Hill's primary defeat of Briscoe assured

John Hill — Texas attorney general who took his campaign for vigorous government straight to the people — was assured today of victory in the Democratic primary over two-term incumbent Gov. Dolph Briscoe.

"I've been trying this case for 10 years," Hill said, smiling during late vote counting early Sunday.

Voters continued to trickle in today at the Texas Election Bureau but officials said there was no question that Hill had grabbed the Democratic nomination without a runoff.

Voters in the Republican primary nominated Bill Clements over Ray Hutchison and both parties defeated the non-binding pari-mutuel referendum.

The Democratic race for the right to meet U.S. Sen. John Tower in November was won by U.S. Rep. Bob Krueger, who led former Texas insurance commissioner Joe Christie all night. Tower was unopposed in the Republican primary.

Incomplete race tallies Sunday included reports from 246 of 254 counties with 198 complete.

Krueger received 55.01 percent with 44.99 percent going to Christie.

Hill, 54, narrowly escaped a runoff, gathering 51.26 percent of the vote in the five-man race, according to returns Sunday. Briscoe was at 41.66 percent. Texas Election Bureau officials said the few remaining votes still uncounted would have no effect on the race other than to simply increase Hill's margin of victory. Late figures showed Hill with 824,845 votes, Briscoe, 670,424, and Smith 83,895.

Clements, a wealthy Dallas businessman and former deputy defense secretary under Presidents Nixon and Ford, had no trouble defeating Dallas lawyer, Ray Hutchison, a former state GOP chairman. The oilman garnered an even 73 percent of the ballots to Hutchison's 24.28 percent. A third candidate, Clarence Thompson of Fort Worth, took the remaining 2.71 percent without campaigning.

Former Texas Gov. Preston Smith, who had been considered by many the man to force Hill and Briscoe into a runoff, finished a poor third with 5.22 percent. Smith was beaten by Briscoe six years ago.

Donald Beagle, a Nederland welding shop owner, and Ray Mayo, an author publisher from San Juan in the Rio Grande Valley, received mostly local votes and were not factors in the statewide race. Beagle received 81 percent and Mayo, 1.05.

One surprise result of the balloting was Mark White's victory over Price Daniel Jr. as the Democrat's choice for Texas Attorney General. White collected 52.36 percent of the vote. Daniel claimed 47.64 percent. Houston attorney Jim Baker was the unopposed Republican winner.

White, appointed secretary of state by Briscoe, dashed Daniel's come-

back hopes, defeating the former Texas House speaker by about five percentage points.

The pari-mutuel referendum failed for the 10th time in three decades. The Democrats knocked it down hard, but the Republicans appeared more lenient.

The Democrats voted against the referendum by a 52.48 percent margin. The Republicans, however,

turned the proposal down by a difference of less than one percentage point.

Allen Maley, director of the Anti-Crime Council of Texas, said he hoped "the gambling promoters get the message." Maley said Saturday's defeat, which would not have been binding on the 1979 Legislature, meant "that the voters of Texas are getting sick and tired of being forced to vote on this issue every four to six years."

Midland has strong Republican turnout

Conservatives in Midland County have "seen the light, and on Saturday they voted that way," according to Republican County Chairman Bill Shaner.

Midland Republicans turned out 6,292 strong to vote in the primary election, giving Midland the largest showing of Republicans in the 19th Congressional District. Lubbock had the next highest showing with 3,412 Republicans recording their votes.

Midland also was the only county in the district where voting Republicans outnumbered voting Democrats. The county clerk's figures show 5,484 Democrats cast votes in the county.

While both figures were high considering it is not a presidential election year, they did not surpass the numbers cast in the 1976 primary. Republicans had 7,884 votes that year, while Democrats recorded 7,044 votes. Republicans, claimed Shaner, have come a long way since 1972 when they had 2,000 people voting, and since 1974 with only 1,600 making it to the polls.

"Maybe our conservatives are finally beginning to get the habit — the Republican habit," Shaner said. "We're making inroads."

Darrell Smith, Democratic county chairman, said he believes the local interest in the 19th Congressional District race between Midlander George Bush and Odessa Jim Reese may have added to the Republican figures. On the other hand, the governor's race on the Democratic side between Gov. Dolph Briscoe and Attorney General John Hill, and the Senate race between Congressman Bob Krueger and Joe Christie of El Paso may have sparked more Midland Democrats to vote Saturday, Smith said.

Absentee voting also was heavier than usual with 905 cast in the GOP primary and slightly more than 500 in the Democratic races.

Ector County, with its favorite son Reese facing Bush in the 19th race, reported only 1,264 Republicans and 2,742 Democrats voting.

But, the general election will show "what type of people live in Midland," the Democratic chairman said. "Midland has very independent-

minded people," he said. "These people are not going to vote straight ticket."

Mrs. Carter heads U.S. delegation

SAN JOSE, Costa Rica (AP) — Rodrigo Carazo, who has promised to kick fugitive American financier Robert Vesco out of Costa Rica, becomes this Central American nation's 36th president today with Rosalynn Carter heading the U.S. delegation at the inauguration.

Outgoing President Daniel Oduber surrenders the red, white and blue silk presidential sash at noon in the national soccer stadium, officially signaling the transfer of power.

Fireworks lit up the skies over San Jose Sunday night, and the city was decorated with Costa Rican flags and portraits of the president-elect. A whirl of inaugural parties got under way, to continue into Tuesday and horn-honking caravans of cars toured the city.

Mrs. Carter, who arrived Sunday afternoon, attended a reception at the residence of U.S. Ambassador Marvin Weissman, where she is staying, and another at the Foreign Ministry.

The U.S. first lady greeted the guests at the ambassador's home in Spanish and in a brief impromptu speech told them, "I like the way you respect human rights here, and I like your democracy. I feel very happy to be here."

Mrs. Carter also spoke Spanish at the airport when she arrived and said her visit "demonstrates U.S. backing of the democracy that exists here."

Costa Rica has a 79-year-old tradition of democracy, no army, and is one of the few countries in the hemisphere in which the literacy rate exceeds 90 percent.

Runoff campaigning already begun

The ballots have been counted and the smoke from the heated contest has cleared with the final result that no one really won, but one contestant is out of the race.

George Bush of Midland and Jim Reese of Odessa are shoring up their forces and getting ready for the June 3 runoff to see who will be the Republicans' choice to run against Kent Hance of Lubbock in the November general election. At stake is the 19th Congressional District seat to be vacated for the first time in 44 years by George Mahon, who announced last summer he will retire at the end of his current term.

The GOP race for the seat started with three men, but Joe Hickox of Shallowater drew only 11 percent of the vote — but that was enough to keep Bush or Reese from winning. Hance bumped Morris Sheats, a Lubbock minister, for the Democratic nomination.

After taking Sunday off to do some retrospective thinking about the Saturday primary election and to start planning for the runoff, Reese and Bush were ready to start on the campaign trail again today.

Reese noted he took 16 out of 17

counties in the 19th District and said, "This indicates the broad base of support that is absolutely essential to winning the general election in November. I'm sure that many of my friends all over the district, and particularly in Midland, will see the necessity of nominating a candidate who can develop the widespread sup-

port to win the general election."

Bush, who today was in Lubbock preparing for a press conference, said, "I got 47.5 percent of the vote in the district. People say that is good — I say that it is fantastic. We are optimistic."

New 'pecking order' of birds questioned

If word were to get around that birds, such as the free-spirited sparrows, were attacking a car, you'd probably figure that either the birds or the teller of the tale was psycho.

Rather than attacking, a pair of English sparrows has been pecking on a black-over-maroon sedan as if the car were a huge hunk of grain. Obviously, it's not.

From reliable accounts, the Midland birds peck on the '67 luxury sedan, chip paint and work at it as if they were a cross between a hummingbird and a woodpecker.

But that's so improbable. Or do birds, like people and the more predictable creatures of earth, have fixations, play games and just do wild things out of compulsion?

"Well," said Mae Murdock, a regular witness to the pecking, "I'll tell you, everytime I mention it (the pecking) to somebody, at first there's a dead silence and then a giggle."

After a round or so of hammering away, the birds generally wing their way back to their perch in an elm tree at Arthur and Mae Murdock's place on the city's westside. Or they land in a neighbor's mulberry's tree.

About three weeks ago, the Murdocks first noticed the pecking. He was putting a water pump on the '67 Lincoln Continental when there came a rapping from the other side of the car.

Murdock took a peek, sized up the situation and did what most any other mortal might do.

"I shoed 'em away," he said, "and they came back."

More than a nuisance, the pecking is becoming a topic of conversation on the block.

"I never saw or heard of it before," Ms. Murdock said. "They're just having a ball. They might have flown off for a few minutes," she said in peck-less moment, "but they'll be back."

She reasoned that the problem is the birds' more than hers.

"I don't think I've lost my mind, but they have," she said.

"I don't want to hurt the birds, but enough is enough."

Being a reasonably reasonable person, Ms. Murdock sought advice, called upon Roustin 'About, who, in turn, called up birdwoman Midge Erskine, who understands the nature of many wild things, including her cherished birds.

Ms. Erskine, at site of the rapping, listened to a recounting of the incident. And with bird book and binocu-

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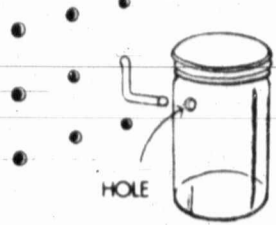
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SUPER HANDYMAN Make winning combo of common shop items

By AL CARRELL

Pegboard walls in workshops are about as common as dirt. And using those little plastic pill bottles to hold small workshop items is also standard practice. Now if you could get pegboards and pill bottles together,



you'd have a winning combo. G.R.G. did just that. When he gets a pill bottle to use in his shop, he drills a small hole in the side just under the cap. He cautions to use a slow drill speed. The bit matches the diameter of pegboard hooks. Now his pill bottle full of small screws or brads can hang in line with the others on the pegboard wall. I have tried inserting cup hooks into the plastic lid, but after a short stint of hanging from a hook, the cup hook comes out. This idea of G.R.G.'s is a good one.

DEAR AL:

I liked all the ways to stop floor squeaks you included in your free floor sheet. Maybe you'll like mine. I thinned out some of the varnish I had used when finishing the hardwood floors. This is then brushed into the cracks where I have spotted movement in the floor boards. I use a tiny artist's brush for this. Naturally, some of the varnish remains on the surface, but this can be brushed out smooth and doesn't even show. The rest goes down between the cracks, and when it dries, it stops the movement. —C.C.

This might work on some slight movements, but where there is much, you might want to try other ways. If you'd like to know the other ways to silence floor squeaks, include a self-addressed, stamped envelope with your request to Super Handyman here at the paper.

DEAR AL:

Here's a far-out idea. I was install-

ing some molding around the ceiling. To keep from having to use a ladder which would have to be moved very often, I used a pair of my son's stilts. They gave me the right height. Even though I'm not very stable on the stilts, I had the wall to lean into, so I never fell. It really made the job easier and was actually fun. I've shad almost as much fun telling about it. —A.J.

Jean liked the idea and thought about using it for painting some molding in the living room. However, she also thought about trying to balance a bucket of paint, so she decided to stick with the ladder.

A SUPER HINT — Along with recording birthdays, appointments and other reminders on our calendar, we also make a note of when warranties are going to expire. We mark the date about a month before the expiration date. Then if the appliance or gadget has developed a problem, we can get it taken care of by the manufacturer instead of tearing into it with a hatchet.

DEAR AL:

Here's a handy reminder. If you have a fireplace, be sure to remember to close the damper if you have air conditioning in your house. Otherwise, an updraft can suck all of your very expensive cold air out to cool the birds. I forgot and discovered a nice blast of cool air when I was checking on a loose brick on the chimney. —R.F.

However, if you don't have air conditioning, an open damper can help with ventilation during the summer.

QUICK ANSWERS FOR HARRIED HANDYPERSONS:

Q: What would cause a toilet tank to crack? Ours just suddenly cracked and flooded the bathroom.

A: It was either damaged by someone who maybe put the seat up too hard, or it received stress from uneven shifting and settling of the house. Usually when a tank cracks because of stress like this, there was a flaw in the tank that could have been just a slight crack from a hit or from bolts that are too tight. Be careful around these fixtures.

New CIA allegations aired

WASHINGTON (AP) — The CIA recruited mercenaries to fight in Angola but didn't get much for its money, a former CIA official says.

John Stockwell, who said he commanded the CIA's Angola task force in the agency's headquarters, estimated about \$500,000 was spent to send 20 Frenchmen to Angola.

"Their contracts were for five months," Stockwell said in a television interview Sunday. "They fought for one month, and then fled and we never got our

money back."

Appearing on the CBS show "60 minutes," Stockwell said a second program involving Portuguese mercenaries also was a failure.

"The third bunch, the British-Americans, included psychotic killers, maniacs, people who were literally deranged, as well as people who were highly incompetent," Stockwell said.

The 12-year Central Intelligence Agency veteran said the CIA embarked on what amounted to a "secret war" in Angola, but withheld information about its activities from the congressional committees set up to oversee covert CIA operations.

A CIA spokesman, Lavon Strong, said the agency had no immediate comment on Stockwell's allegations.

Stockwell's book on the operation, called "In Search of Enemies," was published today.

Prince Charles says he likes ceremony

NEW YORK (AP) — Prince Charles, in an interview in Time magazine, says he would change nothing in the pomp and ceremony of the monarchy and that he hopes he won't leave "a messy mark" on history.

The current issue of Time, which features the 29-year-old prince on its cover with the heading, "The Man Who Will Be King," said it was the first interview Charles has given to a non-British publication.

On pomp and ceremony, Charles said, "I would change nothing. Besides ceremony being a major and important aspect of monarchy, something that has grown and developed over a thousand years in Britain, I happen to enjoy it enormously."

Andrews school trustees plan executive session

ANDREWS — The Andrews Independent School District Board of Trustees is scheduled to meet in executive session to consider personnel matters at its regular meeting at 7:30 p.m. Tuesday in the school administration building.

In addition, the board is expected to consider participation in the U.S. Department of Agriculture Commodities Program and approve proposed bus routes for the 1978-79 school year. It plans to discuss proposed maintenance projects and authorize the school administration to purchase supplies and equipment for the upcoming school year.

The trustees also are scheduled to approve the proposed summer recreation program and appoint a third member to the Board of Equalization.

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Salaries for black men, all women still behind

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Despite major strides in earning power by black men since World War II, it may take 30 to 40 years more before they catch up with wages earned by white men, two researchers say.

Nationally, the researchers said, black men now earn three-fourths as much as white men.

But women, both black and white, have even further to go. Although black women have almost pulled even with white women in pay, the average wage of white women is less than 60 percent of that earned by white men.

In two reports released Sunday by Rand Corp., economists James Smith and Finis Welch said education had become a larger factor than northward migration in bigger incomes for blacks in the last decade.

Rand, based in Santa Monica, is a private, non-profit research center that studies domestic and national security issues.

In 1947, wages for black men were half that earned by white men, while those for black women were one-third of their white counterparts' pay, the studies found.

Most of the gains came during the 1960s, according to the studies, which were financed by the National Science Foundation.

The researchers said improved education was

responsible for 47 percent of the income gains by black men and 33 percent of those by black women.

In 1930, they said, the average black entering the labor market had 3.7 fewer years of formal education than whites. They said that 80 percent of blacks entering the job market had a grade school diploma or less and only 3 percent had gone to college.

By 1970, the education difference separating blacks and whites had dropped to 1.2 years, while only 10 percent of the blacks had less than nine years of schooling and 20 percent had gone to college.

Finis and Welch said black women had made considerable strides because of government mi-

nority hiring programs, but added that they could find little evidence black men had gained much from the programs.

"Because hiring a black woman met both race and sex quotas for employers, the affirmative action thrust may have given black women the advantage in the job market," they said.

In addition, the studies found a dramatic decrease in the percentage of black women doing domestic work in the South.

Half of all employed black women in the South were domestic workers in 1960, but a decade later, only 20 percent were, the economists said. For younger workers, the rate fell from 50 percent to 3 percent.

Justices hear guilty pleas

NEW YORK (AP) — David R. Berkowitz pleaded guilty today to all six "Son of Sam" killings that terrorized the city in a year-long random murder rampage.

The 24-year-old pudgy former postal clerk from Yonkers appeared before a packed courtroom and the parents of two of his victims as Supreme Court Justices from Brooklyn, The Bronx and Queens took pleas of guilty from Berkowitz. He calmly admitted being the killer who struck at night with a .44-caliber revolver.

Berkowitz had been charged with second-degree murder in the six killings, and his guilty pleas were to second-degree murder charges.

During the second of three extraordinary court sessions, Bronx District Attorney Mario Merola revealed to the courtroom that Berkowitz had claimed responsibility for setting 2,000 fires in New York City since 1974. He said a spot check of the claims, contained in Berkowitz' diaries, revealed that the fires had occurred.

"It was wrong," Berkowitz said to Justice Joseph R. Corso in Brooklyn Supreme Court as he pleaded guilty to killing Stacy Moskowitz and wounding and nearly blinding her first-time date, Robert Violante. That was the final attack of Son of Sam, last July 31 in a Brooklyn lovers lane.

Then Berkowitz pleaded guilty to killing Donna Lauria, 18, and wounding her friend, Jody Valenti, 19, in the Bronx in the first Son of Sam attack on July 19, 1976. He also pleaded guilty to killing Valentina Suriani, 18, and her date, Alexander Esau, 20, as they sat in a parked car near her Bronx home on April 17, 1977.

Berkowitz, dressed in a blue suit and white open-neck shirt, stood before Corso and answered a long series of questions designed to see if he understood the consequences of his plea.

"Do you know the penalty for second-degree murder?" Corso asked.

"Twenty-five years to life," Berkowitz answered in a clear, firm voice.

Corso set sentencing in the Moskowitz plea for May 22.

Among those witnessing Berkowitz' appearance were Jerry and Neysa Moskowitz, parents of the killer's last victim. Also present were Mr. and Mrs. Michael Lauria, parents of Donna Lauria.

Rail commission seat still disputed

Incumbent Railroad Commissioner John Poerner and former commissioner Jerry Sadler wasted no time in telling voters who they should cast ballots for June 3.

Poerner said Sunday he wanted to make it "abundantly clear" to voters that they need to closely examine the two candidates.

Sadler said today he is not going to seek office on the basis of "personality or by trying to buy a vote."

Sadler, of Hickory Grove in Anderson County, and Poerner, an appointee to the commis-

sion by Gov. Dolph Briscoe, are seeking the unexpired term which Poerner now holds.

"I am running on the contribution I can make to protect both the consumer and the producer based on my experience gained and proven by past performance," Sadler told the Palestine Herald Press.

Poerner said the "Sadler name is well known to many Texas voters," but said "It is important, however, that the voters are reminded of the reasons why his name sticks in their memories."

Sadler led the field of four candidates in the May Democratic primary Saturday, but did not have more than 50 percent of the vote to avoid the runoff.

Legislative turnover 'small'

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Speaker Bill Clayton today released a list showing support from enough representatives and House candidates to guarantee him an unprecedented third consecutive term.

Clayton listed names from 110 districts, including all candidates in some races still to be decided by run-offs or the November general election. The list contained 121 names.

A majority of the 150 House members elect the speaker.

Clayton's release of the names followed by two days the party primaries, which determined who will serve from most districts.

"These are solid supporters that have indicated to us over and over — some said, 'Put my name at the top of the list,'" Clayton told a news conference.

Supporters of Rep. Buddy Temple, D-Diboll, the only other candidate for speaker, say he is not ready to concede defeat and still has some hope of victory.

The primaries resulted in the defeat of one senator and three representatives, the smallest legislative turnover in years.

Many of the 89 unopposed incumbents received committee chairmanships or choice assignments from Clayton. Only 19 representatives did not seek re-election.

A few incumbents could be defeated in the November general election, but most of the damage normally is done in the primaries.

Sen. Frank Lombardino, D-San Antonio, was the sole casualty in the Senate. The heavy set ex-policeman, a lawmaker for more than 11 years, polled 13,612 votes to 19,471 for Rep. Bob Vale and 15,836 for lawyer Phil Hardeberger.

Other lawmakers defeated Saturday were Reps. John Bigham, D-Belton; Abe Ribak, D-San Antonio; and Chris Miller, D-Fort Worth.

Bigham, a nine-year House member, fell to William Messer, a former municipal court judge in Belton.

Ribak, first elected in 1974; was one of the House's more outspoken liberals. He was defeated by George Pierce, who had twice lost House races to Ribak.

Ms. Miller was defeated by Rep. Gib Lewis, with whom she was paired in a court-ordered redistricting plan to give Tarrant County minorities and Republicans greater representation.

Lewis, chairman of the House Intergovernmental Relations Committee, beat the ardent feminist almost three-to-one.

Sens. Betty Andujar, R-Fort Worth; Bill Meier, D-Eules; and Chet Brooks, D-Pasadena, all won their contested primaries, and Brooks has no opposition in November.

In the race to fill the Senate seat now held by Kent Hance, D-Lubbock, Texas Tech Regent Don Workman of Lubbock and Rep. E. L. Short, D-Tahoka, will meet in a run-off. The GOP candidate is

Rep. Joe Robbins, Lubbock.

Hance won the Democratic primary for congressman from the Lubbock area Saturday.

There will be 11 runoff primaries for the House on June 3 and 62 contested elections in November. Republicans and Democrats will square off for six Senate seats in the fall.

Senators who won their primaries without opposition and have no opponents in November are Peyton McKnight, Tyler; Roy Blake, Nacogdoches; Lindon Williams, Houston; Lloyd Doggett, Austin; Pete Snelson, Midland; Raul Longoria, Edinburg; and Ray Farabee, Wichita Falls.

Clayton said he thought the large number of unopposed representatives resulted from the 1977 Legislature's having dealt with "some things the people are concerned about."

"If we hadn't handled medical malpractice or if we had produced a school finance bill favoring one area over another, we would have had lots of incumbents opposed," he said.

Mondale joins naval drills

CANBERRA, Australia (AP) — Vice President Walter Mondale announced today that the United States would join Australia in naval exercises in the Indian Ocean to underscore America's commitment to the defense of Australia.

Mondale gave no details on the naval exercises. But he said the United States is a Pacific power and the joint war games would be a reaffirmation "of our commitment to the security of the region."

He stopped short of saying the exercises were an answer to Soviet naval activity in the Indian Ocean, which Fraser has criticized several times.

Mondale said the number of Soviet warships in the Indian Ocean "varies from time to time and has now dropped back."

"It sometimes varies from month to month," he said.

Mondale spoke from a prepared text on the steps of U.S. Ambassador's Philip H. Alston's residence with a chorus of white parrots squawking in the trees nearby.

He said the United States and Australia would also work more closely on nuclear safeguards to prevent uranium from being used for weapons.

Ethiopia offers training for South African rebels

BELGRADE, Yugoslavia (AP) — Ethiopia's government-controlled newspaper says Ethiopia has offered to train "fighters for freedom in South Africa," the Yugoslav news agency Tanjug reported today.

In a dispatch from Addis Ababa, the Ethiopian capital, Tanjug also quoted the Ethiopian Herald as speaking of "the brutal aggression of the Vorster regime's racist forces on Angola" and adding: "Provocations against independent African states cannot be tolerated."

The white South African government of Prime Minister John Vorster announced that its forces last Thursday raided bases of black South-West African guerrillas in Angola in retaliation for guerrilla attacks into South-West Africa. That South African-ruled territory lies between Angola and South Africa on Africa's west coast.

The Yugoslav agency quoted the Ethiopian Herald as saying that East African nation's Marxist government has undertaken "the obligation to train fighters for freedom in South Africa and offer other facilities."

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Fiesta leads to rioting

HOUSTON (AP) — Police patrolled a tense north side area today after thousands of Mexican-Americans rioted when police tried to break up a fight at a fiesta in a park.

Police reported shots fired, looting and arson in a 10-block area over a six-hour period Sunday night. A police car and a television mobile unit were burned. Two convenience stores were looted and a fire caused heavy damage to a bakery, variety store, and a laundry in a shopping center.

Twenty-two persons were arrested and about 15 others were injured. One policeman received a broken leg and two television reporters were hospitalized in satisfactory condition with stab wounds.

While more than 100 policemen were at the scene, all other officers were kept on standby alert more than eight hours.

"It was the good guys and the bad guys," said KPC-TV reporter Jack Cato, who was struck on the forehead with a brick and stabbed in the back. "One Latin American helped me get out and others were still throwing rocks at us."

The initial outbreak occurred as police sought to stop a fight in Moody Park, which is located in a predominantly Mexican-American community that has been upset since Joe Campos Torres, 23, died a year ago while in police custody.

"A couple of people got into a fight and some people jumped in," said State Rep. Ben Reyes. "When the police came, people reacted to their being there."

Police answering the initial call were pelted with rocks and bottles.

Four hours after the outbreak, police reported scattered looting and one store ablaze. They said no one was injured when several shots were fired from an apartment building. Police in riot gear escorted firemen into the area.

Police reported the situation under control at 3 a.m. today.

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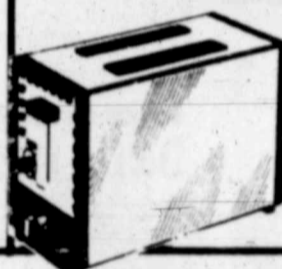

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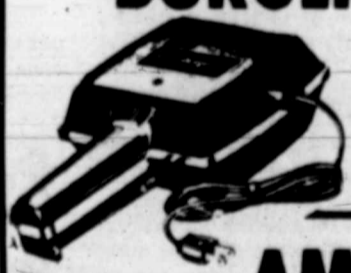

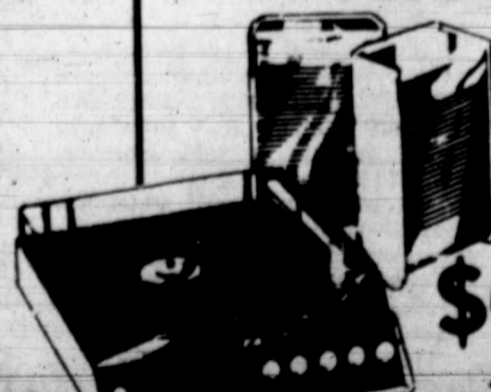

Lecture partner; you'll feel better

Partners never know the value of their cards, and you sometimes have to be very stern with them. The proof lies in a hand that came along in a national tournament some years ago.

North dealer North-South vulnerable

NORTH: ♠AQ, ♥Q8, ♦Q842, ♣AKQ43. WEST: ♠642, ♥KJ74, ♦J6, ♣9765. EAST: ♠1087, ♥A102, ♦AK1075, ♣J8. SOUTH: ♠KJ953, ♥9653, ♦93, ♣102.

North 1 ♣, East 1 ♦, South Pass, West All Pass.

Opening lead - ♦J

West led the jack of diamonds, dummy covered with the queen, and I won with the king in the East hand. (I hate to write about myself, but my journalistic oath compels me to tell the

truth.) I continued with the ten of diamonds and then with the ace and deuce of hearts. West took the king of hearts and led a third heart, forcing dummy to ruff.

When declarer tried to run the clubs I ruffed the third club with the ten of spades, and South overruffed with the jack.

South next ruffed his last heart with dummy's other trump and led a fourth club from dummy. I ruffed, and South overruffed with the nine.

DEPLETED TRUMPS

South now had only K-5-3 of spades. He cashed the king, but West then defeated the contract with the six and four.

"Coward," I snarled at my partner. "You had two natural trump tricks and you didn't have the nerve to double."

This kind of remark tells your partner just what to expect. At least that's what my partners always tell me.

DAILY QUESTION

As dealer you hold: S1087; HA102; DAK1075; CJ8. What do you say?

ANSWER: Bid one diamond. Even if the jack of clubs were a lower card you should still open the bidding. Ace-king of one suit, a side ace and a good five-card suit are enough for an opening bid even if you are shy a point or two.

Joe Don Baker aspires to third screen career

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Joe Don Baker says his movie career has gone through two stages so far. He's hoping for a third.

"I used to play the bad guy who went around beating heads," he said. "Now I play the good guy who goes around beating heads."

Baker, who was the club-wielding sheriff in "Walking Tall," says he would like nothing better than to break the mold.

In "Speedtrap," he plays a private eye who's called in to nab an elusive and ingenious car thief the police can't handle. Does he beat on anybody? Is Pat O'Brien Irish?

"They've got me pegged as a gentleman who gets involved in violent situations," said Baker. "I don't like it. I'd really like to play a human being for a change. They shove you into a pigeon hole out here. They say, 'Oh yeah, hats what he does.' I didn't study acting all those years in New York to be typecast."

Baker said he has a romantic tragedy he is hoping NBC will make into a movie. "I've known about this script for four years," he said. "But everybody's afraid of it because it has a summer ending."

If he's trying to change his roles, why did he do "Speedtrap?" He shrugged and said his soft Texas drawl, "I was hanging around the house and had nothing to do. They asked me if I'd like to go to Arizona."

More seriously, he said, "I did this as a sort of favor to First Artists. I want them to remember me when

they make some big movies."

"Speedtrap," financed by Dutch investors and already doing well in the Netherlands, Sweden and New Zealand, is one of the first films released by First Artists. The company was founded by Paul Newman, Barbra Streisand, Steve McQueen and Sidney Poitier to produce their films.

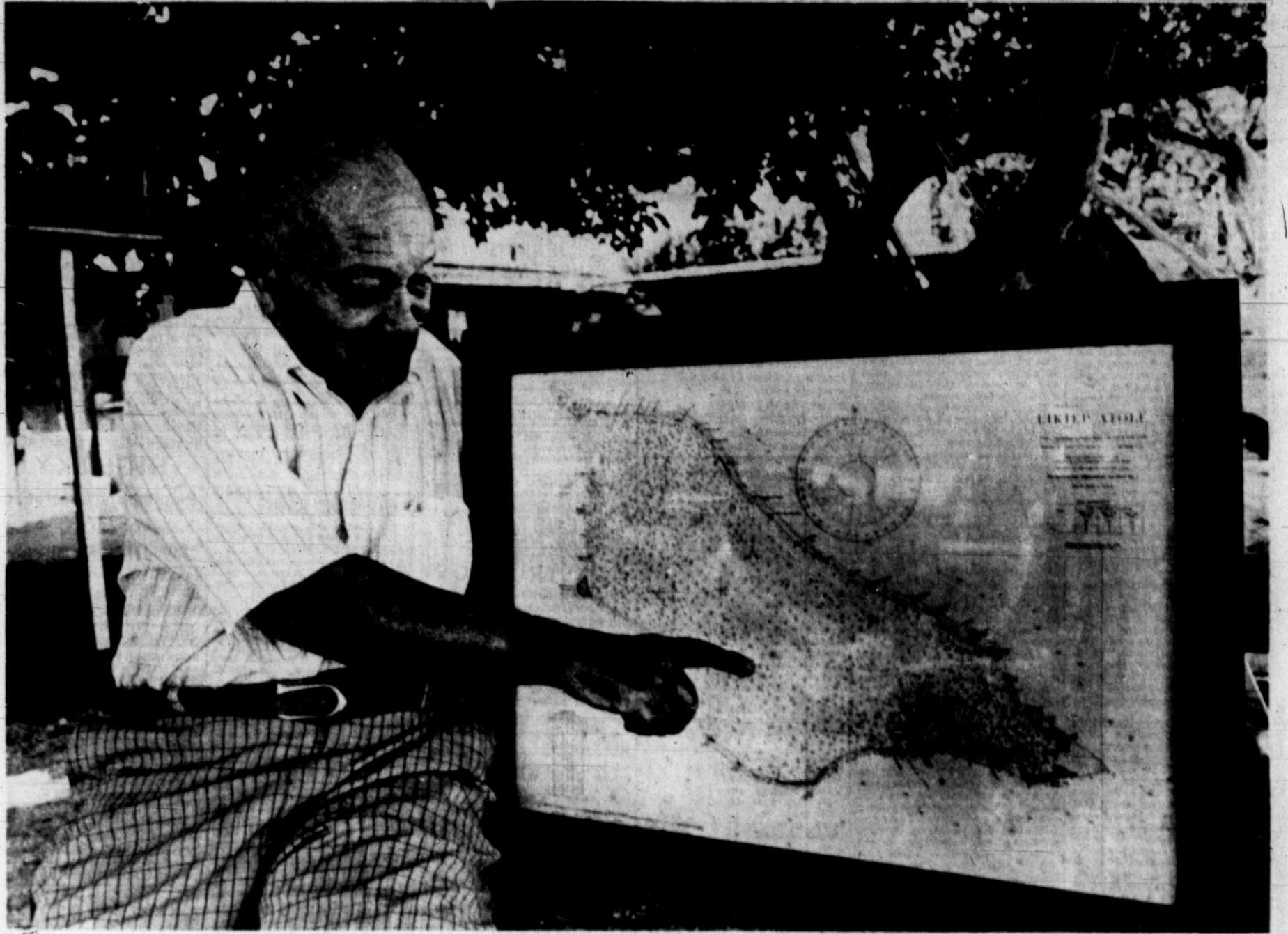
The movie, which also stars Tyne Daly, Richard Jaeckel, Robert Loggia and Morgan Woodward, is sort of an uptown version of those drive-in movies of motor mayhem.

Atoll offers timeless paradise

LIKIEP ATOLL — This remote clump of 64 coconut island 2,200 miles southwest of Hawaii is a Pacific Shangri-la.

Life is simple, leisurely, carefree. There are no automobiles or trucks or other vehicles here. No exhaust fumes. No traffic tie-ups. No stop-lights. No roads.

There is no electricity — no radios, telephones or televisions. There are no newspapers, politicians, taxes, police or jails on Likiep (lee-kee-ep).

It's a turn-back-the-clock existence, a world apart, seldom visited by outsiders.

For nearly a century it has been a tropical paradise for two families — the Capelles and the De Brums.

Likiep is a charming, priceless family heirloom. No airplanes or ships come here. There are no hotels or restaurants.

The 64 islands are embraced by dazzling white sand beaches ever washed by blue-green seas, surrounded by a coral reef on the ocean side and inland by a 28-mile-long, 10-mile-wide lagoon.

Children swim in the quiet lagoon or ride the gentle breakers inside the reef.

There is plenty of food for all. Fruit on the trees — coconuts, papayas, bananas, breadfruit, mangoes, pandanus. Vegetables grown in family plots. Chickens, ducks, pigs. An abundance of fish in the sea.

Likiep has been the private domain of the two families since 1883. That was the year two men in their early 20s bought the entire atoll of 64 islands for a cannon and a small quantity of tobacco, hammers, nails, axes, machetes and saws.

They bought the islands from a Marshall Islands native chief who was an absentee owner. The men were Adolf Capelle, a German from Hamburg, and Anton Jose de Brum, a Portuguese from Pick in the Azores Islands.

De Brum was a crewman aboard a whaler who jumped ship on the island of Ebon, 350 miles to the south of Likiep. Capelle came out on a German copra ship and for a few months operated a small store on Ebon.

Capelle and De Brum struck up a friendship. They decided to team up and go into the copra business. As luck would have it, they met the Marshallese iroij (native chief), who went bananas over the cannon Capelle had in his store.

The chief offered Likiep for the cannon, tobacco, and the hardware.

Capelle and De Brum had themselves an atoll. The two men sailed to Likiep in a schooner. In a short time they had selected the two prettiest Marshallese women on the islands for their wives and had gone into the copra business.

"About 200 Marshallese lived on the islands in the lagoon when my father and Capelle came here," said Melander de Brum, 82, picking up the story.

"They went to work for my father and Capelle harvesting the coconuts and receiving a straight down-the-middle 50 percent of what the two new owners of the atoll received for the copra."

De Brum was the second youngest and the only survivor of seven children born to his mother, a Marshallese Islander, and Anton de Brum. Capelle had six children by his Marshallese wife, all of whom have since died.

Each of the Capelle and De Brum children had six to a dozen children. The grandchildren, great-grandchildren and great-great-grandchildren have been equally prolific.

A dozen of the islands in the Likiep lagoon are uninhabited today. Coconuts are harvested on both uninhabited and inhabited islands.

"When Capelle and De Brum first came here," Melander de Brum said, "they promptly set about dividing up everything in the lagoon."

"It has been a super arrangement all these years, divided but always together," chimed in Lena de Brum, 23, great-grandniece of Melander, explaining: "The copra plantations on all the islands on the eastern side are owned by both families. Three

islands on the western side, Mato, Rongerik and Likia, are owned by the Capelles.

"South of the three islands are a string of 21 islands equal in area to the three northern islands. These belong to the De Brum family."

The biggest island in the lagoon, Likiep — same name as the atoll — is split up, the Capelles living on the north side and the De Brums living on the south side.

There is a cemetery — with the headstones on one side De Brums, on the other Capelles.

By now, however, the two families have so intermarried that some of the younger generation have such names as Capelle de Brum and De Brum Capelle.

Descendants of the original Marshallese copra harvesters — many have also married into the Capelle and De Brum families — are still harvesting the crop on a 50-50 arrangement.

The Capelle and De Brum families send out a boat once a week, circling the lagoon to pick up the copra and paying for it on the spot.

There were nearly 1,000 men, women and children living on Likiep 10 years ago, but fewer than half that are here now.

But even in paradise people hunger for the amenities of "civilized" life — cars, planes, TVs, stoves, refrigerators...

Those who have left have gone to seek employment in something other than copra.

Capelles and De Brums are scattered throughout the Marshall Islands. But those who have left Likiep try to return to visit their relatives and enjoy the quiet life in the lagoon whenever possible.

Here in Likiep there are three houses on each family plot — plywood structures with tin or thatched roof. One is a cook house, where the women of the family cook and store their food and cooking utensils.

Then there is the dining house, where the family eats. And in the third separate house are the bedrooms.

The two families pride themselves on cleanliness.

Every morning shortly after sunup, children are sent out to pick up the leaves that have fallen to the ground during the night.

"We still have some of the Old World customs handed down by our great-great-grandfathers," said Lena de Brum. "If the kids are late for a meal, they don't eat."

There is a large plantation house on Likiep filled with family heirlooms collected by both Capelle and De Brum, both of whom died before World War I.

The two men had valuable pieces of Victorian furniture shipped to the island from Europe before the turn of the century. They had large libraries, old muskets and pistols, glass negatives of photographs they had taken on the island.

The Plantation House is preserved and protected by the islanders as a shrine to the two founders.

There is an elementary school at Likiep and two churches, one Congregational and one Catholic. Both have Capelles and De Brums as members.

DR. NEIL SOLOMON Skin tags could be diabetes sign

Dear Dr. Solomon: Are skin tags dangerous? I have a couple near my right armpit, and I don't know if I should see a doctor about them.—Sam A. Dear Sam: Skin tags—whether they are flesh-colored or brown little hanging outgrowths of your skin—are usually thought to be harmless. But a recent report states that they may be an indication of diabetes. Dr. Jack Margolis of the Veterans Administration Hospital in Big Spring, Texas, found this link in a survey of 500 patients admitted consecutively to the hospital. Out of 47 male patients with skin tags, 34 were diabetic—that is over 70 percent. On the other hand, out of 433 male patients without skin tags, 28 were diabetic—about 6 1/2 percent.

In other words, men with skin tags seemed to have over 10 times more chance of being diabetic than those without. So it might be well worth your while to have your doctor give you a diabetes check. It so happened, incidentally, that there were only 20 women in Dr. Margolis' group. None was diabetic, and just one woman had skin tags. So he was not able to come up with any significant figures for women in this study.

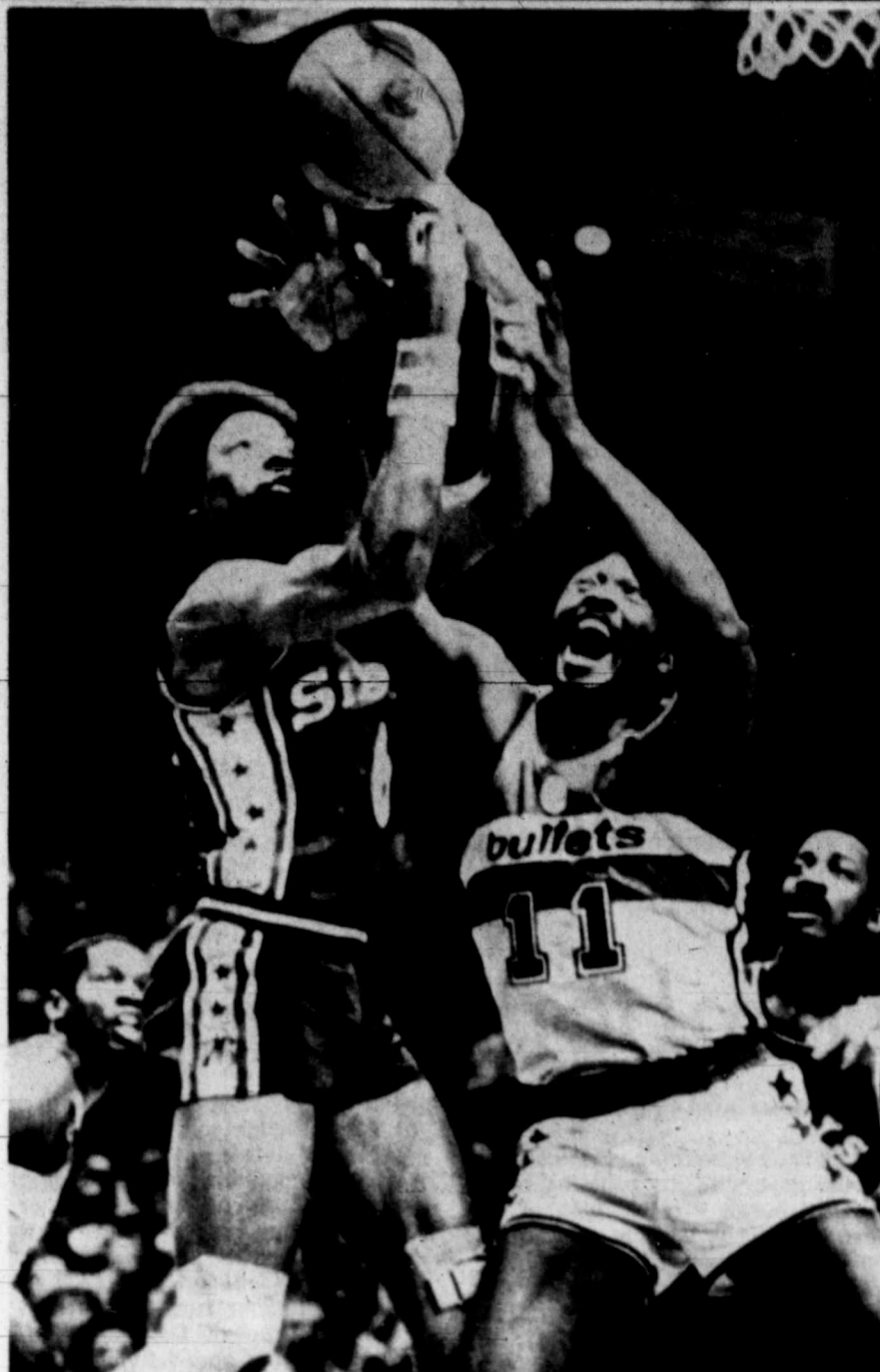

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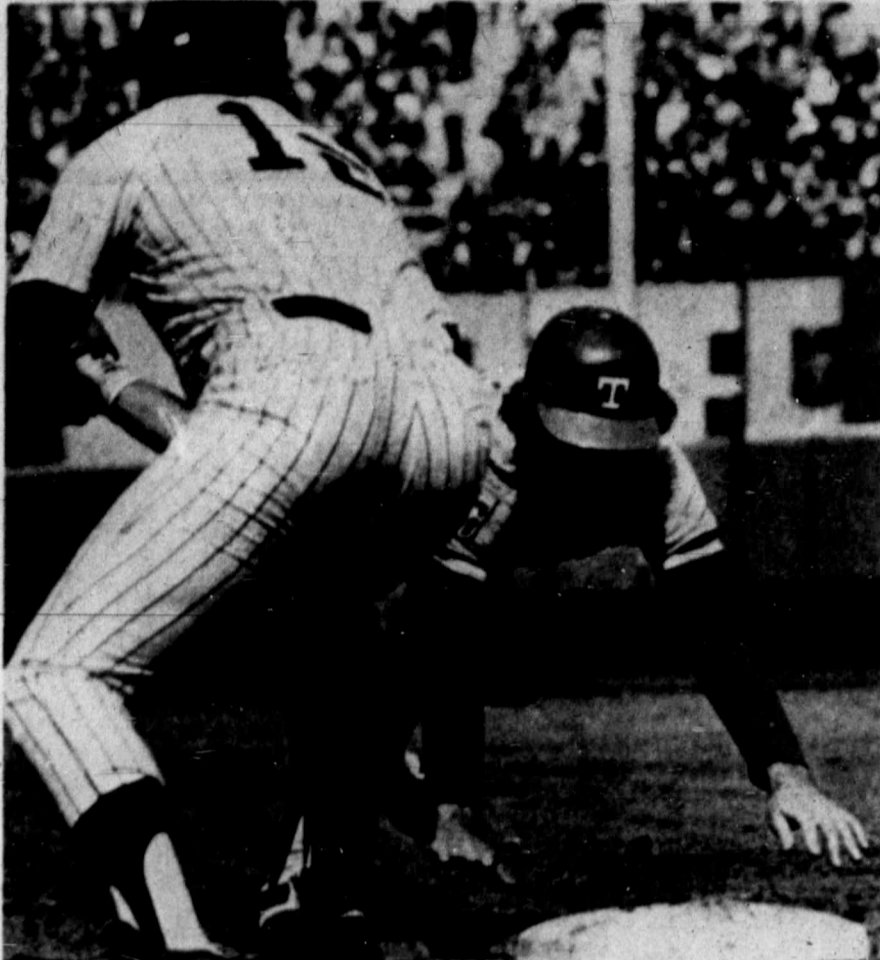

I just didn't expect it. The other four (by Moreno and Taveras) were just good stolen bases. I held them as close as I could, but I also had to concentrate on the plate."

Moreno walked in the first inning, stole second and scored on a single by Robinson. In the second inning, Garner doubled home a run, stole third and scored on a single by Rooker, who then stole his first base of the season.

A theft by Robinson set up a third-inning run, and Pittsburgh scored twice more in the sixth on a two-run single by Dave Parker.

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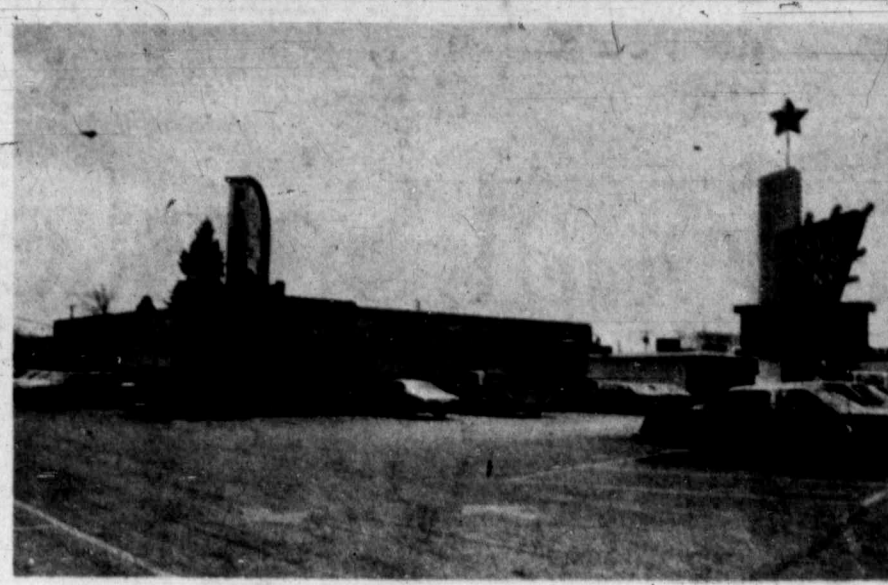
Saudi official denies jet sales linked to oil

TAIF, Saudi Arabia (AP) — Oil Minister Ahmed Zaki Yamani said today there is no direct "linkage" between Saudi Arabia's oil policy and its desire to buy 60 U.S. F-15 jet fighters. But he said it would be "naive" to think rejection of the request would not have a long-range effect on U.S.-Saudi relations.

"It is unfair to link the oil policy of Saudi Arabia with the sale of the F-15s, though they are so important to the kingdom and we need them so badly," Yamani told American reporters at a meeting of the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries.

"You need a great deal of our cooperation, so much of a sacrifice, to deplete our resources at a very great rate. How much cooperation we give will depend on how

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ICC seeks regulation of moving 'estimates'

The Washington Post WASHINGTON — The Interstate Commerce Commission has proposed that the estimates household movers give individual customers be made binding.

The change in regulations was prompted by a recent investigation revealing an "intolerable" number of underestimates furnished by common carriers, the ICC said. Last year nearly one-third of all shipments for individual households were under-estimated by more than 10 percent, the investigation showed.

However, Welby Frantz, president of the American Movers Conference, the largest industry trade organization, accused the ICC of

"taking a steamroller to bread dough."

"It will be a devastating thing for the consumer," he said. "It will put mom-and-pop-type movers out of business. They won't be able to stand up to low bidders." He also protested that the ICC forgot to mention in its release that 25.9 percent of shipments delivered last year overestimated.

The proposed regulation was also prompted by the failure of customers to understand the so-called 110 percent rule, the ICC said. This provides that a carrier may collect no more than 10 percent above the estimated price when the goods arrive. However, the carrier has the right to collect within 15 days

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Hotel strike continues

MALAGA, Spain (AP) — Thousands of tourists made their own beds and hefted their own baggage again today as a hotel strike along Spain's southern coast went into its third day with workers accusing management of a lockout.

More than 30,000 restaurant and bar workers returned to work today after a 48-hour strike, union officials said. But another 20,000 found doors barred to them when they tried to report back, the union said.

The workers walked out Saturday after management rejected their demands for a pay hike. Hotel operators promised a counter offer later today. The leftist-controlled unions threatened another strike for next weekend if the new offer is not satisfactory.

Hardest hit were the teeming tourist hotels in Malaga, Marbella and Torremolinos.
