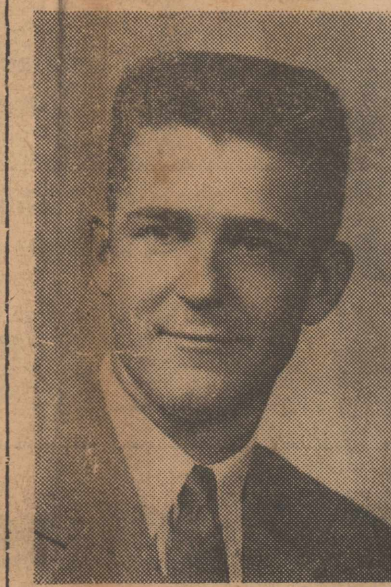

Highway Jobs Let For Fisher County

A Lubbock firm Tuesday submitted the low bid on three highway construction projects in Fisher County. The work will be done on Farm Roads 1614 and 57 and U. S. 180.

J. R. Fanning of Lubbock bid the low \$144,233 for the three Fisher County projects.

The work includes grading, structure and paving of FM 1614 a distance of 4.1 miles from FM 611 at Hobbs west to the Scurry County line; grading, structures and paving on FM 57 from Sylvester northeast four miles to a connection with U. S. 180; and widening of the bridge over Cottonwood Creek on U. S. 180, a mile east of Roby.

Joret Termas, Lebanon, To Rotan Advance

This is my first report on my trip to the Holy Land. I just returned from Jerusalem where I stayed two days. While there, I visited all the holy places, such as: Christ's birth place, Church of the Sepulcher, The Anointment Stone, Calvary Chapel of the Nailing to the Cross, Statue of the Virgin Mary, Calvary Chapel of the Raising of the Cross, the Dead Sea, River Jordan, the Prison Wall of Christ and many other sacred spots.

The trip was very educational as well as of great spiritual benefit. I wish every Christian could see these things mentioned above in order to better appreciate what Christ has done for us.

The people are very poor. The country has no land of any value; nothing but rocks and mountains, and very little water. The old city of Jerusalem is still the same as it was two thousand years ago; no sidewalks. All hauling is done on donkey's backs....I may bring one donkey back for John Young or Elmer Price to deliver groceries on. The climate of Lebanon is among the world's best. It gets so cold after 7 o'clock that you need a sweater or long handles. The people are rather lazy in summer time; they drink coffee and smoke cigarettes all day long.

Christ's Tomb is one of the most impressive sights I've seen. Thousands of people from all part of the world visit it. Only four people can go inside at one time. Every one kneels before the stone and prays in his own way.

I am enjoying my visit more than I expected, and want to express my appreciation and thanks to my friends and customers who have made this trip possible for me. With best wishes to everyone at home and may God bless all of you,

Traffic Accident Toll Is Heavy

Some 1134 people were killed in traffic accidents during the first six months of 1955, representing a two per cent increase over the same period of 1954, F. Darby Hammond, Executive Secretary of the Southwestern Insurance Information Service of Dallas announced today.

Traffic accidents were also up two per cent from the first half of 1954, totaling 952. Over one-half of the traffic deaths—577—occurred on Texas highways. Cities, with a population of 2,500 or more, accounted for 246 traffic fatalities. A total of 139 traffic deaths were reported on farm-to-market roads, and 89 persons were killed on county roads. In towns under 2,500 population 83 deaths were recorded. The month of May was the worst traffic fatality month. A total of 214 people lost their lives during the month, Hammond stated.

The insurance industry representative pointed out that the Department of Public Safety in Austin predicts that at the present rate of deaths on Texas highways, and roads, the year end tally of traffic fatalities will be nearly 4.4 per cent higher than in 1954.

"Already the economic loss for the first six months of 1955, from

traffic accidents is close to \$3,359,750 higher than for the same period last year. Estimates of the economic loss so far this year stands at \$67,296,250. Of course, this is the monetary loss and doesn't take into consideration the terrible pain, suffering and bereavement resulting from traffic deaths," Hammond said.

"As a total problem, or national problem, deaths on the highways and roads have become the major problem confronting the American people. Some 38,000 of our fellow Americans have their lives snuffed out in traffic accidents each year, and the economic loss is nearly 4 1-2 billion dollars. Motor vehicles annually bring death to more children than all five of the major dread diseases combined. Even among adults, they are the fifth-ranking killer during the productive working years of life. In short, the loss of life and property annually sacrificed on the alter of carelessness and criminal irresponsibility is a national disgrace. We're all calloused to big figures when it comes to money, and in a sense, we're somewhat the same way with respect to human accident statistic. But spelled out, those 38,000 traffic fatalities equal the entire population of Tyler, Texas. Think of it! Each year, the entire population of a city of that size is completely wiped out in needless traffic accidents," Hammond said.

"Texas, while it ranks third in the Nation in automobile registrations, it also contributes 6.4 per cent of all the Nation's traffic fatalities. Last year, Texas traffic deaths were the second highest in the country. While there are varying estimates, the cost of traffic accidents to each individual in the Lone Star State to every man, woman and child—is generally agreed to be about \$60 per year. For a community of 10,000 persons that's a bill of \$600,000—enough to build a new school, swimming pools, and to pay for countless other civic improvements," Hammond continued.

'Signs Of Life'

"The cemetery is full of drivers who had the right of way!"

This rather ancient wisecrack states a truth that should receive a good deal of consideration this month when the traffic safety spotlight is beamed on the Signs of Life.

The purpose of the Signs of Life program is to encourage recognition of the basic traffic signs

shapes and observance of all traffic signs, signals, and pavement markings and the laws and rules behind them.

Traffic signs are provided for the protection of drivers and pedestrians. Yet drivers and walkers constantly disregard these safeguards—frequently throwing away their own lives in the process. This is a matter of record. Statistics show that in most traffic accidents there is some violation of the law of safe driving or walking rules.

Observance of the Signs of Life and the laws of common sense rules they represent could save many of these lives. And common sense should take a driver or walker beyond the mere observance of the letter of the law.

You can be killed driving across an intersection on a through street, if a driver on the intersection street doesn't realize you have the right of way. Similarly, you can be struck down crossing the street on foot even though you have the green light. In either case it will be small comfort to you or your relatives that the law was on your side.

Safe walking or driving for any individual should include observance of the following rules:

1. Know the signs of Life by their shapes so you can recognize them on sight. Obey them meticulously.

2. Be willing to yield your legal rights whenever necessary to prevent a traffic accident.

Defeat should never be a source of discouragement, but rather a fresh stimulus.

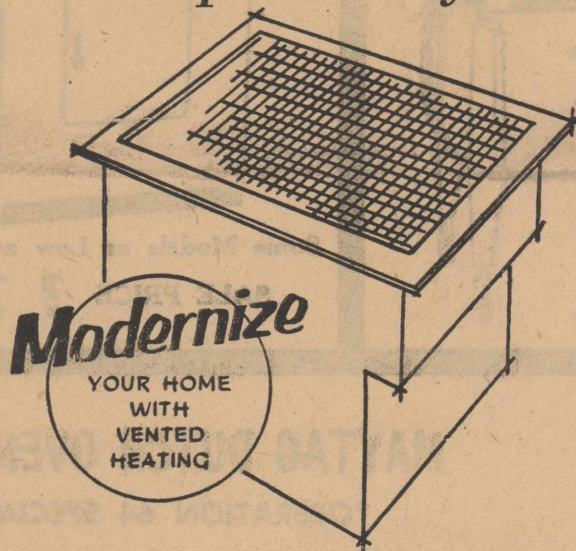

SPECIAL NOTICE

TO ALL OPERATORS OF CARS AND TRUCKS PICK-UPS, BICYCLES, MOTOR SCOOTERS AND OTHER MOBILE UNITS

We are now in the process of marking off traffic lanes, parking lines and turning lanes on the main street of our city. Since the streets have not been clearly marked, the police force has been rather lenient with the citizens in the matter of traffic and parking violations. We are now asking all our citizens to cooperate with us in the matter of proper parking, driving, backing out, etc. To that end we ask that you study the regulations listed below and observe them to the best of your ability. After a brief period of warning to the public, tickets will then be given to violators and fines assessed. It is not our aim or intention to harass the people, but we must have certain traffic rules and they must be enforced for the safety of the public as well as the operators of motor vehicles.

1. The speed limit on the main street (From Morrow Hotel end to West Side Gin block) is 15 (fifteen) miles per hour for all vehicles going east and west.
2. The speed limit on all other streets, alleys and other ways is 30 (thirty) miles per hour.
3. All STOP signs mean STOP, not just slow down. Many of our citizens pay no heed to these stop signs.
4. All motor vehicles will be parked between the parking lines head on to the curbs and in the center of main street. Tickets will be given to those who straddle these lines or who do not park at the proper angles within the lines.
5. Parallel parking of cars behind those parked head on to the curbs and/or in the center of the main street is prohibited, except that a car may be parked parallel behind these cars for not over 10 minutes and there must be a driver in the car who can move it on in case of a traffic jam or a car needs to come out from the curb or the center line of street.
6. The practice of two or three cars driving parallel to each other up and down the streets while the operators talk to each other is prohibited and fines will be assessed in every case of violation against all operators concerned.
7. There will be a 10 (ten) minute parking limit for cars in front of the Post Office between the markers to be erected defining the 10 minute parking zone. This is done for the convenience of our citizens who go for their mail. Rule 5 (five) above will apply here as elsewhere in the matter of parallel parking.
8. We have an ordinance against excessive noise on the main street and other streets of Rotan, and although car horns serve a purpose, the excessive blowing of same for the sole purpose of making noise is a nuisance and violators can expect to get tickets for such violation.
9. Cars operated within the limits of Rotan without proper mufflers will be stopped and owners advised to provide proper muffling. Those who engage intentional back firing of their engines must cease from such practice or be in contempt of our laws.
10. It is a violation of the law to ride a bicycle or motor scooter or cycle on any side walk in the business district of Rotan. Parents permitting their children to ride on these sidewalks will be held accountable.
11. All cars parked head-on to the line in center of main street must back out and proceed to turning post before entering other side of street. You must not drive across the line in center of street in any of the three blocks of main street.
12. It is noted that quite a few children are driving cars and pick-ups in Rotan and without drivers licenses. The police department will begin checking these children drivers for licenses. The Department of Public Safety has set out certain rules covering children who are learning to drive, and we want to advise parents to study these rules.

The city officials of Rotan realize that the making of these rules will be resented by a small minority of citizens who have no regard for the comfort or safety of their fellow citizens, however we feel and believe that most all our citizens will approve and welcome such rules and will abide by them and help enforce them. As stated elsewhere in this document, we are not setting out on a witch hunt nor are we seeking to unduly restrain any citizen, but we must have some safety traffic and driving rules and they must be enforced. We call on our town citizens to consider our farmer friends and to give them parking opportunities, for Rotan depends primarily upon the farmers and farms for their existence. Local citizens should park on side streets or in alleys on the days when the farmers do their heavy shopping. We note that quite a few of the merchants park their own vehicles to the rear of their buildings, or on side streets and we appreciate this for it gives room for customers to park for convenient shopping.
