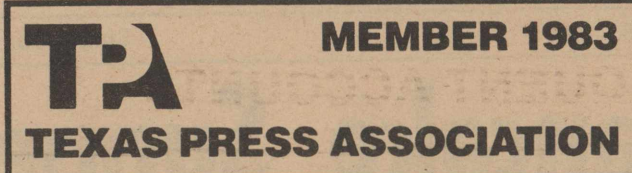

New Tax Law Will Become Effective July 1

Beginning July 1, 1983, payers of interest and dividends must withhold ten percent of each payment for federal income tax, the Internal Revenue Service said. Tax will be withheld at the time the interest and dividend payments are made to the individual or credited to the individual's account.

Certain taxpayers will be exempt from withholding if they file certificates of exemption with payers and if they meet any of the following requirements:

- Taxpayer last year had a tax liability of \$600 or less (or \$1,000 or less if married filing a joint return);

- Taxpayer is 65 or older and last year's tax liability was \$1,500 or less (or \$2,500 or less if taxpayer or spouse is 65 or older and they filed a joint return);

- Taxpayer, or taxpayer and spouse, were not required to file an income tax return last year.

However, the IRS noted, many taxpayers may find the withholding a convenience that will free them of the need to make quarterly estimated tax payments and/or prevent them from being faced at tax time with a substantial tax bill and possible penalties for not having enough tax withheld.

The IRS also said that the withholding will have a very minimal effect on accrual of interest. The Treasury Department estimates that the yield on an asset earning nine percent would be reduced by five one-hundredths of one percent -- to 8.95 percent.

Certificates of exemption should be obtained from payers. If they are not available, request Form W-6, "Individual Certificate of Exemption," by writing the IRS. Those who receive interest or dividends from more than one payer must file a Certificate of Exemption with each payer. Taxpayers with more than one account with the same payer should check with the payer to determine whether separate certificates are required for each account.

USE HERBICIDES ON RANGE WEEDS--- Range weeds could be a serious problem in many areas of Texas this spring due to last summer's drought and good rains in late fall and winter. Ranchers can use the herbicide 2, 4-D in early spring to control such annual broadleaf weeds as distaff thistle, broomweed, camphorweed and ragweed, says a range brush and weed control specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. A dicamba-2, 4-D mixture or a picloram-2, 4-D mixture is effective on harder-to-kill weeds.

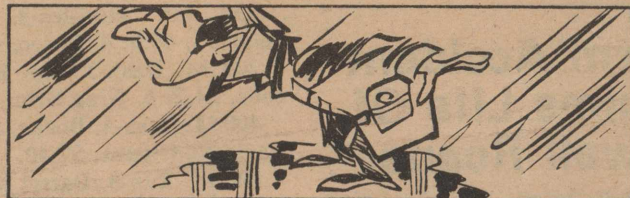
Steer Golfers Are Second

County Attorney Gives Weapons Information

The following article is a public service by the Bronte Enterprise and The Robert Lee Observer through the cooperation of Bill Helwig, County Attorney and The Prosecutor Council. Its purpose is to make you aware of a prosecutor's role, of your responsibility as a resident of Coke County and how we can work together to alleviate some of society's problems. The following article is the first in a series of three articles which deal with the possession and carrying of weapons in Texas.

POSSESSION AND OWNERSHIP OF WEAPONS UNDER TEXAS LAW [Part I]

Since the law on the subject of ownership, possession, and carrying of weapons in Texas is complicated, it is understandable that there is considerable confusion in this area. The objective of this series of articles is to help create a better understanding of where the lines are drawn, so as to assist the law-abiding citizen in staying within the law.

There are certain weapons whose possession and ownership are outlawed altogether in Texas. According to the Texas Penal Code, the following weapons are considered illegal:

- (1) Bombs, incendiary devices, rockets, etc.,
- (2) Military equipment such as grenades, bazookas, artillery pieces, and mortars,
- (3) Machine Guns, i.e. guns capable of shooting more than two shots without manual reloading, by a single function of the trigger,
- (4) Shortbarrel firearms, i.e. rifles with a barrel length of less than 16 inches, shotguns with barrels less than 18 inches long, and any sawed-off shotgun or rifle with an overall length of less than 26 inches,
- (5) Silencers for both handguns and longarms,
- (6) Switchblades knives, which includes spring knives as well as knives that can be slung open, and
- (7) Knuckles, i.e. finger rings or guards made of a hard substance and designed for the purpose of causing serious bodily injury or death. This specifically includes brass knuckles.

The weapons listed above are classified under Texas law as "prohibited weapons" and their possession in one's home or carried on one's person is a criminal offense. It should be noted, however, that Federal law may, in some instances, permit the ownership and possession of certain weapons which are otherwise prohibited. In order to comply with Federal laws on the subject, it is necessary to obtain a license from the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms of the U.S. Treasury Department. Licenses for such purposes are expensive and their possession is subject to very restrictive Federal regulation.

The next article in this series will discuss the unlawful carrying of weapons.

MINISTERS MISLED ON SOCIAL SECURITY COVERAGE

At least two consulting firms headquartered in the Dallas area have been telling ministers they can opt out of social security coverage, after participating in the program, by declaring themselves to be employees of non-profit corporations. The firms are asking for a share of the "tax savings" and may also be offering to sell alternative pension plans. According to Frank Upp, Manager of the San Angelo Social Security Office, the advice being offered is contrary to the social security tax laws covering ministers.

"Ministers of religious groups whose teachings oppose public or private insurance benefits for retirement, disability of survivor protection have the option of not participating in social security when they begin their ministerial careers," Upp said. "However, he explained, "they must request an exemption from social security coverage by the tax return due date for the second year in which they have net income of least \$400.00 from their services as a minister." Fewer than 10% of recognized religious groups qualify for this option.

Ministers who do not request an exemption from social security coverage report their ministerial earnings as self-employment income for social security tax purposes, even though they may be considered salaried employees for income tax purposes. Under the social security tax law, a minister is not considered an employee of a church, denomination, or corporation, according to Upp. Also, Upp said, ministers should be sure to include in their net self-employment income the rental value of a parsonage or a rental allowance, if provided. These amounts do count for social security self-employment tax purposes, even though they are excluded from gross income tax purposes. Upp said there has been some misinformation circulating about the social security tax treatment of rental allowances for ministers. The erroneous information stems from a recent court ruling which excluded the value of employer-provided housing for certain wage earners. Since ministers are not considered wage earners or employees for social security tax purposes, the court case did not affect the way ministers' self-employment income is computed, Upp emphasized.

Upp suggested ministers get a copy of IRS publication 517, "Social Security for members of the clergy and religious workers" to avoid being misled by erroneous advice.

Still Time To Open IRA's

Eligible workers have until April 15, 1983, to make contributions to the Individual Retirement Arrangements (IRA's) and still claim them as deductions on their 1982 federal income tax return.

If they request an extension to file their return, they have until June 15, 1983, to make their contributions, the Internal Revenue Service says.

Eligible employees claiming IRA's on 1982 returns are allowed up to \$2,000 in contributions to an IRA. Since penalties are assessed for excessive contributions, taxpayers should calculate the amount of the contribution carefully.

Banks, insurance companies, credit unions, and other financial institutions can provide assistance in establishing and maintaining new IRA's and in calculating maximum contributions allowable on 1982 tax returns.

Detailed information on IRA's is contained in IRS Publication 590, "Tax Information on Individual Retirement Arrangement," available by using the order form in the tax package.

Estimated Tax Due April 15th

Some wage earners and other individuals who have income other than wages may be required to file estimated tax payments, the Internal Revenue Service says.

You are liable for filing a declaration of estimated tax if you have income not subject to withholding of more than \$500 and you expect to owe at least \$300 on next year's return. The IRS states that you are also liable if you expect to owe at least \$300 and your gross income is more than:

\$20,000-- if you file as single, head of household, or qualifying widow or widower.

\$10,000-- if you are married, can file a joint declaration, and both of you have received wages for 1982.

\$5,000-- if you are married and cannot file a joint declaration.

Just like withholding by employers, the IRS says, estimated taxes are paid in advance of the actual tax return, Form 1040, due for the year. Estimated taxes are normally paid in four installments, and there is a substantial penalty for underpayment of estimated taxes.

For 1983 returns, the four estimated tax installment dates are:

April 15, 1983
June 15, 1983
September 15, 1983
January 16, 1984

Those who haven't tried spring turkey hunting are in for a real treat, so put the chalk to those calls and get your guns ready.

TEXAS FARMERS GO "PIK-ING"-- Texas farmers have signed up to idle some 9.3 million acres of cropland through the PIK (payment-in-kind) program, says an economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. This reduction is out of a base of almost 24 million acres of wheat, cotton, grain sorghum, corn, rice, barley and oats. PIK is designed to reduce huge stockpiles of farm commodities by using these commodities to pay farmers for taking their land out of production. This should help improve farm prices although weather conditions during the year and the level of export demand will be key factors.

Filing Date Can Be Extended

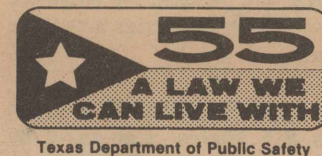
Do you need extra time to file your federal tax return? The Internal Revenue Service says you may receive an automatic four-month extension of time to file. Previously, a taxpayer could get a two-month automatic extension. The change is part of 1982 tax legislation.

The application for an extension beyond the April 15 deadline is filed on Form 4868, Application for Automatic Extension of Time to File U.S. Individual Income Tax Return.

The IRS stresses that this is an extension of time to file your return--not an extension of time for payment of taxes due. When filing for the extension, the taxpayer must estimate the tax owed for 1982 and sent that amount with the Form 4868 to avoid interest and late payment penalties.

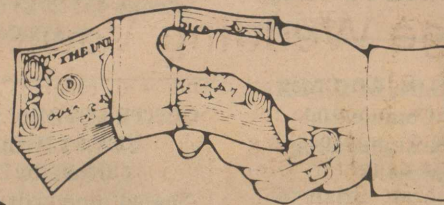
The application for the extension must be filed by April 15.

GROWING TOMATOES LIKE A PRO--- About 95 percent of all Texas gardens have tomatoes, and this popular vegetable can produce a bountiful harvest by following a few proven practices, says a horticulturist with the Texas Agriculturist Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. First, choose consistent performers such as Big Set, Spring Giant, Jack Pot and Better Boy. Add plenty of organic matter and a complete fertilizer to the soil. Protect young plants from early spring winds with boards, shingles or milk cartons. Or put plastic bags around the wire cages you will use to support the plants as they get larger. Apply a fertilizer solution to plants every week or 10 days once small tomatoes appear.

Coke County Commissioner's Court Has Busy Session Tuesday

The Coke County commissioners held court Tuesday, April 5, in the courthouse at Robert Lee with all commissioners and county judge present. After the pledge to the flag and approval of the minutes from the last meeting, business on the agenda was undertaken.

* Sheriff Marshall Millican gave a report on Texas Association of Counties intervening and challenging the County Jails Standards Commission in Texas. Commissioners voted to participate and to pay \$250. as their share of the attorney's fee.

* Corrected the amount of travel expenses paid to the county extension-agents to comply with the budget.

* Voted to grant Thompson Butane Co. the county's account for butane at Bronte and granted Ditmore Butane Co., the Robert Lee account for butane.

* Discussed Senate Bill 676 and 1169, also, House Bill 877.

* Discussed and signed supporting Joint Resolution #91.

* Commissioner Luckett presented an estimate on the roofing

of the Bronte Park caretaker's house and commissioners awarded Joel Shipp the contract in the amount of \$4,500.

* Approved the request of county clerks to attend the area County and District Clerks convention to be held in Marfa April 29.

* Corrected the fees for the Veteran's official to \$1,000. yearly dues and \$200. travel expense in the budget.

* Made the order to designate Robert Lee State Bank of Robert Lee and First National Bank of Bronte as county depository banks.

* Entered into a contract with City of Sweetwater to deputize J. Lee Ensor as a Coke County deputy and a Lake Patrolman and then deputized Ensor.

* Corrected the salary of county assistant-auditor upon District Judge Royal Hart's approval to read \$43.75 per day for a 22 day month and to pay for twelve holiday days per year.

* Discussed an ordinance concerning the protection against rabies and delayed action until more information is obtained.

* Approved bills for payment and adjourned.

Cane Pole - Still A Good Fishing Tool

Although most of the high technology anglers of today wouldn't be caught dead using a cane pole, many fish are caught with this simplest of fishing rigs, says Jim Davis, fisheries specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The cane pole is especially efficient for catching croppie, bluegill and redear sunfish during nesting activity. Using a cane pole, positioning a minnow, cricket or earthworm into small openings in brushy areas becomes easy with a little experience.

Flipping, a bass fishing technique using a long rod and fairly short line, copied a time tested cane pole fishing method.

Fishing with a cane pole is not as complicated as other methods. This characteristic surely accounts for its immense popularity, Davis says. There are, however, certain methods that can enhance fishing success with a cane pole.

The length of a cane pole should be two to three times as long as the anglers height. More length makes the pole too cumbersome and less length may not

provide the desired reach.

Several types of line are available for cane pole fishing, with monofilament the most popular. When selecting a line, buy the smallest pound test that will hold the biggest fish you expect to catch, Davis advises. Also, the lighter the line used, the less likely the fish are to detect it and the more life-like the bait will appear.

The end of the line should be tied securely about two-thirds of the way up the pole, then additional knots tied at one foot intervals to the end of the pole. If a large fish is hooked, the terminal end of the pole may be broken but the additional knots may assist in landing an otherwise lost fish.

Perhaps the most important item for cane pole fishing is the hook. Although hooks come in a variety of shapes and sizes, a good rule of thumb is to match the hook size to the mouth size of the fish. Proper hook style selection can also account for more fish and prolong bait life.

Floats and sinkers are optional equipment utilized by cane pole enthusiasts. Floats assist in signalling a bite and also in suspending the bait at the desired fishing depth. Sinkers are used to

carry the bait down and hold it in the fishing area.

Cane pole fishing is easy to learn and a good way to master the basics of a great pastime. Under many conditions, the cane pole can catch more fish than more sophisticated tackle. Don't look past this technique when fresh fish are needed for the table, Davis concludes.

"The average amount of time women spend in household activities has changed very little in the past fifty years," says Lynn White, a home economics specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. According to White, research shows that homemakers as a whole spend 47-52 hours a week in household activities. Employed wives spend 26-35 hours per week on household activities in addition to their forty-hour work week. "Major appliances, easy-care clothes and convenience foods have not led to a decrease in the total time spend on household work," says White, "although they have changed the way in which that time is spent."

Rabies Clinic Set For April 9 In Robert Lee

The Annual Coke County 4-H Club Rabies Vaccination Clinic will be held Saturday morning, April 9, at the show barn in the Robert Lee Park. If you have not had your pet or pets immunized against rabies, or should they need additional treatment, you are encouraged to take them to the north end of the show barn Saturday morning between 9:30 a.m. and 11:30 a.m. A veterinarian will be present to administer the shot and check animals. In addition to the rabies vaccine, they plan to be prepared to immunize against DHLPP and PARVO in dogs and CBR-S in cats.

Spring is the season in which rabies normally is most prevalent. Also, varmints, particularly skunks, seem to be more prevalent this year. If your pets have not been immunized against rabies you are encouraged to vaccinate them with rabies vaccine. Texas now has a state law requiring all pets to be vaccinated to prevent the spread of rabies.

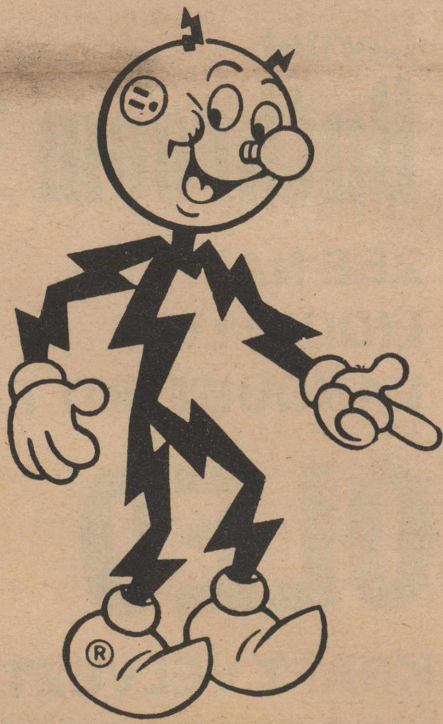

"Large Crowd Attends Rodeo"

Robert Lee put the big pot in the little one on June 29 (1933) with a free barbecue, attended by roughly 4000 hungry people. I mean all the boys and their dogs turned out. West Texas was in her bloomage, a perfect day, a big crowd, plenty of eats and then the Rodeo.

Roy Taylor was the butcher and chief rod at the barbecue pits looking over the 100 goats and 8 calves. The merchants furnished the coffee and bread, Marvin Simpson the wood, and Hubert Buchanan the chief witness.

Rather than rustle cattle all over the county for the Rodeo, it was decided to use Floyd Modgling's quarterbred Brahmas and black poled cattle for the occasion.
