Hospital Faced With Software Purchase

Although the Muleshoe Area Hospital District spent approximately \$750,000 on a federally required electronic medical records system a couple of years ago, the district's board of directors learned during Thursday's regular meeting the current system will need to be replaced.

The information came during the board's strategic planning session, during which the hospital's IT coordinator Bobby Turner explained that representatives from Healthland had notified him the EMR program that had been installed will be neither upgraded nor supported after the third quarter of 2014.

While the hospital received a reimbursement of about \$350 for installing the program, that still leaves the hospital district on the hook for the remaining amount.

According to Turner, the program — Healthland Classic EMR — won't function on a computer with a newer operating system than Windows XP, which in turn is no longer supported by Microsoft.

During the discussion, computer consultant Dave Buchanan noted that Healthland Classic is based on computer software — D-Base, one of the first database management programs, that is a couple of decades old.

"They eventually had to admit it (Healthland Classic) wouldn't work on Windows 7," he added.

Turner explained that because Healthland Classic can't be upgraded the hospital won't be able to meet the federal "Meaningful Use State 2" requirements, which will be necessary for the hospital to receive reimbursement funds.

MISD Local Passes

Muleshoe ISD is once again offering the MISD Local Pass to senior citizens (65 and older) who are residents of the district.

The MISD Local Pass was designed to allow senior citizens who are residents of the Muleshoe school district to attend locally sponsored school events at no cost.

Senior citizens who wish to obtain a MISD Local Pass may do so by seeing Pam Thomson the MISD Superintendent's office or by calling her at 272-7404.

Guidelines for the use of the MISD Local Pass Card are as follows:

Good only for events sponsored by the Muleshoe Independent School District. (This includes district and non-district athletic events.)

Certain District or Regional UIL activities, even though they may be held in Muleshoe, are not covered by this pass. (e.g.- district One Act Plays)

The MISD Local Pass is not acceptable for activities such as dinner theater productions, suppers, etc.

The MISD Local Pass covers only one admittance and is non-transferable.

The MISD Local Pass is not acceptable for department activities (such as speech/drama, home economics, etc.) used as fund-raisers unless approved by the sponsor and/or principal.

When he finally arrives back near Bethany, the funeral wreath, so to speak, is on the door.

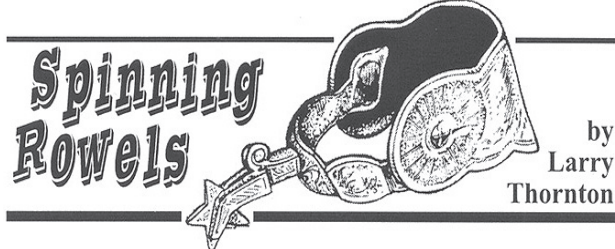
The "sign-in" register for friends and family who come to pay their respects is on its little stand just inside the front door of the house. And death has very effectively wrapped the whole household in its icy grip.

Even when others nearby, seeing Jesus' tears, are moved to say, "Behold how he loved him!" some of them say, basically, "He opened

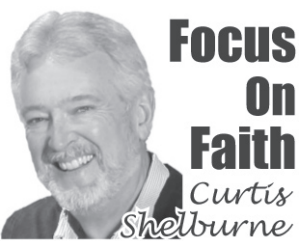

EMR software, the hospital district will be faced with additional costs of about \$60,000 for new computers at Muleshoe Area Memorial Center.

An additional \$15-30,000 may be needed for peripheral equipment, depending upon the requirements of the new EMR program.

"This is one of those things," Turner said. "We don't have any choice."

Although the federal government won't "force" the hospital district to make the change, Turner indicated it was a numbers game in which the hospital will lose.

"If you don't, the (federal) government will cut (Medicare) reimbursements, and in the fourth year fine the hospital," he said.

"When they do it to the bigger hospitals," Turner said, "they do it to us also."

According to Turner,

the hospital district is already in HIPAA violation for every computer it is operating under the XP operating system. However, action or penalties for such violations have been deferred until April 2014.

The new program — depending upon the vendor selected by the MAHD board, could run from \$500,000 up to \$3.9 million.

During the MAHD board's discussion of the district's technological needs, Turner and Buchanan also talked about the problems facing the district at Park View Nursing Care Center.

It was explained that

computer changes were necessary at the facility by October 2013 to meet the federal government's electronic document requirements.

"We're about dragging them into this century," Buchanan said, referring to the fact that the majority of documentation at the nursing home was on paper.

"It's tough bringing the facility current," he said. "We're running on a very tough schedule, and that includes training."

It was estimated that the nursing home was losing about \$15,000 a month because some necessary electronic documentation wasn't

being submitted for reimbursement.

Turner and Buchanan also spoke about the hospital's outdated telephone system.

"This system is so old we can't repair it or replace parts," Turner said. "To call it awful would be a compliment."

In other business, the hospital district board:

- Received a financial report in which it was noted the hospital's cash balance at the end of June was \$387,755.15, while Park View's was \$76,133.89.

The hospital's accounts receivable had dropped by approximately \$12,000 to 41,012,885.67 during the same period, and its accounts payable had decreased to \$752,620.73.

At Park view, the accounts receivable had decreased to \$211,255.02, and its accounts payable had dropped to \$99,206.40.

The hospital's year-to-date revenue is \$7,108,084.66, an increase of \$185,300.95 from its current budget. While Park View's Y-T-D revenue is up by \$206,429.88, and stands at \$2,661,216.26.

- Went into executive session for about 90 minutes to receive information concerning the hospital's Q&A report, and to discuss personnel matters. No

action was taken upon the board members' return to open session.

- Approved the minutes from the board's June 27 regular meeting.

- Approved the appointment of radiologist Michael J. Hall, MD.

The hospital district board will be meeting for another special session on Thursday, Aug. 1, at 6 p.m.

Dealing With White Grubs In Lawns

White grubs are the larval stage of insects commonly known as May or June beetles.

White grubs, sometimes referred to as grubworms, injure turf by feeding on roots and other underground plant parts.

Damaged areas within lawns lose vigor and turn brown. Severely damaged turf can be lifted by hand or rolled up from the ground like a carpet.

Most turfgrass-feeding white grubs in Texas require one year to complete their life cycle.

In summer adult beetles emerge from the soil to mate. Mated females then return to the soil to lay eggs.

Within about two weeks the eggs hatch into small white grubs

that feed on grass roots.

Most damage from white grubs occurs during mid-summer to early-fall when the larger larvae are actively feeding.

The adult stage of the various white grub species are heavy-bodied beetles, 1/2 to 5/8 inch long, brown, with long, spindly legs.

Egg laying periods may last for several weeks, after mating, female beetles dig two to five inches into the soil to lay eggs.

Each female can lay up to 30 to 40 eggs, which hatch in approximately two weeks.

White grub larvae are creamy white and C-shaped, with three pairs of legs.

Larger larvae (1/2 to one inch-long) are responsible for most turfgrass damage due to their large size and voracious appetites.

Feeding by large numbers of large white grubs can quickly destroy turfgrass root systems, preventing efficient uptake of moisture.

Damaged turf does not grow vigorously and is extremely susceptible to drying out.

When cool weather arrives, white grubs become dormant until the following spring.

Occasionally white grubs will be found in turfgrass areas that fail to green up in the spring; however, the damage is primarily the result of feeding that occurred the previous fall.

Spring and winter treatments for white grubs with one-year life cycles generally are ineffective in preventing turf damage.

White grub damage can be detected by the presence of irregular-shaped areas of

weakened or dying grass in the lawn.

Less severely damaged turf lacks vigor and is more vulnerable to invasion by weeds.

Turfgrass damaged by white grubs has a reduced root system and is easily pulled from the soil.

Grubs should be readily found in the top few inches of soil, in the turfgrass root zone to justify an insecticide application but if a lawn has a history of grubworm damage a preventative insecticide application may be warranted.

Proper timing and chemical application are critical to suppressing white grubs.

New white grub insecticides are more persistent and less toxic to beneficial arthropods and earthworms.

However, these treatments must be applied early enough, ideally, within six weeks of egg-laying, to kill the smaller larvae.

Thursday Is Deadline To Submit Nominations For Farm Service Agency County Committees

Juan M. Garcia, Administrator of USDA's Farm Service Agency (FSA), recently reminded farmers, ranchers and other agricultural producers that they have until Thursday, Aug. 1, to nominate eligible

candidates to serve on local FSA county committees.

"The last day to file your nomination form is about a week away," Garcia said. "Please get involved this year and nominate the candidate of your choice

or nominate yourself to serve on your local county committee."

"I especially encourage the nomination of beginning farmers and ranchers, as well as women and minorities. This is your opportunity

to have a say in how federal programs are delivered in your county," he said.

FSA county committees help local farmers through their decisions on commodity price support loans, conservation programs

and disaster programs, and by working closely with county executive directors.

To be eligible to hold office as a county committee member, individuals must participate or cooperate in a program administered by FSA, be eligible to vote in a county committee election and live in the local administrative area where they are running.

A complete list of eligibility requirements, more information and nomination forms are

available at <http://www.fsa.usda.gov/elections>.

All nominees must sign the nomination form FSA-669A. All nomination forms for the 2013 election must be postmarked or received in the local USDA Service Center by close of business on Aug. 1.

Ballots will be mailed to eligible voters by Nov. 4 and are due back to the local USDA Service Centers on Dec. 2.

The newly elected county committee members will take office Jan. 1, 2014.

Texas Farm Service Agency Announces Accepted CRP Offers

USDA Texas Farm Service Agency (FSA) Executive Director, Judith A. Canales recently announced that Texas will accept 2,092 offers on more than 312,000 acres offered under the 45th Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) general sign-up that ended in June.

Texas FSA received 2,226 offers on more than 333,000 acres of land, demonstrating CRP's continuing appeal as one of our nation's most successful voluntary programs for soil, water and wildlife conservation. Nationwide, USDA accepted enrollment of 1.7 million acres.

"The positive environmental

impacts realized over CRP's 28 year history shows that producers, landowners and USDA are committed to protecting and conserving our state's natural resources," said Canales.

"These new CRP contracts will insure continued efforts to conserve and protect wetlands and grasslands and improve wildlife habitat; while the annual rental payments to producers continue to support rural economies across the state," he added.

Landowners enrolled

in CRP receive annual rental payments and cost-share assistance to establish long-term, resource conserving covers on eligible farmland. Accepted contracts will become effective October 1, 2013.

National data demonstrates that during 2012, CRP helped to reduce nitrogen and phosphorous losses from farm fields by 605 million pounds and 121 million pounds respectively.

CRP has restored more than two million acres of wetlands and

associated buffers and reduces soil erosion by more than 300 million tons per year.

All CRP sign-up 45 offers were evaluated and ranked using the Environmental Benefits Index (EBI) that consists of the following five environmental factors plus cost: wildlife enhancement, water quality, soil erosion, enduring benefits and air quality.
