The veterans will NOT be required to live upon the property but he will NOT be permitted to dispose of it for a period of three years.

For example, proof of the applicant's eligibility can be established by submitting a certified copy of his honorable discharge plus substantiation that the applicant was a resident of Texas at the time he entered military service and is still a legal resident at the time of application for land program benefits. For those taking advantage of the 90 day priority offered those who have a service-connected disability sustained in combat, certification of such must accompany the application.

Each veteran will be limited to one purchase not exceeding \$7,500 cost to the Board. He will be required to pay not less than five per cent down and execute an onor-before note for 40 years at three per cent interest for the balance.


Sportsmen Optimists





Atoms May Produce Limited Electricity In Next Three Years

WASHINGTON .- David E. Lilienthal, atomic energy commission chairman, believes that an experimental atomic energy plant might be producing electricity within three years. This first plant wou'd be purely experimental, he added, but within 20 years a sizable percentage of electricity would be produced by

Lilienthal denounced those who, he said, were trying to play down the atomic bomb as "just another explosive, another bomb."

"At first there arose a cult of doom, of dire things to come," he asserted. "We were told that atomic attack could mean a one-night

"Now it appears the pendulum is swinging to the opposite extreme. It is being asserted by some military men and some scientists that the atomic bomb is just another bomb, a super blockbuster, a piece of ord-

"This down-grading of the atomic bomb is the attitude of the Krem-

To accept this extreme could have these results, Lilienthal said: Revive the idea that atomic bomb stockpiling should be controlled by

Give the impression that the United States plan for international atomic control was "quite sense-Give the impression that the at-

omic energy commission was "merely a munitions maker" and a civilian front behind which scientists could work without suffering pricks of conscience. Lilienthal went on to say that



FARM VOTE:

Bait Is Set There was more to the Brannan federal farm program than had met the eye. According to seasoned Washington observers, the plan would serve as a bait for the farm vote in the congressional races next year.

For instance, if administration leaders could extend wartime price supports for another year, it would give voters a chance to pass on the controversial Brannan plan. Thus the plan could be dangled as a major issue when Democrats and Republicans began struggling for the important farm vote.

AT a midwestern Democratic conference, both Brannan, secretary of agriculture, and J. Howard McGrath, chairman of the national Democratic committee, made a plea for extension of the price support program as they began to plan for next year's tug-of-war with

McGrath, making it plain that the Brannan plan has Mr. Truman's endorsement, said continuation of the present relatively high-price support program was to be preferred to the Aiken long-range farm law passed by the 80th Republican congress. Unless congress acts, Mc-Grath pointed out, the Aiken law will go into effect next year.

The Brannan plan is designed to support farm income at a "prosperity" level, but at the same time to provide consumers with lower prices for perishable foods-especially meat, dairy and poultry products-when there are surpluses. It would use government payments to assure desired farm cash re-

PRESENT laws direct the government to support prices of major products at not less than 90 per cent of parity.
