#### Cotton Insect News

Grasshopper damage has appeared at several points over Fisher Co. states County Agent Frank Crowd-

For the flying grasshopper Crowder recommends the use of toxaphene or chlordane at the rate of half gallon to the acre or Aldrain 1 pint to the acre.

Should the jumbo grasshopper appear poison bait is recommended. This bait is a mixture of 5 lbs. of dry bran, 4 lb. Paris Green, 1 qt. of molasses and 1 gallon of water.

Calcium Arsenate may be substituted for Paris Green and using half lb. instead of 1/4 lb. This is to be sprinkled along rows and on fence row.

Crowder further states that there are indications that thrip damage is likely and to control this he recommends using DDT at 1 quart to acre: Aldrin or dieldrin at half pint to the acre or toxaphene at 1 pint peas, July 10 to August 15 are re- The area for field and track events,

These sprays hould be applied at 7 day intervals, beginning when cotton is in the 4 leaf stage. Two to four applications maybe needed.

Heavy Rain Damages Some Crops; Area Is Benefitted By Showers

Crops in the section just west of Rotan were damaged to varying degrees late Tuesday afternoon when a hard wind and rain came in from the southwest. The hard rain did not reach the Hobbs community.

A number of fields are badly damaged and fields leveled. Many farmers in this area state that more water ran across the farm to market road that they had ever seen. Rainfall is estimated from 2 to 4 inches in some of this area. In Rotan 1.37 was gauged, while .6 fell south, east and north.

The badly damaged area is estimated to cover some 6 to 8 sections of farm land.

The colored section of town was again flooded as well as adjoining fields.

The moisture was welcomed by most farmers except the flooded area, and ranchmen were needing considerable rain. Pastures had already begun to suffer for moisture.

> Farmers who are knowingly overplanted and who do not adjust their otton acreage likewise are ineligiole for the price support on the 19-55 cotton produced on the farm.

throughout the Abilene district of the Social Security Administration according to R. R. Tuley, Jr., district manager.

"Interviewers talk personally with each applicant for old-age and survivors insurance benefits, to avoid misunderstandings on the part of beneficiaries as to their rights as well as their duties and responsibilities," he added.

Tuley explained that field personnel assist applicants to secure evidence or information to put their claims in order for prompt payment, since payments are generally needed soon after earnings are reduced or cut off in older years or by death.

"We gather the names of persons desiring social security information in a special holding file, and by making periodic trips are able to talk with many people in their own neighborhoods with no cost to the inquirer and a very small average cost to the government for such service," Tuley continued.

Field Representative Chesney Haney is responsible for service in Fisher County. His schedule for July includes Rotan, City Hall, 9:30 a.m., Friday, July 15.


