in Mexico.

But United States officials Energy and State have confirmed that Mexican reserves equal those of Saudi Arabia's reserves of 150 billion barrels. Some U.S. oil experts estumate mexice
may run as high as 300 billion bar rels.
res President Portillo has confirmed his nation's astounding energy potential, what does it mean for
the United States? What does mean for Mexico?
Well, first of all, it does not
mean this country can ease off on its conservationist energy policie or its efforts to become more self
sufficient through expanded $U$. sufficient through expanded U.S
oil exploration and production. Even though enhanced supplie would tend to moderate world oil prices. and even though Mexico steadfastly has refused to join the ticipated the price of Mexican oil will be in the neighborhood of to day's OPEC price of $\$ 12.70$ per barrel.
It will matter little whether we purchase oil from the Mexicans or
the Arabs: importing about 45 percent of U.S. energy needs still will represent a vast amount of
wealth which tilts the balance of trade against the U.S. and floods the world with cheapened dollars.
The big need is to minimize oil im ports in every way possible.
Moreover, while the huge oil
reserves of our southern neighbo reserves of our southern neighbor
inevitably will lessen U.S.
