New call for flexibility

CAMP DAVID, Md (AP) — The Mideast summit headed into the weekend with a renewed call by the United States for more flexibility from Egyptian and Israeli leaders.

"If we had enough (flexibility), presumably we would all go home now," White House press secretary Jody Powell said Friday

As the conference moved toward the Jewish Sabbath beginning at sundown, Powell said he expected the talks to last at least until Sunday For the eighth day in a row, Israeli

Prime Minister Menachem Begin and Egyptian President Anwar Sadat did not meet formally

Powell, who is acting as spokesman for all three governments, said "such a meeting is not called for" President Carter, maintaining his

role as middleman, met with Israeli Foreign Minister Moshe Dayan On Thursday, Dayan had met with Sadat Under persistent questioning at his daily briefing. Powell said he was

daily briefing, Powell said he was aware of rumors that Begin and Sadat did not get along well but that he "was not in a position to describe the atmosphere"

He did not deny the rumors directly, but told reporters that no member of the Israeli or Egyptian delegations had "indicated" to him there was ill will between the two leaders

No reason was given for the talks stretching into the weekend Powell said the future of both the Sinai and the West Bank of the Jordan

River was under discussion
This was the first public acknowledgement that Begin and Sadat stood apart on the Sinai as well as the West

Bank
Powell reaffirmed that "more flexi

bility and progress was needed."

An aide to Begin, Yehuda Avner, told leaders of the Israel Bonds organization in Washington, that Begin is the first Israeli government leader to have to confront the problem of drawing up Israel's borders in negotiations with Arab governments.

But Asner said the Camp David meeting has not progressed far enough for the two sides to engage in mapmaking

At Camp David, one knowledgeable official, declining to be identified, said the conference would not end before next Monday

This source discounted pessimistic accounts in the Egyptian press as a form of psychological pressure on Israel One of the Egyptian accounts rated chances of agreement as "virtually nil" and said Sadat probably would break off the talks.

Dog's disappearance raises several queries

By LANA CUNNINGHAM R-T Staff Writer

Rosann disappeared one day. The owner is mad at the animal control department but has no proof that's where her small dog was taken. Another woman who thinks she picked up the dog in question also is upset with the department because they put it

to sleep the same day she took it to them.

While there is no proof to show it was Rosann that was picked up and taken to the pound, the incident does bring questions as to why some animals are put to sleep at the shelter before 72 hours are up and who is qualified to make the decisions on

these cases

After talking with Rosann's owner and checking the record on the dog taken to the shelter, it is unlikely it was Rosann that was taken. The dog's owner said her pet was in good health and had a collar. The woman who found a dog in the street at the intersection of North A. Street and Cuthbert Avenue said the animal had no collar.

Records at the shelter show the dog brought in by the woman that morning was very anemic and had white gums as a result. "We told her the dog probably would be put to sleep because of the condition it was in," said one employee at the shelter. The shelter was crowded that day and the sick dogs were put to

sleep first, she explained
But, questioned one of the
women involved in the incident,
who is qualified to decide if the
dog is sick. Dalton Byerly,
director of the animal control
department, said he has worked

in the field of animal control for more than 30 years and has taken sessions at universities on the topic of animal control, and feels he is qualified

The shelter also has two veterinary technicians. These people obtain the two-year degree at a college and then work with veterinarians in their clinics.

But, some veterinarians disagree on that point. Dr. Tom Green said decisions about a sick animal "sometimes are pretty difficult to make even when trained in this capacity." He suggested the city of Midland check into hiring a fulltime veterinarian or splitting the cost of one with the city of Odessa.

one with the city of Odessa.

The shelter has been run as a separate department for less than a year. Previously it had been under the police department. The number of animals handled by the department in the month of August was 764, Byerly said. Of that number, 526 were put to sleep. The rest were adopted or reclaimed by the owner, he added. Because of this large number and the size of the facility, Byerly said many of the animals are put to sleep at the end of 72 hours.

"The amount of animals in the shelter makes us make this decision," he said. "If there is no known owner or the animal is sick it is put to sleep. If we put an animal to sleep, we felt in our conscience it was the best thing to do."

The shelter has 20 pens for dogs and often has to keep four to five dogs in each pen. If they have large dogs, personnel at the facility try to put only two

ployees hired in the future

The binding decision concluded a prolonged contract dispute but the possibility of a mail strike lingered.

Postal strikes are barred by federal law, and participants could be dismissed, fined and sent to jail

The union leaders said they were pleased with the additional pay raise — at least \$100 a year more per worker than under a previously rejected settlement — and current workers lifetime protection from lay off. But they were unhappy with a provision that would allow some lay offs in the future.

"I'm not entirely pleased," said Emmet Andrews, president of the 299,000-member American Postal Workers Union, after reviewing the binding decision by mediator James Healy. But Andrews said he thought his members would ratify the pact.

The dissatisfaction came in the form of a warning from several members that they "wouldn't wait fores er" for action to be taken.

Eddie Gomez, an Odessa Brown Berets major, said that sourceswithin the Justice Department have indicat ed eight indictments have been prepared alleging civil rights violations in Lozano's death

John Wilson, public information of ficer for the Justice Department in Washingtin, D.C., declined comment on the status of the review of the investigation by the civil rights division beyond saying it is "still continuing"

However, Wilson said that the investigation is being hampered by the fact that a transcript of the Midland federal grand jury proceeding "has

not reached Washington, D.C. yet."
Wilson said he has no idea what's causing the delay. No decisions can be made, he said, until the transcript is "thoroughly reviewed" by the Civil Rights Division.

Asked about the references to eight indictments being prepared, Wilson said, "I don't think there were eight persons involved."

As to the procedure the Civil Rights Division will follow when its investigation review is finished, Wilson said if it is determined the grand jury probe produced evidence of an incriminating nature against anyone, then attorneys would present charges in an indictment handed to the Midland grand jury. The panel then would determine whether to true bill or no bill any individual named, Wilson said.

Lozano died January 22 in the Ector County Jail


Ector County Sheriff Elton Faught initially said Lozano, 27, who was jailed following a traffic incident and a scuffle with lawmen, committed suicide by ramming his head against the window of his jail cell door. However, an Ector County coroner's inquest in April ruled that death was accidental, apparently resulting from neck injuries the inmate received when lawmen tried to restrain him.

Death by lethal injection set for condemned Odessan

Condemned Odessa murderer James Paul Burns is scheduled to die by lethal injection Oct. 2, follow ing the rejection of his appeal by Judge John H. Wood Jr. of the Western District of Texas

Judge Wood rejected Burns' contention that the method of execution was cruel and unusual punishment

Burns was convicted February 1974 by an Ector County jury in the Aug. 3, 1973, beating death of G.W. (Pete) McDonald.

A spokesman for the Department of Public Safety said the first execution by injection is slated for Sept. 20. Texas has not executed anyone since a Harris County man died in the electric chair on July 30, 1964.

The original verdict returned by the jury required death in the electric chair

Court-appointed defense attorney Richard Clarkson appealed that sentence to the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals, contending nine jurors had been excluded from the jury because they expressed doubts about the death penalty

The conviction was upheld by the Texas court, and Clarkson appealed to the U.S. Supreme Court for a re-

On Dec. 21, 1977, Judge R.L. McKim of the 161st District Court sentenced Burns to death by extraneous injec-

Prosecutors said Burns and two other men picked up McDonald as he was leaving an Odessa drive-in restaurant on Aug. 3, 1973, and took him to a caliche pit where he was beaten and robbed.

McDonald, 57, died from brain injuries received in the assault

large dogs in one pen. Byerly said they are planning to enclose the outside pens to give them more room for the dogs. Cats have been moved to an empty house next door which is being converted for the furry felines and into offices for the person-

Byerly said the inventory of dogs at the shelter should be no more than 50 per day, but often it is 65. He puts the blame for the large number on the pet owner."They did not have the dog confined or it would not have been picked up," he said. On the days the shelter has too many animals, the director said the drivers are told only to pick up dogs without tags and leave

'It's difficult to handle this iob " Byerly admitted. He said. the public gets more upset about their dogs than they about their own family. "There is a high emotionalism here.

Another Midland veterinarian described the director's job as "a thankless one" even though he said he may disagree with Byerly on some things. "Probably any one you put in that job will have the same problems. I realize that sometimes a veterinarian is not available and they have to make decisions on the dog. I don't care who you put into that animal control job, he's going to step on someone's

Green sees a cause of any problems with the department coming from the size of the shelter. "Within the next five years we may see a bond issue to expand it. It is not something where we can stick our head in a hole. It should be a responsibility shared by the community.

He said the facility is func tional but does not feel it has the capacity to handle the number of animals in Midland now, "If they (Midlanders) want a better facility and to stop things from happening, they are going to have to spend some money.

Judge rejects Mitchell's plea for release

MONTGOMERY, Ala (AP) - U.S District Judge Prank M. Johnson Jr. rejected former Attorney General John N. Mitchell's claim of "bias and vindictiveness" by the U.S. Parole Commission, and refused on Friday to order Mitchell's early release from

Johnson denied Mitchell's three challenges of the commission's decision not to parole him until next Jan 19 Johnson also refused to grant Mitchell a hearing on his claims.

Regional parole commissioners meeting in Atlanta, recommended on July 5 either that Mitchell be paroled on Aug 19 or that his case be considered by the national commissioners as an "original jurisdiction" case

Mitchell then filed suit in federal court here, saving the panel did not properly credit him with five months of medical furlough time, penalized him for appealing the decision of the regional commissioners and denied him due process because one of the commissioners was biased against

Diesel-powered Volkswagens get best fuel economy, says EPA study

WASHINGTON (AP) - With a top performance of 41 miles per gallon, the diesel-powered Volkswagen Rabbit provides the best fuel economy of any automobile sold in the United States, the Environmental Protection Agency announced Friday

The No. 1-ranked German-made Rabbit, equipped with a five-speed manual transmission, was followed by a diesel-powered Volkwagen Rabbit with a four-speed manual transmission, which gets an estimated 40 mpg. Placing third was the diesel-fueled Volkswagen Dasher, which gets

Consistent with the trend in past years, the average miles per gallon for all 1979 models thus far tested is slightly higher than last year's." EPA administrator Douglas Costle said of the agency's annual fuel economy

Costle said the 1979 models are averaging 19.9 miles per gallon com

The average annual fuel cost for the top-rated 1979 Rabbit was estimated at \$220, a figure based on a car driven 15,000 miles and an average diesel fuel cost of 60 cents per gallon. For gasoline-powered cars, the cost is based on a 70-cent per gallon fuel

The Datsun 210, a Japanese-made car, ranked No.4 with 35 mpg - the highest ranking for a gasolinepowered car. At the bottom of the list was the

Aston Martin V-8, which the EPA said gets only 8 mpg. Just above that were four cars listed as getting 10 mpg. They are the Cadillac limousine, the Cadillac with the commercial chassis, Jaguar XJ and Jaguar XJS. All of the top 10 cars are classified

as subcompacts and were either of foreign make or largely manufactured abroad by subsidiaries of M.S. automakers, the EPA said.

MUNICH West Germany (AP) -Willy Messerschmitt, the German aircraft pioneer whose Me-109 fighter ruled the skies early in World War II. died at age 80 Friday - the tradition al anniversary of the 1940 Battle of

Born June 26, 1898, the son of a wealthy Frankfurt wine merchant was lured to flight as a teen ager and had built and flown his own glider by

Messerschmitt's most widely known warplane was the Me 109, a single-engine fighter and defensive workhorse of Hermann Goering's Luftwaffe. More than 30,000 of the propeller-driven fighters had been built by theend of the war.

His death came on the day Britons mark as the anniversary of the Battle of Britain, the aerial duel in the summer and fall of 1940 in which Luftwaffe raiders, including Messerschmitt's Me-109s, battled the Royal Air Force for control of the skies over

Despite numerical superiority, the Nazis suffered their first major setback of the war, failing in their bid to crush the RAF

Messerschmitt's twin-engine jet fighter, the Me-262, was built in strict secrecy in 1941, but strategy disputes with the Nazi high command kept it from being produced until late in the war when Allied bombers had already made a shambles of Messerschmitt's production lines

Arrested in 1945 by the Americans for his involvement in the Nazi re gime. Messerschmitt was interned briefly. Three years later a German de Nazification court in Augsburg tried him on charges of being a "fellow traveler" of the Nazis. The court found him innocent and said he was a "reluctant beneficiary" of the re-

Messerschmidt is survived by his widow. Lilly von Michel-Raulino, whom he married in 1951

A bunch of things could be said about the Captain & to offset a popular (meaning word-of-mouth and Tennille, but the main thing is this: They give you your money's worth if you listen with awareness.

A 12-inch downpour paralyzed northeast Louisiana on Friday, flooding streets and houses with waters that reached 8 feet deep in some places.

Further to the north, in Little Rock, Ark., two persons were still missing on Friday from flooding two days earlier which claimed 10 lives.

The heaviest rain on Friday was recorded at the Monroe, La., airport, where 111/2 inches had fallen by the time forecasters withdrew flash flood warnings over a seven-parish area.

In Monroe, La., gas lines broke and electrical and telephone service failed. Some bridges were reported washed out, and a nursing home was evacuated.

The flooding drove 200 to 300 families from their homes during the night. Forty National Guardsmen were called up to aid city officials.

The National Weather Service said waters were receding in Louisiana and Arkansas.

Reminiscent of Juliette Greco's, Tennille's recorded or live voice comes across as sensuality made audible. The point is: Only Tennille can sing a song about muskrats in love and heat the place up in the process.

There were some special highlights. The titles even suggest how physically and emotionally oriented is their music. "You Need a Woman Tonight." "Was It Good Enough." "You've Never Done It Like That." "The Way I Want To Touch You." And less pointedly "Love Will Keep Us Together," "Lonely "Dixie Hummingbird" and Johnny Mercer's never-done-better "Dream.

The Captain and Tennille ought to get someone to write them another song. This one titled "A One-Night Stand in Midland." The title's apropos if only in that it tells everyone who opted for the fight that the C & T are very sexy, very alive and outspoken,


Girl hospitalized after accident with police car





Siberian Buddhism physically isolated by Soviet authorities

IVOLGINSK, U.S.S.R. (AP) -From a distance the monastery appears miniscule, a secluded tight cluster nearly lost in the snowy, stark, treeless expanse stretching back to the low Khamar-Daban mountains.

Only after turning off the main road from Ulan-ude and heading closer across the bare plain does the Datsan itself begin to take shape, with its crimson and gold-gilt roof tiers

slightly upturned toward the sky. This datsan, or temple, and the fenced-in compound surrounding it is the officially designated spiritual home for Buddhists in the Soviet

In 1916, one year before the Bolshevik revolution, there were about 16,-000 lamas, or monks, at 36 Buddhist monasteries in Butya-tia, this region of Siberia east of Lake Baikal and just north of Outer Mongolia. Also, approximately 600,000 so-called district lamas lived among the people in rural

Now, by comparison, Soviet Buryatia has one monastery, the Ivolginsk compound, with a total of 28 monks. The only other Buddhist monastery still existing in the Soviet Union, at Aga in the Chita region farther east, has 12 monks. The number of district lamas has dropped to about 300.

This precipitous decline resulted

The monastery's physical isolation only begins to suggest the extent to which Soviet authorities have sought to suppress, isolate, and co-opt for political purposes the centuries-old practice of Buddhism among Mongolian-derived peoples of eastern Siberia.

Buddhism initially spread into the Russian empire from Mongolia in the 17th century.

largely from an intensive anti-Bud-dhist drive launched under Stalin in

In 1928, communist-led "militant tored." godless" agitators began interfering with religious processions, blocking the celebration of Buddhist holidays and closing datsans.

Nine years later, scores of lamas were arrested and "liquidated" on charges such as conspiring to disrupt work on collective farms, plotting to blow up bridges, spreading pro-Japa-nese propaganda and encouraging

"pan-Mongolism." All Buddhist monasteries and temples were shut down, and it was not until 1946 that Soviet authorities permitted the reopening of the Aga monastery. The Ivolginsk monastery was later established on the site of a decaying datsan that dated back to

Bandido-hambo Lama Zhambal Dorzh Gomboyev, the chief lama at Ivolginsk and official head of Buddhism in the Soviet Union, told a visiting group of western correspondents that in the 1920s and '30s "our country went through a hard time."

"There were lamas who could not accept the new changes, people who could not understand," the 80-yearold monk said. "Those were difficult times, we admit. But later on, justice triumphed. Our rights were res-

Lama Gomboyev recalled that in the 1930s he himself had been forced to abandon his religious duties and work in a glass factory, until he was called up for the Soviet army in World War II. During the war, he was twice seriously wounded in battles near Stalingrad and Leningrad.

Asked how he could justify taking part in the war despite the basic Buddhist tenet against killing, Gom-boyev said he had been "acting as a citizen of my country ... in the holy, noble cause of defense."

The lama was repeatedly questioned about how many practicing Buddhist believers there currently are in the Soviet Union.

A recent western estimate has put the overall number at about 50,000, including Buddhists in the Tuva area of Siberia and among the Kalmyk people near the Capsian sea, in addition to the Buryats.

Gomboyev, however, refused to give any figures, even approximate ones. "We do not keep such records or statistics, because that would be against our legislation," he replied, adding that "This is a very delicate

Remains of ark not likely found

Accounts in the popular media late-ly have implied that remains of Noah's Ark have been found on Mount Ararat in Turkey. But it's not likely, says an Old Testament scholar who has surveyed the evidence.

The Rev. Dr. Lloyd R. Bailey of Duke University Divinity School concludes that the implications circulated in recent filmed and written accounts are based on hearsay evidence and invalid scientific tests.

Others, including scientists at the University of California and the University of Miami, also have challenged claims that wood from the ancient ark has been found high on the snow-sheathed mountain.

Bailey gives a full-scale airing to the issue in a book, "Where is Noah's Ark," being published by Abingdon Press. He particularly takes issue with an NBC-TV movie, "In Search of Noah's Ark."

'Mountains of Ararat" is the key

phrase used in Genesis 8:4 in reference to the ark's resting place after the flood.

While popular assumptions have been that the landing was on Mount Ararat, located in Armenia near the Turkish border with the Soviet Union and Iran, the Bible does not say that. The ancient land of Ararat contained several mountain ranges, Bailey says, with various cultures picking various ranges and mountains as the

-Ancient reports of the ark's sight-

Disaster strikes Pack in fourth quarter

Old man disaster reared his ugly head at Memorial Stadium Friday night and slapped the Midland High Bulldogs right in the kisser as the El Paso Eastwood Troopers struck in the fourth quarter for a heart thumping 21-14 grid victory.

Midland had taken a 14-7 lead early in the second period, but a series of startling events lifted the Troopers over the shocked Purple Pack in the second half. If tears are going to flow this season for the Bulldogs, then this was the game that would bring rain drops from misty eyes.

With the score knotted at 14 in the final quarter, Midland made goalward moves twice and came up empty handed while Eastwood turned one of the stalled attempts for an 80-yard TD parade in only two plays. The other Midland High drive ended at the Eastwood seven yard line late in the fourth period with a costly

EARLY IN the fourth quarter, Midland cranked the offense up at its own 47-yard line after Earl Michie picked off an errant Trooper pass. A brillant flea-flicker pass gave Midland a first down at the 18-yard line. Quarterback Tommy Somers hit end Jerry Hollums with a 15-yard pass and Hollums lateraled to running back Billy Applin for an additional 17 steps, and the Bulldogs were cooking. Later Randy Moore gained nine to the Trooper 11, but that was two yards shy of a first down and Coach Dennie Hays elected to try a field goal. Bobby Stovall's kick for a 17-14 lead turned wide and the Troopers took over on downs.

EASTWOOD then exploded in no uncertain terms as Alan Reid, who led all rushers with 156 yards in 20 carries, gained five before reserve back Chuck Heist busted 75-yards up the Pack's middle on a simple dive play for what proved to be the win-

ning margin.

Ali wins title from Spinks

NEW ORLEANS (AP) - Muhammad Ali, making Leon Spinks look like an amateur on several occasions, pounded out a one-sided decision Friday night in the Superdome and - at age 36 - became the first man to win the world heavyweight championship

three times. With chants of "Ali, Ali" thundering in his ears, the man who calls himself "The Greatest" once again rose to the occasion. Ali danced and moved; stuck Spinks

with jabs, beat him to the punch with hooks and short rights, tied him upalong the ropes, and made the 25year-old ex-Marine's first title deense a thoroughly frustrating eve-

THE WORLD Boxing Council did not recognize the 15-round bout as a

championship contest, but it would be difficult to convince anyone watching on this night that Ali is not the champion of the world

Ali himself had said before the fight that if he won, he would consider himself champion because WBA king Larry Holmes is a paper champion.

Many people had come to New Or-

leans because they thought it might be Ali's last hurrah. It might be that - Ali has indicated he would not fight again even if he wins - but then again, this incredible athlete might keep rolling along just like the mighty

Mississippi River. Immediately after the fight, the once-again champion said he would have to think about whether he would fight again.

Judge Ernest Cojoe and referee Lucien Jpubert each scored it 10 rounds for Ali, four for Spinks and one even. Judge Herman Dueitriex called it 11-4

The Associated Press had Ali ahead, 12-3.

SO OUTCLASSED was Spinks that one of the rounds he got, the fifth, was taken away from Ali by the referee for holding with his glove behind Spinks' neck.

"It's my biggest fight because I'm older and I realize it's my last fight," Ali had said before his 24th heavyweight championship bout.
It might not be his last fight, and on

this night, Ali did not look 36 years

Ali never really let Spinks get started. And for most of the night, Spinks looked like a young man making his ninth pro fight rather than the heavy-weight champion of the year, which he became by upsetting Ali on a split 15-round decision in Las Vegas last

On that night, Ali tired visibly as Spinks came on to win the last three rounds in impressive fashion. But on this evening, Ali was in shape and in charge from start to finish, and as the fight drew to a close, the only way Spinks could win was by a knockout. The 25-year-old from a St. Louis ghetto never came close to hurting

as any heavyweight who ever lived. IT WAS in this fabled river town on Sept. 7, 1892 that another boxing era

ended when the great John L. Sullivan lost to age and James J. Corbett.

Ali refused to bow to age as he moved better than he has for several fights and used every bit of his ring

inches short of the goal.



IN THE 12th, Ali flashed home a five-punch series to the head and a good right to the jaw that rocked Spinks. He also snapped Spinks' head back as if it was on a swivel with a right to the chin.





During his 14 years with the Dodgers, he posted a 265 batting average and played in seven World Series. He was known in Los Angeles as the hitter who followed Maury Wills in the batting order and helped the shortstop establish base stealing rec-

A native of Nashville, Tenn., Gilliam played with the Baltimore Elite Giants of the Negro leagues before being signed by the Dodgers.

Couple pleads for test tube research

Tennessee couple appealed to the government Friday to resume funding of test-tube fertilization research, while critics charged that it would lead to the laboratory slaughter of embryonic human lives.

The arguments were aired as an HEW Ethics Advisory Board began sifting through the evidence on both the science and morality of the still uncertain techniques that produced a healthy baby in England.

Despite the success of researchers who aided the parents of Louise Joy Brown, "our knowledge of precisely what they did is very limited," James C. Gaither, a San Francisco lawyer who is chairman of the panel, told reporters.

Gaither said the 14-member panel of doctors, lawyers, laymen, academics and a priest was unlikely to take any stand on the issue before January or February at the earliest.

Health, Education and Welfare Secretary Joseph A. Califano Jr. must decide after getting the panel's advice whether to allow taxpayers' dollars to be spent on this research for the first time since 1975.

Califano, in a memo read to the 100 persons at the meeting in the National Institutes of Health in suburban Bethesda, Md., said test-tube fertilization holds out "enormous promise" to infertile couples, but also raises serious questions about possible damage to the fetus that could lead to abnormal

comparison could be made. However,

"Will this research lead to selective breeding, to attempts to control the genetic makeup of offspring or to the use of 'surrogate parents' where ... rich women might pay poor women to carry their children?" Califano asked in the memo. He instructed the board to hold public hearings in 10 regions of the country "to stimulate a national

Princeton University religion professor Paul Ramsey said the government should "stop embryo manipulation as a form of human genesis.

"Millions of U.S. citizens who op-pose abortion will bring the same moral objection against in vitro fertilization because of the numerous 'discards' the procedure requires," de-

clared Ramsey.

But LeRoy Walters, director of Georgetown University's Center for Bioethics, who traced the ethical debate for the panel, said he is inclined to feel that "in early stages of embryonic development ... you are not dealing with a human subject in the full sense of the term.

Morality, ethics of test tube fertilization opened to debate

CLEVELAND (AP) -Public hearings on test tube fertilization and test tube babies will be held across the country to allow a broad spectrum of debate on the moral and ethical issues, Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare Joseph A. Califano announced Friday

Both hearings in each of HEW's 10 regions and consideration by HEW's Ethics Advisory Board are necessary because many difficult questions are being decided by the executive branch, Califano told a Cleveland civic group.

Open discussions are important, Califano added, because "closed doors breed distrust even if what happen behind those doors is perfectly legitimate."

Perhaps our people cannot share in making every big decision; but they should at least see them made," said Cali-

The questions raised by test tube fertilization are confusing, he said. "Is the technology a boon for mankind? Or a dangerous field that increases the risk of birth defects and human trag-

Amputees help kids

OTTAWA (AP) - With the number of war veterans declining, the War Amps of Canada are finding new challenges helping children who have lost a limb, often at play. 





NEW YORK (AP) -Alcoholics who quit drinking are in danger of floating off on a "pink cloud" of euphoria, according to a six-year study by the New York City Affiliate of the National Council on Alcohol-

The euphoria inevitably collapses with a shock that may send people back to the bottle, says Charles E. Shirley of the affiliate. The finding is based on an analysis of the behavior of 3,000 people counseled through the early stages of sobriety at a Long Island hospital.

"Practically every alcoholic who stops drinking becomes euphoric either over the prospects of a wildly wonderful new life or because of the sudden release from the depressant effects of years of alcohol abuse," Shirley says. "One problem drinker.

Endotoxins are normally present all around us, in our food and water, on our skin, in the gut, says Dr. Jack Levin of Johns Hopkins. Only when they enter the bloodstream or other body fluids do they become harmful and cause fever, shock or death.

The FDA requires that all substances injected into the body be tested for endotoxin contamination. The horseshoe crab blood to be used for this purpose is collected from crabs caught on beaches as the tide goes out. The crabs are then returned unharmed to







AP Science Writer

NEW YORK (AP) -Alcoholics who quitdrinking are in danger of floating off on a "pink cloud" of euphoria, according to a six-year study by the New York City Affiliate of the National Council on Alcohol-

The euphoria inevitably collapses with a shock that may send people back to the bottle, says Charles E. Shirley of the affiliate. The finding is based on an analysis of the behavior of 3,000 people counseled through the early stages of sobriety at a Long Island hospital.

"Practically every alcoholic who stops drinking becomes euphoric either over the prospects of a wildly wonderful new life or because of the sudden release from the depressant effects of years of alcohol abuse,"

"One problem drinker, who came into a substantial inheritance shortly before he gave up liquor became so convinced after he quit that he could do no wrong that he lost \$50,000 in reckless stock market specula-

Shirley said any alcoholism treatment must recognize the danger and provide the support needed to get through

poisons that may contaminate vaccines and intravenous fluids.

The extract is called LAL, for limulus amebocyte lysate, and is the most sensitive known detector of bacterial poisons called endotoxins, says The Johns Hopkins Medical Institutions, where the discovery was

Endotoxins are normally present all around us, in our food and water, on our skin, in the gut, says Dr. Jack Levin of Johns Hopkins. Only when they enter the bloodstream or other body fluids do they become harmful and cause fever, shock or death.

The FDA requires that all substances injected into the body be tested for endotoxin contamination. The horseshoe crab blood to be used for this purpose is collected from crabs caught on beaches as the tide goes out. The crabs are then returned unharmed to

The director of NCI, Arthur Upton, says many scientists agree that "factors in diet and nutrition appear to account for a large number of human cancers."


Cancer of the colon, for example, is more common in developed countries where people have a higher fat intake. Within the United States, religious groups that avoid meat and animal fats have a lower incidence of colon cancer.

"Although many other differences between rich and poor countries and within countries could explain the correlations between diet and cancer rates, nutrition is one of the most promising areas for future research," says David Rose of the University of Wisconsin-Madison Clinical Cancer Center.

A new research program by the National Foundation-March of Dimes is aimed at determining to what extent premature birth and low birthweight may impair budget for studies of the mental development.


