Always put your name and return address inside the parcel.

Commissioner's Court Has Busy Agenda At Regular Meeting

The Coke County Commissioners met Monday, December 5, in a regular meeting. The meeting was called to order by Judge Denman and was opened with the Pledge to the Flag led by Commissioner Millican. The minutes of the last meeting were approved on a motion by Commissioner Newby and seconded by Commissioner Luckett.

Item I on the agenda was the passing of a resolution to invite the Brazos Higher Education Authority, Inc. to include Coke County in the areas it services. The Brazos Higher Education Authority services counties by acquiring student loan notes from local banks. They said in their experiences unless there is a Higher Education Authority willing to purchase the loans from local lenders, they are not interested in making them. The resolution was passed on a motion by Commissioner Newby and seconded by Commissioner Tidwell.

Item II - The Tom Green County Juvenile Detention Center was discussed. They need a pledge of cooperation from surrounding counties before starting on the center. The Commission-

ers Court pledged its cooperation on a motion made by Commissioner Tidwell and seconded by Commissioner Luckett. The Commissioners Court will pledge a monthly contribution at a later date.

Item III - The appointment of Stover Taylor as County Auditor was approved on a motion by Commissioner Luckett and seconded by Commissioner Newby.

Item IV - The discussion on the Texas Aeronautics was tabled until a later date on a motion by Commissioner Tidwell and seconded by Commissioner Millican.

Item V - A decision was made to make reservations in Ft. Worth for the West Texas County Judge and Commissioners Convention March 28, 29 and 30.

Item VI - The court decided to table making a decision on retirement benefits until more information was available. The motion was made by Commissioner Millican and seconded by Commissioner Newby.

Item VII - November bills were approved for payment and the meeting was adjourned on a motion made by Commissioner Newby and seconded by Commissioner Luckett.

Item VIII - Judge and Mrs. Aubrey Denman were the hosts for a Christmas party given in appreciation of the cooperation given to Judge Denman by the county government.

Refreshments were served to 80 guests. A short program was presented by local talent.

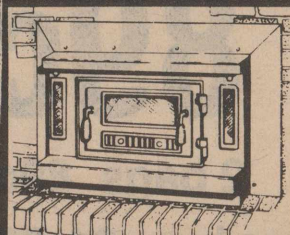
Waldrops To Have Fiftieth Anniversary

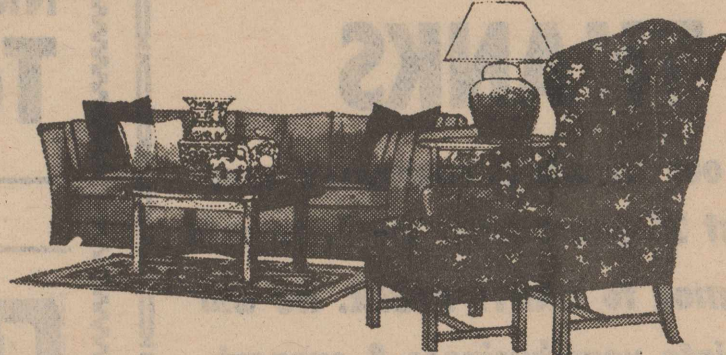

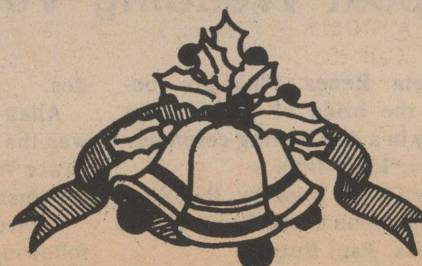

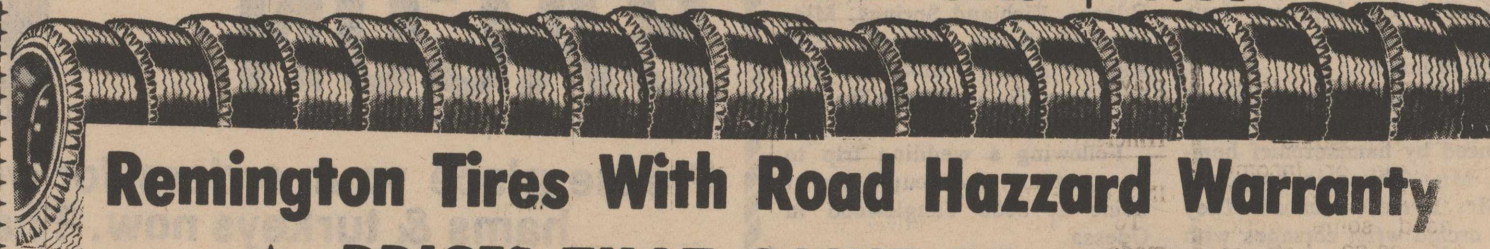
