Judge issues work orders

WASHINGTON (AP) — A federal judge issued a back-to-work order Friday against striking rail clerks and the union's president said he would order an end to the 4-day shutdown that has crippled the nation's railroad network

Industry officials said some service would begin as soon as pickets were

Judge Aubrey E. Robinson Jr. issued a 10-day restraining order at the request of the industry and the federal government to enforce a presidential back to work order issued Thurs-

Fred Kroll, president of the Brotherhood of Railway and Airline Clerks. called the judge's order a "tremendous victory" and said: "I urge our

Robinson's order prohibits the union from striking and gives workers protection against feared repri-

The six-page order returns the industry and the union to the "status quo" that existed when the BRAC began a strike against the Norfolk &

That means that for the next 60 days the union is prohibited from striking and the industry is prohibited from changing work conditions and practices in effect before July 9.

In addition the railroads were or dered not to take reprisal against any employee because of events that occurred during the strike. In additon, railroads were ordered to recall all employees furloughed between July 10 and Thursday. Railroads do have the right, however, to furlough em ployees in the future under their normal union contracts

Robinson also ordered the union, the industry and the government back for a hearing on Oct. 10 for arguments on an injunction Sources said that, in the meantime, the union and industry would attempt to reach an agreement on terms of a longer lasting back-to-work order while efforts to resolve the dispute Robinson issued his back-to-work order after union, railroad and govpeople to return to work. ernment officials failed to reach an agreement on their own for ending the strike before his 4 p.m. EDT deadline yer expressed optimism the talks would succeed. Death of pope again mourned throughout world

VATICAN CITY (AP) — A stunned Roman Catholic Church, suddenly bereft of its new leader by the "inscrutable designs of God," mourned Friday the death of Pope John Paul I, the humble laborer's son whose brief but cheerful reign had heartened millions throughout the world The 65-year-old pontiff was found

dead in his bed Friday morning. stricken by a heart attack at 11 p.m. the night before. The light was on, an opened book of meditations lay nearby and, said a senior cardinal, his face still bore "his usual smile.

John Paul reigned as pontiff of the 700-million-member church for just 34 days, the shortest pontificate in modern history

"Providence took him away from us so suddenly," said Carlo Confalonieri, 85-year-old dean of the College of Cardinals "We are all with our eyes turned upward wondering about the inscrutable designs of God

Long-time friends of the pontiff, who had a history of frail health, said John Paul may have worked himself to death. "Evidently o' late he had to undergo efforts and tensions that he probably could not physically stand." said the Rev. Mario Senigaglia, secretary to the former Albino Luciani when he was cardinal of Venice.

"Possibly the burden was too much to bear for the new pope," commented Vienna's Cardinal Franz Koenig upon learning the news

As it did only 54 days ago on the death of 80-year-old Pope Paul VI, also of a heart attack, the church set into motion an ancient mourning rite and the process of choosing its 264th spiritual leader. The conclave of cardinals to elect a successor must open within 20 days of the pontiff's death by Oct. 18 at the latest.

Vatican observers speculated the cardinals would seek a pope like John Paul - an Italian with no links to the central church administration. "If the cardinal electors wanted a pastoral pope from Italy only five weeks ago, there should be no reason for them to change in such a short time," one observer commented.

Speculation centered on five Italian cardinals who head major dioceses. But Cardinal Koenig told an interviewer he believes a non-Italian pope is "very likely" this time

John Paul, who would have been 66 on Oct. 17, was a dark horse before he was elected to succeed Pope Paul in the first day of balloting Au of the shortest conclaves this cen-

A steady stream of tens of thousands of mourners - nuns in black, Italian political leaders in dark business suits, tourists in bright summery dress - filed past the pope's body as it lay in state beneath a fresco of angels in the Vatican's marble Clementine Hall, a few doors down from the bedroom where he died.

The pope was clad in red robes, white miter and red shoes. His head lay on two pillows atop the bier, a white crucifix standing behind. The hands were clasped, entwining a rosary. A pastoral staff rested be-

Being of the Democratic persuasion would enhance, not hinder, Lubbock attorney Kent Hance's effectiveness to represent West Texas in Congress. Hance told Midland Jaycees Friday. Hance, a state senator, is running

against Midland oilman George W

Bush for the 19th Congressional Dis-

trict seat He spoke before the Midland Jav cees at a noon luncheon Friday, winding up five days of quiet campaigning

in "Bush Country. Hance outlined the issues in the 19th District admitting similarities in thinking between he and Bush. Then, capitalizing on his experience

as a state senator, Hance said, "I know what it takes to be effective (as a congressman) In answer to the charge a Democrat would not be as effective as a Republican. Hance replied, "In the State

Senate I did not always agree with

(Gov. Dolph) Briscoe or (Lt. Gov. Bill) Hobby You learn how to disagree without being disagreeable." Although President Carter is a Democrat, Hance said he has not agreed with Carter's agriculture and energy policies. Being elected to Con-

gress would not make him change his mind on those policies, he added In his speech, Hance concentrated on energy, which is the major industry in Midland. The Natural Gas Bill approved this week by the U.S. Senate did not meet with the Lubbock attor-

ney's approval. Not only has the government's reg ulation of intrastate gas been opposed by the people in the industry, Hance said, but also, farmers in the northern part of the district are concerned they will not have enough natural gas to provide irrigation during the summer

He proposed removal of tangible and intangible drilling costs from the tax preference list. The tax on these low-producing wells is often more than what the producer can get from the well, he said.

'This bill (energy) is not a Republican or Democratic issue," Hance said. "If it was, it would have passed a long time ago because there are more Democrats in Congress than Republicans.

Inflation deficit spending were included on Hance's list of major issues. 'What you purchased with \$1 a year ago now costs \$1.85," he said. In the last special session of the state Legislature. Hance said, he sponsored a constitutional amendment which calls for the federal budget to be balanced. He proposed doing the

same thing in Congress On the federal level, if appropriations comes to \$500 billion and revenues only to \$450 billion, the government just prints \$50 billion more in money," Hance said.

High taxes has become an issue in many areas, Hance said. While he favors reducing taxes, he also encourages reduced spending, he said.

Otherwise, the inflation rate would skyrocket and the country would be burdened with a "\$170 to \$200 billion deficit compared to the \$38 billion deficit for this coming year," he

The Steiger Amendment proposes cutting the capital gains tax to 25 percent. Hance is in favor of the idea, but said he wants it cut to 15 percent. "This would provide more iobs than the Humphrey-Hawkins bill (on employment).

Serving as Hance's campaign manager for Midland will be Rocky Ford the candidate announced.



Floodwaters threaten Presidio

PRESIDIO, Texas (AP) - Rio Grande floodwaters aimed a crest at Presidio Friday night while reports of heavy flooding and some evacuations came from the Mexican city of Ojinaga across the river. The population of the Ojinaga area is about 15,000.

The flooding was caused by heavy flow from the Rio Conchos after storms earlier this week in northern Mexico

A spokesman for the International Boundary and Water Commission said several levees broke on the Mexican side of the river early Wednesday and that valley flooding was widespread.

He said levees on the American side were holding, but a new crest was heading for the International Bridge area. Crest there is 29 feet, and the river was reported at 23 feet and

"We know we have another flood on the way," the spokesman said.

"Ojinaga is not inundated, but the valleys are," he said. Ojinaga itself is located on slightly elevated ground.

U.N. plans supervision of Namibia elections

UNITED NATIONS (AP) - The Security Council called Friday for a large U.N. operation to supervise preindependence elections in Namibia, even though South Africa has rejected such supervision

A resolution providing for up to 7,500 U.N. troops to monitor the election and transition to independence was approved by a vote of 12-0, with the Soviet Union and Czechoslovakia abstaining and China not participat-

A series of speakers after the vote appealed to South Africa to cooperate with U.N. supervision of elections in the territory, also known as South-West Africa

South Africa has controlled the mineral-rich former German colony under a 1920 mandate from the League of Nations. The mandate was revoked by the United Nations in 1966 but South Africa refused to leave.

U.S. Secretary of State Cyrus Vance told the council: "It is ... a time for persistence and vigorous effort in persuading South Africa that its best interests and the best interests of the Namibian people lie in cooperating with the United Nations in the imple-

West German Foreign Minister Hans-Dietrich Genscher asked: "Is it really in South Africa's interest now to challenge the entire international community? Does it want to risk a bloody racial war with the endless suffering this inflicts upon the peo-

The U.N. plan is based on proposals worked out by five Western nations -The United States, France, West Germany, Britain and Canada

School trustees vote to change insurance plans

July or August to let us know what we were going to be facing instead of waiting until September. This has put us under a lot of pressure, and I don't appreciate it," Warren told Blue Cross representative Don Crawford.

Teacher spokesman Mary Dell Fryar listed six reasons she felt the board should change its decision. She said the increase in premiums under the TASB plan fell disproportionately on persons who covered both a spouse and chilren. In addition, she said, the TASB plan called for a \$1,300 maximum expense to the employee, while the Blue Cross plan would put the maximum amount of out-of-pocket expenses at \$500.

The loss of benefits for those people who had already met the \$100 deductible this year under the Blue Cross plan and the lack of a local office were other reasons she listed for staying with the current carrier

Board members chose the TASB plan because of the cost control factors built into it. "As I understand it, we will never be able to keep our premiums down or increase the bene-fits if we carry a plan that pays for the 'nickle and dime' stuff," Trustee Ann Page said.

The purpose of insurance, Warren said, was to protect the employee from catastrophic illness or accidents. The TASB plan allows the district to hold down costs by having the employee pay a larger portion of costs for less-than-catastrophic illnesses.

Board members also cited a special cash payment to the employee after 30 days hospitalization, dental coverage and built in life insurance as benefits of the TASB plan. "Whatever the decision here, we

are all doing what we think is best for the district," Warren told the teachers before the vote was taken.

Midland County commissioners Friday approved a tax roll increase of \$30,781,470, for 1978 yielding a total projected increase in tax revenue of

The total taxable property value in the county for 1978 is \$329,328,260 yielding a total of \$3,128,703 in county revenue, compared to \$298,879,460 in property which brought in \$2,839,434 in revenue last year, according to figures compiled by Elmo Linebarger, assessor-collector.

Valuation of personal property increased by \$11,885,070, jumping from \$38,912,150 to \$50,797,220. There was an \$8,264,810 increase in real estate valuation with the total going from \$138,603,260 to \$146,868,070 over a year's period.

Minerals valuation increased from \$80,282,280 to \$86,165,290, an increase of \$5,830,010 from 1977.

Utility valuations (\$33,028,320) experienced a \$2,704,020 increase, the banks tax roll (\$17,367,920) increased by \$1,982,810, and the railroad company valuations (\$530,160) jumped by

Pope John Paul earned popularity

By EDWARD MAGRI

VATICAN CITY (AP) - In a little more than a month, Pope John Paul I achieved the broad popularity that for 15 years had eluded Paul VI, his austere predecessor.

From the moment he stood smiling on St. Peter's balcony to be introduced to the world as the 263rd pontiff until his last audiences with bishops and prelates Thursday, Pope John Paul struck a responsive note from those who saw and listened to him.

His simple manners and speech quickly endeared him to the Romans who always looked upon Paul VI as rather aloof. Pope John Paul's smile seemed contagious, and he immediately drew large crowds at his public appearances.

"St. Peter's square was jammed to the brim for the noon blessing the past two Sundays — something that had occurred only very seldom previously," said Carlo Confalonieri, the 85-year-old cardinal

"It was the first time I met him privately and I found he was the hearty and happy man everybody was talking about. We left his room filled with joy," said the Rev. Henri De Riedmatten, a Swiss who was one of the prelates received by the pope Thursday

Here is a brief summary of some of Pope John Paul's activities in his 34 days as pontiff:

Aug. 26: Cardinal Albino Luciani, 65, is elected pope on the first day of balloting in one of the shortest conclaves ever. He appears briefly at St. Peter's balcony, saying bluntly that he had been surprised at his own election.

Aug. 27: In a speech to the cardinals he pledges to seek continued fulfillment of the Second Vatican Ecumenical Council and more discipline in the

Aug. 28: Reconfirms in their jobs all the Vaticanbased cardinals and prelates.

Aug. 29: Decides to do without the portable throne

and the coronation rite for his inauguration Mass. Aug. 30: In a speech to the cardinals he says he will respect "legitimate autonomy" of local churches but stresses need for "unity of discipline as well as

Aug. 31: Addressing the diplomatic corps, the pope vows to continue the work of his predecessor in human rights, disarmament and peace.

Sept. 1: Meets journalists and asks them to "focus on the heart and substance of our ministry and not

the incidental details.' Sept. 2: Welcomes leaders of other Christian

churches as "brothers" and prays with them on the eve of his installation.

Sept. 3: Pope John Paul is officially installed in a simple outdoor Mass without the pomp of the past. Sept. 4: Meets official delegates who attended his inauguration mass and tells them the Vatican has "no miracle solutions" for world problems but is at the service of man.

Sept. 5: Metropolitan Nikodim of Leningrad, a Russian Orthodox prelate, dies of a heart attack in the arms of the pope during an audience. Niko-dim, 49, had attended the inaugural Mass.

Sept. 6: Tells a general audience to pray for success at the Camp David Mideast peace meeting.

Sept. 13: Tells a general audience the church is like a mother in treating sick children. He says: "Mother told me when I was a little grown up: 'When you were small you were very sick; I had to take you from one doctor to the next and stay up for entire nights.""

Sept. 14: Meets his first cousin and closest American relative, Silvio Luciani, 79, of Port Huron,

Sept. 19: Receives a detegation of the Syrian-Orthodox church.

Sept. 20: Addressing a weekly general audience, he warns against confusing Christian social justice

with Marxism, saying: "It is wrong to say...that where is Lenin there is Jerusalem.' Sept. 21: In a letter to the Turin archbishop, he

describes as "a happy opportunity to strengthen faith" the display of the holy shroud, the linen in which Catholics believe Jesus Christ was buried.

Sept. 23: Leaves the Vatican for the first and only time as pope and says Mass in the Lateran Basilica, his cathedral as bishop of Rome.

Sept. 24: At Sunday noon blessing, he speaks against violence and says: "People sometimes say we are in a rotten and dishonest society. This is not true. There are still many good people, so many honest people.... Violence can't do anything but love

Sept. 26: Holds his last public appearance before an audience of 17,000 and speaks of the "twin loves" of God and of the neighbor.

Sept. 29: The Vatican announces Pope John Paul was found dead in his bed and that doctors say he probably died before midnight Sept. 28.



Working moms report enthusiasm with jobs

NEW YORK (AP) - More than half of all women with children under 18 are in the labor force and a new study indicates that the majority of them like their jobs and plan to keep working until retirement.

The survey by the A.C. Nielsen Co. also found, however, that working mothers are evenly split about whether they view their occupations as a

career or "just a job."

The Nielsen Co., which conducted the study on behalf of a fast-food chain, based its findings on telephone interviews and follow-up questionnaires involving a sample of 508 working mothers.

For purposes of the survey, work-ing mothers were defined as: married women, 25 to 49, with husbands employed on a full-time basis and living at home and with children under 18 also living at home. To qualify, the women had to be employed outside the home

Labor Department statistics show that there are almost 30.5 million women with children under 18. Of these, 16.1 million or 53 percent are employed. Wage-earning mothers represent 44 percent of all women

The Nielsen study concluded: "The working mother appears to be satisfied with her dual role. Few (working mothers) feel that their husband or children suffer as a result of their working. In fact, both husband and children typically share in the housework - or don't care if it gets

Among the survey findings:

 —Ninety-seven percent of those questioned said they liked their work and 55 percent said they would keep on the job until retirement. Half said they considered their work as "just a job" and half described it as a career.

-Money is the main reason for working. Forty percent of the working mothers said they had jobs because they needed the money; 20 percent said they worked because their earnings allowed the family extra luxuries; and 4 percent said they were saving for a major pur-chase. Others said they worked for personal fulfillment, to keep from being bored or because they had always planned a career.

-Working mothers are most likely to hold service or clerical jobs. Half of those surveyed said their occupations fell into this category. Twenty percent of the women questioned described their jobs as professional, 16 percent said they were in the sales or managerial category, 13 percent said they were blue collar workers and 1 percent refused to say what they

-Sixty-two percent of the working mothers earn under \$10,000 a year and only 2 percent earn more than \$20,000 annually. The women's earnings are highest in the sales and managerial category, where 5 percent of those questioned said they earned \$20,000 or more a year.

-Eighty-eight percent of those surveyed said they were proud of being working mothers. Seventeen percent or less than one-fifth of those questioned said they felt their children were slighted because of their work.

-Working mothers generally say they get support from their families. Eighty-four percent said their husbands were interested in their work. At the same time, most of the working

mothers - 85 percent - said they felt that women who worked have more demands on their time than men with

-Just over half of the working mothers said they believe the increased number of women in the labor force has increased the divorce rate. The number who link work and divorce varies by age, however; 47 percent of those 25 to 29 said the increased number of working women boosted the divorce rate, compared to 58 percent of the 35 to 39 age group.

The study was sponsored by the Kentucky Fried Chicken Time Out Institute, founded in 1977 to study subjects involving women.





VATICAN CITY (AP) - "They kill each other, even among young people," Pope John Paul I said, commenting on reports of the slaying of a Communist youth in an ambush in Rome

Those apparently were his last words. About an hour after he spoke them Thursday night, he died of

a heart attack. The pope retired to his bedroom on the third floor of the ornate, four-story Apostolic Palace shortly after 10 p.m.

Vatican sources said death came between 11 and 11:30 p.m. while John Paul either was asleep or reading "The Imitations of Christ," a 15th century book of meditations.

Even if South goes down at two spades, he is glad he responded. West would have made two hearts doubled, scoring game and rubber, if South had passed the repeated takeout double.

South is even happier if he succeeds in making two spades. He is in danger of losing three trumps, one heart and two diamonds, but South can save one trick if he is quick and nimble.

RUNS CLUBS

South takes the ace of hearts, cashes the ace and king of clubs and then overtakes dummy's jack of clubs with his own queen. When the clubs break evenly, fortunately for South, declarer leads his last club and discards dummy's low heart.

Since West cannot gain by ruffing the last club, he discards a heart. East ruffs with a low trump, but this eventually costs him a trump trick.

No matter how the defense pro-ceeds, declarer leads trumps twice. The four remaining trumps come down on two leads, so that South loses only two trump tricks in addition to the club ruff and two diamonds.

The latest request came from Rep. John Conyers Jr., a Michigan Democrat who walked out of a White House meeting between Presi-dent Carter and the Congressional Black Caucus after saying the administration is not doing enough to promote full employment legislation. Conyers and his col-

eagues want the White House to push for swift adoption of a bill that would set as a national goal the reduction of unemployment to no more than 4 percent within

four years. White House officials say Conyers proposed a meeting at Camp David to put pressure on congressional leaders for action on several bills, particularly the jobs

Conyers' associates say he wasn't necessarily seeking a return to the presidential retreat in the Maryland mountains, site of the 13-day summit on the Middle East but, rather, was suggesting a "Camp David style" meeting to give the legislation a



Evidence tends to support suicide verdict in death of Chilean leader Allende

morning five years ago. That was the time official records show that Chile's armed forces launched an armed revolt against his three-year-old govern-

Ever since that day, the circumstances of his death have been in dispute: Did the 65-year-old Marxist commit suicide as the government conto or was he assassinated as his widow and follow

Through interviews with witnesses and studies of official documents and tape recordings made public last year, The Associated Press now has been able to piece together their version of what happened inside Allende's La Moneda Palace in downtown Santiago on Sept. 11, 1973.

Allende's personal surgeon said in one of the interviews he saw Allende fire an automatic rifle into his own face. A civilian police inspector, called later to investigate, said in another AP interview and in his official report that he concluded the death was a

The widow, Hortensia Bussi de Allende, maintained in an interview with The AP from her exile in Mexico that her husband was slain, although initially she accepted his death as a suicide because, she said at the time, he had told her he would take his own life

President Allende's mistress, Miria Conteras de Ropert — known as La Payita, was one of those with him that morning, but she now lives in Cuba and could not be reached for comment. Two others who were with Allende that day declined to discuss his death with The AP.

What follows is the account of the testimony given in the interviews and the documents so far made

The widow said in the interview that Allende telephoned her from La Moneda that morning to inform her of the rebellion and to say the situation was grave. He told her, she added, to remain in the

Dr. Patricio Guijon Klein, Allende's surgeon on a palace medical team, said in his interview in Santiago that he drove to La Moneda shortly after 8 a. m. and learned that a military junta was demanding Allende's resignation. Guijon added that he and six or so other physicians gathered in a small dispen-sary on the first floor of the palace. Allende and his staff were on the second floor.

According to tape recordings and official docu-ments now made public, Gen. Augusto Pinochet, who now is president, warned that unless Allende resigned he would order an attack on La Moneda palace at 10:50 a.m.

Guijon said he saw Allende come downstairs abo 10 a.m. — carrying a gun — and talk by telepho from the palace administration office.

In the government material, Gen. Ernesto Baeza, who was in charge of army operations downtown, says it was he who talked to Allende and that he told him the air force would put a plane at his disposal to

leave the country.
"Then, about 10:50 a.m., Allende called me at the Defense Ministry," Baeza recounted, "and asked for 10 minutes' delay to allow the women to leave the ilding. 'The men,' he told me, 'are going to stay since many men also left."

About this time, according to the govern material, Pinochet said over a radio hookup: "It is necessary to attack at 11 o'clock sharp because

that rooster is not going to hand himself over."
"It (the palace) is being attacked now," came the reply in the tape recordings. "It is being surrounded and attacked with plenty of force. They are going to

Inside the palace, Guijon said, he and the other doctors moved from their dispensary to the base-

Dakotan believes in spider spirits

PIERRE, S.D. (AP) - Jim Gillihan carries two spider spirits in a medicine pouch around his neck.
Gillihan, formerly the state's director of cultural preservation, says Sioux Indians gave him the pouch and assigned the spirits to look after him.
"It's perfectly logical," he says. "Spiders are everywhere. When something goes wrong with me, they'll tell their brothers. And their brothers will tell their cousins.
"And soon the Alminton of the spirits of the says."

"And soon the Almighty will know, because if there are spiders everywhere, there's certainly one where the Almighty is," he says. Gillihan, who now lives in Mt Carmel, Ill., has been

interested in Indian religion since the days he taught comparative world religions at Bradley University. When he came to South Dakota in 1970, he began

attending religious ceremonies with an old Yankton Dakota Indian named Joe Rock Boy, who helped him understand the significance of the various rituals.

"Godfrey Chipps from Wambaugh taught me about stones," he says. "One day he gave me a stone and sang it a song and it jumped in my hand. I didn't believe it could happen, but I saw it happen.

"That made me re-evaluate everything I knew," he says. "Now I realize that everything has life."

Gillihan was given his first serious religious pipe in 1972 and smoked it with Frank Fools Crow, the 90-year-old spiritual leader of the Sioux. He still prays with it.

"I carry it in the proper way and care for it," he

"I carry it in the proper way and care for it," he says. "I keep it clean, respect it, and don't say bad things around it. The pipe is the direct link between man and the Almighty so it must be kept clean."

Then in 1975, doctors found that Gillihan had cancer and recommended a major operation to remove his lymph system.

"So we had a special lader commended to the system."

"So we had a sweat lodge ceremony and the medicine men told me to go ahead with it because I would feel good when they found no cancer," Gillihan says. "He said he would send some spirits to the hospital to guide the doctors, and that there would be a sign. And he told me to tie 405 tobacco ties before

the operation.

"The doctors later told me my heart stopped while I was on the table, but that it started again for some strange reason," he says. "And they said they'd counted the number of sutures it took to sew me up—

Doctors found no cancer that day, Gillihan says. After a later operation to remove a cancerous right lung, Gillihan is gaining weight and strength. And the Indians are praying for him.

"He has been our great friend in Pierre," Matthew Noble Red Man said at a recent Sun Dance ceremony. "He has asked that we bless his pipe with which he prays to the Great Spirit.

"He may be a white man," Noble Red Man added, "but at heart he is an Indian."

He added in the SANTIAGO, Chile (AP) — The final hours of the life of Salvador Allende began at 7: 40 one September spent much of his time with Dr. Arturo Jiron, his health minister, and Carlos Jorquera, a press aide, in the Independence Salon on the second floor. Police records show that Inspector Pedro Espinoza Valdes reported later that he found in the same room a number of Scotch whisky bottles — some full, some

empty.

Jiron and Jorquera, who now live in Caracas, Venezuela, declined to be interviewed or to answer

mestions from The Associated Press about what appened during those hours.

Dr. Guijon said that after an attack by air force lanes began, he and other physicians were called to he second floor from the basement. They gathered, he said, in an interior hallway in a state of great confusion. There were no lights, but he said the up on the second floor appeared to number about

Guijon said he heard someone say that Augusto Olivares, another press aide, had been wounded and that he and three or four other doctors returned to the first floor, where they found Olivares near death. He was sitting on a chair in a dining room with a pietel of the Cuiton added Olivares died. with a pistol at his side, Guijon added. Olivares died before the medical men could do anything for him and they judged his death a suicide, Guijon said. It was then afternoon and fires were beginning to spread in that part of the palace.

"From the back," Guijon went on, "I clearly heard the voice of the president, who said, 'Give up! This is a massacre! ... La Payita leaves first, I will follow at the end.' La Payita then moved forward and while the others formed a long line, I took off my white (medical) apron and somebody found a broomstick to make a flag of surrender. It was passed forward from hand to hand and the group began to move." Guijon gave this account in the interview of what followed:

The group moved down one hall past the Indepen-dence Salon, then turned right to descend a flight of stairs to a side exit into the street. Guijon, who was about in the middle of the line, realized that he had left behind his gas mask and turned back to look for

"I was walking through the dark hallway and in that moment the door from the Independence Salon was open, so when I passed by there I could see into the room because of the light coming through the windows from outside. Just at that moment Allende

Guijon said he could not hear Allende's shots because of all the shooting outside, but he added that he saw Allende's body react when the automatic rifle — propped upright between his legs — went off.

I saw how the body was shaking. I saw the cranial cavity explode. I saw the head torn apart. I immediately went to him, by instinct, even though I knew perfectly well that nothing could be done to help him.

According to Guijon, Allende was seated on one end of a red velvet sofa. Guijon said he was in a nervous state but pulled up a footstool beside the body and waited, directly facing the door through which he expected soldiers soon to enter. Then, thinking the troops might believe at first glance that the gun between Allende's knees was pointed at them, Guijon said, he moved it to the other end of the

He estimated that he waited 10 minutes before two soldiers came through the door, followed by a lieu-tenant, then by Gen. Javier Palacios. The general asked what had happened and then told Guijon to put the gun back where Allende had it, the surgeon

The government's material relates that at military command headquarters, a message came from Vice Adm. Patricio Carvajal, who was in the Defense Ministry in charge of short wave radio communica-

"There is a communication from infantry personnel who are now inside La Moneda," Carvajal said, according to the government material. "Because of the possibilities of interference I am going to transmit it in English: "They say that Allende committed suicide and is dead now." Tell me if you have

"Affirmative," replied Pinochet. "We have under-

stood perfectly."

Police Inspector Espinoza said in an interview with The AP that he was at police headquarters when he was told there had been a death in La Moneda. He said he was ordered to investigate it because of his 20

years' homicide experience.

Espinoza said that he, a detective and two ballis tics experts were taken to the Defense Ministry by

"Gen. Sergio Arellano Stark then told me the death was that of Allende," Espinoza recalled in the interview. "He was not clear about what had happened and seemed to think someone inside La Moneda had killed Allende, possibly one of the GAP." GAP stands for Grupo de Amigos Personales (Group of Personal Friends), Allende's personal security forces.

Espinoza said that when he arrived at the palace he immediately saw Allende's body in a position "atypical" for a homicide. He said a paraffin test detected powder traces on Allende's right thumb. He added that he found the gun across Allende's knees but that Guijon had told him how it had been when he saw Allende fire it.

In the police records Espinoza describes the weap-on as a Soviet-made AKA rifle inscribed on the handle: "To Salvador, from his companion in arms, Fidel." Fidel Castro of Cuba and Allende were







0-3 would be 1st ever for Irish

You'd think that just about everything possible has happened in Notre Dame's storied past but the Fighting Irish can do something this weekend that po Notre Dame football team has ever done - go 0-3.

Only four times have the Irish dropped the first two games in a season — 1888, 1896, 1963 and this year - but never, not even the 2-8 seasons of '56 and '60, have they been 0-3.

The 0-2 beginning, which includes losses to Missouri and Michigan, has knocked college football's defending national champs out of The Associated Press Top Twenty. They'll be trying to work their way back in Saturday by entertaining Purdue in a neighborhood brawl which promises to be anything but easy pickin's.

NOTRE DAME leads the series 30-17-2, but Purdue's 17 victories represent the most by any Irish opponent except Southern Cal, which has 18. And the Boilermakers have something to shoot for besides the ecstasy of beating Notre Dame; a victory would make them 3-0 for the first time in nine years.

As far as the Top Twenty is concerned, there will be one head-to-head encounter, an important Big Eight clash in Norman, Okla., between toprated Oklahoma and No. 14 Missou-

Elsewhere, runner-up Arkansas hosts Tulsa while third-ranked Southern California met Michigan State in Los Angeles Friday night. Fourthranked Michigan is at home against Duke, No. 5 Penn State entertains Texas Christian and No. 6 Texas visits Texas Tech for a night contest. The Longhorns are the only Top Ten team on the road.

ALABAMA, WHICH skidded from No. 1 to No. 7 after losing to Southern Cal a week ago, tries to rebound against Vanderbilt at home. Eighthranked Texas A&M hosts Memphis State, North Carolina visits No. 9 Pitt and Houston is at No. 10 Florida under

NOTRE DAME'S biggest problem has been a failure to score more than 14 points in two games. The 3-0 loss to Missouri ended a record string of 131 games in which the Irish had scored while one of last week's two touchdowns came after Michigan fumbled deep in its own territory.

"We had drives the past two games that our staff had to be pleased with," says Coach Dan Devine. "We blocked well, drove people off the line of scrimmage and opened some good holes, but the big disappointment has been that we stopped ourselves with turnovers.

"The biggest problem is not to let the players overreact to defeat, but to let them react enough so they don't let it happen again. We can't afford to lose confidence in ourselves because of the trememdous schedule we have ahead of us.

While Notre Dame's scoring streak ended at 131 games, Oklahoma has the NCAA record up to 134 - and how! The Sooners have scored 153 points while warming up against Stanford, West Virginia and Rice. Now come Missouri's upset special-

"A brand new season," Coach Barry Switzer calls it. "The honeymoon's over. We'll find out how good we are against these people. Missouri has good players year after year and they've been tough for us to beat every time we take the field against them. Sometimes we don't beat

TRUE, BUT Oklahoma has won eight in a row from Missouri, although the last three scores have been 21-17, 27-20 and 28-27

The first six teams in The AP rankings have perfect records. Then comes No. 7 Alabama, which begins its quest for a seventh Southeastern Conference crown in eight years against doormat Vanderbilt.

There have been at least 25 books written about the Cowboys, three of them novels. There have even been two movies made about them.

The Cowboys do have some characters on their team. They have a linebacker. Tom Henderson, who might be the best all-around athlete in the National Football League. He also wants to be a movie star and auditions during most postgame inter-

They have probably the best defensive lineman in the league in Harvey Martin, who had his heart broken after he had offseasón surgery on his jaw to improve his looks and, unrecognized, couldn't get into New York's Studio 54 disco.

After easily winning Super Bowl 12, the Cowboys were expected to walk through the NFL this season on their way to a second straight title.

ON PAPER at least, no team was supposed to be able to stay on the field with them. But the Cowboys have struggled. The old spark doesn't seem to be there.

They go into Monday night's game with the Washington Redskins with a 3-1 record, but they have played well only in spurts. They beat Baltimore, the New York Giants and St. Louis and lost to Los Angeles.

"We've been struggling, trying to find that explosivness we used to have," said running back Preston Pearson. "It's frustrating because we have people who can explode. We just aren't at our peak. We're world champions of 1977, all right, but this is

"I think our team has an excellent attitude. We just aren't playing with the intensity we did at the end of last year," quarterback Roger Staubach said. "It just isn't there yet. As a result, we're making a lot of mental and physical errors. We're certainly capable of being a better team than we've shown.'

THE COWBOY offense still revolves around Staubach, but it is halfback Tony Dorsett who determines how effective it will be. He is the NFC's leading rusher and the Cowboys' game-breaker.

Dorsett ran for 154 yards against

the Cardinals Sunday. "This year, my knowlege is 100 percent advanced over last year," Dorsett said. "This is not an easy system to pick up. I had a rough time at times last year. I'm still learning, but I can read defenses better now and I understandour offense better.

Dorsett says that the Cowboys' biggest current problem is that everyone is standing back waiting for the long run or the long pass to bail the team

"We have a lot of weapons on this team and that gives us the tendency to fall back and depend on that, maybe too much. "The hell with that. You can't win

games sitting back waiting for the big play all the time. We have to be ready to go three yards in a cloud of dust if we have to. THERE HAVE been only five

changes in the lineup that started the super Bowl and the one that will probably start against the Redskins in Washington Monday night.

Second-year man Tony Hill from Stanford moved ahead of both Golden Richards and Butch Johnson at one wide receiver spot, and Richards was traded to the Chicago Bears. Pat Donovan, the Cowboys' best

screens and short pases to Hill in an attempt to break him loose. Hill has 10 receptions for 148 yards and a touchdown, but pulled a hamstring muscle in the Cardinal game and made only two catches for 17 yards. He is expected to be healthy for the Redskins.

DONOVAN, ALSO from Stanford, could be the next great offensive tackle in theNFL at 6-foot-4 and 250 pounds in his fifth year. He was drafted as a defensive end and then moved to tackle. He is the strongest Cowboy and runs 40 yards in 4.7.

In the opener against Baltimore, he received the highest grade any Cowboy hadbeen given since the team began doing that sort of thing.

The Cowboys are certainly not invincible and their weakest link is the secondary. The cornerbacks are Washington and Aaron Kyle and safeties are Charlie Waters and Cliff Harris. None is very big or particularly fast.

Dallas, as much as any team in the league, has been hurt by the onechuck rule. "It's really putting us in a bind." Waters said.

The Cowboys are not a good manto-man team and speedy receivers have caused them considerable trouble this season.




