One Group Reaches Goal; End in Sight

Muleshoe Area United Fund has started down the home stretch, past the half-way mark, and at least one group has wound up its work entirely. These facts were revealed Wednesday when a rundown on the campaign's progress was made. Campaign chairman Gil Lamb considers this a "good report, considering the fact that only one week actually has been spent in the solicitation drive." Last week a series of kick-off breakfasts were held through Monday through Thursday. George Favors Amendments, Asks All Voters To Go To The Polls

State Representative Jesse T. George, Bailey County's Austin lawmaker, has urged the voters of his five-county legislative district to turn out in large numbers at the polls Tuesday, Nov. 2, to cast their ballots in the constitutional amendments election. Lawmaker George, who said he will support all 10 amendments, has given approximately 43 speeches to various groups in his district explaining the amendments to his constituents and giving both pro and con views on each. George said approval of Amendment No. 1, increasing the state ad valorem tax by 5 cents on the \$100 valuation to be used for building construction by state institutions of higher learning, is necessary to provide adequate school plants to meet the increasing enrollments in Texas colleges and universities.

defeat knocked Tulia clear out of the top-ranking clubs. It was somewhat the same situation for Tulia in its scrap with Perryton. A fumbled center snap was grabbed up by Perryton's Jerry Dukes who made a two-point conversion and iced the game.

But it was just not Tulia's night. Tulia's big (he weighs 184 pounds) full back scored both of Tulia's touchdowns and he gained 149 yards of ground in 19 ball-carrying assignments. The game had started as do-dusters had predicted — a Tulia victory. Perryton was held behind the 50-yard line throughout the first 24 minutes of play — except once. That one exception carried the ball only to the 44.

Besides the scoring drives by Smith, Tulia had looked good throughout the first half, driving to the 27, the 29 and the 31-yard lines in sustained drives. Eight times during the game, the Hornets were penalized for players being in motion before the ball was stopped, and several other times, Perryton turned down penalties for the same kind of violation when such penalties would not have served the Perryton cause.

Tulia's Larry Brown set up the second Hornet score by recovering a Perryton fumble 14 yards outside the goal stripe. (See TULIA Page 5)

Out-of-Season Rattlers Here?

Three smallish rattlesnakes were found squirming around in an old cellar in the 300 block of West Tenth this week, leaving city officials to wonder whether they are new crop" rattlers or just regular season rattlers that failed to eat too well all summer.

City Manager Albert Field said the pint-sized rattlers were reported to his office, but he did not know whether they were young or "stunted."

Melvin Evans, manager of the Muleshoe Wildlife Refuge, says rattlers "don't make too much progress anyway during the first year of their lives," and he figured the small rattlers found here were "either early spring rattlers that haven't grown very much, or else they are young rattlers that may have hatched late in the summer."

He said there is no "season" as such for rattlers but usually the mama rattlers lay their eggs early in the summer. Even early-hatched rattlers probably won't grow longer than 8 to 10 inches during the first season.

Of Law and Love

Duty of a Doctor
 Imagine what would happen if a doctor, awakened by urgent knocking at the front door of his home at midnight, refused to give medical aid to an auto accident victim who later bled to death on his doorstep.
 In such a very unlikely event the cries of indignation would ring out mightily. The doctor's indifference would outrage both the ethics of medicine and the morals of religion.
 Yet, the doctor would not be acting unlawfully. For a doctor has no legal duty to "take all comers." Unless he has some special, pre-existing relationship with an individual patient, he has the right to turn him down. For various reasons, part historical, part practical, our law does not ordinarily require a doctor (or anyone else, either) to lend a helping hand to the stranger in distress.
 But once a doctor does take over, his legal position changes. From then on, he owes the patient an affirmative duty to be diligent.

A physician applied a cast to the fractured arm of an elderly woman patient, who immediately complained that the cast too tight. Despite continuing complaints, the physician did not split the cast. He then left the country for a two-week vacation trip without arranging for another physician to care for the patient. As a result, she suffered partial paralysis of her arm.
 For the physicians' negligence and abandonment of the patient, a court later held him liable for damages.
 On the other hand, even after a doctor takes a case, his duty to be attentive has reasonable, common sense limits.
 For instance:
 A woman's finger became so badly infected that it had to be amputated. Suing her doctor, she complained that for more than a week he had been unavailable to his patients.
 But in court, it turned out that the doctor had taken time off only because his own father had died. It also turned out that he

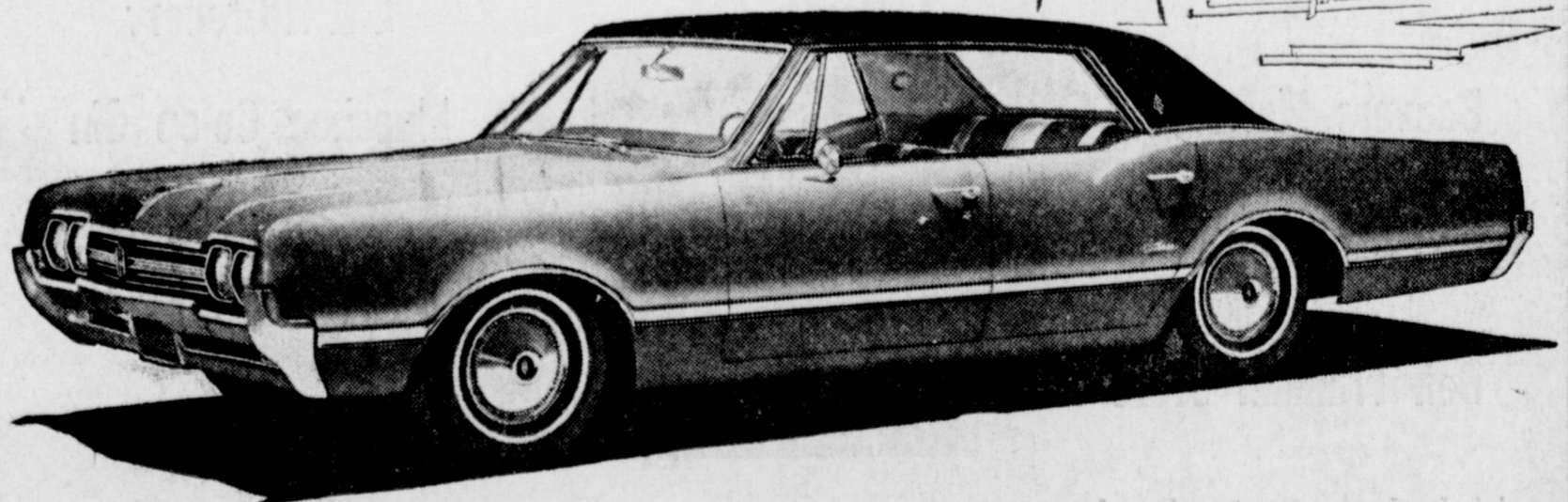

is to continue its participation in a medical care program for old age assistance recipients which use federal funds. A withdrawal of federal funds would result in great hardship to participants and final death to the Texas medical care program," George stressed.

Representative George said that approval of Amendment No. 4, authorizing a 4 year term of office for governor, lieutenant governor, secretary of state, and other state officials elected in state-wide elections, would give the people of Texas more efficient utilization of their state officers and would enable executives more time to formulate state policy essential to productive operations. George said similar approval on Amendment No. 10, providing four-year terms for members of the Texas House of Representatives, would serve to keep an equal balance of power between the legislative and executive branches of state government, and would reduce burdensome campaign expenditures every two years. George urged that voters either vote for both amendment 4 and 10 or against both.

Of extreme importance, according to George, to the teaching profession in Texas is public approval of amendment No. 5, which gives constitutional stature to both the Texas Teacher Retirement System and the Board of Trustees of the Teacher Retirement System. He stated, "Approval of Amendment No. 5 will give greater assurance to teachers and school employees of a continuity of the teacher retirement system. It would further serve as an attraction to the teacher profession, as well as keeping experienced teachers in the teaching ranks."

Amendment No. 6, another in the education field, and one which George served as a co-author, provides for the issuance of bonds to be used in creating the Texas Opportunity Plan Fund as a loan fund for Texas students attending public and private institutions of higher education in the State. According to George, "Amendment No. 6, if approved, will allow the issuance of \$85 million in bonds to be used by students who are financially unable to complete

their college education. The single greatest natural resource in the State of Texas is its young people, and such a loan as this amendment provides would assure many of these students the college training they deserve. The loans would be repaid, principal and interest, after the student completes his college training. This is an area where the state has assumed a vital responsibility in the greatest of all American investments — EDUCATION."

Representative George concluded his plea for a heavy voter turnout by emphasizing, "It is a vital responsibility of all responsive and responsible citizens to familiarize themselves with these amendments, as they are a basic part of our representative form of government. Often amendments are not defeated because of opposition to them, but because of voter apathy and complacency. This, of course, can result in a government by default. Regardless of your stand, please make your stand count by going to the polls on November 2. Remember that an alert and knowledgeable citizen will remain a free citizen."

However, only one name or set of figures and letters can be made by the state highway department, she explained. Thus the necessity for applying as early as possible.

When the new special tags are received, the owner must drive his car to the tag office and the regular tags are removed on the spot and replaced by the new, fancy jobs. Mrs. Lovelady takes charge of the "regular" tags taken off.

Special assignments may include up to six letters or a combination of letters and digits. But the special jobs are issued on a first-come-first-served basis.

Marlyn and Corky, for example, will be able to keep their special assignment only if they apply between now and Jan 1 for renewals; otherwise such names might be assigned to some other Texas owner.
