#### **Negative Vote** Kills Bond Election

Voters in the Muleshoe Independent School Disvoted down a \$2,000,000 School Bond Election Tuesday.

Late results revealed that the bond issue failed by only 87 votes. A 55% turnout, or 463 voters cast their ballots against the issue, while 45% (376) voted for the bond which would have allowed the badly needed renovations and updating of the Muleshoe Schools.

A total of 839 voters turned out for this issue -less than a fourth of qualified registered voters.

Of the 839 votes cast, 60 of these were by absentee, which revealed a strong opposition of 53 against, 7





Although cooler temperatures hit the Texas Panhandle early, other parts of the state are just beginning to experience the chilly winter weather. Consequently, motorists who are draining and adding antifreeze is a tasty but deadly poison to animals, and can result in their deaths.

"Anti-freeze has a sweet taste and is a tempting treat for animals. Consequently, veterinarians in Texas treat numbers of dogs and cats for antifreeze poisoning each year," said Dr. Ben Johnston, president of the Texas Veterinary Medical Association (TVMA).

"It's probably more common than anyone realizes. An owner may find his pet in a coma or dead and not know what has happened," said Johnston.

A small amount constitutes a toxic dose for an animal- two to three c.c's per pound of weight for a dog, and even less for a cat, said the TVMA presi-

counts for about 15 percent of reported animal poisonings, but many are never reported because owners don't realize what their pet has gotten into.

Johnston recommends that old anti-freeze be flushed down the sewer drain since it is biodegradable. Any that has spilled onto the driveway or street should be washed for 10 minutes toward the street drain. No puddles should be left for pets to get into. And no residue should be left behind because the dried crystals contain the poison. The drain pan should also be washed thor-

freeze which animals find tasty is ethylene glycol, a sweetish colorless liquid that also is an ingredient in other compounds found around the house. The toxin also is found in brake fluid, windshield de-icers and wallpaper remover.

Don't forget that ethylene is also a coolant and Texas motorists use it year round. So caution should always be used when disposing of anti-freeze or coolant.

An animal that has ingested any amount of antifreeze will appear drunk. He may be aprehensive, depressed, listless, uncoordinated or wobbly. If your family pet exhibits these





#### Ask Questions As Well As Answer Them

A job seeker--much like a football team--must prepare both offensively and defensiveily for an inter-

Don Bryant, retired executive vice president of Equitable Life Assurance Society, is conducting interviewing seminars at Texas Christian University, where he is spending the fall semester as executiveresidence at the school of

A job interview is simply an exercise two people go through to keep either or both of them from making mistakes, he tells students. "If I don't do a good job of interviewing you, then hire you and you're wrong for the job, I've made a mistake," he says. "On the other hand, if you seem to have everything I'm looking for and I don't have what you're looking for but you let me hire you any-

It's important that both parties be ultra-honest in the interview, and both must be prepared. Too often, says Bryant, the job applicant assumes the interviewer will take the lead and have all the questions and all the applicant has to do is respond.

"Don't stop there," he warns. "Don't assume that every interviewer is an expert at the art of asking questions. Prepare both offensively and defensive-

"By that I mean you must try to anticipate what information the interviewer wants from you that he doesn't already have in the resume. Be prepared to give him that information, but offensively you must be prepared to ask your own questions."

Bryant recommended that job seekers take two approaches to asking questions of prospective employers. One is to mentally list all the reasons you might feel you had to resign from a company. "Keeping those in mind while you're having interview might reveal it you could end up in predicament in which you would have to resign.

"The other approach is to ask questions that will show you whether the company has a need for a person like you," he ad-

# Try Out Power Tool By Renting Before Buying

Think you want a power tool, but not sure?

Rent one first, suggests Mary Lou Rowland, a housing and home furnishings specialist.

Rowland is on the home economics staff of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The Texas A&M University System.

Renting gives you an opportunity to try power tools--to learn by first-hand experience if you want such tools for your own, she says.

Even when you're just renting, it pays to keep these things in mind:

1) Rent a good tool, and see that it's in good condition when you take it. You may be responsible for any damage that shows up when you return it to the dealer.

Read the terms of the agreement or contract before you sign to pick up rental equipment.

2) Have the materials

you intend to use on hand before you start running up rental charges.

3) Be sure to read instruction manuels or books about the particular tool before you rent.

You'll select it with more confidence, get the feel of the tool more quickly and avoid making many mistakes that spoil material--and important point, since power tools work as fast in the wrong place as in the right, You're the "boss", the tools only follow orders

4) Don't get in rental habit. If you rent a tool again and again, you'll soon have "paid" for it-with money you could have put on your own power tool.
