showing windows, doors, electrical outless, and draw tiny pictures of the furniture you're considering to the scale of 1 foot to each quarter inch. An -(oot sofa would be 2
inches long. A 88 inch table would be 1 inch long, ett. Then cut out each piece of furniinches long. A 4 inch table would be linch hong. etc. Then cut out eaci
ture with scissors. Place your furniture cut-outs in your room layout. You can take a set of crayons and color your floors and all the other pieces, and
