## **Roberts Family Takes Trip**

Mr. and Mrs. Bobby Roberts and Douglas recently visited the Dwain Walkers' in Mechanicsburg, Pennsylvania.

The Roberts family flew on a 727 American Airlines plane from Dallas-Fort Worth airport to Baltimore-Washington airport. Dwain and Joel Walker met them at the airport and drove to Mechanicsburg, where they were greeted by the rest of the Walker family- Beth, Aaron, Lori, Greg and William. Mechanicsburg is across the Susquehanna River from Harrisburg, which is the capital of Pennsylvania. The Roberts' were houseguests of the Walkers' for six days. The group did a lot of sightseeing and visiting. Points of interest were Battleground of Gettysburg and President Eisenhower's Gettysburg home and farm. They also visited Lancaster where the Amish people live- they travel by horse drawn carriage, farm with teams of horses, use no electricity, dress in the typical clothes of Dutch people, have no modern conveniences. They drove by the Sperry-New Holland Farm Equipment factory in New Holland, Pa., the Hershey Cocoa factory in Hershey, toured the capitol building in Harrisburg and drove by Three Mile Island.

The group took a nine hour bus tour of Washington D.C. which included touring the White House, walked through the U.S. Capitol Building, Lincoln Memorial, John F. Kennedy Center of Performing Arts, crossed the Potomac River and passed the Iwo Jima Memorial, toured Arlington National Cemetery, watched the changing of the Honor Guards at the tomb of the Unknown Soldier, viewed the Kennedy gravesites and their Eternal Flame. Passed by the Supreme Court Building with newspeople and photographers standing on the steps as the Hinckley trial was in progress at the time, the Art Gallaries, Ford's Theatre (where Lincoln was shot), the United States Treasury Bldg., Washington Monument, Library of Congress, the Smithsonian Institution, the Jefferson Memorial, the National Archives, the Pan American Union, the Watergate Buildings and the home of Robert E. Lee.

Toured George Washington's town, Alexandria, Va., once a great seaport and Christ Church, where he worshipped. Then they drove down the Potomac River to tour Washington's home and plantation at Mt. Vernon.

Other points of interest were the Liberty Bell, Independence Hall, Benjamin Franklin's Court where his house was once located, Franklin Museum and

They crossed the Delaware River in Camden, N.J., by way of the huge Benjamin Franklin Bridge. They crossed another huge bridge returning to Philadelphia and passed in front of Philadelphia Veterans Stadium, the Spectrum and John F. Kennedy Stadium.

They returned to Mechanicsburg and enjoyed the evening at the annual Jubilee Day festivi-

## **Voter Registration Information**

Qualifications for Voting: 1. You must be a citizen of the

United States. 2. You must be at least 18 years of age on the day of the election.

3. You must be a resident of the county, or political subdivision conducting the election.

4. You must be registered to vote.

Persons Not Entitled to Vote: 1. Those convicted of a felony whose full rights of citizenship have not been restored.

2. Those persons found mentally incompetent by a court of law.

How to Register to Vote:

1. Complete a post card application for voter registration and mail it postage-free or present it in person to the voter registrar in your county.

2. You may register to vote at any time, but your application must be received by your county Voter Registrar by October 3, 1982 in order to vote in the November 2, 1982 general election. Because October 3, 1982 falls on a Sunday, persons wishing to register in person at the voter registrar's office by the October 3rd deadline must do so no later than the close of business, Friday, October 1, 1982.

3. You may register to vote if you are at least 17 years and 10 months of age, but you may not vote until you are 18 years of age.

House Joint Resolution 1 proposes a constitutional amendment that prohibits any state ad valorem tax. Receipts from previously authorized state ad valorem taxes that are collected after the effective date of the proposed amendment shall be deposited to the credit of the general fund of the county collecting the taxes and may be expended for county purposes. Taxes collected before that date shall be distributed by the legislature among educational institutions eligible to receive those funds under prior law. The proposed amendment also repeals a section of the Constitution levying an ad valorem tax for a construction fund for 17 state colleges and universities.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

#### PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 62 as amended by Senate Joint Resolution 10 proposes a constitutional amendment that would eliminate the \$80,000,000 ceiling on state welfare aid during any fiscal year.

The amendment would set the state welfare spending limit at \$160,-000,000 for the 1982-1983 biennium.

The amendment further provides that, for each subsequent biennium, the maximum amount spent for state welfare shall not exceed one percent of the state budget.

Ed Cumbie, Noel Percifull and Clifton Reed. Bronte have been appointed Coke County chairmen for Cattlemen's Round-Up for Crippled Children, according to Jim Alexander, general Round-Up chairman. The Cattlemen's Round-Up for Crippled Children benefits the West Texas Rehabilitation Center with campuses in Abilene, San Angelo and Snyder. stated Shelley V. Smith, WTRC's Executive Director.

"Livestock donated by ranchmen are collected at a designated point in each community and transported free to the auction site," Alexander explained. "The county chairman's role is to make a personal pledge, then ask friends and neighbors to join them in the annual CRCC drive."

### PROPERTY TAXES— GOOD INTENTIONS AREN'T ENOUGH

I want to talk this week about taxes and good intentions.

As I travel around Texas, I notice that what's known as the Peveto Bill is the subject of much talk and controversy. This bill, named after state representative Wayne Peveto, is a tax reform law: legislation of the best intention.

The law was designed to end confusion and unfairness in the way property taxes were assessed. Property was often on different tax rolls at different values. Older properties went years, sometimes decades, without being revalued or updated. New construction and newly sold property was on the rolls at more correct values and so people who owned it paid a higher share of taxes. Some property was simply left off the rolls entirely. The system was confusing and inequitable

In an attempt to correct these problems, the Peveto Bill created property tax appraisal boards for each Texas county. These boards were charged with the re: ponsibility of setting all property at its full value-as residential or commercial property or as land used for agricultural purposes. Taxes could then be levied on this accurately assessed property according to the needs of the taxing entities.

It sounded good, but it hasn't worked. The biggest problem is that the people on the appraisal boards are appointed, not elected. They are not accountable to the taxpavers. So now we have a new, faceless bureaucracy to deal with. It amounts to taxation without representation.

My opponent has been on both sides of this issue, first supporting the bill in the legislature—then doing an aboutface and calling it bad legisla-

tion after it was passed.
The Peveto Bill, though well-intentioned, has created problems which must be dealt selections with in the next legislature and as your next Lt. Governor, I will do just that. If you have any thoughts on this subject. please write me at 1213 W. 34th, Austin, 78705.


