A meeting for organization of a Stratford Chamber of Commerce will be held in the district court room of the courthouse Friday, April 1, at 8:00 P. M.

Business and professional men and women and all others interested in the progressive welfare of Stratford are invited to attend the meeting.

C-C Work Outlined At Meeting Tuesday

Highlights of the activities and benefits of a chamber of commerce to a city were outlined by 4 representatives of the Dumas Chamber of Commerce at a mass meeting held in the district court room of the courthouse in Stratford Tuesday night.

Delbert Cummings called the meeting to order and introduced H. S. McMurry, past president of the Dumas organization.

McMurry stated that it was hard to value the accomplishments of a chamber of commerce until a review of a year's work was made. He stated that during the last year his local chamber greeted all new business firms in Dumas and sent them a floral bouquet on their opening day. They assisted the Dumas baseball club and spent \$2,000.00 for lights for the lighted field. Establishment of the night field resulted in better attendance at the games than crowds Sunday afternoon games had drawn. The organization entered floats in all parades. It was instrumental in the Doggy Day celebration and provided free tickets for the rodeo for all members of bands playing at the celebration. Girls were hired by the chamber of commerce to register men for selective service military training. Two flyers breakfasts were sponsored. Lights were secured for night tennis courts in cooperation with the ladies business and professional club. The chamber sponsored queens to celebrations in adjoining cities. They sponsored a trades day program and have committees on hand to greet all boosters delegations visiting in their city. In cooperation with the Lions Club a census of the city was taken to make possible the adoption of a new form of city government. The Chamber of Commerce investigates all types of solicitors and only representatives of reputable firms are granted approved Chamber of Commerce cards for soliciting in the city, minimizing fraud. The chamber sent delegates to Austin in cooperation with the Amarillo Chamber of Commerce in an effort to secure a four-lane highway from Dumas to Amarillo. Establishment of opening and closing hours and the holidays to be observed by the City of Dumas was effected through efforts of the chamber. Holiday observation was established by majority rule.

McMurry recommended affiliation membership with the West Texas Chamber of Commerce as a valuable connection which would not likely cost more than the chamber's solicitation of local firms at the present time.

Assessments of the Dumas Chamber of Commerce are made on a basis of the work they hope to accomplish. Memberships are granted for a \$25.00 fee with larger firms taking memberships ranging upward to \$350.00.

Officers of the organization include the president, vice-president, secretary, and treasurer. A part-time secretary carries the load for the organization. A board of six directors with the officers compose the governing body of the organization which may act in an emergency without the sanction of the entire organization.

General meetings of the organization are held once each month with called sessions for officers and board of directors meetings. Eighty percent of the business firms of Dumas back the organization. They had only two membership refusals.

An industrial committee of the Chamber of Commerce made numerous contacts with industrialists. They gathered information necessary for securing housing projects and highway improvement.

Johnny Johnson, president elect of the Chamber of Commerce expressed his hopes that Stratford would organize a chamber. He stated that each organization would work for its own town but they would also work together to secure improvements of mutual benefit.

Oil Showing Continues In Limelight

Oil shot 30 feet in the air from the Phillips Kathryn No. 1 located in section 8 of block 3-B Wednesday afternoon according to observers at the well. The well was reportedly acidized and swabbed before the small geyser appeared.

The pay formation is said to range from 5,350 to 5,450 feet. According to reports the showing of oil is similar to that found in practically all deep tests in Sherman County. When these showings were first found production engineers who at least pretended they attempted to bring in the oil wells were puzzled. They were certain they had oil yet they were unable to bring in production.

In recent years geologists have claimed that the oil sand is found in Sherman County between the stratas of sweet and sour gas. They have argued that oil cannot be brought in in paying quantities until the gas pressure has been relieved and allows the oil to drain into the underground basins of the formations.

Phillips has made no official report of the Kathryn test. Reports have been confined to observations of those not employed with the Phillips Company.

Weekly News Letter

(From W. J. (Bill) Craig)

AUSTIN. — On March 16 the House Education Committee sat from 7:30 p. m. until 5:45 a. m. hearing the proponents and opponents of the Gilmer-Aikin proposals for changes in the State's educational system.

Before the 21 committee members met it appeared that the battle line was already finely drawn with 10 members for it and 10 against. Your representative had co-authored the Gilmer-Aikin House bills for which the Senate bills were substituted; therefore, my vote was cast in favor of sending these measures to the floor of the House for their consideration rather than to a sub-committee of five members, three of which were opponents of the bills. Had the sub-committee been the destination of these bills a determined effort might have been made to kill them. It was felt that measures of such great study and far reaching importance should have the consideration and action of the House in their final disposal. As this is being written opponents of these bills are planning various strategy to amend or kill them on the floor of the House. An attempt may be made to send Senate Bill 116, the money or Economic Index feature, to the committee on Revenue and Taxation. This might have been the place for it instead of the Education Committee in the first place. Another suggested proposal would be to resolve the House into a "Committee of the whole House" and study the entire background out of which these particular bills were formulated and caused to be proposed. Many accusations have been made about our present administration which would be well to have some substantiation in the form of facts.

To find out just who is proposing this Economic Index method of financing the school bill and where the tax load will fall the heaviest is causing no little consternation among the members of the house who would like to have some clarification on this subject. This Economic Index, the proponents say, does not set your tax rate but it does tell the County how much money they must contribute not to exceed one dollar and fifty cents on the 100 dollar valuation.

Much controversy and differences of opinions exists on abolishing the elective office of State Superintendent of Public Schools and the change in appointing to electing State School Board Members. It is believed that the 10-10 division of the House Education Committee is fairly indicative of the sentiment of the House as a whole and that a bitter and prolonged fight is in store before any school program is enacted.

The majority of the Classroom Teacher Associations and School Administrations in the District have gone on record as favoring Senate Bills 115, 116, and 117, as have many other civic organizations and individuals. Many people concerned with the school problems of administration and finance have given their approval to these bills because they will give Texas a better school system.

On March 21 Representative Hanna of Dallas moved to send Senate Bill 115 to the Committee on State Affairs for further study. The motion was defeated by a vote of 70 to 55. I think the main purpose of the motion was to determine the strength of these measures in the House. However, it is my opinion that this was not a true test.

Senate Bill 63, the Minimum Standards Bill, will probably be up for consideration before the Senate this week. I voted for this bill because this bill does not deny anyone the right to select whatever kind of practitioner he desires. It expressly provides that no medical doctor shall serve as a member of the Board. It expressly exempt chiropractor, osteopath, naturopath, medical doctor or other practitioner who has been in practice for as long as one year. It expressly exempts students now studying any branch of the healing arts or who have graduated after having stu-

Sid Lowery Outlines Services At Legion Feast

Sid Lowery, American Legion Service officer, attached to the Veterans Administration office at Lubbock, was the principal speaker at a luncheon served to members of the American Legion in the home demonstration club-rooms at the courthouse Tuesday noon by ladies of the Legion Auxiliary.

Commander H. F. McIntosh introduced Walter Pendleton who in turn introduced Sid Lowery, a service officer of 21 years experience in securing benefits for disabled veterans and their dependents.

Commenting on McIntosh and Pendleton, Lowery complimented the meal served by the ladies, by stating he understood how some men acquired the "Stratford waistline."

He expressed his desire to learn how the local post secured its quota of paid-up memberships so easily.

Lowery met with the policy making groups in Washington, D. C. March 2 to 4 at which 51 departments of the American Legion were represented. Hospitalization was the main objective of the body. In planning hospitalization for World War I veterans a ten year program had been set-up to provide 120,000 beds by 1948. With the enlistment of men in the unexpected World War II a potential patient list of 18,500,000 men and women became a reality. It is estimated that 105,000 hospital beds will be necessary to care for the needs of the veteran population of the United States and for this reason he urged the banding together of veterans as the only hope to secure sufficient appropriations.

Lowery traced the accomplishments of the American Legion. The educational benefit bill with many faults was written and sponsored by the Legion. Terminal leave bonds became a reality after a stubborn fight fostered by the Legion. Various other benefits, predominately the restoring of hospitalization facilities for disabled veterans appropriations is being fought with members of the 81st Congress by the American Legion. With its main objective still the "hospitalization and rehabilitation of veterans," Lowery expressed the necessity of Legionnaires taking the six months extension course for the education of service men in the work of the American Legion.

Veterans now control the house and senate and a veteran sits in the presidential chair.

With war clouds still threatening in the disputes with Russia, Lowery warned, "it is quite possible that many of you will again be called upon to wear a uniform in the defense of your country and its ideals."

Lowery believes that through the work of the legion in Washington, D. C. that within six months the original hospitalization appropriations will have been approved and work started in the construction of necessary facilities for proper hospitalization and care of veteran patients. Briefly he sketched benefits of the disappearing veteran as hospitalization, \$150.00 burial fund, a monument, an American flag, with benefits for service-connected disability for widows, and in some cases fathers and mothers. 80 percent of the legislation favoring veterans has been sponsored by the American Legion, Lowery stated.

Commander McIntosh thanked Mr. Lowery for his efforts, the ladies for serving the meal, and the legionnaires for attending.

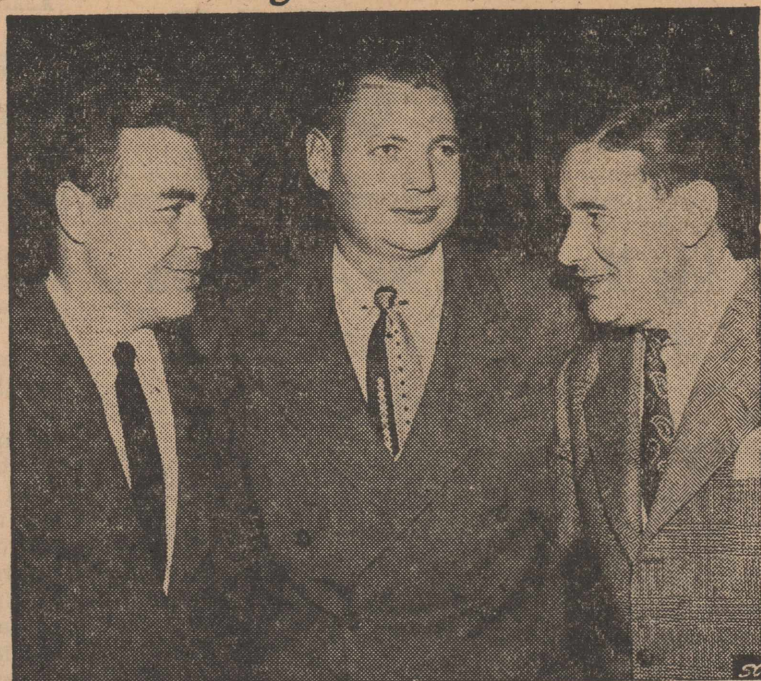

The temperature fell to 23 degrees Tuesday night following the storm.

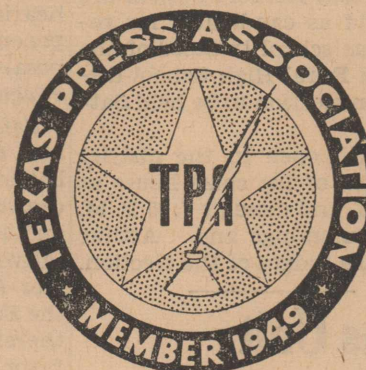
Moisture fell at intervals from 6:30 P. M. until about midnight.

Fresh Rhubarb Pie



Folks won't need to guess what this pie's all about, for tart, rosy rhubarb gets a chance to show its virtues with individual pastry wedges baked atop the pie.

"Pieplant" is an old name for rhubarb, but a very appropriate one. Crisp rhubarb stalks, rosy or cherry-colored, make a spring pie that is pleasantly tart and sparkling.

'Tis a pity to hide such an inviting filling, so cut five or six triangles of pastry to arrange on top of the pie, one for each serving. Cut the wedges with a pastry wheel to get the pretty scalloped effect, and place pastry over filling before baking.

Since this is a juicy pie, the favorite crimped edge is the one to use to hold in the juices. Make this by pressing dough together between thumb and finger of left hand and forefinger of right hand.

Pie is a favorite dessert, and a satisfying one. That's reason enough to make fresh rhubarb pie a luncheon or dinner pastry treat often this spring.

RHUBARB PIE

1 1/2 cups sifted enriched flour
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup shortening
2 to 3 tablespoons cold water

Sift together flour and salt. Cut or rub in shortening. Add water gradually. Mix to a dry, crumbly dough. Toss out on lightly floured pastry cloth. Press dough together. Roll two-thirds of the dough to a circle one-eighth inch thick. Line nine-inch pie pan with pastry. Fill with rhubarb filling.

Roll out remaining pastry to circle one-eighth inch thick. Cut into five or six triangular wedges. Arrange evenly over rhubarb filling. Bake in hot oven (450 degrees F.) 10 minutes. Reduce heat to moderate (350 degrees F.) and continue baking 45 minutes.

Rhubarb Filling

1 1/2 pounds fresh rhubarb
1/4 cups sugar
1/4 cup enriched flour
1/4 teaspoon salt

Cut cleaned rhubarb into half-inch lengths. Add sugar, flour and salt to rhubarb and mix well.

Place on baking sheet and bake in hot oven (450 degrees F.) 12 minutes. Place a spoonful of jam or jelly in the top of each lily. Serve hot.

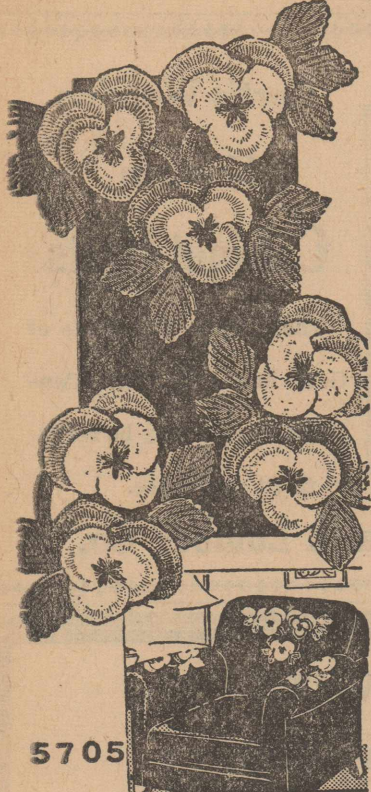

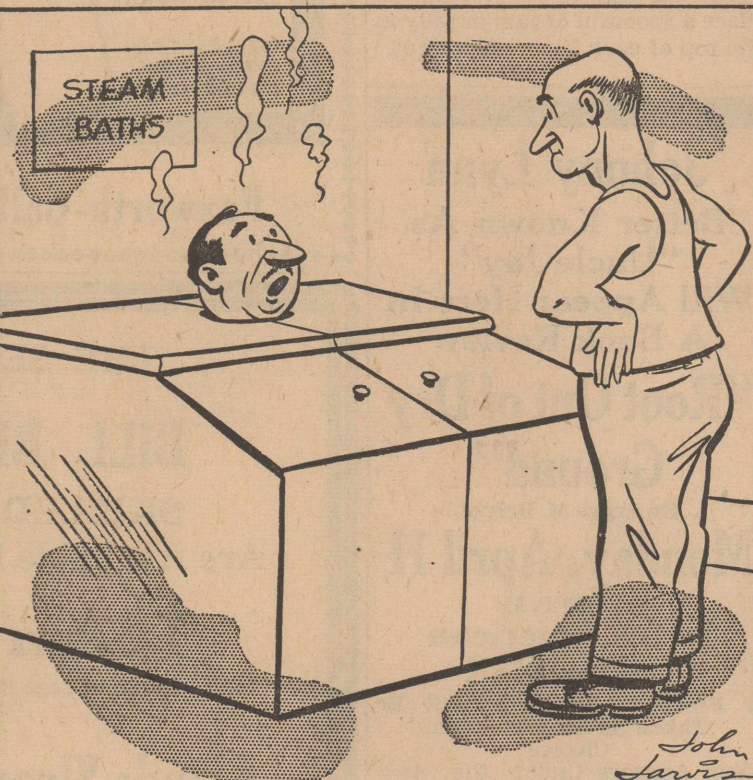

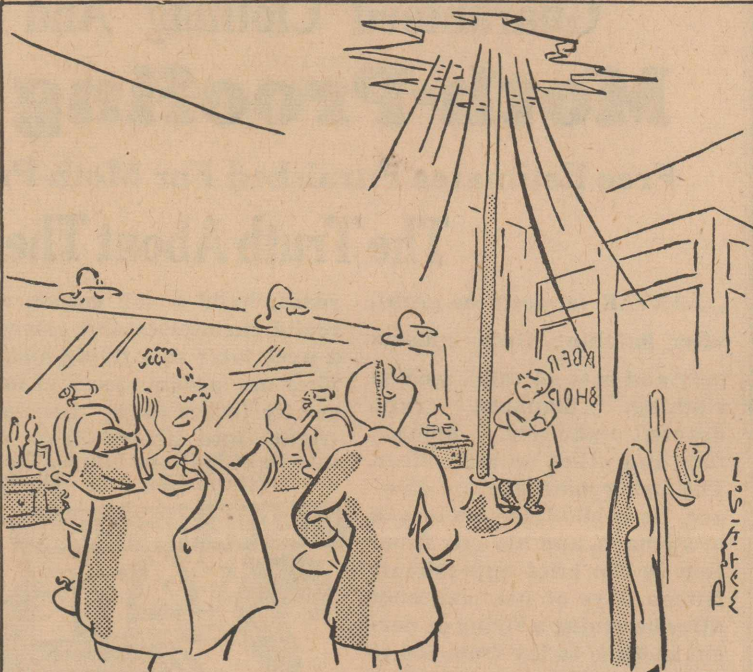

WORRYING is a fault and a habit. It is also stupid. But of this faulty, stupid habit, many women make a virtue. They are proud of their worrying. It nearly drives everyone mad; but they are meekly, resignedly proud of it.

Take the wife of the man who writes the following letter. He, Jim, is 40; his wife is 38. These are wonderful ages, the very cream of life. But for Rose the cream is curdled.

"The girls and I love Mama," writes Jim, or rather typewrites, on paper that shows he is the head of a wood and coal business. "We've got everything we want—a nice home, friends—and we're all normal people, no sickness of body or mind. So what can keep a sensible woman like Rose fretting and worrying, nagging and complaining is more than I can see. She says her mother was a great worrier, and says it as if it were something rather fine.

Others Don't Fuss

"But what she doesn't know," Jim adds, "is that a man is apt to meet other women who don't make such a damned fuss about everything. My agent in a near-by town is a young war widow, and is just a streak of sunshine. Nothing worries her.

"She'll fix a little meal up in the office; she'll laugh if anything goes wrong; she's sure this'll come out right and that'll all clear up, and it's a pleasure to be with her. She's got a boy of five and the way she handles that little fellow is a pleasure to see. They laugh together like a couple of kids.

"At home Rose begins nagging when I arrive and doesn't stop until I leave the next morning. Our girls are only nine and five, but already they are beginning to ignore her criticisms. Their clothes,

their health, our financial status, the weather, the people she sees and doesn't want to see, and the ones she wants to see who don't come, my manners if I'm too cordial, my manners if I'm too cool, my family's treatment of her when she was a bride 12 years ago—there's no end to it. If I get in a helper, the girl wastes everything and isn't clean; if I don't get her anyone, she's half dead with work.

"And all the time she's capable and hardworking and economical, and would die for any one of us," the letter continues. "But she sure does make life a burden for herself and everyone else.

Criticizes His Driving

"Then there's my driving. She leans over from the back seat and watches the road like a cat, and there isn't a chicken or a red light or a truck that she doesn't see 'way ahead. It gets a man nervous. The whole thing gets you down."

This Rose of Jimmy's sounds to me like a too-well known type. There isn't any advice or suggestion that will reach such a woman. She is too entrenched in her own conviction and righteousness.

Her defense would be that Jimmy is careless, that there are many accidents, that someone has to watch the family safety and sanity, that people would be wasting money and getting sick and spotting their clothes and leaving lights burning and running into traffic if she wasn't on guard. She would argue that she kept a perfect house, never rested day or night, had to assume responsibility because no one else would, and altogether considered herself pretty nearly the perfect wife and mother.

No, you can't reach the worriers, complainers and naggers with even the gentlest criticism. They are letter-perfect, and they would laugh at the idea that households need the spirit as well as the letter. The letter, says the wisest book in the world, killeth. But in the spirit is eternal life.

What might reach Rose's impregnable fortress of perfection is the hint of the other woman, in Jim's letter. The other woman, in his branch office in a neighboring town. The woman who is simple and cheerful and philosophical.

Grief and change already have struck at this woman. She is one of hundreds who were widowed in the war years. She had a child to protect. She had her living to make. And still she is happy and self-reliant and free from the swarms of mosquito cares that beset the more fortunate Rose.

Trail of The Cross

Lesson for April 3, 1949

THE TURNING-POINT in Jesus' career was dramatic. But the few friends who were present did not then realize what it meant. On a vacation journey, Jesus put to his most intimate friends this question: "Who do men say that I am?" Peter's answer, "Thou art the Christ," may sound obvious to us, but was not obvious then.

It was sensational so much so that Jesus did not want the publicity that would come to him if that name "Christ" were freely circulated. For the word "Christ" meant nothing less than "King." To the Romans it would sound like treason; but to the Jews it would sound like Judgment Day.

When Peter said, "You are the Christ," he was implying also: "You are immortal. You are the coming conqueror of the world. You are not in the same class with any other man. You will do for mankind what no other hero has ever done."

God's View and the Devil's

ON ALL THAT glowing devotion Jesus' next announcement fell like icy rain. In the ears of those friends of his it sounded like the bell of death. Never before had Jesus told them anything like this, and they must have found it hard to believe. For he had not a word about a throne, nothing about success, nothing about mastering the world. Quite the contrary. He must "suffer many things . . . be rejected . . . be killed." If they heard the words "rise again" too, the words made no impression.

For Jesus had announced what to them seemed impossible, absurd: He, the Christ, would be killed! Small wonder that Peter broke out—No, No! But Jesus would not compromise. He even called Peter "Satan" for thinking as he did.

The Christian church agrees with Jesus, not with Peter. We realize today, as Peter himself did afterwards, what the Cross of Christ means.

Buddha, founder of a very different religion, died in old age of over-eating. Can you imagine Jesus doing that? Suppose Jesus had taken Peter's advice and made arrangements to retire comfortably where he would never see a cross? Then we never should have heard of him. He would not have been worth hearing from.

One Cross is Not Enough

YES, WE KNOW now that the Cross of Christ is important. But we are a good deal like Peter, after all. For we do not listen to what we do not like to hear. And the next words of Jesus, on that historic occasion, must have sounded then as they do now, most chilling of all: "Whoever would come after me, let him take his own cross and follow me." In Jesus' time no one was ever seen carrying a cross who was not already under sentence of death and on his way to be executed.

Translated into modern terms, what Jesus said would sound as horrible as this: Any man who wishes to follow me must take his seat on the electric chair . . . must take his place in the lethal chamber . . . must put his neck in a noose . . . and follow me.

One cross is not enough. There must be other crosses. My road is a death-march. I want for my followers only those who are willing to take the same trail.

Trail of the Cross

SUCH WORDS sounded harsh then; but they do still. But in the light of the centuries, we can see what Jesus meant, better than that little band of frightened men around Jesus who did not want to hear the words "suffer . . . die." Jesus was not advocating pain for pain's sake.

Why did Jesus set his own face toward the cross? The Christian answer is, He did it—for others. Now what is wrong with the world today? It isn't that we don't wish our neighbors well; but the trouble is, we don't want to be bothered, our good-will is too tender to stand any strain, we will do anything for other people provided it doesn't hurt.

But the world can be saved only as men and women imitate and multiply the spirit of the crucified Christ.

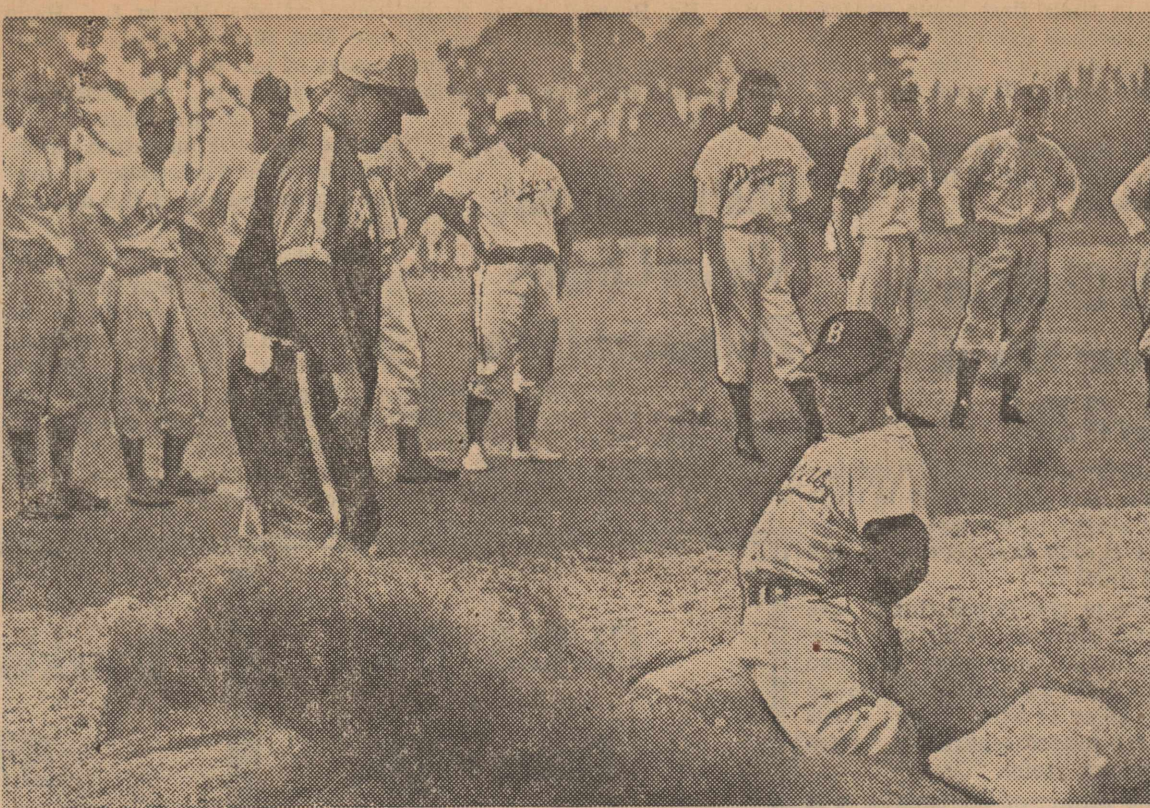

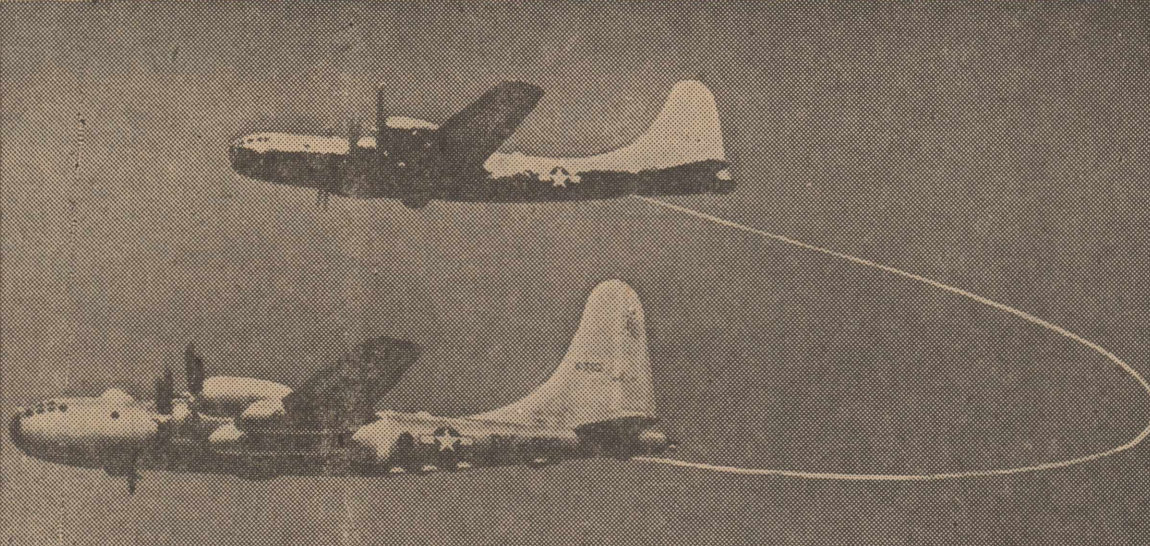

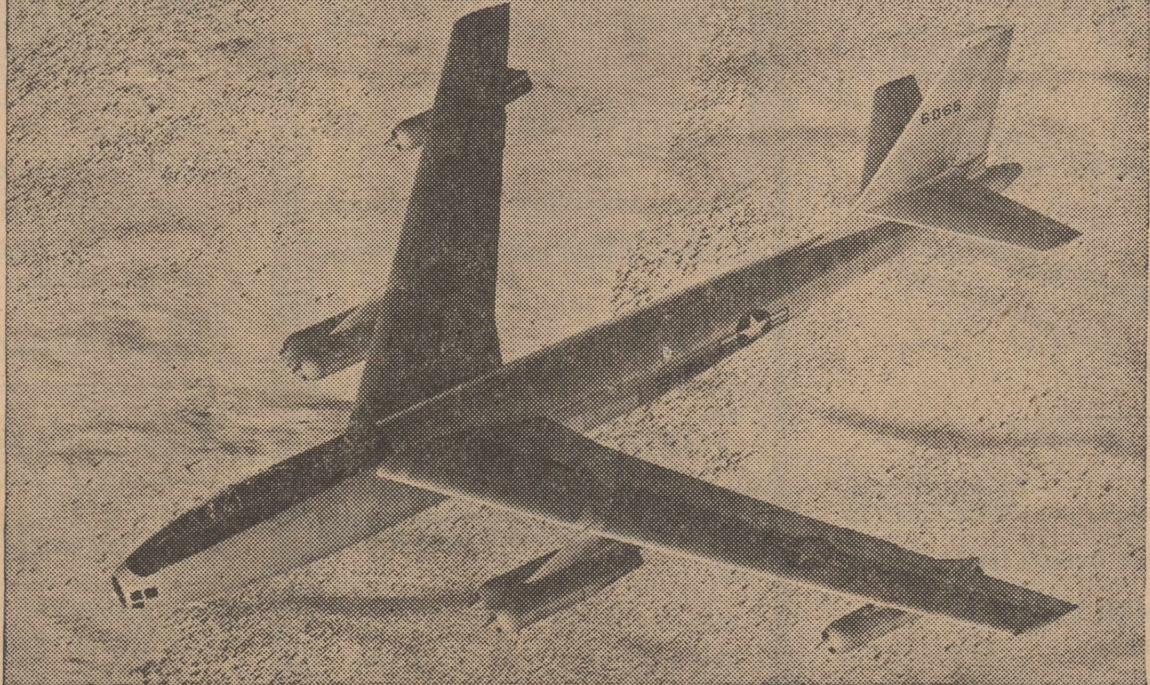

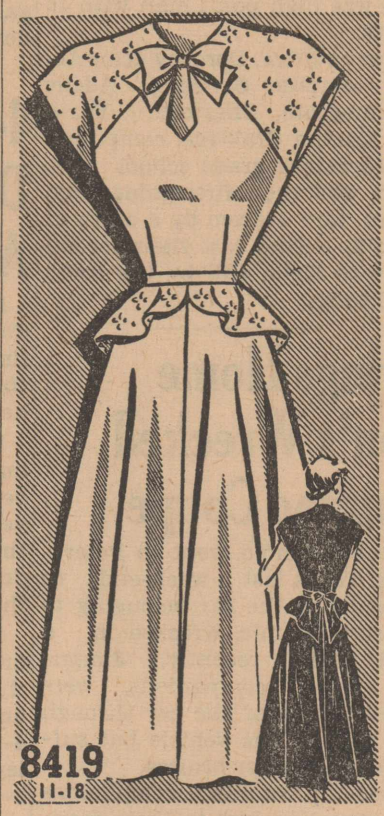
WORLD'S FASTEST BOMBER

The American Veterinary Medical association warns poultrymen against reaching for the sulfa bottle too frequently.

In a recent experiment, the production of 671 birds given sulfa for periods of from three to six days dropped 50 per cent; and, compared with a control group of 430, it took the sulfa-treated hens a month to reach a rate of production equaling that of the untreated hens.

The association points out, however, that this argument is not against the use of sulfa drugs when needed, but rather a note of warning against their overuse.
