The contest for county judge of Coke County gained momentum this week when W.W. (Bud) Thetford filed for a spot on the ballot. His candidacy brings to three the number seeking the office.

A former county judge of Coke County, Thetford was defeated in the Democratic Primary four years ago by D.W. (Dub) Sims. Later in the season, he conducted an active campaign as a write-in candidate in the November election, but again was defeated.

Also seeking the county judge job is Aubrey Denman of Bronte.

The only other contested races so far are for commissioner in Precincts 2 and 4.

In Precinct 2 the incumbent, Bobby Vaughn is being challenged by Billy Joe Luckett. In Precinct 4, the incumbent, Jerry Parker, had two opponents, Willie Carper and James Arnold Tidwell.

Cecil Kemp, candidate for reelection as justice of the peace, Precinct 2, is running his announcement in this week's Bronte Enterprise.

There has been some speculation this week that the deadline for filing may be extended due to a dispute over redistricting in some areas of the state. Mrs. Winnie Waldrop, county clerk, said Wednesday that she has had no official word on any plan to extend the deadline for filing for county and precinct offices. The present deadline is 6 p.m. Feb. 1.

Cancer Info Phone Funded

The statewide toll-free telephone service that answers Texans' questions about cancer has been refunded as part of a three-year contract from the National Cancer Institute (NCI).

The \$833,610 contract was awarded to The University of Texas M.D. Anderson Hospital and Tumor Institute to continue its public education program, the Cancer Information Service (CIS), which operates the toll-free telephone line.

Since it began in 1975, the CIS staff of trained volunteers has assisted more than 40,000 Texans with their cancer questions and concerns.

The contract will enable CIS to continue its present activities and expand educational programs directed to minority audiences and those at high risk for cancer.

The Texas CIS is one of 17 such regional centers established to help ease the public's fear of and confusion about cancer by providing rapid access--via a telephone line--to the facts about the disease. The program is part of M.D. Anderson's Department of Public Information and Education.

"Early detection, successful treatment and even prevention of cancer depend greatly on each person's health habits and knowledge about the disease," said Dr. Charles A. LeMaistre, president of the UT Cancer Center. "CIS helps bridge the gap between cancer knowledge and personal action by providing people with accurate, up-to-date cancer information and by helping make them aware of the methods for early detection and prevention that can help save lives."

The toll-free phone service operates from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Friday, in English and Spanish. Callers are given information over the phone and receive printed material, if they request it. No caller is required to give a name or address.

Eggs are one of the best sources of protein available to humans in both the quality and quantity of protein. They contain all of the essential amino acids. In fact, egg proteins are of such high quality that they are used as a standard by which other proteins are compared.

Essential amino acids are those which cannot be manufactured by the body.

A question often arises about the difference in nutritional value between brown shell and white shell eggs. More and more the conclusion seems to be that brown and white shelled eggs do not seem to be different, at least the brown shell does not seem to be superior.

The color of an egg yolk is not related to nutritional value. It is easily changed by the chicken's diet.

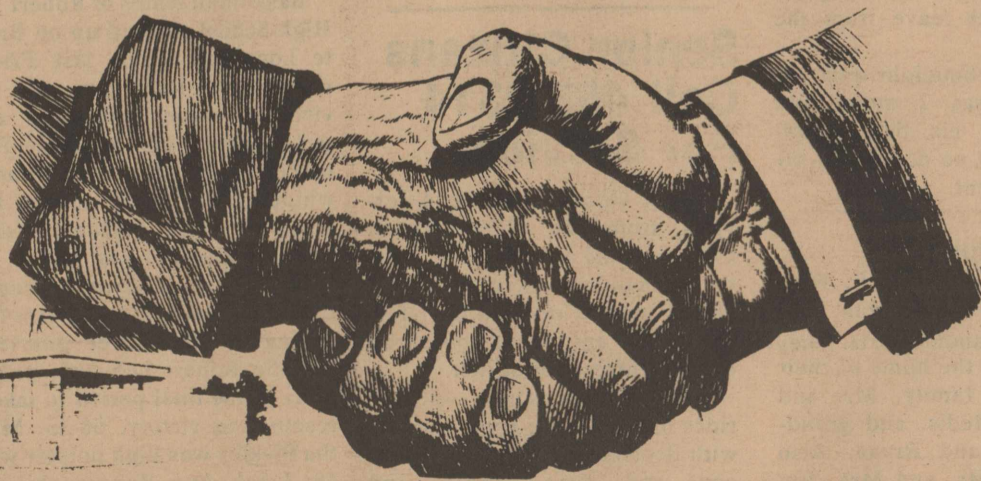

Local Taxes Due in January

An important deadline occurs this month for property owners in Texas.

Kenneth Graeber, executive director of the State Property Tax Board, today reminded Texans that local property taxes assessed for 1981 by cities, counties, school districts and special districts must be paid by the end of January.

"Taxes not paid before Feb. 1 are delinquent and penalty and interest begin to accrue," Graeber said.

The state tax administrator noted that delinquent 1981 taxes will incur a 6 percent penalty and 1 percent interest charge on Feb. 1.

Combined penalty and interest charges will total 9 percent in March, 11 percent in April, 13 percent in May, and 15 percent in June.

Total penalty and interest on delinquent taxes reaches 18 percent in July, 19 percent in August, 20 percent in September, 21 percent in October, 22 percent in November, and 23 percent in December.

If not paid until January 1983, delinquent 1981 property taxes would be subject to a combined 24 percent penalty and interest charge. And, Graeber noted, the interest would continue to increase by 1 percent per month.

In addition, if a taxing jurisdiction or appraisal district has contracted with a delinquent tax attorney, its governing body may add an additional penalty to any tax delinquent on July 1.

The additional penalty may not exceed 15 percent of the taxes, penalty and interest due.

Graeber pointed out that some home rule cities may have different delinquency dates for 1981 taxes. "The Property Tax Code does not affect a city's delinquency date for its 1981 taxes if the city charter or ordinance provides an earlier delinquency date," he said.

He also noted that if a taxing jurisdiction mailed its 1981 tax bills after January 10, the delinquency date is postponed to the first day of the next month that will provide a period of at least 21 days after the date of mailing for payment of taxes before delinquent.

Taxpayers with questions are encouraged to contact local government tax offices.

CHILD DEPRESSION

Some children suffer from depression just as adults do, says a family life education specialist, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. Studies show that some children have the same depressive symptoms as adults about being loved--hopelessness, worthlessness, guilt and anxiety. A depressed child may show retarded physical movements, a sad face and stooped posture. His appetite may drop off and he may have trouble sleeping. Dreams and fantasies are likely to be full of danger and sadness. Child depression is often linked to relationships with adults, such as feelings of being abandoned or unloved. Children also may become depressed when they are over-criticized or over-protected. Family crises and new situations also trigger depression.

Gen Tel Asks For \$110 Million In Latest Request From PUC

Citing a crucial need for increased revenues required to meet customer pressure for a better quality of telephone service and to attract the capital necessary to meet those needs on favorable terms, General Telephone Company of the Southwest President E.L. "Buddy" Langley has announced intentions to file with the Texas Public Utility Commission Jan. 29 for some \$110 million in new revenues of which less than \$43 million would be recovered through monthly basic local service rates.

The new revenues would increase intrastate revenues less than 24 percent. Langley emphasized monthly basic local service rates were last adjusted almost two years ago equating to less than a 12 percent increase per year. He added that the annual increase compares favorably with annual increases for most other services.

Some \$14 million of the request is a result of restructuring plans as mandated by the Federal Communications Commission as it continues deregulation of the

telephone industry which must become effective April 1 and Oct. 1, 1982. Another \$30 million of the request is proposed for intrastate long-distance service. Approximately \$18 million would be received from increased rates for terminal equipment such as telephones and business systems and \$6 million from miscellaneous services.

SERVICE TAKES CAPITAL
Langley said, "Our industry and company are being called upon to provide a very high quality of telephone service as well as modernize existing facilities and provide new services. We must have the earnings to attract the necessary capital to provide the quality of service required."

"The expanding service needs of customers, continued rapid growth, inflation, a changing regulatory environment, the need to modernize facilities, the need for acceptable earnings sufficient to attract investors all contribute to the need for additional revenues," Langley emphasized.

GROWTH IS COSTLY
"A high percentage of our Texas Service areas are undergoing strong growth. As a result, we have an accelerated demand for telephone service including the rapidly expanding data transmission services."

"Unlike other businesses, we have an obligation to serve all customers even though adding new customers to the network costs. We can't delay capital expenditures until interest rates are lower. We are really the victim of inflation, not the cause."

IMPROVEMENT ACCELERATED
Langley added, "During the test year, our accelerated service improvement and modernization programs involved adding over 1,400 employees, mostly in positions directly affecting service performance. The cost of intrastate construction and modernization program increased over \$224 million, 29 percent greater than in 1980. Our maintenance expenditures rose more than 58 percent above 1980's cost of approximately \$81 million."

"We are generally meeting or exceeding the Public Utility Commission service standards in most areas, but we also are continually striving to meet individual customer expectation because customer approval is also extremely important to all of us at General Telephone."

"As a result of growth, the need for expanded and improved service and modernization programs, we see significant increases in capital expenditures for the future. In 1982, we will have a 68 percent greater intrastate capital requirement than in 1980. We will invest \$265 million in 1982--that's approximately \$726,000 every day of the year."

PHONE SERVICE A BARGAIN?
"The telephone industry is undergoing tremendous changes due to growth of the Sunbelt states, deregulation and competition, and the economy, all of which affect our customers. But despite these changes, the price of telephone service remains one of the best bargains available. Since 1976, General Telephone rates in Texas have only increased 22 percent. But when you look at other goods--gasoline - 128 percent increase; natural gas and electricity - 82 percent; and an overall price index - 57 percent--we have held the line much longer even though we have had the same impacts of inflation as our customers and other businesses."

Langley said details of the company's proposed restructuring of rates to recover the needed revenues will be released when the company files with the commission.

"However, we will be proposing repricing of many of our services to place the costs of these services on the customers who benefit from them rather than having all rate payers pay for someone else's service. We are doing everything we can to keep the cost of basic local service as low as possible."

Ensor Doing Well Following Heart Surgery

J. Lee Ensor, former Coke County sheriff, was reported to be doing well late Tuesday, after he had heart surgery Monday morning at San Antonio Community Hospital in San Antonio.

Ensor's son, Marvin, said Tuesday night after he had arrived in Bronte, that his father was already on a liquid diet and was expected to be moved Wednesday from the intensive care unit to a private room.

Ensor had five by-passes during the surgery, but there were no complications, his son said, and "everything seems to be going great." Marvin said they expect his father to be in the hospital eight to ten days after the surgery.

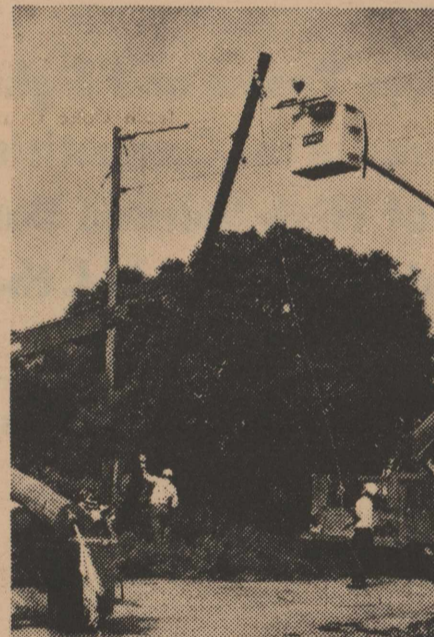

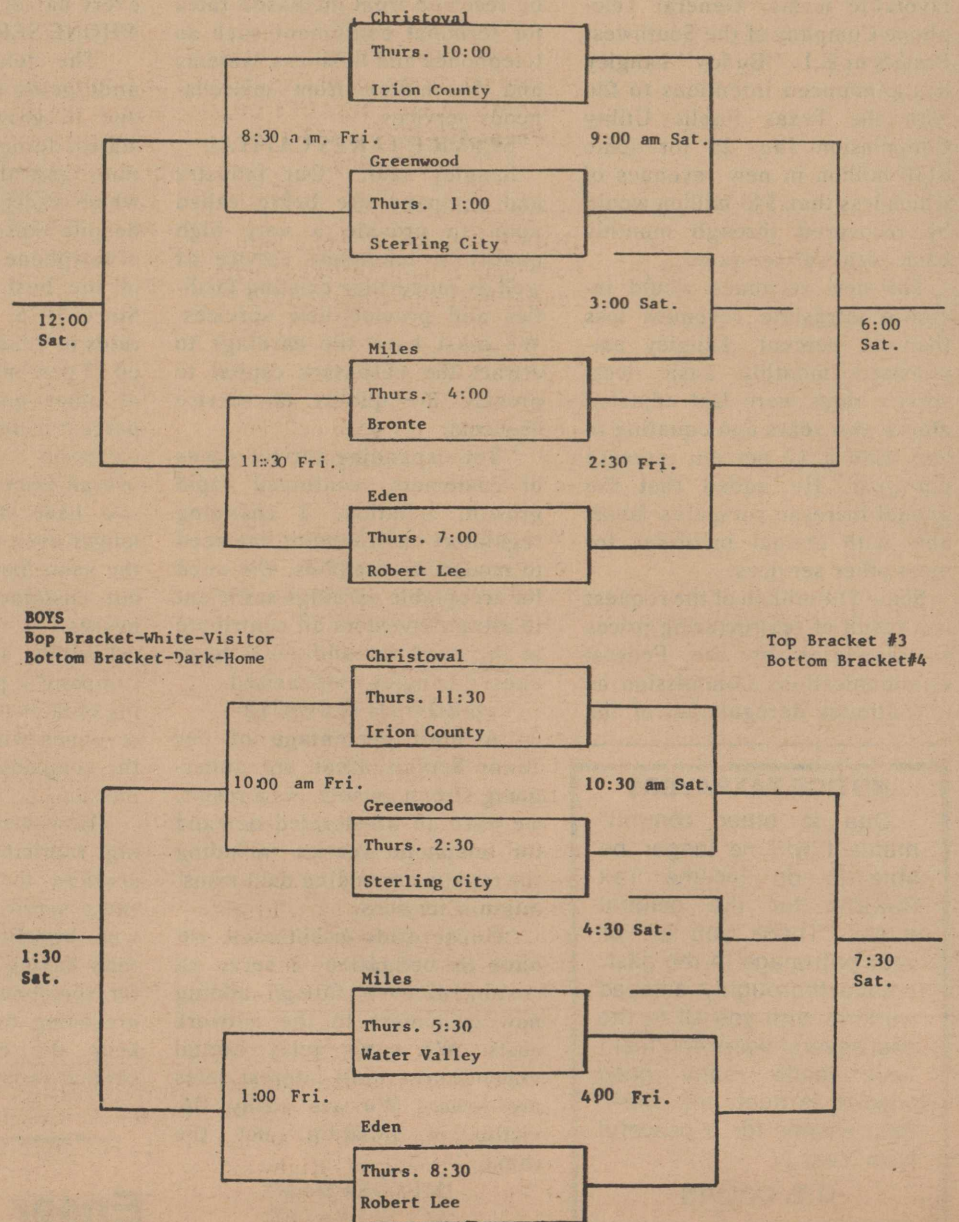

Abilene is headquarters for West Texas Rehabilitation Center, the beneficiary of the fundraiser, the money is converted into services to care for some 10,000 handicapped children and adults at Abilene, San Angelo and Snyder. The telethon was viewed all over the Southwest via a 14 station network.

Featured stars included Rex Allen, Shari Lewis, Rex Allen Jr., Ray Price, Johnny Gimble, The Reinsmen, Grandpa Jones and Family, Alan Sheppard, Slim Pickens, James Drury, the Rev. Grady Nutt, Johnny Desmond, Helen O'Connell, Arthur Duncan, Anacani, Joey Schmidt, and the Otwell Twins.

Others included: Bill and Susan Hayes, John McCasserty, Caryn Richman, Jackie Vernon, Pedro Gonzales-Gonzales.

Also, Yolanda, Jimmy Weldon, The Angle Sisters, Montie Montana, Ace Reid, Clyde Creel, the Lone Star Travelers, Bill Mack and Dick Yaws.

On tape was Bob Hope, Glen Campbell, Tanya Tucker, Jeanie C. Riley and Spanky McFarland.

My assignment this year was to interview and photograph the stars backstage. It was my fourth telethon to work and I believe without a doubt the best show we have presented. The show got better with age and the last three hours were the best. I hope the viewers stayed awake.

Actually, the telethon marks the beginning of a year-long funding program. The 1982 budget will be near the \$4 million mark in order to provide services without charge to the 10,000 handicapped individuals to be treated this year.

There will be many opportunities for people to give throughout the year. The Joint-Venture for Crippled Children program will kickoff in the summer. The LaJet Golf Classic will be part of the PGA fall tour. The annual Cattlemen's Round-Up for Crippled Children will provide ranchmen an avenue to participate in Rehab. And the Cotton Round-Up will allow farmers an opportunity to help.

Every now and then I hear the comment in a coffee shop that "the Rehab bunch is always asking for money." That's right... we are, with the budget we must support every year, the money is needed. No donation is too small. On my desk now are plans for a benefit roping Feb. 20 in Mason County. Similar events will be held all year in between the JVCC and CRCC and the

other larger drives.

WTRC campuses are in Abilene, San Angelo and Snyder, but outreach services are extended to 43 counties. Services offered at WTRC include physical therapy, occupational therapy, speech and language pathology, audiology, education, adaptive equipment and bracing, psychology, social services work evaluation and recreation.
