The city of Robert Lee received a check from State Comptroller Bob Bullock's office for \$1,810.61 as its share of 1-percent sales tax for October. Payments for 1982 to date are \$28,498.37, up 39.20% from same period in 1981. The statewide total so far this year is up 11% over the 1981 total at the same time last year. The county-wide total of \$45,946.93 is up 36.06% over 1981 total at the same date.

Oil, Natural Gas Brings \$104.4 Million To County's Economy

The Sale of Crude Oil and Natural Gas from Coke County wells in 1981 enriched the county's economy and accounted for \$104.4-million of the \$44 billion value placed on Texas petroleum production last year.

In a report on the economic impact of oil and gas industry operations in the significant producing counties of Texas, Dallas-based Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association said the county ranked 100th among Texas' 254 counties on the basis of value of its marketed petroleum production. This production includes condensate and casinghead gas.

The county's wells produced 2.4-million barrels of crude oil, valued at \$82.3-million, and 12.4-billion cubic feet of natural gas, valued at \$22.1-million. Owners of royalty in the county received \$13.1-million as their share of the output, the Association noted.

"Although the oil and gas industry is suffering through a slowdown in drilling -- attributable in large part to a worldwide decline in demand for petroleum products -- it continues to be the cornerstone of the economy of Texas and many of its counties," said the Association's chairman, Avery Rush Jr., of Amarillo. "Oil and gas producers operating in Texas remain committed to the drilling of every well that is economically feasible," Rush added.

In addition to paying local, county, and state property taxes, producers in the county supported state government through production tax payments estimated at \$5.4-million, according to the Association. Crude oil taxes

amounted to \$3.8-million, while natural gas levies totalled \$1.6-million.

Based on Texas Employment Commission figures, some 209 oil and gas industry employees in the county received wages of about \$5.4-million in 1981.

In the search for new petroleum reserves in the county oil and gas operators spent a reported \$22.2-million in the drilling of 93 wells, including 36 wildcat, or exploratory, wells. This effort resulted in the completion of 53 oil wells and one gas well, although some \$7.1-million was lost in the drilling of 39 dry holes. As of April 1, 1982, there were 611 producing wells in the county; 576 oil and 35 gas.

Petroleum processing also contributed to the county economy, with two natural gasoline processing plants, having a total daily capacity of 66.1-million cubic feet of natural gas, and one petrochemical plant in operation.

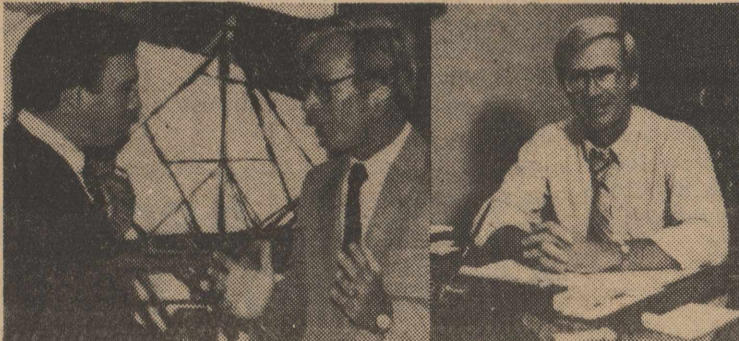

STEERS BLANK HORNETS IN HOMECOMING GAME, 26-0

The Robert Lee Steers treated a homecoming crowd to a impressive victory over the Irion Co. Hornets from Mertzon, with a shut-out and a showing of all the younger talent of future players. The score by the fourth quarter had some breathing room, so everybody, except the waterboy, got into the act. The Steers offense has improved so much since district started that it's a joy to watch.

1st QUARTER

The Hornets received the opening kickoff and after running two plays, they fumbled and Kyle Gibbs recovered at the Hornet 34. The Steers quickly make a first down at the 16 and three plays later Skinner carried it over from the 9 yard line for a TD. The extras failed and with 3 minutes gone it is 6 to 0. Gibbs kicked the extra points and it was 26 to 0. The Steers kickoff and the Hornets got to run four plays before they fumbled again with Abalos getting his 2nd recovery

at the Hornets 36. The Steers made a first as the 3rd Quarter ends.

4th QUARTER

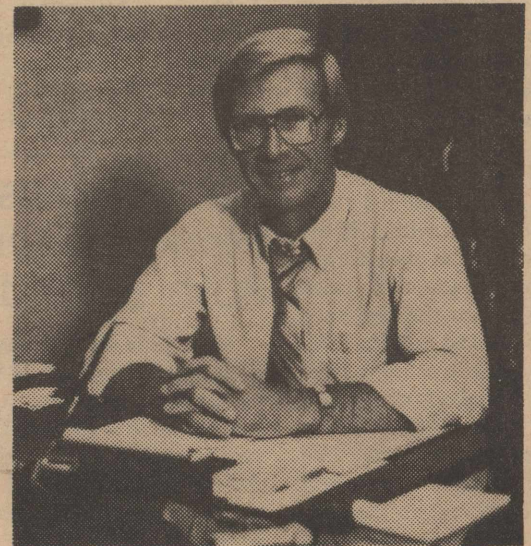

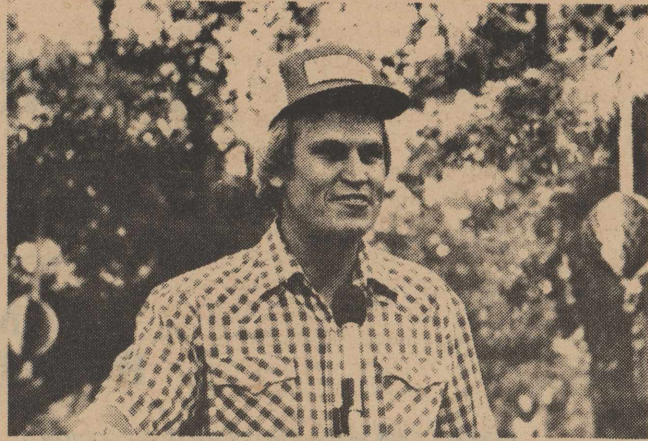
The '64 Study Club will make bluebonnet planting their special program and are urging others to join in the beautification of lots, thoroughfares, and open areas.

WTU Buying Cheaper Gas

West Texas Utilities Co. has entered a gas purchase agreement with Haskell Gathering Co. which could result in lower fuel costs at its Paint Creek Power Station.

WTU has begun taking a small volume of low Btu gas, and is expected to take more when the gathering firm's pipelines are extended to additional wells in Haskell and Throckmorton counties. The Paint Creek plant is on Lake Stamford in southeastern Haskell County.

The gas is cheaper than WTU's main supply, but is of lower

quality, according to Walter Meller, WTU's manager of system production.

"Because it is a lower Btu gas, it must be blended with other gas before it can be burned in our boilers," Meller said. "But we are doing everything we can to buy gas where there is a price advantage."

He said WTU is in the process of negotiating for low Btu gas at some of its other power plants. The company's contract with its principle supplier, which was renegotiated this past year, permits WTU to purchase gas from other sources, and WTU does so when it is available. The Company has eight major power plants, all of which burn natural gas as the primary fuel.
