with 5:10 to

Playing despite five personal fouls with seven minutes remaining, Smith trig-gered the rally that resulted in a stretch of 15 consecutive East points, which eventually carried to a 21-2 edge, changing a 113-104 deficit to a 125-115 lead as the East captured its third All-Star Game in four years and its 18th against 10 de-

Smith was an overwhelming choice for the Most Valuable Player trophy and an accompanying 1978 automobile. He scored a game-high 27 points, had seven rebounds, six assists and two steals in 29

"This was one of the highest achieve-ments I have ever accomplished," Smith said of the MVP honor, which he said his wife, Terrion, had predicted he would

"She didn't keep me out late last night, so I had all the rest in the world," Smith

He also paid tribute to Ramsay, coach of the defending NBA champions, the Portland Trail Blazers, who once coached Smith at Buffalo.



Why Has Tennis 'Lost' 10 Million Players?

AP Special Correspondent NEW YORK — Lost: 10 million tennis players.

Last sighted, they were wearing \$50 shorts, \$25 shirts with a crocodile on the chest, \$65 warmup suits and \$45 kid shoes. They were carrying two \$75 racquets in a fancy satchel and were racing toward the closest indoor bubble Anybody seen 'em? Where did they go?

"Just got fed up," the Sports Training Institute of Chicago said today in reporting on what it pictures as the greatest

ites out of the wilderness. Within the past decade, tennis became the fastest growing participant sport in the country. Its ranks mushroomed from six million timid souls - almost embarrassed to be seen with a racquet under their arms - to a bustling 30 million who went deliriously mad over the pastime.

It was the "in" thing. You couldn't go into an airport without seeing scores of travelers lugging court equipment under their arms. Indoor complexes mush-roomed. Real estate couldn't be cleared fast enough to build the courts in demand. Sporting goods stores, instructors,

publishers and promoters prospered. The tournament players became the millionaire elitists of professional sports.

Then something happened, the Sports Training Institute said. A wave of disenchantment set in among the new recruits. Learners lost their interest in clusters until the casualty list, by the Institute's count, numbered 10 million.

What happened? It was a question the Institute decided to learn for itself, so it assigned researchers to student dropouts, instructors and court operators. This is what they found. Listen to the deserters first:

"Learning was not fun. It was actually uite frustrating."
"I was making a fool of myself out

"The hyped-up advertising and promo-tion made you feel like a second-class cit-
