5.78 Inches Moisture This Year

An election for the purpose of electing three trustees for the Stratford Rural High School District for a term of two years will be held at the Courthouse, in Stratford, Saturday, April 3, according to an order issued by the Board of Trustees this week.

No nominations have been filed.

Special Session Legislature Requested

The Texas State Teachers Association has requested Governor Beauford Jester to call a special session of the Legislature to prevent several hundred schools from closing their doors before completing their regular terms this spring.

Before the end of the school year there will be a deficit of approximately \$3,000,000 in the state equalization aid fund.

Unless the deficit is made up by an appropriation, many schools will be forced to curtail their activities and shorten their school year, a delegation from the Teachers Association told the governor.

Schools receiving equalization aid, of which there are more than 3,000 are operating upon budgets set up after they had been assured they would receive definite amounts of assistance from the state, the delegation informed the governor.

Equalization aid is tendered schools which qualify for it under state law to help pay teachers, provide transportation and general operating expenses and for high school tuition.

The Legislature appropriated \$18,000,000 each year of the biennium for the equalization aid fund. The deficit for the school year 1948-49 will be even greater due to the fact that no surplus will accrue in the available school fund for distribution as happened last year when the State Board of Education distributed a surplus of six dollars per student to all schools in the state.

Marketable Livestock Decreasing

There will be fewer meat animals and less meat in '48 which is hard on the consumer but money in the pocket for the producer. The situation holds true for Texas as well as the whole nation.

Extension farm management specialists for Texas A. & M. College say there are several favorable factors affecting the livestock market. Cattle prices will be affected by the heavy marketing of cattle and calves in '47, as it brought breeding cattle numbers down and means a short calf crop in '48 for certain. Fewer calves and strong demand mean good prices for beef. The cold wave may cause still more breeding cattle to be marketed because of the high cost of winter feeds.

An early spring and good pasture conditions in the Feed Belt would make a good market for Texas cattle, as many farmers in that area plan to buy younger and medium to good grade cattle for use on their pastures this spring and summer and will feed them only a little corn until the new crop comes on in the fall.

Not only will there be fewer cattle to market this year, but fewer lambs. Many ewes in Texas are in poor condition and won't be able to stand continued severe weather without heavy feeding. Winter wheat pastures in Texas as a whole are in relatively poor condition. Last year small grain pastures carried a million lambs, but very few moved to that area in late '47 because of the drought. Many ranchmen have culled their flocks closely.

All in all, it looks like the demand will be good and the prices right for the livestock producer in Texas in 1948.

Lions Attendance Percentage On Increase

Twenty-five Lions and guests were present at Lions Club Monday night. Mrs. Sallie McAdams spoke on the Post Office Department, and the Stratford Post Office in Particular. She reported that there were slightly over forty-three thousand post offices in the United States. The Post Office was organized in 1775, and has grown to become the second biggest business in the United States, outranked only by the War Department. The Stratford Post Office was opened in 1901.

Secretary Goule reported that attendance for the month of February averaged seventy-six percent, the highest in the history of the club, and under the most adverse weather conditions.

Teachers Conference Friday

The meeting of the annual convention of the Northwest Texas Conference for Education, District IX of the Texas State Teachers Association, with headquarters in the municipal auditorium, will be held in Amarillo Friday.

Beginning with registration at 8:30 o'clock, the meeting will feature three speakers who will stress the theme "Education Stands Challenged." After a 30-minute concert by the Badger Band of Amarillo College, the program will commence with a speech of welcome by Charles M. Rogers, superintendent of Amarillo public schools, and a tribute to Dr. J. A. Hill, whose 30-year term as president of West Texas State College will expire next August.

In the morning session, Dr. Hugh A. Stuntz, president of Scarritt College in Nashville will discuss the international aspects of the present situation in education; and Dr. Willard L. Goslin, superintendent of schools at Minneapolis and president of the American Association of School Administrators, will treat the subject from a more localized viewpoint.

In the evening schedule starting at 8 o'clock, Dr. Alexander J. Stoddard, superintendent of schools at Philadelphia, will address the group concerning "The American Scheme of Education."

Following a series of luncheons given within the various sections, the meeting will be divided into special interest sessions from 2 until 4 o'clock. At the meeting of the House of Delegates at 4 o'clock, officers for the coming year will be elected and other business transacted.

Interment was made in the Stratford cemetery beside the remains of her husband under the supervision of Wilson Funeral Directors.

Mynola Brown, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John V. L. Brown, was born in the family home near London, Kentucky November 13, 1875.

At an early age she placed her membership with the Methodist Church.

In 1904 she came to Sherman County to care for her invalid mother who became ill while visiting her daughter, Mrs. M. H. Bradshaw.

June 10 1905 she was united in marriage with James Hartford Ross, who preceded her in death September 11, 1912.

To this union was born one son, Brown Ross, who survives.

Following the passing of her husband Mrs. Ross moved to Stratford with her son, taking an active part in the Methodist Sunday School and for several years was the Junior League sponsor.

In 1936 she became active in newspaper work, being associated with her son in publishing the Stratford Star.

Advance of Insects Stymied by Science

Man's Intelligence Termed the Only Safeguard in Struggle.

LONDON. — The dinosaurs had their day, 60 million years ago, and fishes had their millions of years before that. Mammals had a golden age and today is the age of man, the highest mammal.

Many seers, professional and otherwise, have predicted that the next form of life to take over will be the insects. Only man's intelligence, so entomologists believe, stands between the decline and fall of mankind and the rise of bugs.

Dr. V. B. Wigglesworth of Cambridge university, one of Britain's outstanding entomologists, told a science survey audience, reassuringly, that scientists are doing their best to provide more efficient weapons in the struggle against insects. The basic element for eventual success, he warned, is knowledge.

"In the practical art of killing insects," he said, "there comes a time when we find that our basic capital of knowledge is exhausted. It is the pure sciences which provide that working capital."

New fields of inquiry are being opened up, Wigglesworth said.

California Plans Relief Ship To Carry Supplies to Europe

SACRAMENTO, CALIF. — Gov. Earl Warren has disclosed plans for California to send a unique relief ship filled with food and clothing to Europe.

The governor announced that preliminary arrangements had been completed to use the training ship "Golden Bear" of the California Maritime academy on the trip. Donations will be solicited, he said, for the 1,500-ton cargo the ship will carry to Greece, Italy and possibly France.

Depleted Ore Mines Viewed as Arsenal

Deep Tunnels Are Safe From Bombs in Atomic War.

JOPLIN, MO.—With the lead and zinc ore reserves badly depleted by all-out production in World War II, this vast mining field in the corners of Missouri, Kansas and Oklahoma thinks in terms of becoming a huge, subterranean arsenal when hearing talk about an atomic war.

The district has miles and miles of man-made underground caverns suitable for munitions works and storage. This, coupled with the fact that the district is near the center of the United States, makes atomic warfare conversation perhaps less frightening than almost any place else in the country.

The idea that the district could be used for defense production and storage has been stimulated by recent visits of military procurement men who have talked with manufacturers and business men on this subject.

Tunnels—"drifts," the miners call them—large enough to accommodate whole munition works are available. Many are scientifically ventilated and electrically lighted. Pumps can keep them dry. They are reached by perpendicular mine shafts. They exist at depths ranging from 50 to 300 feet.

Scores of mines, already 30 to 40 years old, worked at top speed on thin ore percentages during the recent war and under the stimulation of federal subsidies.

In July, 1947, the subsidies were withdrawn. Many of the big marginal mines closed. Others are preparing to close. About 50 per cent of the field now is idle, but the underground of the entire region is literally cut to pieces by mine drifts.

A problem of preserving the field for future subterranean development would be keeping the drifts from filling up with water should mine operations be suspended completely. Once the underground became water filled, the cost of "dewatering" would be terrific.

ST. LOUIS, MO. — A pastor standing at the rear of his church at the close of services noted a young man and woman, strangers, coming out and hastened to introduce himself.

He was somewhat taken aback when the youth explained: "We're here, sir, because we plan to be married, and we are looking for the right sized church with a good center aisle. Well, your church meets the requirements, so we just dropped by this morning to audition you. We think your voice and manner are great, so how about your handling the wedding?"

The youngest age at which one may be married in the U. S. is 14 years for men and 12 for women.

The soil removal tests were made in accordance with the Test Manual of the American Washer and Ironer Manufacturers' Association, with water temperatures of 160° for the automatic machine and 125° for non-automatic type machines as specified by the Manual.

For the germ removal tests the washing procedure as above was supplemented by a pre-determined rinse procedure established from contact with authorities in the field of home laundering including the manufacturers of the machines used. The Bendix was used in accordance with the manufacturer's published instructions. Staphylococcus aureus bacteria (bacteria commonly used for test purposes) were used to measure efficiency of germ removal.

The four washers used, three non-automatic and a Bendix automatic Washer, were purchased in the open market by the Pittsburgh Testing Laboratory.





still at an extreme high and the great bulk of businesses are doing well. However, certain trouble spots have begun to appear which, while more or less isolated as yet, may have an important long-term effect on the whole industrial structure. One of these spots is credit. The United States News recently published a survey of this problem, which pointed out that the credit needs of many businesses have turned out to be unexpectedly large. They entered the post-war era with such large resources on hand that it didn't seem wise or necessary to issue securities to raise cash. But higher prices, wages, and the ever-rising cost of physical expansion have eaten into their capital at an alarming rate. They must look to bank loans to carry them through.

Bank lending, says the News, is now becoming more restrained. Marginal borrowers, especially, are being discouraged. A bank economist is quoted as saying, "The overall situation of business is quite strong at the moment, but, under present conditions, an individual could lose his shirt in 30 days." Bankers are keeping a wary watch on the price and business volume indices. They are advising their customers not to get over-extended. Some con-

cerns, which were riding the top of the wave not so long ago, are actually on the brink of failure now, due to over-optimistic commitments. As the Chicago Federal Reserve Bank expresses it, in the jargon of finance, "an increasing number of individuals and business firms are experiencing financial stringencies and hence are becoming more and more vulnerable to any interruption or slowing down in income or production."

The inventory problem is another potential headache. Manufacturers, wholesalers and retailers all are carrying inventories that, measured in dollars, are double or more the prewar level. A sharp price break could cause an untold loss. Thus, the tendency may well be to gradually reduce inventories, and to replenish with care. The big retailers are being especially watchful, and are counseling their industry to get absolutely top value for each dollar spent. The retailers are the first to feel consumer resistance when it appears, and it has been noticeable lately in some lines, such as high priced foods, and luxury and semi-luxury goods.

As a general principle, practically everyone believes that a certain amount of price decline would be extremely desirable. But few believe that the country could stand a return of prices to the 1941 or any similar level, even if such a miracle were possible. The whole economic and governmental structure is based upon an enormous national income, and that can be maintained only if employment, volume of business and prices all stay well up. As a nation, we are hundreds of billions in debt, and that debt must be serviced and gradually reduced. At the lowest conceivable estimate, the government's annual budgets will be far larger than we ever had in peacetime. A worse turn of the international scene may force a sharp jump in the amount of money we will have to spend on the armed forces. If government is to get the revenue it needs, a serious deflation must be avoided.

The effect of possible lower prices and a lower national income is being felt already, the outlook for tax reduction is nowhere near so bright as it was a short while back. The case for tax reduction was based on estimates of governmental income which, in turn, were predicted upon a continued boom in all its phases. If those estimates prove to be seriously in error, tax relief will really be a chimera.

There is an intangible factor of great economic importance which may prove to be a definitive influence in the near future. That is the state of business and consumer thinking. When people think prices are coming down, whether their logic is sound or full of holes, they will defer all possible purchases. The industrial purchasing agent as well as the individual will do that. This factor can be especially important in such fields as industrial and residential building.

Handwashing Precaution
Thorough washing of the hands before eating was one of the cardinal precautions recommended by National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis during the recent epidemic season. Scientific studies have shown that the hands may be a means of spreading the virus infection through the contamination of food, drinks or objects carried to the mouth. For this reason, the foundation cautions that a high standard of personal cleanliness should be maintained, and that fresh fruits and vegetables especially should be washed well before eating.

Ekos Out Meager Livelihood

To Preserve \$20,000 Cache
WICHITA, KAN.—Police investigating the plight of a woman who had eked out a meager livelihood by laundering the clothing of other residents of a third-rate hotel found some \$20,000 among her belongings. The hotel manager had appealed for aid for his guest, reporting that she apparently had barely enough to eat.

The woman, Mrs. Joyce Leed, told police "I've been living this way because I'm afraid I would be killed if some people knew I had this much money and bonds."

Wolf Too Often; Police Moan
HOLLISTER, CALIF.—The burglar alarm at the local Bank of America branch has gone off so many times lately — because of short circuits — that Hollister's police mention it in the same breath with the old "cry wolf" fable.







Banana Cup Cakes



Sliced bananas show off their good looks in these tempting banana cup cakes made with enriched flour for better food value.

Fruit variety is limited at this season so let's find different ways for using the "dependables" on the market. There are more ways than one to eat bananas. For proof, we offer these cup cakes with a real banana flavor, their fluffy frosting decked with two slices of the fruit. The cup cakes are made by the usual cake method, with the flour mixture added to the creamed mixture alternately with mashed bananas and milk. Measure ingredients carefully, sifting flour once before measuring. Preserve the golden yellow of the cut bananas in the topping by dipping them in lemon or other citrus juice.

Besides good eating, the cup cakes boast of good food value supplied by the enriched flour with its protein, iron, and B-vitamins. The recipe makes a sufficient quantity to serve at a casual afternoon tea, or for after-school snack and dinner dessert.

BANANA CUP CAKES

2 cups sifted enriched flour	1 teaspoon grated orange rind
2 teaspoons baking powder	1 teaspoon grated lemon rind
1/4 teaspoon soda	1 teaspoon vanilla extract
1/2 teaspoon salt	1 cup mashed bananas
1/2 cup shortening	2 tablespoons milk
1 cup sugar	1/2 cup chopped nuts
2 eggs, beaten	

Sift together flour, baking powder, soda and salt. Cream together shortening and sugar until light and fluffy. Add eggs, mixing well. Add orange rind, lemon rind and vanilla extract. Add flour mixture to creamed mixture alternately

with bananas and milk. Fold in nuts. Fill greased three-inch muffin pans two-thirds full. Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees F.) about 25 minutes. Yield: About 14 three-inch cup cakes.

Manuscript of Beethoven's

Last Completed Work Found

BALTIMORE. — The original manuscript of what is believed to be the last completed work of Composer Ludwig von Beethoven has been unearthed at Peabody Conservatory of Music, officials of the institution said.

Searching for displays to celebrate the conservatory's 80th anniversary, the manuscript was found gathering dust amid modern books and magazines in a library. Peabody officials said they were unaware it was in their possession.

The work is a canon, a composition having "voices" or "parts" with the same melody sung in harmonious succession. The words and music are in Beethoven's handwriting.

Beethoven sent the composition to a friend along with the last movement of his B-flat quartet.

N. Y. Court Decision Holds

NEW YORK. — A supreme court justice ruled that a child born as the result of artificial insemination is legitimate.

Farm Topics

Homemade Weighing Bin Speeds Work

Device Aids Automatic Feed Handling Setup
It is an old saying that all farm equipment was first thought of by a farmer. Whether that saying holds true may be questioned. But it is certain that much of it did come into being as the result of ideas which some farmer had concerning ways to improve and speed up the performance of his various chores.

A pertinent example of this fact is shown in the accompanying illustration. It shows a homemade weighing bin, which was conceived by a Midwestern farmer for use with his automatic feed handling setup. It holds several tons of feed and is fixed to the ceiling by a series of heavy springs and turnbuckles, one spring being located at each corner of the bin in the center of two turnbuckles. Tension on the springs moves a pointer across a scale at the bottom of the bin to indicate weight up to 3,200 pounds. A slide gate at the bottom of the bin permits feed to spill out into a cart in desired quantities. The bin

s placed below a chute leading from a two-ton mixer in the barn now. The entire setup operates as follows: Whole grain is blown into an overhead bin, from which it flows into a blower-equipped hammermill on the first floor. Ground grain is blown back into the mixer and then drops into the weighing bin. The mixer and grinder are operated by live-horsepower motors, whereas the whole grain is blown into the storage bin by tractor power.

Automatic Egg Washer



Prof. F. B. Wright demonstrating the new egg washing machine developed at Cornell university. The device makes it possible for two persons to wash, dry and pack five cases of eggs an hour, five times as fast as the same jobs could be done by hand. As most poultrymen and their wives spend from two to four evenings a week cleaning eggs by hand, this machine will result in a big saving in time.

Formula Computes Feed Required for One Hen

High egg production clearly takes more feed, but just as clearly the feed brings a greater return in terms of eggs than the same amount fed to low-producing hens. Dr. L. E. Card of the Illinois experiment station explains how to compute the total feed required for one hen for a year:
Multiply the live weight of the bird, in pounds, by 8.
Add 25.
Divide the total number of eggs the hen lays by 7 (e. g. 105 divided by 7 equals 15) and add this figure to the total obtained by the first two steps. An example:
Weight of hen—5 pounds.
Five times 8 equals 40; plus 25 equals 65.
Hen lays 105 eggs per year. Divide this figure by 7. Result 15.
Total feed required—80 pounds. (65 plus 15).

Plowing Is Major Step In Garden Pest Control

International Union Sunday School Lessons

Christian Character

Lesson for March 14, 1948

WHO is the most valuable person in your community? In many communities it has come to be the custom to select the Man of the Year or the Woman of the Year, the idea usually being to name the person, through a process of sampling of public opinion, who has rendered the outstanding service of the year.

Sunday's lesson is a dramatic scene out of the long ago, picturing a community's tribute to a truly great man, the apostle Paul. Read Acts 20:17-38, and you will have the story.

LOVED AND HONORED
THE first impression I get from this story is the fact that these people of Ephesus loved Paul. They loved him enough to lay aside their work and hasten to the nearby seaport of Miletus to see him for the last time, and to bow down in his presence and honor him.

Why did they thus love Paul? Because he had told them about God. You need but read again the record of Paul's ministry in that important city of Ephesus to be reminded of how greatly he had served them in the name of Jesus.

Loved and honored! What a tribute to the worth of Christian character! Wouldn't you appreciate the tribute which they paid Paul as the goal of yonder to which you strive? Boys and girls of today may thus be honored tomorrow, if they will live for Jesus as Paul did.

THE POWER OF RIGHT LIVING
PAUL not only told the Ephesians how to live, but illustrated day by day in his own life what he preached to them. The most eloquent sermons are not spoken, but lived. "What you are speaks so loudly I can't hear what you say."

The boy and man who plays the game straight are putting into practice what the teacher and preacher proclaims on Sunday. The power of right living will win its way today, just as it did in the long ago when Paul witnessed for Jesus in Ephesus.

It was not easy to live for Christ in Ephesus, nor is it easy to live for him in Chicago or Los Angeles or Boston or Miami, but it is the one way to ultimately impress the world of the reality of Christianity.

PAUL'S CONSUMING PASSION
WE ARE what we are becoming, and never was this axiom of life more powerfully illustrated than in the case of Paul. "I press on toward the goal for the prize of the upward call of God in Christ Jesus," Philippians 3:14. And in Ephesians 5:6-21, Paul reviews the qualities of conduct which produce worthwhile character, admonishing all Christians to strive for these qualities.

"I live, yet not I, Christ liveth in me," is another of Paul's watchwords, and still again, "I can do all things through Christ, who strengtheneth me."

It was the consuming passion of his life to embody the teachings of Christ in his words and in his works. It is conceivable that the people at Ephesus had come to see Christ in the life of Paul, and that his daily ministry in their midst convinced them that God was in Christ reconciling the world unto himself.

WHAT AM I WORTH?

THE question then emerges, What am I worth to my community? When I come to the end of the journey, will the people who know me best honor and love me for what I have done?

I can see the people of Ephesus bowing on the dock at Miletus, kissing this weary old servant of the Lord. It is a beautiful scene. This tribute meant more to Paul than all the gold of Ephesus would have meant. It was compensation of abiding worth to him. And what is vastly more important, it was glory to God which must have evoked the praise of the angels about the great White Throne.

2 pkgs. Red Star Dry Yeast
1/2 cup warm water (100°-110° F.)
1/2 cup milk
1/2 cup sugar
1 teaspoon salt
5 cups flour (approximately)

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Safety in Driving

There are Emily Post rules of etiquette for the highway, just as there are for the drawing room, according to W. J. Elliott, Chief of the Texas Highway Patrol.

"And traffic rules not only make for gracious living, they make for living - period," he said.

"No driver is a good driver unless he knows and obeys the traffic laws, to insure his own safety as well as the safety of other drivers and pedestrians."


Chief Elliott pointed out that nearly half of all accidents in business and residential areas involve two vehicles at an intersection, and half of these are the result of two vehicles entering at

right angles intent on going straight through.

He said that statistics of the National Safety Council show 15 per cent of all drivers in fatal city accidents failed to yield the right-of-way, the most frequent violation.

The Texas Highway Patrol is cooperating in a nationwide "Know and Obey Traffic Laws" program, and Captain Polk Ivy of the Amarillo District listed the following facts to remember about right-of-way at intersections:

1. A car already in the intersection has the right-of-way over cars approaching. You must give way to any car already there as you come up to the intersection.
2. If two cars arrive at an intersection at about the same time, the one on the right has the right-of-way, and the other driver must give way to him.
3. Slow down before you reach the intersection in order to be ready for a car on the cross street. Don't wait to slow down after you reach the corner, it may be too late.
4. Despite the rule, don't insist on your right-of-way at the risk of an accident. Humility is a small price to pay for safety.
5. If there are stop signs at the intersection, or if one vehicle is turning left, special rules are applicable.



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Shrews Sought In Malaria Fight

Rare Jungle Mammal Seen As Aid in Long Fight To Cure Disease.

WASHINGTON.—As another step in its long campaign to effect a cure for malaria, the navy is going hunting in African jungles for a giant jumping shrew.

This rare specimen, which will be used as a laboratory aid in the malaria fight, has a body somewhat resembling a rat's, but it also has a long, elephantine snout and can hop around like a kangaroo.

It's a "giant" only as far as shrews go—about six inches long. The run-of-the-brush shrew is only mouse-length.

The navy wants to investigate a report that the African mammal has malaria naturally. If that is so, the jumping shrew would be one of the very few mammals, other than man, subject to the disease.

Phase of Major Study.
The search will be only one phase of a year-long study of tropical diseases in Africa. The navy's six-man safari, headed by Comdr. J. M. Amberson of the medical corps, constitutes the medical research unit of a broader expedition sponsored by University of California.

Research to find a truly curative drug for malaria has been hampered by the fact that no completely satisfactory laboratory creature has been found. The most commonly used subject is the canary, but the form of malaria which birds get is far different from that in human beings.

The only two mammals—other than man—which the navy knows to be subject to malaria are monkeys and vampire bats. The malaria parasites which cause the disease in these animals are also different from those which affect man. Nevertheless, these animals have been used to some extent because they are mammals.

Monkeys Are Unsatisfactory.
Both monkeys and bats have proved unsatisfactory for final discovery of a cure, says Capt. James J. Sapero of the navy's bureau of medicine and surgery. Also, monkeys are expensive and bat colonies are difficult to maintain.

Sapero said that if it is confirmed that the jumping shrew can acquire malaria naturally, it might be possible to take blood samples from the shrew and pass on the infection to some easily procurable animal, such as the guinea pig, rat or mouse.

Shrews are related to moles and hedgehogs, but these jumpers are not true shrews. They are found on rocky, bushy slopes in most parts of Africa south of the Sahara.

One scientist said he didn't quite know how the name "shrew" popped into the language as a tag for a vexatious woman. He said Shakespeare, in his "Taming of the Shrew," may have had in mind a small European variety of shrew which makes a squeaking noise. Encyclopedia Britannica describes a pigmy shrew found in Europe and Asia which is "pugnacious and very voracious."

Atomic Danger Zone Posted

For Tests on New Weapons

WASHINGTON.—The atomic energy commission has posted a "Danger—Keep Out" notice covering 39,000 square miles of the Pacific ocean surrounding Eniwetok atoll, site of forthcoming "tests of military weapons."

"Hazards will exist" in a rectangular area approximately 173 miles north and south and 226 miles east and west, the commission said.

The danger will continue through-out 1948.

Plane Crosses Ocean With

Dead Motor; Bishop Safe

SYDNEY, AUSTRALIA.—An Australian flying boat, carrying 29 passengers and a crew of 6, landed here safely after flying 380 miles across the storm-tossed Tasman sea with one of its four engines dead. Among the passengers were Episcopal Bishop G. Ashton Oldham of Albany, N. Y., and his wife.

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


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
