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Carter linking detente to human rights in Russia

BONN, West Germany (AP) -President Carter said Friday the prison sentence given Soviet dissident Anatoly F. Shcharansky has produced "a sadness the whole world feels" and linked the future of U.S. Soviet detente to Moscow's respect for human rights.

The president, in a series of statements throughout the day in the West German capital, criticized the Soviet Union, saying it was once again violating its pledge to respect human

"Our voice will not be stilled" in defense of people whose rights are being violated, the president said at an impromptu news conference with German Chancellor Helmut Schmidt after Shcharansky's sentence of 13 years at hard labor was announced.

'We are all sobered by this reminder that, so late in the 20th century, a person can be sent to jail simply for asserting his basic human rights," Carter said in a later state-

Then, at a state dinner given in his honor, Carter declared: "Detente must include the ordering of solemn international agreements concerning human rights and a mutual effort to promote a climate in which these rights can flourish

'Genuine detente also includes restraint in the use of military powerand an end to the pursuit of unilateral advantage - as in Africa today," he said.

He said in a statement issued here

by the White House that the message of the Shcharansky trial "is saddest of all for the Soviet people...who yearn like all others for peace and liberty; who have seen their own government pledge two years ago to respect those human rights and desires; and who now have seen that pledge broken once again.

"The struggle for human liberties is long and difficult, but it will be won," Carter said. "There is no power on earth that can long delay its

After Carter declared at the news conference that his criticism of human rights violations would not be silenced, Schmidt, with the president at his side, told reporters: "I wholeheartedly agee with everything President Carter said.

Following a 21/2-hour meeting with Schmidt, Carter traveled by motorcade in a limousine through the downtown section of this German capital to the 150-year-old rococo, pink stucco city hall where President John F. Kennedy spoke on June 26, 1963.

A crowd estimated by local authorities at 10,000, a figure which seemed inflated to some observers, filled the large and colorful cobble-stone Market Square in front of the building. There were shouts of "Mr. Carter" and "Jimmy, Jimmy" when he moved through the crowd shaking

Several persons held a large sign calling for disarmament. Carter received his loudest applause when he declared "our security is your security and yours is

Somewhat surprisingly to some observers, there was only light and scattered applause when Carter said Americans "share your aspirations and commitment for the peaceful reunification of all Germany.

On Saturday, Carter will travel to Berlin 110 miles inside East Germany to visit the Berlin Wall and conduct a so-called town meeting for about 1,000 Berliners. The economic summit Carter is attending begins here on Sunday. He returns to Washington on Monday

Carter spoke to the crowd in English, but he ventured into German when he recited a phrase from "Ode to Joy," by Johann Schiller, the 18th century German poet: "All mankind will be brothers where thy gentle wing abides.

During his tour of downtown Bonn, a city of about 283,000, the president was accompanied by his wife, Rosalynn, and 10-year-old daughter Amy, who each signed the guest book at a city hall ceremony. Amy's blonde head was barely visible above the second-floor balcony railing as she remained at her father's side.

She is scheduled to tour the Berlin Zoo during her father's visit to the

Midland shopping center groundbreaking planned

Midland's long-awaited shopping center came a giant step closer to reality Friday, when developers of the center announced groundbreaking will be held here Sept. 12.

The announcement, by Melvin Simon and Associates of Indianapolis, Ind., should end months of speculation, rumors and worry that the prospective shopping center, located at FM 868 and Midkiff Road, would never come about.

David Samberg, assistant public relations director of Melvin Simon and Associates, said the shopping area of the new mall will encompass 750,000 square feet.

Solons term governor has-been, call his program 'illconceived'

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) - Two Democratic legislators agreed Friday that most of Gov. Dolph Briscoe's proposals to the special session are "ill-conceived" and should never have been submitted.

Sen. Lloyd Doggett of Austin and Rep. John Bryant of Dallas portrayed Briscoe as a governor whose political strength was sapped by his loss to Attorney General John Hill in the Democratic primary

On the other hand, Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby's "stature has substantially increased," said Doggett.

Bryant said Hobby has been "the voice of reason in the midst of a lot of hysteria the last two weeks The legislators, both regarded as

liberals, were interviewed on the weekly radio program, "Texas Week-

Bryant referred to Briscoe's tax relief proposals as "cosmetic . a complete waste of the

taxpayers' money" and said "anything good that comes from this session will be as a result of good luck and not good planning.

Doggett said he was pleased that the House and Senate had approved proposals to eliminate the state sales tax on residential utilities and to raise the inheritance tax exemption from \$25,000 to \$200,000. He said Briscoe's proposal to re-

quire a two-thirds vote of the Legislature to raise taxes, coupled with Speaker Bill Clayton's proposal to prohibit a corporate profits tax. "is to insure that we would keep the very regressive tax system that we have in

Bryant said he thought he could guarantee the two-thirds proposal would not pass the House, adding, "That's an extreme proposal that was made, in my opinion, simply to dramatize Mr. Briscoe's position for his

own aggrandizement. He also said if Briscoe does not submit a tax reform proposal by Rep. Wayne Peveto, D-Orange, to the special session, "there's a substantial possibility" that all other tax relief proposals will be defeated.

Asked if anything might be adopted that would help the middle class or poor, Doggett said most of Briscoe's proposals "are going to help the higher income groups.

He said, "I don't think there's any science" to Briscoe's statement that his propoals would reduce an average family's taxes by apoximately \$550.

"The old Peveto bill . . . is the only real effort that has ever been made to address the problems of property taxpayers," said Bryant.

That bill died in the Senate in 1977. It centralized property appraisals for tax purposes at the county level, creating only 254 appraisal offices in place of about 3,000. It also provided machinery for the state to assure that similar pieces of property were appraised similarly across Texas.

Municipal labor disputes spread; Louisville, Philadelphia hurting

Striking Cleveland policemen ended their walkout, the National Guard was sent into Louisville because of a firemen's strike and Philadelphia was left without the services of nearly 20,000 non-uniformed work

The strike in Cleveland ended moments after a state court judge had held the patrolmen in contempt for refusing a court order to return to work. Later Friday afternoon officers began returning to their regularly assigned duties.

The Louisville and Philadelphia disputes erupted Friday and stemmed from arguments over wages and other contract issues; the Cleveland police strike began Thursday night after Mayor Dennis J. Kucinich fired 13 officers who refused to start one-man, daytime foot patrols in high-crime housing projects.

Those 13 patrolmen were ordered back to the payroll for 14 days, and Judge Daniel O. Corrigan said that during the two-week period, the officers would be considered under suspension, which means no street duty

During the walkout, there were reports of some criminal incidents, including an outbreak of vandalism with broken windows and some looting along a two-mile stretch of a west side business district.

Kucinich, 31, who faces a recall election next month, had asked Gov. James A. Rhodes for state assistance, but the governor's office said the National Guard will not be called out until all other possibilities have been exhausted. Guard observers were sent to the city to keep the governor up to date.

Mayor William Stansbury of Louisville, a city of 400,000, said more than 100 guardwmen were sent to help

protect the city, where nearly all 600 firefighters had walked off their jobs early Friday. The day before, the Kentucky Labor Relations Board found the city guilty of unfair labor practices in its negotiations with the firefighters.

A Guard spokesman, Col. Raymond Wallace, said about 80 guardsmen would be sent to Louisville's 23 fire stations while the rest would remain on standby duty

The firemen have not made their demands public. They now have an annual starting salary of \$11,085 for a 56-hour week. The city's latest offer would give a fifth-year firefighter an increase of \$1,200 a year.

Like the Louisville walkout, the Philadelphia strike involved a contract dispute. Some 19,600 blue-collar, cierical and professional city employees struck Friday while their union negotiators pondered a tenative contract settlement announced late Thursday night.

Judge rules all Abilene ballots must be counted in disputed vote

ABILENE, Texas (AP) - For West Texas imbibers, Friday's court ruling fell like gentle rain on a thirsty sponge, but nobody's breaking out the martini shakers just yet.

District Judge Don Lane ordered Taylor County Commissioners to recanvass "all" the ballots in Abilene's June 17 wet-dry election. Unofficial returns showed the Wets with a narrow 11,591-11,460 victory.

Last Monday, however, the commissioners involved themselves in a voting precinct dispute and tossed out more than 800 votes. The court also declared Abilene still dry to the astonishment of a packed courtroom. This one-time West Texas cattle

town has been dry since 1902. Those who indulge make frequent pilgrimages to nearby Impact and Buffalo Gap where they pay up to \$8.60 for a case of cool ones

Wet forces, calling themselves Update '78, asked for Friday's hearing, claiming the commissioners had no right to throw out any of the returns. Judge Lane agreed.

However, Buck Wood, attorney for Citizens for a Better Community (the Drys), said he will appeal Lane's ruling. Since Wood is allowed 10 days to file his motion, no court-ordered canvass is expected before the end of the month

The controversy has done little to promote harmony in Abilene. Based on the commissioner's refusal to count all returns, book dealer Ben Ezzell lodged a civil rights complaint with the FBI

Ezzell said his rights were violated and he requested indictements against County Judge Roy Skaggs and the commissioners. He said since a majority of the court wants Abilene to stay dry, "We feel that they would enjoy a long, enforced stay in a certifible dry federal prison.

Skaggs conceeded he has been deluged with calls from irate citizens mad about the court's refusal to canvass controversial Voting Box 19. He said the ballots were thrown out be cause the precinct boundries "were in limbo" after annexation proceedings were implemented by the city last year and a precinct line automatical-

Camp ground death toll at 144 as four more die

TARRAGONA, Spain (AP) — The Health Ministry announced four more burn victims died Friday in Spanish hospitals, bringing to 144 the official death toll in the gas explosion at a camping site on the Mediterranean coast Tuesday

It said 72 victims remained in Spanish hospitals, and about half had burns over more than 90 percent of their bodies and were near death. Their nationalities were not given. Most of the victims at the Los Alfaques camp were European tourists. No Americans were known to be involved in the tragedy that occurred when a truck loaded with propylene gas veered off a highway, caught fire and exploded, triggering a series of other explosions in vehicles at the camp crowded with vacationers.

The ministry reported 33 foreign tourists - 10 Belgians, 19 French and 4 Germans - had been evacuated to hospitals in their countries.

Latest bombing could lead to underground Puerto Rican group

NEW YORK (AP) - One hundred nine explosions came without warning, leaving death but few clues. The 110th, an accident, may lead to the terrorists who kill and maim in the name of Puerto Rican independence.

The accidental explosion of a pipe bomb led police to a "super bomb factory" and left a suspected terrorist without his hands — the first person ever seized by police who is connected directly to the terrorist explosions. It may also have led them to another connection between an Episcopal church group and the FALN.

The FALN has called or left notes after each of the bombings over the last four years in government and private offices, stores and restaurants here, and in Washington, Chicago and Newark, N.J. The bombings have killed five persons and in-

The recovery of 66 sticks of dynamite Wednesday in an apartment in the New York City borough of Queens was said by a police spokesman to be the "biggest haul of explosives ever recovered in New York City ... a tremendous amount of explo-

"They also found propane tanks and detonating caps," the spokesman said. "It was an ac-

tual super bomb factory."
Police found other clues that lead them to believe the terrorists have even more dynamite and a new FALN note warns they may use it this month. That does not leave much time to piece together the still little that is known about the small,

secretive group.
It is believed to have cells in Chicago, New York and Wash ington and its suspected leader is Carlos Albert Torres, who is on the FBI's 10 Most Wanted

list. In custody is the man whose hands were lost in the accidental blast. A police source said relatives identified him Friday as William Morales, 28, thought to be a leading FALN member.


Both men were volunteers for the Episcopal Church's Commission on Hispanic Affairs. Five other persons connected to that group have served jail terms for refusing to testify to grand juries about the FALN. Authorities believe the church group is an FALN front.

The FALN's bombings have come in spurts, and there have been only two major breaks in the case, both by accident. The latest was the discovery of the FALN hideout in Queens.

Six devices went off that same night, including three in closed stores. Three other bombs found at the Queens apartment — along with 66 sticks of dynamite,

Santos case, government says

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Justice Department decided Friday against federal prosecution of former Dallas police officer Darrell Cain in the 1973 Russian roulette-style shooting of a 12-year-old Mexican-American

Santos Rodriguez of Dallas was shot once in the head at close range with a .357-caliber Magnum while sitting handcuffed in a patrol car on July 24, 1973. Rodriguez was being questioned concerning an \$8 service station robbery.

Vilma Martinez, president and general counsel of the Mexican-American Legal Defense Fund, said he was "stunned" by the decision.
"The administration claims a com-

mitment to the Hispanic population, but their actions do not show it," Martinez said. "I regret the administrations perception of the worth of a

Mexican-American's life."

Justice Department spokesman Terence Adamson, calling the decision "one of the toughest announcements I've ever had to make," said the recommendation not to prosecute for possible civil rights violations was made by Assistant Attorney General Drew S. Day, head of the civil rights division, "after an exhaustive re-examination" of the case.

"After personal review of the case. the attorney general agreed with this recommendation," he said.

He said Jody Powell, President Carter's press secretary, was advised of the decision Friday afternoon in Bonn, West Germany, where Carter is attending an economic summit. The president had asked Bell to advise him on the status of the case after Carter had met with Hispanic leaders in Houston in June.

Dissident's wife appeals for international support

WASHINGTON (AP) - The teary eyed wife of Anatoly Shcharansky, saying "I cannot wait 13 years to see my husband," called on President Carter and the leaders of eight other nations Friday to apply pressure for his release by the Soviet Union.

Moments earlier, Avital Shcharansky arrived from Paris at Dulles International Airport outside Washington and was informed of her husband's sentence by Israeli Ambassador Simcha Dinitz.

Dinitz told Mrs. Shcharansky, 26, that her husband had been sentenced to 13 years in a Russian prison. She appealed immediately for help.

"Thirteen years in a Russian prison is too much time to expect," said Mrs. Shcharansky, her eyes glistening with tears. "Fifteen days in a Russian prison is enough to kill a person. Fifteen days is too much for my husband because he is not guilty of

Asked what specific actions the American government might take, Mrs. Shcharansky said Carter and the heads of other nations holding an economic summit now in Bonn should apply pressure on the Soviets, not only on behalf of her husband, but other Jewish dissidents in the Soviet Union

Account error shows weapons

unaccounted for

WASHINGTON (AP) - Pentagon auditors are struggling to untangle a monumental bookkeeping foul-up involving up to \$30 billion in foreign arms sales, defense officials said Fri-

The officials, who asked not to be named, said it could take five years or more to straighten out the accounting problem affecting weapons and other equipment now under contract but not yet delivered to foreign customers.

"The services are going to have to account for every bullet, every tank tread, every widget that they've been assigned to procure for other countries." said one official.

The problem, as defense officials see it, is in the way the Army, Navy and Air Force have separately handled their procurement accounts. The services have generally bulked together all orders for their own use and for foreign sale.

Therefore, the officials said, the services have not separated in their books specific numbers of tanks, for example, bought for the U.S. Army from those bought for Israel or other

Until now, there also appears to have been inadequate - if any central supervision of the handling of such accounts, leaving defense officials unaware of the status of arms orders.

Defense officials added that another factor in the problem has been the virtual explosion in the sale of U.S. arms abroad from about \$1.5 billion worldwide in 1971 to an indicated \$13.2 billion this year.

On the other hand, officials said they believe there is no problem in accounting for the financial status of equipment delivered in the past for foreign customers.

They added that there was also no suggestion of any theft or misappropriation of funds, or any black market diversion of equipment in the pipe-

However, from now on, officials said, the armed services will be required to segregate carefully the accounts of foreign sales equipment from records reflecting orders for U.S. military use.

Defense officials estimated the armed services will have to go back over contracting details and other aspects of the possibly 16,000 foreign military sales over the past several years. It normally takes a number of years for military equipment to be delivered after contracts are signed.

In the past, the General Accounting Office and Congress have raised questions about the adequacy of Pentagon record keeping on arms sales.

Hot and fair and no end in sight

The proverbial long hot summer seems to have settled on Midland, and there's no prospect for rain to end the seige, the weatherman says.

Mrs. Shcharansky called on the International Olympic Committee to move the 1980 Olympics from Moscow to some other nation, and said Americans should refuse to cooperate with Russians at any level in protest of her husband's sentence on a treason conviction

She said Americans who buy tickets "to see a Russian ballet are cooperating with the evil forces of the world

And Mrs. Shcharansky added that the sentencing of her husband and Alexander Ginzburg are symbols of Russian determination to suppress attempts by Russian Jews to emigrate to Israel.

"The Holocaust is here for the dissident movement in Russia." she

Mrs. Shcharansky is in the midst of an international publicity campaign on behalf of her husband and other Soviet dissidents. She said she learned of the sentencing of her husband from Dinitz moments after stepping off her flight.

After meeting with Vice President Walter Mondale and congressional leaders on Monday, Mrs. Shcharansky will fly to San Francisco later next week and then take a tour of scientific installations in various U.S. cities. A slight, dark-haired woman, Mrs.

States under the sponsorship of an informal group of American scien-Shcharansky, a 30-year-old computer expert, was accused of spying

Shcharansky is visiting the United

for the American CIA. Carter has publicly denied the allegation. Mrs. Shcharansky, who adopted the Hebrew name Avital when she immigrated to Israel in 1974, was known as

Natalia Shtiglits before marrying Shcharansky the day before she left the Soviet Union

The marriage was questioned in court Thursday, the Soviet news agency Novosti reported. It said the prosecutor introduced documents purportedly indicating the Shcharanskys never married under Soviet law and that even their religious marriage was conducted without a rabbi and was invalid under Jewish law.

a weapons arsenal and various bomb making and timing devices — exploded in a police bunker, responding to timers.

A message received by news media Thursday, but mailed before the bomb factory was found, claimed responsibility for an "armed attack against the property of the North American corporations and the United States Military.'

Police, who said the note appeared authentic, do not know what the targets were to have been but they believe a citywide assault had been planned for Wednesday night.

The Queens hideout was found after the pipe bomb blew up in Morales's face. The apartment was rented by a couple police believe may have been Torres and his wife, Marie Haydee Beltran Torres, who is wanted in an FALN bombing here that claimed one life. The first progress against the

FALN — the initials represent the Spanish words for the Armed Forces of National Liberation for Puerto Rico - came in 1976 in Chicago. An addict stole dynamite from an apartment and sold some to an undercover agent. Police then raided the apartment, which they say was rented by Torres.

Torres has been in hiding since. Until then, he had been considered a quiet, young man, who as a member of the Episcopal group had helped write hymnals and religious texts in Spanish. A church spokesman said that Morales worked for the group in 1975 and 1976, the same

period that Torres did. As late as last year, authorities had said they believed the FALN had but 10 members. William Morales was not then a known member, according to all sources. Yet it appeared he was doing top-level work for the terrorist organization, police sources say.

A source said Morales is the "first absolute, bonafide FALN member" apprehended. He is under guard in a New York City hospital to protect him from an FALN attack to quiet him.

The FALN demands Puerto Rican independence and accuses multinational corporations of hampering it. Although most of its attacks have been against property, a blast at Fraunces Tavern in the Wall Street area in January 1975 claimed four lives and the bombing last summer at the Mobil Oil Building here took another life. That day bomb threats in New York caused evacuation of some 100,000 office workers. Just before the Democratic Convention opened here in July 1976, 10 incendiary devices went off in six nearby department stores.

There is reason to believe the group still has plenty of dynamite. Sticks found in the New York and Chicago apartments came from a 1976 robbery and more than 130 sticks are still missing, police said.

Family pawns, defector says, in try to wreck chess game

BAGUIO CITY, Philippines (AP) -Russian defector Viktor Korchnoi charged Friday that Soviet authorities were using his family in Moscow as pawns to wreck his chances in next week's world chess tournament But Korchnoi declared that anger

at Russia's decision to keep his family as "hostages" has given him extra strength to wrest the world chess crown from Soviet champion Anatoly Karpov

This accusation was made amid political squabbling between the two rival Russians and Korchnoi's renewed charges that KGB secret police accompanying the Soviet delegation might try to sabotage his play.

Korchnoi, who now lives in Switzerland, mailed an open letter to Soviet President Leonid I. Brezhnev two weeks ago requesting his wife and 19-year-old son be permitted to emi grate to the West. He said he had received no reply.

The 47-year-old challenger said in an interview with The Associated Press that Brezhnev and the KGB had apparently decided "the best way to affect my play is to keep my family in the Soviet Union...like hostages.'

Would this harm his game? "It's a double-edged business," said Korchnoi. 'd feel worried that my son will be drafted and if he decides not to to go, that he will be imprisoned. On the other hand, I have supplemental, strength...I get more angry. I cannot forgive them.

Champion Karpov himself had nothing to say about Korchnoi's family. Viktor Baturinsky, vice president of the Soviet Chess Federation and the head of his delegation, said in a separate interview: "The Soviet Union has laws which ought to be followed."

Korchnoi defected during a 1976 chess tournament in the Netherlands

Baturinsky added: "In this match the most important thing is chess play and we would not like to turn this match into some kind of political thing.

Political squabbling seemed to dominate pre-match proceedings in this mountain resort about 130 miles north of Manila. The tourney begins at the new \$3.5 million Convention Center here next Tuesday. Florencio Campomanes, local orga-

nizer of the match, said representatives of the two competing players meet Saturday with World Chess Federation president Max Euwe and other officials in a bid to resolve a number of problems including which flag Korchnoi can display.

The official Soviet delegation challenges Korchnoi's right to play under the Swiss flag, arguing he is not a citizen of that country.

Korchnoi claims his opponent is at an advantage with a big back-up delegation including a masseuse. "They have transformed a personal competition into a team competition," he said. "He (Karpov) is a clever guy and he succeeded to force everybody to serve him. His chess talent is not outstanding, but he collects the whole talent of the country."

Against Koshnoi's charges of planned Soviet sabotage his chief delegate Petra Leeuwerick of the Swiss Chess Federation said last week her group had brought a secret ray detector to measure whether radioactivity or other rays are used to muddle the defector's thinking.

Soviet chief delegate Baturinsky, denying any suggestion of foul play, suggested the organizers use special equipment to check all spectators.

The championship, the first since American Bobby Fischer dethroned Russian Boris Spassky in 1972, has the largest prize ever offered in a world title match - a total of \$550,000 with \$350,000 promised the winner.

Experts estimate there will be 20 to 30 games spre4ad over about two months before a winner emerges.

"I do not believe that Mr. Young can remain any longer as our ambassador to the United Nations without placing our entire foreign policy in jeopardy for years to come,'

Power bid ousts Ford president

DETROIT (AP) — The sudden ouster of Lee Iacocca as Ford Motor Co. president was touched off by an escalating power struggle for control in the board room of the giant automaker.

But the fall of the onetime management star of the world's fourth largest industrial corporation appeared inevitable. given recent re-organiza tions and the fate of past seconds-in-command at Ford Motor.

There also were signs that personal friction had developed between Iacocca, 53, and Henry Ford II, chairman of the No. 2 automaker.

Neither man was available for direct com-

The men apparently were referring to an April 1977 shakeup that established the triumvirate of Ford, Iacocca and Philip Caldwell at the top of the company, with Caldwell vaulting over Iacocca to become second in command.

In June of this year, Caldwell's position was strengthened when he was made deputy chief executive officer. As part of that change, William Clay Ford, a brother of Henry's, was added to the ruling group and put in line to succeed Henry as chairman.

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Caldwell, 58, thus stood to succeed Henry as chief executive officer in 1980 with William Clay Ford to become chairman in 1982. Iacocca was clearly

out of the picture. Iacocca, the marketing genius behind the 1964 introduction of the highly successful Mustang, will stay on the payroll until his 54th birthday on Oct. 15 to give him a bigger pension. But company insiders said he probably wouldn't be around

Already, plans for Iacocca to unveil in person the 1979 Mustang to automobile writers on Monday have been can-

Iacocca's scheduled appearance indicated that the firing was "a blowup. It was not a carefully planned thing," guessed Arvid Jouppi, an auto analyst who is close to key Ford

It also was apparently a surprise to Iacocca, who, in an interview on Wednesday, told the Detroit News, "I'm still here and as far as I know I intend to stay here for the foreseeable future." He said his duties were unchanged since the June shakeup.

Iacocca's departure was officially described as a resignation. But William Clay Ford, brother of Henry, said the board had voted to remove Iacocca "on the recommendation of my broth-

Dallas' oven-like heatwave kills 3, forecasters call for more of same

DALLAS (AP) — The oven-like heat that has baked the Dallas-Fort Worth area for 13 straight days is no longer the subject of simple bickering by perspiring city dwellers.

Now, it's deadly. Two men died Thursday and a man was pronounced dead Friday morning. The Dallas County Medical Examiner's office said initial reports indicate all three deaths were a direct result, or prompted by, heat stroke.

Maria Gomez, 73, was admitted to a local hospital Thursday morning. By mid-afternoon the thermometer registered a blistering 102 degrees. Grover McDaniel, 42, was found

unconcious behind a garbage dumpster about 3 p.m. Thursday. He died

Silverio Lopez, 35, was felled Monday, his first day on the job with a local pipeline company. He was admitted to a hospital and died about 12: 15 p.m. Thursday.

"I understand both of those men had been working outside at the time," said Mike Darst, a field agent with the medical examiner's office. "Mrs. Gomez had been in an un-airconditioned apartment. God only nows how hot it was in there.

'She actually died from a heart condition, but it was brought on by the heat. If she had been in a cooler place, it may not have happened.

LA shrouded in smog blanket; city asked to curtail activities

LOS ANGELES (AP) - Hospitals treated increased numbers of patients with breathing problems, industries were asked to cut back and motorists were urged to drive only when necessary as severely polluted air hung over much of the Los Angeles

James Birakos, deputy executive officer of the South Coast Air Quality Management District, said severe conditions probably would continue into Saturday but should impove by Sunday, mostly because there's less business and industrial activity on the

However, Kaiser Medical Foundation spokesman Jim McBride said the group's medical center in the Fontana area reported "a significant increase in the number of patients complaining about breathing probiems in the last few days."

Exact figures were not available. Air quality officials issued a second-stage smog alert Friday afternoon for the western San Gabriel Valley, Similar alerts were likely in the eastern end of the valley and the Fontana and Upland areas, 50 miles

closed down.

The current situation in Los Angeles, long considered synonymous with smog, is considered severe even by local standards.

The problem stems from an atmospheric inversion — a layer of warm air that keeps cooler air and smog trapped beneath it. The situation is worsened because the Los Angeles basin is ringed with mountains that trap the smog under the warm air

State District Judge Larry Gist reduced the bond for Mrs. Burnett, a mother of three, from \$100,000 after she pleaded innocent to the capital murder charges.

Mrs. Burnett declined to comment on the case but Burnett said publicity about the case had been hard on their three children, ages five, nine and

Student plane crashes into home; a family's dream turns to ashes

EDITOR'S NOTE - After years of running a grocery store, Sam Gulle was preparing to move his family to a farm. Then a small plane practicing takeoffs and landings crashed into the house the Gulles were leaving in three

MELBOURNE, Australia (AP) -Another working day had just ended in Melbourne, and the city was wind-

In the sprawling suburb west of the city's airport for small planes, lights came on in comfortable brick homes as the sun began to drop over the horizon. The chill of the Australian winter evening began to seep in, and heaters were switched on.

It was 6.45 p.m. July 10, 1978. In the Gulle home at 55 Matthews Ave., Pauline Gulle, 30, sat with her family in the living room watching the news on the color television set. With her were her four children -

Michael, 12, Robert, 6, Sharon, 10, and month-old Graham asleep on a cot and her 60-year-old mother, Margaret

The children's father, Sam Gulle,

The family had just sold their house after years of running a successful small grocery in the friendly little neighborhood. They were buying a neat little farm at Meredith, about 50 miles away, and Gulle was there getting things ready for the move in three weeks.

Across the back fence of the Gulle home there was a similar peaceful family scene. Joe Corso, his son and his daughter were sitting around the kitchen table after dinner. Mrs. Corso was washing the dishes.

On the Tullamarine Freeway linking Melbourne's international airport with the city, taxi driver John Tyrell was driving toward the airport with two passengers. At nearby Essendon Airport, Mel-

bourne's main airport for light aircraft, a twin-engine plane taxied down the east-west runway on a training flight. Aboard the red-and-white Italian Partenavia were Alan Clement Bas-

kett, 40, Geoffery Walker, 33, and Uwe Meinhardt, 36. They were prac-ticing takeoffs and landings. At 6:50 p.m., the plane rolled down the runway again, picking up speed as it headed for disaster. It quickly gained altitude, and taxi driver Tyrell

glanced casually at it passing 180 feet above him.

The whine of the motors changed, and the nose of the plane dipped. Tyrell screamed frantically over his two-way radio that there was going to be a crash.

The plane tore through telephone lines and crashed into the roof of the Gulle home, killing all six occupants instantly as burning gasoline poured through the house. The plane kept going through the back yard, ripped through a small bungalow and a garage and slammed into the rear of the Corso house, finally stopping in the

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As fire erupted around them, Corso grabbed his son, daughter and wife and rushed them from the their home. They received minor injuries.

The TV news program continued. Before it ended, the newscaster was telling of the crash and its toll.

Meinhardt and Baskett, trapped in the wreckage of the plane, were cut loose 45 minutes later. Meinhardt survived a critical head injury. Baskett had minor injuries.

Walker was thrown clear of the wreck, also with minor injuries. Sam Gulle arrived 48 minutes after


Stephens said showing the photo essay in a gallery setting wouldn't be the same.

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Insurance Board redistributes rates, vetoes statewide hike

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homeowners insurance rates.

But the State Insurance Board's 3-0 vote Friday against a statewide homeowners increase made other changes that will raise rates on homes insured for \$15,000 to \$42,000.

Highest increase would be 6.7 percent on homes insured for \$27,000 to \$29,000. The board decided to redistribute premium income to fit the actual loss experience of houses in

Owners of houses outside the \$15,-000-\$42,000 range will enjoy rate reductions, including a 5.7 percent cut on homes insured for \$60,000 and 15 percent on \$100,000 residences.

'There is no average rate increase. This simply moves the money where it ought to be. If some were getting insurance too cheap, it was at somebody else's expense," said board chairman Hugh Yantis, who used the meeting to campaign for Senate confirmation.

Tom Lee, spokesman for the insurance companies, said if they had to choose, they would prefer redistribution of premiums over the 14.1 percent homeowners rate increase they had

In addition to deciding against a statewide increase in homeowners and ranch owners insurace rates at current levels.

Overall, insurance companies will gain a 4.2 percent increase in Texas premiums, or \$34 million over the coming year. The companies said they would ask for a rate increase in

The board's public meeting was marked by an acceleration of Yantis' campaign for Senate confirmation of his 1977 appointment.

Yantis said he has received expressions of support from associations of insurance agents and labor union locals around the state.

He said if his hometown senator, Lloyd Doggett of Austin, insists on invoking senatorial courtesy to "bust" his appointment, that would "defeat the wishes of people all over the state."

'If people . . . would write letters to the local media, perhaps the heat will be felt," Yantis told the small gathering of insurance organization representatives, reporters and board staff members.

Later he told reporters, "The only thing that will help me in the Senate would be for enough people who support me to make enough noise to move Doggett off his present position."

"It needs to be known he'll be busting one of the people who has brought good insurance to Texas, one of the best chairmen this board has ever had," Yantis said.

He said publicly he wants the Senate to take up his confirmation during the present special session, not wait until the regular session convenes in

Yantis said if the Senate delays action until January, and Doggett won't budge, he will resign in November or December so Gov. Dolph Briscoe - not his successor - can

A: After years of balancing between the two Communist giants, Vietnam may have seen a number of reasons to move toward the Soviets - traditional fear of China, Soviet willingness to give postwar aid and a Vietnamese perception of the Soviet Union as a safer because more distant ally.

But many analysts note that the Vietnamese leadership, apparently uneasy about the possibility of overdependence on the Soviet Union, has been sending out increasingly conciliatory signals towards non-Communist Southeast Asia and the United States.

Vietnam's Deputy Foreign Minister Phan Hien said this week that his country is searching for U.S. servicemen missing in action despite the absence of U.S. aid and diplomatic relations. A Vietnamese delegation is to'visit the MIA search unit in Hawaii

Italian intelligence head said innocent of covering up coup

ROME (AP) - The former head of the Italian intelligence service, accused of covering up an alleged rightist coup plot, was acquitted Friday after a marathon trial that gave sentences of up to 10 years to others on charges of conspiracy.

After a 55-hour deliberation, a Rome court found Vito Miceli, now a parliamentary deputy for the rightist Italian Social Movement, innocent of accusations that he covered up the alleged 1970 coup attempt by the late Junio Valerio Borghese, the fascist "Black Prince" war hero who died in exile in Spain 1974.

The court said charges against Miceli had no basis. It also dismissed accusations against more than 70 others of armeh insurrection, theft of

CLEVELAND (AP) -Striking Cleveland police officers ended a strike on Friday moments after a state court judge had held the patrolmen in contempt of court for refusing a court order to return to their jobs.

William McNea, president of the Cleveland Police Patrolmen's Association, and William Gallagher, president of the Fraternal Order of Police Lodge No. 8, announced the end of the walkout after Judge Daniel O. Corrigan ordered the city and unions into arbitration over the status of 13 policemen whose firings triggered the strike.

Corrigan ordered that the officers be returned to the payroll for at least two weeks. He said that during the 14-day period, the officers would con-tinue to work under suspension, meaning no

street duty assignments. "The strike is over -

let's go back to work and do the job," McNea told reporters outside court. Gallagher said he expected all officers to return to work immedi-

"If you want to get anything in this world you have to scramble for it and that is what we did today," Gallagher said, without elaborating. Nearly all of the city's

2,000 uniformed offficers refused to work until Mayor Dennis Kucinich reinstated the 13 dismissed officers.

McNea said representatives of both police or-ganizations would immediately check district police stations to make sure officers were returning to work.

Associated Press Writer ATLANTA (AP) - The number of measles cases reported in the United States during the first six months of 1978 was less than half the number reported during the same period a year ago, the national Center for Disease Control said Fri-

In its Morbidity and Mortality Weekly Report, the CDC said preiminary figures for the 27-week period ending July 8 showed that 20,753 cases were reported, six months of 1977.

The decrease was a continuation of the decline in cases reflected during the final 19-week reporting period in 1977, the CDC said.

Dr. Phillip Nieburg, a CDC epidemiologist, said scientists were not sure of exactly why the number of cases declined. But he said three factors could have contributed to the decrease.

'First, measles are always a periodic disease. You have some years where there are a lot of cases and some years where there are less,'

Neiburg said. Secondly, he added, vaccine were distributed last year. And thirdly, Nieburg said, state governments "finally were making sure that school-

Conflict over ordination of women heading toward splinter climax

NEW YORK (AP) - A long-smouldering conflict in the Reformed Church in America over the ordination of women has veered suddenly into some unprecedented initiatives on the home fronts. In some cases, they're ordaining women without specific denominational authorization.

They claim they don't need it. Opponents insist it's required, and are launching a battle to enforce it. The confrontation has headed the drawnout, sometimes hairbreadth issue toward a possibly splintering climax.

"It could mean a split for us," says the Rev. Dr. Arie R. Brouwer, the new chief executive of the denomination, the oldest in America with a continuous ministry and with a tradition from the start of select, highly educated clergy.

"That doesn't mean a big schism," he added in an interview. But if the

Hernandez, who had been paid \$1,-500 a month by the Clements campaign, said, "They kept changing the emphasis of the Mexican-American program to a point where I felt it was going to be a token effort."

Jim Kane, Clements' campaign organization director, said, "Mr. Hernandez' idea of a token campaign and being hamstrung is a result of the fact that he wanted to do a number of things before budgets were worked out and approval given."

Homeowners hurt by depreciation

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) - Not every homeowner knows it, but insurance companies often depreciate household contents before paying for losses after a fire or other disaster.

The State Insurance Board has taken steps, however, to allow a homeowner to avoid taking such a financial beating.

Insurance companies will be allowed to sell "replacement cost" coverage of household contents, charging extra for it, of course.

Jack Jones, head of the board's property insurance division, said it would be about three months before the new policy rider can be printed and a rate table

"It will be optional. Anybody can write it," Jones said.

Kemper and St. Paul insurance companies are writing such coverage in other states. Kemper once filed a rate table with the board,

tying the cost of replacement coverage of household goods to the insured value of the owner's house. It showed the extra coverage on contents would be \$35 if the house itself was a brick residence insured

Kemper also provided samples of normal depre-ciation showing, for instance, that a stereo would depreciate to nothing in 10 years, a television picture tube in four, a refrigerator in 15 years and wooden furniture in 15 years.



WASHINGTON - AI Perry wears a haunted look. He doesn't smile easily. He knows he chucked it out the window - the job he loved and held for nine years: trainer and keeper of the elephants at the National

In the last year Perry has seen an elephant only a few times. He looks after zebras and gazelles these days. He is sorry, bitter, hurt and contrite. He hopes virtually around the clock for another chance with the animals he adores.

But he isn't going to get it, "not as long as I'm here," says Theodore Reed, the zoo director. The reason is that, one day in April 1977, Al Perry did exactly what a professional elephant trainer is not supposed to

Perry wanted Shanthi to eat a meal. As elephants will, Shanthi had other ideas. So, for reasons Perry cannot fully explain even 14 months later, he flew into a rage and broke a glass bottle full of Shanthi's watery rice across the elephant's head.

The only casualty was Perry. He spent two weeks in a hospital recovering from deep gashes in his right hand. When he returned to work, he was assigned to other large mammals and was told he would never again work with

his floppy-eared friends. Shortly afterward, the position of elephant keeper and trainer was formally abolished by

No keeper could have been closer to his animals than Perry was to the National Zoo's three elephants - Shanthi, Ambika and Nancy. In fact, Perry is the first to

admit he grew too close. Were the elephants moody? Perry would sleep beside them in their cages all night, on his own time. Were they getting too little attention? Perry would don a bathing suit and wash with them. Were they sick? Perry would nurse them with a dedication that bordered on the fa-

natic. But when the elephants were balky, Perry admits he sometimes could not handle them or himself. It tended to become a test of wills.

"I have a temper, oh, yes," Perry says. "And occasionally, when they weren't doing what I said, I lost it."

In 1970 he lost it in public and beat one elephant several times with an elephant hook - a long stick with a prong on the end of it. A tourist was taking home movies at the time and later turned the film over to the Washington Humane Society.







Malawi President Banda unique in black Africa

Unlike most authoritarian leaders in Africa, President Hastings Kamuzo Banda of Malawi has remained more popular within his country than among his fellow rulers on the continent. Almost everything he has done for his 5.5 million people since inde-pendence in 1964 has infuriated the Organization of African Unity (OAU) and driven some former friendly neighbors to despair.

Banda, now in his late 70s, opened relations with South Africa in 1967,. refused to break with Israel after the 1973 war as did other black African nations and has provided Taiwan with its only mission on the continent. His is the only OAU state to refuse all dealings with the eastern block while consistently advocating dialogue with the white south.

In a continent whose countries are largely grappling with various forms of socialism, Banda stands out as an unabashed, old-fashioned capitalist. He scorns traditional African wear, preferring the rather sinsiter ensemble of a charcoal-colored three-piece suit, a black Homburg hat and dark glasses. Although he works with extraordinary vigor to eradicate his country from the lists of the world's 25 poorest nations, a predeliction for palaces has brought the erection of a sumptuous State House in the commercial capital of Blantyre with another on the way in the new capital of

It is little wonder that Banda is regarded as part African heretic, part eccentric by his OAU colleagues. Perhaps most galling is the fact that while the Malawian leader has deliberately broken every rule in the political book, he has also managed to steer his small and resource impoverished country into an enviable economic position. Foreign exchange reserves stand at \$95 million, and the Finance Ministry has no trouble raising loans on the European market. Last year a \$25 million Euroloan was granded by bankers anxious to invest

There is no collateral for such loans, of course, because the country possesses no minerals. The economy is built on agricultural production and, to a lesser extent, tourism, which draws visitors to the scenic sporting attractions of Lake Malawi. The steady production and export of tea. tobacco and cotton fuels the economy. This coupled with Banda's insistence on the timely repayment of loans and the implementation of aid programs has made his nation a favorite in Africa or donor countries and the banking community.

Banda's appeal is that he runs his country much like a victorian family estate. Hard work, thrift and obedience are the watchwords. Banda does not seem to mind that all this makes him very much a lost soul in Africa. But there is a price to be paid at home as well. Despite recent liberalization and cautious moves away from continential isolation, the whole thrust of government policies in Malawi has been to improve on the past rather than make political preparations for the future.

As one diplomat said: "In almost every speech, he (Banda) points back and says look what we have done, look at the future because that means succession and the president does not encourage talk of his departure."

Kamuzo Banda left his country on foot to become a migrant mineworker in South Africa where he saved enough money to travel to America and become a doctor in 1937. He spent the war years and after working in England, then returned to Africa in 1958 to be detained, released and swept into power during the country's last real elections before independence

The experience shaped a style of rule that drifts between paternalistic and dictatorial. He works hard to shield his people against the distractions of the outside world which he fears will disrupt national stability or threaten his own position.

Opening lead — ♥ K

When West opens the king of hearts South must show the stuff he is made of. If South ruffs he cannot draw East's trumps; and then South cannot safely cash his long clubs.

The winning technique is to discard

a diamond on the king of hearts. When West continues with a heart, South must discard another low diamond. And when West proceeds with a third Exhibit heart South should pitch a third dia-

DUMMY TAKES OVER Now dummy is ready to take over the defense against the hearts. If West leads a fourth heart, dummy can ruff with the king of spades. South still has his four trumps and can draw trumps without danger.

If West switches to a new suit, South can draw trumps and run the clubs. Either way South is safe.

As it happens, South loses nothing by discarding the three diamonds on the first three tricks. South was going to lose those diamonds sooner or later in any case. He could gain nothing by ruffing, but could lose the game and rubber by wasting a trump from his

With both sides vulnerable, partner opens the bidding with one heart. The next player passes, and you hold: S A Q J 10 H None D A 8 3 2 C A Q J 10 2. What do you say?

ANSWER: Bid three clubs. It is unusual to make an immediate jump response with a void in partner's suit, but your hand is strong enough to suggest a slam nevertheless. If partner cannot support clubs or spades, you are willing to play the hand at

Thus the local media has yet to mention the overthrow and death of the Ethiopian Emperor Haile Selassie or the coup that removed general Yakubu Gowon from Nigeria.

There is no sign that the less than even-handed approach to rural development has hurt presidential popularity or provided the basis for serious resistance within the country. Malawi is the only nation in Africa with an unarmed police force, and the small but disciplined army is rarely visi-

One reason for this is that the disaprity between the rural masses and the elite has yet to achieve critical proportions. Both share a common and poor rural background and thus communication is maintained. The risk will come when the second generation of Malawians emerges from a relative prosperous background and loses touch with small farmers or fieldworkers in the countryside destroying the country's present social

This does not mean that there is no opposition to Banda. During the journalists' travel throughout the territory, even missionary critics of the regime conceded that no politically effective opposition was functioning. Such sources said that for all Banda's autocratic ways he remains popular because the quality of life had steadily improved since independence.

Nyasaland, as Malawi was known in the days of the Central African Federation, was by far the smallest and poorest of the three states in that grouping. Southern Rhodesia and what is now Zambia seemed assured of a mineral-rich future while the orphan of the trio hardly looked capable of surviving on its own.

Banda has been even more determined than Zambia's President Kenneth Kaunda to take his young nation out of the Federation and he has pursued a different course ever since. Pan-African principles have not been allowed to interfere with his vision of progress and when no other support could be found to begin work on the new capital in the mid-1960s he turned to South Africa.

As a doctor, a non-smoker and nondrinker, Banda takes great care with his health and is unlikely to disappear as fast as much of black Africa might wish. Ironically, the real threat to his achievements lies less with his political enemies beyond Malawi's borders and more in the growing social po-larization among his people. If that is the price of progress, it seems one that Banda is prepared to pay.

Women's equality drive helps divorced fathers

NEW YORK (AP) - Divorced fathers are collecting a dividend from the drive for women's equality: They have started to demand and get child

support payments.
Consider Allan S. Carter, a New York City school teacher in his late 30s. His former wife, Carolyn R. Carter, also in her 30s, was a New York City school secretary until she remarried and moved to Texas. The father had custody of their one

child, 7-year-old Kenneth. Then, on July 25 of last year, a landmark ruling in New York State

appeals court gave Carter something else - \$25 a week for child support from his former wife, even though she no longer works. The ruling said, in effect, that her

ability to work obligated her to help with the expense of raising her son. Such a ruling would have been almost unheard of a few years ago. Divorce laws in most states had always placed the financial burden of child-rearing on the father, unless he was physically or otherwise disa-

But today, an increasing number of divorced men with children are being granted child support from their exwives. More and more, the important factor is which parent can best afford to pay for child-rearing, and less and less what sex that parent is.

Practically every state has adopted law changes in the past few years that make the financial support of children in divorce cases the responsiblity of both parents, according to Dr. Doris Jonas Freed, chairman of the American Bar Association family law research committee.

And many feminist groups aren't at all sorry to concede this gain to divorced men. They say it is a fair price for divorced women to pay for the freedom to pursue careers that divorced men have always had.

The trend is difficult to measure, because lawyers are reluctant to talk vorce settlements. Certainly, the great majority of divorce settlements still require men to pay the child

But divorce lawyers and other family court officials around the country assert the trend is there.

"It's a clear movement, of recent origin, linked to the ERA (the proposed Equal Rights Amendment) and the whole process by which the former preference of women as the child's natural custodian has been held constitutionally unsound," says Joseph DuCanto, president of the American Academy of Matrimonial Lawyers, based in Chicago.

"Child support payments have been de-sexed," says Dr. Freed. "It's a phenomenon of the '70s but it's become increasingly true lately. I think this is definitely an outgrowth of so many more women in the work-

"It's no longer a matter of sex, it's a matter of dollars," says Philip F. Solomon, a past president of the matrimonial lawyers academy.

Dr. Freed also says 37 states now make provisions for alimony to be awarded to either the man or the

This seeming role reversal, in which divorced fathers want a larger part in child-raising, and careerminded women are increasingly willing to grant it, so far is most noticeable in urbanized states such as California, Illinois and New York.

The federal government estimates there have been slightly more than one million divorces each year since 1975, and the number of children involved has been more than 1.1 million each year. Those figures are roughly double the levels of a decade earlier. No one knows how many of those

cases involved wives paying child support to the husband. But in New York, for instance, following the Carter decision, there have been hundreds of cases in which men

have won such claims from their di-

A psychologist for the Chicago conciliation service described in general terms a recent case in which the wife, a corporate attorney, had an income about three times that of the husband.

The man was granted custody of the couple's two young children and is getting child support payments from his former wife

"It worked out very well because daddy played what is characteristically described as mommy in the household," the Chicago psychologist says. "We're frequently seeing the whole business in divorced women of 'now I'm getting to do my thing,' and she is quite willing to give up the children.'

The impetus for change in many states came when judges ruled old statutes unconstitutional, and not so much because advocates had lobbled in state legislatures. But feminist groups seeking the same career and family choices as divorced men did not oppose the changes. And a grow ing array of "men's lib" organizations, claiming divorce laws put an unfair financial strain on men, supported the revisions.

Such groups include Fathers United for Equal Rights, Male Equality Now Inc., Men's Liberation, America's Society of Divorced Men, and the Committee for Fair Divorce & Alimony

"Men have begun to realize they can get custody of their children. think the fact that the men's group have been vocal has brought this along," she says.

And Susanne Duval of the Depart ment of Health Education and Welfare's Office of Child Support Enforcement says, "Judges are awardng custody more and more to men. What follows is that women should have to help support the children. My own view as a feminist is that this is

WASHINGTON (AP) - A congresseman wants to have all workers and their families who have been exposed to cancer-causing asbestos dust to be eligible for medical examinations at the expense of the government.

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

British Open produces sidelights

ST. ANDREWS, Scotland (AP) -Japan's Isao Aoki and Texan Ben Crenshaw have played together in the first three rounds of the British Open golf championship, and have had no trouble with communication.

'When we hit a good shot we say 'okay,' and when we hit a bad shot we say 'Don't mind,'" Aoki said after he and Crenshaw finished at 212, only one shot out of the lead going into today's final round.

"I don't know any Japanese except 'ohayo gosaimasu,' which I think means 'good morning," Crenshaw said. "We have known each other for four years, since my first visit to Tokyo, and we have become very good friends.

"Isao speaks fairly good English but only short phrases. He has a very good sense of humor. While we're

walking down the fairway, he will notice some bunkers like the 'Seven Sisters' and say, 'Not today, bun-

"I think he's great." Aoki, who led the first round of the tournament over St. Andrews Old Course here and has hung on, gave Crenshaw credit for keeping him re-

"Benshaw is a friendly partner," Aoki said through an interprepter, mixing Crenshaw's two names.

The notorious 17th hole, the "Road Hole" which has been dubbed the "Ogre of the Open," took another heavy toll Friday, Arnold Palmer getting a second 7 and Spain's Severiano Ballesteros skying to a 6. But neither experienced the agony of Japan's Tsneyuki Nakajima.

Nakajima reached the green in two shots and wound up with a 9. He putted into a bunker, finally got back on the green in seven and 2-putted.

Finally, an achilles heel has been found for the great Jack Nicklaus. There is really something that can crack his powerful concentration.

"It's helicopters," Nicklaus acknowledged after 3-putting the eighth hole Friday. "I can stand airplanes. I can tolerate moving crowds and flashing cameras. But things hanging over my head like helicopters - they drive me mad. Nine landed while I was playing the loop on Thursday."

Helicopters are used to bring fans from outlying areas. "I don't mind the helicopters so much," said coleader Tom Watson. "It's those bantam jets that bother me."

Watson, who has won this championship twice in the past three years and is threatening to make it No. 5, admits there is a certain fascination about links courses, particularly St.

"It's a different game than we play in America," he said. "it's a game of

maneuverability. You have to make a lot of pitch and run shots. There is luck to the bounce of the ball. But I enjoy it."

Nicklaus would be one of the last to criticize the august Royal and Ancient Club, but he accuses the tournament committee of hiding the pins.

"They don't give us a golf course to play with," he says. "They hide the pins so you can't get to them. Everybody is putting from 25 feet. But the things they vsay about the old course that it's ancient and outdated - well, look over the records. It always produces decent winners and good golfers finish second."

Watson, who beat Nicklaus in a great head-to-head birdie battle at Turnberry a year ago, said a golf tournament is like a horse race. "You can't afford to let anybody are." out in front," he says. "If somebody does, then you have to adjust and be more aggressive - gamble to catch

Peter Oosterhuis, Tom Watson grab British Open lead

ST. ANDREWS, Scotland (AP) -The old course at St. Andrews has been a tough one for golfers for more than 400 years. But the pin placings for the British Open have made it a

Tom Watson, the defending cham-pion, went into the last round today tied for the lead with Britain's Peter Oosterhuis, with eight other players within two strokes. It's the tightest bunch of contenders challenging for the old title in years.

"It's the flag placings that have made it so tight," said Jack Nicklaus, one stroke off the pace. "It's just the way the golf course has been set up.
"The championship committee has

not given us any golf course to play with. Everyone is putting from 25 to

SOME OF the greens are huge, with a hole at either end, one belonging to the outward nine, and the other for the trip home. The greens are dotted with hillocks and fringed with bunkers, and often the holes are placed so that approach shots are impossible from some angles.

"The pin placings are traditional," said Nicklaus, who won the second of his two British Open titles at St. Andrews in 1970. "You have no chance to get up close with approach shots."
Watson, who has been creeping up

through the field after a slow start, posted a 2-under-par 70 Friday for 211, 5 under par over the ancient 6,933-yard, par-36-36-72 links beside Oosterhuis and Nicklaus both shot

69. Nicklaus had a three-round total of 212 along with Isao Aoki of Japan, Ben Crenshaw of the United States and Simon Owen of New Zealand.

Four players were on 213 - Americans John Schroeder, Tom Weiskopf and Tom Kite, and Britain's Nick

OF THE 10 leading golfers, only five — Oesterhuis, Owen, Crenshaw, Faldo and Kite — made par-4 at the notorious 17th, the "Road Hole."

Most players took three to get on to

the dreaded green. Nicklaus got on the front of the big, undulating green

An unlucky Japanese, Tsuneyuki Nakajima, reached the green in two but then putted into a bunker, had terrible adventures trying to get out, and eventually holed in nine. That is the kind of hole it is.

"The greens have been getting pro-gressively faster," said Watson "They are not going to vary the pin positions much for the last round, if I guess correctly. If anything they

could be even more difficult. For the second straight day, Arnold Palmer drove out of bounds from the

17th tee and took a triple-bogey 7. Palmer, 48, had a chance to become the oldest player ever to win this legendary tournament, which started in 1860. But the old campaigner fin-

"The longer we play the tourna-ment, the more 6s and 7s we shall have on the 17th," Watson said. "It ought to be a par-5 really, not a 4."

ished with a 76 and a total of 217.

THE GOLFERS are playing for a first prize of \$27,300. The crowds so far have totaled 98,252 - easily an all-

time record for the event. Watson had to pull himself together after four shaky holes to fight his way to a wind-blown, 2-under-par 70 and tie Oosterhuis for the top spot at 211. Close as it is, however - a distinct departure from last year's two-man

battle between Nicklaus and Watson — the Old Course thinned out the field a little bit. At one time or another, eight different men led or shared the lead. They included Crenshaw, Oosterhuis, Aoki, Kite, Weiskopf, Nicklaus, Australian Bob Shearer and Severiano Ballesteros of Spain.

But that was before they got to the dreaded and dreadful 17th. "the Road Hole," that has proved to be the testing and turning point throughout the tournament. And it was again.

Watson bogeyed it to lose sole con-trol of the lead.

Nicklaus bogeyed it and lost a share

Arnold Palmer, the 48-year-old liv-ing legend whose problems on 17th cost him the 1960 British Open, hit another one out of bounds there and, from a position among the leaders, took a second consecutive triple-bogey 7. He finished wth a 75-217.

BALLESTEROS, the dashing Spaniard who was tied with Aoki and Crenshaw for the 36-hole lead, hit his second shot in the Swilken Burn, a little creek in front of the first hole, had varied adventures and then, on the 17th, got his third shot on the paved road that gives the hole its name. He took another double bogey 6 and finished at 76-215.

But their troubles were nothing compared with those encountered by Tsuneyuki Nakajima of Japan, also well among the leaders when he went to the 17th. There, he hit two good shots to the green but walked off with a horrendous 9

of the sand but failed to make the top of the ridge and trickled back to rest at his feet, still in the bunker. So did his next shot. His next-his seventh -made it. and he 2-putted from there for "9." He finished 76-217.

HUBERT GREEN, who opened the tournament with a horrible 78, made up some lost ground with a 67 that matched the best of the tournament. He was tied at 215 with, among others, Americans Ray Floyd and Bob Byman. Floyd shot 71, Byman 74.

"Ol' Sarge" Orville Moody had 74-216 but the rest of the American contingent was spread out well behind the leaders; again, a sharp departure from last year when tour-toughened American pros claimed 10 of the first

Lee Trevino, 73, and Mark Hayes, 75, were at 220. The group at 222 — the qualifying score for the last round included Hale Irwin, 76; Rocky Thompson, 76; Jerry Pate, 74, and Andy Bean, a winner in three of his last five starts who blew to a 79. George Burns shot 80-224.

SOUTH AFRICAN Gary Player, the masters champion and a threetime British Open winner, was 76-

Oosterhuis, who makes up for occa-sional erratic behavior off the tee with a putting touch that is surprisingly deft and delicate for a big man, got maximum mileage from his short

On four occasions he 2-putted for par from more than 50 feet. One of those occasions was on the 17th, where he made a signifficant par, a rarity over the last three days.

He also holed birdle putts of 30 and 20 feet on the fourth and fifth holes, scored on a five-footer following an eight-iron shot on the 11th and didn't make a bogey.

Watson was slightly more uneven. Usually a deadly putter, he missed a birdie attempt from six feet on the first hole. He bogeyed the second when his approach came up short. He had to get down in 2 from six feet on the third. He drove into the right rough on the fourth, reached in 2, had a poor first putt and had to hole from 10 feet for par 10°feet for par.

BUT HE reached the par 5 fifth in 2 and 2-putted for a birdle from 50

"That kind of turned me around," said Watson, winner of two of the last three British Opens. "I finally got myself organized, got down to busi-

He birdied the eighth with a putt of 50 feet and holed 20-footers on the 12th and 13th.

That gave him the lead alone. It stood until he reached the 17th. He almost played it well. He was in front of the road bunker in 2 but tried to play a shot that was a little too delicate, an open-faced wedge flip over the lip of the bunker.

He shanked it. But, due to the unusual shape of the green, and its contours, he ended up on the putting surface — a long, long way from the hole. He got it down in 2 for the bogey that cost him outright possession of the title he won from Nicklaus last year and in a playoff with Australian Jack Newton in 1975.

NICKLAUS, of course, is very, very much in the chase for his 15th major professional title. Playing well in front of Watson, before the defending champion had reached 6-under-par figures, Nicklaus was tied for the lead until he, too, reached the 17th,

His second shot, a two-iron, hit in the face of a bank on the green. "If it goes three feet further it runs up on the green," said Nicklaus. "If it's three feet shorter, it'll take the con-tour of the slope and run up. Either way, I'm going to be somewhere around the hole. But it hit the face of the slope and came back down. It was an unlucky break. He 3-putted from there.

He also 3-putted the eighth for a bogey. But he also had five birdles a wedge to 21/2 feet on the second, an 18-foot putt on the fourth, another of about the same distance on the ninth, a wedge to six feet on the 14th and a three-iron to 12 feet on the 15th.

"Obviously, I'm delighted," he said. "I've been striking the ball very well for three days. This put me in position where I can win the golf

And he had a theory about why the field was so bunched.

"Because the committee (which sets up the course) hasn't given you any of the golf course to play with. There's only one hole, the ninth, where they can't tuck the pins. They've got everybody putting from 35 feet all the time."



Auerbach spurns offer by Knicks

BOSTON (AP) - Red Auerbach spurned an offer to run the New York Knicks and said Friday he will stay with the Boston Celtics, seeking to rebuild the former National Basketball Association powerhouse under its new owners.

Only three days ago, the Celtics' president and general manager was ready to jump ship, furious at new owner John Y. Brown for swinging a major player trade without giving the legendary NBA wheeler-dealer advance notice.

"After being mad, I though it over and I have more respect for Brown," said the 61-year-old Auerbach at a news conference.

BROWN SAID in a telephone interview from Fort Lauderdale, Fla., that he and Auerbach so far have "an oral understanding," not a formal written contract.

"I look to Red to run things," Brown said. "It just took some time to get to know each other."

Brown, and his partner Harry Mangurian, took over the once-powerful Celtics a week ago in a franchise swap with Iry Levin. Levin took Brown's Buffalo NBA franchise and moved it to San Diego after trading a batch of players - including several Celtics dear to Auerbach.

But the Boston general manager, whose team has won 13 NBA titles. said Friday he and Brown "agreed to agree. It's a question of where I want to be. Money was secondary." Auerbach said he will sign a mul-

a couple of practice balls before game It is the common complaint of Man-In a Tokyo hotel cocktail lounge southpaw Clyde Wright of the Yomiuri Giants let out a roar when a smiling waiter asked about his physical condition. He cursed the waiter and replied with an obscene gesture.

"Conditioning - that's all they think about, the fans, the press, everybody," Wright complained to a reporter. He pulled up his shirt to show how his trousers sagged loosely away from his flat stomach.

Spring training is four times as tough as in the States," he said. "They go to the park at 10 and finish at 4: 30 and then run 3 1-2 miles back to the hotel. And everybody does it.'

What keeps the Americans coming to Japan is money. Most are a little over the hill for the American major strenuous training, language problem and strange cities to avoid either the painful descent through the American minor leagues or a low-paying nonbaseball job.

Wright, 35, gets \$86,000 a year plus some hidden extras from the Yomiuri Giants, about \$20,000 more in cash than he last earned from his American team, the California Angels..

Manuel, was mainly a utility outfielder with the Los Angeles Dodgers and Minnesota Twins before the Yakult Swallows lured him away from a minor league team. He makes 'six to seven times" as much as he was earning in the States, and the Swallows pay his rent for a two-

bedroom apartment But both are on one-year contracts and could be dropped at the end of the season - and may well be if things don't improve. Wright started the season with a sore shoulder while Manuel, who set a gaijin record of 42 home runs last year, was in and out of

the lineup because of a slow start. Their up-and-down performances are typical of many American players here. The strange parks, the impenetrable language and the peculiarities of Japanese-style baseball seem to have an unsettling effect on the foreigners, who generally produce erratic records.

Adrian Garrett, outfielder for the Hiroshima Carp, is having an upbeat season. Last year, his first in Japan, he hit .279. This year he hit 15 home runs in the first month, tying a record held by the Yomiuri Giants' famous Sadaharu Oh and two other Japanese players.

"Last year I was just confused," he said recently.

Garrett made the change that many American hitters find they must make to compete in Japan. They learn to modify their stances, shorten their swings, and punch at the ball, abandoning the free-swinging, powerhitting styles they learned in the States. Japanese pitchers lack speed but have excellent control and are exceptionally clever at working the corners with breaking pitches. So far it has been a good year for

American sluggers who are hired to hit the long ball.

Dave Hilton, who played five years with the San Diego Padres, was an early-season batting leader in his first year with the Yakult Swallows. Americans doing well in the Pacific League were Bob Mitchell, formerly of the New York Yankees and Milwaukee Brewers and now playing outfield for the Nippon Ham Fighters, and Bernie Williams, an outfielder with the Hankyu Braves and former player with the San Francisco Giants and the Padres. American hitters also think that

Japanese pitchers throw at them intentionally to knock them down or push them back from the plate.

prejudice. "There are only a couple of pitchers who'll knock a Japanese guy down but they're always throwing at the gaijin, Wright said. "Hell, they figure every one of us is over here taking some (Japanese) guy's job. (Two years ago) they hit Davey Johnson (ex-Yomiuri Giant) six times, every time after Sadaharu Oh had hit a home run, and they never hit Oh. So I parted one off their guy's cap, and it never happened again,

In general, however, the gaijin players aren't the source of controversy they once were. Since arriving in large numbers in the 1950s, they often have been accused of arrogance, bad after-hours habits and foul play on the field. They allegedly loafed in practice and tried to outboss their managers. Fans once complained their sport was being subjected to an American invasion.

Now each team is limited to two foreign players, and the old scare of American dominance has subsided.

These days only Wright has a serious reputation as troublemaker. He is outspoken and by his own definition a little lazy by Japanese standards. Among the gentle, soft-spoken Japanese, he is still a gregarious and feisty country boy from middle Tennessee. In his first year with the Yomiuri Giants, he suddenly ripped off his uniform in the dugout because of a dispute over his team-financed apartment.

"The place had 15,000 cockroaches, and I used to sit up at night watching them march around like soldiers,' Wright recalled. "I kept telling the manager I had to have a different one, but nothing happened. Then one day I tore off my shirt in the dugout and dumped my pants in their bathtub, and then they took care of my

"So I got a reputation for being a little crazy, but you know, you can pet a snake only so long."

Women's sports becoming intense

With the increasing success of women's college sports, competition for top athletes has become intense. And, perhaps inevitably, where there is money and motive, there is illegal recruiting.

The Association for Intercollegiate Athletics for Women (AIAW), the governing body, does not discuss infractions or release the names of schools on probation - preferring to handle disciplinary matters in-house. ("When parents spank a child, they don't go tell the neighbors," a spokes-

HOWEVER, THE AIAW reports that 20 of its 825 member schools have been put on some form of probation. and its regional or state organizations have taken action against 25 others. (The men's NCAA says 16 of its 725 member schools are on full proba-

The majority of AIAW violations involved recruiting, illegal financial aid or eligibility, the spokesman said, with punishment ranging from banning just one athlete to interdicting post-season play for a school in any

The AIAW has much stricter recruiting rules than the NCAA. And it relies almost completely on self-policing, rather than an investigative force such as the NCAA's.

The rules were designed to protect women's athletics from the problems seen in men's athletics and to be consistent, with a philosophy that athletes should, as much as possible, be treated the same as other students. Self-policing is workable, according to the AIAW, because the member schools favor that philosophy.

AMONG THE schools on probation, said Joan Hult, an AIAW official, some athletic directors reported their coaches, some admitted guilt when confronted by reports of violations, and some were proven guilty by the local or national organization. Punishments are lighter for those who admit wrongdoing. "We seem to be governing ourselves to our satisfaction," said Hult. "It is working." Is that realistic?

Well, said one coach, if you believe the stories that are going around, it is

Apart from the schools on pobation, many others are playing dirty, ac-cording to some of those involved in women's sports. This year, in particular, rumors of violations - from free meals to free apartments - have been popping up. If some of them are true, some self-policers are not doing

SOME institutions, however, have the reputation of being squeaky clean. Several big schools, in particular, appear to be going to great lengths to avoid anything that might even have the appearance of impropriety.

Finally, even if the motive is there, many would-be violators may, quite simply, lack the weapons. Said Judith Holland, women's athletic director at UCLA: "It takes money to cheat and there isn't that much money in women's athletics. If you're going to offer an athlete a car, as I understand it, you have to come up with that car. I don't see that kind of money floating around."

Full-ride scholarships in women's sports aren't new, but more schools are offering more scholarships to more athletes in more sports. This year, according to Hult, the number of letters-of-intent received from college-bound athletes is double what it was at this time last year. She estimated that roughly 3,000 scholarships have been offered and accepted. The largest number went to basketball players, with tennis, volleyball and

track following in that order.

TO AVOID recruiting scandals that have plagued men's sports, the AIAW keeps more restrictive rules. They allow a coach to write letters or to make phone calls to a prospect - and that's all. "Our basic philosophy is to treat an athlete as much like every other student as possible," said Hult.

Prospects must pay for their own campus visit. A coach cannot visit a prospect's home. Any conversation between a coach and an athlete at an athletic event must be initiated by the athlete. Next year, that rule will be changed so that all competition-site conversation is taboo, no matter who

The competition-site rule has been

one of the most discussed and; probably, one of the most abused of the regulations. Basically the AIAW wants to shield athletes from recruiting pressures in their senior year of high school. Most important, the organization decided, was that an athlete be protected at a competition site, where her mind should be on playing. "We don't like the pressure of the other model we've seen," said Hult, declining to mention the NCAA by name.

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NEXT YEAR, institutions will be allowed to reimburse coaches for scouting talent, but no conversation will be allowed. Said one basketball coach: "Next year I'll have to say: Sorry, rules do not permit me to talk to you. Could you please call or write?' My feeling is that this may turn athletes away from our pro-gram. And it's very difficult to say 'no' to someone who wants to talk to vou.'

Said a gymnastics coach: "It's hard not to break rules and still be

Almost every coach interviewed said he or she had seen the conversation rule broken. Many reported hearing rumors about coaches visiting athletes' homes, high school athletes practicing with college teams or coaches buying meals for athletes. Most of the reports center on individual sports — track, tennis, gymnastics and swimming.

There are rumors of larger abuses such as gifts of cars or apartments but no one interviewed had any evidence of them. Most thought such rumors unrealistic because no one seems to have that kind of money.

UNDER AIAW rules, any school official aware of an abuse has the responsibility of reporting it. The first choice is for the institutions involved to settle the matter between them-

Said USC women's athletic director Barbara Hedges: "I have heard from my coaches that there are recruiting violations. If I hear something about a school, the first thing I do is call the school, as a courtesy. But, if we know something is going wrong, we have an obligation and a responsibility as a member of the AIAW to do something

Any report to the AIAW must be in writing. The organization checks out reports through letters.

"Not much is being reported," said one coach. "The ultimate report has to come from the student-athlete, which puts her in a difficult position. It's one thing for me to say I saw something going on. If the studentathlete denies it, what can I do?

"I've asked athletes if they would mind filing a complaint and they felt uncomfortable. They're afraid of repercussions.

HULT DENIED that the AIAW policy puts too much responsibility on athletes. "It depends on whether honesty is a burden," she said. "We are not running around forcing studentathletes to make statements. We ask first that the institutions deal with it among themselves. That is happening. Institutions are doing things in a responsible manner.

We have looked at ourselves and asked: 'Are we controlling athletics in an academic setting?' Then we look at the only other model. It is more obvious that it is not working for them than that it is working for us. I know we definitely believe in the volunteer process.'

Some of those interviewed said the enforcement process should be tightened. Others said it is working as well as any other system would.

Said Holland: "When my coaches come in with a problem, I tell them we have enough problems running our own program. People do things - I know that. My opinion is that they are going to get caught, sooner or later. It's most often later, I know, but I leave it to the laws of chance to get those people."






