

R-LEE STEERS DOWN MILES IN 1983 SEASON OPENER, 14-0

The Steers surprised a few people Friday night with a peashooter backfield with amazing quickness and conditioning that wore down the opposing Miles Bulldogs. The reason for calling them pea-shooters, is none of them is big enough to carry the water bucket, but they sting you pretty good. The line is good sized and with the changes made, added more weight and blocking up front. The Steers could be called young and inexperienced, but I think they are going to grow up fast. They better!

FIRST QUARTER

The Steers received the opening kickoff with a short return to the 8 yd. line. They are slow to get started and had to punt to the S. 40 yard line by Rasco. Miles drove to the Steer 19, but then Kirby Rasco intercepts a pass in the end zone and it's their ball at the 20. The Steers then give it and they fumble and Miles recover. Then Miles fumbles and Johnny Torres recovers at the S. 20. Then the Steers move to the S. 44, where Greg Grim breaks a couple of tackles and goes 56 yds. for another Steer T.D. Naico kicks the extras and it is now 14 to 0. The Steers kickoff to the M. 15 with a return to the M. 30 as the quarter ends.

FOURTH QUARTER

Miles made a couple of 1st downs to the S. 35 but then Grim intercepts a pass and returns it to the S. 32. The Steers then makes a 1st, but they fumble again at the S. 41. The Steers hold on downs and they start another good drive with 4 1st downs to the M. 13 yd. line, but Miles then holds on downs and a field goal attempt is wide. Miles then try to pass their way to a score, but to no avail as time runs out at the M. 32.



Item I on the agenda was the authorization to install water and electric meters in the new Senior





LETTER TO THE EDITOR

The topic of most conversation today in Robert Lee is water and rightfully so

So let's talk water for a little bit. For the last 2 months we have been putting Spence water in our lake and mixing it. Spence water is approximately 500 parts/ million salt. Our lake is about 100 parts/million salt at present we are pumping to town, good, clean, safe water that is about 350 parts/million salt. If the drought continues, we will soon be pumping you nearly straight Spence water.

We engaged an engineering firm from Dallas to make a survey concerning the feasibility of building an outlet at Spence to get the water off the top. They report has been handed to us. They took samples of water on top of the lake; on the bottom, out in the middle of the lake and up at the far end of the lake. Top water 450 parts per million, bottom water 500 parts/million. They recommended that we not spend any money at Spence, but build an aerator at our water plant to remove the odor that we have during the summer only. Their report is available for anyone's inspection at the City Hall.

The brown water that you get at your house once in awhile came from our old cast iron and galvanized pipes whenever the pressure is very low or we have a major line break that requires us to turn off the water to most of the town. This stirs up the rust and sediment that is in the bottom of the lines. Also, we occasionly have a malfunction of our automotive controls and run out of water. Anytime your water pressure gets very low, you can expect this brown water for a short time.

We will start about December on the complete remodeling of our treating plant. We have \$327,000 in a grant and expect to add about \$50,000 to that. We will be able to treat and pump you over a million gallons per day of good water. But we still have miles of old lines that we are replacing as fast as possible.

Please bear with us and the next time you flush your commode, get on your knees and thank the good Lord for Spence water, without it we would have been out of water thirty days ago and I guess all our trees, shrubs and grass would be dead by now. Some of you that are on a salt free diet would probably want to buy your drinking water. Personally, I like the taste of it, it has body to it.

active in these causes until his death.


