The Muleshoe Independent School District Board met at noon Monday to hire a softball coach for the new program which will start next year.

Stephen W. Dunn spent 20 years as a nuclear engineer before becoming a teacher and a coach. He comes from Taft, Texas. Dunn has a record of 45 wins and 11 losses the last two years and went 19-7 this year.

In addition to coaching and teaching at Taft, Dunn also coached and taught at Chester and Covington School Districts in

Dunn will be teaching science and chemistry as well as coaching softball.

Court finalizes contract By MARSHALL STINNETT

The new Bailey County Jail Complex is a done deal. The commissioners court signed the final papers with the contractor and finance company on Thursday, May 15 in a special meeting. The groundbreaking is scheduled for June 17 at 1:30 p.m.

The new 92-bed facility will be built on the block just south of the present jail on South Second between Ave. D and E. It will house the justice of the peace, the sheriff's department and a new handicapped court-

The court passed the adoption of order authorizing issuance of combination tax and revenue certificates of obligations to pay for the new jail complex if the plan of housing federal prisoners fails to yield enough revenue to pay off the bonds. Under the plan, 50 federal prisoners will more than pay for the new jail.

The current jail will be remodeled to house juvenile and adult probation offices which are now being housed in rented space. The \$75,000 cost of the remodeling is included in the price of the new jail which is \$3,548,159.

The jail will be built by Corplan. The financing is being handled by Municipal Capital Markets Group. It is expected to take a year to complete construction.

Chavez blasts police department, Leal responds

City Councilman Juan Chavez levelled charges at the City of Muleshoe Police Department in the Tuesday morning City Council meeting. Chavez claimed that "if you go to the country club or any other church besides the Catholic church, you can break the law." He said, "You get searched on one side of town, but not on the other" and that "the police don't watch the country club. They watch the VFW."

Chavez made the charges in his "who is allowed to break the law" topic he had placed on the agenda of the meeting.

He said over the eleven years he has served on the council there have been four mayors and four city managers. He also

said his complaints to the mayors and managers had not been resolved so he has been forced to "go to the media." Representatives from the Clovis News Journal, the Lubbock Avalanche Journal and Channel 28 television in Lubbock attended the meeting.

Mayor Victor Leal challenged Chavez to cite incidents that had been brought to his attention by Chavez to which he, as mayor, had not tried to find answers. Leal said he had always tried to be sure that people were not being mistreated by the police.

Leal continued by saying in most incidents he had found the police to be very professional. He said, "This doesn't mean they are perfect," then added, "The police get 35 percent of budget and generate 90 percent of the complaints" because of the nature of the job.

Leal then told Chavez, "I hope you don't think that your concerns are being taken

Many years ago, Circle Back, Texas in Bailey County was a very lively little country town. It all began before 1917. Several families began farming in the area, including Jesse Reed and sons, Earl Black, J. K. Milam, Mac Bellar, and the Perkins, Miller and Workman families.

Mr. and Mrs. Sharmon built a grocery store and laundry. They later added a post office.

The school had four or five class rooms and enrollment was around 60 students. The first school superintendent was Pat Boone and Rosa Hammock was one of the first teachers. The First Baptist Church was built by the late 1920s and the small community began to thrive.

In the 1930s, Ken Smart opened a blacksmith shop. Alvy and Marie Patton built a second grocery store and added

a cafe. The Pattons also pur chased a truck and delivered groceries to farm families in the area. Fred Beene was the truck

In 1931, Elmer and Alta Gage, Raymond and Thelma Gage, Brewer and Lillian Gage and E. G. Gage Jr. built Gage Gin in this little farming com-

By 1937, there were 180 students attending Circle Back School. During the early 1940's, one classroom in the Circle Back School was converted into a cafeteria. Mable Reed and Pearl Henry were the first cooks.

During this time, the Sharmons sold the store to L. A. and Beaulah Harper. Elmer Gage also sold the gin to Raymond Gage in 1946 and moved their home to Bula, Texas. In addition to ginning, Raymond Gage operated a repair shop by his home. Brewer Gage and E. G. Gage Jr. moved from Circle Back. A teacher's home, bus barn and service station were also located in Circle Back.

School enrollment declined before 1950 and Circle Back's high school was forced to consolidate with Sudan in the late 40s. The elementary school remained open until 1957 when

it also combined with Sudan. The small community suf-

fered another tragedy in the 1950s when the Patton's store burned. The store had been recently purchased by Buck and Edith Cox.

Later in the 1960s, Ken Smart and his wife, Zue, purchased the remaining grocery store from the Harpers, and 1962 saw the construction of a new First Baptist Church.

From the 1920s to the 1960s there was a family living on almost every acre of land in the Circle Back area — the third generation of the Gore family, the third and fourth generations of the Damron family and the second generation of the Hall family. Many of the early pioneer families also still owned land in Circle Back.

The 1970s saw the small grocery store being sold once

again to Slats and Ruth Gore. However, the Circle Back Post Office located at the back of the store was closed by this time. In 1979, Raymond Gage retired, sold the gin and moved to Sudan. The gin operated for only a few more years before it sold and was moved from Circle Back.

Today, only a few buildings remain standing in Circle Back. Proudly, the First Baptist Church is still active with approximately 20 members. Benny Baker is the pastor.

These are just a few memories from the past and how the community of Circle Back has changed over the past 80 years.

The reunion on June 28, 2003 will be an opportunity to exchange Circle Back stories with old friends and find out what's happened

lightly, because I don't." Councilman Clifford Black suggested the council have a closed meeting to discuss the personnel problems and other problems with the police department with Chief Don

Another of the issues Chavez raised was police twice arresting Agapito Aguirre, who is both hearing and speech impaired. Chavez said Aguirre was arrested by Officer Rodney Stevens several years ago, sprayed with mace and brought to the jail in handcuffs. No charges were filed against Aguirre.

Chavez said the same thing also happened recently. Leal told the Journal Tuesday afternoon the city police were not involved in the latest incident. It was the Department of Public Safety and county officers.

Leal said he had called a special meeting of the council for Wednesday afternoon with Chief Carter to discuss all of Chavez's charges. Leal cited his desire to have better communication between the council and the police department as his motive. He said, "We may need to add an officer and improve training and give the department a better vision."

In other business, the Muleshoe City Council reelected Clifford Black and dispersed \$20,250 from the city's Hotel-Motel Tax Fund.

The council approved \$1,500 to the Comité Patriotico for the Cinco de Mayo celebration.

The Muleshoe Ladies Golf Association received \$5,000 for their four day, 72-person ladies golf tournament.

The Chicanos Unidos Campesinos received \$1,250 for their Father's Day festival.

The council granted the Muleshoe Heritage Foundation \$10,000 to buy windows, doors and complete the re-roofing of the Figure 4 Ranch House, the newest addition of the Heritage Center. The foundation hopes to make the house into a museum and qualify for various grants.

The council, after much discussion, delayed a request for a \$15,000 one year contract to provide recreational activities for senior citizens at the Oneita Wagnon Senior Center. It was the third time the center had come to the council for help. The council did agree to grant the center \$2,500 from the Hotel-


