Thus it herds-locally estimated at 55,000 character, if not in a heavy bal-

head of cattle, and all of Colorado that they could claim and hold. Thus the "Mother of the British Companies" came to Colorado.

There is a persistent story on the ranges of this region that the Prairie had bought so cheaply that they paid off their original investment during the first two years, and still had plenty of cattle left to stock their country. The balance sheets of the business hardly support this optimistic account, for, upon reappraisal of their position in 1889, the Company found that they had only 22,000 cattle on this, their Arkansas Division, and instead of their boasted 150,000 cattle of a few years before, their total on all their ranges was only 56,000 head.

The multiple hazards of the range had taken a heavy toll. Oldtimers still like to recall that during the winter of 1885, a short-gaited cowpuncher could have walked for twenty-five miles down the river on dead cattle, from the ranch into Las Animas, "without putting a foot on the ground." That experience almost put the JJs out of the cow business.

But there was one saving grace. After the snows were gone, the land, responsive to sun and rain, was still there. And the lasting return of honest struggle with the soil is a goodly profit in human

ance at the bank. So for years the three JJ chuckwagons regularly rolled out from their headquarters on the Picket Wire for the spring work, and swept the country clean for their drifting cattle down through the corner of Kansas and back into New Mexico. At last the heavens 'smiled a little, their returns fell well on the profit side of the ledger, and, with success achieved, they could afford to quit. They sold out the last of their cattle in 1917, and the most fantastic of all the foreign range ventures faded into forgetfulness.

Not so, however, the significant symbolism of the JJ brand! It is still recalled with wonder and awe on the high lands of Colorado, though the capital, care and courage it once entailed and provoked are now channeled into other pursuits. Times have changed. The great cattle ranches that brought color and character to the Southwest are largely gone. Fortunes. were lost and made. Vigorous men toiled out their time and died.

But their real heritage remains a thing of the spirit. It persists today in an expansive and generous attitude toward life, a zestful and courageous point of view, and a high regard for honorable tradition. It hovers over these vanished grasslands as a sort of an aura of gentility-the mark and brand of indestructible character-the genuine heraldry of the open range.
