## Justices hear guilty pleas

NEW YORK (AP) - David R. Berkowitz pleaded cuilty today to all six "Son of Sam" killings that
crrorized the city in a year-long random mur
der rampage.

with a 44 -caliber revolver. Berkowitz had been charged with second-degree
murder in the six killings, and his guilty pleas were murder in the six killings, and his guilty pleas were
to second-degree murder charges.
During the second of three extraordinary court
sessions., Bronx District Attorney Mario Merola sessions, Bronx District Attorney Mario Merola
revealed to the courtroom that Berkowitz had
claimed responsibility for setting claimed responsibility for setting 2,000 fires in New
York City since 1974 . He said a spot check of the York crys since 1974 . He said a spot check of the
claims, contained in Berkowitz' diaries, revealed
that the fires had oceurred hat the fires had occurred
"It was wrong," Berkowitz said to Justice Joseph R. Corso in Brooklyn Supreme Court as he pleaded
guiltty to killing Stacy Moskowitt and wounding and nuerty binding her firist-time date, Robert IVolante.
