## Auto ferries just one big joke?

| SOUTH SHORE, Ky. (AP) - Until last summer, to get from South Shore to Portsmouth, Ohio, you spent a few minutes on the bridge over the Ohio River. Now you spend a few hours River. Now yo waiting in line. <br> The U.S. Grant Bridge was closed in August so structural defects could be repaired. It's supposed to reopen in December 1979. In the meantime, it's for pedestrians and two for cars. The bridge used to take 12,000 cars a day, officials say.
