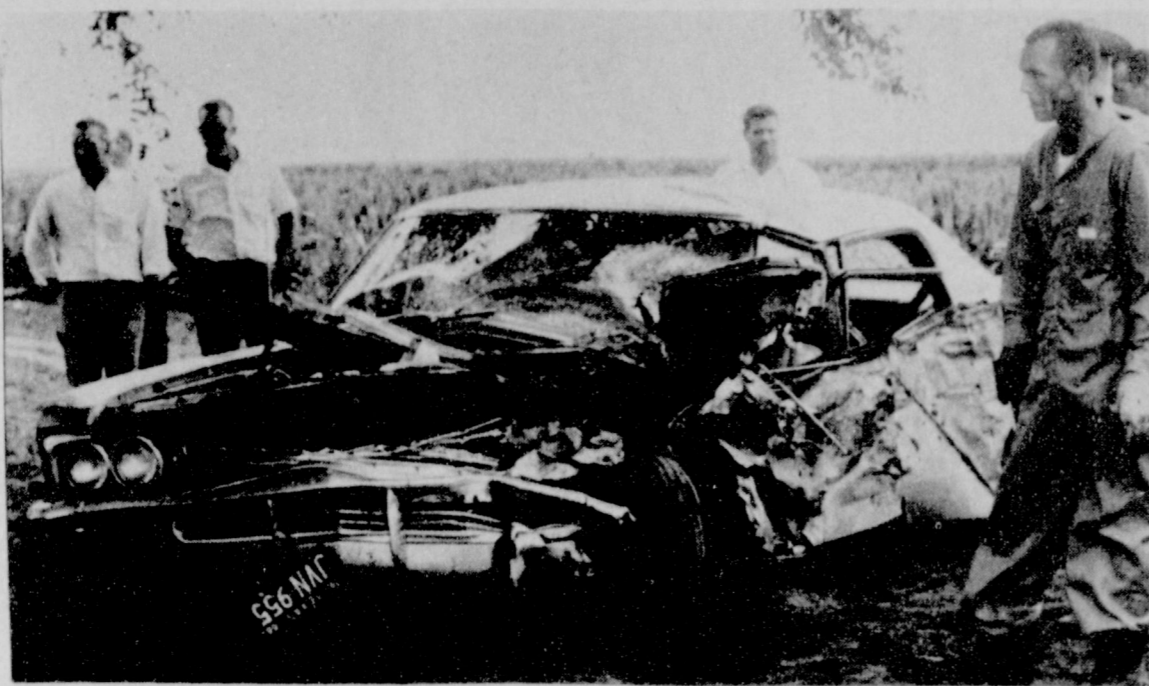


Killer 84 Goes on a Weekend Rampage

Two More Die on Killer 84; Engineer Says Four-Lane Road Programmed for 1967

State Proposal In '58 Rejected

Back in 1958, the state highway department figured the nine-plus strip reaching from Muleshoe to the Parmer county line could be four-laned for a cost of \$170,000 to Bailey county taxpayers. The state made such an offer to the commissioners here, but no action was taken on the matter, says County Judge Glen Williams.

Parmer county commissioners, on the other hand, accepted a similar offer to four-lane Killer 84 from Farwell to the Bailey county line -- a bit farther, in fact.

Today Parmer county has its four-lane road and has had for a couple of years. Today Bailey county still has only a two-lane road, built for the traffic conditions of 1933 when a 20-foot, 10-inch road was adequate for this area.

These factors being considered today as the toll continues to mount on U. S. 84-70 west of here. The past weekend was a typical example; four accidents occurred between here and Progress. The toll: two persons killed, 10 injured.

Two-Year Program

The proposal by the state made in 1958 was a two-year improvement program. "They designated it under the 50-50 right-of-way program," recalls Judge Williams, "for the years 1959-60, and included this road in it, requesting that this county accept the program. Had that been done we would have been much farther along with the road program today.

"At approximately the same time, the state designated the same type program in Parmer county from the county line to Farwell. Parmer county accepted it and went to work acquiring right-of-way. That is the reason they are so far ahead of us now."

Program Favored

He explained the reason for not accepting the program here back in 1958 in this way: The people apparently were not ready for it."

The judge said he strongly recommended it (the program) at that time to the commissioners, adding, "I spoke to the civic clubs about it. I talked with business men about it, and the people in the rural areas. There were some who were for it, but the general feeling seemed to be that the road was needed, but the cost was too high. So if you ask who was at fault, I say, 'we, the people.' No doubt a more positive attitude and action on the part of our leaders would have accomplished something, but such action was lacking. The only way it could have been financed was through a bond issue, and under the law the commissioners' court cannot call a bond issue election of that kind except they be legally and properly petitioned to do so. And no such petition was presented to the court."

Incidentally the commissioners at that time, Judge Williams recalls, were Mr. or Mrs. Tom Morgan, Woodrow Couch, W. H. Eubanks and R. P. McCall.

Ironically, if the \$170,000 cost was considered too high as the county's part in widening the road back in 1958, the final figure will be some \$80,000 more. In fact, three years later when the county DID vote bonds, they were for \$250,000 -- with a \$25,000 lee-way spread for emergencies. The bonds, incidentally, were finally voted April 3, 1961.

Now, however, the county has completed its part of the work. All right-of-way projects have been completed several months ago, Judge Williams claims, and now "it is up to the state to decide just when the road will be constructed."

This question was put by the Journal to Rhea Bradley, Littlefield, district engineer. He said that "the road definitely is on our program for next year, and the contract should be let as soon as possible after the first of the year."

Personnel Problems

Bradley, however, told the Journal that personnel problems are plaguing the highway department. He said that one of his assistant engineers, the man who draws the plans and specifications for such projects as the 84 program, had resigned recently to accept a job with a private concern at a better salary.

Said Bradley: "This is the problem which we are facing, but I hope we can get the work done and the project ready to submit to the state road department and the national road

Patrol Scurries To Many Wrecks

Muleshoe area had one of the worst traffic weekends in its history. The score: Two dead, eleven injured.

Rain, bumpy killer 84 and a detour all contributed to the high toll.

A Houston woman and a Tyler man died from injuries suffered in the crash.

They were Mrs. Mae Murph,

68, Houston, dead on arrival at West Plains Hospital here, and J.L. Cook, 66, Tyler, her brother-in-law, who died about 30 minutes later.

Daniel Segnia, 30, Bovina, driver of the pickup which collided with the car in which the Cooks and Murphs were riding, has been charged with negligent homicide.

Mrs. Cook and H.C. Murph, mates of the victims, were injured, but not seriously, and Segnia received a facial laceration.

Bodies of the two victims were flown to Tyler Sunday evening.

The series of accidents started at 7:30 a.m. Saturday, according to Freddie Jack, highway patrolman, when a pickup truck and an automobile crashed head-on in the barrow ditch alongside U.S. 84 three miles northwest of Muleshoe.

All six persons riding in the two vehicles were hospitalized from injuries, and both vehicles were written off as "total losses." All were taken

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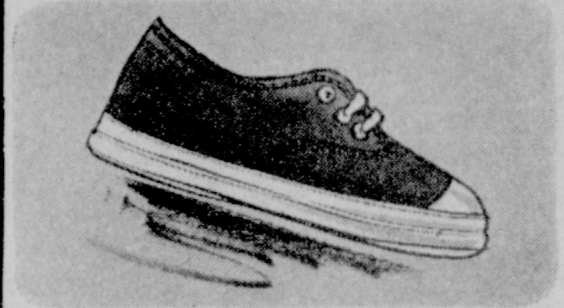

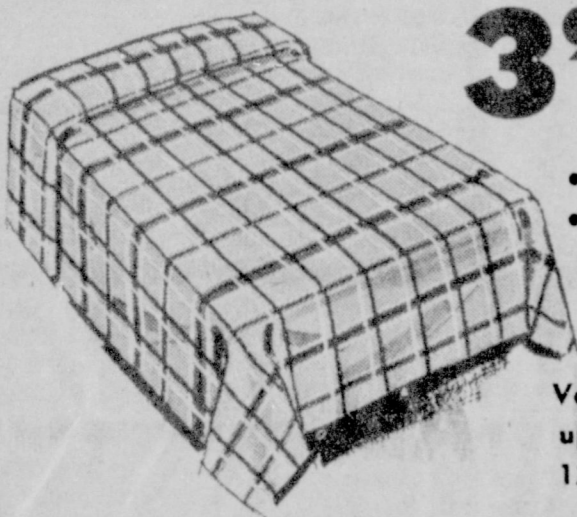

SHEATH CAKE
Bring to a boil the following ingredients:
1 Stick margarine
4 tablespoons cocoa
1 cup water
2 cups sugar
Pour over 2 cups flour, beat well then add:
2 eggs
1/2 cup buttermilk
1 scant teaspoon cinnamon
1 teaspoon vanilla
1 teaspoon soda

Beat until smooth and pour into greased 11 1/2 by 16 pan. Bake 20 minutes at 400 degrees.
ICING
Five minutes before cake is done, combine the following ingredients and bring to boil:
1 stick margarine
4 tablespoons butter or margarine
3 tablespoons milk
Remove from heat and add:
1 pound powdered sugar
1 teaspoon vanilla
1 cup pecans
Pour over cake as soon as removing from oven.

 program soon, so the project can be included in next year's building schedule."
 Meantime, the road continued to exact its toll. An examination would show that the highway is rough -- rutty, in fact -- and that there are places where the shoulders fall away from the paved portion slightly, making it difficult to return a vehicle to the pavement once it has left the paved portion. Another factor in the tedious process of road building was pointed out by a Muleshoe attorney who termed the Texas land-acquisition system as "archaic." He added: "The complicated and slow-poke system which we use to acquire land for right-of-ways was all right back in the early '30 when there was not such a demand for roads anyway, but it has long since become obsolete. We need a speed-up system for acquiring land, and we need a priority program which will put the lion's share of our road-building money where traffic shows it is most definitely needed."
 "Four years to build a road! That's ridiculous!"

TB Symposium For Physicians Set in Lubbock

(Mrs.) Clifford E. Sharp Executive Director

Physicians from 23 West Texas counties are expected to attend the West Texas Tuberculosis Association Symposium on TB Saturday at the KoKo Palace in Lubbock.

Purpose of the Symposium is to clarify for physicians advances in the care of tuberculosis patients and also the new Texas Plan for the eradication of TB throughout the state.

The Symposium will assist those attending to qualify as patient care physicians under provisions of the Texas Plan as outlined in Senate Bill 130 and passed by the Legislature.

The new law provides for financial assistance from the state in caring for TB victims, the State paying qualified private physicians for post-hospital and home-care patients. This is insurance against re-activation of the communicable disease.

Participating in the program will be: Dr. John H. Selby, Lubbock, president of the West Texas Tuberculosis Association; Dr. E. E. Dell Adams, Lubbock, president of the West Texas Thoracic Society; Dr. Albert G. Randall, Austin, director of the Division of TB Services, Texas State Department of Health, who will discuss "The Texas Plan for TB Eradication"; Dr. H. Katharine Hsu, Houston, president of the Texas Thoracic Society and pediatrician-in-charge at Jefferson Davis Hospital as well as associate professor at Baylor College of Medicine, speaking on "Case-Finding by Means of Child-Centered Approach"; Dr. Daniel E. Jenkins, Houston, president of the Texas Tuberculosis Association and chief of the Pulmonary Disease Section, Medical Service of Jefferson Davis Hospital and professor of internal medicine at Baylor Medical School in Houston, speaking on "Mycobacteria, Pathology, and Pulmonary Function in Tuberculosis."

Following a luncheon, the guest speakers will discuss the treatment of tuberculosis in children and adults and the role of the private physician in TB control.

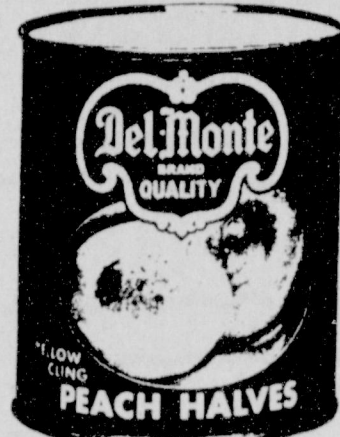

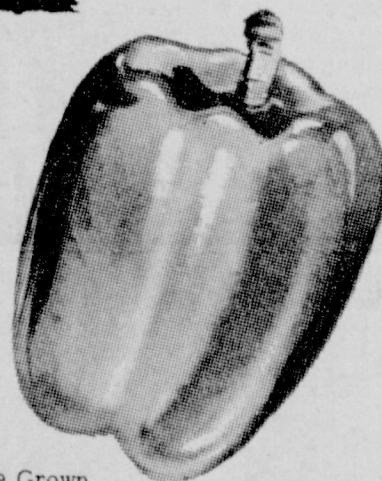

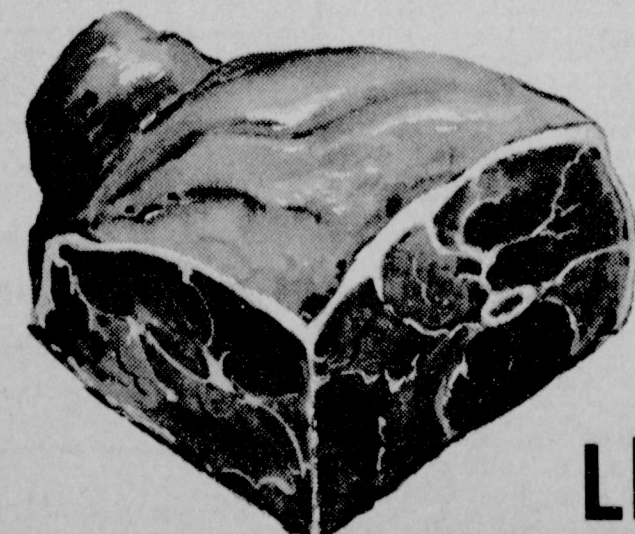
