## Wintry Blasts Favor Local Vicinity

Sherman County has been favored in recent blizzards which swept the south plains, the Oklahoma Panhandle and Colorado. Although the county experienced snow flurries Thanksgiving day and Saturday they hardly compared with the drifting snow fields in nearby sections. Snow drifts at Eva, Oklahoma five feet high were still standing last week.

Moisture content of the snows has been limited to sections where drifts stood.

## Texas TB Death Rate Decreasing

In Texas during 1947 TB killed 2,744 people. This is 44 less than died of TB the previous year. The tuberculosis death rate in Texas for 1947 is 38.6 as compared with a rate of 33.2 for the country as a whole. However, since 1940, the Texas death rate from TB has been decreasing at a much more rapid pace than the rate for the United States. The national TB death rate has decreased 20 percent while that in the state has decreased 31 per cent. This decrease means that some 2,200 people are living today who would have died were it not for tuberculosis control in Texas.

Christmas merchandise with a wide range of choice is making its appearance in Stratford business houses.


Although the Christmas spirit has been slow in developing this year, many business firms report several customers have completed their Christmas shopping and have all their gifts wrapped for the holiday.

DALLAS. — About 58,000,000 acres of Texas land, nearly one-third the state's area, has been leased for oil and gas exploration and production, a report published by the Texas Mid-Continent Oil and Gas Association indicates.

Land has been leased from landowners in each of the 254 counties, the report showed, and there is oil and gas production in 175 counties at the first of 1948. ## Statement On Flare Gas Waste From Oil Wells

Col. Ernest O. Thompson, Chairman of the Texas Railroad Commission, makes the following statement in regard to the highly controversial issue of gas wastage in Texas oil fields.

The economy and continued prosperity and well being of the entire State of Texas is tied in absolutely and inescapably with the production of oil and gas.

Conservation and waste prevention of the God-given irreplaceable natural resources is vital to every man, woman and child of Texas.

Our schools are affected; our churches are vitally interested, and our landowners are dependent upon the Railroad Commission of Texas to see to it that oil and gas are not wasted. The stockholders of companies wasting gas are affected, and the landowners and royalty owners are vitally affected. The State of Texas is losing the taxes on this waste of gas in flares from oil wells.

Today we have 110,000 producing oil wells in our State, producing 2,500,000 barrels of oil each day. Oil sells today at around \$2.50 to \$3.00 per barrel. Even at \$2.50 a barrel this means an income of 6½ million dollars per day to the oil producers of Texas.

We have 1425 oil fields in Texas stretching from the piney woods of East Texas to the shadow of the Davis Mountains, and from the Magic Valley of the Rio Grande to the Llano Estacado in the Panhandle.

Nature has been bounteous in her distribution of oil and gas all over Texas. Therefore conservation of oil and gas is not a local problem; it's statewide in Texas. Every school child is benefitted by conservation and by conservation I mean wise use of nature's blessing, not wasting it away in flares from oil wells.

The sky is lighted in many parts of our State by oil well gas flares burning valuable gas to the air. Every citizen has seen this waste going on. It must be stopped. It can be stopped.

The Railroad Commission has been working for many years to get the operators to cease and desist from this wasteful practice. At one time a billion feet of gas per day was wasted in the Panhandle. All that waste in the Panhandle has been effectively stopped.

Hundreds of oil fields now save every foot of the gas produced with oil. It means added profits to the producers.

Our program is to stop all such waste wherever the quantity is great enough to justify saving the gas.

The oil companies ought to save this gas without being compelled to do it by law. They are wasting their valuable assets when they do not save flare gas and use it either to lift more oil or for some lawful purpose or use.

The Supreme Court in the Seelingson Case it was within the powers of the Railroad Commission and was the Commission's responsibility to stop this waste wherever it was economically feasible and reasonable to do so, and we are requiring that waste of gas be stopped in 16 more fields on December 1, 1948. More show cause orders on other fields will be soon forthcoming.

We tell the operators to either save the gas or cease producing oil there until they are ready to save the gas that comes with the oil. I believe this is reasonable.

Of course, the operators will try to enjoin our orders in the courts, but I feel that in the end we shall prevail in stopping this waste of the heritage of all the people of Texas. We are certainly in earnest about it.

Every oil field in Texas is being restudied. Wherever it is economically feasible the gas flare waste will be ordered stopped. If an oil field's gas waste can be stopped by reducing the allowable, that will be done on request of the operators.

International Uniform Sunday School Lessons

SCRIPTURE: Acts 1:8; 2:1-4; 4:1-4; 8:4-17; 25; 11:1-18; 13:1-3; 14:26-27; 16:1-10; 22:16; 30-31.  
DEVOTIONAL READING: Acts 4:23-31.

**Story of Revolution**  
Lesson for December 5, 1948

THE MOST important history in the world is in one small book. The most important movement, the most revolutionary, the one that is destined to change the world more than any other, is the Christian church. The story of how it began is in the book of Acts. No other book in or out of the New Testament tells the story: The history of the beginnings of the one and only international, interracial, world-wide movement that sets out to aim at nothing less than a complete transformation of mankind, the Revolution from Within, the Christian Church.



**What the Church Is**  
THERE are hundreds of churches today and they do not all agree. But every church, whatever its name or peculiarities, aims to stay on the course marked out by the Christian church when it was one and undivided, the church of the Apostles. We look back to the story in Acts to see what the true church is.

In the very beginning, the church was not the place where the Christians met for worship. It was not the officers, the Apostles themselves were not the church. The church was not a thing at all; it was people.

In Acts these people are seldom called Christians and never called churchmen or church-members. They are given more meaningful names. They are called "disciples," that is, learners, students. They are called "believers." They are called "brothers" for their life was like that of a family. They are called the people of "the Way,"—travelers together to the same destination. The church, in short, is a fellowship, the Family of the Friends of Christ.

**How the Church Began**  
THE infant church was like all human babies; it began small and poor. No bystander would have expected it to live; but it had life in its heart. Two forces set that church on its way. One was the command of Christ.

The people who were in it, or rather the people who were the church, took their orders from Christ. It was because of him that they went out to bear witness to him to the "utmost parts of the earth."

Then the people were filled with the Holy Spirit; they were guided constantly by the Spirit. The book of Acts has often been called the "Acts of the Holy Spirit" rather than of the Apostles.

**Leaders**  
GOD never does for people what they can do for themselves. So guidance of the Spirit was never a substitute for human leadership. A true church is not a mob: It acts, as the New Testament church did, in an orderly fashion.

One of the church's first problems was, that of finding leaders. The history in Acts is largely the history of certain leaders—John, Peter, Paul. But these were not noted. Not even the Apostles tried to run the church like a dictatorship. The people themselves chose the officers who were ordained by the Apostles.

**What the Church Does**  
FIVE things the Apostolic church did, and these mark any true church today. They "continued in the Apostles' teachings;" the beginning of all our church schools and Sunday schools is in that brief phrase. They formed a fellowship; the church then was not a list of names of people who cared little for one another; it was a true family.

They observed the sacraments; they and their households were baptized, and they continued "in the breaking of the bread." Baptism and the Lord's Supper have always been observed in some form in every Christian church. They "continued in prayer;" a church in which only the minister prays is a feeble affair.

Above all, they were "witnesses." That is to say, they told the story of Jesus—his life, his teachings, his death, his resurrection. Jesus lives! Jesus is Lord! So the Apostles preached, from Jerusalem to Rome and far beyond. But their preaching would have been mere shouting in the wind, if Christ had not lived again in thousands of everyday Christians.




