## Cheese, Butter To Be Issued In January

Coke County has contracted with the Texas Department of Human Resources and is authorized to distribute cheese and butter to the citizens of Coke County who qualify. This is **not** the same cheese Distribution program used earlier in the year. Listed below are eligibility requirements as quoted from the Texas Department of Human Resources:

11.6002. Eligiblity Requirements. To qualify quarterly for emergency food assistance, applications must meet the following requirements:

(1) Income. The household's gross yearly/monthly/weekly income, in relation to household size, may not exceed 130% of the most recent federal poverty level published by the Office of Management and Budget or the household must be categorically eligible and receiving food stamps, Supplemental Security Income (SSI), Aid to Families with dependent Children (AFDC) or non-institutional Medicaid benefits. warm spell as the mercury climbed to 28 degrees around lunch before plunging again.

Most that could be said for the bonechilling cold was, it had been drier here than in most areas, just a few freezing spurts of fine mist and sleet, lessening icy traveling conditions and making it some less miserable outdoors for those forced out.

Monday night lows ranged around the 20 degree mark but our area was hit by light mist overnight, turning to snow and sleet flurries by dawn on Tuesday. Winds and blowing snow plunged the wind chill factor down to single digits. By Tuesday noon, however, moisture had stopped and temps rose to about 28 degrees.

Forecasters were calling for a slight warming trend Wednesday with another artic front arriving at the end of the week. But as we all couldn't help, but notice when we got up Wednesday the front got here early. Temperatures Wednesday morning were hovering around 10 degrees; with freezing rain and snow falling to make driving hazzardous. Holiday drivers are warned to watch the weather predictions for the areas they will be traveling, leave in plenty of time and do their driving in daylight hours.

In West Texas ranch country, first concern is always centered around livestock and their welfare. With pastures unusually bare due to the prolonged drought, most stock men will be kept busy and miserable-- feeding and breaking ice on water troughs.

Officials here are concerned about broken pipes and mains when it does thaw out. We are not normally prepared for the extended cold with days of subfreezing temperature.

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



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

## Mail Order Meats Okay

COLLEGE STATION-- Mailorder gift packages of smoked cured ham, bacon, sausage or turkey are increasingly popular holiday gifts.

But those receiving smoked meats may wonder about its quality and edibility after weeks in storage and transit, says a Texas A&M Unviersity Agricultural Extension Service nutritionist.

"Mail-order gift packages from reputable dealers are safe for consumption, so you need not worry about giving them as gifts or using them yourself," advises Marilyn Haggard, a foods and nutrition specialist.

"The products are highly processed and contain preservatives, allowing them to be mailed without refrigeration," she explains.

But the meats should still be inspected before eating, cautions Haggard. After opening the package, look for signs of spoilage such as a rotten or putrid smell. Foods with a questionable odor should not be used or even tasted.

Also inspect the food for signs

of surface mold growth. Mold of this type is not poisonous but must be removed before the meat is used, says the specialist.

According to Haggard, you can trim off any mold and the meat directly under it, or scrub the mold off with a brush and vinegar wash. A vinegar wash can be made by mixing one part vinegar to three parts water. Rinse the wash off with plain water.

For maximum flavor from smoked cured meat, Haggard recommends rapid use. Bacon can be stored in a refrigerator at 35 to 40 degrees F for seven days. A whole ham can be refrigerated for seven days, a half for three to five days and slices for three days.

Smoked sausage keeps well when refrigerated for up to seven days, a half for three to five days and slices for three days.


Smoked sauage keeps well when refrigerated for up to seven days and dry or semi-dry sausage and cured smoke turkey will keep for two to three weeks.


Since frozen cured meat loses quality rapidly, you should not plan on long freezer storage, says Haggard. Bacon should be frozen at zero degrees F for one month or less and ham for only one to two months. Turkey can be frozen for three to six months, but freezing is not recommended for sausage.

Cured meats are safe when frozen for longer periods of time, but there may be a drop-off in taste that makes the gift less enjoyable, notes the specialist.





## WTU Granted Rate Increase By PUC

West Texas Utilities Company has been granted a retail rate increase totaling \$12 million annually by the Public Utility Commission of Texas.

The overall increase amounts to 5.1 per cent, much less than the 11 per cent the company had said it needed. The Company had asked for \$25.6 million in its request to the cities and the PUC.

The exact amounts assigned to various customer classifications and the effective dates of the new rates awaits PUC approval of rate tariffs which will be filed early next week. Company officials said the rates are likely to go into effect around January 1.

The approved rate hike also is less than the interim rates WTU has charged customers in 32 of its cities since October 22, which means that those customers will be receiving refunds and will see their rates lowered slightly. The interim rates, collected under bond and subject to refund, were designed to increase the Company's annual revenue by \$18 million.

Approximate effects of the rates changes on a typical residential customer's bill are as follows, based on 600 kilowatthours of electric usuage and including fuel costs: **Proposed rate** Interim rate \$46.85 \$49.56 **Present rate Proposed rate** \$44.16 \$46.85 Increase Decrease \$2.69 or \$2.71 or 6.1 per cent 5.7 per cent Company officials said the refund on interim rates probably will be made in the February billing. Customers due refunds

billing. Customers due refunds who have moved out of the WTU service area should contact their former local offices.

Robert Lee is one of the communities whose residents will be due a refund.

Interium rates were not placed into effect in Bronte because they denied the rate increase, so they will have no refunds coming.



## DPS Estimates 51 Persons To Be Killed During Christmas Holiday

AUSTIN--The Texas Department of Public Safety has estimated that 51 persons will be killed on Texas streets and highways during the Christmas holidays. The estimate is based upon previous holiday death statistics and the number of hours during which motorists are anticipated to travel.

"Last year, 44 persons were killed in traffic accidents during the actual holiday period. However, persons injured in various accidents across the state brought the final death toll to 52," said Colonel Jim Adams, director of the DPS.

Adams said while Texas is experiencing a significant decrease in traffic deaths statewide this year, the holidays can reflect a deadly time for motorists.

"As of noon, Friday, December 16, we had an 11 per cent reduction in traffic deaths and that is 412 fewer people killed. We attribute the reduction to increased DWI enforcement, widespread attention to the drinking driver and a renewed effort by drivers to obey traffic laws.

The DPS director said that holiday weekends are dangerous times to travel.

"We find the volume of traffic increases. Also, we still have some drivers who insist upon drinking and driving and others who exceed the speed limits. These drivers are risking accident involvement," he said.

DPS statistics show that DWI and speed are the two main contributing factors to traffic

## Asthma And Christmas

Can Christmas trees produce a wheeze? They can according to the American Lung Association of Texas. For the two million children under 17 who have asthma, the Christmas season harbors a number of triggers that can bring on an asthma episode.

First is the seemingly harmless Christmas tree. Mold often begins to accumulate on the branches, especially if the tree has been cut several weeks before. When the tree begins to dry out, the mold spores are released. These spores are a trigger for many people with asthma.

Be sure to pick your gifts for the child with asthma carefully. Pets are often poor gifts, because of their dander; stuffed toy animals, too, can be a problem. They retain dust and can become a home for the house dust mite.

The Lung Association warns

accidents in Texas.

"We'll have additional available troopers to assist the motorists and to be especially watchful for the drunken drivers and those who speed."

Adams praised local police authorities for their work in reducing the traffic death toll and he applauded the various local programs to help keep the drinking driver from getting behind the wheel.

Civic clubs, local police agencies and other organizations have begun programs to help prevent drunk driving and this could help tremendously toward accident prevention. However, we will still find a few who will be on the road while drinking or speeding and will be involved in a tragic accident," he said.


The DPS "Operation Motorcide" program begins at 6 p.m. Friday, December 23 and ends 78-hours later at midnight on Monday, December 26. The program is designed to inform motorists of the number of traffic deaths occurring during the holiday in an attempt to increase public awareness of the dangers of holiday driving.

COLLEGE STATION-- Most holiday party hosts think serving alcoholic drinks demonstrates their hospitatlity. Yet for their guests on diets or medication of those who want to be sociable without drinking, alcohol can cause problems. For guests with a drinking problems and especially those who drive, alcohol can bring disaster, says Dr. Mary Ann Heussner, a health education specialist with the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service. According to figures recently released by the Texas Commission on Alcoholism, 11 percent of Texans have drinking problems. And it's obvious that most party guests will drive home, whether they are sober or not. If alcoholic beverages are served, a host can show true hospitality by serving alcohol and at the same time food, not pushing drinks, monitoring the consumption of alcohol, and not letting a guest who has over-indulged drive home, says the specialist.



## **KEEP POINSETTIAS GROWING**

People

Thanks to concentrated breeding and selection, the traditional Christmas poinsettias is a hardy plant that can easily be preserved and enjoyed for Christmases to come.

Poinsettias, with their vividly colored leaves (bracts) and golden-yellow flowers, make excellent gift plants for the holiday season. They are now available in colors ranging from the traditional scarlet to white, pink and even variegated.

There are several suggestions for keeping poinsettias healthy and beautiful indoors during the holiday season.

Room temperature should nev-

er exceed 72 degrees F. in the PAGE 10 day and 60 degrees at night to prolong the bright color of the bracts. Poinsettias should not be subjected to any sudden changes in temperature or any drafts or excess heat, as from appliances, radiators and ventilating ducts.

Place the plants in a room with light sufficient to read fine print. Keep them out of the way of traffic, children and pets.

Water poinsettias thoroughly when the soil is dry to the touch and drain off excess water. Put the plant in a water-proof container to protect furniture.

When bracts fade, poinsettias can be grown as a foliage plant. Cut back the plant to 8 inches and place it out of doors when temperatures warm. However, make sure the plant is not exposed to temperatures below 50 degrees at night.

Return the poinsettia to a room for direct light six to eight hours daily, keeping night temperatures between 60 to 70 degrees. For reflowering next winter, keep the plant away from artificial light at night after Oct. 1.

## Preheating Wastes Energy

COLLEGE STATION-- Most recipes for oven-cooked foods traditionally call for a preheated oven, but recent studies have shown that preheating is not essential for food quality and may even waste energy.

Researchers at the United States Department of Agriculture's consumer nutrition laboratory compared a variety of foods prepared in preheated and nonpreheated ovens and found few significant differences in the quality or size of the items, reports home economist Bonnie Piernot.

The non-preheated ovens required five minutes or less extra baking time than the preheated ovens, says Piernot, who is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.


The energy savings from not preheating averaged about 10 percent.

"Overall," Piernot says, "the findings confirm that preheating the oven is not essential for good quality baking, so it's an unnecessary use of energy."

The foods used in the research study included pies, cakes, casseroles, souffles and meat loaves. The dishes were prepared in preheated and non-preheated standard gas, continuous-cleaning gas, standard electric and self-cleaning electric ovens.

The variability in baking times reported between preheated and non-preheated ovens was often less than that reported among the different types of ovens, adds the specialist.

**RETURNING HOLIDAY GIFTS--**Your success in returning gifts will depend on the type of complaint and store policy, says a Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service home economist. Consumers have the right to have their complaints resolved when merchandise is faulty or does not perform correctly," says Nancy Granovsky, a family resource management specialist. If a retailer or manufacturer won't replace faulty merchandise, you have recourse through the manufacturer, the Better Business Bureau, the Attorney General's office, or consumer action panels, she adds. But if the gift doesn't fit, is the wrong color, or doesn't suit your tastes, there are fewer options. "Return policies are voluntarily offered by merchants as a convenience to their customers," says Granovsky. "Returning goods depends upon goodwill, especially if the merchandise is not defective or misrepresented." Consumers can save time and embarrassment by returning gifts they receive only if the merchandise was never used, or its initial use revealed a defect, says the home economist. Even then, you may have to keep the merchandise if you have no sales slip or are unable to meet the store's return requirements.

#### **HOW TO DRESS** TO KEEP WARM

When you regulate a thermostat to conserve energy, proper clothing selection becomes vital for maintaining thermal comfort. Clothing can be used as an insulator to prevent heat loss from the body. The clothing does not create heat; it prevents the transfer of existing heat by trapping air. It is this trapped air that provides the warmth, not the clothing itself.

To keep warm:

\* Select garments that fit loosely so that an insulating layer of air can be trapped between the body and the fabric. Avoid tight fitting garments which eliminate insulating layers of air and inhibit body circulation. Avoid overly large garments which can also eliminate insulating layers of air through ventilation, reducing insulation.

\* Select garments with closures at neck, wrists, waist and ankles to prevent warm air from escaping.

**Holiday Safety Tips Given** 

AUSTIN-- Keeping safety in mind when going to and giving parties, decorating, traveling, and buying gifts can help everyone avoid accidents which can mar a happy holiday season, according to George R. Gustafson, Executive Vice President of Texas Safety Association.

The following tips can help Texans keep their holidays safe:

\* If you're using a real tree, choose a fresh one with flexible boughs and needles that are difficult to pull off. To keep the tree fresh, make a diagonal cut in the trunk, about two inches from the bottom, and place the tree in a water-filled container. Remember, a dry tree is a fire hazard.

\* Place the tree away from a fireplace, radiator, space heater, or any source of electricity.

\* Trim the tree with UL-listed lights. Check the insulation on older strings of lights. Wrap bare spots with electric tape, or better, replace those strings. For outdoor lights, use exterior lights connected to weatherproof out-

\* Turn off the tree and outside lights before you leave the house or go to bed.

Examine every toy you consider purchasing. Look for potential dangers to children. If a toy can be swallowed or has a sharp edge, choose another. It's strongly suggested that you observe the age recommendations which are indicated on toys.

\* Keep children away from some holiday decorations such as berries of holly, mistletoe, and the leaves of poinsetta, all of which can be poisonous if swallowed.

\* If you're planning a party at which you serve alcohol, plan also for plenty of non-alcoholic beverages and food. Close the bar early, mix drinks moderately, and don't allow guests to drive home if they've had too much to drink. eligible group for receiving categorical benefits must be determined on the basis of income. If income is from farming or selfemployment, eligibility is based on net income. The contractor determines gross or net income without deductions unless a household member(s) is 60 years old or older or handicapped. In that case, the household may claim a deduction for actual medical expenses of the elderly or handicapped member(s) up to a maximum of 20% of the household income.

(2) Residency. The household must apply in the contracted service area for its county. Contracted service area in defined as the county (counties) served by a single contractor, Coke County. (3) Identity. The applicant


