Nelda McCright Feted With Morning Party

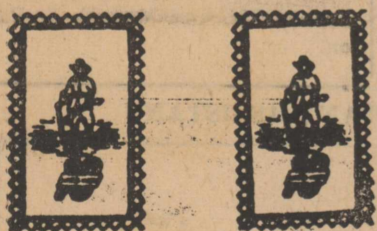

State Health Officer Warns of Danger From Rheumatic Fever

Austin, July 5—The outlook in the fight against rheumatic fever has improved, but this disease, which begins most often between the ages of five and fifteen, still results in serious heart damage in many cases, declared Dr. Henry A. Holle, State Health Officer.

Rheumatic fever usually strikes after a notice and throat infection caused by germs of the streptococcus family. An average of three out of one hundred of the commonly called "strep" infections are followed by rheumatic fever.

Sulfonamide and penicillin usually can overcome the infection. But if rheumatic fever develops, strict bed rest is the first resort to ease the load on the heart and to help the patient avoid added infection.

Sometimes sulpha or penicillin may be given to the convalescing patient to help avoid a recurrence of the disease. Repeated attacks of rheumatic fever are more likely to lead to heart damage.

The rheumatic heart condition can involve damage to one or more of the four valves of the heart or to the heart muscle itself. Rheumatic fever inflames the valves and muscles and when the inflammation subsides, it usually leaves a scar.

In about two out of three cases this fever leaves no heart damage, or causes so little injury that the victim can regain active, everyday living. In other cases, modern surgery may help.

No matter how slight an attack of rheumatic fever may seem, the first and most important thing to do is to follow your doctor's advice to the letter.

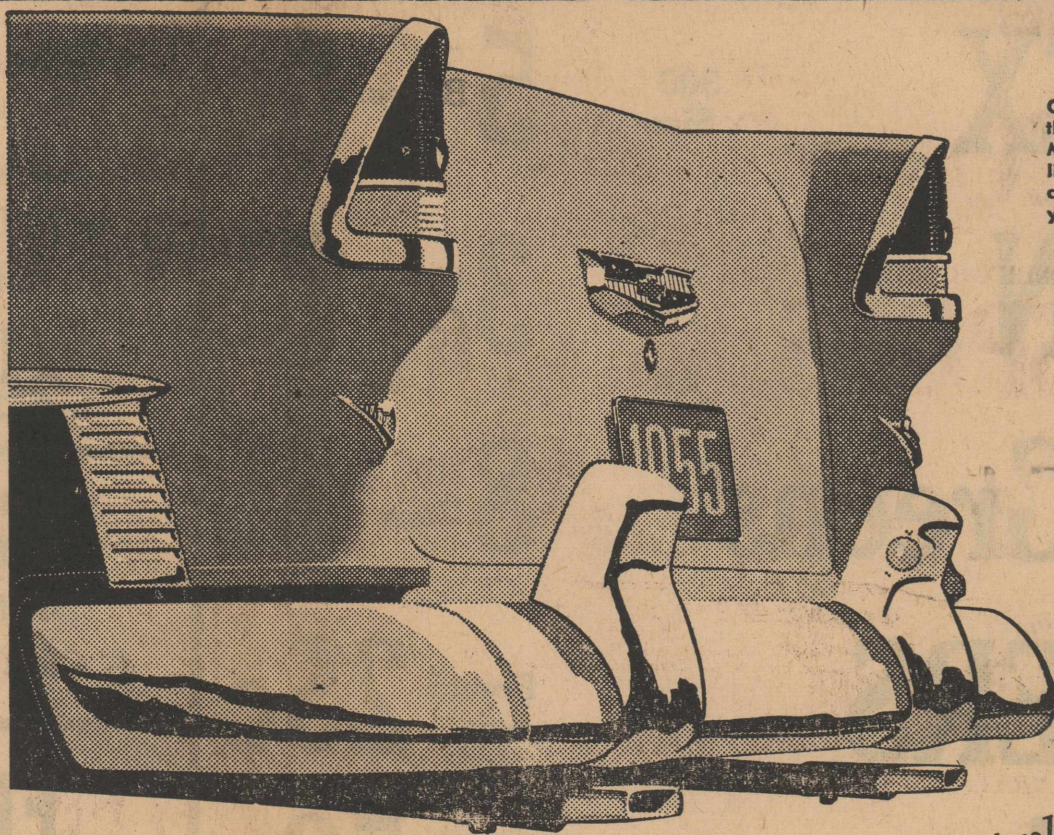

Cecil Lotief Making Trip to Lebanon

Cecil A. Lotief left last week en route to New York, he is leaving by plane shortly for the Homecoming celebration in Lebanon. The following release was received by the Advance after Mr. Lotief's departure, from the Arab Information Center in New York:

Hundreds of Lebanese Americans are returning to Lebanon, Biblical "Land of Milk and Honey," this summer, in recognition of the 100th anniversary of the first Lebanese Emigrant to the United States.

More than three hundred members of the National Association of Federations of Syrian and Lebanese American Clubs are scheduled to leave by plane for Beirut the first two weeks in July, among them

about fifty persons from Boston, fifteen from Alabama, fifteen from Washington, D. C., twenty from Florida. About seventy-five persons left June 29 from New York on the S. S. GUMHURYAT MISR of the Khedivial Mail Line, and innumerable other groups are in their way by ship and by plane to Lebanon.

The Homecoming Year is being arranged in the belief that Americans can play an important role in bringing about peace and international understanding, by friendly visits to the lands of their origin. At Beirut, capital of Lebanon, on the Eastern rim of the Mediterranean, a warm reception is being planned for native sons, starting with an official inauguration of Homecoming Year at the UNESCO Building on July 21. Camille Chamoun, president of Lebanon, will preside.

Members of the group will tour

other Near East countries, including the Hashemite Kingdom of Jordan, Egypt, Syria, Iraq. They will visit health institutions, agricultural programs, and see the economic development taking place in this part of the world. Meetings and conferences will provide an opportunity for members of the group to share experiences and goals for the mutual benefit of each.

The opportunity to visit Bible Lands and Biblical sites will be welcomed by many members of the groups who will be visiting the old country for the first time. In Lebanon trips have been arranged to such Biblical places as the Cedars, Tyre, Sidon. In Jordan the groups will visit Damascus, including the Street Called Straight, the Wall of St. Paul, and in Jordan there will be trips to the Holy places of Old Jerusalem, the Via Dolorosa, the Church of the Holy Sepulchre, the Garden of Gethsemane, the Mount of Olives, Bethlehem, Jericho, the River Jordan, and the Dead Sea. Visits to Iraq, land of the Thousand and One Nights, and to Egypt to see the Pyramids and the Tombs of the Pharaohs, will offer an opportunity for younger members of the group to see places they have studied about in school.

Lebanon's famous mountain resorts are making plans to receive a number of Homecoming guests who will wish to rest in the coolness of the mountains, taking trips down to the Mediterranean for swimming. Recreation offered in mountain resorts for visitors will include tennis, horseback riding and motoring along well-paved highways.

Upon their return to the United States, members of the Homecoming Group will report to their cities and communities throughout the United States on their visit, in order to build better understanding of their native land in this, the country of their adoption.

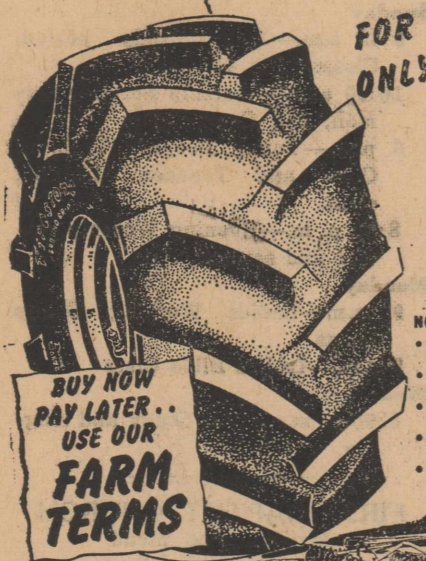

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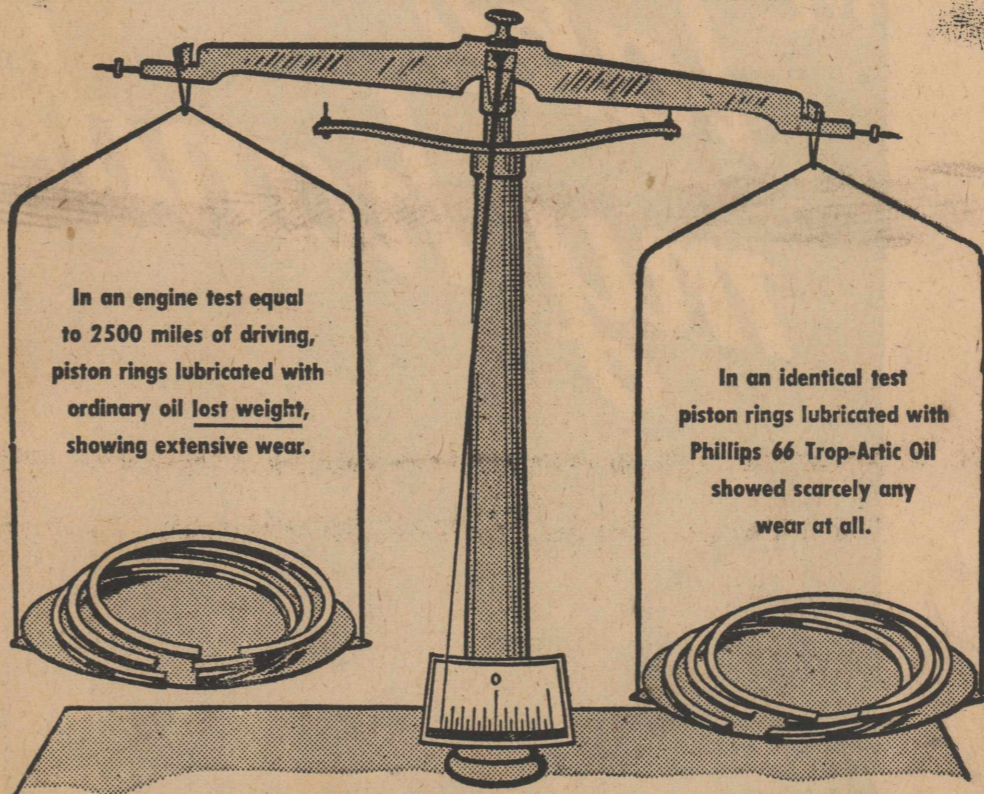

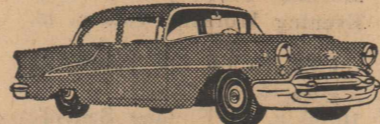

Highway Patrol Needs More Men

Captain G. L. Morahan, who commands the Abilene District of the Texas Highway Patrol, told the Advance today that he is interested in contacting young men in this area who desire a career in traffic law enforcement.

According to Captain G. L. Morahan, the Patrol Division of the Texas Department of Public Safety plans to train 100 men in the year beginning September 1, 1955. The examination, which will be statewide, is tentatively set for early in August with the training school to begin in October. In the mean-

time, applicants have until midnight of July 25 to file for the positions.

Captain Morahan said that you are eligible for one of the positions if you can meet the following conditions: You must be a male, between the age of 21 and 35 years, inclusive; not less than 5 feet 8 inches in height; and weighing not less than 2 pounds or more than 3-1/2 pounds per inch of height.

You must have a high school education, and must be a citizen of the United States and a resident of Texas for at least a year immediately prior to application. Finally, you must satisfactorily pass an exhaustive character and mental ex-

amination.

Salary of Patrolmen is \$315 per month with \$10 per month extra for each five years of service up to 15 years. An annual two weeks paid vacation is afforded, and uniforms and equipment are provided to all members of the Patrol.

Captain Morahan says that you can secure an application blank by calling in person at 2064 Butternut in Abilene, or you may write directly to W. J. Elliott, Chief, Texas Highway Patrol, Austin, and request one.

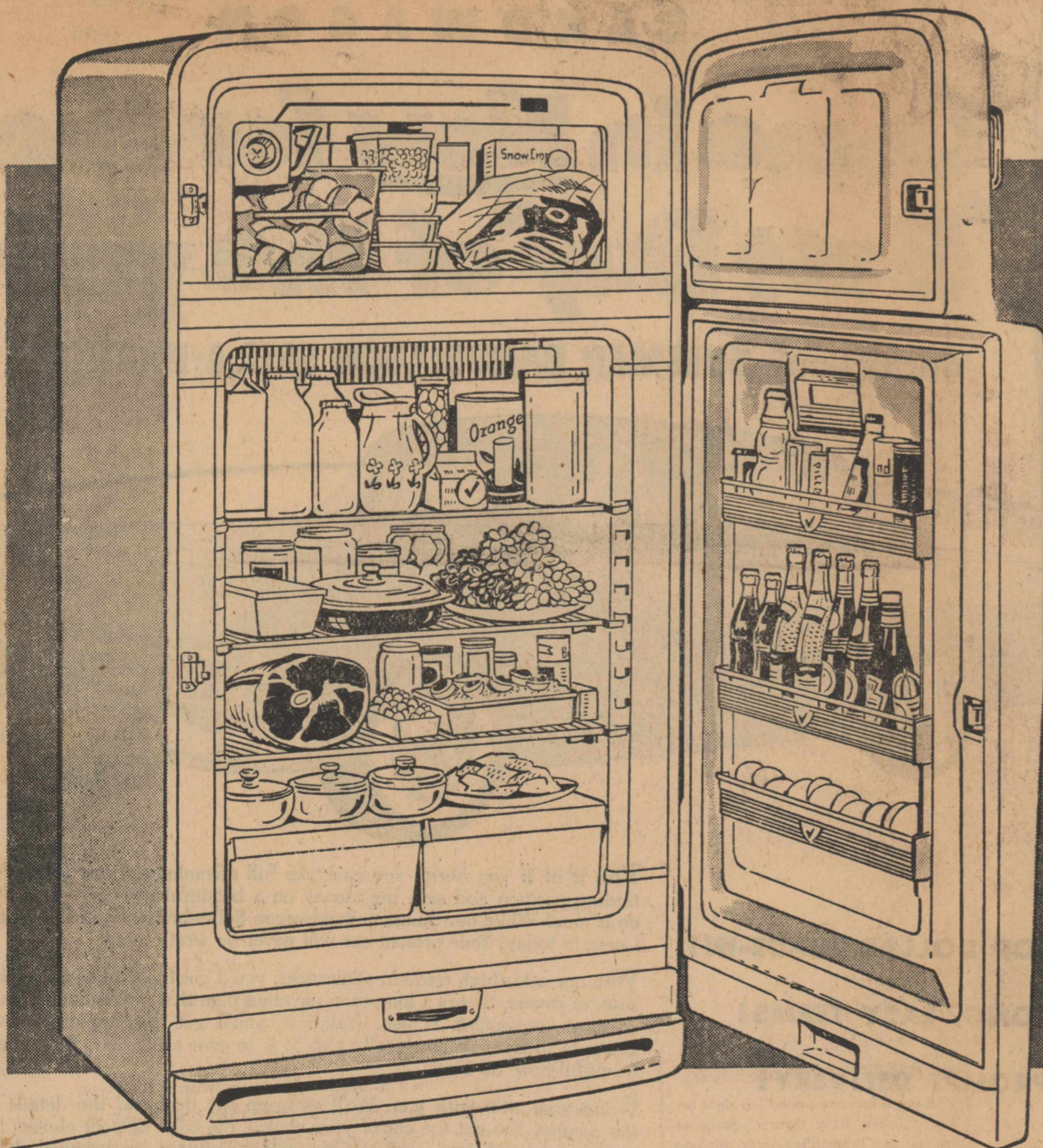

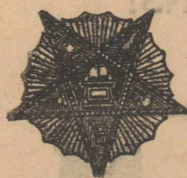

"The Debt Is Outlawed"

John hadn't made any payment on an open account of his grocery bill for two and one-half years. He was not a dishonest man, but was just a poor manager. After several years, the groceryman sued for the bill.

John's attorney interposed the defense of the statute of limitations, the groceryman was denied judgment. Yet there was no question but that John owed the money. One may ask why the laws permit such a defense as the statute of limitations, or outlaws an otherwise valid claim.

The groceryman slept on his rights. He should have acted sooner. The courts cannot be used for processing stale claims. Proof of such claims is more difficult. One litigant might wait for the only adverse witness to die, and then sue. Memories grow dim and sometimes are modified to fit one's desired views. So the law says it is no injustice to force a litigant to act within a reasonable time, whereas if he doesn't, injustice is more likely to happen.

Practically all actions have time limitations. With some it is very short, as some claims against a municipality require that notice to the municipality must be given within ten days after the accident. On the

other hand there is a 25 year limitation applying to some types of claims involving rights to real property.

Even criminal actions must be brought within a certain period, usually two to three years. An exception is a murder charge, which may be brought at any time.

Lawyers use the word "laches" in certain cases to indicate that the litigant slept on his right and should be denied relief since "equity aids the vigilant."

**Vacation Traffic
Rush Is Greatest**

Problem Says Authority

"What's the answer to the vacation traffic problem? You are, Mr. Motorist."

In those words E. C. McFadden, president of Texas Safety Association, Inc., today squarely pinned responsibility for the heavy annual toll of vacation traffic deaths on the drivers themselves.

"It is my firm belief that most vacation-time auto accidents can be laid at the door of impatient and discourteous drivers," said Mr. McFadden as he discussed the safe vacation driving program which the Texas Safety Association, the Department of Public Safety and the National Safety Council are sponsoring this month.

"These Hurry Bugs are so intent on cramming their vacations full of activity and pleasure that they don't take time to drive safely."

Mr. McFadden suggested a more

relaxed attitude as a safeguard for the driver. He pointed out that a vacation is a time to take it easy and enjoy a little fun.

"There's very little fun in making an over-ambitious schedule and trying to keep up with it no matter who happens," McFadden said. He advised motorists to get an early start each day and to plan to cover just as much territory as they can arrange without strain. These two things, he pointed out, will remove the pressure to drive at a speed too fast for conditions, to disregard traffic signs and signals and to ignore the ordinary rules of courtesy on the road. He also warned drivers to be especially careful at night because danger is increased

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after dark and the driver is likely to be fatigued.

"I guess my whole message can be summed up in the familiar slogan from the Texas Safety Association: 'Drive to Arrive Alive—Slow Down and Live!'"
