#### Bishop resigns

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) Calling himself a "sinful and vulnerable human being," activist Bishop C. Kilmer Myers, successor to the late James Pike in the Episcopal diocese of California, has resigned.

The 62 year-old Myers told a diocesan convention of 1.000 delegates he would retire to a religious center in the northern part of the state and spend some time with American Indians. whom he described as strug gling under government domi-

Myers underwent treatment for alcoholism in Minneapolis last spring and has described himself as "a closet drinker" who was "helped to see I was an alcoholic" by a church aide

Myers was the only white priest with Martin Luther King Jr., in his first Washington, D.C., march. He antagonized southern bishops by joining the Selma, Ala., freedom marchers and later denounced the Viet nam war and the death penalty

#### Thanks offered

JERUSALEM (AP) - Prime Minister Menachem Begin of fored his "heartfelt thanks today to the Norwegian Nobel Committee that awarded him the 1978 Nobel Peace Prize jointly with Egyptian President Anwar Sadat

"I consider it to be the greatest distinction possible," Begin wrote the committee

"Of course, the coveted award is due to the entire people of Israel whom I have the honor to represent. Our people yearn for peace perhaps more than any other nation on earth because it has suffered so much and lost so many." Begin wrote in a text released to the press

#### Arafat received

MOSCOW (AP) - Soviet For eign Minister Andrei A. Gromy ko received Yasser Arafat, leader of the Palestine Liberation Organization, in the Kremlin today "in an atmosphere of cordiality and mutual understanding." Tass said

They talked about "the Middle East situation and objectives of struggle for a just solution of the Palestinian problem within the framework of a comprehensive Middle East settlement," the of ficial news agency said

Arafat arrived in the U.S.S.R. Sunday at the head of a PLO delegation at the invitation of the Soviet government.

#### Flights resumed

BANGKOK, Thailand (AP) -Pan Am is flying over Vietnam and Laos again, becoming the first American airline since the 1975 communist takeover of both countries to resume the shortcut between Bangkok and Hong

Since 1975 Pan Am has had to fly around Indochina, meaning higher fuel costs and a longer flight time that put Pan Am at a disadvantage with non-American airlines that resumed the shorter route earlier this year.

# Cuba gains Russian MiG-23 jets

WASHINGTON (AP) - For the first time, Russia reportedly has given Cuba advanced high-speed MiG-23 jet fighters

The acquisition of MiG-23s substantially upgrades Cuba's air defense force, which until now has been equipped chiefly with less sophisticated MiG-21s and other, older

Some types of the MiG-23 "Flogger" are believed by U.S. intelligence officials to be capable of firing tactical nuclear weapons as well as conventional arms on ground-attack misthe new jets sent to Cuba are designed for ground attack as well as for airto-air combat.

Intelligence sources, who declined to be named, said an estimated 18 to 20 MiG-23s arrived in Cuba earlier this month aboard a Soviet freighter. That many planes would comprise about a squadron.

The aircraft were shipped disassembled in crates and it was not until they were observed flying that U.S. intelligence identified them as MiG-

Earlier this year, Defense Secre tary Harold Brown listed the MiG-23 among several newer types of Soviet warplanes which he told Congress have substantially better ranges and payloads than their predecessors."

MiG-23s have been assigned to Soviet fighter units based in East Germany for five years and the Russians supplied them to only a few Warsaw pact allies and Arab countries ahead

It is uncertain whether Russian or Cuban pilots have been flying the MiG-23s provided to Fidel Castro's air force. Several months ago, U.S. intelligence officials reported Moscow had sent about 30 Russian pilots to Cuba to

replace Cubans then flying combat missions in Africa.

Thanks to billions of dollars in Soviet weapon gifts since the early 1960s, plus combat experience gained in Angola and Ethiopia, the Cuban

armed forces are rated as the best in

Latin America The level of Soviet military aid to Cuba has increased noticeably since Castro committed his troops to the pro-Marxist side in the Angolan civil

war in 1975. Since early last year, U.S. intelligence has reported Soviet ships deliv ering to Cuba T62 tanks. SA3 low-alti-

As with military assistance, the Russians have been subsidizing Cuba's economy and analysts estimate that Russia has supplied Cuba nearly \$10 billion in economic aid since 1961. # Plantation workers get taste of Indian politics

NEW DELHI, India (AP) - A backwater district in southern India is getting a taste of rough and tum ble, big city politics as Indira Gandhi makes her strongest bid for a political comeback since she was toppled as prime minister 18 months ago

Never have the plantation workers of Chikmagalur district 1,100 miles south of here, been courted by so many national politicians and media

Name calling and rumors of planned violence and massive drug gings are spicing up the campaign for the Nov-5 parliamentary by election in which Mrs. Gandhi, 60, started out as the leading candidate Mrs. Gandhi's successor, Prime

Minister Morarji Desai, has stayed out of the campaign, but leaders of his Janata Party are determined to de feat the former prime minister in what had been regarded as a safe district for her. Now, it looks close It is her first personal bid for election since the Janatas swept her Conher own seat in Parliament in March.

Traveling through the coffee and tea plantations, Mrs Gandhi ad dresses an average of 20 rallies a

She defends her 11-year administration and her harsh 1975-77 emer gency, during which many freedoms were suspended and thousands were jailed as political prisoners, as neces sary to restore democracy. She talks scornfully of Desai's government as the lackey of multinational corporations and Western governments, un able to maintain peace.

Indian Parliament members need not reside in their own districts, and Mrs Gandhi is far from the Hindispeaking belt of her native northern India She speaks in English, and local backers translate her remarks into Kanada, the local language.

Her Janata Party opponent, former Karnataka State Chief Minister Veerendra Patil, 54, portrays her as an outsider who thinks she can hood wink the simple local people



# Weekend delivery far from 'routine'

LOS ANGELES (AP) - Fire Department paramedics Mel Samples and Ray Seeger face life-and-death situations on a daily basis, but the delivery of a baby from a dead mother, they say, "could never be routine."

That, however, was only one of the incidents that made Saturday night unusual. They arrived too late to help a mother of four who was killed in a shootout with police, then faced a gun-toting man while trying to administer aid to the victim of a beat

"The deaths are routine, the assaults are routine, even the attacks on us have happened before," Samples said. "But delivering a baby from a dead mother, that could never be routine.

The two members of Rescue Squad 64, along with nurse Betty Nakatani, who rode with them to observe their techniques, began the night with a 10:30 p.m. call that a woman had been shot.

By the time the paramedics arrived four minutes later, 26year-old Mary Miracle Ross was dead from a bullet wound in the

Samples and Seeger also found that she was pregnant and that the eight month-old fetus was still alive. The dead woman's corpse was

placed in the ambulance and, while driving to the hospital, the paramedics applied intense cardio-pulmonary resuscitation to the woman, supplied intravenous sodium bicarbonate through her jugular vein to reduce acidosis of the blood and pumped oxygen through a tube to the uterus.

"The idea was to keep the blood moving and keep the baby

When the paramedics reached Martin Luther King Hospital, they found that their efforts had

been rewarded. Doctors removed the baby in 15 seconds and it took them 15 minutes to have the three-pound boy breathing normally. The child was immediately placed on a respirator machine and remained in critical condition Sunday night.

The dead woman had been shot during an argument with her common-law husband, Sampson Simmons, who denied being the child's father, police said. Simmons was booked Sunday for investigation of mur-

For Samples and Seeger, the night was still young. Their next call at about 2:30 Sunday morning was another

shooting Again the victim, a mother of four children, was dead when they arrived. Marvoline Snowden had been killed in a shootout with police.

The paramedics' next major assignment was a beating victim, Calvin Blockmon, whose eyes were swollen shut. When they began to treat Blockmon, several onlookers attempted to interfere.

Seeger asked them to leave. One man did, but later returned with a shotgun. "When I saw that gun," Seeger said, "I thought, 'Someone is going to

He said he distracted the guntoting man long enough for Samples to disarm him. But in the free-for-all, Seeger was hit several times in the head. Police later booked Gerald Blockmon for investigation of assault with

SALISBURY, Rhodesia (AP) - A record number of whites fled Rhode sia last month in an exodus triggered by the growing war with black nation alist guerrillas, official statistics showed today

A total of 1.490 whites from the 260,000 white population in the breakaway British colony, chose to leave Rhodesia in September, the government figures said. There are 6.7 million blacks in the country

It was the biggest monthly emigra tion of whites since Rhodesian Prime Minister Ian Smith declared unilater al independence from Britain in

The latest figures compare with 1,245 in August and 1,024 in September

The number of new settlers was only 286 last month


The command said a security-force position at Chirundu, 200 miles north west of here, was hit Sunday night and this morning with mortar shells. rockets and machine-gun and smallarms fire. A military command communique said Rhodesian forces retaliated by "neutralizing a Zambian emplacement." No other details were



#### Soviet Union assails Western press

PARIS (AP) - The Soviet Union accused the Western press today of "rough and unjustified attacks" on UNESCO'S initiatives on international news reporting and attacked child pornography in America.

Deputy Foreign Minister Igor N. Zemskov's remarks to the United Nations Educational, Cultural and Scientific Organization General Conference marked the beginning of an expected strong campaign to win approval of the Soviet-sponsored initiatives. They will be discussed during this five-week policy planning

The United States and other Western nations, along with several Western news organizations and journalists' professional groups, Kave denounced the draft declaration as inviting government interference in national and international reporting.

"In the past few weeks, we have become witnesses to rough and unjustified attacks on UNESCO on the part of the so-called big Western press,' Zemsksov said.

"It misinterprets the idea of a draft declaration on mass media, permitting itself even to make threats to our organization." He did not refer to any specific attack.

Zemskov said the declaration was designed to help developing countries free themselves from "information imperialism" and said the Soviet Union was dedicated to helping Third World efforts towards "decolonization of information."

# John Paul II speaks on children

Paul II told an international congress on the family today that children must grow up under their parents' guidance and responsibility.

In an address in French, the pope told the group of 600 that the parents' role in educating children was "very difficult in modern times.'

'Family atmosphere must be made of trust, dialogue, firmness and respect for children," the pope said.

You are co-responsible with us of the future of the (Roman Catholic) Church and mankind, because such a future is born and grows in the family, in every family," the pope said.

The congress was sponsored by several Roman Catholic lay organiza-The Vatican announced that the

pontiff will travel by military helicopter on Sunday to Assisi, the birthplace of St. Francis. The Polish-born pope will follow up

the one-day trip with a visit to the tomb of St. Catherine of Siena at the Santa Maria Sopra Minerva Basilica in downtown Rome

"With these two visits," the announcement said, "Pope John Paul II intends to put his minister of Supreme Pastor under the patronage of the two saints.

The Assisi journey will be the pontiff's fourth trip outside the Vatican since he was elected pope two weeks ago. The robust 58-year-old pope helicoptered to a isolated monastery in the mountains southeast of Rome on Sunday

In a separate announcement, Vatican officials said John Paul reappointed two more cardinals to their posts in the Curia, or church administration

The pope confirmed Yugoslav-born Cardinal Franjo Seper as head of the Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith, and Argentine-born Cardinal Eduardo Pironio as prefect of the Congregation for the Religious.

The announcement said the pope told the cardinals of their reappointments in separate private audiences today.

Seper, 73, has headed the powerful doctrine congregation since 1968. Once called the Holy Office, it deals with the protection of faith and morals, the judging of heresy, dogmatic teaching and impediments to marriage with non-Catholics, among other matters.

The 58-year-old Pironio's department deals with matters regarding religious orders.

The pope has already reappointed four other cardinals to their Curia posts, including French cardinal Jean Villot, who was reconfirmed "for an initial period" in the key post of Vatican secretary of state.

modification program. It's a gamble; Lockheed may or may not get the Navy contract for the work. If not, Big Spring leaders figure they'll entice another company, which needs the hangar space and the clear-flying weather afforded by the West Texas climate, to move in.

Anyway, the city got excellent runways, hangars, and many other buildings and facilities for nothing. They were a gift from Uncle Sam, who has closed hundreds of camps. bases and forts over the years in the aftermath of world wars, confined wars and "conflicts."

Just last week, Big Spring was host for the third annual conference of the National Owners and Operators of Former Military Installations. About 125 members from throughout the nation and from Canada, Newfoundland and Puerto Rico showed up for the conference

# Supreme Court agrees to review decision on Texas abuse laws

preme Court agreed today to review a decision striking down as unconstitutional the way Texas officials handle child abuse cases The court voted to study an appeal

aimed at reinstating the state proce-At issue are portions of the Texas

Family Code which were challenged by a suburban Houston couple, John and Mary Sims Three young Sims children were

attending Houston elementary schools in 1976 when teachers began to suspect that the oldest child, 9year-old Paul, was a victim of severe and abusive beatings

After an investigation, a caseworker for the Harris County Child Welfare Unit took custody of all three children and filed a complaint against their parents in juvenile court. Judge Robert Lowry signed an order which in effect removed the children from their parents' custody for 10 days. Under Texas law, a judge has to

order the children returned to their parents or order that the state take additional steps aimed at removing the children from parental custody permanently. The Sims couple sued the state in

federal court before the state proceedings were completed. Their suit charged that the state procedures for cases of alleged child abuse violated the constitutional due-process rights of both parents and children. A three-judge federal panel in

Houston ruled in favor of the parents. finding fault with the state's failure to require a hearing on the enforced state custody within 24 hours of the

children's removal from parental custody

The federal court also criticized the state for not appointing a lawyer to represent the children's best inter-

Justice Lewis F. Powell Jr. last by state officials.

State Assistant Attorney General C.J. Carl said in an earlier interview that the federal court's ruling, if left intact, would spark new legislation on child abuse cases.

But he and other state officials said that until new legislation is passed, social caseworkers would be placed in a "terrible dilemma" in which they might face returning children to lifethreatening home situations

# Court to decide on minor's rights

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Supreme Court today agreed to decide whether minors accused of crimes may be questioned by police after the minors ask to consult with their probation officers.

The justices voted to review a case from California that could have direct bearing on the court's controversial 1966 Miranda ruling. In that decision, the court ruled that

criminal suspects must be informed of their right to have a lawyer's help during interrogation and their right to remain silent. Under the Miranda doctrine, a sus-

pect who requests a lawyer's presence may not be questioned by police until the lawyer arrives.

# MAP test results ready this week

MAP tests 30 basic reading skills and some 30 basic math skills. Overall, the tests show the district

specific skills in which students are weak so teachers can plan individualized programs for each child. In addition to classroom work,

Partners in Reading packets for both below-grade-level and above-gradelevel students contain exercises to help strengthen reading skills such as comprehension and vocabulary. Additional teachers work with students during the school year in both

math and reading. Both coordinators urged parents to request teacher conferences to discuss MAP test results.



Israeli Radio on Sunday said Washington was awaiting a letter from Israeli Prime Minister Menachem Begin to President Carter, and quoted U.S. sources as saying both sides worked out proposals with "farreaching changes" before Israel's delegation returned home last week.

The broadcast said the Americans, after Begin's letter is received, will prepare a new draft treaty to try to tween the two sides:

The letter follows complaints from President Carter that Israel's decision to expand Jewish settlements in the West Bank of the Jordan River was detrimental to the talks.

The text of the correspondence was not made public, but Israeli Cabinet Secretary Arieh Naor said it reiterated Begin's position at the Camp David summit that there would be an "addition of several hundred families" in the occupied area.

Vance said Saturday the decision to expand the settlements "deterred progress" at the peace talks. It ap-parently prompted Egyptian President Anwar Sadat to recall his negotiators, but Carter interceded and asked Sadat to keep his delegation in

Washington, and it stayed. In Baghdad, Arab envoys began gathering to prepare for a summit to counter the Camp David accords. The summit begins Thursday and is expected to draw most major Arab powers, among them Jordan and

Saudi Arabia. Both have criticized the accords, calling them inadequate, but neither has criticized Sadat for his participa-

# Patients, friends celebrate doctor's acquittal

WEST NEW YORK, N.J. (AP) -Joyful patients and friends embraced and gave thanks at Mass with Dr. Mario Jascalevich in a church celebration of his acquittal on murder

About 1,000 well-wishers packed the basement chapel of St. Joseph of the Palisades Roman Catholic Church Sunday, smiling, hugging and giving the 51-year-old physician pats on the

Jascalevich was acquitted Tuesday after an 8-month trial on charges that he used the muscle relaxant curare to poison three patients at a small New Jersey hospital during the 1960s.

"He is our doctor, the doctor of all the Spanish-speaking people here," said former patient Maude Vega. It was 21/2 years ago that patients and friends prayed for Jascalevich's ac-

"It is important for us that the truth finally is known," said Mrs. Vega, who brought flowers for the altar to fulfill a vow

About 300 former patients rushed to Jascalevich and his wife, Nora, as they entered the chapel for the Span-

Smiling broadly, embracing the well-wishers, and stopping to shake hands and thank each patient by name, Jascalevich slowly made this way to a rear pew.

The doctor's offices are four blocks from the church, and his former assistant, Nelly Arriola, estimated that 75 percent of his patients are parishio-

"This is a spontaneous gathering of all the people who loved and trusted him through his long ordeal," she

Jascalevich's trial earned national attention when New York Times reporter Myron Farber, whose articles about a "Dr. X" prompted officials to reopen the case, was jailed for refusing to surrender his files for inspec-

Farber spent 40 days in the Bergen County jail and the Times paid \$285,-000 in fimes in the conflict between the rights of a free press and a fair

Refinery workers go on strike

 The flow of natural refinery walked out demanding higher wages and the release of political prisoners, the goverment said today.

The line supplies the neighboring Soviets with about 30 billion cubic feet of gas annually, officials said. Saturday's walkout, combined with a strike by about 400,000 teachers, means about half the country's public employees are on strike for higher pay and more political freedom.

Thousands of other goverment employees have ended their strikes on government assurances that their demands would be met.

On Sunday, thousands of anti-government protesters clashed with police in 37 cities around Iran and authorities said at least eight were killed when police fired into crowds

Tanks and heavy vehicles rolled to Tehran University Sunday where more than 10,000 persons gathered to demand resignation of the government of Shah Mohammad Reza Pahlavi.

The government said the demonstrations were spawned by communist dissidents receiving instructions from abroad.

But many of the protests are led bg the Moslem Shiite sect, angry about the shah's Western-type reforms that give more freedom to women and redistribute church lands among peasants.

# Amendment No. 2

The Reporter-Telegram previously has reviewed and recommended approval of the nine proposed amendments to the state constitution to be voted on Nov. 7, but it is felt that additional information on one or two of them might make them more easily understandable.

Amendment No. 2, for instance, would provide that "the legislature may permit political subdivisions to issue revenue bonds to develop employment opportunities for its citizens."

What the amendment really would do is to permit the legislature to pass a law allowing Texas towns, cities and counties to issue revenue bonds for industrial development. Numerous other states have similar laws. Approval of this amendment would help Texas meet the competition.

Text of the amendment reads: "Political subdivisions of this state are empowered to develop employment opportunities for its citizens through the issuance of obligations payable solely from revenues derived from the lease or sale to others of facilities (land, equipment and improvements) under such terms and conditions as the Legislature may prescribe; providing that such facilities are found by the governing body of such political subdivisions to be required to develop employment opportunities. No facilities acquired hereunder shall be exempt from ad valorem taxes unless used exclusively by the political subdivision nor shall any revenues from the utilization of facilities so acquired be utilized for purposes other than the retirement of obligations issued while the same are outstanding.

Proposed enabling legislation places other restrictions on how the bonds can be used and for what purposes. This is most important. Highlights are as

1. Property to be used as the site for the plant cannot be taken by emiment domain.

2. Neither cities, nor counties can be held liable for bond repayment in case of default. This must be printed on the bonds.

3. Three state agencies must approve the bond issue before it can be sold. The attorney general reviews the issue to protect the city or county. The bonds must be registered with the State Securities Board to protect the bond buyer. The Texas Industrial Commission must review the

issue for its financial stability.

4. The county or city must publish public notice of intent to issue the bonds prior to their actual issuance and prior to approval of the three state agencies. The political subdivision issuing the bonds can call for a referendum, or the electorate can petition the city or county to call a referendum.

5. Bonds can be repayable only from the revenues derived from the lease. No general tax funds can be used for that purpose.

6. The company can have a purchase option only after all bonds have been paid off and only. if the company has never been delinquent in its payments.

7. The bonds must meet all state laws now in existence for their issuance.

8. Bonds cannot be issued to purchase a facility and re-lease it to the same occupant.

9. No bonds can be issued on behalf of a company which relocates a plant from one city in Texas to another.

10. Language in both the amendment and legislation specifically provide that the company for whom the project is financed must pay ad valorem taxes just as if they owned the facility.

11. Other safeguards include a restriction of the federal government that a bond issue cannot exceed \$5 million.

All this makes sense and certainly clarifies the proposal for the voters.

There is nothing mandatory about it. The amendment merely would give communities interested in gaining new industry and creating jobs the opportunity to do so. It certainly would benefit many West Texas communities.



# Tapes and Kirbo echo Watergate

By JACK ANDERSON

WASHINGTON - Atlanta attorney Charles Kirbo, the pal of the president, has been caught in a trap of his own making — a trap he had set for us, with the help of White House aide Richard Harden.

Taking a leaf from Richard Nixon's Watergate book, Kirbo sought to discredit our story about the Robert Vesco scandal and to destroy our reputation in the process. He launched a Nixon-style investigation of us. coordinating his efforts with the White House and conferring regularly with Attorney General Griffin Bell.

The distinguished King and Spaulding law firm gave Kirbo and an associate, Charles Tisdale, time off to conduct the probe at no cost to President Carter. A White House spokesman acknowledged that the president is never billed for Kirbo's services.

In a sense, Kirbo and Tisdale are now functioning as Carter's "plumbers." This is a nickname that became attached to G. Gordon Liddy and E. Howard Hunt, who conducted extracurricular investigations for

The FBI has evidence that Kirbo plotted with Harden to suborn one of our news sources. Calling from the White House, Harden persuaded his sister-in-law, Mrs. Tina Harden, to induce the source, Cynthia Herring, to meet with Kirbo. (We have Cynthia Herring's permission to use her name.)

In an atmosphere of high intrigue, a rendezvous was arranged at Mrs. Harden's apartment in Albany, Ga.

FBI sources say that Kirbo kept a private plane standing by to whisk him from Atlanta to Albany for the secret interrogation.

Mrs. Herring is represented by Benjamin B. Brown, a Rockville, Md., attorney, who retained one of the nation's sharpest private detectives to investigate the case. Mrs. Herring notified the detective, Richard Bast, of Kirbo's approach. To protect her, Bast wired her with a recording device so she would have a record of the conversation. The tape has now been turned over to the FBI.

Kirbo is a crafty country lawyer, slow and dry of speech, who made it big in Atlanta. But he still carefully cultivates an avuncular, crackerbarrel image.

He started off by reassuring Mrs. Herring that he came from her corner of Georgia. "I'm just an ordinary South Georgia cracker you're talking to." he drawled.

Together, Kirbo and Tisdale amiably pumped her for information that they could use against us. She did not give them the answers, however, that they wanted.

If this disappointed Kirbo, it didn't deter him. He simply distorted what she had said and mounted a calculated campaign of slurs and lies against us.

But like Nixon before him, the unfortunate Kirbo has become snagged by a secret tape that contradicts his public statements. His campaign of denial and distortion, therefore, has turned into a dead cat that now hangs heavy around his

Kirbo implied to newsmen after talking to Mrs. Herring that we had plotted with our informants to concoct fake documentation. He knew this was untrue. Although she acknowledged on the tape that two letters had been reconstructed, she swore to Kirbo: "Jack? (Anderson) did not know. He had no idea.'

- Kirbo also suggested that we knew the letters weren't really reconstructions but fabrications. On the contrary, influence peddler R. L. Herring has testified in federal court that he lost the originals on an airplane flight and reconstructed them from memory. His former secretary, Gerolyn Hobbs, has also sworn before a federal judge that she typed and mailed the originals. In any event, Mrs. Herring told Kirbo: "I don't know why Herring had to do those letters because he had plenty of proof without that. Now that's what some of the other people connected with R. L.

Kirbo contended that we presented the letters as genuine even though their authenticity had been challenged. Not true. From the first, we took pains to emphasize that the letters were disputed. We quoted the alleged signatory, Spencer Lee IV, as denying he wrote them. Our first reference to the letters carried the careful qualification "if valid." Of course, we also cited the secretary's sworn testimony that she had typed and mailed the letters.

- Kirbo told reporters that even after we learned about the dubious origin of the letters, we continued to base columns on them. This is not what Mrs. Herring told him. She stated on the tape that Anderson "said it was his duty as a reporter and as a citizen to make (the reconstructions) known as soon as possible ... Jack did everything he possibly could to get the story out." The fact that the letters had been rewritten

was also uncovered by us, not by - In statements to the press, Kirbo claimed we did not initiate the investigation of the reconstructed documents as we had reported. He insisted we didn't act until Mrs. Herring told us voluntarily about her role in retyping one of the letters. Again, the secret tape proves Kirbo deliberately misrepresented the

clearly confirming our report. - The president's attorney even distorted the minor details. He told reporters that the private detective worked for us, although Mrs. Herring told Kirbo that Bast "was working for the lawyer in Washington that R. L. hired.

# Soviets launch propaganda attack against Brzezinski

By ROWLAND EVANS AND ROBERT NOVAK

WASHINGTON - A vicious, unprecedented Soviet propaganda campaign against Zbigniew Brzezinski, President Carter's national security adviser, has been launched on orders from Moscow by the U.S. Communist Party (CPUSA).

Evidence linking the Soviet Union to the campaign being run out of Communist party headquarters in New York City has been turned over to the White House by Justice Department investigators. Although its only possible political effect on President Carter would be to make Brzezinski impregnable, the direct linkage between Moscow and the U.S. party's attacks marks a precedence for vilification of any senior presidential aide in modern U.S.-Soviet relations.

Orders to the CPUSA are to castigate Brzezinski by pamphlets, stories in the Daily Worker and all other available means with this object: depict him as a warmonger, a zeaiot and a "mad dog," in the words of one official privy to the campaign.

Brzezinski, Polish by birth and the son of a pre-World War II Polish diplomat, has long been targeted by the Kremlin as Soviet enemy No. 1 within the Carter administration. His relatively hard line on Soviet adventures in Africa, together with his personal initiatives in strengthening Washington-Peking ties, are seen here as the reaston for using the CPUSA as the Kremlin's instrument

for undermining him. The campaign will get nowhere. But evidence that the CPUSA will



lend itself so directly to the dictate of Moscow has deeply disturbed the White House.

EXIT JOE AND PAT?

Two of the biggest spending cabinet members - Secretary Joseph Califano of Health, Education and Welfare and Mrs. Patricia Harris of Housing and Urban Development will not surprise the White House if they quit early next year after their budgets are drastically cut back for fiscal year 1980.

Califano and Harris, heading the two biggest social welfare departments, are already battling budget guidelines for the Office of Management and Budget (OMB) which sharply reduce future spending in line with President Carter's drive toward a balanced budget. "They are still living in the mood of the Great Society,'

one administration official told us. The showdown is expected early next year when Mr. Carter's stripped-down budget becomes a reality. Califano and Mrs. Harris will have only three choices: surrender, change the president's mind or resign. Neither is expected to surrender, nor is Mr. Carter in any mood to change his mind.

#### **CUNNING JERRY BROWN** The political cunning of California's

governor Edmund G. Brown Jr. was on view when he publicly called on President Carter to come west to campaign for two struggling Democratic candidates in California.

Brown seems well ahead of his own race for a second term. But Lt. Gov. Mervyn Dymally faces an uphill fight for re-election and Rep. Yvonne Braithwaite Burke is in a tough contest for state attorney general.

Actually, negotiations had been underway for some time between California Democratic leaders and the White House for a Carter visit just before the election. But by personally asking the president and then quietly publicizing it, the governor has forced Mr. Carter's hand. The president can scarcely decline to campaign for Dymally and Mrs. Burke, the two blacks on the state Democratic ticket. Even if Mr. Carter does come to California, Brown has it both ways. Should Dymally and Burke lose, the president will be shown to lack coattails. Should they win, Brown could take credit for having talked the president into making the trip.

Brown's ploy is all the more clever in shifting the responsibility for saving Dymally from himself to the president. The governor has been criticized for doing little or nothing to help his hard-pressed running-

#### **GOP GRUMBLES**

Grumbles among rank-and-file Republicans on Capitol Hill are increasing over the failure of Sen. Howard Baker and Rep. John Rhodes, the Senate and House minority leaders, to extract concessions from President Carter for Republican rescue missions of embattled Carter bills in the just-ended Congress.

Republican votes saved Mr.Carter time and again: aircraft sales to Saudi Arabia, Panama Canal treaties, sustaining his veto of the public works bill and others.

One senior Republican strategist told us: "If the late-Sen. Everett Dirksen (former Senate Republican leader) had been running the party, this would not have happened.'

In the future, Republican operatives will make a much greater effort to obtain far more concessions from Mr. Carter for supporting his legislation than they got in past years.





# Auto ferries just one big joke?

SOUTH SHORE, Ky. (AP) - Until last summer, to get from South Shore to Portsmouth, Ohio, you spent a few minutes on the bridge over the Ohio River. Now you spend a few hours waiting in line.

The U.S. Grant Bridge was closed in August so structural defects could be repaired. It's supposed to reopen in December 1979. In the meantime, it's been replaced with three ferries, one for pedestrians and two for cars. The bridge used to take 12,000 cars a day, officials say. The ferries take 50 an

"The best thing you can say about this whole situation is that it's a big joke on the working man and the taxpayer," said Jeff Lyons, 36, who lives in South Shore and works in a plant in Portsmouth.

The auto ferries are funded by the federal government, the passenger ferry by Ohio.

"When the river freezes, I suppose a lot of us are going to get fired." said Maynard Fitch, 45, as he kicked at the gravel while waiting his turn for the auto ferry. "If the snow is too deep to drive around and the barges and tugs are frozen in the river, we just won't

make it. Nothing moved on this river last January."

Portsmouth is a town of 28,000, South Shore a hamlet of 676, and the Kentuckians do most of the traveling. They say it is normal for 100 or more vehicles to be in line at peak periods for the auto ferries.

The alternative - and the only way to cross when there's fog on the Ohio - is to drive 25 miles upriver to the bridge at Russell, Ky., which crosses to Ironton, Ohio.

NEWARK, N.J. (AP) - Two Soviet spies who could be sentenced to maximum terms of life in prison must face a judge who had said the pair "would do everything they could to destroy" the United

States. The former United Nations employees were to appear today before U.S. District Judge Frederick Lacey for sentencing on three espionage counts. There is no minimum mandatory sentence.

Valdik Enger, 39, and Rudolf Chernyayev, 43, were convicted Oct. 13 for their part in a ninemonth conspiracy to obtain U.S. military secrets, including plans for antisubmarine warfare.

Witnesses testified at the two-week trial that the two were lured into the scheme by FBI agents investigating the possibility of a network of spies operating from Soviet ships.

Lacey, a former U.S. Attorney, said after the jury's verdict that Enger and Chernyayev had "demonstrated they hold no love for this country and would do everything they could to destroy

# **Death should** be talked to children

WEST LAFAYETTE, Ind. (AP) -"Unfortunately, parents sometimes treat death like sex - a no-no, not a discussable subject," says a Purdue University family counselor who advises it is healthier to bring the subject into the open.

"Some children never say anything or show signs of grief," says Professor Wallace Denton of the School of Consumer and Family Sciences. "It may be that in some way a child has decided that he can't talk about death. Parents in this situation may initiate the subject and indicate that he can talk about it.'

Part of the difficulty, says the director of the Marriage and Family Counseling Center, is that adults haven't sorted out their own feelings about death and thus may evade the subject or gloss over its reality.

Some anxiety about death on the part of children is typical, says Denton, who suggests that a matter-offact straightforward treatment of questions is the best approach.

"Initially the child is not filled with the morbidity of death as are adults," he points out. "Don't say things such as 'they have gone to sleep' since it causes fear in the child, who is afraid to go to sleep for fear he might not

"People who operate out of religious orientation can have some meaningful explanation, such as 'they've gone to Heaven.' However, an explanation such as 'Jesus loved him so much he took him to live with him' should be avoided. A child fears the latter statement, believing that Jesus might want him also."

Denton says that when a close friend or relative dies, a child should be able to be with a person to whom he feels close.

There's sometimes a temptation to ship children off to a relative's or a friend's house, and sometimes it is advisable," he says. "But this increases the child's anxiety. Generally it is better for the child to remain with the family and be a part of the whole

Denton says that a child's major concern, perhaps triggered by the death of a grandparent, is fear of a parent's death and the worry, "Who'll take care of me?" For this reason, a close to for security and the knowledge that he will be cared for.

It should be remembered, Denton notes, that a child as well as an adult should be able to express grief. Research shows that unexpressed grief has a negative eft.

"If a parent thinks a child is not affected by grief, or reacts in an unusual manner, there may be need for counseling," Denton points out. "It's not uncommon for a child to have a sense of guilt about the death

of a person close to him.' Should the very young attend funer-

"There's no common agreement on the subject," Denton says. "Probably children younger than 5 ought not to attend funerals. Part of the value of attending a funeral is that it is a symbol of finality. People who avoid funerals may have more difficulty accepting the finality of death."

# Despite faults, Washington subway is working

By LARRY MARGASAK

WASHINGTON (AP) - Traffic choked Washington's broad avenues and a pedestrian had "such moments as heart disease and brainstorms are made of." So, asked the Washington Post, why not a subway system for Washington?

The date was Dec. 5, 1909. Nearly seven decades later - on March 7, 1976 - the capital got its first five miles of a subway, a modern sophisticated system but also one in which 14 percent of the computerized fare collection equipment is out of service at

And it won't have a completed system until at least 1984, 11 years behind schedule and \$4.3 billion above original cost estimates.

In short, Washington did not heed the advice of Superintendent Richard Sylvester of the Metropolitan Police, who warned in 1909 that a subway "should not be put off until the 11th

But the 11th hour was fine for Debbie Stutz, a 20-year-old secretary for the Federal Election Commission.

The Metro was extended toward her Alexandria, Va., home in July 1977. She had taken a haif-hour bus ride into town; a combined bus-subway trip gets her to Washington 10 minutes faster.

While she's crossing the Washington-Virginia border, other riders are coming from the Maryland suburbs and still more are moving within the city. Twenty-three miles of the planned 101-mile system are operating and 210,000 people ride the trains each weekday.

Ms. Stutz and fellow commuters speed under the Potomac River at 73 mph. "Your ears pop going through the tunnel," she said. "You look around and see everyone swallowing at the same time.

Above ground the partially-built system is not yet roducing rush-hour traffic, but District of Columbia officials say congestion is not getting worse. A survey this year estimated that 32.6 percent of subway riders would otherwise travel by automobile

Metro is a computer-age subway, and its sophisticated equipment is responsible for most of its problems.

San Francisco's BART has gotten most of the bad notices. But Washington's system has had troubles too;

failures of computerized fare equipment are rattling the nerves of

When Ms. Stutz enters the subway at a station next to the Pentagon, she buys a farecard - if the farecard machine is working. To get on the platform, she inserts the card into a special gate - provided the gate is

"Some days you wake up and you're not in a terrific mood," Ms. Stutz said. "You can't get your card into the turnstile and you miss your train. You feel like going back to

Francis Francois, a transit authority board member, said the unreliability of the fare-collecting equipment has reached a crisis stage. "We are clearly losing riders and revenues,"

At the same time, transit officials gladly cite the subway's benefits. Crowds of workers zip from one part of town to another during lunch hour. shopping and finding new restaurants. Wives meet husbands in town for lunch, often for the first time in

# 'Tortilla Curtain' criticized by congressman

ESPANOLA, N.M. (AP)-A New Mexico congressman says the United States should create a legal way for Mexicans to cross the border for "an economic shot in the arm" instead of building fences to keep them out.

U.S. Sen. Harrison Schmitt, a Republican, criticized a "Tortilla Curtain" proposal by the Carter administration that calls for concrete and wire fences in El Paso, San Ysidro, Calif.. and San Luis, Ariz.

"So long as we don't allow interference with Americans looking for jobs, I don't see any problem," Schmitt said Thursday.

Schmitt added that he believes public outcry against the proposed "Tortilla Curtain" would be enough to stop the project.

He said he opposes amnesty for aliens residing in the United States because "it would encourage people who want to live here."

Deputies said about 10:30 p.m. Saturday they discovered Romero's body on the floor of a bedroom in the trailer where he lived. Officers said Romero had bullet wounds in his chest.

Authorities said a .38-caliber revolver was found at the scene and taken as possible evidence.

quickly washed away. When finished, Metro will cost \$6.8 billion, give or take \$100 million. This compares to the \$1.4 billion cost of the 75-mile BART opened in September 1972 to serve the San Francisco

If the full Washington system had been finished on schedule in 1973, the cost would have been \$2.5 billion, transit officials said. But with inflation, labor disputes, minority hiring practices, design and environmental problems, the earliest completion date now is 1984.

Like other systems, this underground-surface transit operation must survive with local government subsidies. Fares cover only half the cost of a ride. But ridership has met or exceeded expectations for the areas being served.

Based on rush-hour rides, fares range from 40 cents to \$1.05. An offpeak or Saturday ride costs 50 cents. A Sunday schedule is planned next year, a welcome development for Washington Redskin fans who could ride directly to Robert F. Kennedy Stadium. Trains recently carried 7,-500 people to a Monday night football game, and subway officials say there's room for many more.





# Dollar sagging; Gold soaring

LONDON (AP) - The sagging dollar tumbled to new lows and the price of gold skyrocketed in early trading on Europe's money markets today amid continued concern over American economic troubles.

The price of gold jumped nearly \$7 an ounce in Europe's main bullion markets, Zurich and London, as speculators sought their traditional sanctuary against monetary uncertainty in the precious metal.

Dealers said the renewed pressure on the dollar began in Tokyo and spread to Europe.

The dollar, which closed in Tokyo Friday at 179.625 yen, set three new lows today - an opening of 178.50 yen. a trading level of 178.30 and a closing

One dealer reported: "The dollar's poor performance has to do with exporters unloading dollars during the day. They're afraid the dollar might decline even further.

Europe's markets opened after Tokyo had closed and the dollar was in trouble as soon as trading began.

A Frankfurt broker commented: "There honestly seems to be no floor for the dollar in the market's mind." The dollar opened at a new low there in nervous dealing - 1.7400 marks. It quickly dipped to 1.7388 marks, down on Friday's closer of 1.7615 marks.

Many European dealers said the dollar could go lower. "The dollar is much lower than it should be," one dealer commented. "But we have no news that makes us feel it should be

In Paris, the dollar fell through the 4-franc level for the first time in three years. It opened at 4.00625 francs, well down from Friday's 4.07125-franc closer, then dipped to 3.9875.

"No one seems to want dollars," a dealer said.

In Zurich, the dollar opened at 1.4982 Swiss francs, down from Friday's 1.5040-franc closer. By mid-morning

it had tumbled to 1.4917 francs. In Milan, the dollar was quoted at an unofficial 33-month low of 789.25 lire, down from Friday's 795-lire

In London, the pound jumped more than 31/2 cents to \$2.0990, the first time it has been as high as \$2.09 since mid-September, 1975. The pound closed Friday at \$2.0630.

In Amsterdam, the dollar fell sharply to 1.8940 guilders in early trading from Friday's closer of 1.9400 guilders.

Some European dealers commented that only central bank intervention could stop the dollar sliding further. However, a Tokyo dealer reported that despite the U.S. currency's fall there the Japanese Central Bank made no move to prop it up.

The dollar has shed about 30 percent of its value in its 18-month nosedive. This has been caused by major problems in the U.S. economy.

ST. INIGOES, Md. (AP) - Rough seas today forced an indefinite delay in an effort to lift the ill-fated Cuyahoga from the bottom of the Chesapeake Bay, the Navy and Coast Guard an-

The death toll from the sinking of the cutter is now officially put at 11. The Coast Guard said the body of Senior Chief Machinery Technician David Markin, 34, of Newport News, Va., was found Sunday two miles west of where the Cuyahoga sank after a collision Oct. 20 with the Argentine coal ship Santa Cruz II. The Coast Guard ended its search after the location of Markin's body, spokesman Fred Maldonado said.

Eighteen other crewmen on the Cuyahoga, the Coast Guard's oldest vessel, were rescued after the accident. No one on the 521-foot freighter was injured.

Efforts to raise the steel-hulled, 125-foot cutter, lying in 57 feet of water, had been scheduled to begin Sunday evening but were postponed because adjustments were necessary on the slings under the Cuyahoga, Maldonado said.

Two floating cranes were on the scene off Smith Point, near the Maryland-Virginia border. Efforts were aimed at raising the 51-year-old cutter in one piece for study by a marine board of investigation, Coast Guard spokesman Fred Kern said.

The board, which held five days of hearings last week in Baltimore, planned to inspect the Cuyahoga, which was to be placed aboard a barge. Once the inspection was complete, the cutter was to be taken to the Coast Guard Support Center in Ports-



# Dollar sagging; Gold soaring

LONDON (AP) - The sagging dollar tumbled to new lows and the price of gold skyrocketed in early trading on Europe's money markets today amid continued concern over American economic troubles.

The price of gold jumped nearly \$7 an ounce in Europe's main bullion markets, Zurich and London, as speculators sought their traditional sanctuary against monetary uncertainty in the precious metal.

Dealers said the renewed pressure on the dollar began in Tokyo and spread to Europe

The dollar, which closed in Tokyo Friday at 179.625 yen, set three new lows today - an opening of 178.50 yen, a trading level of 178.30 and a closing

One dealer reported: "The dollar's poor performance has to do with exporters unloading dollars during the day. They're afraid the dollar might decline even further.'

Europe's markets opened after Tokyo had closed and the dollar was in trouble as soon as trading began. A Frankfurt broker commented:

"There honestly seems to be no floor for the dollar in the market's mind." The dollar opened at a new low there in nervous dealing - 1.7400 marks. It quickly dipped to 1.7388 marks, down on Friday's closer of 1.7615 marks.

Many European dealers said the dollar could go lower. "The dollar is much lower than it should be," one dealer commented. "But we have no news that makes us feel it should be

on the upswing."

In Paris, the dollar fell through the 4-franc level for the first time in three years. It opened at 4.00625 francs, well down from Friday's 4.07125-franc closer, then dipped to 3.9875.

"No one seems to want dollars," a dealer said.

In Zurich, the dollar opened at 1.4982 Swiss francs, down from Friday's 1.5040-franc closer. By mid-morning it had tumbled to 1.4917 francs.

In Milan, the dollar was quoted at an unofficial 33-month low of 789.25 lire, down from Friday's 795-lire

In London, the pound jumped more than 31/2 cents to \$2.0990, the first time it has been as high as \$2.09 since mid-September, 1975. The pound closed Friday at \$2.0630

In Amsterdam, the dollar fell sharply to 1.8940 guilders in early trading from Friday's closer of 1.9400

Some European dealers commented that only central bank intervention could stop the dollar sliding further. However, a Tokyo dealer reported that despite the U.S. currency's fall there the Japanese Central Bank

made no move to prop it up. The dollar has shed about 30 percent of its value in its 18-month nosedive. This has been caused by major problems in the U.S. economy.

The death toll from the sinking of the cutter is now officially put at 11. The Coast Guard said the body of Senior Chief Machinery Technician David Markin, 34, of Newport News, Va., was found Sunday two miles west of where the Cuyahoga sank after a

collision Oct. 20 with the Argentine coal ship Santa Cruz II. The Coast Guard ended its search after the location of Markin's body, spokesman Fred Maldonado said.

Eighteen other crewmen on the Cuyahoga, the Coast Guard's oldest vessel, were rescued after the accident. No one on the 521-foot freighter was injured.

Efforts to raise the steel-hulled, 125-foot cutter, lying in 57 feet of water, had been scheduled to begin

Sunday evening but were postponed because adjustments were necessary on the slings under the Cuyahoga, Maldonado said

Two floating cranes were on the scene off Smith Point, near the Maryland-Virginia border. Efforts were aimed at raising the 51-year-old cutter in one piece for study by a marine board of investigation, Coast Guard spokesman Fred Kern said.

The board, which held five days of hearings last week in Baltimore, planned to inspect the Cuyahoga, which was to be placed aboard a barge. Once the inspection was complete, the cutter was to be taken to the Coast Guard Support Center in Ports-

NEW YORK (AP) - Flight attendants for Pan American World Airways continued a sickout today to protest the absence of a contract with the airline, despite Pan Am's announcement of a temporary restraining order barring the action.

Flight delays of up to four hours were reported due to the wildcat protest, which began early this weekend. The attendants said about half of Pan Am's 3,800 stewards and stewardesses worldwide had called in sick.

They said the protest was not authorized by their International Union of Flight Attendants, which has failed to reach agreement with Pan Am on a new contract to replace one that expired last Oct. 31.

The attendants said the sickout is a reaction to the union board's vote Wednesday not to strike Pan Am despite fruitless negotiations.

One flight attendant said Sunday that talks between the union and Pan Am broke off on Oct. 20. Airline spokeswoman Lucille Rich, who said Pan Am "would not comment on the issues while negotiations are still effective." asserted that talks have "been on for a while.

Pan Am said the order signed Saturday night by Judge Mark Constantino in Brooklyn federal court "reaffirms that any disruptive action is illegal while negotiations are in

Neither union officers nor Pan Am have commented on the sickout, issues involved in negotiations, the number of attendants involved in the job action, or the number of delayed flights.

But a recorded message on departures from John F. Kennedy International Airport said "all flights have been indefinitely delayed" due to the

"There have been a lot of delays, said a Pan Am ticket agent who did not want to be identified. She said flights had been staffed by morning supervisors, and added that "we're expecting everything to get better now" due to the restraining order.

A flight steward reached at the union's Manhattan office said the attendants had not been served with the order, which he said Pan Am was using as a scare tactic to get people back to work.' The steward said major issues in



# Conspiracy brews in corporate realm endangering chiefs

NEW YORK (AP) - In the corporate suite where the facade is neat, controlled and subtly proper, a conspiracy might be hatching that could erupt in a palace revolt that topples

It's happening more often than before. Since 1975, presidents of major corporations have been ousted at an increasing rate, and more than half of them were undone by disgruntled sub-"This sort of thing didn't exist in the

1960s," says Professor Eugene Jennings, psychologist and confidential adviser to chief executives. There were "kitchen debates," but seldom revolts, he maintains.

In the kitchen debate, top tier executives discuss the chief executive's weaknesses and discretely leak to the board of directors the word that he no longer has their respect, support and confidence.

This is usually bad news for the chief, and often it can undermine his effectiveness, but he can still assert his leadership by effectively managing other members of his executive corps and the directors too.

By contrast, in an open palace revolt sides are chosen and the revolting side makes a demand upon the board: "He goes or we go."

Jennings, who teaches management at Michigan State Universty and is the author of numerous studies of corporate life, attributes the rising incidence of revolt to several peculiarities of today's business world. "In the 1960s there was a greater

respect for authority and an unwritten law among boards that no palace revolt should be successful. Almost all boards were made up of business people," he said. "Boards are different today. They

are comprised not only of business people but outsiders from various walks of life. Boards today are not as much believers in the old ethic." They meet more often too. In the 1960s, when directors met perhaps six

times a year, there was little opportunity for an executive to inform discretely on his boss. He simply didn't have the personal contact. Today, there is far more interaction between board and executive. Boards

'Corporate information systems today are swift, timely and accurate," he said. Others share the chief's information, so "there is no way a mediocre chief can hide his mistakes.

This legitimate access to information, largely through electronic computers, tends to undermine the ability of any leader to be autocratic or

'Strategy today is made through consensus rather than by a lone beacon," said Jennings. "It comes from analyses and planning. More so than before, strategy is subject to negotia-

"In many corporations, analytical techniques also permit alternative ourses, in itself a source of disunity. If the chief cannot mold out of this a cohesive group, and handle his opponents, disunity grows.'



WASHINGTON - With the ink hardly dry on his hard-fought bill giving natural gas producers higher prices for their product, President Carter is facing an awkward prospect: a natural gas glut.

The glut may be brief - that depends to a certain extent on how the new law works out in practice - but a wide range of experts now believe it could be lengthy.

"One of the prospects we seriously face is a natural gas glut," said Jay Kennedy, head of ELCON, a Washington coalition of major industrial en-

At the Energy Department, one of the administration's top policymakers said, "We have a gas glut now that could run on for 3 or 4 years."

Oil industry executives bristle at the term "glut," particularly since during the debate over the gas bill they had maintained that without higher prices the nation would face a long-term shortage.

I prefer to call it a bubble," said Bud Lawrence, president of the American Gas Association, And in Houston, one of the nation's top natural gas analysts is calling it "an over-deliverability situation."

How long the glut lasts depends on the effects of the complicated natural gas measure Carter signs into law, and whether the tantalizing prospects of major gas imports from Mexico and Canada come on stream.

By any name, however, there has been a dramatic change in the nation's gas outlook. Up until a few months ago, most gas companies were not allowing new industrial hookuns, and as recently as two years ago papers such as The New York Times and The Washington Post carried headlines warning "Gas shortage a Fundamental Long-Term Economic Threat to U.S."

This dizzying shift from shortage to glut has left consumers to say nothi of some members of Congress who just finished the often acrimonious legislative battle, confused.

There are some real contradictions here that have to be worked out,". said ELCON's Kennedy when asked about the supply outlook.

One thing that is certain about the suddenly abundant gas supply outlook is that it has taken the gleam off some new high-cost energy projects.

FERC Commissioner Don Smith said, "It may slow down some goal gasification projects, as well as some uefied natural gas projects." Coal gasification is a high-cost method to convert coal to pipeline quality gas. LNG costs, which require expensive shipping, are about twice the highest cost of conventional gas now sold in

would be in jeopardy, at least for a while," said one top Energy Department official, adding that given the choice of gas from Canada or Mexico at less than \$3 per 1000 cubic feet, 14.50 gas from Alaska looks less at-

Edward Saouma, director-general of the U.N. Food and Agriculture Organization, said 1.5 billion people depend on wood for cooking, heating and hot watter. He said some must travel as flar as 60 miles for firewood and conserve it by eating only one cooked meal a day. "The use of flossil fuels is far too

costly for the poor. Future alternatives such as solar energy.... will not he available for many years to come. Shortages of fuelwood are already sevene in many countries and are ng the gett warse," he said. Wood amounts for 30 percent of the

Saouma said as wood supplies van-ish, villagers must travel farther for fuel, often cutting shrubs and other vegetation, causing erosion and other long-range agricultural problems.

The conference was told more and more labor is diverted to supplying firewood. In parts of Tanzania, in east Africa, it is estimated that 250-300 man-days are needed to fill the annual firewood requirements of a sin-

J.E. "Mike" Arnold, the FAO's chief forestry planner, said wood accounts for nearly three-fifths of all energy in Africa. more than two-fifths in the Far East (excluding China), one-fifth in Latin America and 14 percent in the Near East.

The shortage was virtually unrecognized four years ago although some countries took action earlier, he said, adding developing nations should follow the lead of South Korea, India and China and their successful fuelwood growing programs, estab-lishing "social" or firewood forests.

He said South Korea has reeducated its foresters, encouraged a switch to coal and replanted 1.25 million acres of fuelwood trees since 1973.

"Conditions vary from country to country, but fuelwood shortages have reached serious levels in wood-poor countries of all developing regions... where crisis conditions exist, there is a clear need to lower fuelwood comsumption in urban arees, where higher incomes permit the use of al-ternative fuels," Saouma said.

# Scientist says nuclear, coal plants not needed

LITTLE ROCK (AP) - Gesturing to the overhead lights in the room, Amory B. Lovins, the controversial scientist, asked, "Are these need-

The knot of people gathered around him didn't reply at first. Until that moment, Lovins informally had been discussing methods of soil conservation and biomass, a way of generating energy by burning vegetation. Finally, all agreed the lights could

Lovins switched off the lights and plunged the room into semi-dark-

"I just can't see that," he began, but his listeners were chuckling. They didn't need to hear more, considering Lovins' well-known aversion to energy waste.

Lovins came to Arkansas last week to convey his views on nuclear and coal-fired power plants, which he says are wasteful and unneeded, and to argue that future energy needs can be met by utilizing renewable energy sources, such as the sun, the wind, water and vegetation. He has coined the term "soft path" to describe his approach.

Lovins' best known essay on the subject appeared in the Fall 1976 edition of Foreign Affairs. It was entitled "Energy Strategy: The Road Not

Since 1976, Lovins, 31, the British representative of the Friends of the Earth, has been at the center of a debate that has raged in most of the industrialized nations. The issue could be summed up by asking this question: How should we plan for a future of limited fossil fuels? Lovins' nove approach is three-

- Present energy systems can be made more efficient. Lovins contends that energy now is consumed in the United States at 10 percent efficien-

- Present energy systems are not appropriate for the tasks for which they are used-"like slicing butter with a chain saw," Lovins once said. - "Soft path" economics ultimately will prevail over the economics of

depletable resources, because the 'soft path" is cheaper than "hard" technology, such as power plants. "The soft path, in a sense, is unstoppable," he says.

It is this last statement that arouses the most skepticism in Lovins' listeners. To many, such a dramatic change of course implies disruption of the social and economic orders. But Lovins says that the developed

countries can embark on the "soft

path" now, if they begin using energy more efficiently and switch to renewable energy sources. Nonrenewable energy sources, such as fossil fuels could be used during the interim peri-Lovins says that this change could be achieved smoothly through the

present system, with the help of power companies and utilities, which he said could actually finance the Basically, Lovins says many individuals cannot afford to switch to

renewable energy sources. Utilities, on the other hand, are being driven to bankruptcy by the expense of continuing to build massive power plants, The solution could be for utilities to

loan money to individuals to switch to renewable energy sources. "They can act as bankers," he said. This would keep utilities financially







# College football's surprise teams continue to win

College football's surprise teams of 1978 - Maryland, Houston, Navy, Georgia and Purdue - continued their winning ways over the weekend, and the surprise may be starting to

Fifth-ranked Maryland, one of the four remaining major teams with perfect records, blanked Duke 27-0 but the Terrapins are far from home free. They have a major nonleague showdown with second-ranked Penn State on tap next Saturday, plus an Atlantic Coast Conference shoo-

tout with Clemson on Nov. 18. Houston, No. 11 in last week's Assoclated Press ratings, probably will crack the Top Ten in the next one thanks to a come-from-behind 20-9 victory over ninth-ranked Arkansas.

NO. 18 Navy remained among the unbeatens - top-rated Oklahoma and runnerup Penn State are the others by knocking off No. 15 Pitt 21-11 while No. 16 Georgia came from 16 points down to nip Kentucky 17-16 and No. 17 Purdue whipped Iowa 34-7.

The weekend's results left Houston and Texas tied for the Southwest Conference lead, Georgia and Alabama among the non-losers in Southeastern Conference play — so is Auburn and Purdue in the driver's seat for the Big Ten title and the Rose Bowl.

Meanwhile, Oklahoma and Penn State kept rolling toward a possible national championship showdown in the Orange Bowl if they finish the regular season 1-2. Both teams have 8-0 records - Oklahoma trounced Kansas State 56-19 and Penn State trimmed West Virginia 49-21 - with three regular-season contests remaining. Oklahoma must face Colorado, Nebraska and Oklahoma State while Penn State has Maryland, North Carolina State and Pitt left.

ONE TEAM had its perfect record ended when unranked Holy Cross bowed 31-25 to Brown as Mark Whip-

ple passed for two touchdowns and scored two

Elsewhere, Keith Pugh caught five passes - four of them sensational grabs - for 148 yards, including a 45-yard touchdown toss from Jeff Rutledge, to lead third-ranked Alabama past Virginia Tech 35-0. Rutledge also fired a 27-yarder to Bruce

Fourth-ranked Nebraska, prepping for its Nov. 11 shootout with Oklahoma, turned back Oklahoma State 22-14 as Tom Sorley scored once and passed 20 yards to Rick Berns for another TD.

Paul McDonald threw three touch-

one to Vic Rakhshani while Charles White and Lynn Cain combined for 320 yards on the ground to lead sixthranked Southern Cal past California

EIGHTH-RANKED Michigan avenged last year's loss to Minnesota by whacking the Gophers 42-10 as Rick Leach threw for three touchdowns and ran for two.

Tenth-ranked UCLA defeated Arizona 24-14 on Friday night while on Saturday No. 12 Arizona State was drubbed 41-7 by Washington as Toussaint Tyler scored twice and Tom Porras tallied one TD and passed for

No. 13 Missouri squandered a 27-7 lead in the final 20 minutes and lost to Colorado 28-27 when Eddie Ford scored on runs of 7 and 16 yards and Bill Solomon added a 12-yarder.

Louisiana State, No. 14, was idle but Vagas Ferguson scored twice as No. 19 Notre Dame blanked Miami of Florida 20-0 and Clemson's Lester Brown outrushed North Carolina State's Ted Brown 117 yards to 70 as the 20th-ranked Tigers downed the Wolfpack 33-10.

WASHINGTON - Billy Kilmer had a fine analysis of his successful reemergence Sunday as the Washington Redskin quarterback - and, no, Joe Walton did not send in the words for

"Guess I'd better play good against a 1-7 team," Kilmer said after that 1-7 team, the 49ers, became 1-8.

Those searching for cosmic answers about the Redskins one game beyond midseason still are stymied, because Joe Thomas is in the teardown phase of his rebuilding program in San Francisco.

Because both had been in similar positions with the Jets, John Riggins said he mentioned to defensive tackle Ed Galigher Saturday night that if the Redskins got two touchdowns ahead the 49ers probably would "quit."

"He just acknowledged it," Riggins

SO KILMER was exactly right in not applauding himself too lustily after the 38-20 victory. Probably, Joe Theismann also could have won -

and the thought occurs that Jack Pardee almost had to switch quarterbacks last week to remain consistently honest with the team. The dominant theme in Pardee's

brief service as Redskin coach has been that a player either performs of gets benched - or fired. Len Hauss and Rusty Tillman were the first examples; Frank Grant and Ron McDole were among the latest. Theismann had been playing poorly

for at least two weeks. So why make him an exception, especially with Kilmer's record as a winner? Naturally, there were doubters - and Kilmer might not feel comfortable if he were not greeted in RFK Stadium by hearty boos. Among the doubters, undoubtedly,

was Kilmer. He did not say so, but his face did. He is, after all, a 39-year-old man with a 79-year-old body who was being paid handsomely to keep his mouth shut while Theismann was given his job before the season.

IF THAT was not enough to raise a question or two about his usefulness



# Black Hawks, Rangers crack negative streaks

**By The Associated Press** All bad things must come to an end - including strings of frustration in

the National Hockey League. That point was underscored Sunday night when the Chicago Black Hawks, Vancouver Canucks and New York Rangers won games to snap negative streaks.

Chicago's period of futility against the Montreal Canadiens ended three years, to the day, after it began. Two goals by Ivan Boldirev helped the Black Hawks beat the Canadiens 4-1 for Chicago's first triumph over the defending champions in 12 games dating back to Oct. 29, 1975.

The Canucks, meanwhile, hadn't beaten the Flyers at Philadelphia in 18 games there since Nov. 21, 1974. There had been 16 Flyers victories and two ties in that span - until Sunday night, when Vancouver recorded a 5-2 triumph for only the second Spectrum victory in Canucks'

THE RANGERS' streak was the shortest of the three. New York had been winless in its last five home games against the Pittsburgh Penguins, going back to Dec. 23, 1975, but wiped that slate clean with a 3-2 victory in the only other NHL game Sunday night.

Of course, each reversal starts a similar streak for the other side. Montreal, for one, isn't used to that type of





The hurricane center also said high tides and beach erosion were likely to mark the southeastern coastlines.

South led a trump to his hand and tried the diamond finesse. East pounced on this with the king of diamonds, cashed the ace of clubs and led another heart, defeating the contract with two hearts, one diamond

and one club. PESSIMISM PAYS

Declarer should pessimistically play dummy's ace of hearts at the first trick instead of finessing. The heart finesse is not essential. South leads a trump to his hand and

then tries the essential diamond

finesse. There is no harm in allowing East to win a diamond, but South must do what he can to keep West out. East does win the diamond trick, but he cannot get the lead to West for a heart return. The defenders can get only one heart trick since South will draw trumps and discard a heart on dummy's fourth diamond. One heart trick is not enough to defeat the con-
