Steer-Bearcat Action

R-LEE STEERS MANHANDLE G-CITY BEARCATS, 24 TO 6

Oh, it was a GRIM night for the Garden City Bearcats on this TORRES (sic) night as the Steers put a HOOD on the Bearcat offense. The Steers rung their BELL with a few surprise attacks by SKINNERing them in the second half to completely dominate the game. It was no TRAMPAS through the park, but it was BOONE-y brook win as the Irish would say. The Steers outwrestled the Bearcats on the line of scrimmage using a half NELSON hold on their attack for a total of 179 yards, while the Steers piled up 233 yards.

FIRST OUARTER

The Steers received the opening kickoff at their own 12, with Greg Grim returning it to the S. 38. On the first play the Steers pass only to have it intercepted at the Bearcat 26. Then on their first play, they fumble and Jim Bob Jacobs recovers at the G.C.23. The Steers moved for a few yards, but G.C. then intercepts another pass at the 11 yard line. But the tension is high evidently as G.C. fumbles it right back to the Steers as Jim Skinner recovers a fumble at the G.C. 11. Then the Steers fumble with G.C. recovering at their 9 yard line. All this consumed the first six minutes of time as though neither one of them wanted the ball. Finally G.C. makes a 1st down without fumbling, but the Steers then hold and they punt to the S.41. The Steers fail to move the ball and they punt short to the S.48. Then the action starts for G.C. as they drive all the way to score the first touchdown. They fail on the extra points and it is 6 to 0. The Steers return the kickoff to the S.39 and the quarter ends at the Steer 44.

SECOND QUARTER

The Steers make a 1st down, but then G.C. holds and Rasco punts one out of the end zone with G.C. getting the ball at the

20. The Steers get a break as G.C. fumbles again with Bobby Boone recovering at the G.C. 19. But, G.C. holds on downs at the 10, but again G.C. fumbles the ball and Gery Naico recovers the ball at the 13 yard line. The Steers can't punch it in, so they settle for a field goal with Naico kicking a 26 yarder to reduce the score to 6 to 3. The Steers kickoff with a return to the G.C. 30. They make two 1st downs, but the Steers then hold and they punt to the Steer 29 yard line. Then the Steers break the ice as Rasco rolls out and hits Larry Palmer with a short pass and Palmer breaks a tackle at the 40 and races for a 71 yard pass and run TD. Naico kicked the extra point and the Steers are on top 10 to 6 with 2 minutes left. The Steers kickoff with a return to the G.C.27. They make a 1st down, but then Eddie Hood intercepts a pass and returns it to the S.40. The Steers, then just run out the clock to end

THIRD QUARTER

G.C. received the 2nd half kickoff and get the ball at their 27. The Steers held them at the 23 on downs and they punt to the S.41. The Steers make a 1st down, but then they have to punt and G.C. gets the ball at the 20 after the punt goes into the end zone. The Steers get the ball back on a punt to their 20 and on a time consuming drive take the ball to the 20 yard line as the quarter ends.

FOURTH QUARTER

On the first play of the 4th quarter, the Steers fake another field goal try and Eddie Hood rolls to the right and throws a TD. pass to Greg Grim in the end zone. Naico kicked the extra point and it was then 17 to 6.

G.C. received the kickoff at their 15 and returned to the G.C. 32. The Steers hold there and they punt to the S.20. The Steers



lines across our state, not the number crunchers in Washington, will ring up the alarming dollar signs when it finally comes time to total up West Texas irought damage.

The food prices you and I will pay tomorrow are being decided by what happens to our food producers today.

U.S. Agriculture Secretary John Block is downplaying the early warning signs reflected in August food price figures released by the U.S. Department of Labor. He continues to characterize food as an "inflation ighter" even as vegetable prices :limbed 16.5 percent in August, a urnaround from an 11.9 percent irop in July.

Beef prices dipped by 1.3 percent last month, but food ndustry analysts say lower prices tre only a short-term effect of ncreased cattle sales forced by frought conditions. Diners in Dallas. Detroit, and Dayton can expect to fork over more money or a Texas T-bone in another six nonths.

The hard times facing Texas armers and ranchers will have a lomino effect on related indusries, such as steel and farm nachinery, already plagued by ayoffs and depressed sales.

Secretary Block never respon-'led to my invitation to tour the West Texas drought area, and he "drought relief" he offered alls far short of what is needed.

It is no surprise that only a nandful of Texas farmers and anchers have applied for federal oans at interest rates of 8 to 14 percent. Already mortgaged to he hilt, they cannot repay what hey owe now.

For this reason, I have asked ecretary Block to approve emerency payments to Texas farmers nd ranchers to cover existing lebts and help purchase feed. Even more important is the need o release federally owned corn tored in the Texas Panhandle ince the 1980 Russian grain mbargo.

This low-grade grain, unfit for

uman consumption, is costing axpayers \$5 million a year to rarehouse when it could feed tarving cattle and keep West 'exas ranchers from going broke. Secretary Block has coldshoullered this request while Texas attlemen have watched the sumner heat wave scorch the grazing and. Their alternatives are few: ell off their herds at low prices,

Cashiers in grocery checkout transport the cattle to better grazing land hundreds of miles away, or continue purchasing expensive feed.

Bill Honaker, a Fort Stockton rancher for 32 years, told me he has cut his herd from 1,028 to 319 head since January. He says his feed bill increased from \$4,628 in 1982 to more than \$30,000 during the first eight months of 1983.

Many Texas ranchers cannot afford that kind of feed bill. The Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Far West District, reports 30-40 percent of area ranchers have had to get rid of all their cattle, while others sold 50-60 percent of their herds. Land unsuitable for grazing offers even less hope to farmers trying to coax crops from stubborn cracked soil.

The far corners of our state and nation are tied to West Texas by the economics of the dinner table. We need to offer more than crumbs of "drought relief" to those who feed us.

Mrs. Thomason Attends Meet

Jerry Thomason, County Treasurer, Coke County, along with some 175 other Texas county treasurers attended the 35th Annual Texas County Treasurers' Conference in San Angelo, September 20-22, 1983. The Conference was the conclusion of a highly productive year for Texas county treasurers under the leadership of President Bill Melton, Dallas County Treasurer. The agenda included headline speeches from State Treasurer Ann Richards, Attorney General Jim Mattox, Secretary of State John Fainter, and House County Affairs Chairman Gary Thompson, as well as financial and educational discussions and workshops.

Mrs. Thomason explained that the County Treasurers' Association was instrumental in the passage of four bills during the 68th Session of the Texas Legislature, including HB 570, the county treasurers' continuing education bill which requires 20 hours of classroom training in the duties of county treasurer each 24 months. The organization also published the new Texas County Treasurers' Procedures Manual in cooperation with the V.G. Young Institute for County Government, a part of the Texas A&M System.

It is normal to feel angry sometimes. Anger is a healthy emotion for people. Even children feel anger. Sometimes it makes them feel better. Anger helps get the "mad" out, too.

At times, angry feelings result in hurtful actions. These actions must be stopped. Children should not be permitted to hurt other children, their parents, property or themselves. It is important that parents not make children ashamed of their feelings. However, children need to learn to express anger without hurting others or feeling guilty.

Younger preschool children (3year-old, usually show anger in physical ways: Biting, hitting, kicking or breaking things. As they get older (4 to 5 years of age), children will use words to tell others they are mad. Help and encourage your child to say, "It makes me mad when you do that," or "Stop hitting me - it hurts."

What makes a child angry? Children become angry when they are stopped from something they enjoy. Children become angry when others tease or make fun of them.

Many children learn that anger is a sure and easy way to get adults' attention. They see others get results from temper tantrums. So children think it will work for them, too. If parents let temper tantrums attract their attention, children may use them every time they get angry.

3. Help a child learn to express anger. Teach him ways that he can control his angry feelings. Suggest that your child use words when he is mad. Try "I am Childress. mad because..." or "It makes me mad when..." Let your child know you love him, even when you do not approve of some of his

AGRICULTURE by Tommy Antilley

County Extension Agent

Fall is generally time for producers to examine their herds and cull any undesirables. The drought coupled with expected high feed costs this winter are added reasons producers should take a hard look at their herds. Any animals found to be open, older or unthrifty should be the first to cull.


With the existing conditions, producers should wean calves a little earlier than normal to allow cows to pick up a little before winter. Also, it takes less supplemental feed for dry cows than lactating cows. In this same frame of mind, producers might consider culling fairly deep on mature cows and keeping a larger percentage of replacement heifers as they also require less feed than mature cows.

To assist the producer in this annual culling process, some sort of individual cow identification such as ear tags can be a very useful management tool. Throughout the year "problem" cows, those that lose a calf, raise unthrifty calves or those that generally are uneconomical can be jotted down and a record kept to aid in the culling process next

For producers who calve yearround, individual cow identification enables you to write down the approximate date each cow calves, and a record of calving interval determined. Those cows taking 12-18 months to calve back should be culled.

SWCD To Elect New Director

An election for a director to serve in Zone 5 on the Coke County Soil and Water Conservation District Board is scheduled for October 6, 1983 at 10:30 a.m. The election will be held in the conference room in the Coke County Courthouse, announced Horace Scott, secretary of the board.

State law decrees that to be eligible to vote in a soil and water conservation district election, a person must own agricultural land within the zone where the election is being held. The person must also live in a county all or any part of which is in the district and the voter must be at least 18 years old.

Legal qualifications state that a candidate for the office of a district director must own land in the zone he represents, be at least 18 years of age, and be actively engaged in farming and ranching. He must also live in a county all or any part of which is in the district.

Zone 5 of the district includes land from the south county line on both sides of Hwy. 208 to just North of the Hayrick Cemetery, and to just South of Sanco.

Current members of the board are: Joe Rawlings, Royce Fancher, Horace Scott, Wilbern Millican, and Finnell Smith.

Most of the credit can go to the cold front for the sharp drop in the number of fish caught this past week. The fisherman were here and most fished the same way and places they had all summer and went home with little to show for their efforts. This rapid drop in the shallow water temperature no doubt moved the fish out into deeper water for the time being. A change like this throws everything out of kilter, add a full moon and a barometer that's high and steady and it's a good time to stay home unless you are just coming for the outing are need the practice. Generally the weather is near perfect, but seldom will you find the fish very cooperative.

Crappie are often an exception and will bite better during and after a siege of bad weather than at any other time. Most experienced fisherman think the crappie are the craziest fish in the lake anyway. Three people can be fishing from a boat, one catching fish like mad and the other two, not every as much as get a bite. Because this often happens it's best to go crappie fishing with good friends. Bob Cope and Rufus Rush of Lubbock got a fine string of crappie last Saturday and were back late buying more bait. At the time they were in the store, they had over thirty fish with several going over a pound. DeWayne Crawford of Odessa caught several good fish from their dock

Energy Conservation and Power Subcommittee in Washington this afternoon, Lone Star Vice President Neal Hall said neither program merits continuation.

'Neither program can ever be cost-effective and, as a consequence, places an unnecessary cost burden on Lone Star's customer," he told subcommittee members. Hall's comments refer to Congress's mandate that utility companies must offer home energy audits to all eligible customers, and must soon begin offering similar energy audits to eligible commercial and apartment customers. These conservation programs are required by the National Energy Conservation Policy Act of 1978 and the Energy Security Act.

"Unlike the many conservation programs and information Lone Star historically has offered, the RCS program is not cost-effective for our customers," Hall said. The reduction in natural gas usage by customers who have had the RCS audits is minute, particularly when you realize that some 97 percent of customers neither want nor use this program Hall continued. It has cost Lone Star, and ultimately the customers, some \$2.1 million to date. In other words, Hall said, the RCS program has achieved conservation at the cost of more than \$82 per thousand cubic feet of gas conserved.

Speaking after the hearing, Hall added, "On behalf of its customers, Lone Star has opposed these programs since their inception," He also applauded Congressman Ralph Hall (D-Rockwall) for making the hearing possible. He said, "In doing so, the Congressman has provided consumers of this area an outstanding service."

Rep. Hall represents the 4th Congressional District of Texas.
