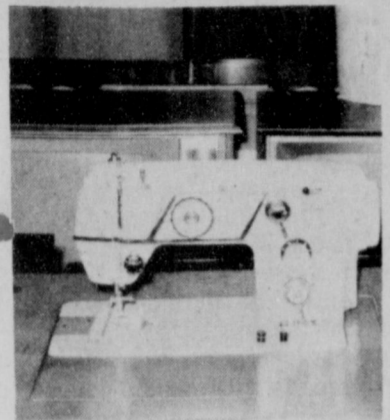

### Upland Cotton 1967 Program

Features of the 1967 upland cotton program were announced today by the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Included in today's announcement were details of the price-support payment rate, the diversion payment rate, the level of the price support loans, the requirements for the additional price support payment, the rules covering skip-row planting, the dates of the period during which farmers may sign up to take part in the diversion feature of the program, the final date on which farmers may request export market acreage, special provisions covering small farms, and the closing date for producers filing application for the sale or lease of cotton allotments.

### Formal Opening for New Livestock Auction Set

Formal opening will be held Saturday for an all-new Muleshoe Livestock Auction Barn, located directly in front of the old building, 1 mile southeast on the Lubbock Highway. The business is owned and operated by Clayton Myers.

The main building of the modern steel and concrete structure is 60 by 60 and has a seating capacity of approximately 300 featuring central air and heating, and individual chairs with padded seat and backs.

This building is joined by a 40 by 60 hog barn which allows hogs to be sold in a better method, putting them through the ring as they do the cattle and horses. The "catch" pens are all new and constructed of steel fencing.

A modern snack bar has been opened in the main building and is being operated by the Myer's daughter, Patsy. Sandwiches, hamburgers, hot dogs and other food items along with soft drinks will be served. Myers and his family have lived here since 1954 and has been in the auction business for the past 14 years and in the cattle and livestock business for more than 20 years. The public is invited to view this new facility and register for prizes to be given during the afternoon. Free coffee and donuts will be served. The Saturday auction will begin at noon. 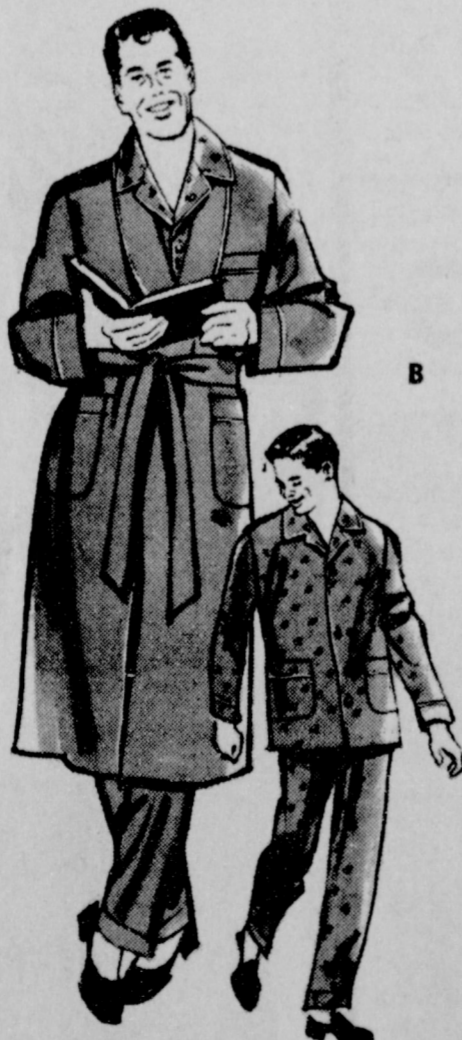

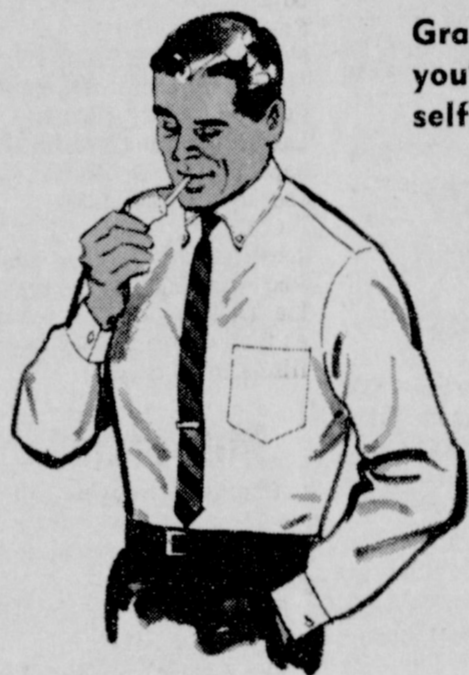

## Tips

FROM THE OFFICE OF

Research shows that the roots of trees and shrubs can grow whenever the temperature is about 45 degrees and upward. Since transplanting is always damaging to the root system, this gives plants the winter season for roots to re-grow and get ready for spring. If this repairing of roots has to take place at the same time leaves are growing, then the plant has more trouble surviving.

Another reason for fall planting is that there are several months for the soil to become firmly settled. Nurserymen know the soil must be firm around the roots and they can still do this even in the spring. Still, it is easier in the fall with nature doing the firming with rainfall and time. It is also best for the amateur gardener.

Severe pruning of the top growth is essential if plants are to survive. This is especially true of late spring plantings. At least 1/3 to 1/2 of the top growth should be removed to compensate for loss of roots.

In our high plains area, newly transplanted plants should always be protected from winds until they are established.

Following is her recipe for "Beef Hot Dish."

- 1 - 1/2 pounds ground round steak
- 1 medium onion
- 1 medium bottle stuffed olives
- 2 cans mushroom soup
- 1 can chowmein noodles
- salt and pepper
- 1 cup milk

- 1-8 ounce package egg noodles
- 1/4 pound cheese (grated)
- 1/4 pound salted nuts
- 1 small can mushrooms

Method:  
Brown meat in butter, add onion and brown more. Cook egg noodles, gently fold in rest of ingredients except chowmein noodles, olives cheese and nuts. Put into baking dish, one layer of ingredients, sprinkle with cheese and stick around olives. Add another layer of mixture then another of cheese and olives.

Bake 1/2 hour and sprinkle with salted nuts and chowmein noodles, and bake the last half hour.

A hybrid grain sorghum variety demonstration was conducted by Marlon Inman and Verney Towns at a location 10 miles west on Highway 84.

Twenty-six brave souls ventured to pick the highest yielding of the 12 varieties and final winner of a \$25, hat given by the First National Bank was Horace Hutton. Hutton guessed the nearest pound yield per acre of the best variety.

For the second straight year, the winning variety in this demonstration on this farm was Pioneer 820. Four farmers out of the 26 guessed Pioneer 820, but Hutton's well-known area dryland and irrigation farmer placed his guess at 8,220 pounds, and underguess of yield by 702. The Pioneer 820 made a whopping yield of 9,022 pounds per acre.

Mervin Wilterding, YL Community pioneer came in the guessing race in close second by overguessing Pioneer 820 by 838 pounds per acre.

Walter B. Little also chose this same variety and was third place winner by missing the total yield by 852 pounds.

Troy Clem, who farms 10 miles southwest, was the only other person selecting Pioneer 820.

We shall look forward to copies of your Newspaper.

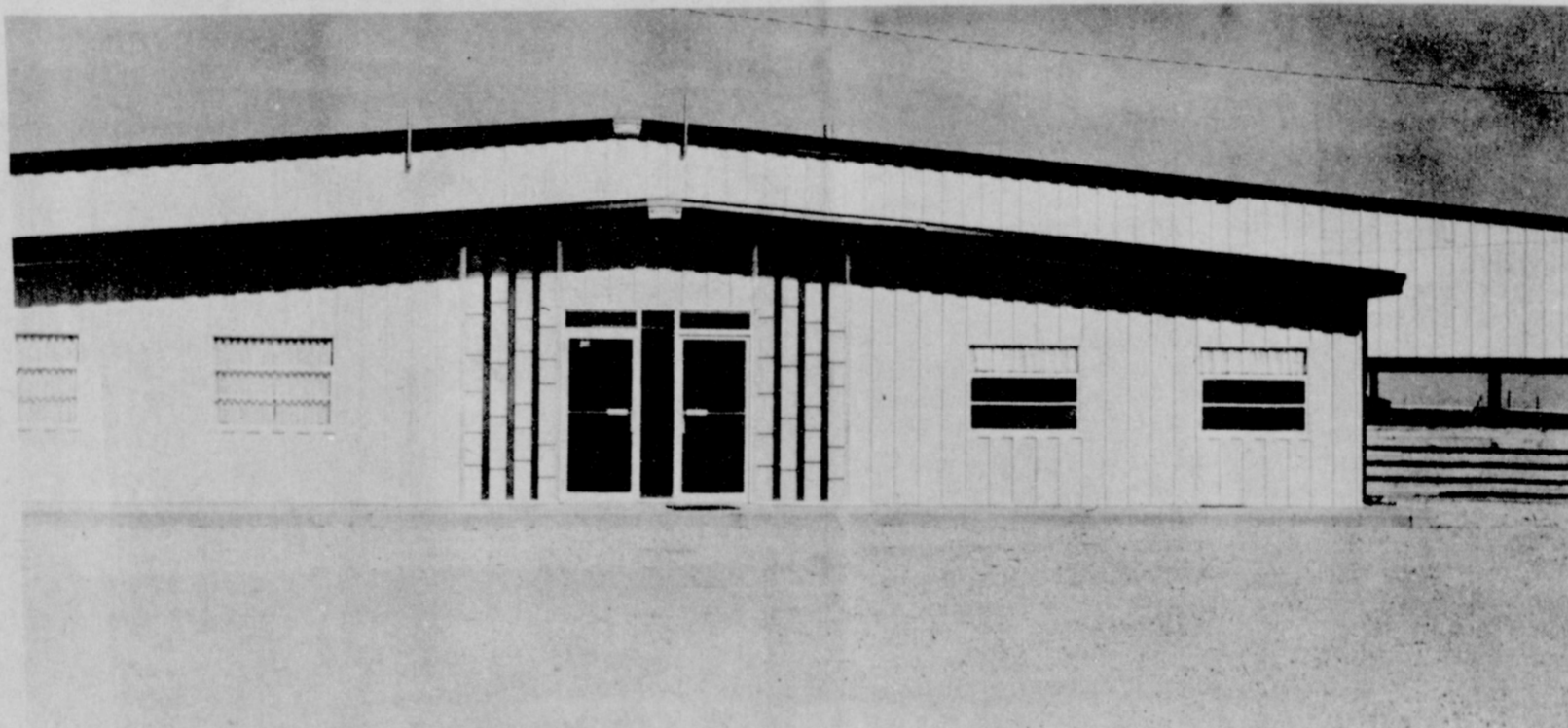
